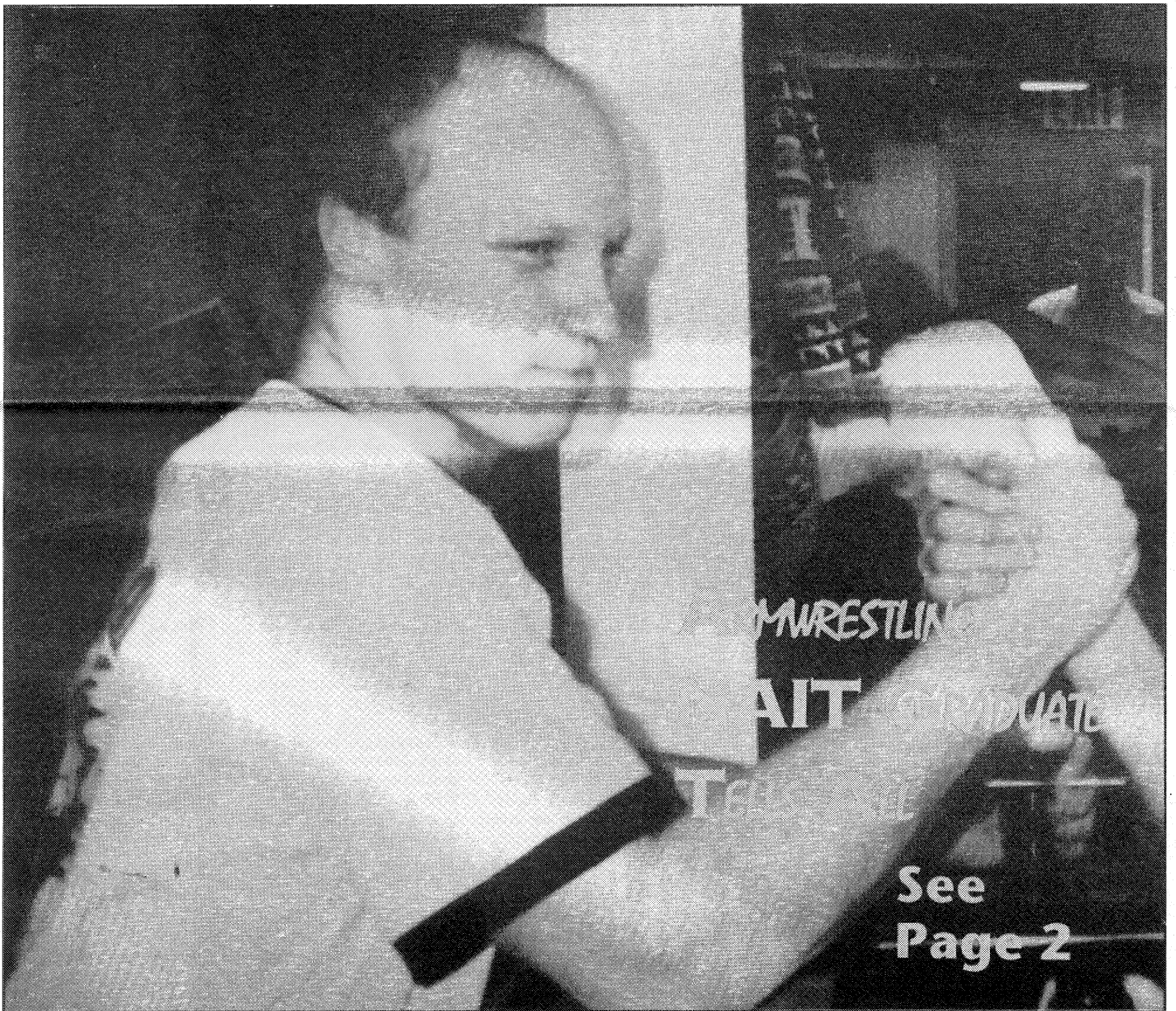

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NEST LOSING MONEY NEEDLESSLY

The NAIT lounge The Nest is losing money needlessly. Manager of The Nest, Waeil Yaggey, feels extending the hours that alcohol can be served will help in preventing The Nest from dipping into the red. This, Yaggey feels has been proven by other campus lounges.

RATT (Room At The Top), a student run lounge at the University of Alberta

verifies Yaggey's claims. "Any alcohol you sell above and beyond food sales is going to increase profits, especially if you have a full lunch time crowd." This is the feeling of the manager at RATT.

The Nest certainly has a full house come the lunch hour. Yaggey goes on to say that if he sold a minimum of 1 drink per table during the lunch rush, he could almost guarantee bringing The Nest out of a money-losing situation.

The Nest's profits run in a cyclical fashion. They could make money one year, and lose money the next. Before depreciation, The Nest made \$11,205 in 1993, in

1994 however they lost \$7,245. Yaggey feels by extending the hours of alcohol service he could eliminate losing money at The Nest. The biggest profits made at The Nest last year came from alcohol sales. These profits go directly back into the running and

not want to perpetuate drinking while classroom instruction is taking place. Two, a comparison of The Nest's hours to those of other technical institutes.

Jim Berg, Vice President of Student & Staff Services feels that these are the main two reasons to

his knowledge that the hours are not extended earlier. The Nest is owned by the NAIT Board of Governors and run by NAITSA. Essentially any decision involving The Nest must be put forth

by NAITSA and approved by the Board of Governors. Extending hours in which alcohol can be served falls into this category. Getzinger says that she and the rest of the NAITSA executive are there to serve the interests of their members. "If the majority of the students showed us that earlier serving hours is what they wanted we would do everything in our power to get that done."

As The Nest manager, Waeil Yaggey has petitioned the Board of Governors individually, but feels that the real voice that can bring the change is the voice of the students, who Yaggey feels would benefit most from the change.

Yaggey feels by extending the hours of alcohol service he could eliminate losing money

operations of The Nest. Angie Getzinger in charge of finance at NAITSA says "any profits made by The Nest would likely go back into The Nest in the form of new furniture or renovations. Essentially any profits made by The Nest are to the benefit of those who use it, students and staff." Yaggey feels that everyone who goes to The Nest would like to see the extended hours granted.

Why then are earlier serving hours not granted? This decision lies in the hands of the NAIT Board of Governors. The logic behind not allowing earlier hours of service is based on two criteria. One, The Board of Governors does

NAIT Getting Students Jobs

In the 1994 NAIT job placement survey, 73% of graduates received training related jobs either full or part-time. This figure sits well with both students and instructors. Warren Frey, a recent graduate of the University of Alberta came to NAIT for this reason. "After graduating from university I realized I wasn't going to find a job. Knowing of NAIT's success in job placement I felt my best option was to come here." With the current increases in post-secondary education costs an education must pay dividends. There is a common consensus among students, that investment in an education must pay off. As the 1994 placement survey shows NAIT is doing just that. An interesting comparison can be drawn between congruent faculties at NAIT and the U of A. 1994 figures released by the U of A in the faculty of engineering reveal that only about 70% of engineering grads are getting training related jobs. NAIT figures in engineering show that 80% of NAIT grads are finding employment in training related jobs. (Civil, Electronic, Geomatic, Mechanical, Chemical, Mineral considered). Although NAIT has approximately a 10% higher employ-

ment rate it trails the university in starting salary comparisons. A graduate of NAIT in engineering can expect an average salary of approximately \$25,000 per year. A graduate in engineering from the U of A can expect about \$37,000 per year. This figure seems large at first but education costs must play a role in salary comparison. Books and tuition at NAIT for a two year engineering program can run anywhere between \$2500 to \$3500. At the U of A cost of a four year degree including books and tuition run around \$15,000. Also a NAIT grad has two more years of earning potential over a university graduate. With figures such as these, and the increasing of education costs, NAIT's engineering program and others like it are soon going to see an influx of would be university students.

WRESTLING PERSONALITY

Some people golf. Some people shoot baskets. Others arm wrestle. Aaron Lengyel belongs to the latter group. In fact, he holds the title of World Champion in his weight division.

Lengyel graduated from NAIT in April '93 from the department of Instrumentation Design Technology. Currently his day job is working for Dow Chemicals in Ft. Saskatchewan as a Designer. By night he trains to uphold his world class title. You wouldn't know he is a world class athlete to look at him. He's about 5'8" and only weighs 180 lbs. He says he doesn't work out or follow a strict diet. He eats normally and practices arm wrestling three times a week for three or four hours at a time. Yet, he is able to beat competitors a lot larger and stronger than himself.

The reason behind this is good technique. You wouldn't think arm wrestling required competitors to think about and plan their next move. To be honest, the only arm wrestling I've ever seen has been at the bar after a few beers. However, Lengyel maintains technique is more important than strength or size. In fact he spends almost half of his training

time watching videos of himself and his competitors. Lengyel watches these videos to analyze his competitors' techniques. In turn, he is able to improve his own.

Lengyel got involved in wrestling in 1980 at the age of 14. He attended a competition called the North American Championship. He says, "I got smoked!" But with perseverance and guidance he consistently improved. At one of his early competitions a NAIT instructor, Tony Singer observed him and remarked that he was World Championship material. Lengyel and Singer have been friends ever since. Lengyel's first trainer was his older brother who is a retired five time Canadian Champ. Lengyel first became interested in arm wrestling watching his brother compete. He learned a lot by observing arm wrestling competitions.

In 1987, Lengyel's brother retired after the Over the Top competition in the United States. (Do you remember the movie with Sly Stallone?) Lengyel decided to retire also in 1987 at the age of 21. Lengyel says there was flagrant drug use which detracted from the sport. He didn't compete for six years after Over the Top. Last year

Singer convinced Lengyel to return to competing and reiterated his belief Lengyel might become World Champion.

In September '94 Lengyel competed with Team Canada in Sweden against 32 other countries and received a bronze medal. If you're interested, Georgia took first place and those strapping Russians took second. By October '94, Lengyel was back in the saddle. He placed first in the World Championship Wrist Wrestling Competition in Petaluma, California. He holds the title until the competition next October when he will have to wrestle again.

This April Lengyel will travel to Moscow to compete with Team Canada in the invitational Golden Bear competition. If you would like to watch Lengyel train for the Golden Bear, he has open practices every Tuesday night. If you are brave, you can even try it out. Lengyel says he trains with many people including women. Lengyel says women make the best students because they are willing to try without being competitive or embarrassed. He trains at the Rugby Hall in K division. In other words, he practices across the field from the RCMP station at 111 Ave. and 109 St.

Can you afford to pay more? The administration at NAIT says whether you like it or not, the price tag of tuition is on the up and up. This is the message the president of NAIT, Dr. Stan Souch delivered to General Council last Tuesday. Post secondary students are having nightmares about their expenses swelling yet again.

However, there are many reasons why tuition must rise. The provincial government reduced by 21% or \$19 million the grants given to NAIT in 1994. The problem is, where are we going to get the extra funding? The answer is to increase revenue or cut spending. Of course, this is the simpli-

fied version of the answer to NAIT's financial woes. The bottom line is that any decision NAIT makes will affect the lives of the students.

Cutting spending without reducing the quality of education is a daunting challenge. Because maintaining the quality of education is important the logical route is to increase revenue. The Oxford Dictionary defines revenue as "income from any source". In NAIT's case the total of all money received from all sources. NAIT's sources of revenue for their operating budget are government grants, private donations, fundraising and tuition. Grants

have been severely cut and fundraising does not accumulate enough money. Again, increasing tuition seems to be most reasonable conclusion. In 1994/95, tuition accounts for 14% of NAIT's operating budget. The NAIT administration's goal is to increase the percentage to 28% by the year 2000. This translates to approximately \$215.00 each year. This year tuition is just over \$1100. Next year NAIT will ask for just over \$1300 which is about a 15% increase.

As far as post secondary education in Alberta goes, NAIT is still an amazing bargain. Compare

NAIT to the tuition at the U of A. Students there currently pay almost \$3000, almost 300% more than NAIT. And for what? At the end of our programs, about 70% of us will get jobs in our chosen fields. That rate is substantially higher than the U of A's.

I'm not trying to knock the University. But I thought the comparison might enlighten some people to how good NAIT students have it. That doesn't mean we shouldn't constantly try to improve post secondary education. However, I think we should appreciate what we have even if it does cost \$215 more next year.

SLAP ON THE WRIST

In the last issue of the Nugget, a letter of apology was published regarding parking fraud. This letter was the punishment agreed upon by parking services and the guilty parties. Parking Service officials feel that this type of punishment, (public exposure of the offence amongst their peers), will prevent this type of behaviour in the future. The content of this letter conveyed an, OOPS! sorry about that message at best. This letter will end up doing Parking Services more harm than good. Other than having to print this semi-apologetic letter, the guilty parties were administered no other substantial punishments by Parking Service officials, no major fines, no parking privilege suspension, nothing.

In any system of justice the objective of punishment is to deter further offenses. Ask yourself this question. As a punishment, is a letter of apology an effective deterrent of parking fraud? Personally, I don't think so. If anything, this brand of slap on the wrist punishment will perpetuate further offenses. Take for example a student in his or her last semester of study. The risk of getting caught in 4 months is rather minute. And even if caught a letter of apology to people they will never see again is no big deal. Also consider the fact that to 98% of N.A.I.T. students persons found guilty of parking fraud such as Adam Lefebvre and Hugh Porter are names without faces. Parking Services should

be commended for the moral lesson they are trying to teach the guilty parties. Realistically though, how effective is this public letter of apology going to be as punishment for Adam Lefebvre and Hugh Porter. And more importantly though, how effective will it be as a future deterrent to parking fraud. A commonly held practice, and a quite efficient one is to take away a privilege that has been abused. That is a more suitable punishment for this type of offence. Parking Services should institute a more severe form of punishment. For example, the penalty for parking fraud should be as follows:

1. A charge of \$2.00 per day for every day wrongfully parked

2. A standard fine of \$100 to be paid to NAITSA, to indemnify the NAIT student body for any inconvenience caused by these illegal actions

3. Suspension of NAIT parking privilege for the duration of the offending parties studies or program

This type of punishment is one only type that will be effective. Admittedly school is not cheap, and cutting costs is the only way students can afford to attend these days, but ripping off parking should not be a cost cutting option, and stiffer consequences for parking fraud is way to ensure this.

Debt Debate

Some things know no limits. And if the federal government has its way, this may apply to students' tuition fees. This was the essence of Monday's debate between provincial Advanced Education and Career Development Minister Jack Ady and University of Alberta Graduate Student Association President Kim Krushell. The debate was prompted by the strike and march on the Legislature January 25. Students marched because they are outraged at the most recent federal government proposal to eliminate post secondary education transfer payments to the provinces. Minister of Human Resources, Lloyd Axworthy made the proposal which if implemented, will mean a 93% rise in students' tuition.

Federal government transfers for post secondary educa-

tion currently account for \$2.6 billion nationally. Of that, \$200 million is transferred to Alberta. This \$200 million could be loaded onto the students, by almost doubling tuition. To compensate students', the government will make student loans more accessible and make repayment contingent on income after graduation. Krushell says that with this approach, students' may graduate carrying debt loads of up to eighty thousand dollars. Both Krushell and Ady agree this amount of debt is unacceptable to Albertans. Ady has written a letter to Mr. Axworthy outlining his concern about the future of post secondary education in Alberta. Unfortunately, if the federal government proposal takes effect it could undermine accessible education in Alberta.

Alberta would like to maintain a 70/30 relationship. That is, the public would pay 70% of post secondary education while the stu-

dent would pay the remaining 30%. With the proposal of the federal government, the student would end up being responsible for 60%.

Krushell maintains that this policy will mean post secondary education is available only to the economic elite in Canada. Many people will reconsider getting a diploma or degree due to the debt they would incur. The debate attracted a crowd of about seventy people. No one appeared to represent NAIT. NAITSA President Dean Andres appeared after the speeches had been delivered and decided not to ask any questions or make any remarks on behalf of NAIT students. This is after NAIT decided to boycott the march on the basis that there are other avenues for the students to express their concerns.

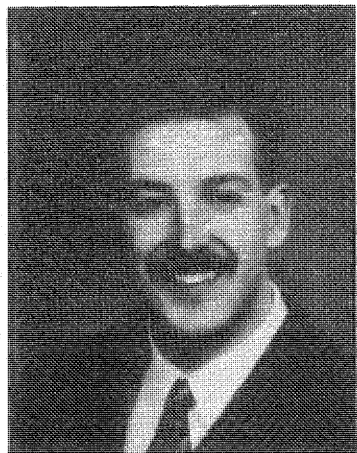

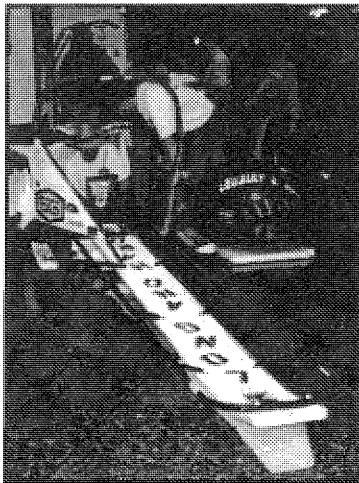

WHAT IS ANARCHISM?

The ideal of anarchism is a society in which all individuals can do whatever they choose, except interfere with the ability of another individual to do what they choose. This ideal is called **anarchy**, from the Greek *anarchia*, meaning absence of government.

Anarchists do not suppose that all people are altruistic, or wise, or good, or identical, or perfectible, or any romantic nonsense of that kind. They believe that a society without coercive institutions is feasible, within the repertoire of natural, imperfect, human behavior.

Anarchists do not "lay down blue prints for the free society." There are science-fiction stories and other fantasies in which anarchies are imagined, but they are not prescribed. Any society which does not include coercive institutions will meet the anarchist objective.

It seems clear, however, that every conceivable anarchy would need social pressure to dissuade

people from acting coercively; and to prevent a person from acting coercively is to limit that person's choices. Every society imposes limits, and there are those who argue, with the air of having an unanswerable argument, that this makes anarchism impossible.

But anarchy is not perfect freedom. It is only the absence of government, or coercive establishments. To show that perfect freedom is impossible is not to argue against anarchism, but simply to provide an instance of the general truth that nothing is perfect.

Of course, the feasibility of anarchy cannot be certainly proved. "Is anarchy practicable?" is a hypothetical question which cannot be answered for certain, unless, and until anarchy exists. But the question, "Is anarchy worth striving for?" is an ethical question, and to this every anarchist will certainly answer "yes".

As for me, I say, "Let's go for it!"

Well I guess I got told now didn't I, I only went in to the store to see if they had any copies of 'Doctor Hook's greatest hits' Sheesh!!

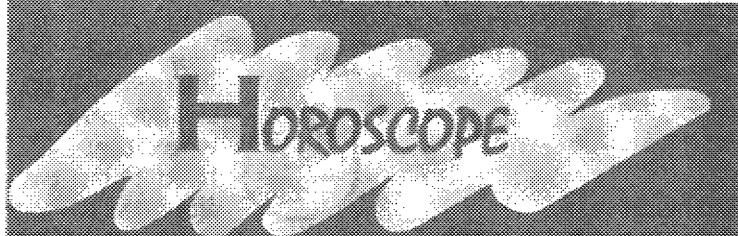

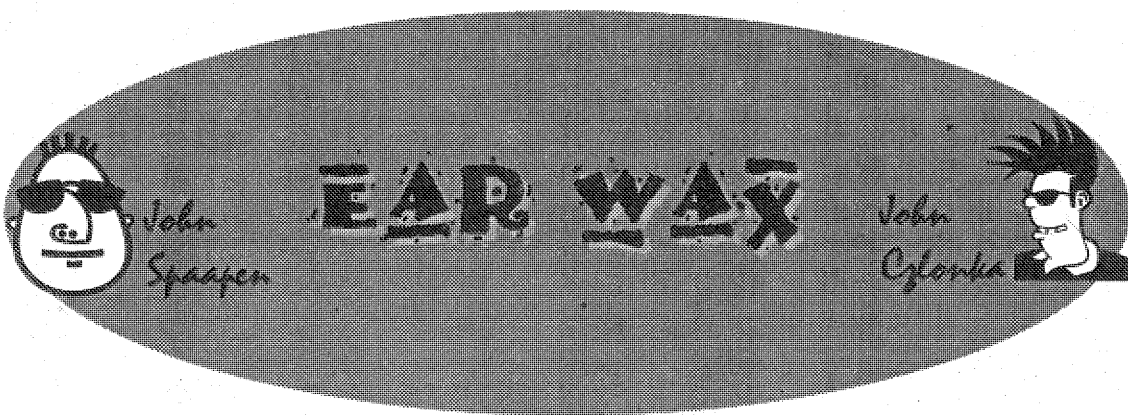

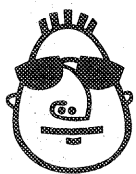


And yet I'm catching it on MTV's Buzzbin...

And I had my auditory senses pummeled by the 23 tracks on Rancid's blistering CD, *Let's Go*.



Hey, I loved *Whiteout*. Only I loved it more when Front 242 filled its last two albums with it, only done better.

I had heard that *Pandemonium* was the redefinition of Industrial "music", and for the most part, I agree. Having been introduced to the genre by such bands as Nine Inch Nails and KMFDM, I was prepared for another knock-off of their style. After listening to the first four tracks on the disc, I was ecstatic — an album that deserved to be placed on an altar, and paid dutiful respect to, I thought. Then *Black Moon*, the fifth cut, unveiled itself, and I almost fell out of the tree. Suddenly, the harsh vocals didn't fit — for God's sake, if you removed the distortion, this could be a Bryan Adams tune!



Hmph! Well, sir, I disagree. The six brutally harsh, throbbing bass, screaming guitar tracks that I thoroughly enjoyed on this disc make up for any shortcomings — and ensure this album a place in my CD player along with Nine Inch Nails' *Broken*, and *Blitzkrieg* by Excessive Force.

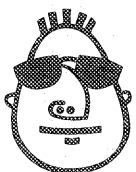

Ooks Battle for First Continues

Specialty teams came to the forefront as the NAIT Ooks (13-5-2) swept a home-and-home series from the Red Deer College Kings. The Kings had 19 power play opportunities in the two games yet failed to score a goal. In contrast, the Ooks received five markers from their specialty teams on the weekend and tied two ACAC records — most shorthanded goals in a game (3) and most shorthanded goals by a player in a game (2-Jamie Barnes). With the wins, the Ooks move into a first place tie with the SAIT Trojans.

On Thursday, the Ooks rallied to a 6-4 win in Red Deer. After falling behind 2-0 in the first eight minutes of the game, the Ooks re-

ceived strong goaltending from Rick Nichol and scored five unanswered goals.

One of the keys in the comeback was the outstanding work by the Ooks penalty killing unit who held the Kings' power play off the scoresheet on 10 opportunities. On two occasions, the Kings had a two-man advantage for a considerable length of time but could not capitalize. Shortly after each 6 on 4 situation, the Ooks bounced back with an even strength marker to turn the tide.

Dan Pilling paced the Ooks with two goals and two assists. Jason Sorochan, Stacey Rayan, Craig Samoil and Peter Kasowski also tallied for the Ooks.

Tom Mix replied with a pair for the Kings while Rob Clark and Chris Lenz added singles.

The two teams were tied at 2-2 following the first. The Ooks led 3-2 after 40 minutes before sealing the victory in the third. Red Deer outshot NAIT 42-38.

On Saturday, the Ooks scored three shorthanded goals to tie an ACAC record as they skated to an 8-2 win over the Kings at the NAIT Arena. The Kings went 0 for 9 on the power play.

Dan Pilling sparked the Ooks with four goals and an assist. Jamie Barnes tallied twice while the Ooks were shorthanded to tie the ACAC record for most shorthanded goals by a player in a

game. Craig Samoil and Darryl Romano added NAIT singles.

Clint Black and Darren Reeves answered for Red Deer.

Outshooting the Kings 45-37, the Ooks held period leads of 2-0 and 5-2.

The Ooks cannot rest on their laurels as they travel to the Stampede City for a weekend set with their Calgary rivals who each have a game in hand on NAIT. The Ooks meet the SAIT Trojans (12-3-4) in a first place showdown at the SAIT Campus Center on Friday at 7:00 p.m. The Ooks then face the Mount Royal College Cougars (12-5-2), a team which is only two points out of top spot, on Saturday in a 7:00 p.m. start at Centennial Arena.

This past weekend the NAIT Badminton team competed in the ACAC Regional #3 in Fort McMurray. Results not available at this time.

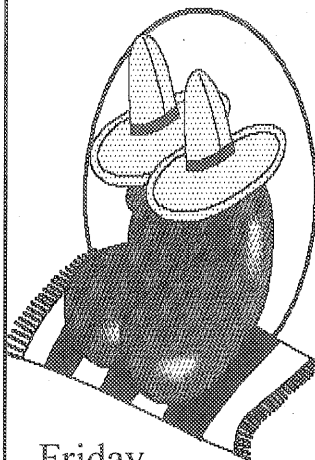
ACAC Athlete of the Week Nominee
