They would be happy to contract out for video production if anyone has the need.

Wassill first knew he wanted to be involved in film when he was 12. That was the year Wassill's family purchased their first video camera. One of his earlier products was a video for his junior high school detailing a school student exchange.

Wassill says his mentor is director David Cronenberg. "He takes a realistic look at the world by portraying it in a warped way." He also enjoys Quentin Tarantino films and hopes Pulp Fiction takes the Oscar for Best Picture as a result of its, "original directing style."

The NAIT team was in competition with Red Deer College's and Lakeland College's Carpentry students. The competition was essentially a playhouse build-off. Each team had 25 hrs to build a playhouse following a pre-determined blueprint and using a pre-determined amount of building materials. The teams did have a certain

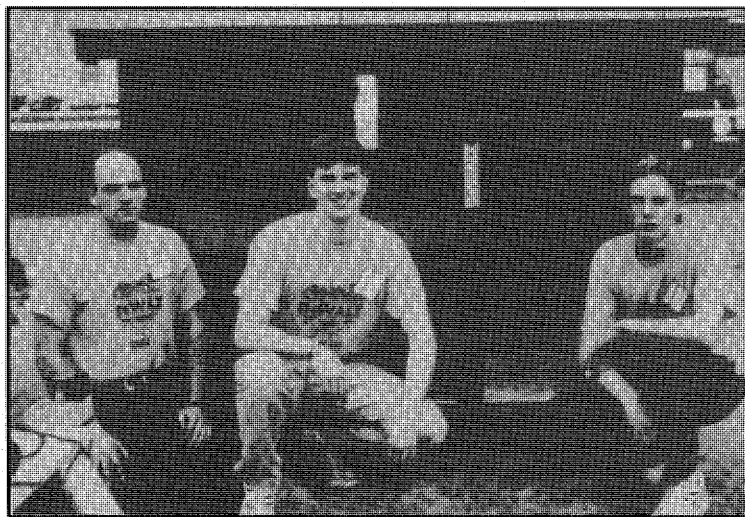
amount of creative leverage to improve upon the design and give it their own unique appearance. The judges decided the winner on several criteria. Ultimately though, the final decision was based upon craftsmanship and aesthetic appearance.

Athletics VP Mike Bitz felt that prizes like school rings, and vouchers from the bookstore were positive influences on the election. Whether or not the prizes were the major factor for the voter increase is speculation, and whether or not this practice will continue next year is up to the new student Executive.

Alrighty then, the students of NAIT proved the critics wrong. Last week was NAITSA elections week, as if you didn't know, and the turnout was a mere 1400 voters. A whopping 24% of the student body turned out to speak their mind.

Why such a response from a supposedly "apathetic" population?

One possibility was the prize draw incentives that this year's NAITSA Executive offered during the polling. The prize issue was a bit controversial, but it seemed to

serve the purpose it intended: Which was to entice voters to look at the candidates, not to win a prize. Maybe a little of both. However, I don't think this was the reason for a 14% increase over the turnout last year of 10%.

One of the issues brought up this year during campaign week was "how good a job this year's Executive did." A number of students, when asked this question, weren't satisfied with what they received. A very fair opinion when you think of the amount of money the Student Association handles.

What Happened?

However, I was fortunate this year to see exactly what the Executive did and I can tell you, they did a lot of work.

The problem is for most students NAITSA is a product that doesn't sell itself, it must be sold. The free events, activities, and facilities are strictly optional, not a necessity. The key is convincing the students that participating will be good for them. Not only to add to their experience here, but also to add to a part of post-secondary

education that's been lacking enthusiasm for a few years. Not an easy job.

The real reason for the 14% decrease in the apathy department? Awareness. The prizes may have pulled some students to the voting tables, but the awareness was out there. Floating through hallways and drifting in and out of classrooms. The key to a great experience at NAIT is knowing what's happening around you, and 24% is a good start.

By the way Heather, keep up the good work!!

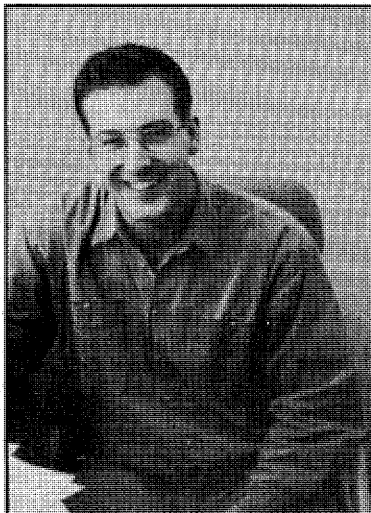

In The Nugget (Volume 32, issue 22), Page 9, somebody wrote that if a person stops breathing CPR is started. This is wrong.

CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) is used if no pulse can be found. That is, no heart beat. If a heart beat is found and CPR is started, the heart may stop beating or may beat irregularly. So come on out to PlasticFest '95 and have some fun, get crazy, let your hair down, kick up your heels. YEEEE-HAA!!

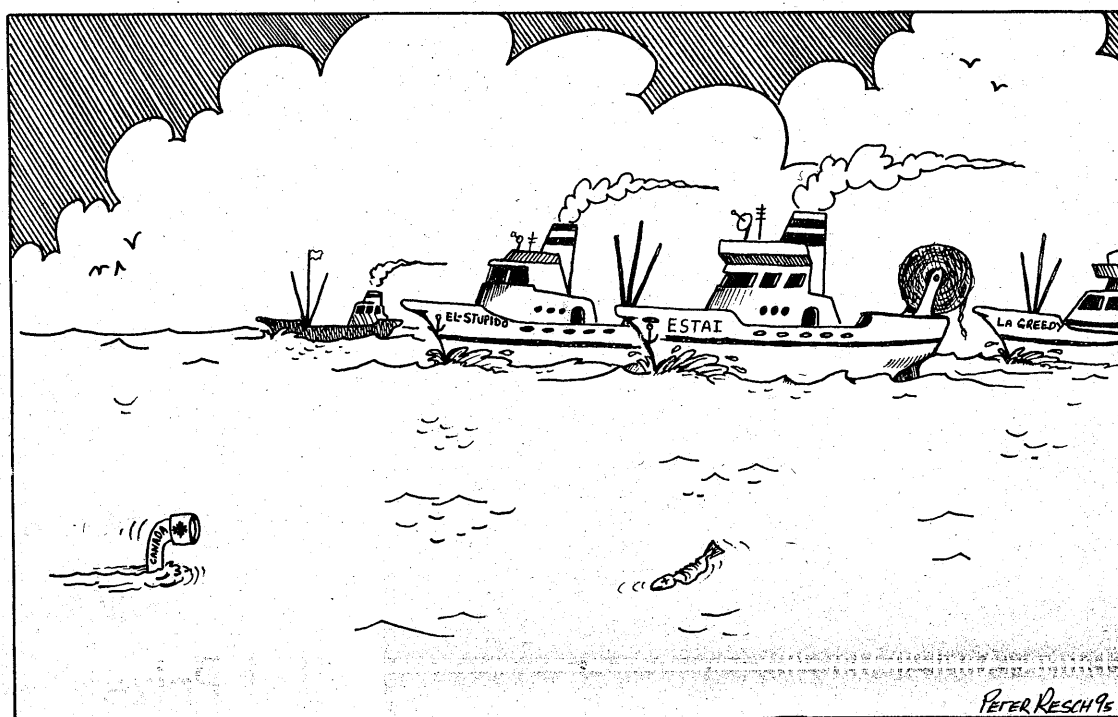
