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Intoxication As A Defense To Sexual Assault

A few months ago intoxication as a defence to sexual assault was a concept that seemed unthinkable but it has now become a successful legal defence. The decision of Queen vs. Daviault has caused considerable anger and concern within the community at large but especially to those most vulnerable to sexual assault. As difficult as it may be to believe, there is academic validity for its existence.

Mr. Daviault, a chronic alcoholic, is accused of having assaulted a woman confined to a wheelchair after consuming several beers throughout the day and the better part of a bottle of brandy after 6:00 p.m. He stated that he recalled nothing after arriving at the victim's home around 6:00 p.m. until he woke up in her bed the next morning.

His defence counsel obtained expert testimony that supported the theory that after a certain amount of alcohol is consumed by a man of Mr. Daviault's height and weight, the person would likely blackout and not recall his actions. This argument was taken to the Supreme Court of Canada where in September, 1994, it released its judgment, the majority holding that the argument is legitimate and should be looked at on a case by case basis.

For a person to be convicted of a crime, the court (judge or jury) must be satisfied beyond a reasonable doubt that the accused committed the action and had the necessary intention — mental component. If intention is missing, that may warrant a verdict of not guilty.

In the Criminal Code, there is

the defense of automatism — proceeding by action but having no mental component. In other words, the person is not aware of his or her actions. Sleepwalking is such an example.

The Supreme Court of Canada held that the defence of automatism may apply if a person is so intoxicated that he or she loses all recollection of events. Proof is required to show if the lack of recollection is legitimate and therefore each case must be determined carefully. The case of Mr. Daviault was sent back for a new trial to determine if automatism truly applied in his case.

While the decision may make academic sense, practically, the decision seems perverse especially when someone becomes extremely intoxicated by his or her hand. There have already been decisions in which the accused has been found not guilty of sexual or domestic assault by reason of extreme intoxication, one in which the accused was high on Crack-cocaine.

Rather than take anger out on the court system, we must ensure that the law is changed. The Minister of justice, Allan Rock, has pledged that the law will be changed in 1995 and his staff has produced a White Paper dealing with various laws that need re-examining, one of which is that defence of automatism and hence, the defence of extreme intoxication. Mr. Rock wants the reaction of the public in writing in order to draft a law that will protect the vulnerable and withstand any constitutional challenge. Primarily, Mr. Rock and his staff are wrestling with whether to make it ille-

gal to become extremely intoxicated or to be more specific and negate the extreme intoxication defence to certain crimes such as sexual and domestic assaults. He has indicated that he wants to present a new bill when Parliament next convenes which is scheduled for February 1995.

We ask as a group that you discuss how you would like to see the law changed. Talk to other groups on campus such as women's groups and exchange ideas. Keep in mind that the law has to withhold any possible constitutional challenge.

More importantly, put your comments and ideas in writing. Send it to the MP representing the riding that your College or University is in and send it to the MP representing your home riding. Send copies to Justice Minister Allan Rock, Sheila Copps and leaders and justice critics of the other parties. Whatever change is made, it will affect all of us.

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NAIT Goes Formal

The rumours are flying. All because Marketing instructors are attempting to change the way they relate to their students. People are saying everything from the "instructors are violating their contracts" to "they are protesting government budget cuts to education". If you've heard these tales, discount them. Exciting things like that never happen at NAIT.

The department of Marketing is testing a new approach to deal with increased class time and class size. Basically they are scheduling their office hours. According to Assistant Program Head, Brian Wrightson, the department of Marketing wants to "maximize instructors availability to students." The department began to notice students not being able to find their instructors. Many NAIT students have experienced the frustration of searching for an instructor... unsuccessfully. Now, instructors have appointed times they will be in their offices.

NAIT Academic Staff Association (NASA) spokesman John Miller said he thought the idea of posting hours is negative for both students and NAIT itself. Miller identifies it with "a change in culture at NAIT." One of NAIT's strong points is its informal relationship between staff and students. NAIT is also known for instructor availability. Miller feels

this will change. He views the new policy as a closed door policy similar to a university. Miller says posting hours, "tends to distance the two parties."

Wrightson disagrees. He chalks the rumours and NASA's opinion to a misunderstanding. Wrightson says the changes do not mean "a closed door policy with minimal contact between staff and students." He says the department has been implementing the changes for three months and posting hours seems to be positive. They are also openly consulting students about what they feel about the change. So far the feedback seems positive. Miller says Marketing is considering other options as well. Something needs to be done to counteract the negative effects of larger class sizes and more teaching time. Next year the classes will increase 21% - 36%. It's estimated each student adds fourteen hours of marking each year.

Other programs are considering the change but have not implemented the change yet. Wrightson feels they are waiting to see how the policy works out for Marketing.

NUGGET OK WITH STUDENTS

A marketing research study prepared for NAITSA last December showed that NAIT students are pleased with the Nugget. The survey covered a wide range of questions from paper appearance to frequency of publication. Of all the students surveyed only 12.64% of them don't read the Nugget at all. The remaining students read the Nugget somewhat frequently to all the time.

Of all the sections read in the Nugget, the Grapevines were read the most. 88% of those surveyed said that they read the grapevines. Second was the entertainment section, read by 61% of the readers. Classifieds are read by 57%, and sports by 51%. News was the lowest, only read by 49% of those who pick up the Nugget. The Long

Haired Hippy Freak's 'Top Ten' lists were also very popular.

When asked if the students would like to see the Nugget published more often, 65% of those surveyed said that they are happy with one edition per week. Over 70% of the students surveyed said that all sections were either average or excellent in their performance. The overall analysis of the paper from the survey showed that the paper is read and well received by a high percentage of the student body. Students were able to find both entertainment and information in the Nugget. Some concern was raised about lack of censorship in the Nugget. This concern was obviously not large enough to warrant a change or I and most of the staff would not be here.

a mini-skirt to get your votes, then she's lacking in the other qualities needed to get the job done.

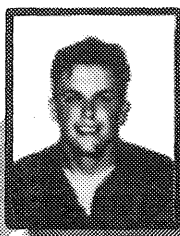
I don't know who is running and who is not. These are just general rules any fool can follow.

NAIT IN VICIOUS VOTING CYCLE

NAIT's apathetic voter turnout appears to be a no win situation. NAIT's student association elections consistently bring out a low voter turnout. NAIT ranks lower than most post-secondary institutions in this category. Last year the NAITSA (NAIT Student Association) election turnout was just under 10%. This figure is low compared to other institutions. Over the last three years the University of Alberta has averaged a 25-30% voter turnout. Grant MacEwen has also had an average of 20-25% voter turnout over the last few years. Adam Green at the U of A says that the national average for student association or

council elections is between 12% and 18%. Why NAIT's turnout is so low is still left to speculation.

NAITSA president Dean Andres feels that the low voter turnouts might be attributed to a couple of things. Andres feels that students in their second year don't bother to vote because they won't be there next year and thus the results won't affect them. Andres also feels that first year students at NAIT are not fully aware of the elections or the election process at NAIT.

Andres is considering giving out prizes to students who come out to vote. Although the details are not set, the prizes will prob-

ably be given to voters whose names are drawn at random. Andres feels that this is a possible solution to aid in voter turnout. Another way to increase turnout Andres hopes, is to increase awareness of the election and the election process. Andres also added that last year one of the reasons some students didn't vote was because they didn't like the hole punched in their ID card. This practice will be replaced this year by simply putting a felt marking on ID cards to show a student has voted already. These changes, Andres hopes, will help to raise voter turnout at NAIT in the upcoming election.

STUDENT AWARDS PROGRAM

The purpose of the Student Awards Program is to encourage academic achievement and provide financial assistance to students who are in financial need.

Various types of awards, such as scholarships, bursaries and prizes are available to full-time students. The majority of awards are available to students who have

completed their first year of study and are enrolled in their second year. For the majority of awards, no application form is necessary. Candidates are selected upon the recommendation of the Program Head. Selection of award winners usually takes place during the month of September and students normally receive their award by December 20th.

Some awards are administered outside of NAIT and require a special application form. Generally, selection is performed by the individual donors, and each award has a different application deadline. A list of these awards is published in the Student Awards Handbook. The 1995-96 Student Awards Handbook will be available in April.

There are some scholarships and bursaries which are administered by NAIT and require an application form. These awards are awarded on a competitive basis. Interested candidates must submit an application form. Application forms are available after August 1, 1995. The deadline for submitting a completed application is September 30, 1995.

If a person was to evaluate any Students' Association, the only problem they would find is a lack of continuity and experience by the incoming executives.

I feel NAITSA must maintain its strong ties with ACTISEC in its rally against the government to halt/minimize any further increases that may occur in the future. NAITSA must also continue to help support the Institute through any donations and promotion of events such as the SS Benefit Cruise, NAIT Foundation Phone Campaign and the Hockey Draft for Dollars to help offset any cuts in government grant money given to NAIT to cover its operating costs.

What changes would you like to bring to the position?

The past year, Dean has shown an incredible work ethic and commitment to the position and students of NAIT. Therefore, I don't feel any changes to this position are required. What I will do is continue where Dean left off and bring the same qualities to the position.

Other comments?

Students should be more aware of what NAITSA does for them and realize it is only as effective as they will allow it to be. An excellent start to the new term would be to see student participation in the elections. An increase from the 10 % voter turnout last year would signify this start.

Remember March 17, 1995 is the beginning of the new year so take the time to vote and take part in your education and campus life.

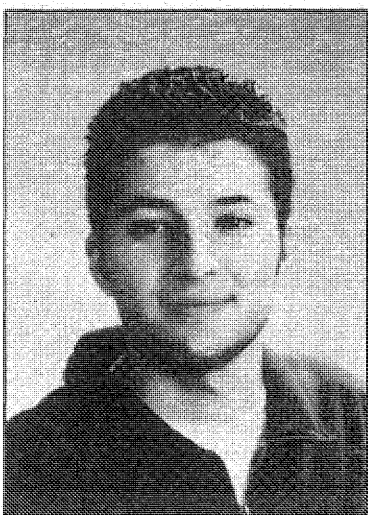

CHRIS CHELMICK

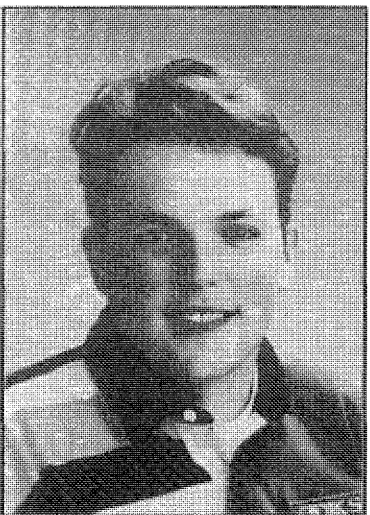

ball, soccer, and basketball teams which helped me develop solid leadership skills.

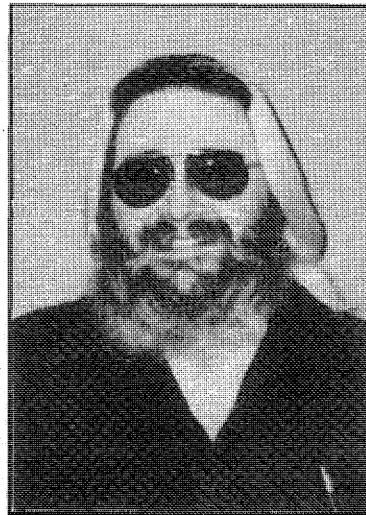

In 15 seconds they were back in Federation space and the series took an unexpected finale.

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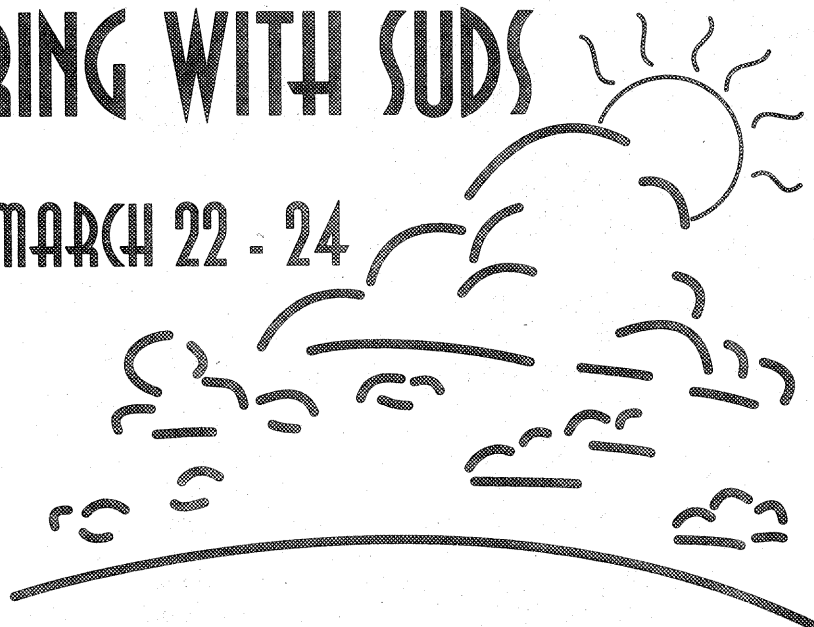
