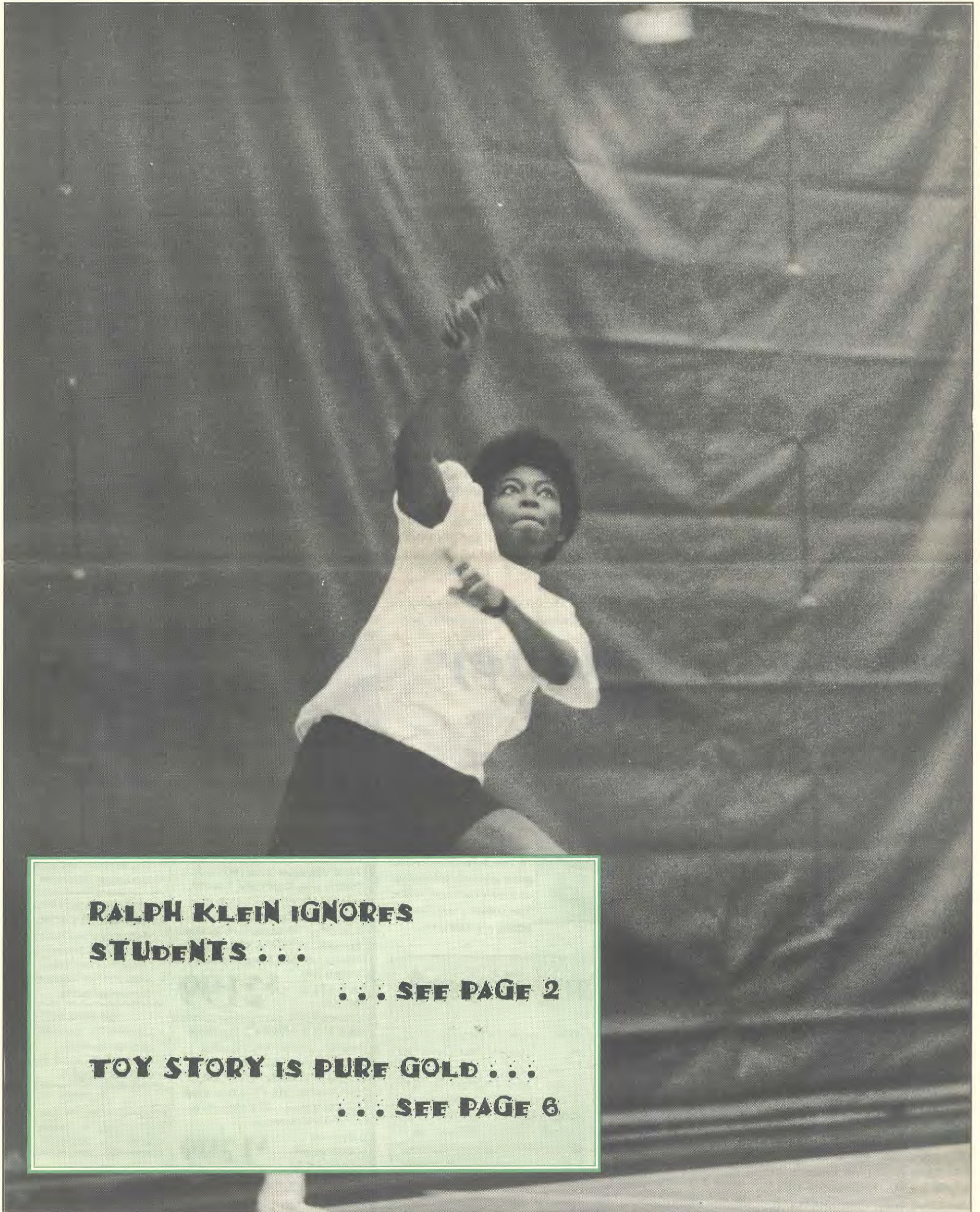

## Ralph ... are you listening?

On October 14, Premier Ralph Klein made a guest appearance at convocation (at the University of Calgary) to insult students.

"I am angry that Klein would have made comments like this he knows to be false," said Kate Kimberley, U

of C Students' Union President. "It was totally inappropriate to make those comments where he did, when he did."

Klein stated, after his convocation address, students agree with rising tuition because they have not protested.

"He's ignoring students," said Kimberley. "Students have been hit directly in the pocket book. Klein is implying we haven't noticed any change — it's totally untrue and it's insulting."

Jack Ady, Alberta Minister of Advanced Education, said Klein didn't intend his remarks to be taken as an insult. However, Klein made

similar remarks at a recent conference at the University of Alberta that were taken by students to be insulting.

According to Ady, students are very involved and have greatly affected the state of Alberta education.

"I was surprised at Klein's comments," said Murray Fraser, U of C President. "It is my view that students have acted responsibly in both internal and external relations. It may be, however, their representations have gone unnoticed." Kimberley said the premier has a duty to stay in touch with his ministers, and if he had, "he wouldn't have said those words, which were not in anger but in ignorance."

The ignorance Kimberley refers to is of both student involvement and the damage funding cuts have caused to post-secondary education.

"When Klein says students aren't protesting, it implies that the cuts aren't hurting students — they are," said Lance Kayfish, U of C Students' Union Vice President (external). "For an area of the population who traditionally don't have a lot of money, students are sucking up a lot of the debt." Provincial cuts have forced tuition to skyrocket, increasing over \$1000 over the last four years and expected to increase well over \$2000 per year until the year 2000. At the same time the provincial government is

forcing tuition to rise, the value of a degree is dropping. Statistics Canada reports that the annual earnings are down and the unemployment rate is up for graduates.

"Students are being forced to make a sacrifice and it's hurting them, anyone who says differently doesn't see the big picture," said Kayfish.

The damage caused by cuts goes deeper than just the pocket book.

Pouring money into the debt instead of education aided in placing the U of C dead last in the MacLean's magazine university rankings; cuts are causing the U of C to lose respect nationally.

"Make no mistake: the U of C, once a fine, striking university with grand dreams, is now deeply demoralized and sliding into government induced decay," claimed Calgary Herald columnist Don Braid.

"What makes this situation worse is that Klein won't acknowledge there's a problem," said Kimberley. "When we protest, Klein claims he won't blink. And when we voice our opinions through communication channels set up by the government, he claims it's evidence we are in agreement."

His comments have cast a shadow of mistrust on future discussions."

## Keep Your Money in Your Pocket

Great news! You can still afford to take the bus. City council decided to freeze transit fares for '96. You won't be shelling out any extra dough to hop on that bus or board the LRT. The problem is that someone has to pay for the service. Council decided to draw the money from an insurance fund. The cash in question was collected from an incident last year. An LRT worker was caught and charged with stealing two million dollars from fare boxes. The insurance payoff from the ex-worker's crime is what shielded bus riders from an increase in ticket prices.

The decision to use the insurance money created a number of last minute changes. Before last Thursday, transportation officials were proposing to take serious measures. Cuts needed to be made in order to save 1.4 million dollars. Officials were ready to slash bus service by 40,000 hours per year. Another plan saw post-secondary students paying an extra six dollars a month for a bus pass. Passes would have then cost 48 bucks a month. That's steep when you're living on a shoestring budget Maitson tried to reason there was room for a price hike since Edmonton enjoys some of the lowest transit fares in Canada.

The down side is clear. Edmonton's Transit System needs reworking. Councilor Michael Phair proposed using the insurance money. He is happy the idea helps, but he is aware of long term problems that have to be taken care of. Phair is most concerned with "declining ridership." Mayor Bill Smith shares Phair's concerns. Smith



is happy with the freeze, but admits that Edmonton "can't keep patching this thing." The mayor says "sooner or later we'll have to find some long-term solutions." One of the mayor's election promises was to reduce transit fares to only one dollar. That probably won't be happening any time soon.

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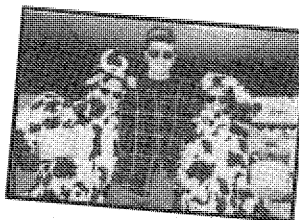
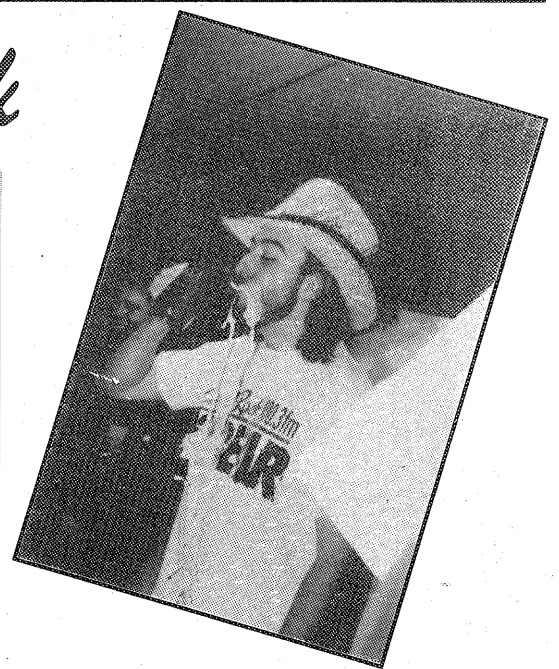
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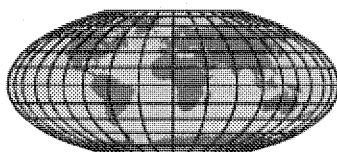

### HANGINGS PROTESTED

Edmonton was part of a national movement last weekend. Protesters rallied outside a south side Shell gas station on Saturday afternoon. Killings in Nigeria are what sparked the demonstration.

The Nigerian Military Government executed environmentalist and Nobel Peace Prize nominee Ken Saro-Wiwa along with eight other Nigerians earlier this month. The protest is against Shell Canada importing Nigeria's oil products. Protesters believe that boycotting could help save the lives of others who are in danger of being executed.

Greenpeace is fighting a similar battle. They are targeting Irving Oil Canada. Greenpeace official Jeanne Moffat says "rapid action is needed." Moffat claims "the Nigerian government continues to arrest and to persecute environmental and

human rights activists." Irving accounted for 40 percent of Canadian Imports of Nigerian oil last year. The sentiments of Greenpeace and the local protesters are the same. They are looking to raise awareness of the deaths in Nigeria.

Amnesty International has identified 17 more Nigerians who possibly face execution.

### DIVORCE ME, I'M IRISH!

Divorce is now legal in every Western Nation. A 58-year-old bill that banned divorce was overturned in Ireland recently. Like Quebec's referendum, a yes vote won by a small margin. Only 50.2 percent voted yes to legalize divorce. Drawing parallels again to Quebec, this wasn't the first time a vote was cast. Back in 1986, Ireland voted nearly two to one against legalizing divorce. This time around, all five of the major political parties backed the change. Pre-polling estimates

showed 75,000 (or four percent) married people stuck in a broken marriages. The vote was crucial politically as much as it was socially. Government officials of the predominantly Roman Catholic country were scared of a "no" verdict. They felt a "no" decision would harm the relationship with Protestant Northern Ireland, which supports divorce.

Ireland's Health Minister Michael Noonan was happy with the "yes" decision. Noonan believes that the main supporters of the "no" side were "middle-aged and older men, both clerical and lay, who wish to keep women in a subordinate role."

The new law permits divorce in situations where couples have been split up for four out of five years, and who could demonstrate "no reasonable prospect of a reconciliation."

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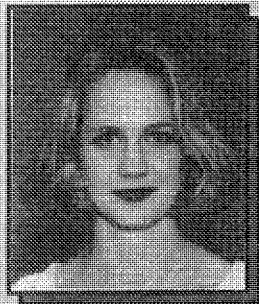

## Common hour, what does it mean?

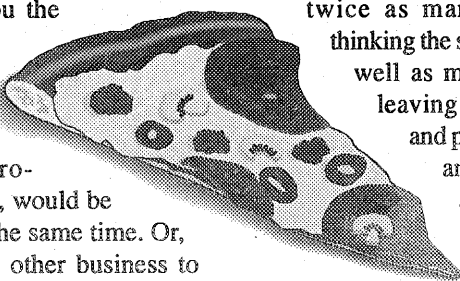

### Managing Plastics Waste

N. Piquette,

I think you misinterpreted a line in my article ("...plastic dumped into paper bins means a return of the whole... cage...")

Plastics are not compatible with paper recycling and vice versa. Therefore the importance of separation at the source of collection was being stressed, not that "plastics are bad, period." Mix anything into any recycle box on campus, and garbage results because it is not cost-effective to pay someone to manually sort recyclables at NAIT.

Our campus is generally "tree-hugger territory", but not radical, only realistic. So a recycling program begins only if participation is voluntary and the process at least covers its own costs. Notice that we did not harvest newspaper until the price of newsprint rose and made it economically feasible. Similarly, plastics are unfortunately not currently easy to recycle because of the many variations to separate before thermoplastics melted or thermosets ground up for filler.

Are we being irresponsible to our natural world by adopting this stance? Yes. However, contrary to what you said, plastics are not the largest landfill item: paper is. In 1990, two years after the Blue Box Program was started, the Cloverbar landfill was investigated: an estimated 45% of its content by weight was paper and cardboard while plastics made up 9%. (Yard waste and organics made up 28%, while metals, glass, textiles, minerals, and miscellaneous made up the other 18%).

Dig to the bottom of this landfill, and you will find perfectly preserved newspapers printed in 1975 or earlier that look fresher than the one you're holding. Anaerobic and dry conditions guarantee that millions of phone books, for example, just sit there. Clay partitions protect our ground water from toxic waste, but also ensure everything dumped is just land filler at best.

Your claim that NAIT has not researched recycling plastics is false. Five years ago, results of this option and others were published in the Packmore study, available in the library. This study helped direct Custodial Services to cut waste in half since its publication. Nowadays you will be proud to note that NAIT recycles materials like wood, metals, cooking oil, and chemicals. Hopefully, plastics will be on the list in the future.

P.S. Did you know that the organizer of the Environment Committee,

Doug Popowich, is a proud Plastics student? Any students interested in joining are invited to come to our next meeting; ask at the NAITSA office for the time and place.

### Student feedback ... not evaluation

Dear Editor,

In your opinion article November 16, you have made several errors about NAIT's feedback on instruction. Unfortunately, your article adds confusion to a process that is already misunderstood by many staff and students alike.

First of all, it is FEEDBACK, not an evaluation. The point is critical to understanding the process. By using the term feedback, students can express their opinions, suggestions, and their observations. The feedback forms clearly state that students are to provide honest opinions and constructive suggestions when they fill them out. Also, the questions on the forms are phrased to elicit student views, rather than facts. This distinction allows for opposing beliefs to appear on the forms.

The term evaluation implies that the statements made are factual, based on a set standard, and there are consequences based on the result. Facts, by definition are indisputable, and verifiable. Also in an evaluation, the evaluator has the same, or better credentials as the person being evaluated.

Secondly, the feedback process is on instruction, not specifically instructors. Certainly, instructors are a significant part of the instruction process, but there are more factors involved that are important. The form also asks for opinions on these items.

Other misleading statements made are about Program Head initiated feedback. This feedback can be started informally or formally, but a formal complaint is not always a written one. The Program Head may exercise the discretion not to solicit feedback, if they view the complaint as frivolous. In either case, the student as well as the instructor, is informed of what is happening.

These forms are not signed for legal purposes, but rather so that discussion can take place. The feedback is discussed among all parties when it is processed; however, in no case do students and staff "go at it head-to-head" as in your statement, "the accuser has the right to

challenge his accuser," would have people believe.

Currently, Academic Council is simply examining at the feedback process. This examination may lead the Council to improve the current system; in fact, divisional administrations have already made significant progress in this area.

Finally, your article is very negative towards the whole system. NAIT prides itself on a policy of fairness, respect and benevolence in dealing with anyone; a policy that it carries out. Using phrases such as "if he's a poor instructor, he really doesn't care," and "...what other purpose does this serve? Not much," and "this same instructor could receive bad evaluations semester after semester to no avail" implies that you do not believe in any of those values.

If you wish to provide an informed article on the feedback system, I suggest you interview the following people: Terry Cooke, Associate Dean of Engineering; Dini Corbett-Lourenco, Assistant to the President; and Oliver Samarutunga, an instructor. Terry Cooke has been forming new feedback practices in his division. Dini Corbett-Lourenco has recently completed a major study of the NAIT feedback system. Oliver Samarutunga has been through a Program Head initiated feedback cycle: one that his supervisor felt unnecessary, but Oliver encouraged to occur. Once you have discussed the matter with these people, you will be able to present an informed article for the student body.

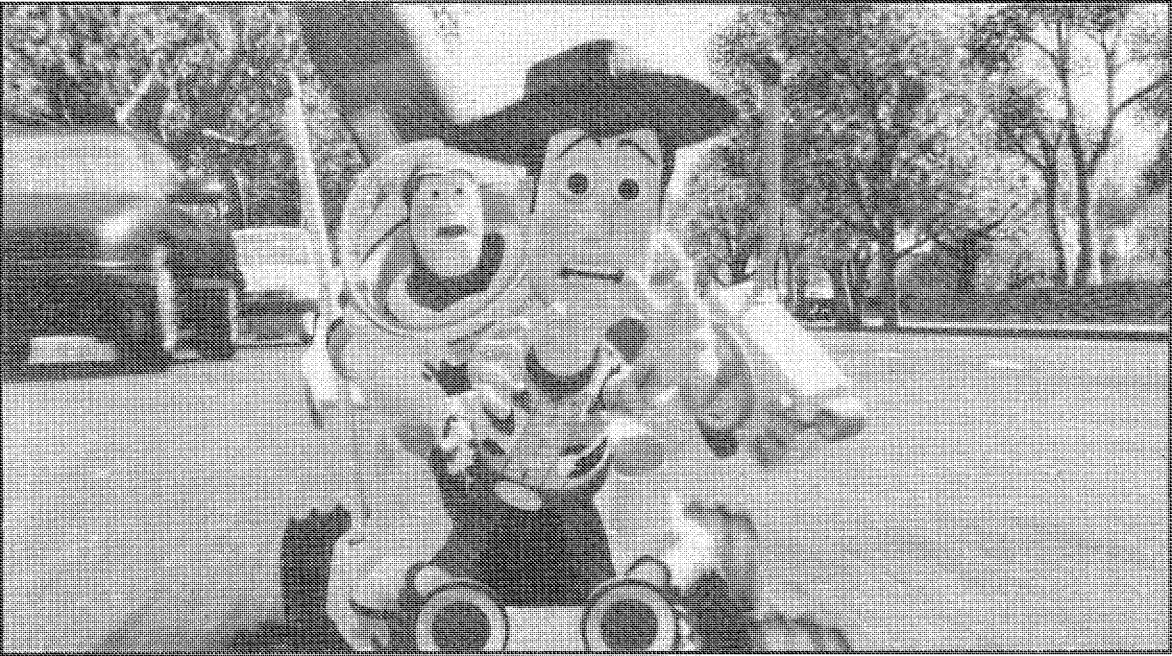

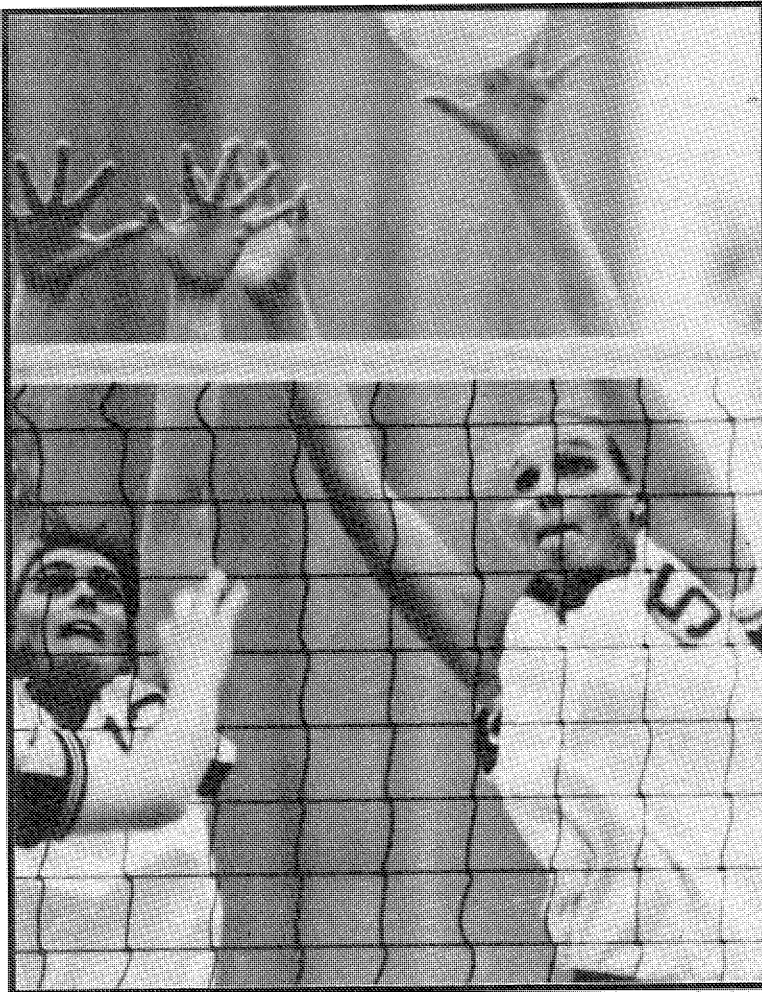
The Oaks and the Rustlers only faced off in four games. NAIT had the lead many times in the final two games, but lost their grip in the end. Lakeland carried on to win.

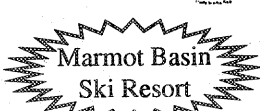

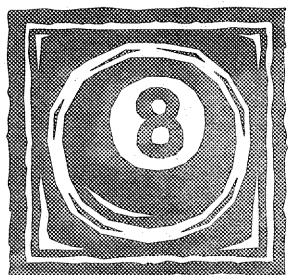
The NAIT Team will continue to train through to December 15 at which time they will break for Christmas.

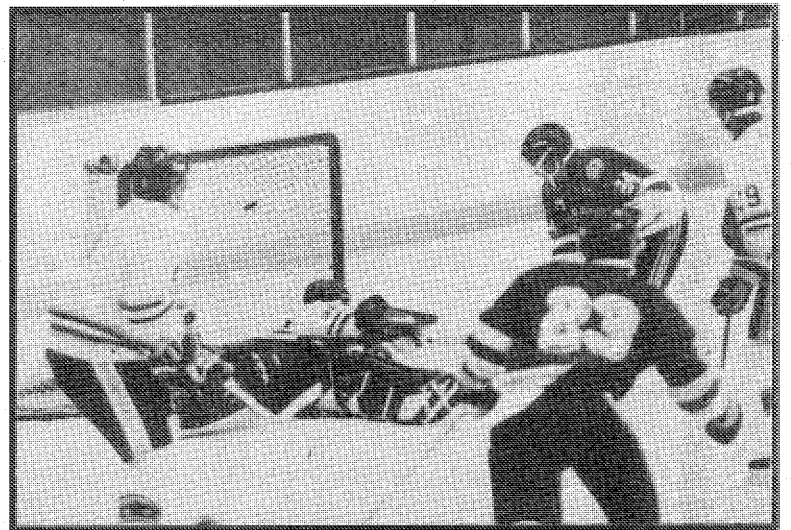

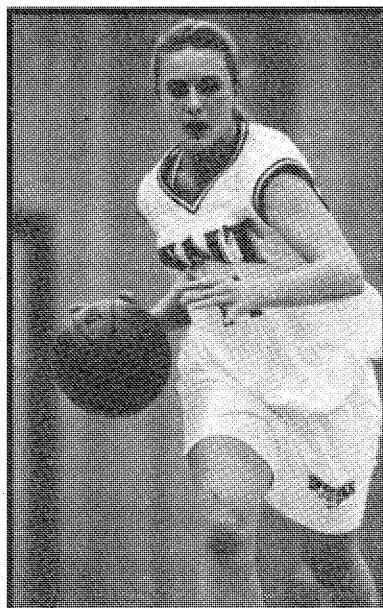
