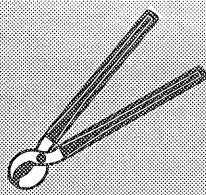
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CRIME ON CAMPUS



Drivers be wary

Your vehicle may not be safe. Incidents of theft and vandalism at NAIT are up. With all the publicity this issue has had, this should not be shocking news. It still leaves victims frustrated, and angry though. A NAIT Student,

Cameron

Weichel, was surprised to find that he is the latest victim of parkade crime after discovering his car was keyed. Weichel said he was "insane with anger." He just couldn't believe it. He says, "it was my worst

dream come true." Weichel was "in total shock. What can I say, I'm still just livid. Only a coward would touch a person's car. If someone has a problem with me," says Weichel, "they should confront me in person, not be cowardly about it." The damages are close to eight-hundred dollars. This senseless crime could now end up costing everyone who has insurance just a little bit more.

Head of NAIT security Dick Maertens-Poole, is surprised and confused by the incident.

Maertens-Poole says it's unusual for "a car to be keyed, because normally there is not just random vandalism in the

parkade." Usually it is done by someone who is upset with someone else, and as Maertens-Poole puts it, "trying to correct a perceived wrong." Poole says "you might see it on the street, where kids are walking by, for the sake of doing something that they'll

run a key along a car. But to go into a parkade and target one car, it's very unusual." The head of security is concerned with the amount of problems NAIT has already had in the Parkade

this year. Just last month, in the span of only a few hours, on one morning alone, there were three break-ins. The crimes have mostly been because a thief wants the electronic goodies inside.

The increase in incidents has prompted the addition of two new security guards to patrol the parkade. The head of security feels this doesn't solve everything though. Poole feels that there would have to be a security guard on each level of the parkade at all times. This measure is just not feasible. If you notice anything suspicious, call NAIT security at 471-2400.

The atrocities of war

Reflections on the Second World War

Leon Bass is a veteran of WWII. He was a member of the 103rd Engineer's Battalion. He recounts walking through the gates of a liberated concentration camp, the infamous Buchenwald: "I could never, ever forget that spring day in April when I walked through the gates and I saw there in front of me what I now refer to as the walking dead.

I saw human beings that had been beaten and starved, they'd been tortured... They were skin and bones. They have skeleton faces with deep-sunk eyes... they stood holding one another just to keep from falling."

Bass spoke of other atrocities. He saw a laboratory with jar after jar of human noses and ears and other body parts left over from medical experiments. Human skin had been fashioned into camp shades.

There had been many children in the camp. But all that remained were piles of clothing, booties, and little hats. He was shown ovens still full of ashes, charred human skulls and rib cages.

"I stopped. I said to myself, what is this insanity? Who are these people? What have they done? What could cause people to do this to them?" Some would say war itself is the answer to Bass' last question. The Allies were no less amoral than the Germans. WWII became a war of attrition. Is it any more moral to drop 500 pound explosive devices into residential areas? They say "air was on fire" during the bombing of Dresden. Imagine that, the air being on fire.

Atrocities were and are committed on all sides. Accounts of American Soldiers in Vietnam cutting off

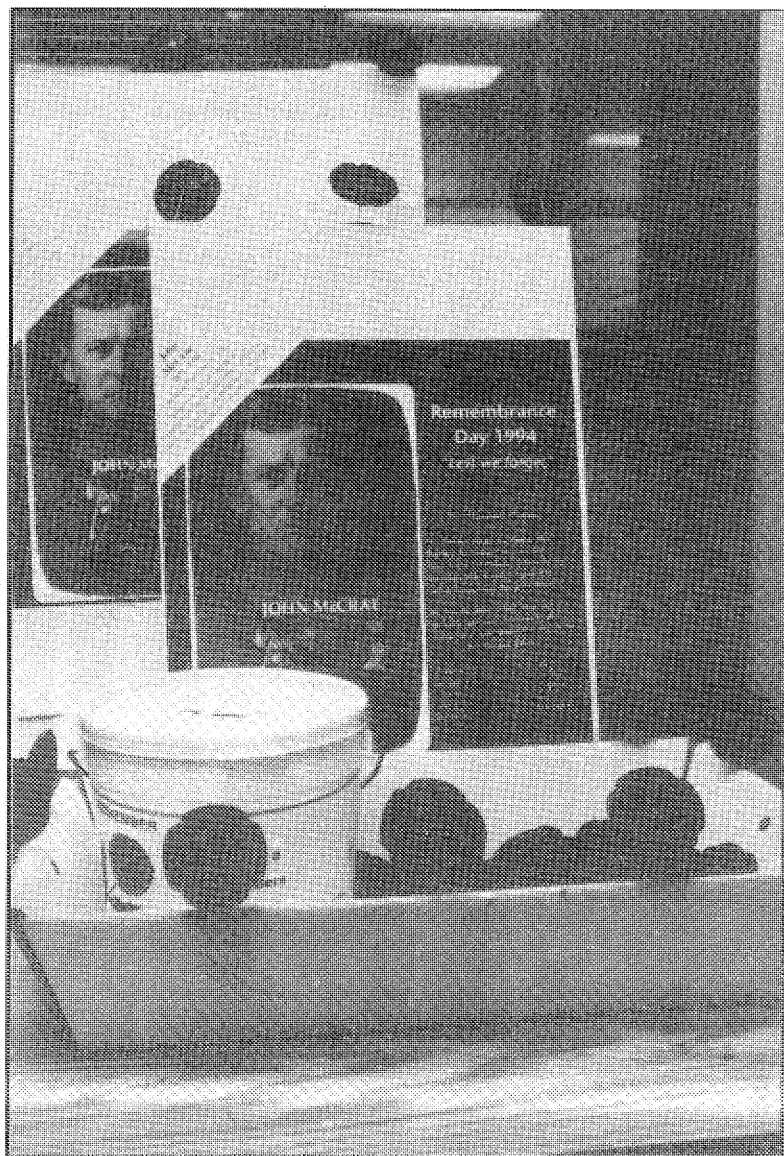

the ears of dead enemy soldiers was not uncommon.

Today in Yugoslavia, there are concentration camps and atrocities are occurring on both sides. This is being very well documented by the UN. We should expect war-crimes trials if and when the conflict ends. War-crimes trials are held by

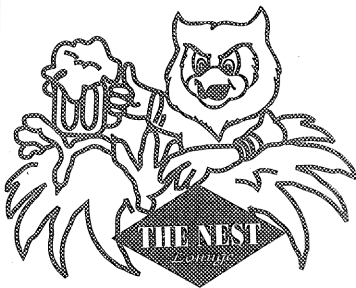
the victors.

Big deals for a small student's bank account

NAIT offers a plethora of great deals to students on everything from meat to software

Live the life of a King. A student King that is. Being a NAIT student doesn't mean you have to deny life's simple pleasures. Take advantage of the many discounts available.

For instance, you can catch exciting Oilers action for only 15 bucks. The Edmonton Oilers donate tickets to the student store for every home game. NAITSA executive Chris Chelmick says "all the profits from the sales go to the NAIT Foundation."

Store manager Rose Orfino says "there are only 24 tickets available per game. They are the mid blues, they are the regular 22 dollar seat, and you're getting them for 15 dollars each." Orfino says students usually take advantage of the offer. "Tickets are available for every game," says Orfino, "but, not the finals."

There are a lot of magazines available at the south bookstore. They are not any cheaper there than an outside store. But, if you have a request for a particular magazine, the store will check with their supplier. If the supplier carries the magazine, they'll bring it in for you.

There's always the free workout facilities. The Hydra-gym, weight room, swimming pool, ice arena, racquet ball courts and more are available with the simple showing of your ID card.

Getting your car fixed doesn't have to be put off any longer. That's because NAIT's automotive program offers saving to students in a helpful way. They don't charge for labour. That doesn't mean it's free. Program Head of Automotives Blane Thorsbey says, "people come in with the misguided opinion that we work for nothing." What Automotives does is, "repairs on vehicles to factory standards, but we don't charge labour." Thorsbey stresses, that "by doing them to factory standard, it often becomes a relatively expensive operation in that we follow the manuals, we bring things back to original sizes and specifications." The Program Head warns, "if you want something patched up, we don't do that, so sometimes it becomes expensive." Tune ups are relatively inexpensive. Thorsbey describes the normal situation: "We would put in plugs, a valve or two, those kinds of things, and those parts are quite inexpensive, and the results are usually quite good, but if we run across a situation where it needed a relatively expensive part, then we would want to have the authority to put that in as well, and often with students, they don't understand that, they don't have the finances to cover those kinds of things, so we would want to keep that communication pretty clear that we do work to a particular standard." The Automotives program does do a lot of tune ups for NAIT students. If you need work done, don't hesitate to make an appointment. Thorsbey says "there are lots out there, on the first day of school we fill up to Christmas."

Savings on food is always a sweet spot with students. NAIT has a retail meat cutting course. The course has set up its own store in the back

of the south cafeteria. The outlet is used to sell the students' projects. Instructor Dan Westgeest instructor in the retail meat-cutting, he's been there for 6 years. Westgeest describes the store as "an outlet that the students in meat cutting utilize to dispose of the product for the projects that they do. It's a great savings to the rest of students in NAIT because it's on a cost recovery basis, so there's no real mark up, we're not looking at a profit margin type." Westgeest says the cost is the "wrapping supplies, and the purchase of the meat that the students work on." As for selection, Westgeest says the store has "all the variety that [students] would normally find in a large grocery store, or an independent meat market with respect to fresh meats." According to Westgeest, "the prices average anywhere, depending on the item around a 20% average (less than outside sources). The variety changes somewhat from a day-to-day basis depending upon what projects the students are working on. "The basic variety we have," says Westgeest, "is the pork, the beef, the lamb, the chicken, ... they do a lot of stuffed items, they make the fresh sausage. People come in just for our sausage because we have a secret ingredient, it's called MEAT."

If you give the store an advanced notice, they should be able help you with any large requests. Westgeest says the teachers try to incorporate requests so that it "becomes a project for the students; there has to be some leaning value." The last day of sales is November 30th, so from the 28th to the 30th, you might be able to snag yourself a good deal. The store is open three days a week - Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, from ten in the morning till two in the afternoon. It's available to who ever comes. Much like the Retail meat cutting store, the Bakery items are just cost recovery priced as well.

Look no further for deals on computer software. Store clerk Pat Kozdrwski claims a lot of software is available at student pricing. WHAT IS THE PRICE DIFFERENCE? Word perfect 6.1 sells in stock at NAIT for \$118. Kozdrwski claims the cheapest she has seen it elsewhere is \$350. It is quite a difference. The store will also do price inquiries and special orders.

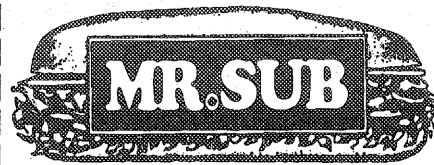

You do have to have your student ID to purchase the software. Kozdrwski says "most things take about 2 weeks to come in when it's a special order, and there are a few that have to come from the states, and those take about 4 weeks." Unfortunately, Windows '95 is not available at a student price. The store also holds sidewalk sales. Kozdrwski says the store has sidewalk sales "periodically both because it's easier to have them outside of the store so that people can see what kind of stuff that we have, and we do mark down items."

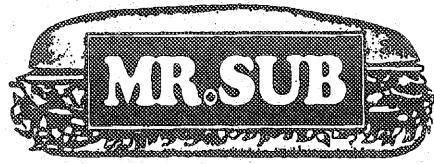
With all these great savings, and even more not mentioned here, you could almost say that NAIT is self supportive. Save your self some money by taking advantage of what NAIT has to offer.

When NAIT and SAIT decided to join forces and raise money through the Mega Lottery, there was lots of reasons for both institutes to be nervous. After all, this is the first time a post-secondary education institute has attempted such a lucrative fundraising scheme.

Both institutions should be pleased with the results of the lottery so far with ticket sales over 60% sold out and the break even point surpassed.

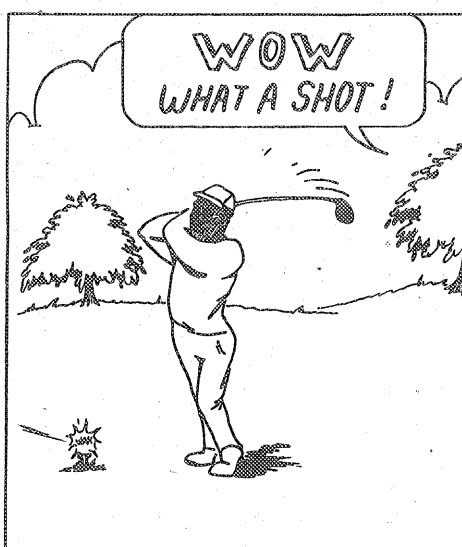
If all the tickets (43,000) sell, the odds of winning a prize are a staggering 1 in 18. The prize list is phenomenal, with 4 grand prizes consisting of two houses that are completely furnished and landscaped including a brand new car to park in the garage, and two cash prizes of \$1000 per month for 10 years (\$120,000). This doesn't include the other 2400+ other prizes.

A sellout means NAIT will receive \$800,000 which would be designated to capital equipment upgrades and replacements, such as computers, drafting tables, or testing equipment.

NAIT students have sold over \$9000 worth of tickets to date. As an incentive program for students, we are entering the names of students who sell a ticket into a draw for a mountain bike, bookstore vouchers (\$300.00 value), and free use of the Internet for 8 months and Oiler tickets.

The draw for the student incentive plan will take place in the Little Theatre (H-005) on Tuesday, November 27 at 4:30 p.m. NAIT President Dr. Souch will be on hand to make the draw, so if you're one of those people who sold a ticket through the NAITSA office, stop by and see if you are a winner.

We will be accepting student submissions for the draw up until November 27 at 4:30 p.m. in the NAITSA office (E133). So, pick up an entry form and return it to NAITSA for your chance to win.



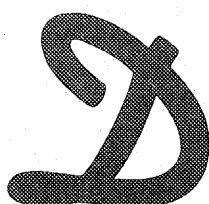

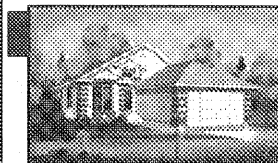

Select Restaurant and Bar 10180 - 101 Street

On the atmosphere scale, Select gets a solid 10. This is one beautiful restaurant. The detail that went into this place is exquisite. This place has a definite 50's flair.

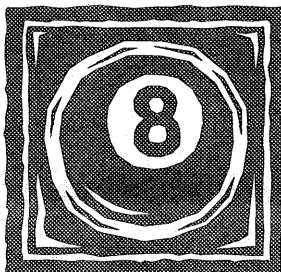
Captain Happy

It tries for the edge of your seat, twists and turns, surprise ending formula that worked so well in films like Chinatown, and Dead Again. However, Color of Night was about as thrilling as an enema. It stars

Bruce Willis, "The Lover's" Jane March, "Quantum Leap's" Scott Bakula, and a host of 3rd rate actors. The plot, ha ha ho hee hee, excuse me I lost my composure for a second, involves psychiatrists, a murder, mysterious patients, and a doctor/patient love affair. Excuse me, but didn't like this movie the other times I saw it under the titles, "Final Analysis" and "Whispers in the Dark." This is supposed to be the big

the bartender, Lana, Hefe, et al. It has all the same misunderstandings, arguments, and sexual innuendo. Except Threes Company is infinitely more entertaining.

After Bakula's character is murdered, Willis takes over his therapy group knowing that one of the patients was the killer — but doesn't know which one. Oooh, I can feel the hairs on the back of my neck stand up just thinking about it. This film has about as much tension as a Ronco infomercial except the acting is superior in the infomercial. Slowly, but surely, the other patients are bumped off one by one, and all

NAIT's Graham Wood 1995 Soccer Coach of the Year

Not everything in athletics is about winning.

NAIT has been blessed with a men's soccer coach who lives by the standard of caring about his players.

Graham Wood is the recipient of the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference (ACAC) most prestigious soccer coaching award — 1995 soccer coach of the year. He receives this award for more reasons than just his record over the season. He won because of his all-round contribution to college athletics.

Wood never fails to forget that the sport is for the players. He is completely honest and up front with all of his students and has every one's respect.

Wood's coaching goal is to develop his players understanding of the sport. His goal is always to be successful throughout his various seasons, but success will only be achieved by teaching his players. As Oaks manager Kevin Jones explains, "Graham teaches the players so much about the game...they respect him because they are consistently learning."

"He's the best coach I've ever played under," says Soccer Oak Shannon Troke, "he understands the game really well." Another valuable asset Wood has is

his way of dealing with his players. He is always up front and honest so the players know where they stand at all times. "There's no animosity with anyone from Graham," states Jones.

One may say that his only weakness is that he may be too kind to his players. No matter what is comes down to, he will always side with his team.

"There isn't one player he's coached that wouldn't do anything for Graham," says Jones. "I don't think there is one person I respect more."

His personal approach to young athletes may be his greatest asset. As one member of the Oaks commented, "Graham cares about us as more than just players, he cares about us as people."

Aside from being an accomplished soccer athlete, Wood plays cricket and a pretty mean game of golf. His fellow coaches recognize him as "the best 'Speaker-Dancer' in the ACAC."

The Oaks finished the season with a 6-1-3 record and are ranked

eighth in the country.

This is the second year that Wood has won the ACAC award. It's a major accomplishment to win 2 out of 3 seasons as a NAIT Coach. However, Wood's success stems further than NAIT.

Wood moved to Edmonton in 1981 from England. It was there that he learned all he could about the sport of soccer. He played in semi-professional leagues around England until he started a coaching career with the Edmonton AJAX Club. From then, Wood moved up to coach the senior men's team of the Victoria Soccer Club in the Edmonton Premier Division. He has taken on other coaching positions since then. The Alberta Soccer Association (ASA) recognized Wood's talent for teaching and molding

young players and chose him to coach several Alberta Select teams. His resume boasts of coaching positions which include the Alberta Selects in the Canada Games (1993), the under-17 Alberta Selects (1991), the under-23 Alberta Selects in the Western Canada Games and the under-15 Alberta Selects (1989).

In his efforts, Wood has developed players that are now playing in the National programs as well as the '96 Canadian Olympic Team.

Alberta ACAC Teams Win Cross Country Championship

Jon McFee, Shaun Hogg, and Berthe Pelchat were the NAIT representatives on the Alberta ACAC Cross-Country running team. The team traveled to Kelowna last weekend for the annual B.C./Alberta Interprovincial Cross-Country running championships.

Both the men's and women's teams from Alberta were victorious over their B.C. counterparts. The Alberta teams were comprised of the best Cross-Country runners from the ACAC championships held in Lethbridge on October 21. Eight Alberta Colleges/Institutes had members on the teams.

In the men's 7.5 km race, NAIT's Jon McFee placed 4th in 29:18, Shaun Hogg placed 6th in 29:57 and Richard Cameron placed 17th in 36:23. The winning time was Mark Bomba in 27:59. Mark is from University College of the Caribou. The top 5 positioned runners on each team were awarded position points. Alberta easily outpointed the B.C. team by 38 to 27.


In the women's 4.5 km race, NAIT's Berthe Pelchat placed 13th in 26:37. The winner was Lyndsay Belisle of University College of the Caribou in 20:25. The point totals

in the women's race were very close with Alberta edging B.C. 28 to 27 points.

The coaches at the Interprovincial meet unanimously approved the move to make this meet a Level II Canadian Championship for 1996. This could mean that Cross-Coun-

try runners would be eligible for Jimmy Condon Scholarships this fall.

This ends Cross-Country running for this year. We now move into the Cross-Country ski season. Practices are every Monday and Wednesday @ 4:30 — meet outside the gym.

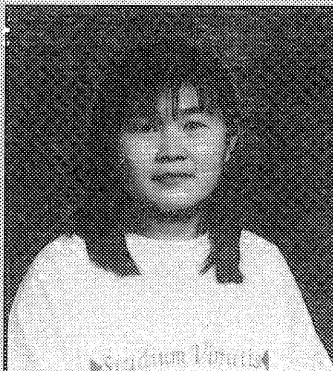
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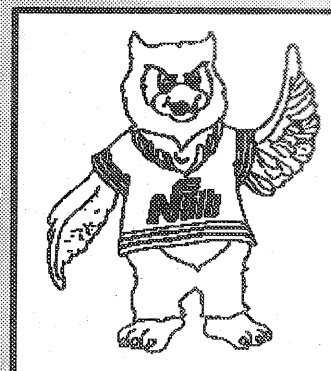

Ooks and Trojans gearing up for critical series

The NAIT Ooks (4-2) battle the SAIT Trojans (4-2) in a crucial series at the NAIT Arena on Friday, November 17th and Saturday, November 18th. Game time both nights is 7:00 p.m. Both teams are four points behind the Mount Royal College Cougars (6-0) and have a share of second place.

Calgary's SAIT Trojans of Calgary placed second (15-6-4) last season and are strong contenders for the 1995-96 ACAC title with 15 players back

from the 1994-95 squad. The Trojans' major strength is the return of their goaltending tandem that posted the lowest goals against average last season (3.11). Shawn Dietrich, who spent four seasons in the WHL with the Spokane Chiefs, the Tri-City Americans, the Seattle Thunderbirds and the Brandon Wheat Kings, was named the ACAC's best goals against average in 1994-95 (3.00). Veteran Heath Weenk, who toiled with the Regina Pats (WHL), Prince Albert Raiders (WHL), and Swift Current Broncos (WHL) between 1989 and 1993 — along with a pair of other returnees Mike Rees and Jim MacLean — give the Trojans strength on the blueline. Trevor Warrenner, an ex Saskatoon Titan (SJHL), paced the offensive charge. Newcomers Corey Heon, formerly of the Humboldt Broncos (SJHL), and Russ Gronick, formerly of the Regina Pats (WHL), add to the Trojans arsenal.

While the Trojans split a weekend set with the Red Deer College Kings, the Ooks swept a home and home series with the Augustana University College Vikings.

On Friday, November 3rd, the Ooks netted four goals in the second period en route to a 7-4 win over

the Vikings at the NAIT Arena.

In the first, the teams traded power play goals with Derek Robinson scoring for NAIT at 6:30, Steve LeBlanc replying for AUC at 14:27, and Stacey Rayan countering for NAIT at 16:06.

In the second, the Ooks dominated receiving goals from Josh Ray at 4:06, Peter Kasowski at 7:42, Wade Fennig at 10:21, and Dan Kopec at 13:01.

In the third, the Ooks widened their lead to 7-1 as Peter Kasowski tal-

lied at 2:17. The Vikings then rallied with goals from Russell Seifried at 14:04, Patrick Misura at 17:55, and Jan Stefan at 18:58.

NAIT's Rick Nichol stopped 25 of 29 shots. AUC's Derek Christiaens blocked 32 of 39 drives. On Saturday, November 4th, NAIT Captain Stacey Rayan pocketed a pair of goals and added three assists as the Ooks scored a 5-3 win.

In the first, Rayan opened the scoring by going upstairs while the Ooks were shorthanded at 7:41. The Vikings tied the contest on Richard Nault's shorthanded tally at 11:51.

In the second, the Ooks moved ahead 3-1 as Wade Fennig notched a power play goal at 2:29 and Rayan netted an even strength marker at 6:03.

In the third, the Vikings pulled to within one on Peter Lodoen's penalty shot and found the five hole at 59 seconds. The teams then traded goals with NAIT's Peter Kasowski tallying at 5:23 and AUC's Jason Evenson scoring at 10:08. NAIT's Derek Robinson sealed the victory with an empty net marker at 19:32.

Two matches, two wins, first place in the Northern Division of the ACAC Big deal!

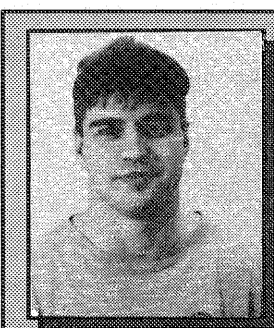
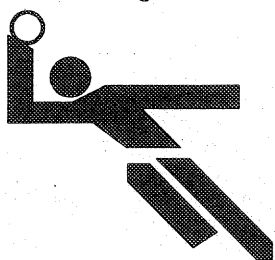
That is what you may be saying, big deal, you beat a team that is forever in 5th place (Keyano College), twice.

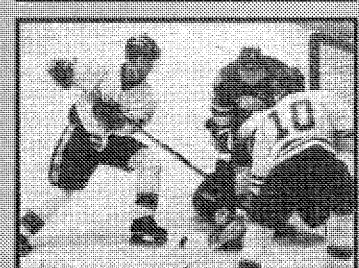
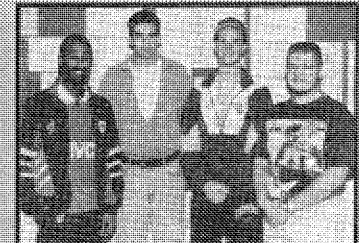

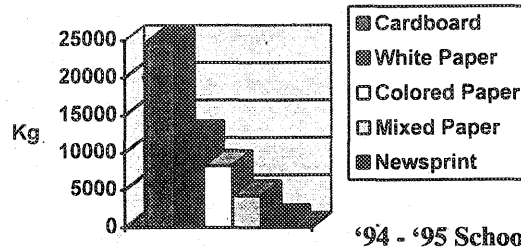

Since 1990, NAIT has been taking action on waste. Thanks to innovative programs implemented by Custodial Services, we throw away about a half of what we did five years ago.

Proceeds from most recycled materials go into General Revenue. What does this mean for us students? Tuition is a big part of General Revenue, so if we can increase recovery of recyclables and/or reduce waste, our costs as students are less than they might otherwise be.

You can help. Computer labs and some photo-copying stations have paper recycling bins, but please do not mix paper types. Mixed paper is considered contaminated, and the value refunded is much lower due to the costs of manual separation. Also, any plastic dumped into paper bins means a return of the whole postage cage of paper from the depot without refund.



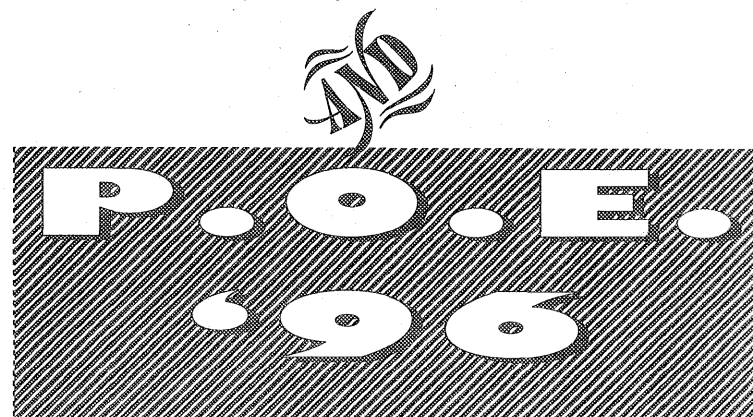
Putting drink bottles and cans into correct bins reduces waste. Funds from these bins go towards worthy causes like specific technologies, athletics, and approved clubs. Kerry Nolan, Manager of Custodial Services, estimates only 70% of returnables in this area are actually being recycled.

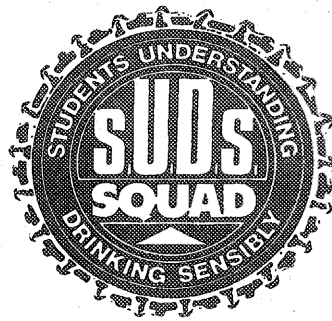
