The Civic Election is Finally Over


Well, for those of you who live in a vacuum or are in the middle of midterms, Bill Smith is Edmonton's new mayor. He surpassed Jan Reimer's bid for the mayor's chair by less than 1% of the vote. Reimer's narrow defeat is a surprise to many Edmontonians because as far as the pre-election poles showed, Reimer had it in the bag.

This was Smith's second run at the position after losing to Reimer three years ago.

Another surprise was Brad Checknita's fourth place finish over fifth place Lance White. Checknita finished the election with almost 5% of Edmonton's vote. White brought in about 3%.

In Ward 3 (NAIT and surrounding area), the incumbent Alderman, Allan Bolstad regained his seat and is being joined by former police commission chairman, Rose Rosenberger.

Another significant change for NAIT students and members of the



community surrounding NAIT is the transfer of passenger flight service from the Municipal Airport to the International. Student's who park outside will now be able to turn their car alarms on without fear they will be set off any time a plane lands at the neighboring airfield.

Finally, the heated dispute over the Keillor Road issue is finished. Fifty-six percent of Edmontonians voted to close down the road to cars. The road will remain in use for bicycle traffic only.

About half of the eligible voters in Edmonton actually made it to the poles.

Troubled Students Take Refuge

NAIT can bail you out! There's a system set up to help you if you're short of cash. The program is called Emergency Funding. It's not a new thing. NAIT has been lending a hand to troubled students since 1984. Student Awards & Fi-

The fund is not for someone who just needs cash the next day. If someone is just looking for a quick fix to a cash flow problem, they will probably be denied.

Financial Aid Advisor Helene Lagace has been there from the start. She says the program is designed to help when there are

"situations outside of a student's control." Two examples of this would be: student loans not showing up on time, or the student has no accommodation. Events like these require immediate attention. Lagace says the most requests for aid come at the beginning of each semester. There is not an endless pit of money available though. Not every student who applies is going to be helped. About 100 students apply for help every year. Around 20 to 25 people actually get money. That means four out of five people are rejected. Most applications are canned because they are not legitimate. The fund is not for someone who just needs cash the next day. If someone is just looking for a quick fix to a cash flow problem, they will probably be denied.

In 1984 the program was started with \$6,000 available. According to records, from 1985 - 1993, the program dished out over \$25,322 and lost about \$3,000. Lagace says, "it's

to be expected to lose some."

This year, NAITSA provided \$5,000 to the Emergency Fund and NAIT matched it. Students can get anywhere from \$50 to a maximum of \$200 when they ask for assistance. The loan is only temporary. It must be paid back in 30 days. You can only receive one loan. This is to ensure that students don't become dependent on the service as an income. Along with the loan, the student receives some advice on financial planning. Lagace says she wants to "remedy the problem instead of just patching a hole."

People in need of money can go directly to the Student Awards & Financial Aid Office. The office is located in the south lobby of main campus. Students are sometimes referred by their instructor or program head.

The Emergency Fund has helped 184 students. This year only four loans have been given out, totaling \$450.

Annual General Meeting a Big Flop

A Nugget of what?

The first issue of NAIT's first student newspaper came out in mid-November 1963. At that point, the paper was unnamed. Page one, article one, is a plea to the student body for ideas on a name for the newly founded paper. Actually, it was a contest and the author of the winning name received five dollars.

A Nugget of what? A Nugget probably refers to a nugget of gold that represented the

northern, pioneering, and explorative spirit of NAIT (no one knows who actually coined the name and won the five dollars.)

The purpose and scope of the first NAIT newspaper was defined by the eloquent Mr. R.G. Meadus (now retired), Student Coordinator at the time. He said "...it will serve as a vehicle of communication which is an integral part of our society. Without communication there is no sharing or dispensing of ideas [and therefore] no chance of identifying which leads to a feeling of belonging; no chance to a concerted group effort and therefore no society. Secondly the paper can provide an avenue where personal opinion can be presented and discussed openly. Personal opinion, amplified, is the precursor of group opinion which, as far as I'm concerned is the adhesive which holds any dynamic society together." The ideas of the "group" and conformity were popular in 1963.

Errors were considerably few given the difficulty of typesetting the early newspapers; "it was a real bitch! It was very dirty and messy," explains someone who knew of the process. Apparently, you typed it on a wax paper Gestetner 10 X 13 master which was then run through the Gestetner itself; the Gestetner was the typesetting machine at that time.

'Did the Grapevine exist in 1963?'

There was absolutely no room for error as one could not correct mistakes on the wax paper master. Word processors did not exist.

Did the Grapevine exist in 1963? No, but "Dear Daizey" did. "Dear Daizey" was the "Dear Abbey" equivalent; people submitted their problems to Daizey for analysis and hopefully a response. One troubled reader writes that he's feeling guilty because his "true love" writes everyday (he's from out of town) and "in the big city there are many temptations...I don't know how to tell my true love that I have greener pastures." Daizey basically tells him to go for it because his true love has probably "found greener pastures too." All questions and responses were polite, innocent, and conservative.

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The Referendum Debate

The Quebec connection

The Quebec issue has roots right here at NAIT. Jason Demers is a 19 year old Francophone student and an executive for the Business Administration Society here at NAIT. Demers was born and raised in the small Francophone town of Jean-Cote, Alberta.

Being a Francophone, Demers knows where he stands on the separation issue. He thinks Parizeau and Bouchard are stupid because "they are not thinking further than their noses."

Economically, Demers feels that Quebec could not survive as it's own nation. His reasons are the people and the land. Only 55% of Quebec's population are true French Quebecois. The other 45% is mostly comprised of Anglophones and First Nation Peoples. The significance of these numbers is quite important. The English people in Quebec would probably not want to live there, especially the businessmen.

Then there is the issue of land. Labrador is not constitutionally part

of Quebec. It belongs to Newfoundland. That would mean a 15% loss of land to Quebec if they were to leave Canada. Also, the natives in Quebec are living on Federal Reserves. The reserves make up about 40% of the province's land. If sovereignty was achieved, Quebec

would have less than half the land than they do now.

Quebec is taxed quite heavily. If Quebec lost most of its population, their tax base would decrease dramatically. They would have to jack up taxes to maintain their current standard of living.

Demers feels Francophones outside of Quebec are being drawn into the argument. He feels that this is hurting all Francophones. Demers says that the Bloc Quebecois is "a bunch of babies asking for everything when they should be promoting their culture. If they put more energy into promoting, rather than

complaining, they would be better off."

Alberta's town of Jean-Cote had to fight for an Ecole Homogene Francais. It is not a French immersion program, but a school built especially for Francophones. Everything is in French. The northern community had to go all the way to the Supreme Court to gain jurisdiction over their own school district. Demers speaks of vari-

ous Francophone organizations throughout Alberta which try to promote their culture and let others experience it—"no thanks to Quebec." According to Demers, Quebec wanting to preserve its culture through dissociation with others is simply "copping out."

Demers strongly believes that, "if Quebec looked at Alberta, they could learn a lot. Cooperation and hard work is the way to succeed."

At the end of this month, when the referendum is decided, it may be a seasonable trick, or treat.

Bill Hunter has the MIDAS touch

His passion for sport led to stints as a player, a coach, a manager and an owner. Edmonton's guru of sport has seen all sides of the business and is now lending his passion and knowledge to benefit students at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology.

Bill Hunter, a man who is known across the country for his contributions to Canadian athletics, joined up with the NAIT Foundation in 1993 to lead the annual Draft for Dollars fundraising campaign, and, despite facing challenges like the 1994/95 NHL lockout, has made the project enormously successful.

"But that's to be expected," notes Foundation Managing Director Bill McCallum. "Hunter's got the Midas touch, everything he touches turns to gold."

And Bill has indeed left a golden trail in his wake.

As a student at Saskatoon Public School, Bill played hockey, football, and baseball. He curled, and as skip led his team to win the provincial championship. And he was also a

star on the track team, breaking the provincial record for the mile.

Bill didn't just play the games though. He became the only student to coach a Saskatchewan senior collegiate football team, and he coached them all the way to the Saskatchewan provincial championships, which they also won.

In college, Bill was once again a track champion, and he expanded his coaching efforts to include hockey as well as football.

Following college, Bill took a break from sports to serve overseas as a pilot with the RCAF and the RAF. On his return to Canada, however, he picked up where he left off joining Saskatoon's CFQC Radio as the sports director.

In 1945, Bill opened Hunter's Sporting Goods in North Battleford, which became Canada's largest sporting goods store. Bill's other business stints have included being the president and founder of Peoples Investors Ltd, acting as the senior vice-president and general sales manager of Principal Group, and as

president and publisher of Saskatchewan Report news magazine.

While leaving his mark on the business community, Bill never strayed from his initial passion. Using the skills he honed in the business community, Bill dedicated himself to influencing and improving the world of sport for fans in Saskatchewan and eventually Alberta.

Bill founded the Saskatoon Dukes Football Club, which became the Saskatoon Hilltops; he was the GM and coach of the Saskatoon Quakers in the Western Hockey League; the GM and coach of the Moose Jaw Canucks in the Western Hockey League and Yorkton Terriers in the Northern Saskatchewan Hockey League; the owner and president of the Regina Capitals and the Medicine Hat Tigers; the owner, president and GM of the Edmonton Oil Kings; the founder and first chair of the board of the Western Canada Junior Hockey League; founder, owner, president and GM of the Edmonton Oilers; a founder of the World Hockey Association; and the general manager of Team Canada 1974.

The list is endless and impressive. And it's hard to imagine that a man with that many milestones can pick out a few highlights, but a few did come to mind right away.

To Divide Canada

Rico Chovinard is a Francophone student attending NAIT (Biological Sciences - Laboratory & Research option). In light of the upcoming Quebec Referendum (October 30, 1995), this is what he has to say on the subject.

"It's a very complicated issue. I don't feel fully informed on what the consequences of a yes vote would mean to both Canada and a sovereign Quebec. I think it's

both an ethnic and economic issue. You have politicians like Bouchard and Parizeau whipping up ethnic pride, worrying Quebecers that if they don't break away from Canada, the French will lose their identity. I don't think this is true; actually I think the opposite is true: Canada has nurtured their (Quebec's) language and culture for about 130 years. It kind of scares me to think at what will happen to non-French people in Quebec if it's a yes vote. Will they be asked or told to leave? Could we see ethnic cleansing in Canada? This whole movement


smells of subtle racism."


When asked how the sovereignty issue was an economic one, Mr. Chovinard replied, "it all really comes down to a dollar figure, doesn't it? Who needs who; can Quebec survive without Canada and can Canada do without Quebec. Although people speculate on the answers to these questions, I don't think anybody really knows for sure. It will be interesting to see what happens. Could we see

disputes over borders and natural resources? These two things have been the causes of many wars; it is possible that we could see violence in Canada on that scale. One doesn't have to look too far to see parallels; when you have a nation made up of small distinct, ethnic states, you have all of the components for violence."

Mr. Chovinard was reluctant to say what his vote would be replying that, "Again it's a very complicated issue and I'm still working on becoming informed so that I can make a responsible decision."





Lately I've been browsing through the Internet in search of new recipes and worthwhile information for this article. I came upon this interesting piece by accident, and I'd like to share this with my readers.

Low-Fat Myth

Don't be misled. Calories count. . . ALWAYS have, always will.

I have heard, and I have obeyed. Journal articles, newspaper stories, infomercials, friends, and relatives in my own kitchen - all have said the same thing: Fat is bad, low-fat is good. I have taken the calories to heart as well.

I believed the notion you don't have to worry about calories as long as you eat lots of carbohydrates, that the body readily burns carbohydrates, but that fat makes a beeline for your midriff and packs itself there with the permanence of mortar.

In my house we have eaten lots of bagels and fruit, substituted "made-from turkey" stuff for beef

and bought low-fat cheeses and mayonnaise. We have even opted for low-fat versions of ostensibly healthy snacks like fig bars. We've done it with the confidence that eating less fat keeps us thin, healthy, and free to binge on anything that smacks of starch... especially pasta.

Lately, however, the harmonizing voices of common wisdom have become discordant. Earlier this year, for example, there came a now-famous (at least in nutrition circles) cannonade against convention on the front page of The New York Times. "Bye-bye pasta, it's been fun," began the article, which quoted researchers suggesting that carbohydrates, long touted as the cornerstone of a slimming diet, can, when eaten in large quantities, make you just as fat as fat can.

Statistics seem to confirm that cutting fat while ignoring calories isn't working. According to the National Centre for Health Statistics, Americans aged 20 to 74 reduced

their fat intake from 36% to 34 % between 1978 and 1990, but they took in 231 more calories a day. A report from the Centre of Disease Control and Prevention indicates, that during roughly the same period obesity in this country rose by 8%. In the 1980's a quarter of Americans were obese; in the 1990's that number has bloated to one-third. What gives? Isn't fat important anymore? Have people been misled by scientific uncertainties?

And the article goes on and on, blah blah, about why and wherefore, etc. Of course, the answers are sim-

ple: "If you overeat anything, you'll get fat". It doesn't take a genius to figure this out. What is really needed is a sensible approach to the quantities you eat and the calories you put out. The body burns up calories as fast as you can inhale them. The trick is to get into some sort of activity to burn up those calories before they are stored in the body "for future use". And yes, it's true that the body will burn up protein and carbohydrate calories faster than fat calories, but then again, protein

and carbohydrates only contribute 4 calories per gram while fat offers you a whopping 9 calories per gram. Incidentally, alcohol, be it wine, beer or hard liquor, packs 7 calories per gram or ml, without ever offering you anything else nutritionally. And, you can't live off a headache.

Anyway, I thought I'd share a neat recipe with you here. This one is intended for a party because it feeds 9 people and the ensuing activities should take care of the calories consumed, so you can call this the absolute best party food ever!

Four Cheese Vegetable Lasagna

1 (10-ounce) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed
Vegetable cooking spray
2 teaspoons vegetable oil
2 cups chopped fresh broccoli
1 1/2 cups thinly sliced carrot
1 cup sliced green onions
1/2 cup chopped red bell pepper
3 cloves garlic, crushed
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
3 cups 1% low-fat milk
1/2 cup grated fresh Parmesan cheese, divided
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 1/2 cups 1% low-fat cottage cheese
1 cup (4 ounces) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
1/2 cup (2 ounces) shredded Swiss cheese
12 cooked lasagna noodles, cooked without salt or fat

Press spinach between paper towels until barely moist, and set aside. Coat a Dutch oven with cooking spray; add oil, and place over medium heat until hot. Add broccoli and next 4 ingredients; sauté 7 minutes. Set aside.

Place flour in a medium saucepan. Gradually add milk, stirring with a wire whisk until blended. Bring to a boil over medium heat, and cook 5 minutes or until thickened, stirring constantly. Add about two thirds of the parmesan cheese as well as the salt and pepper, cook an additional minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, stir in the spinach. Reserve one third of the mixture and set aside.

Combine cottage cheese, mozzarella, and Swiss cheese, stir well. Spread two thirds of the spinach mixture on bottom of a 13 x 9 inch baking dish coated with cooking spray. Arrange 4 lasagna noodles over the spinach mixture. Repeat layers, ending with noodles. Spread the reserved one third of the spinach mixture over the noodles, and sprinkle with the remaining Parmesan cheese. Cover and bake at 375°F for 35 minutes. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Cut into 9 pieces. Let the party begin.

"Winning the Memorial Cup," says the father of Edmonton's Oilers with a twinkle in his eye. "I'd taken over the Edmonton Oil Kings in '65, and in the spring of 1966 we won the Cup against the Oshawa Generals, in Maple Leaf Gardens, in six exciting games," Bill says, noting that Edmonton was the first western team to win the Canadian Junior Championship in 18 years.

"Not only that. Bobby Orr played for Oshawa. Let's just say, they were heavily favored," Bill says with much pride.

Another highlight? "Forming the greatest junior hockey league in the world - the Western Hockey League," Bill says without hesitating. "Hockey in those days was a way of life with Canadians. The enthusiasm and excitement generated during the season was unbelievable."

And the third and final career highlight Bill mentions is, not surprisingly, bringing major league hockey to Edmonton - the Edmonton Oilers. And Bill believes that the World Hockey Association exemplifies the glory days of the sport.

"At that time, major league players were playing for scandalously low salaries. We in the WHA raised salaries to respectable levels, but didn't go overboard.

"The fans were able to enjoy a great brand of wide-open exciting hockey at very reasonable prices," Bill says, while noting this is no longer the case.

In his mind the turning point for the sport was when Scott Stevens was signed by St. Louis to a "ridicu-

lously high" multimillion dollar contract. "From that day on, owners fought one another with huge salary contracts. The major problem isn't money paid to the few superstars who fill the arenas, but rather to the average player in the middle ranks who still command million dollar contracts which are obscene to say the least.

"The trend is the same way in major league baseball and in the NFL. All of which are headed on a destruction path unless serious steps are taken to immediately curb and control these salary structures, so that we can stop passing the financial burden on to the fan," Bill says.

Despite his contempt for the current "unhealthy climate created by greed and corrupted by money," Bill Hunter is still committed to promoting sport, and NAIT officials are thrilled that one avenue he has chosen to do so is through the Foundation's Draft for Dollars.

But Bill says, NAIT need not thank him. He was attracted to the school for two reasons - a sense of duty to helping the next generation, and a sense that NAIT staff are bound by that same duty.

"I am so impressed by NAIT's programs; by the spirit, attitude and enthusiasm of the student body; and by NAIT's tremendous record in Alberta and Canada as a contributor to the workforce," Bill notes. "This especially impresses me today as I am deeply concerned for the welfare of the young in these stressful, disturbed and violent times.

"I believe that I must do everything I can to provide young people with the education and work opportunities which my generation enjoyed in easier and more enjoyable

times," he says, with fierce determination.

And Bill has done an enormous amount to help provide these opportunities for NAIT students.

During the 1993/94 season, his first year with the Foundation, Bill helped to raise \$100,000 for the regular season draft and another

\$40,000 during the playoffs. In 1994/95, the year of the strike, Bill used his name and connections to keep the regular season draft alive and brought in some \$40,000 a figure he matched during the playoffs.

And 1995/96 will be the most successful season ever. His goal is to see both the regular season and

the playoff draft raise \$100,000.

"I'm committed to NAIT and intend to see the both drafts this year become the most successful in history," says the man with the Midas touch.

"I am proud to be part of the world's richest and most respected hockey drafts."



Is it ethical to peddle religion?

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

No matter what Courtney Love wears it always looks like she's



Ooks open regular season at home on friday

In a rematch of the 1994-95 ACAC Championship final series, the NAIT Ooks will host the Mount Royal College Cougars in a two game series to open up the 1995-96 ACAC hockey regular season. The Ooks play host to the Cougars at the NAIT Arena. In a 7:00 p.m. match up on Friday and a 7:00 p.m. contest on Saturday.

In 1994-95, the two teams split the regular season series with each team posting a record of 2-2-1. In the post season, the two teams hooked up in the ACAC final series where the Cougars took the best of three, two games to one.

The Cougars have many players back from last season's ACAC championship squad. Dion Wandler completed the hat trick for the Cougars while Shayne Green, Mirsad Mujeln, Scott Bright, and Mark Ashlee added singles. Jay Lines, Trevor Ball, and Derek Robinson replied for the Ooks.

Outshooting NAIT 40-23, Mount Royal held period leads of 3-1 and 3-2.

On Thursday at the NAIT Arena the NAIT Ooks scored two goals in each period en route to a 6-3 win

over the Concordia College Thunder.

Robert Plante, Kelven Hall, Aaron Hills, Stacey Rayan, Sandro Pisani and Jay Lines tallied for the Ooks. Aaron Harburn, Scott Harding, and Rhett Dudley answered for the Thunder.

The Thunder outshot the Ooks 27-26, but trailed 2-0 following the first and 4-3 following the second.




