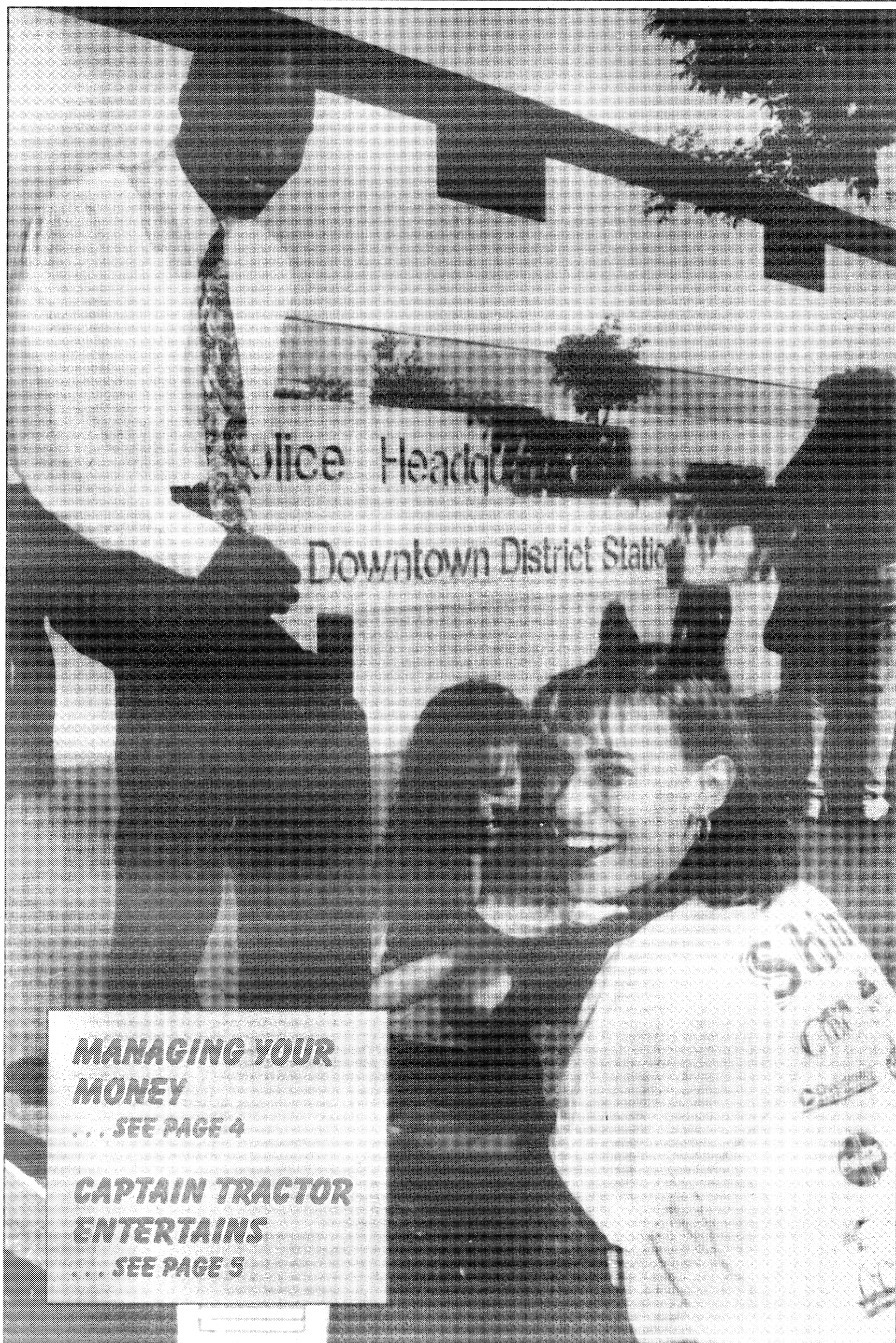

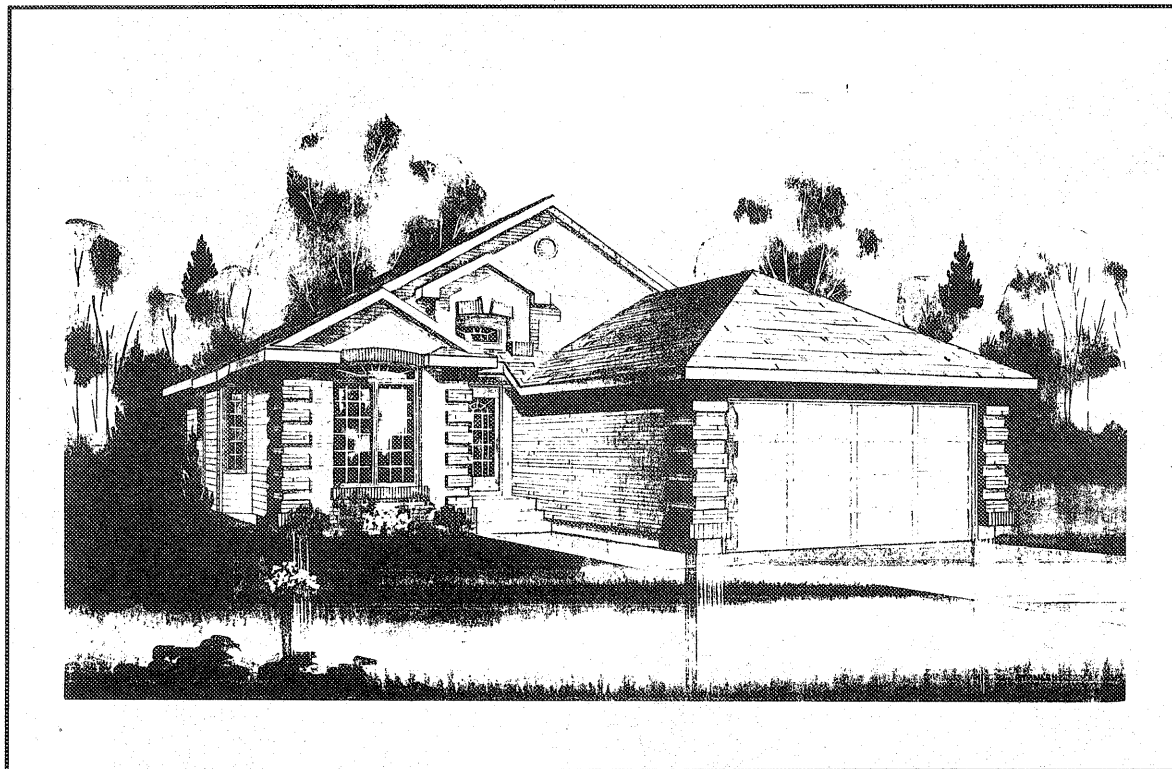

## Brain Money

**T**he Bank of Montreal has launched an organized campaign called Brain Money, designed to financially assist students entering and returning to post-secondary school. Included in this student campaign are multimedia advertisements, a chance at winning tuition funds, direct mail, point of sale, interaction via the Internet ([Http://www.bmo.com](http://www.bmo.com)), and literature dealing with student finances.

Eight lucky Generation X-ers will win \$2500 towards their post-secondary or vocational tuition through a joint Much Music/Bank of Montreal contest. The Brain Money - win your tuition contest is open to all students. The deadline to enter is September 22, 1995. There's nothing to buy, and you can enter as much as you like. Ballots can be found at any Bank of Montreal, or send your name and address to Brain Money Contest c/o Much Music.

The Bank of Montreal's Student Service Program has a very specific agenda of financial education or getting students to take charge of their finances. The Bank has published a "Student's Guide to Financial Survival", discussing what to expect and what to do when mom and dad are no longer around to provide fiscal

restraint. The Manager of Student Services at the Bank of Montreal, Rosie Gentile says, "this is the first time a major financial institution has mounted such a campaign. We have established a Student Line of Credit ... designed to help students pay for their post-secondary education."

To help serve a majority of students who will not qualify for federal or provincial loans the Bank of Montreal has set aside some \$.5 Billion in credit for student loans. This money is available not only for university and community college, but trade schooling as well, as long as you are a Canadian citizen, or a landed immigrant.

The program involves a revolving line of credit, and, at any time of the year, the student can apply for, "initially, up to \$5000 per academic year. Special student interest rates of prime plus 1% applies to outstanding balances. Repayment of the loan takes place one year after graduation or upon leaving school and is spread out over 7 years," says Gentile.

Other student services include a package of day to day banking services offering a 70% savings. You can also apply for a Bank of Montreal no-fee Mastercard and when used responsibly, can begin a future of good credit rating. So don't delay, grab for that free cash!

The Canadian Red Cross Society is setting up shop in our hallowed halls today and tomorrow. From 10:30 am to 1:30 pm, a mobile blood donor clinic will be set up, eager to accept your generosity. If you're worried that you may not be eligible, worry no more. The Red Cross has set up a phone

number for information regarding Medical Eligibility. The number is 431-0202 ext. 216. If you plan to donate, the Red Cross has two prerequisites:

1. Please bring picture ID
2. Please eat prior to donating. (This enriches the quality of your blood).

The facility housing the blood donor clinic is located in the North Lobby (west end - near the main cafeteria). If this is your first time donating, expect the room to be decked

out like a scene from \*M\*A\*S\*H\*. It's actually quite a neat experience. When you arrive they have you fill

out a little info card. If you are a first time donor, your blood type will have to be determined. Next, you are wrestled down and strapped into some old patio furniture, your arm is nicked with a rusty cafeteria fork, and they syphon every last drop out of you with a big green garden hose. No, just kidding!!! The people working the donor clinic are trained professionals. The techniques they use make giving blood pretty darn safe, simple, and painless.

Giving blood lets you donate to one of the most worthwhile causes in the world - LIFE. The Canadian

# The City: A Community Partner

**The airport debate continues...**

**I**nteraction between municipal government and the community occurs often, at different levels and for different reasons. Virtually every City department has been involved in facilitating community solutions that range from developing playgrounds to addressing neighbourhood crime.

"Even if the City had the money and the staff to offer solutions to every community issue, I would not recommend that. Imposing solutions is never as effective as helping a community develop their own answers to their own situations. They own the problem; they have a right to own its solution," City Manager Richard Picherack said.

Other community issues affect the entire city. For those, the City can act as a facilitator, leader or catalyst in helping our entire community find a workable solution. The current airport issues is a good example; the City has an active role even though its position must remain neutral.

"The City's public information program urges voters to understand the question, become informed and to tell them how they can get the facts. Neutrality doesn't mean silence. The City administration cannot abdicate its responsibility to City council to have voters make a meaningful decision," Picherack said.

This is what voters will see October 16 on the ballot: City council wishes to resolve the airport issue.

Do you direct City Council to repeal "The Edmonton Municipal Airport Referendum Bylaw" (No. 10,205)? That bylaw requires the City to operate the Municipal Airport and promote that airport's air passenger service.

A YES vote means that the City will promote moving scheduled air passenger service to the Edmonton International Airport.

A NO vote means that the City will promote maintaining scheduled air passenger service at the Edmonton Municipal Airport.

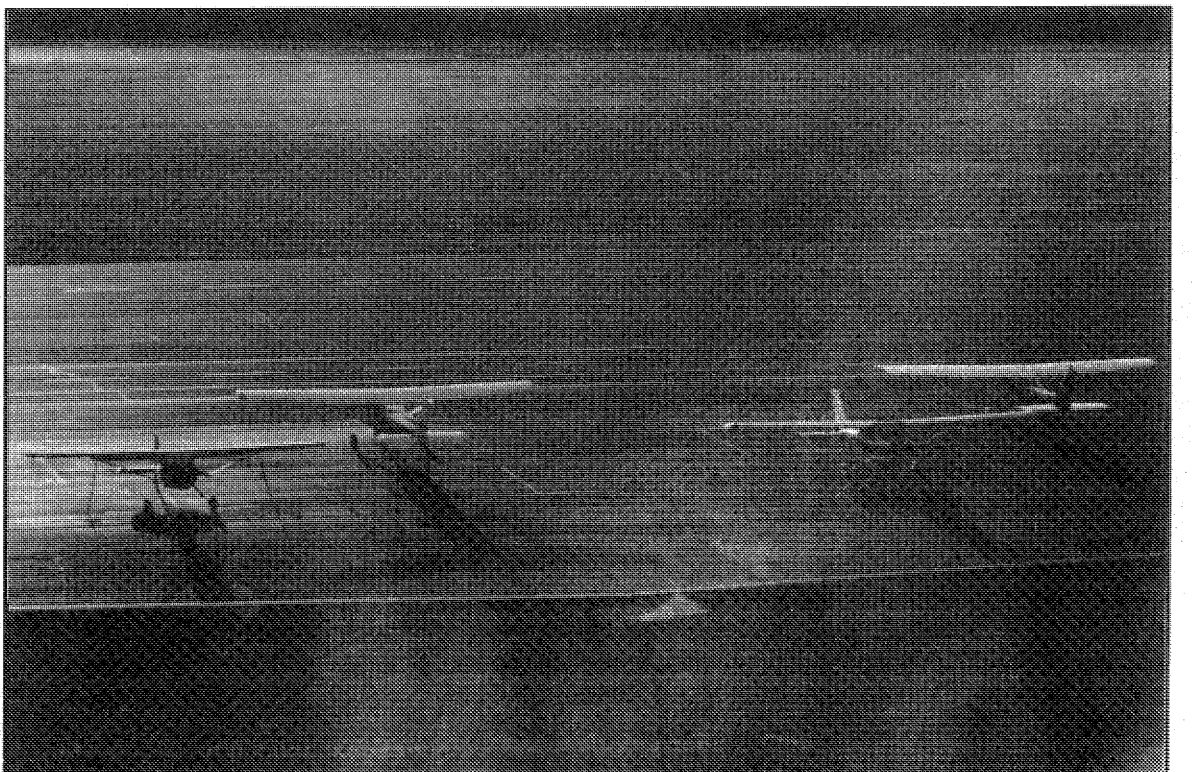
Under both options the City will continue to own and offer general air services (e.g. private planes, small

charters, air ambulance) at the Municipal Airport.

Neighbours of the Municipal Airport, including NAIT, find them-

selves in a unique position of weighing the advantages of their neighbour's current operation against future potential for the community.

The City's advice: get the facts, listen to the debates on the issue, and make an informed decision at the ballot box October 16.

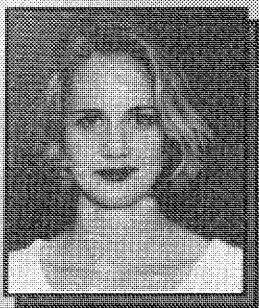


The municipal airport - to be or not to be... that is for you to decide

## Tuition payment by semester?

Money is a touchy subject for students in the 1990's. Tuition increases every year and summer jobs are more difficult to find.

NAIT is an affordable post-secondary institute, especially considering the University of Alberta's tuition is more than double NAIT's.

However, some of NAIT's procedures are a little archaic.

The *Nugget* received a letter last week from a student concerned about having to pay all of his tuition at the beginning of the year.

Handing over more than thirteen hundred dollars in one chunk is more than some students can afford, especially if the student has dependents or couldn't find a good

summer job. These students may have a hard time buying groceries or paying their rent after paying their tuition all at once.

Registrar Don Yurchuk says the number of students in this position only account for about 20% of students. Most students tuition is paid by the Student Finance Board in the form of student loans. Others are covered under bursaries and special programs where their tuition is paid as well. For these students, it does not matter that they would have to pay in one lump sum.

Still, one fifth of students is a significant amount and NAIT should encourage students to pay their own tuition if they can afford to as a part

of their debt management program. They could do this by facilitating a manageable tuition payment.

Yurchuk says NAIT recognizes the problems associated with payment in a lump sum and tried to institute a split payment program this year. This way, students who chose to pay by semester during the year would pay a small processing fee. This is the way the U of A handles the situation and their processing fee is only \$25.

There are several problems associated with paying per semester. The most significant problem is the administration fee for paying per semester would be considered part of a total tuition increase. By this logic, students who did not use the service would end up paying for it anyway. Hopefully NAIT will be able

to accommodate this type of program by next year.

The reason student's are able to pay per semester for January to April and April to August if they are a January or May intake student, is the academic year end is in June, so the programs are not considered to be continuous.

Something a little more enlightening is that if you decide to withdraw from January classes before January 1st, your entire January through April tuition will be refunded. If you attend one day of classes in January before you withdraw, you will lose half your tuition.

If nothing else, consider this editorial a plea to both NAIT and Naitsa on behalf of the student body to help institute a split payment program for student tuition.

## Food to go...

Some of the most significant and worldshaking thoughts came to light while the thinker was having lunch. There must be, I am sure, a connection between what we eat and how we perform. I personally don't eat breakfast before coming to school at 7:00 a.m., and therefore my performance in class mirrors my breakfast. Zero, zilch, nada. Just ask my students. But once I have a decent lunch I can out think and out dream anyone. Some of my best ideas come right after lunch, like, when I am spending the Lotto money I am going to win next Saturday, or the unique way I will end my life, if I don't win.

The truth is that the food we eat greatly influences our ability to cope with the daily work load, be it mental or physical. One of the greatest chefs said 200 years ago: "Tell me what you eat, and I tell you who you are."

Unfortunately, many young (and not so young) people have habitually poor eating habits. Most often it is because it is the lack of proper understanding of nutritional value of the food and what it can do for us. One other reason for poor eating is

availability. Whether this is due to finances or opportunity really makes no difference to the body. Nutrition has been given a bum rap over the last couple of decades. Even today, very few people really want to get involved with anything that spells nutrition. The fact is however, the body needs a variety of natural products in order to be able to function for you and give its best performance.

For example, lack of oxygen in the blood makes it difficult for the brain to make the electrical connections between various areas of recall. This makes learning very difficult. How to get oxygen into the blood? By eating more leafy greens, as in vegetables and salads, more iron and potassium are ingested. This produces haemoglobins which carry oxygen through the blood stream.

The brain's only nourishment comes from the blood that curses through our skull. More fresh blood equals more nutrition, equals more brain activity, equals better electronic connections, equals better recall, equals better learning. So, eat spinach and you'll be wiser!
