



The Red Cross, Blood, AIDS and YOU

Next week is AIDS Awareness Week. AIDS is an acronym for Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome. AIDS is caused by a virus that can destroy the body's immune system. The AIDS virus can be transmitted through bodily fluids from an infected person to an uninfected person. Semen, blood, or vaginal secretions are all considered carrier vehicles for in transmitting AIDS. Blood is the issue that the Canadian Red Cross Society has had to deal with. With AIDS being as serious as it is, the Red Cross has

Fear is being spread about AIDS. The Coordinator of Blood Donor Recruiment at the Red Cross Barb Smith, says people should not be afraid of donating blood. Smith says that the equipment used to collect blood is sterile, and used only once before being discarded. 

N a tionally, the number of donors is down by 11%. In Edmonton, the number of

donors has decreased by 8% within the last two years. Smith attributes the decrease to the increased length of the screening process and that some may be offended by the current questionnaire. The health assessment questionnaire has to be filled out before any blood can be donated. The questionnaire deals with, in part, the risk activities for AIDS. The risk activities, according to the Red Cross, include: males having sex with another male, even once; sharing neeease by donating blood. This mes- dles or taking street drugs by nee-

donated blood is found to be AIDS positive, the Red Cross informs the donator in confidence. According to the Red Cross, the name of the donor's physician will be requested for amedical follow-up. To help inform the public of AIDS, the Red Cross has set up the FRIENDS FOR LIFE CAMPAIGN. Barb Smith explained that the campaign is used to help educate students. 

Consider the section on academic integrity. A first offense has a minimum (re-write) and a maximum (0 in COURSE) penalty. The sentence depends on the circumstance, and more importantly cannot be applied without the instructor first discussing the matter with you. Your instructor must also inform you of your rights of appeal and redress.

As you can see, no rules have to be broken to handle most situations. However, there can be exceptions since no rule can be made that covers every case. It is here we must trust in the wisdom of the institute to serve us, rather that an expectation to be exempt.

Also, academic regulations are not static. They are constantly evolving to meet the demands of the institute. As students, we are the reason NAIT exists; we have a strong input into what the regulations are.

The second-best film of the year

"Usual Suspects" is the kind of film you don't see much of anymore: a tautly written, tense thriller with an edge. In a sea of mediocrity, "Suspects" shines out as an example of how to write a film properly, avoiding predictability at every turn. The plot revolves around five career criminals brought together in a police line-up for a crime they claim they didn't commit. The story weaves a serpentine path from there, evolving in flashback as "Verbal" (Kevin Spacey) relates the events following the line up to a California cop (Chaz Palimenteri). No matter how hard the viewer tries to stay ahead of the drama, the film has a fresh surprise in store. The acting is first rate, with Spacey and Gabriel Byrne standing out in a cast

devoid of slackers. The directing is nicely understated, stylish when necessary but always serving to up the tension as the film races towards its conclusion. The score by Kenneth Ott is exceptional, even more so because he also served as editor of the film. There isn't a bad thing I can say about this film. In fact, it's my second best film of the year, beaten out only by "Braveheart" for sheer quality. Do yourself a favor; go see "Usual Suspects". You won't be disappointed.




