NAIT Students Make a Difference

For two months, four NAIT students, one NAIT graduate, and one NAIT instructor have been helping the disabled at Employ Abilities. The students are Les Bankay (3rd semester CST), Cindy Topelko (4th semester CST), Crystal Armstrong (3rd semester CST), and Anna Lynores (4th semester CST), and the

instructor is Dave Brown (from the Micro Computer Institute at Westwood Campus).

Since December 2, Dave Brown has been instructing handicapped adults in the use of computers and software, with the help of the CST students and graduates. The project is called ON RAMP. The idea was initially formed by Donna Savaard, and was aimed at providing the handicapped with a higher quality of life. With the help of major corporate sponsors and volunteers from NAIT and other post-secondary institutions, Employ Abilities has done just that. AGT, with their project Blue Eagle, has provided some computer hardware to the computer lab at Employ Abilities (which were donated by people in and around Edmonton). EdTel has provided some software, including an Internet access package called Planet. Instruction has been focused on the use of Microsoft Works and the Planet software, which has provided these adults with technological access to the outside world. What better people to volunteer, than students dealing with computers for living.

Les Bankay and Cindy Topelko had similar views on the experience,

particularly that it was easy and fun teaching these people as they were highly motivated to learn. This volunteer work has given the two a way to apply their practical experience in an environment other than a classroom. The software is a bit different from what they are used to, and they had to express terms in English, rather than "computerese". The work has been non-interfering to their studies, and both Les and Cindy would like to gain more volunteer experience of this sort. When asked, both decided that once finished the CST program, they would like to get into database development and multimedia development.

Dave Brown, who was initially approached by Donna Savaard, says that the teaching has been slower, but he has learned a lot more about the disabled, and considers himself better off have done this volunteer work. Dave plans on being involved in future projects of this sort, including a more advance program for those adults who have finished the basic course. As to the instructional use of the Internet, Brown agrees that it is probably the most useful skill that a person could learn. As time goes on, more and more businesses and stores will be going "on-line". This provides an opportunity for handicapped people to work out of their own homes, and become self-sufficient. Brown, as well as being an instructor and a volunteer, is also working on a book about computers, and hopes it will be used as a CST instructional textbook. The Nugget salutes the effort of these students, graduate, and instructor.

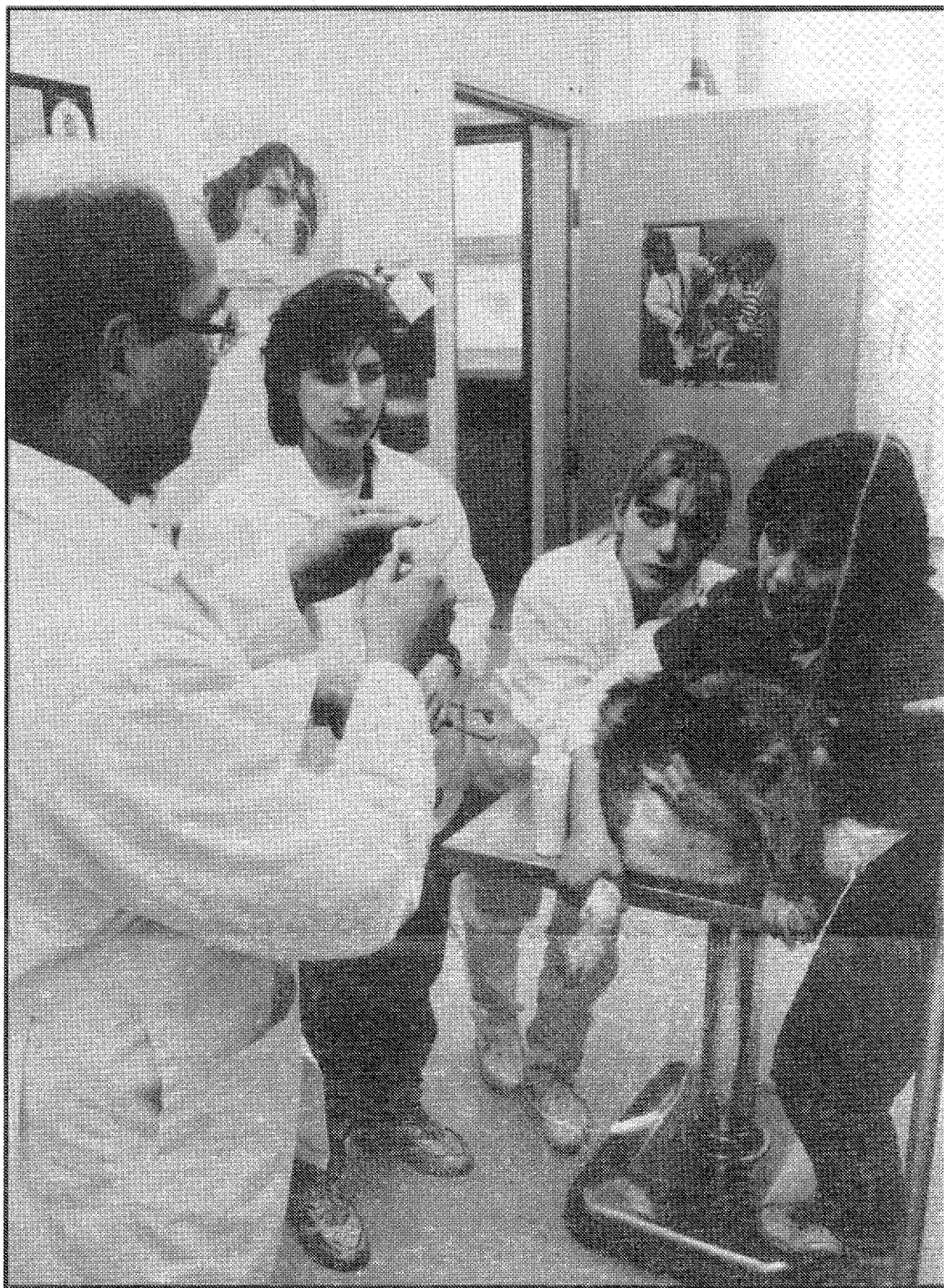

Crime on Campus

Theives target NAIT lumber

Campus Crime Stoppers is interested in hearing from anybody who can provide information regarding a recent theft at NAIT.

On January 1, 1996, at 10:30 am, a part pallet of construction grade 2 x 6s was stolen from the west side of the V Building. The perpetrators removed the tarp that was covering the lumber, broke the strapping and

loaded the lumber into a vehicle.

The Suspect Vehicle is described as a white half-ton truck with the first three digits of the license plate 65-2. The last three digits are not known.

Suspect #1, the driver of the vehicle, is described as a white male, 20-30 years, who was wearing a dark coloured jacket and a baseball cap.

Suspect #2 is described as a male who was wearing a light coloured shirt and a dark jacket.

A similar incident occurred on the night of January 8, 1996, between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 am on the 9th. Approximately 50 varying lengths of 2 x 4s were taken from the same area during this theft.

call Campus Crime Stoppers at 429-8336. CCS policy maintains, as do all Crime Stoppers programs maintain, that you do not have to reveal your identity and if your information leads to an arrest, you may be eligible for a cash reward.

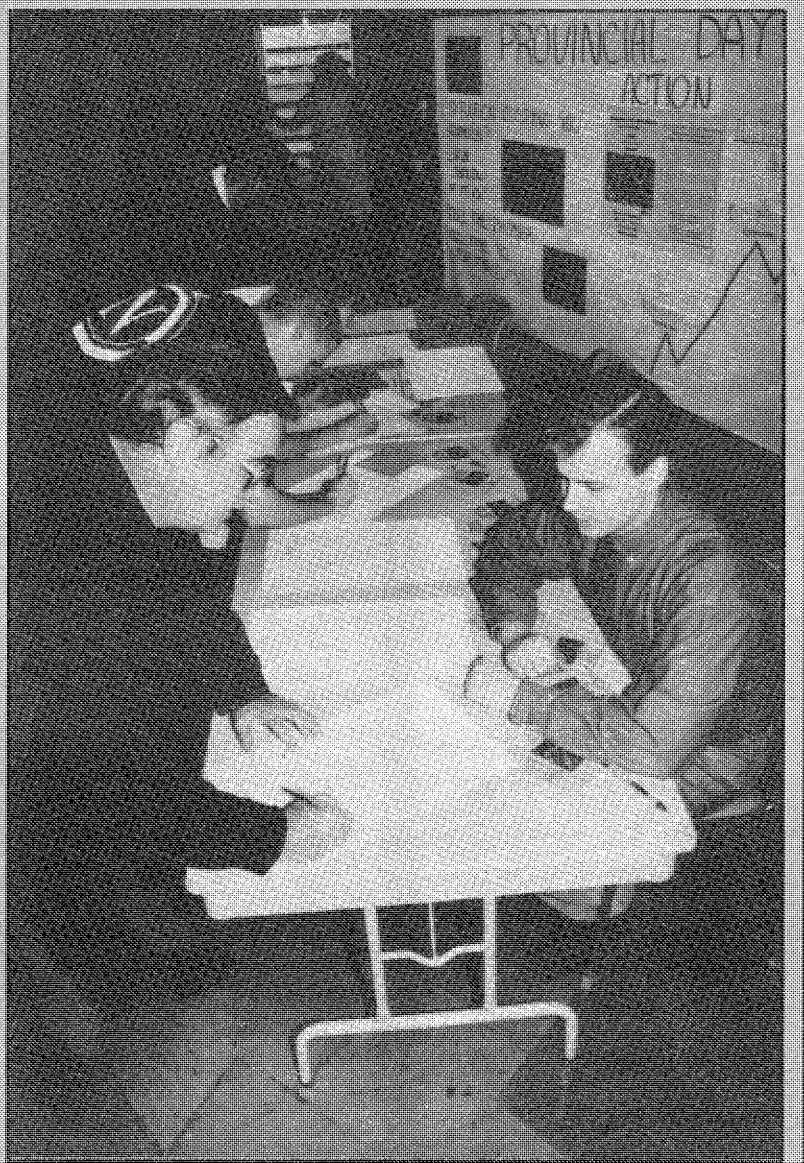
I must really commend Athletics V.P. Doug Popowich on his efforts to make this trip a success, and an enjoyable trip for all those involved.

Protest Update

A picture may be worth a thousand words but a petition is worth a thousand names. The petition in question was drawn up by the Alberta College and Technical Institutes Students' Executive Council (ACTISEC) and circulated here at NAIT last week. According to NAITSA president and ACTISEC representative Chris Wilson, the preliminary tally is in. The verdict: 900 signatures in 2 days with the results from the NAIT Academic Staff Association (NASA) still due. Once those numbers have been received, the total should be near 1000 names. Wilson stated that he expected 1000 names and he's "relatively happy" with the project so far. The petitions will be collected from 14 schools across Alberta and will be presented to premier Ralph Klein during a meeting at the end of February or the beginning of March. That meeting is still being organized.

Students win award for community service

Edmonton Journal columnist Cam Tait presented two students with NAIT tuition scholarships in recognition of their commitment to community service.

Angela Lee, a second-year Business Administration student, and Denny Mellot, a first-year Electronics Engineering Technology student, each received \$1,300 to put towards their NAIT education.

"I'm putting myself through school, so this scholarship will make a big difference. I really appreciate it," says Angela.

The money for the NAIT Cam Tait Tuition Scholarship was raised during last summer's Foundation Drive for the Green. On top of the \$30,000 raised during the event, an additional \$2,650 was raised for the scholarship fund.

Tournament players placed wagers on how many strokes it would take Cam — playing from his wheelchair — to sink the ball. Charitable golfers also topped up the fund through donations.

Cam, a NAIT Radio and Television Arts 1977 alumnus, enjoyed swapping stories about volunteering and community work with Angela and Denny during a January 17 lunch held in their honor.

For Denny, his favorite volunteer activity was during high school when he joined a Reading Buddies

Program. Here he teamed up with Grade One and Two students to help them with their reading.

"During the Reading Buddies Program, I was able to watch my buddy Bobby improve his reading skills, and he and I made a life-long friendship," says Denny.

Angela's most recent volunteer role as a worker in a Mexican orphanage as a learning experience.

"The work made me realize that even when faced with the most trying of personal obstacles, you can overcome them," she says.

NAIT Career Advisor Helene Lagace believes in scholarships that recognize community service, although the majority are based on academic achievement.

"Students that give their time to help others deserve recognition," she says.

In coming years, the NAIT Cam Tait Tuition Scholarship will be awarded to one NAIT student who takes time out to make a difference in the community.

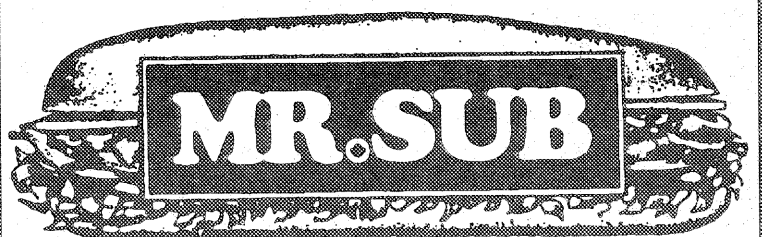

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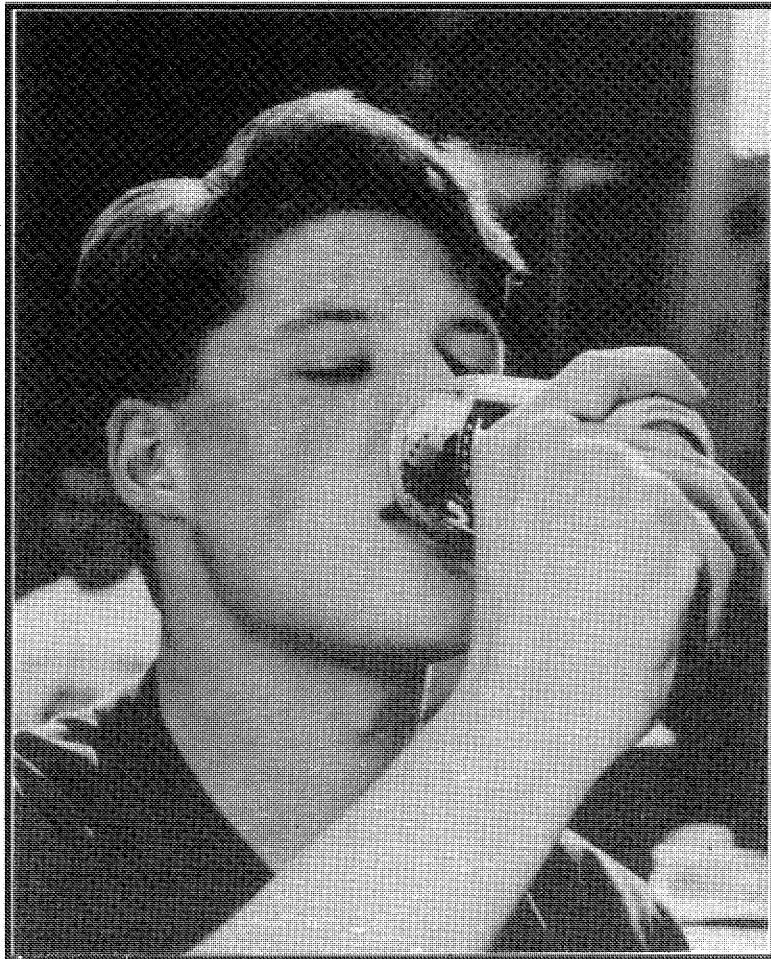

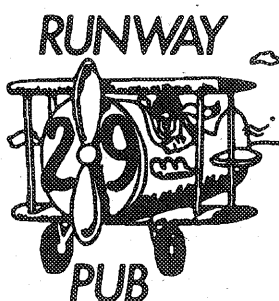

Give yourself a (tax) break

The time is coming. The time to fill out your tax return, that is, and the people at H & R Block have a few tips to help students spend the least on their tax payments and get the most out of their refunds.

-a single student who earns less than \$6456 a year can receive a GST credit of \$199. You must apply for this with the GST form in your return.

-if you are a low-income taxpayer, as most students are, you may get tax credits in a tax refund. Even those who have never paid any tax may be eligible for a refund.

-if deductions were made from your summer pay cheques, chances are that most of it can be recovered

on your return plus some of the CPP premiums.

-the first \$500 of income from scholarships, bursaries, fellowships and achievement prizes is exempt from tax.

-student loans are completely non-taxable.

-any moving expenses incurred may be deductible, providing that the new residence is at least 40 km closer to school than the old residence.

-tuition fees in excess of \$100 can be claimed as a tax credit.

-for every month or part of a month that a student was enrolled full-time in college, \$80 may be claimed on the tax return as an education amount.

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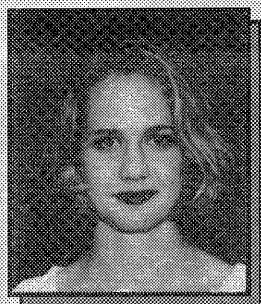

NAIT gives its students a watered down version of Reading Week. We get two days off at the end of the week. Combine that with Family Day Monday and we get a five day weekend.

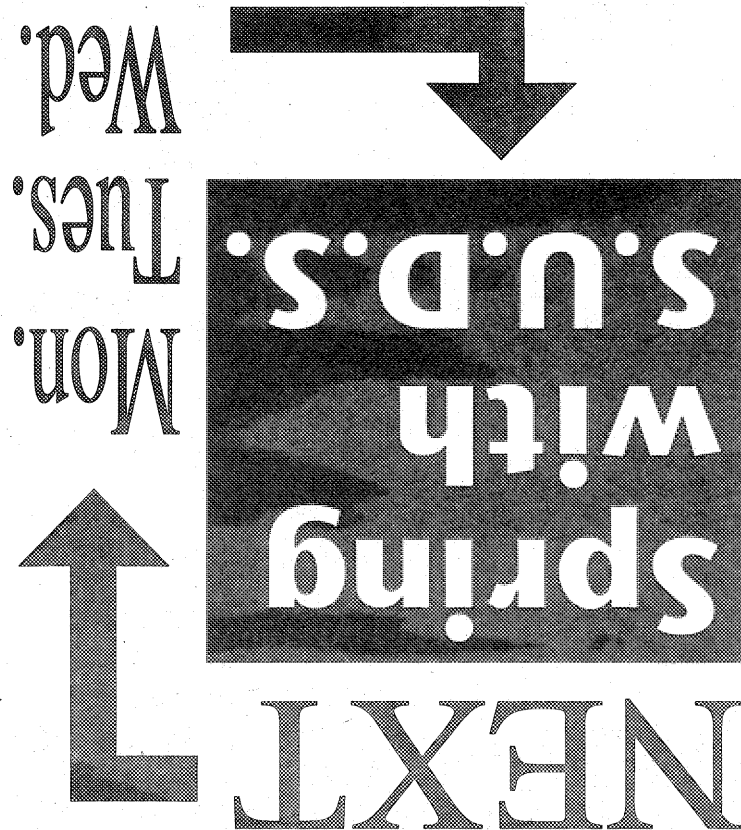
The reasons behind the short break run anywhere from NAIT is less stressful than University because we have smaller classes to NAIT students experience a different kind of stress and don't need the break.

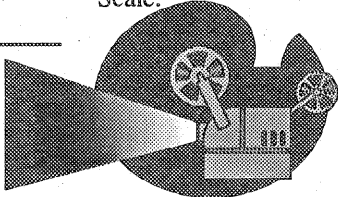
THE JUROR

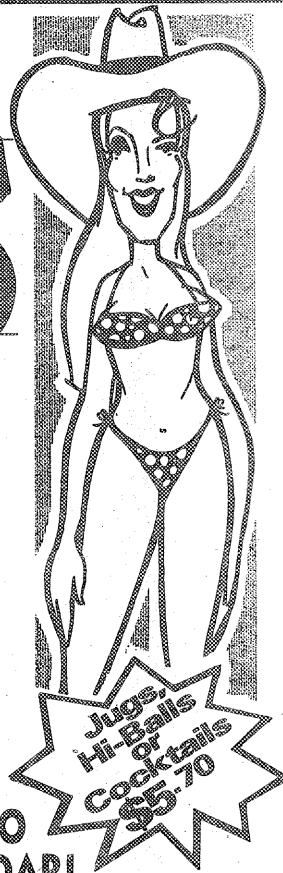

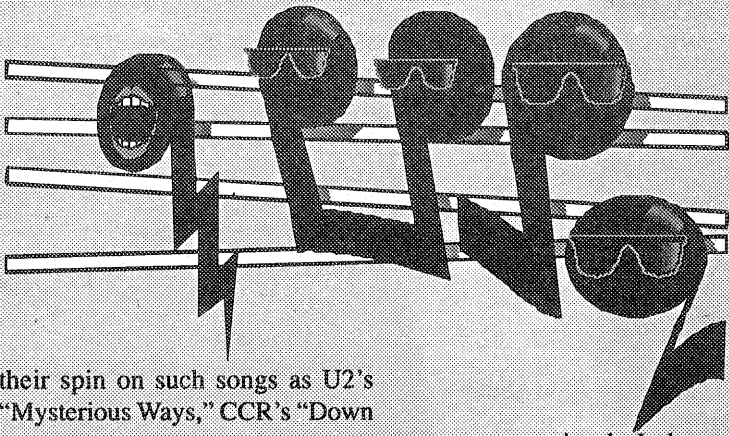

These guys can sing literally any song acepella, whether the tune is disco, country, doo wop, or rock.

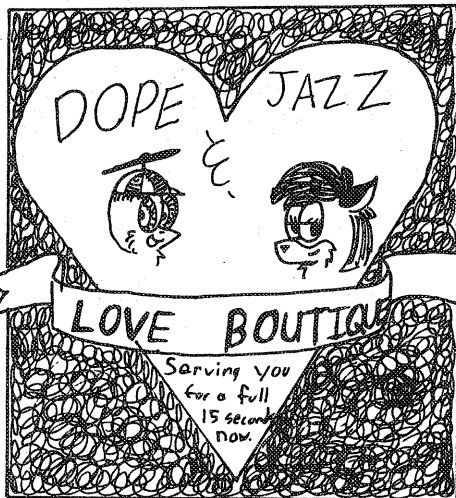

Acepella is challenging because you have to be a good singer to keep time in your head and flow harmoniously. It showcases one's pure singing voice alone with no music to use for camouflage.

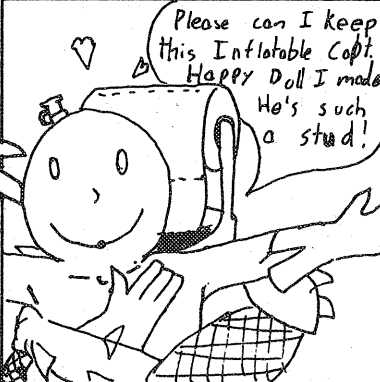

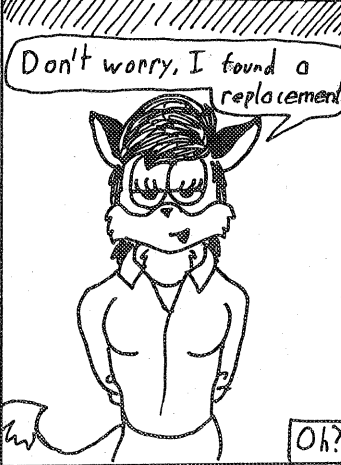

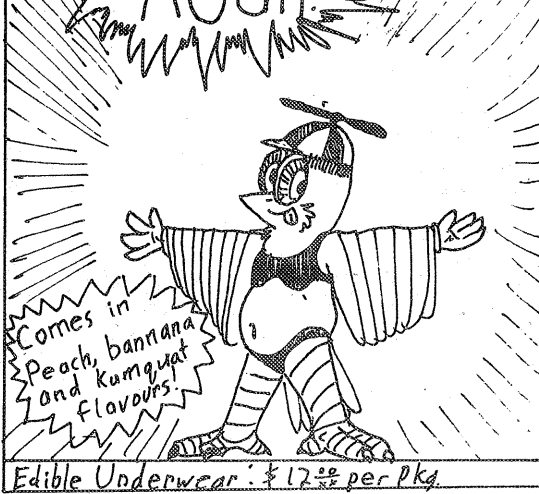

Now our passes weren't quite getting to our teammates, the shots weren't falling and we were getting pushed around. The intensity was there, and the will to win was there,

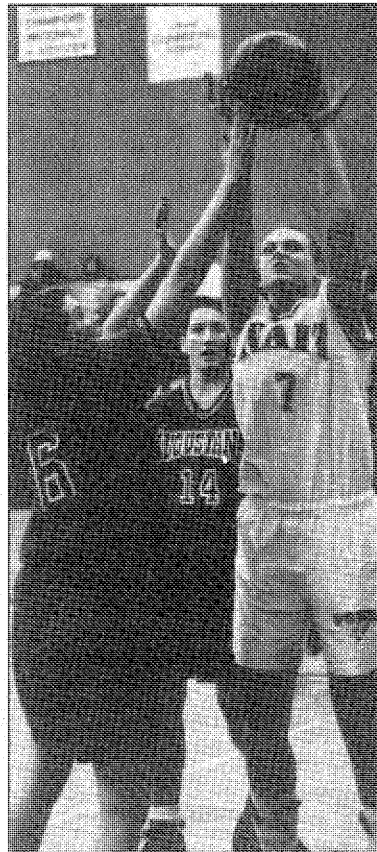
