Klein meets with students

No name-calling on the agenda

It's true that Alberta Premier Ralph Klein has not always thought favourably of protesting post-secondary students. He even called them "jackasses" only a month ago. Next week he's going to meet with those same students and name-calling is not on the agenda.

University of Alberta Students' Union vice president external Matt Hough, along with delegates from the Universities of Calgary and Lethbridge, as well as the Council of Alberta University Students, are anxiously awaiting the meeting. They should be as they have been trying to set it up for three months.

It was at a Faculty of Law ceremony on October 20 when Klein spoke out that students must approve of his budget cuts because they no longer throw eggs at politicians (referring to an incident in 1991 where former Advanced Education minister John Gogo was egged by protesting students). Klein repeated his comments at the University of Calgary in November. With that in mind, STORM (Student Organized Resistance Movement) planned to show Klein on December 10 at the Legislature tree lighting ceremony that students do care, so they tried to give him 1200 eggs with student signatures on them. It would have been a peaceful reminder if it hadn't failed. As the University of Alberta Gateway re-

ported, Security personnel told the students to wait at the door and the premier would meet with them shortly. Klein then avoided the confrontation and called them jackasses as they were left out in -30 degree temperatures.

With that in mind, Garrett Poston, U of A Students' Union president, fired off a letter to the Edmonton Sun, calling Klein's actions, "rep-

rehensible." Apparently, that was the straw that broke the camel's back. Klein called Poston the next day and set up

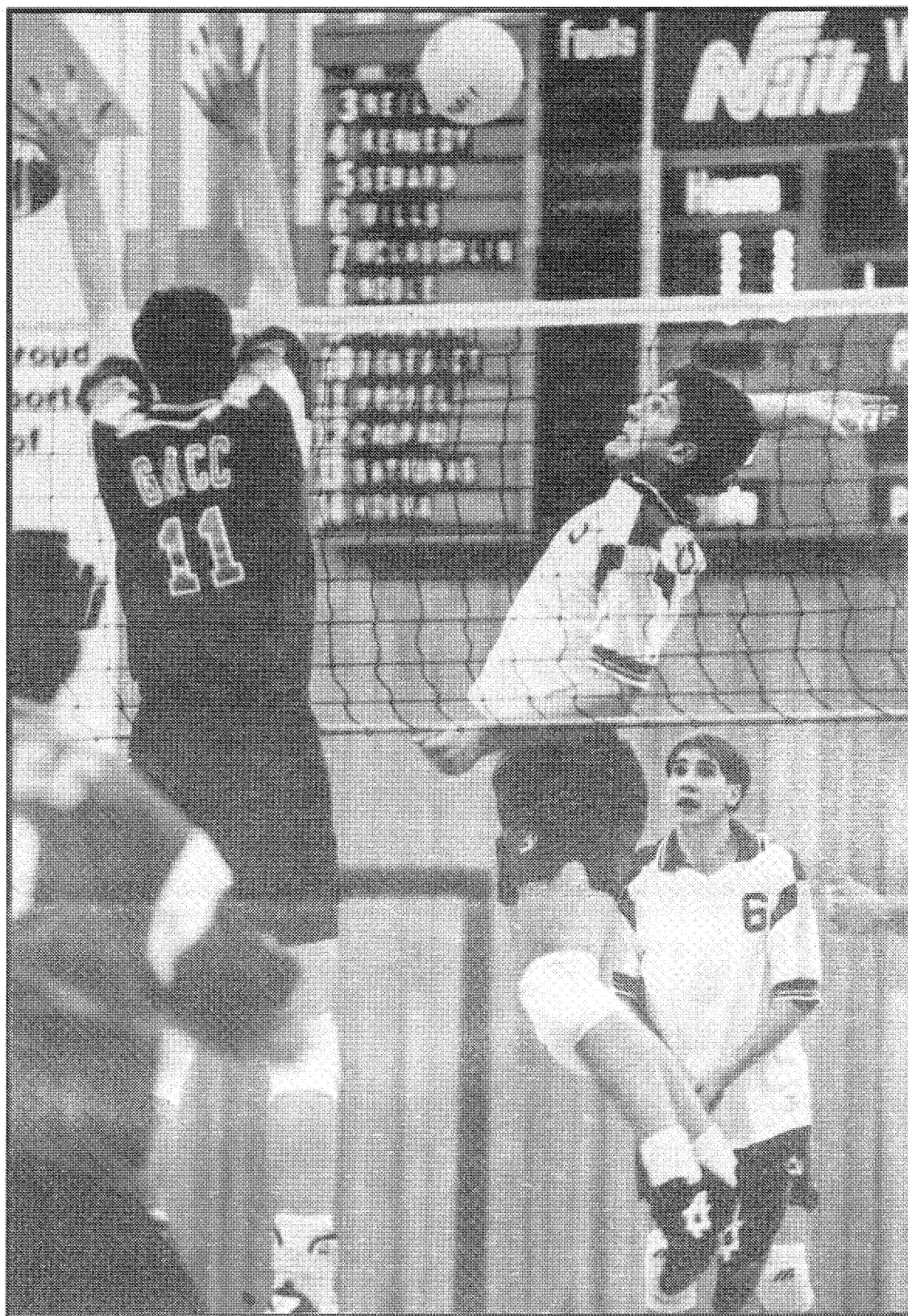

the meeting for January 17 at his office.

When asked about his objectives for the meeting, Hough detailed that it will try to "open up a dialogue and keep the channel of communication open". Although he couldn't reveal the specifics of his strategy, he mentioned that his focus will be reinvesting in post-secondary education.

NAIT, as a member of ACTISEC (the Alberta College and Technical Institute Students' Executive Council), is planning an alternate strategy to the CAUS campaign. January 31 has been designated a Provincial Day of Action to protest funding cuts and the general state of degradation of post-secondary education.

In the works for ACTISEC's protest are petitions and postcards of opposition to be signed by students and sent to the premier.

ask that very question. The answer is yes, NAIT does own the land and the building. So why the special ticket? As it turns out, NAIT is under contract with the City of Edmonton for these tickets, and their

the Petroleum Engineering Technology here at NAIT. They started their education at the Ukhta Industrial Institute, a university-style school. Why did they come to NAIT — because there are relations between staff here and staff over there. They are studying our methods of training in the petroleum industry.

You can imagine how difficult it must be to adjust to education in a foreign country, that is why these students had to take a number of English courses. Through the last semester, they had to learn how to read, write, and speak in English.

"The courses are easier here than in Russia," says student Snejana Bykova, the elder of the group, and the most experienced. Snejana is

contracted to work for a Russian oil company for three years once she is finished her education. Can you imagine having a job already waiting for you when you graduate?

The other two who were interviewed, Maria Gourevitch and Svetlana Chpakova,

have a little longer to study. When asked, Maria stated, "maybe I would like to work in Australia." Svetlana said, "I would like, maybe, to work in Canada."

But those decisions are still a few years away. After staying for the two year petroleum program, they must go back to Russia to finish their schooling and earn their degrees. They all agree, however, that they would like to find work in the field of exploration.

For the summer break, thoughts are on family and friends. Each would like to spend time back in Russia, before spending time working. Compared to their hometown, of approximately 100,000 people, Edmonton is a lot more quiet and

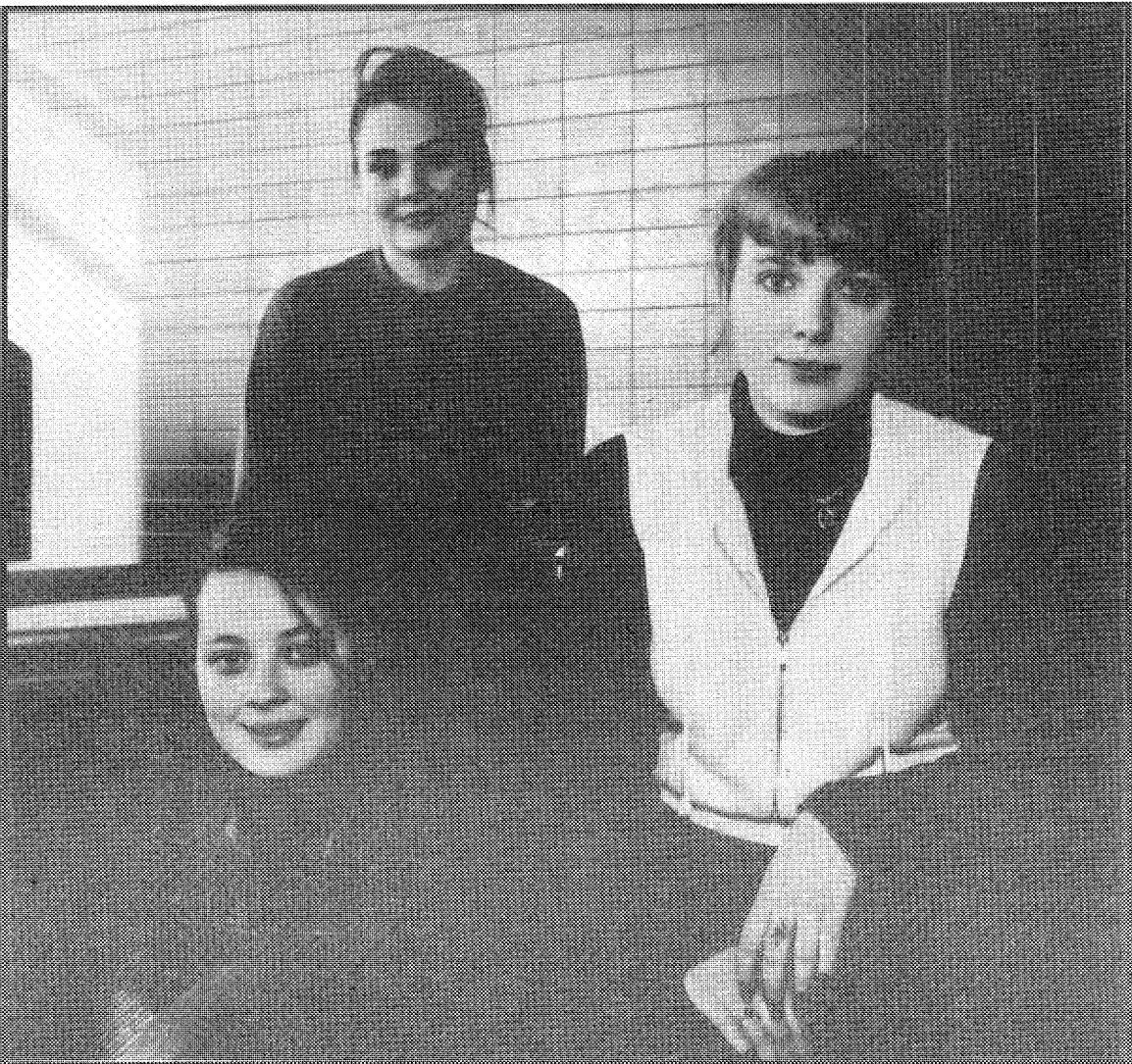


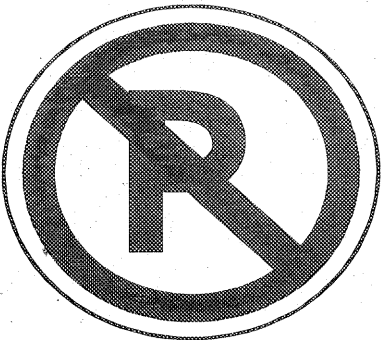

Parking Tickets Anyone

You're not alone if you've ever had troubles finding a parking spot in the parkade. More than a handful of students with valid parking passes have been forced to park illegally this semester. By 10 o'clock in the morning, it's likely all parking stalls will be occupied. Parking clerk Carol Klien-Robinson explains there are two daily entry lots on campus which fill up fast. Tickets are then sold for any empty spots security finds in the B zone of the parkade. By 10 o'clock, they assume all students are in class. 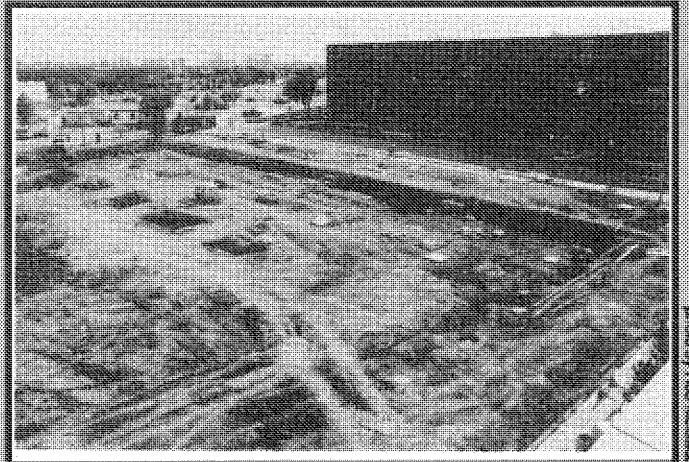

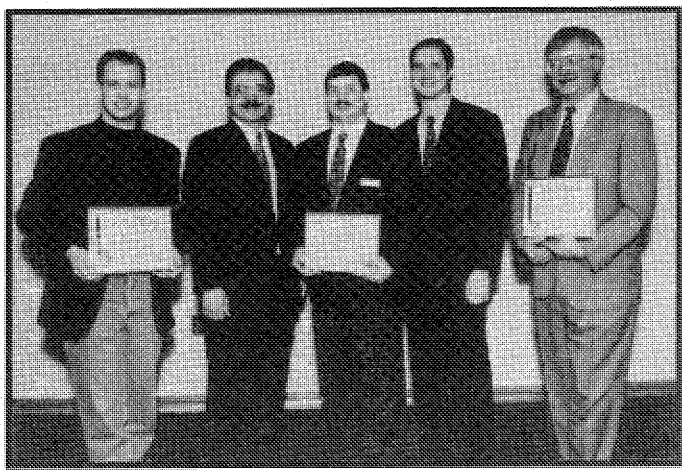

How valuable is your privacy?

carry this card at all times and could only access the information with a security code.

A centralized health information network and the healthcare cards have many advantages. You cannot overlook the advantages for patients, doctors and the budget.

However, you should be careful.

Healthcare officials say maintaining privacy is paramount, but they have no concrete plans to back this up.

You need to ask yourself whether this technological leap is worthwhile. What if your medical information falls into the wrong hands. Insurance companies, employers and the media (to name a few) have a vested interest in learning about your health. Has anyone ever heard

of bribing a government official for information? The movies brim with this theme - which is not too far off the mark. Not saying that there is a great chance someone is going to slip a civil servant a c-note for your medical background, but you should consider whether or not you are comfortable with the possibility of that happening.

Healthcare officials say maintaining privacy is paramount, but they have no concrete plans to back this up.

They have a soiled track record when it comes to maintaining privacy. Social Insurance Numbers were initially only to be used by the Federal Government. Today they are used much more casually.

All technological advances possess benefits as well as liabilities. When it comes to your health and your privacy, you should seriously consider whether the benefits of the impending Health Information Network outweigh the risks.

If you're not comfortable with this idea, contact your MLA.

How valuable is your privacy? This is a question all Canadians should ask themselves in the coming months.

Privacy is a scarce commodity in this country and carries a limitless price tag.

In the age of the internet and massive computer data bases, Canadians are losing the luxury of keeping their business to themselves.

The Alberta Government is currently toying with the idea of creating a healthcare network. They have already formed the Healthcare Information Utility which has the massive job of deciding how doctors, hospitals and pharmacies are going to do their paper work.

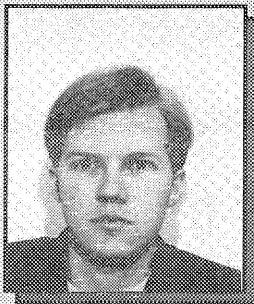
The idea is your medical history, the treatment you're currently undergoing and the drugs you are taking will all be logged onto a computer. This data will be stored in a

centralized location. From there, any doctor, nurse or pharmacist will be able to find out what medication you're taking and what diseases you have.

The motivation behind the creation of a healthcare database is ... of course ... saving money.

Apparently, storing healthcare information is a central database will save the government anywhere from \$100-million to \$1-billion annually. The savings come as a result of less duplication of services as well as better diagnosis and treatment. For example, if you were ever rushed to the hospital because you were in a car accident, the hospital could find out if you are allergic to any medication.

The other idea the government is toying with is healthcare cards which contain information about your medical history. You would

live on. There have been others like Malcolm X, whose struggle for equality focused on the differences between us which seemed to spark only bitterness and violence. King, on the other hand, tried to find the

common bond between us all, to make us see beyond the colour of our skin into that which we all share: the spirit of humanity.

It is for this reason that I remember Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Some people can lead a life of mediocrity and be content to seldom have uncommon worries or tribulations. These people are plentiful. And then there are a rare few who take upon themselves the strife of higher principles, principles like greater peace and equality among all human beings. We praise them for their spirit and ambition toward the betterment of our society.

Although only a formal holiday in the United States, January 15 is unofficially recognized around the world as Martin Luther King Day. It is a day to remember a man of high ideals who set out to personally change the system for the better.

After becoming a Baptist minister at age 17 and later having earned degrees in theology and sociology as well as his doctorate in philosophy, Martin Luther King Jr. decided, at the age of 26, to change the active racial discrimination in the American South. In 1955, he successfully organized a year-long boycott of public buses with "colored" segregated seating in Montgomery, Alabama. This protest, started by Rosa Parks, heralded King as a national civil rights leader.

As a disciple of Gandhi and Thoreau, King espoused the virtues of satyagraha, meaning "truth-force", and is the guiding belief behind a nonviolent attitude toward civil protests. This philosophy helped him win many battles. In 1957, the Supreme Court ruled that

racial segregation in public buses was unlawful. Along the steep road of King's other campaigns lay the milestones of the Civil Rights Act in 1964 and the Voting Rights Act in 1965, all promoting equality.

During the entire time of his social activism, he managed to write several books and make speeches whenever he could. On August 28, 1963, he organized and led the infamous March on Washington wherein he delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech. This was still a year before Nelson Mandela was sentenced to life imprisonment in South Africa. King received many accolades for his human rights advocacy, including 20 honorary degrees, 250 citations for civil rights work, Time Magazine's Man of the Year 1964 (the first black American so honored) and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize the same year (the youngest person to achieve that distinction).

King never had time to rest. In the midst of planning a March on Washington for the poor in early 1968, he detoured to Memphis to aid a group of striking sanitation workers. It was there, on April 4, that he was assassinated. Although one man, James Earl Ray, admitted to the killing, the circumstances surrounding the death are still suspect, and many theorists believe that there was a conspiracy involving many others.

Regardless, his life and his work

Max-A-Millian: Take Your Time

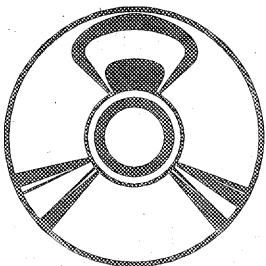
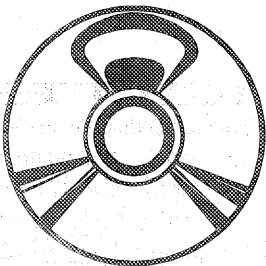

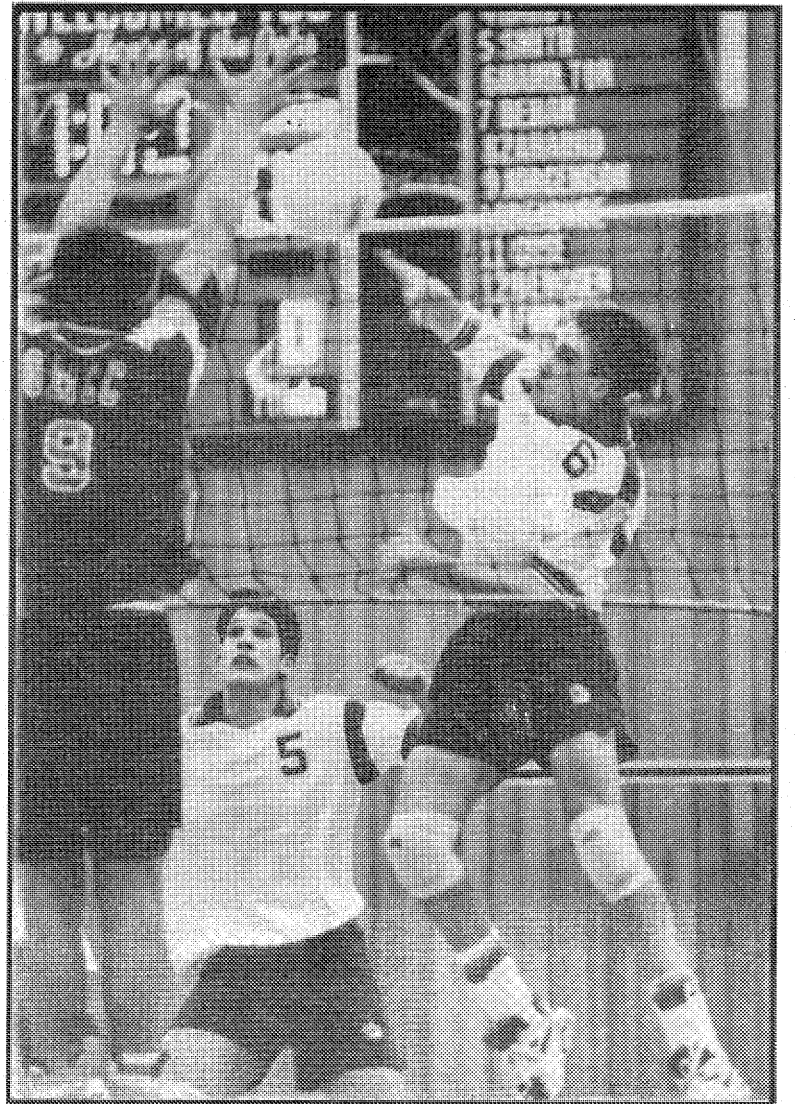

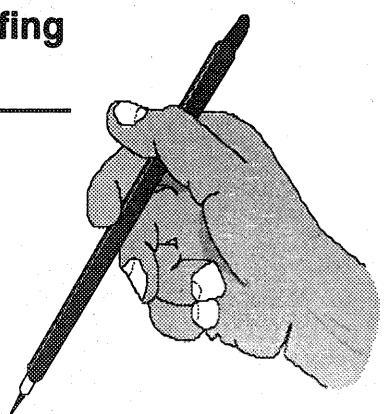
things that might be the cause to the disappointing start to the season.

Come out and support our athletes this weekend as they challenge our cross-town rivals from Grant MacEwan Community College.

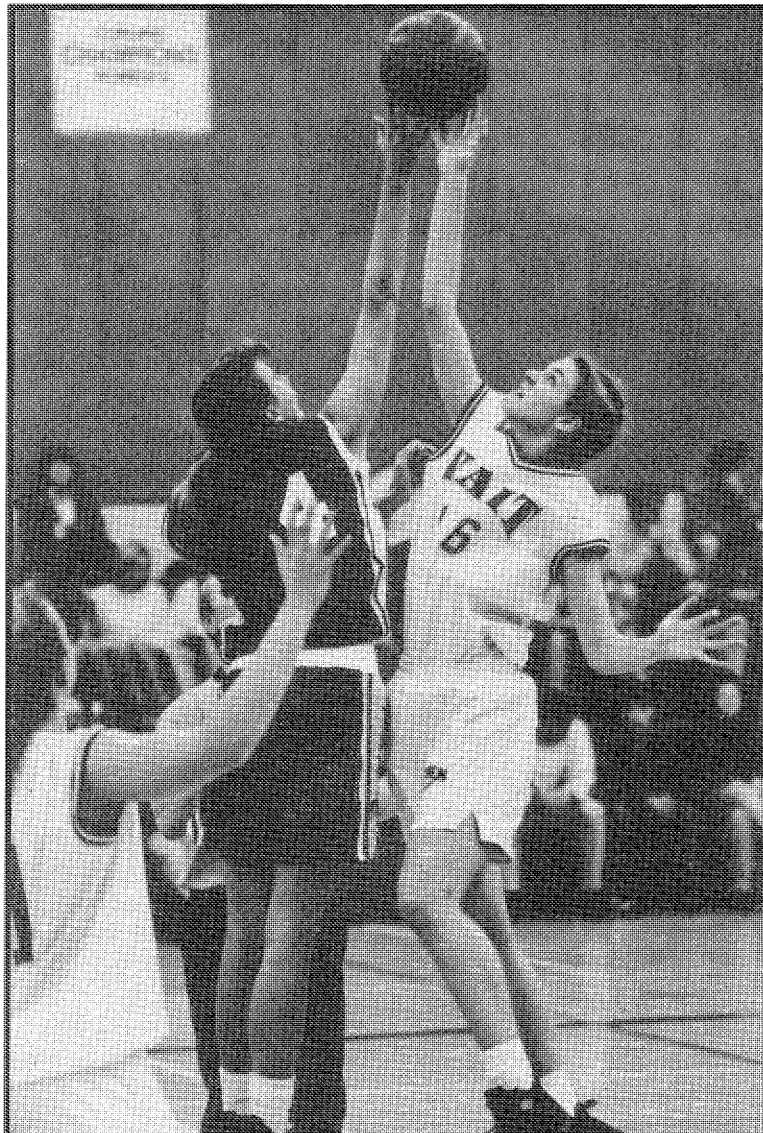
