ACTISEC ATTACK!

Premier beware! There is another student offensive being organized and it is coming sooner than you would probably like. It's no assault on Normandy; it's a Provincial Day of Action, brought to you by the Alberta College and Institute

Students' Executive Council (ACTISEC). They have planned a postcard and petition campaign for next Wednesday, January 31.

It's also trying to arrange a meeting with Jack Ady, Provincial

Minister of Advanced Education, to ensure that its message of education support was received.

Chris Wilson, NAITSA president and representative to ACTISEC has high hopes for the protest. When asked about his expectations, he replied that "considering the support for the Bacchus drive, we should get at least 1000 names on the petition," referring to the alcohol awareness drive that had enough students sign their names to fill in a large banner.

An ACTISEC press release regarding the action states that the main focus is to "spark awareness and protest the devastating cuts to post-secondary education. Class sizes are increasing, tuition fees rising, and students are faced with massive debt loads upon graduation with shrinking job prospects."

With this in mind, a booth will be set up in the main lobby on Wednesday, January 31, with ready-to-sign petitions available for student signatures. NAIT is not participating with postcards as are some of the other ACTISEC schools.

BoG Rep sheds some light on South Instructional Centre

As a student, you may be excited and even a little curious about the new building being constructed on main campus. The South Instructional Centre has also been the cause of a lot of confusion among students and staff here at NAIT. The following will hopefully provide some insight on the subject...

Which technologies will be moving into the new building?

The new addition will provide lab space specifically for Animal Health Technology and Biological Sciences Technology. Also, common classroom space will be available to all other programs.

What will the new building

feature?

Besides classroom and lab space, the new building will feature a 350-seat lecture theatre, two 90-seat lecture theatres, and one 150-seat lecture theatre.

Also featured will be a coffee kiosk, more student lounge space, and a walk-in bookstore.

The walk-in bookstore will provide better customer service to students. More products and product lines will be available for students to choose from. Above all, there will be one location for you to purchase your books and supplies that doesn't move depending on the time of year!!

When will the new building be

ready for use?

For students attending NAIT in September 1996, you will be purchasing your books and supplies in the new bookstore. The students of Animal Health and Biological Sciences will be attending classes in the new building at this time.

What is the total cost of the

new building?

The cost of the building itself is slightly over \$8 million. The total project, which includes furnishings, equipment, design fees, and renovations to vacated space, will total approximately \$9.9 million.

In a time of government fund-

ing and grant reductions, how is NAIT paying for such a costly venture?

Unlike most educational capital projects, not a single penny of funding for the new building came

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The Ogoni Struggle

The Ogoni are a race of people living in Nigeria (central west Africa). They have a population of 500,000, less than the population of Edmonton.

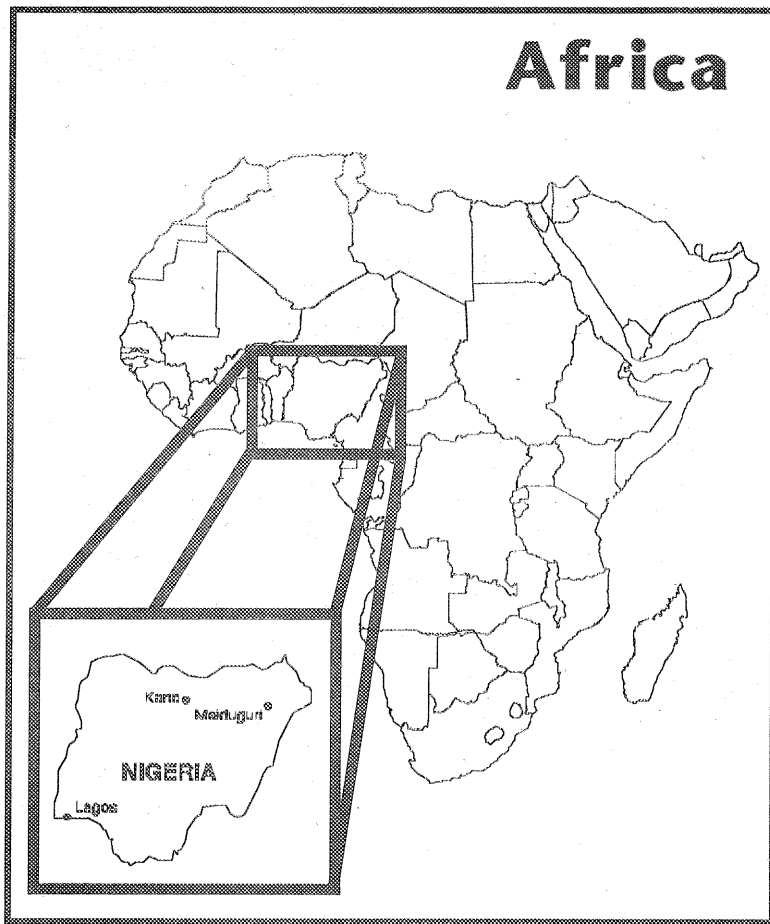
Their very existence is being threatened by the actions of Shell Nigeria (part of the multinational conglomerate commonly known as Shell).

The trouble started back in 1958, at the first discovery of oil. Only recently have events warranted "global recognition". Part of the problem is that the Ogoni represent only a small portion of the population of Nigeria, and therefore are deemed unimportant.

The environmental damage being done is staggering. Between 1976 and 1991, about 3000 oil spills have been reported. These spills average about 700 barrels each.

Often, response to such spills is slow and damaging. One spill which was set alight caused the land to be unusable, even though Shell has reported it as being cleaned up. In more recent years, Shell required six weeks to respond to a leaking pipeline.

In addition to spills, gas flares from the wells have been polluting the atmosphere (flares can last up to 30 years). In response to this inaction, the Ogoni have formed MOSOP, Movement for the Survival of Ogoni People. After multiple peaceful protests, Ogoni villages suffered brutal attacks. While the military maintains that it had no involvement, one eyewitness reported that the attackers spoke a language other than the native tongue. These attacks, between August and Sep-



tember 1993, left 750 people dead, and 30,000 homeless.

One memo, dated May 12, 1994 stated "Shell operations still impossible unless ruthless military operations are undertaken for smooth economic activities to commence." It is also reported that this memo continues the "wasting" of Ogoni leaders.

Shell has released a publication stating that the reports of environmental devastation are exaggerated. They do, however, admit to the presence of 3000 drilling sites across the Nigerian Delta. These sites account

for 1100 million cubic feet of flared gases per day. Shell says that the Nigerian legal system should be left to resolve this problem. It is this very system that has allowed the actions of Shell to continue. The actual word of the company has yet to be analyzed but this kind of devastation is hard to cover up. from new government funding. Funding was raised through external sources through a campaign called "Partners in Tomorrow". With corporate sponsors, private donations, staff contributions, and student con-

tributions, NAIT has paid for the building with no new government financial assistance.

Students have made a significant contribution. Each student pays a Students' Association Fee every year (or half year) that they attend NAIT (not part of tuition). \$15 of that fee for the past 6 years (1989 - 1996) has been put into a separate fund for the new building. Of the total cost of the project, over \$760,000 was contributed by YOU, the students of NAIT!!

Students and staff should be excited to see the expansion of such a great post-secondary institute.

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Are the recent tuition increases linked to the funding of this new building?

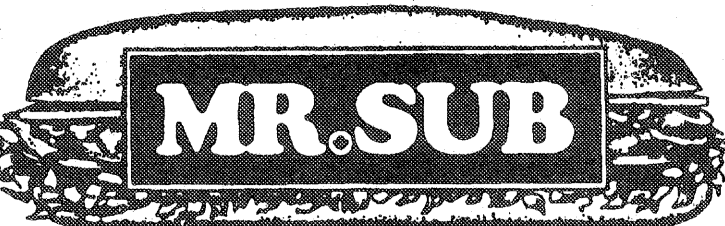
The rumor that your tuition is increasing as a result of the construction of the new building is simply untrue. The tuition increase that all post-secondary students in Alberta are experiencing is due to operating budget decisions resulting from reductions in provincial grants.

Will I have to take classes in the large auditoriums with

hundreds of other students in the future? The initial intentions of building a large auditorium into the new building was not for bigger classes. Of course, the large seating space does lend an opportunity for holding seminars, orientations, small graduations, guest speakers, and other situations where it is ideal to meet in a large group. But in terms of holding huge classes, like at university, it is not in the plans for NAIT administrators. It is ridiculous to think that most classes will turn into "university style" classes with hundreds of students in one class. There is not enough space in the four lecture theatres of the new building to accommodate this idea.

Don't worry, NAIT has no intention of providing "university-style" classes!

Students and staff should be excited to see the expansion of such a great post-secondary institute. It is refreshing to see that in times of budget cuts and government grant reductions, that NAIT has the support and resources to continue moving into the future by providing "Quality Career Education."

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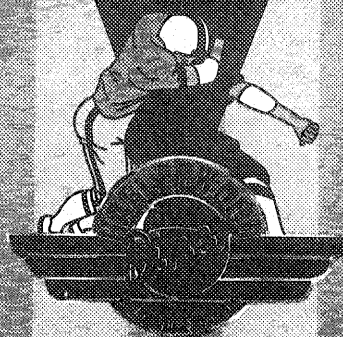

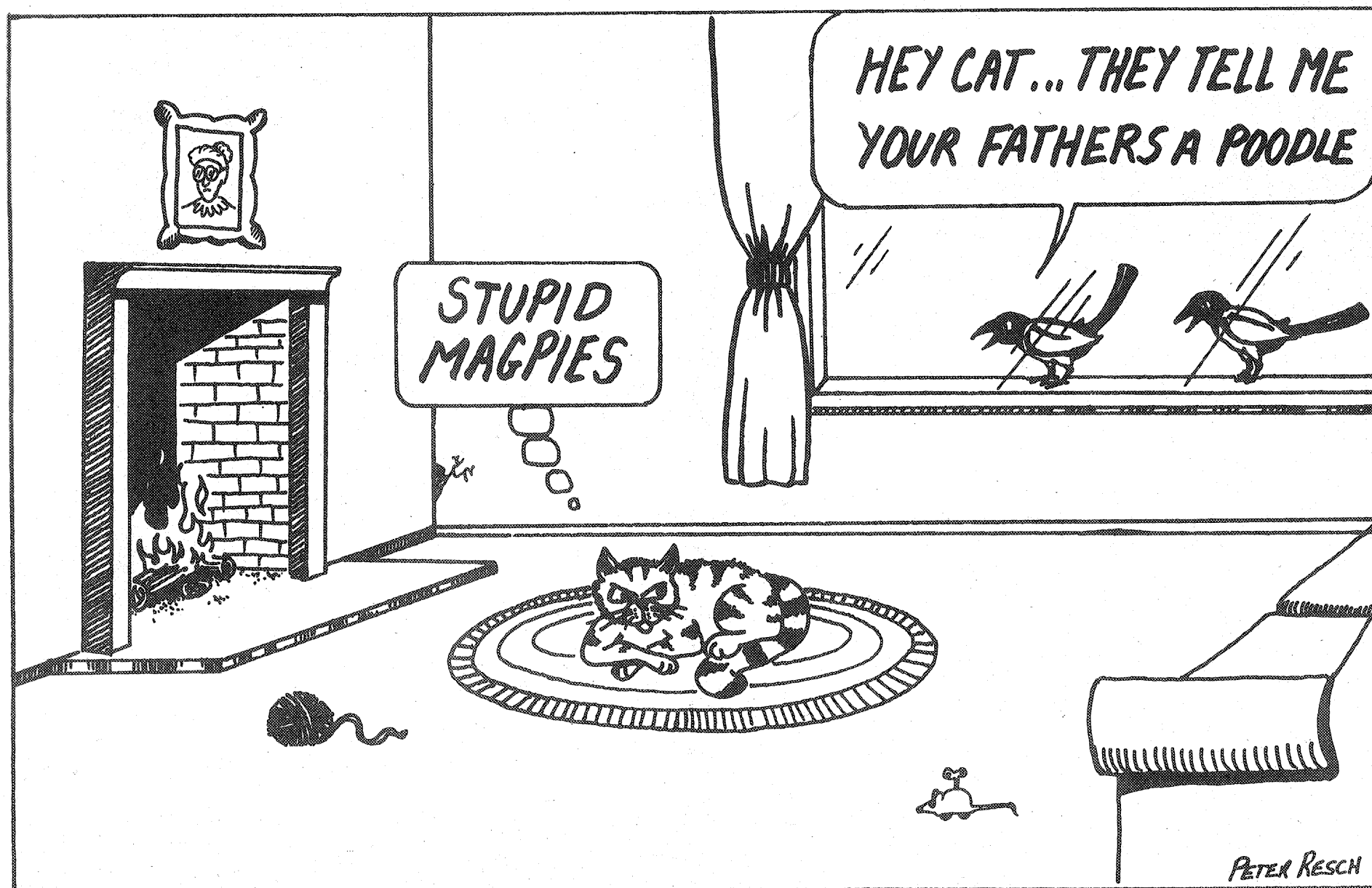

In one case, a student waited in line for over five minutes, before pulling out a quarter and using the pay phone.

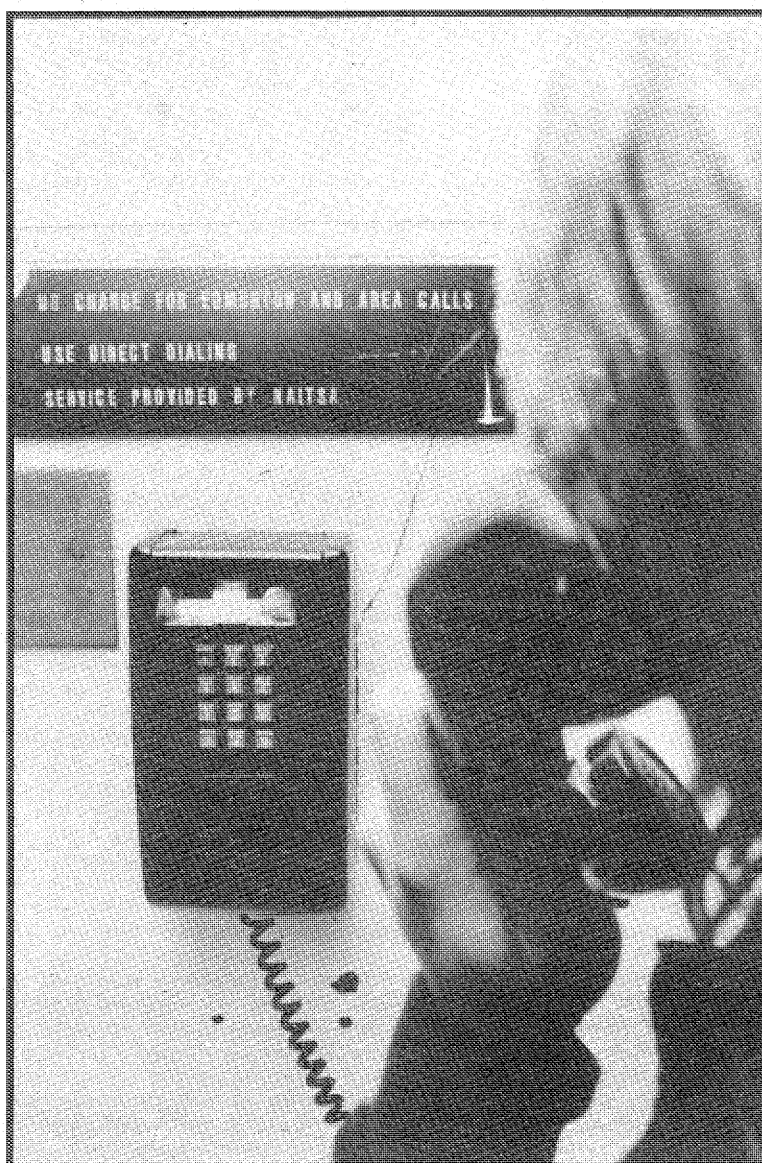
Sure the phone is worth the cost, but it is being sorely abused. In one case, a student waited in line for over five minutes, before pulling out a quarter and using the pay phone.

STUDENT AWARDS PROGRAM

NAIT Badminton won't stop till they reach the top

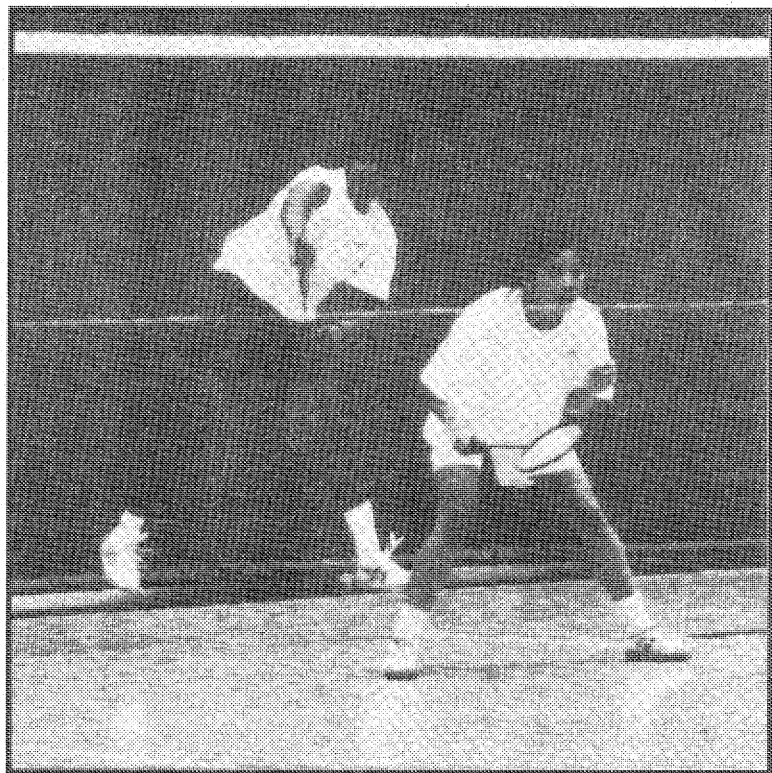

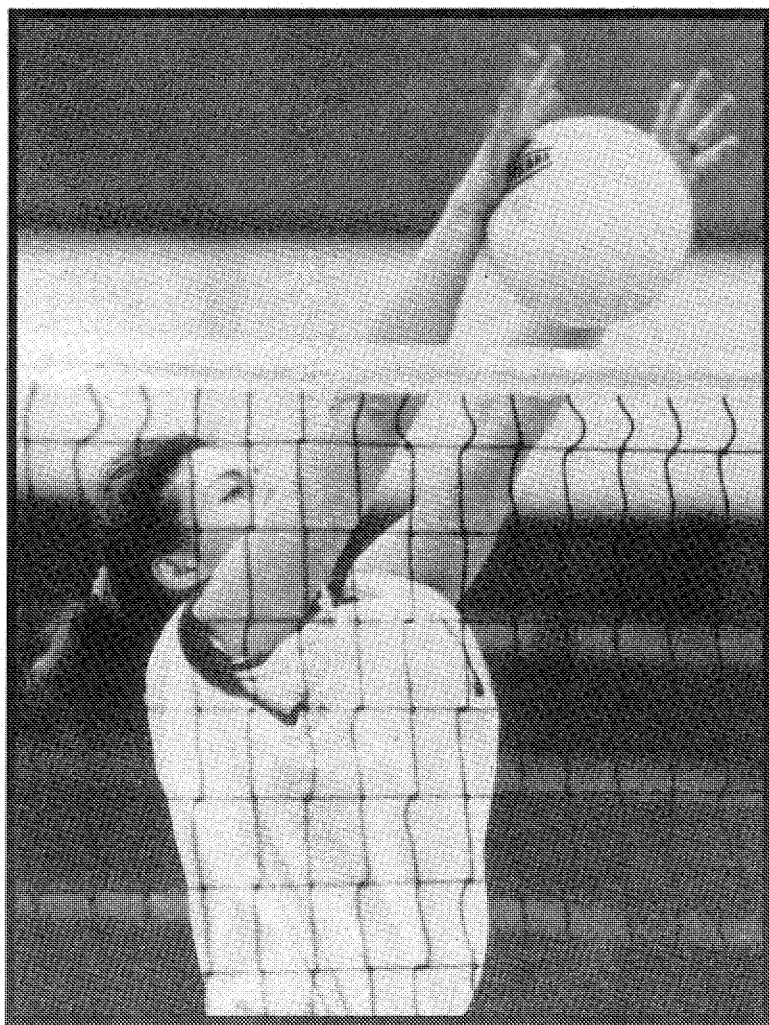
