Stats Can Reports a Gloomy Picture of Literacy

In a report released last Thursday, Statistics Canada reports that many Canadians have difficulty reading in this era we live in. In this same report, Alberta was found to have the highest proportion of people with high-grade skills, followed closely by Ontario and British Columbia.

Some of the startling results of this study are eye opening.

Only one in five adult Canadians tested can read the instructions on an Aspirin bottle so that they can take the proper dosage. Merely 59% of those polled said that they regularly read a newspaper. These facts raise concerns about our society due to the high amount of literacy required in many of today's jobs. The jobs that once required only the minimum of literacy skills are quickly and quietly dis-

appearing.

The same report states that literacy varies from region to region.

After Alberta, British Columbia and Ontario, the areas placed next on the list were the Atlantic provinces. Quebec finished in last place.

The information stemming from this report does not support the belief that the quality of the literacy skills taught in the Canadian education system is decreasing. In fact, the latest graduates are said to be, in general, much more liter-

ate than their older counterparts.

One surprising reality found in this study is that there has been no notable improvement in Canadian literacy since a similar study was done in 1989. It was believed that by replacing the older, poorly-educated workers with younger, well-educated workers, the overall level of literacy in Canada would improve.

SMOG FREE Keeps On Chugging

Until November 30, NAIT's automotive services section and 47 other Edmonton and area service stations will be offering free vehicle emissions testing. These tests are offered as part of the Alberta Lung Association's program to raise awareness about vehicle emissions.

Called SMOG FREE—Save Money On Gas From Reduced Exhaust Emissions—the program aims to attract participants with promises of economic benefit. As well as being made aware of engine inefficiencies and failures at no cost, participants will receive a \$10 discount coupon to go toward emissions-related car repair.

While the average Albertan is likely to be participate due to the low cost, the Lung Association's main concern is to, at minimum, prevent further degradation of air quality (and thereby prevent respiratory-related health problems). After you've fixed your car's emission problems, the ALA suggests other ways to reduce the quantity of emissions your car produces, which, in turn, may help improve the air you breathe.

Change your driving style.

Avoiding rapid acceleration and deceleration will improve your mileage as well as reduce pollutants emitted by your car.

Change your driving habits.

Walk or bike the few blocks to the store. Plan your journeys so that can fit all the errands you need to do into one trip, rather than a number of back and forth journeys.

Use public transit.

Each bus can hold approximately 80 people, which is 20 times more than a standard car can hold. You do the math. Despite the cuts to transit service and the fare increases Mayor Bill Smith has overseen, in a meaningless grasp for redemption, Smith was the first in line on September 9 for the program's kickoff at NAIT. The irony of Smith's presence at this

event was not unnoticed. His tax-funded vehicle, however, tested below the lax Canadian standards for emissions.

If you would like to have a vehicle tested, or if you would like more information on the participating locations, call Talking Yellow Pages at 493-9000 and enter 5864.

The program will run again in the spring. The Alberta Lung Association plans to expand it to include Calgary area service centers.

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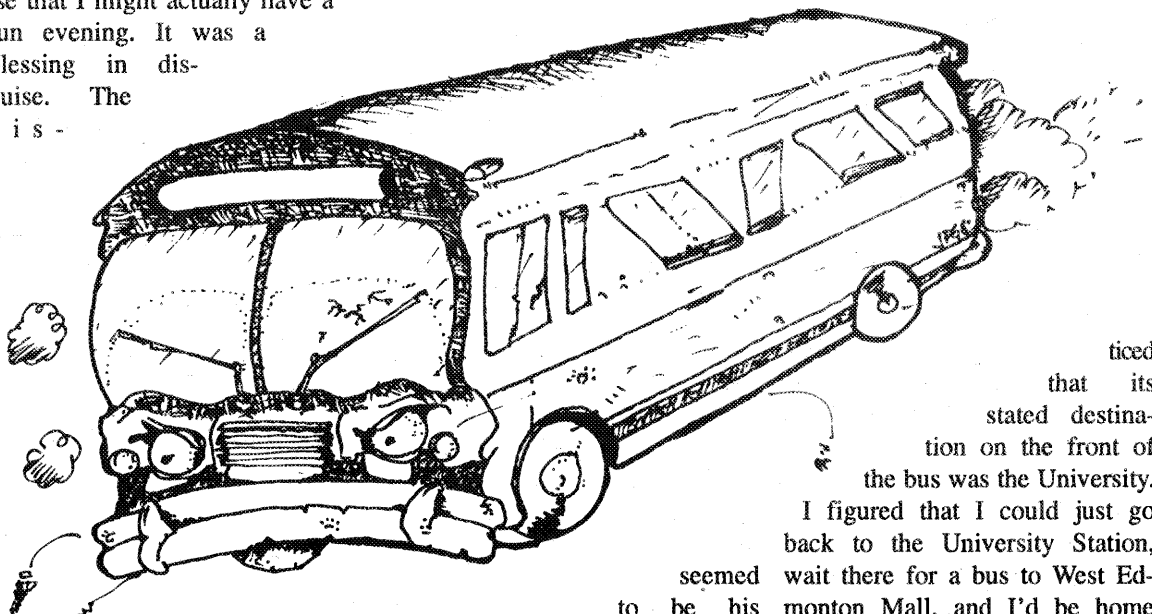
A Bus Named Nightmare

NAIT/SAIT Students Place at Culinary Olympics

Last week at the 1996 World Culinary Olympics IKA HOGA in Berlin, Germany, three NAIT students along with three SAIT students clinched a silver medal, becoming one of the top culinary teams in the world.

"We are so proud of them," exclaims Ralph Walker, Culinary Arts Program Head. "It's a tremendous accomplishment."

The six member team including NAIT's own Kristina Milisic (second year CuA), Mike Buckley (second year CuA), Aaron Cowley (third year apprentice) and three students from SAIT scored an amazing 312 points out of a possible 340. The only teams to rank higher were Senior Team Alberta (gold medalists - 327 points out of 340) and the Grand Challenge

winners, Team Switzerland, who scored only one more point than Senior Team Alberta. The main reason winning a silver medal is so spectacular is because these

Culinary Arts students competed as professionals, not as students. This is the first time that there was no stu-

dent category at the Olympics.

Anyone who doesn't think my damn bus story is going to last forever...

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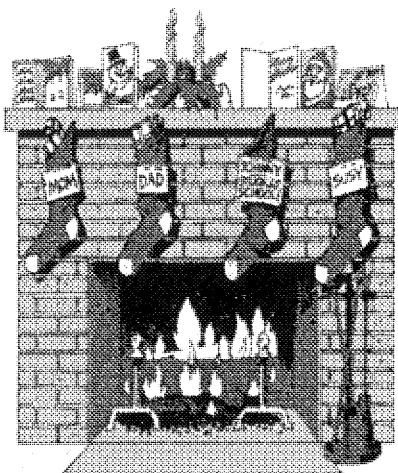
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My Two Cents Worth II

sonality because it's never established whether she's happy or moody, or what!?! This bothered me as a viewer because I like to try to understand each character fully.

Jennifer Aniston, as Renee, was well suited to play the wife of Francis. The superficial nature of her husband is not reflected by

her. She does appear to be self-important at times, however, she's basically good.

Heather is a wannabe upper-class tart who strives for money. She is sneaky and vindictive, but don't we all know someone like that? Cameron Diaz

does well with this part and is very convincing, you can't help but like her at the same time.

"She's the One" incorporates different types of personalities which makes at least one character easy to relate to. You understand most of their positions from the start, so it's easy to them. One of the film's flaws is that it falls into a slump in the slow-moving middle where it takes awhile for an event you know is going to happen to happen. Another flaw is that the plot is very similar to that of *The Brothers McMullen* (same makers) which deals with the same love-triangles type of issues. My major complaint is a character that is thrown into the plot but bares no significance to anything. I don't recall her name, but she works in a diner, as a waitress with Hope. She is in love with Hope or at least that is what the audience is made to believe, and she is an annoying, over protective bitch. I don't know if she was gay because she never reveals it, but she addresses, at least borderlines, gay issues that are irrelevant, really. She also flirts with the ideas of a threesome but then never touches it again. Basically, it's my guess that she's there for "effect". Maybe a lame attempt at showing how cultured and worldly Hope is. (Whatever!)

All in all, "She's the One" is filled with every emotion. Just when a tear jerking moment comes up, you're bailed out of crying in the theater by laughing. There are lots of crude, cheap shots in it, which is the humor style of this film. They would make you almost blush in embarrassment or disgust. "She's the One" is a must-see for any mature audience, as long as you're not offended by the mention of vibrators or orgasms. It's not just another "chick" movie, although it is light hearted. 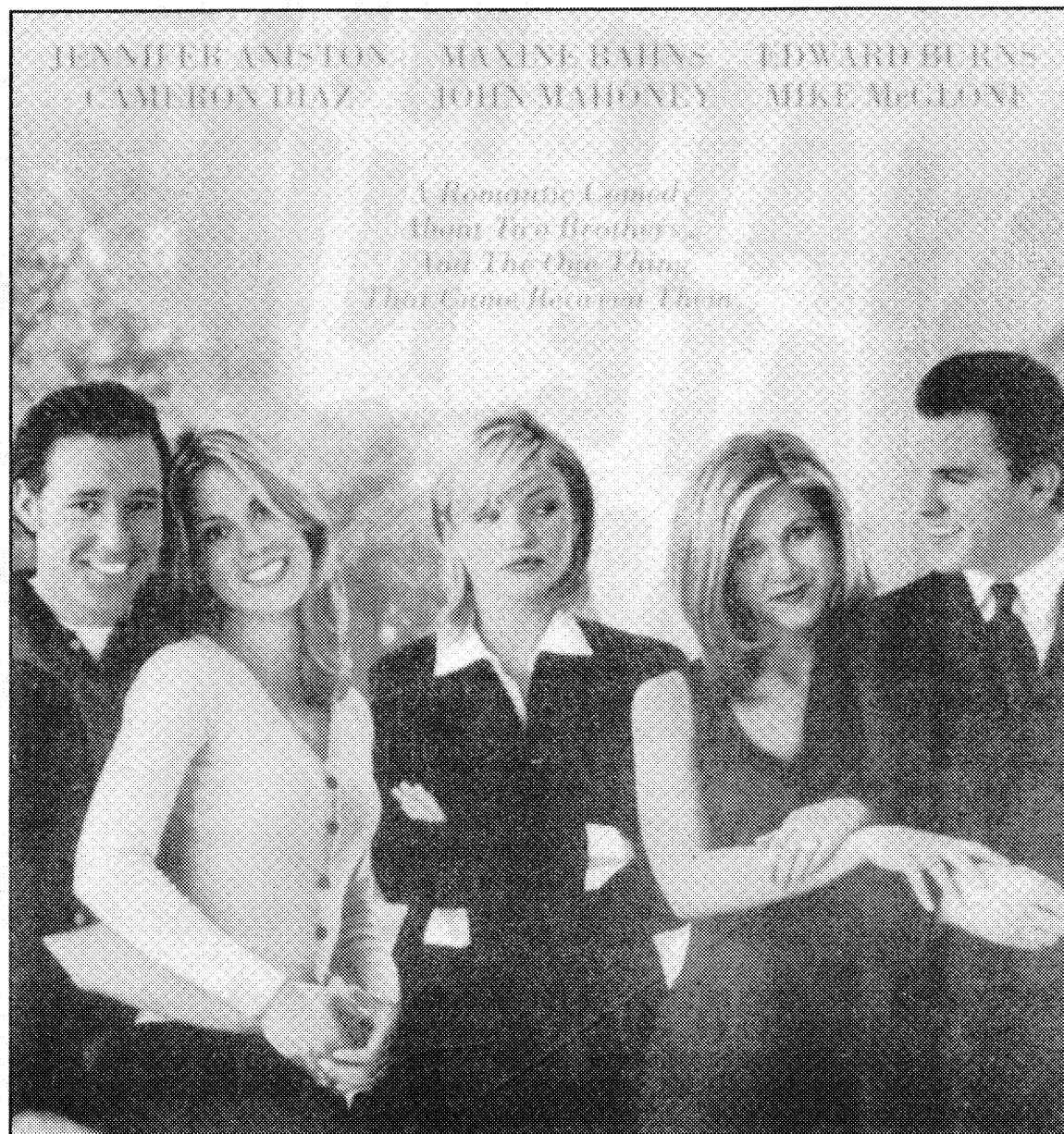
Based on this, I suspected that my mum and I, on our monthly journey for girl movie bliss, were going to be less than satisfied. I was not proven wrong.

When did the Northern Pikes break up?

In mid-1993, so three years ago.

Why?

A lot of reasons, really. We were all tired of each other and burnt out. We played together for so long, we started to eventually grow apart. Ryan (wanted to leave, most unhappy) moved to Toronto. Don and I stayed in Saskatoon. We all had a talk, and decided it was too difficult to stay together. Once Ryan left, there was no point in getting a replacement. So we all got away from it for awhile. When any relationship ends, it's not smooth. There were a few hard

feelings but it has since ended. They visit my gigs and we get along good now. So I puttered around for a bit after we separated, and then got a phone call to write the theme for the pilot of "Due South" Worked on a few other projects, and by that time, I was getting my own ideas and getting to know my own music really well.

What is your best quality aside from your musical talent? What would you want people to know about yourself?

I guess it would have to be that I'm a genuine guy in life, in general. Being in the music and film industry, I have encountered people who aren't always what they seem to be, and I try to avoid that.

Do you consider your new solo album "Mouse" to be the best album you have done?

Of course, right now. It's the best solo album I've ever done. It's the only solo album I've ever done! But it's a tough call, it's like comparing apples and oranges. In a band, everyone has equal say like a democracy, but in my own position, I call all of

the shots. Which, actually it took awhile for me to get used to. I have learned how to be a leader. When I have a certain vision and direction, I go for it.

Do you take pride in being a part of the Canadian Music Industry?

Absolutely. I think the Canadian music industry is at the best place it's ever been. Stars like Shania Twain and Alanis Morissette have really done great things. Canada's the best country in the world. We have a strong music scene.

Give some examples of some Canadian bands you like to listen to.

Inbreds, The Tragically Hip, Blue Rodeo, and on a more local level (Saskatoon), Polyester, and the Touchtone Grooves.

What is your all-time favorite song, not done by yourself?

It would have to be The Canadian Railroad Trilogy, by Gordon Lightfoot. My parents listened to it, and I grew up with it, so eventually you develop a taste for it.

Why is your latest album title, "Mouse"?

It's just a name. I wanted a living, breathing animal that wasn't a big deal. I think it's a neat image and it's related to a song.

Anything else you want to add?

Just that my main focus is my song writing. I think I do that relatively well. I like to express myself creatively. I get antsy when I haven't written in awhile. It's kind of therapeutic.

Do you enjoy playing for smaller clubs like the Sidetrack, or do you hope to move onto coliseums soon to see the crowd?

Playing anywhere is great. It was fun playing at the Sidetrack because the crowd was so into it and that makes me have a good time. I like the good feeling I get from a great response, so it doesn't really matter to me.

Well, that about sums it up. Jay Semko is really down to earth and he does appear to be genuine. Although he has to regain some personal status with Pike fans now that he has gone solo, I'm sure he'll have no problem maintaining the local Canadian status level he has already reached.

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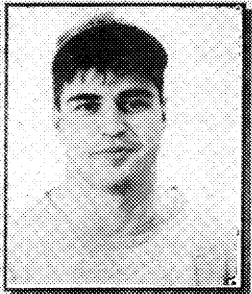

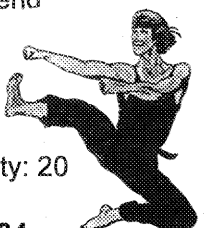

Without Oilers' holdouts Doug Weight, Jason Arnott, Miroslav Satan, Boris Mironov, and Jiri Slegr, and the likely permanent absence of Zdeno Ciger, some thought the Oilers wouldn't pull through against the mediocre Phoenix Coyotes. But with the help of Todd Marchant's penalty kill line, the Oil defeated the Coyotes 4-2 in pre-season action Sunday. lanche last season, was traded by Montreal due to his lack of performance in the playoffs. Kovalenko likes the new, young squad and predicts 35 or 40 goals for himself this year.

Kovalenko, who is a left-handed shooter, told head coach Ron Lowe that he would prefer to play right wing, "but if I was thinking of playing him with Dougie Weight, it didn't matter where I played him," Lowe laughed.

The Oilers are Kovalenko's fourth NHL team in three years. He would like to quit sending out those pesky 'change of address' cards and therefore hopes to be here, "For long time." (sic)

When (not if) Glen Sather signs the guys listed above, the Oilers will be well on their way to a great season.
