

Catch the Spirit of the Heart

February is Heart Month. The Heart and Stroke Foundation of Alberta and N.W.T. is asking for your help and your donations to continue the vital research they are conducting.

The theme of the 1997 Heart campaign, "Please give - we're only halfway there", has a different focus than in past years. There are 75 000 heart disease related deaths in Canada each year. On top of that, 1 in 4 Canadians live with cardiovascular disease, living in fear of the next heart attack, resulting possibly in paralysis or brain damage. For these Canadians it is vital that the research of the Heart and Stroke Foundation continues.

It is believed that the most dramatic developments will occur in the next 10 years; provided, of course, that a strong commitment to research is maintained. Current research projects include developing new grafts and heart valves, heart rhythms disorders, and the correction of congenital heart defects. Researchers are also working to find the genes that may cause heart failure, obesity, high blood pressure, heart attack and other illnesses. It's believed that by the year 2000, that gene therapy will render many of

our current heart and stroke treatments unnecessary.

Over 30 000 volunteers will help the Heart and Stroke Foundation during the month of February by canvassing door-todoor, co-ordinating corporate campaigns and co-ordinating special events around town.

There is a Campaign kickoff Breakfast at the Coast Terrace Inn, in the Atrium Cafe on February 2. It runs from 6:30 am to 10:30 am. Tickets are \$10.00 and available at the Atrium Cafe at 431-5810. Join the Heart and Stroke Foundation at the World Waterpark, February 2 between 6:30 and 9:30 for a Beachparty. Tickets are a steal at \$3.00 a piece and are available at Shoppers Drug Mart. Canvassers will be braving the cold and the snow on February 3, 4 and 5.

The Heart and Stroke Foundation has been hard at work raising awareness and funds for research for heart and cardiovascular disease for over 40 years. Since the beginning, the death rate from heart disease has declined by 50%, which means "we're halfway there". Ultimately, the support of the community will help the Heart and Stroke Foundation reach their goal. So remember this during February, Heart Month.

NAITSA Meeting

After a lifeless meeting with virtually no debate two weeks life with a vigourous discussion on the proposed NAITSA executive raises.

After the final set of constitutional readings on Quorum numbers and on withdrawal from ACTISEC, the student tech reps responded with their (and their technology members') feelings about the raises. Although, the majority were not in opposition to a raise generally, they found considering future raises. the amount, \$300 per month per position, to be too large.

Despite the fact that the earlier, the NAITSA General NAITSA V.P.s are currently paid Council Meeting came back to less than half of what their counterparts at similar institutions are paid, several arguments were raised to support smaller increases. One rep proposed that increases were not necessary because students should be inspired to run for the executive in the spirit of community service, and not for financial benefit. Another suggested that this large a raise would set a bad precedent when

However, those in favour of raises in the full amount also raised convincing items. One rep pointed out that if a large raise was not granted, the rates of pay for our exec will never reach rates similar to those granted at other institutions. Al Morrison, Assistant to the Dean of Student Services, who also functions as business manager for NAITSA, noted that, over the years, the work load has been steadily increasing for the executive, and that the proposed raise was partly based on consideration of this.

Liberals Showing Signs

Under pressure from party members, the Liberal parliamentary caucus chair, Joe Fontana, announced the party will be ending cutting for now, and concentrate on sustaining a growing economy and more jobs.

In addition to suggested priority areas of child poverty, charity incentives, and tax relief for students, around budget time the

government intends to announce a youth job plan with a \$315 million price tag.

The program has been in the works since last year's budget, but has required adjustment prior to initiation.

The program is intended to provide temporary work terms for youths who are completing or have recently concluded their education. The intent is to improve employers' opinion of

younger workers while providing work experience for youths.

Because it is possible the budget could come in \$6 billion under the predicted \$24 billion deficit, Jim Peterson, chair of the Commons finance committee, says a \$2 billion expenditure would not be unreasonable. It is expected that the budget will continue support of the youth job

The same summer, one of the NAITSA executives lost a close friend in an alcoholrelated accident.

The SUDS squad committee is composed of three NAITSA members and three staff members. the NAITSA office in E131.

Funding for the SUDS squad is obtained from NAITSA, grants and donations from local brewing companies and the sale of SUDS wear and promotional items.

SUDS is the committee that holds the "Who's Responsible?" seminars that every Tech must take before they host a cabaret. Activities V.P. Scott K. Fediow will possibly be organizing one in the next few weeks.

The main SUDS activity during the year is Alcohol Awareness Week which happened November 18-22. Coming up however is "Spring with SUDS", February 10-12. Activities will include: a mocktail contest, popcan tab and condom guessing games, police displays and possibly a movie in the Shaw Theatre.

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DOWN With Private **Automobiles**

I hate my car. I hate the way its tires go flat, its battery goes dead, its c.v. boots crack, and its gas tank empties. I hate the way its continued function over three years of school has added \$4500 to my debt. Most of all, I hate the way paying for my car cost me a summer of my life at a crappy, dead end, but well-paying job that I worked at only to buy the subsequently hated item.

I did this because from the day I got my license, my own car was the focus of my desires. In Edmonton, with its sprawling suburbs, its decentralized everything, and its pitiful public transit system, having a car is next to essential to having a life.

Now, after three years of supporting a needy, moody, and endlessly dependent car, all the more altruistic and broadlyscoped reasons not to have a car come to mind whenever I try to start the little bugger.

Besides the \$7000-\$10000 it costs to run a reasonably-priced car for a year, a seven-year old Greenpeace Pollution Probe study estimated that the increased gas taxes required offset the government subsidy car owners enjoy, the price of litre of gas would increase to \$1.37. This number which took into account

the cost of building and maintaining roads, police and accident-related emergency service, and tax losses from the land paved over for roads, would, for example, cause an cost increase for me of around \$2500 per year. (And I drive one of the most fuel efficient cars on the market.). If you consider that there is one car driven for every two Canadians, and even if you estimate that the average car is used much less than mine, the cost of government just to support private transportation runs in the billions.

Further, low density development is far less efficiently serviced by public utilities (according to EcoCity Report 1995 Issue #6, "a bungalow requires four times the infrastructure compared to a townhouse."), which entails a further government subsidy to those with cars and who are able to afford the lowest density, single family dwellings.

These numbers only take into account the current cost of our car addiction. Environmental costs are becoming increasingly apparent. According to the scary bit the Weather Network runs daily, the average Canadian car emits 4 tonnes of pollutants yearly, which may include oxides of carbon and nitrogen, volatile organic compounds, and chloroflourocarbons. All of these contribute to the rapidly increasing rate of respiratory problems, ozone depletion, potential problems involving the Greenhouse Effect, and other future disadvantages.

Even without consideration of the influences of the green movement, many cities with progressive and effective urban planning bodies have put forth programs to deal with the future disadvantages of car depend-

Portland, Oregon is a favorite example. For decades the municipality has been a leader in responsible and forward looking planning, whose main focus could be said to be designing for people rather than designing for cars.

The measures taken there which could easily be applied elsewhere not only improve the experience of urban life, but also discourage the use of the private automobile:

- 1) Their Urban Growth Boundary preserves farms and wilderness while promoting responsible land use within the city (increasing density and reducing travel distances).
- 2) Their diversion of dollars for highway construction to light

rail transit construction allows more people more access to the city with a more efficient mode of transporta-

3) Encouraging mixed use planning with innovative people, scaled architecture has revitalized the sense of neighbourhood community and vibrancy of downtown on a 24 hour basis (again increasing density, and also reducing the need or desire for people to leave an area to fulfill needs).

Until our city undertakes efforts similar to Portland's, I doubt I will be getting rid of my car. When I finish here in May, it is unlikely I will find a job that I could bike to in summer and be decently serviced by public transit in winter with the way the city is set up. So I'll be polluting the environment, contributing to government debt, and working several months a year just to support the car. With such a uselessly run city, I guess I'm lucky that my form of dependence on the government is of the same dependence every member of government is guilty (not to mention the great majority of those with political power i.e.wealth). Therefore, I'd guess that solutions to our car problems won't be found too quickly.



Pre-Interview/Show

Sweet, Sweet **Jagori Tanna**



Remix Queen No More!

Toni Braxton's "You're Making Me High" (remix), Case's "Touch Me Tease Me", Total's "No One Else" (remix), Jaÿ-Z's "Ain't No Nigga", and LL Cool J's "I Shot Ya" (remix). These songs all have two things in common: 1) they are all chart-toppers and 2) they all feature the lyrical talents of a Foxy Brown cameo appearance. Foxy is also associated with a group named The Firm, which consists of herself, Nas, AZ and Cormega. Their only appearance so far is on the Nas album, It Was Written, in the song, "Affirmative Action," which was one of the best tracks for that album. Now it's time to see if Foxy can captivate an audience on her own and shed her remix queen title and stretch her style beyond the reach of just gangster lyrics. I consider this album mission accomplished, as Foxy manages to shine like a finely cut diamond that is the over-saturated rap market. In her first single released from this album, "Get Me Home", featuring Teddy Riley's super-group BLACKstreet, Foxy reproduces Eugene Wilde's 1984 hit "Gotta Get You Home With Me Tonight", which employs the guaranteed hit making formula of remaking a past R&B song with a modern day R&B/rap slant. Method Man, from the Wu-Tang Clan, appears in the album's title track to lend his characteristically unique nasal voice to the chorus making it a great track with a bouncy bass. Mobb Deep's infamous member Havoc produces and raps in "The Promise", a thoroughly Mobb sounding joint and Foxy handles her own very impressively with her throaty voice and hardcore lyrics. Jaÿ-Z returns the favor to Foxy from their previous duet in "I'll Be", which isn't as controversial as "Ain't No Nigga" was. "(Holy Matrimony) Letter to The Firm" and "The Chase" are two other outstanding tracks with gangster overtones, while "If I..." and "No One's" are excellent examples of Foxy being cute and sexy. There's also a retro rap track entitled "Foxy's Bells" and a party jam entitled "Fox Boogie" with a guest appearance by Kid Capri. The only negative aspect of this album is the length, it's a very short 41 minutes when you include the intro, outro and interlude. Useless fact: Foxy has never given her exact age in any interviews she's done. I have read her quote ages from sixteen to nineteen, but in the last interview I read she confessed that she was honestly still a teenager, so my guess is that she is seventeen.



New Life for Old Songs

Judging by its cover, one would expect this CD to be pretty generic. The yellow background with the black silhouette looks just like some no-name product. However, having learned my lesson about judging CD's by their covers, I grabbed it anyway, hoping that perhaps a bad cover would portend good music.

Despite the poor cover artwork, this album isn't really that great either. Maybe there's no correlation between the cover and the contents...

Anyway, the songs on this album are all orchestrated symphonic remixes of all the old "Split Enz" songs of the late 70s and early 80s. Split Enz, the collaboration between brothers Neil and Tim Finn, was kind of a one hit wonder from down under (New Zealand, actually) that was also the first commercial success for the Kiwis. However, in New Zealand, they are something approaching national icons. As a tribute to their 'legacy', the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra along with the former members of Split Enz, and other various as-yet-unheard-of New Zealand musicians, have created this album.

For the most part, the new renditions are hard to recommend to anyone. For symphony they are too choppy. For pop, they are too unbalanced. And while they obviously were hoping for some kind of "Moody Blues' Knights in White Satin" or "Proceed Harem's Conquistador" effect, practically everything on the album falls flat.

The two bright spots on the album are the Neil Finn lead "Stuff'n'Nonsense", and the wonderful lead vocal of Annie Crummer on "I hope I Never".

I guess I recommend this album for anyone who is a die-hard Split Enz fan, and has a little more money that they know what to do with. Unfortunately for the rest of us, there's just not a lot to go for.

Good Thing, Ever Fallen In Love, Don't Look Back, and, of course, She Drives Me Crazy: they were all in high rotation on every commercial radio station all through to the next year. Then they just disappeared. Well they're back!

Okay, they're not really back, "The Finest" is just a greatest hits package but it's about bloody time. Even though the band only released two albums and then broke up while trying for a third, the material they came up with is astonishing. Their first hit, Jonny Come Home, was instant number one, and then there was the cover of Elvis' Suspicious Minds, a movie soundtrack, and the monster "The Raw and the Cooked" of 1988. It looked like they were really on to something. But faster than they rose, they fell. Egos, perfectionism, and money took their toll and the band called it quits in 1989. The song The Flame is one of the songs that survived their aborted third album, and it really shows they had plenty more hits in them. A bittersweet taste of what could have been.

Since the Raw and the Cooked came out in the late days of the cassette and practically everybody bought it, "The Finest" is a perfect excuse to buy a CD from them. Just in time for a nostalgia kick, it's a great buy. This is one band from the 80s that's worth remembering.


One Flew Over The **Ooks Nest**


