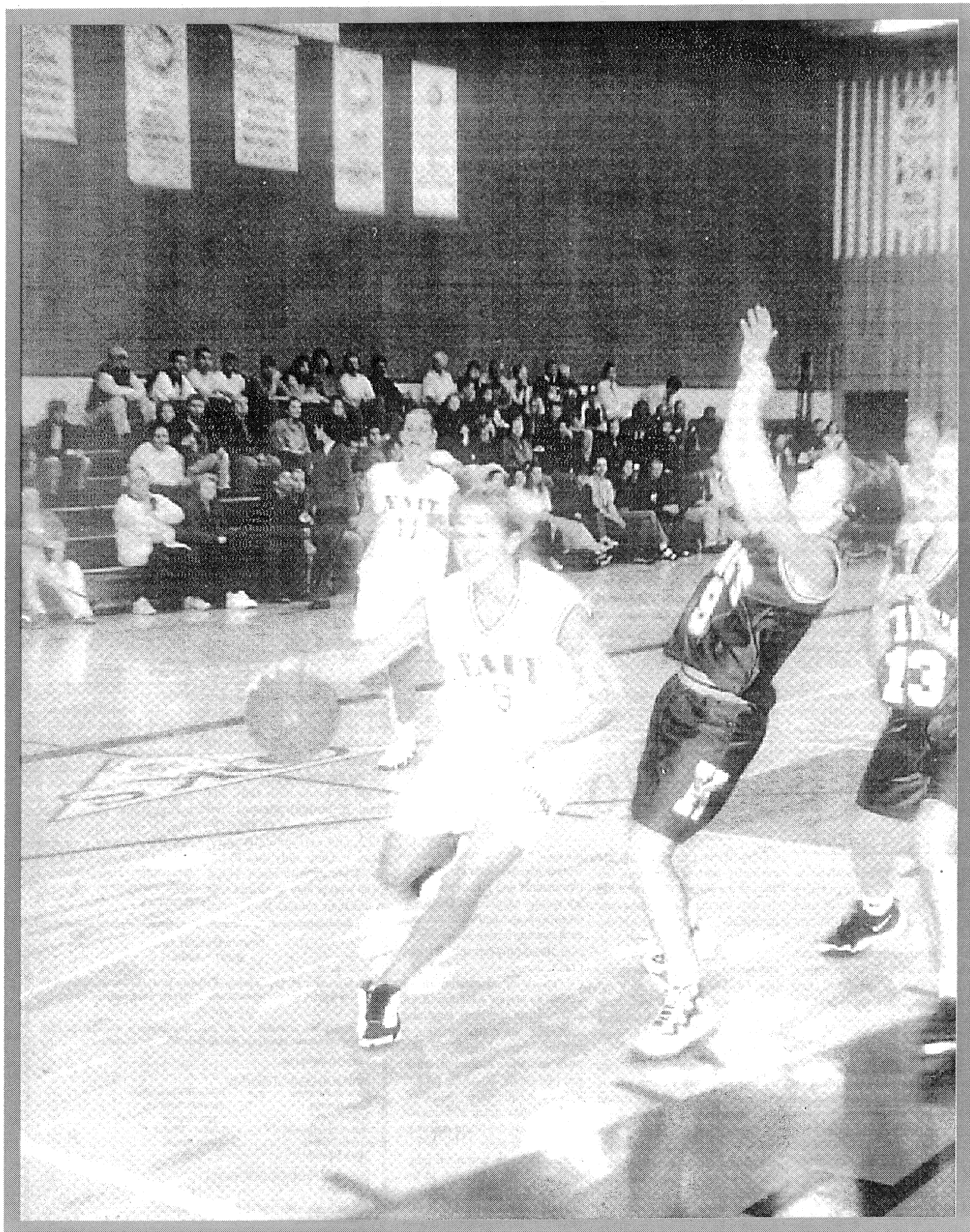

It's a typical day in the life of a NAIT student. I finish my classes, haul ass to my car, and drive towards my warm house. My biggest worry is how I'm gonna make up an excuse about the Internet assignment that was due a week ago. Today, however, there's a detour...

Today, I stopped after a few blocks. In the middle of 118 Avenue, I entered a very plain looking store filled with a rainbow of used clothes and furniture from twenty years ago. To you and I, this is simply another run down neighbourhood in Northeast Edmonton. The only people we might know in this area are students living close to school. There are over twenty pawn shops in this neighbourhood, along with a bunch of adult movie stores and dingy bars. In the middle of all this is the St. Vincent De Paul — a Catholic Social Services store. This is also where Fred Brown works.

Fred has run the show at St. Vincent De Paul for several years. In that time, he and his staff of four

employees and roughly a dozen volunteers have seen everything that the poor neighbourhood in Edmonton has to offer. He knows these people. Many of the customers are regulars. He's been in apartments where stabbings have occurred. He's met people that we throw spare change to, so if anybody has something to say about this area, it's him.

St. Vincent's is a non-profit, secondhand clothing and furniture store. Their entire inventory is made up of what you and I no longer want in our closets. He sees the lack of education and resources that plague the people in the neighbourhood. It's pretty tough to get to West Edmonton Mall to buy that new ski jacket when you've got no car and no money. Although he was very careful not to label the pawn shops as rip-off places, Fred Brown did admit that there is a good chance that they can take advantage of people who don't know enough about what they're buying. Many people in this area lack the education of the resources that would allow them to get a better job and a safer home. He is also very quick to state that there are many honest people in this neighbourhood who are trying to raise a family on a tight budget.

I asked Fred why the area next door to our school has become to highly populated with people on social assistance and low incomes.

He told me that often they simply don't realize they could live in a much quieter and often safer neighbourhood for the same amount of rent. Families often fear that they won't be accepted in any other neighbourhood except for a poor neighbourhood if they are unemployed or on social assistance.

This article wasn't written to fulfill my charity quota for the year, and I definitely didn't write this to make Fred Brown out to be a modern day saint; but as far as I know, we haven't done much as a school to improve the lives of the people in the NAIT vicinity.

The bottom line is: It's the middle of October and it's getting colder. People are going to need coats and gloves and boots, whether they can afford them or not. So, if you've got old clothes or furniture that you don't want, I know that St. Vincent's will love you for packing them over there. Hell, they'll even pick them up for you. Other places do the same thing as well if you don't want to donate to St. Vincent's. There's The Salvation Army, Goodwill, and the Bissel Centre who all do the same thing. The point is that that old coat will do a lot more good on some kid's back than sitting in our basements gathering dust. Kind of makes that excuse of mine seem less important now, doesn't it.

We received an interesting piece of mail at The Nugget last week, it was definitely something you don't expect to read. It was a fax from a couple in Toronto named Judy and Franklin, and they have a very simple request:

They want a baby.

No, these people are not crazy. They do not believe that babies come from newspaper offices or that the stork drops them from out of the sky. What they are, however, is original. Judy and Franklin have been looking into adoption for the past two years. Judy has had two miscarriages in the past, and at age 42, she feels that her time is beginning to run out on the chances of her having a natural, healthy preg-

nancy. Her and her husband are currently part of a waiting list through the Ontario Children's Aid Society, but that list is a long one. According to their social worker, it's about a 5 to 10 year wait.

Realizing that they don't really have that kind of time or patience available to them, Judy and Franklin took matters into their own hands. They decided to take a demographic approach to their search and came to the conclusion that there's no better place to find a potential young woman who is not prepared for motherhood than at colleges and universities.

They took me step-by-step through a very cautious and time consuming adoption process that mainly involves social workers and lawyers. The main thing that comes out of the legal aspect of adoption is a report known as a Home Study.

It's done by an independent social worker who evaluates the prospective parents and makes sure they are worthy candidates. The study takes between 6 and 9 months with each meeting lasting 2 hours; however, this is only one side of adoption.

There is also something known as private adoption. It involves all of the same legal and civil rules and regulations, but it also means that a couple is on their own. No waiting lists, no agencies, just two people searching far and wide for a child to call their own. They are very quick to point out that what they are doing is not exploitation. If there is, in fact, a woman with an unwanted pregnancy out there, it is up to the young woman to contact them — they are not harassing anyone. All private adoption means is, that no

Like I said in Part One, it was about three or so years ago when I got my eyebrow pierced. I was commenting about how my mom kicked me out when I first had it done. Now for body piercing and the workplace.. up until I was 18, I didn't have any seriously paying jobs. I babysat, worked a couple of Klondike Days, and pretty much

I was starting a program at GMCC in the Fall, but nothing else. It took me about four months to find a job in Edmonton here. I had quite a few interviews, but no calls back. Desperate, and I mean desperate.. I applied to work the late-night shift at a local fast-food chain.

So there I was, November 2, 1995, waiting for my interview at at one of this chain's restaurants. One has to understand how low this was to sink for me. I told myself I would never work at one, even though my best friend had been working at one for about five years at that point and planned to make it her career. I told myself I was better, that I didn't want to flip burgers, and as luck would have it, my interviewer actually ended up hiring me on the spot and I started

working that night.

For the record here, I still had my eyebrow ring in at the time I was hired, along with a headful of Fuschia hair.

So I started my job at this chain, and the entire time I worked for them I only had one comment about my eyebrow ring. The first assistant at the restaurant asked me when I had had the ring put in, and I told her I was hired with it. Since that was the case, she asked me to put a band-aid over it while I worked. After that, I never heard another thing about it — not until May 1998, anyway.

By 1998, I had worked at two different locations for this fast-food chain, and under three different

head managers to boot. The first set of managers I had above were the ones who asked me to wear the band-aid when I worked. When I transferred to another restaurant, along with a new set of managers, again I was asked about the ring (because I was still wearing the band-aid over it on my shifts) and the first assistant there told me that I constantly looked injured with the band-aid on and to take it off. 98/100 times I was working solely with the food anyway, so I wasn't dealing with customers. I didn't really think too much of it until I was working one night and the head manager pulled me into his office. He asked me about my ring, and like I had told the previous head managers that I had worked with, I was hired with it. He then told me that it was against uniform policy to have my ring in, and he asked me to take it out. Having an eyebrow ring was against uniform policy? This was news to me, but since it was a new head manager, I wanted to start off on the right foot with him. I agreed to take my ring out and actually did so about two days later.

So May went by with no incident. My face felt extremely naked without my eyebrow ring in, but I was coping. I mean, I felt plain, I felt normal. I felt like my security blanket of three years was gone, and I did it all because of a uniform policy — or was it even a policy?

The thought kept me awake at night, and finally I broke down and called the head office.

Hey, guys! (actually, just one)

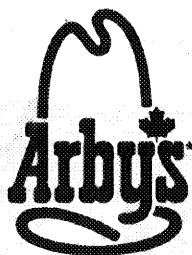

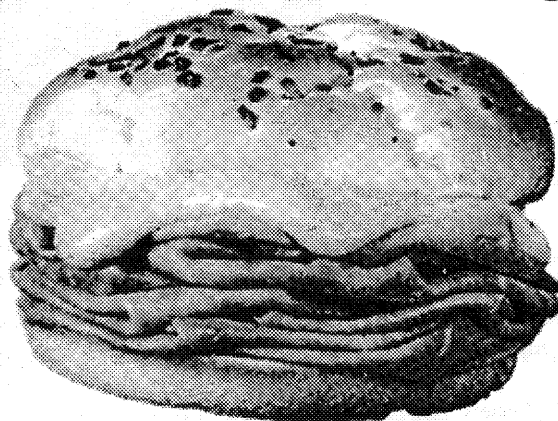

NATO Making a Strong Showing in Kosovo:

Attempting to Bury the Past?

Not that long ago, people in Bosnia-Herzegovina were killing each other. They slaughtered their neighbours because of their religious beliefs, and the United Nations sent peace keepers in. You may know some people who spent time there — some have tales of sitting around waiting for things to happen, and others have horrific tales of watching, impotently, as people died. Many Canadians served some time there, attempting to stop the massacre. One could argue that if there would have been a greater involvement by some larger countries with bigger armies, many lives would have been saved.

Genocide is frowned upon for good reason. Killing people is harsh. We think we are fairly lucky to live in Canada because we believe that we won't have to deal with mass slaughter. Canada's actions with respect to then-Indonesian President Suharto's visit last year at the UBC should stir feelings of uneasiness regarding our governments' values in the area of human rights abuses. Don't think that all is peachy here. In 1975, Suharto's Indonesia brutally invaded the Portuguese colony of East Timor, killing 200,000 of 700,000 residents. This guy was welcomed to Canada with open arms. The students who protested were pepper sprayed for peaceful demonstration, something that every Canadian is free to do by law. Point being, if Canadian officials enjoy the companionship of gun-toting human rights violators, what does that make them?

Getting back to the issue of genocide, police and military in Yugoslavia are currently killing people. Last month, the Serbian police carried out a sweeping offensive through the southern province of Kosovo, killing hundreds of people who may have been members of the Kosovo Liberation

Army (KLA). Ethnic Albanian villagers were chased out of their villages by artillery fire, surrounded in the hills and told it was safe to go back to the villages. They would return to their homes, only to be separated into groups to be raped or killed by the Serbian forces. A few men survived pit shootings by pretending to be dead as the police sprayed them with machine gun fire. Atrocities continue, with no sign of backing down by President Slobodan Milosevic in Belgrade, who claims that the deaths either never occurred or were a result of the KLA's activities.

NATO moved in this time. As of Sunday night, there were over 400 aircraft ready for an air strike. This past year NATO countries invested some time and money into

strengthening their league, as the inefficiency of NATO was revealed. When NATO was formed, one of their chief tenets was their ability to be almost anywhere very quickly. Last year it was revealed that it would take three times the target time of the agreement to reach a destination with an adequate number of troops or aircraft. After tightening up into a more cohesive force, it seems that they are excited at the possibility of showing the world their sagacity and validity in Kosovo. The images of the American B-52 bombers landing at nearby bases should be enough to make President Milosevic back down and stop the slaughtering, but just to make sure that complete intimidation occurs, there's also over 400 aircraft armed and ready.

Perhaps there is some guilt in the minds of the NATO countries who did too little (if anything at all), too late. The exhuming of over 200 bodies in a common grave in Bosnia this weekend offers us a reminder of what happens when we don't stop genocide. Perhaps we'll stop it this time. Until next week, don't forget to floss.

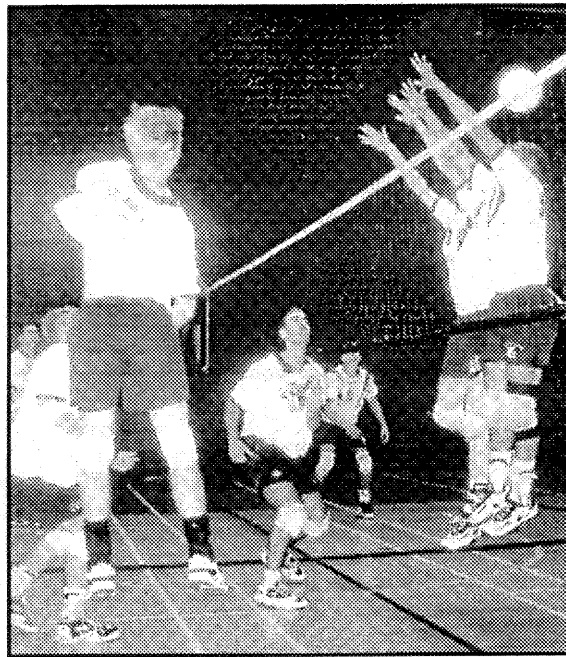
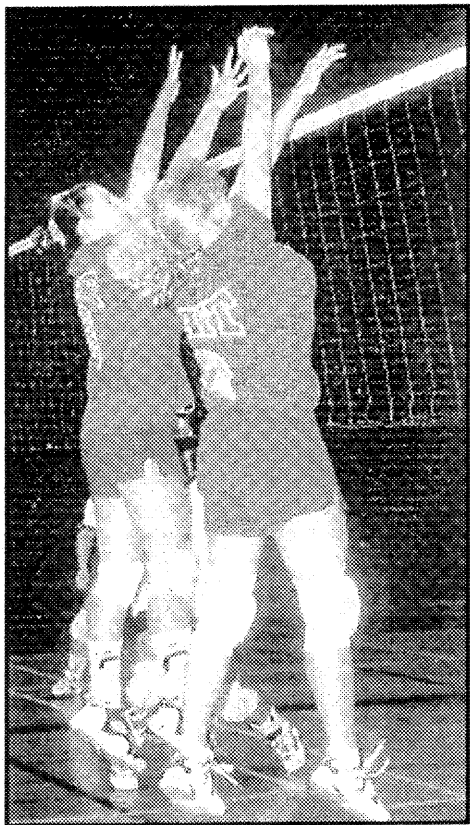

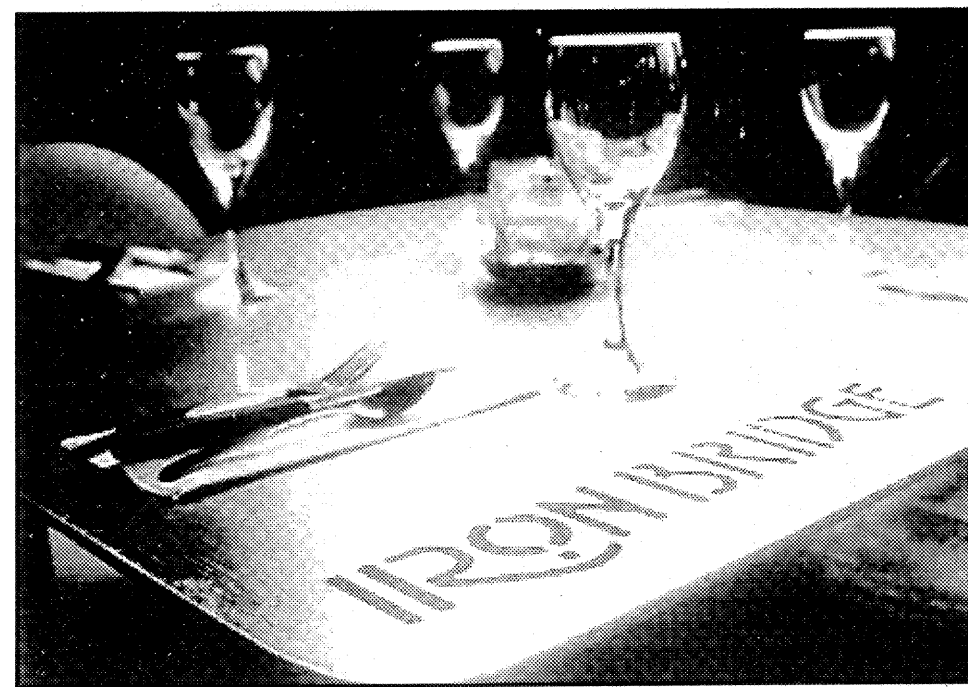


some great meals on the menu. By specializing in fewer dishes, you can be sure that your edible options will all be delectable. This is not

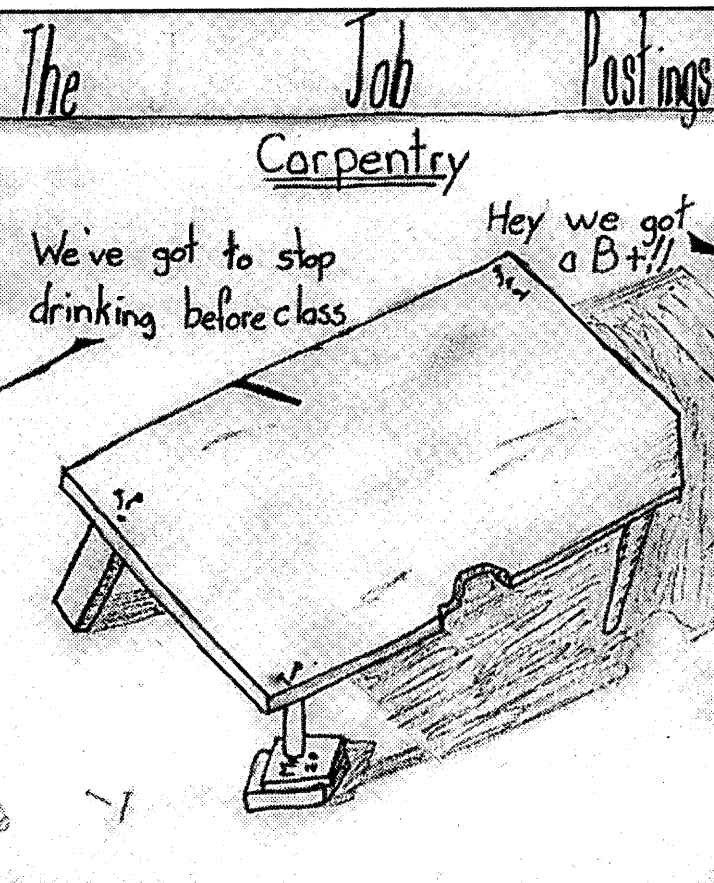

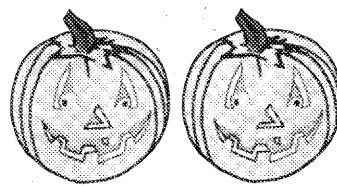

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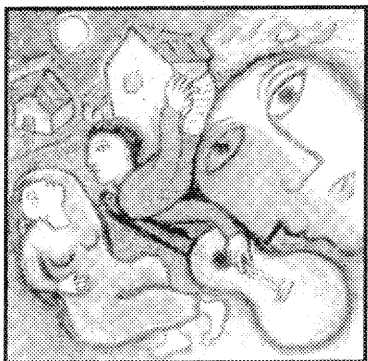

male/female thing, but my best friend is a total dog person, too. In fact, about six years ago, she got a cat for Christmas and she named it "Stupid".

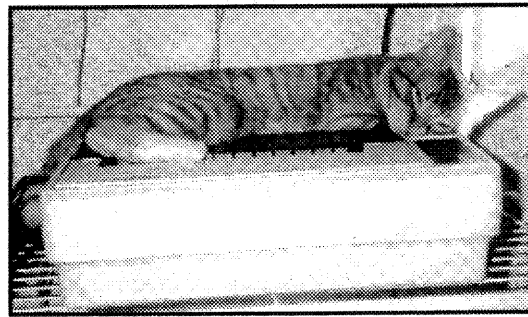
Now, let's get back to this "Tank Ass" thing.
