## Paul Bunyan Rapes the Amazon



n its annual report last Tuesday, Greenpeace warned that the Amazon rainforest could be wiped out in 80 years if logging companies continue with the mass deforestation now in progress.

The Brazilian government has estimated that 14,762 square kilometres per year is lost to multinational logging companies. Experts believe the number could be twice that number.

"The choice isn't between logging and national parks, the choice is between logging and pasture," said Adalberto Verissimo of IMAZON, Brazil's Institute of Man and the Amazon Environ-

"There's just no support here for parks that will keep the forest unspoiled."

Entangled among the fallen trees, are 5 percent of the rainforest's original species lost forever to pulp and paper, giving weigh to dry pastures and temporary farmland.

About 20 percent of the Amazon is already gone, and many scientists believe the destruction is accelerating global warming — the



For \$55 US per semester, this small electronic device resembling a pager will send out a signal to the campus police just by pushing a button. The Walkmate has three buttons in total: one for medical emergencies, one for criminal emergencies, and one for non-emergencies such as car troubles.

As for the content of the messages you can send, Bentspace claims they do not censor any of the messages that go out, nor are they responsible for any replies that come back.



## Nugget Trying On CUP For Size



AIT's own Nugget has joined a nationally recognized news service. It could potentially give Nugget writers national exposure as well as bring a wider variety of articles into the Nugget.

The Canadian University Press, or CUP for short, is a national organization of student newspapers that spans all of Canada. Started in 1938, CUP was founded by a bunch of students that needed to share what little information and resources they had. Since then, CUP has grown into the oldest student organization in North America and the largest student-run news service in the world.

Owned by approximately 60 student newspapers across Canada, CUP provides services to members such as getting research information on articles and helping less fortunate members upgrade their computer systems. Membership will give us access to regional bureaus, as well as the rights to print a variety of articles from other member colleges and universities. It will also give those colleges and universities the rights to reprint Nugget articles. This could potentially give Nugget writers national exposure.

Each year, CUP holds regional conferences for student newspaper staff to get together and make contacts with each other. The conferences include guest speakers from the journalism industry talking about their experiences and providing tips on how to improve member publi-

[Seeing as they have been around since the beginning of time. there aren't too many things that CUP hasn't seen.] From libel threats to staff shortages, even Student Unions threatening to shut down production. CUP has been there and done that. They provide support staff and legal advice to help out member newspapers when they get themselves in hot water. Speaking of hot water, CUP also keeps a couple of bucks on hand in case they have to defend a member's freedom of speech in court. As well as the legal fund, CUP also gives legal advice to members defending the "people's right to know."

Okay, so it sounds a little corny, but the organization sounds like a perfect fit for the Nugget. They sound like they have their heads on straight, and they could really enhance the spectrum of articles that appear in the Nugget. 


## THE BIGWALLEY PARTY





### **Obtain Pamphlet**

he Edmonton Police Service would like to inform all NAIT students and staff of the restrictions in respect to parking at Kingsway Garden Mall and the surrounding residential areas of NAIT.

Everyone should be aware that it is illegal to park at Kingsway Garden Mall entirely while you are attending NAIT. Also, please

watch all signage carefully on residential streets before you park. Bylaw enforcement will be in effect immediately and this could mean ticketing and/or towing of vehicles that are illegally parked in the above mentioned areas.

Feel free to contact the Parking Office at 471-7539 if you have any questions.

### DAY PERMITS

Full time day students may apply for a parking permit at the Parking Services Office. All NAIT Parking is identified by Zones (see map) Vehicles not displaying the permit corresponding to the area in which they are parked during restricted daytime hours (7:90 am - 6:90 pm) will be issued a violation parking ticket.

Parking permits that have been lost, or destroyed will be replaced upon application to the Parking Services Office. A fee will be charged for

Parking permits are not valid at metered, handicapped, 24-hour reserved or restricted parking areas.

Day permits are valid for evening and weekend parking

Reserved Zones:

During restricted daytime hours, students may park only in the Zons designated on their permit.

Disabled Person Parking:

Permits for reserved parking are available for disabled persons, entitiing them to park their registered motor vehicles during restricted daytime hours (7:00 am - 5:00 pm).

Students who arrange a rideshare may apply for a vehicle permit at Parking Services. Only one vehicle may be parked on NAIT property at any given time. Preference will be given to students who utilize the Rideshare program.

Display of Permit:

if you have lost or are unable to displey your permit in this manner, it must be reported to Parking Services. Only NAIT permits will be honoured and notes, handwritten or otherwise, are not recognized.

Withdrawal of Parking Services:

During times of construction, mainte may be necessary to cancel parking made to provide alternate parking to displaced.

Refunds can be made for the unused portion of parking permits upon cancellation of the application and return of the permit to Parking Services. PARKING PERMITS AUTOMATICALLY BECOME INVALID UPON WITHDRAWAL FROM CLASSES.

Bicycles do not require permits and may be parked at no cracks provided. They are not allowed in NAIT buildings of landscaped areas. There is a secure Bicycle Compound local the South entrance by the Gym and East of the Engine Technologies Annex. Contact Parking Services for fulinformation.
