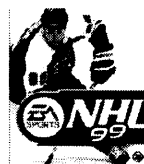
NAIT Campus Crime Stoppers is a student-run committee which has as its mission student awareness, crime prevention, and safety and security education.

The wind blasts out of you as you slam onto the ground, and you take a minute to catch your breath, amazed that you are still alive.

Then you realize what you're holding. It's Ryan. Or rather,

what's left of Ryan. The grenade that should have killed you shredded Ryan, leaving only a grotesque imitation of a human hand in your grasp. The horror of it snaps your mind for a minute, and you fall back onto the ground, screaming and thrashing your legs and arms and flinging the sickening stump of a hand away from you. Your eyes squeeze so tight together that you tear up, the drops running down your blood and muck-en-crusted face and leaving tiny trails of visible skin.

And then you open your eyes, only to find the enemy soldier standing over you. His face is a parody of humanity, twisted by inhuman rage as he sights down the barrel of his weapon towards your face. So you walk down the street, and you go to the city's ceremonies honoring the dead, to remember your dead comrades and to treasure their lives in your memories for another year.

Yet even as you listen to the speakers, and wipe away the tears that well up unwillingly, you take a moment to look around at the people around you. Most of the people in this crowd are old, like you, those people with a connection to the past that the young can never replicate. It is obvious that those few young people who have managed to come have no real understanding of what happened, no real emotional link.

And when the ceremony is over, those same young people will walk away, maybe to the local shopping mall to find something to hold their attention now. It is this new tragedy that you cry even harder for now; for the lessons that your generation paid for in blood to learn will be lost on these new hands that come to take the torch from your failing hands.

You find yourself praying that these young ones will never have to learn those lessons the same way that you did. Yet you fear that your

prayers will go unheard.

After all, they think, there's midterms coming up, and then that big assignment due next week, and then my sister's getting married, and then I have to go pay that bill, and...

I do not pretend that I am a good enough writer to encompass the horror of the World Wars and the conflicts that have both followed and preceded it. I offer you only a snapshot taken from my conceptions of what happened.

A man stopped by the office this morning to help me out with my research; I had quoted numbers of casualties in a previous article and he gave us a better list. I did not have the chance to speak to this man personally, but the numbers speak for themselves. 55,000,000 people died in the six years of World War II alone.

Try to see, in your mind, the stories of each one of those 55,000,000 people, and the millions of others that have come and gone in the furnace of war. Live their lives with me; for if we can't remember what happened for ourselves, we should at least try to remember it with those who were there.

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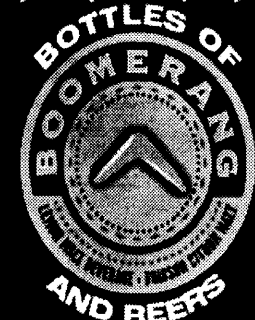
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Ooks Thump Briercrest Bible College

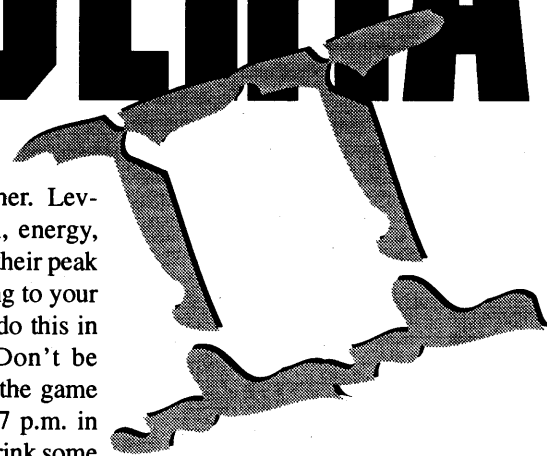

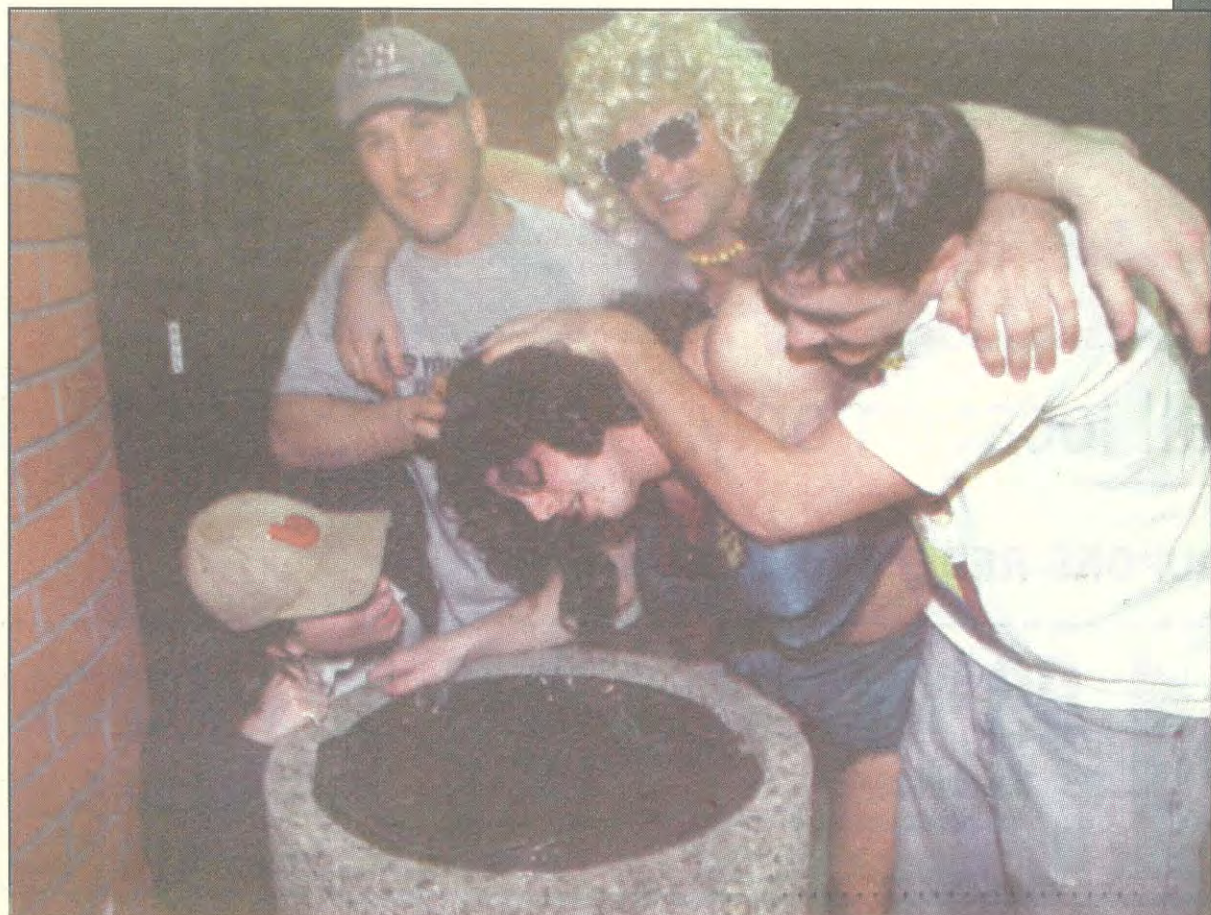

The 20th Century has more or less been an orgy of consumption. The shift of the global elite economies from an agrarian base to a manufacturing base, has led us into an awkward and dangerous position — that of a small boy with his hand in a seemingly bottomless cookie jar. The Greenhouse Effects

nomie success of our great province, and yet it continues to play a major role. This industry literally fuels what is known as the "greenhouse effect," a term that some of us seem to have forgotten about.

The greenhouse effect works on the same principle as a car with its windows rolled up on a sunny day. Heat goes in, but heat does not come out. Relative on a global scale: the more carbon dioxide our automobiles release into the air, the hotter it gets. Human GE

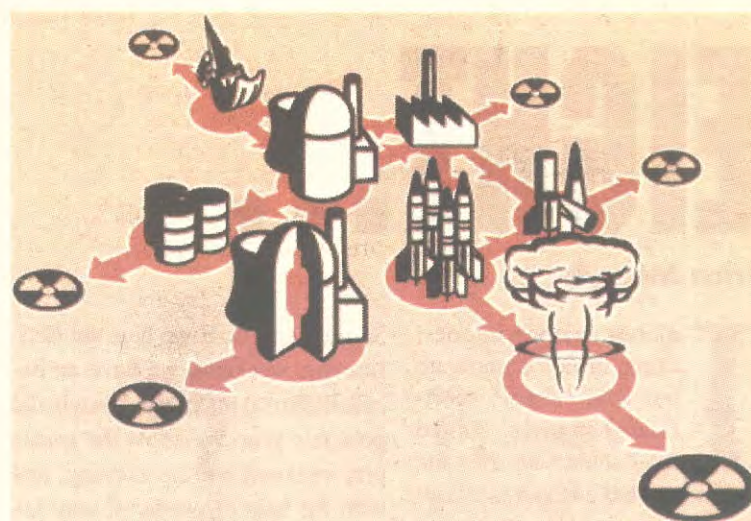

It is estimated that the US Patent and Trademark Office has, to date, issued 1,250 patents on human gene sequences. In theory, this means that gene sequences such as the ones that determine right-handedness and the colour of a person's eyes could one day be patented.

These patents and the organizations behind them are paving the way for the re-designing of the human genetic code. The facts are, however, few and far between. Mankind does not, at this juncture in time, possess the knowledge or foresight to manage the double-edged sword of genetic manipulation. Harsh criticism of these matters persist, and they are the subject of an infinite number of scientific journals.

- A US-based company called Biocyte holds a patent on all umbilical cord cells, from fetuses to newborn babies. This gives them complete control over the extraction and use of umbilical cells and any other therapies developed in connection with them.

Nuclear Weapons

Although the cold war is long over, many countries around the world still carry on active nuclear programs. The issues surrounding

On October 11, the US Senate again postponed the signing of the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT). This agreement is at the forefront of efforts to continue nuclear disarmament, and without US approval, it

will not succeed.

The amount of environmental problems facing the world today are as diverse as the world itself. Man's refusal to use nature in a healthy and sustainable manner is the crux of our difficulties, and if our efforts to date are any indication of the future, things will get worse before they get better.

As the temperatures increase and our vanity grows, mankind has painted itself into the corners of morality. The only certainty for the future of the planet lies in one simple paradigm: Our desire to prolong our existence is matched only by our disrespect for nature.

Monsanto has teamed up with Disney for the Beautiful Science exhibit. Beautiful Science is a 3,800 square foot chasm of nature in the Innoventions Pavilion that also houses exhibits sponsored by IBM, Motorola, Xerox, and AT&T.

The opening of Beautiful Science marks the fifth time in Monsanto's 100-year history that the company has partnered with Disney. The company was among the very first exhibitors at Disneyland in California in the 1950's.

I think that it is safe to say that Sorrentino's is one of the best Italian restaurants in the city. Not only do they provide authentic Italian cuisine, their service is of the highest quality. Through a contemporary, lively atmosphere, Sorrentino's customers are given the opportunity to enjoy extraordinary food at moderate prices.

Their menu is very impressive, offering several genuine Italian appetizers, pastas, pizzas, and entrées. The pizzas come in fascinating combinations, most of which I have never heard of. The most interesting pizza we found on the menu consisted of prosciutto, goat cheese, pesto, and NAIT's own Culinary Arts student Ryan

Cane showing off his expertise. A very unique (and confusing at times) feature to Sorrentino's menu is that the name of each food item is written in Italian. Thankfully, the description of the item is in English.

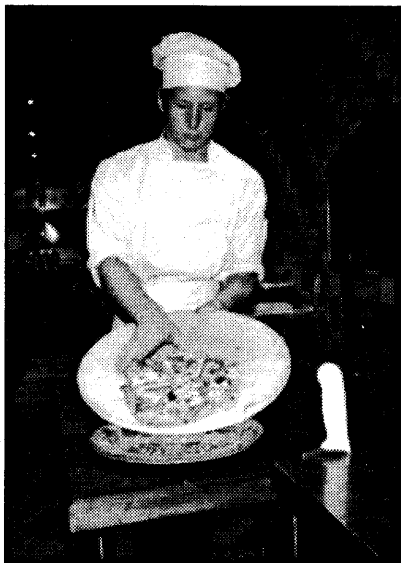
Sorrentino's service is, like I said before, top quality. We decided to test Mark's (our server) product (food) and company knowledge by asking him difficult questions regarding the menu and the restaurant. He astounded us by answering all of our questions with such detail, that we decided that he would probably make the best decisions as to what we should order. So, we left it up to Mark to decide what we were going to eat that evening.

Mark did not disappoint. For our appetizers, he chose to delight our taste buds with a Gamberi Sorrentino (sautéed prawns in a garlic butter sauce) and a Buccconcini E Pomodori Caldi (light mozzarella cheese and fresh tomatoes wrapped in thinly shaves of ham). Mark continued his parade of wonderful food by bringing us the entrees. He brought us two of the more popular ones, the Vitilo Marsela (sautéed veal in a mushroom cream sauce) and a Polo Portofino (two chicken breasts stuffed with a light

mozzarella and black tiger prawns then covered in a creamy mustard sauce).

After devouring our meals, it was easy to tell why both the Vitilo Marsela and the Polo Portofino are customer favorites.

You will not be at a losing end if you decide to choose Sorrentino's for your next dining experience. Keep in mind, it may



be a little difficult to get a table on a Friday or Saturday night, so you will probably want to make reservations. So you don't feel out of place, either, Sorrentino's could safely be labeled as a typical upper class Italian restaurant, so dress semi-formal attire.

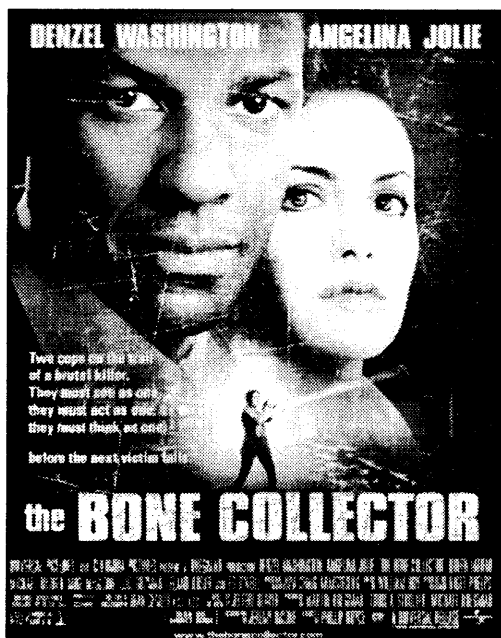
Even though I'm not a Denzel fan, *The Bone Collector* has an excellent plot that can't go unnoticed. Do-gooder Denzel plays a

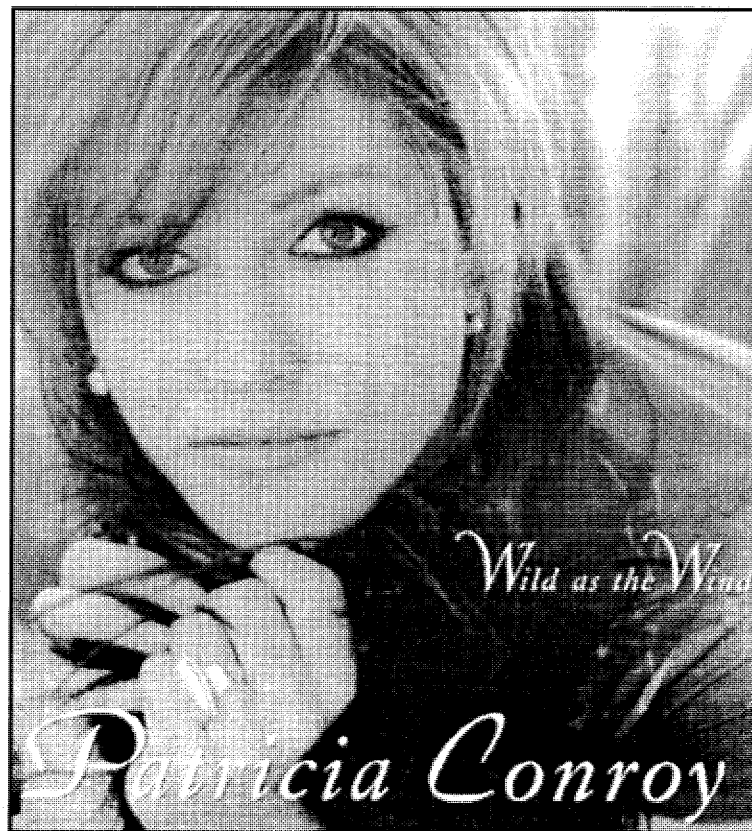

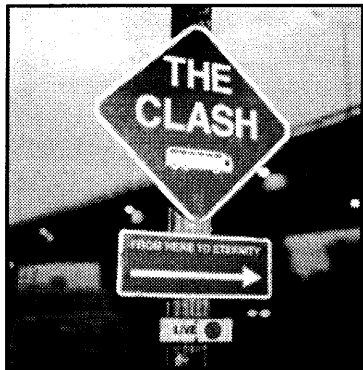

The Clash*From Here To

Empty booze bottles from the audience would land and shatter on the stage (with the band asking them to throw more). The security wouldn't let us dance so the bands would turn out the lights for 30 seconds just to see what would happen to the order of the room. I remember the golden age of punk when the bands actually had a social commentary and wanted the world to change, and not just the balances in their bank accounts.

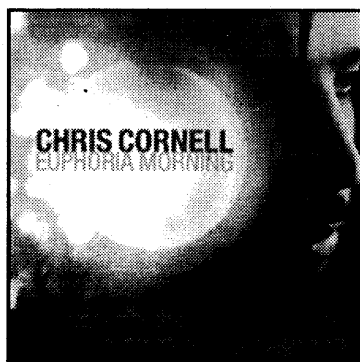
I've been looking forward to The Clash's Live album, anticipating the possibility of being taken back to the good old days. I was a different person when my CD player only contained The Clash; a much more carefree person with a whole different attitude. Naturally, when I stopped trembling enough to open the plastic and actually get the new CD into my player, I was a happy man.

This disk has all The Clash's greatest tunes, ranging from the sugar like "Should I Stay or Should I Go" to the raw energy of "Clash City Rockers." The newest song on the disk was recorded in 1982, and the oldest is from 1978, showing how short The Clash's stint actually had to be in order to have such a strong influence. Even in 1996, when I was in Vancouver, I heard about a Clash reunion from a 12-year-old girl, who wasn't even alive when this material was produced. It takes a good band to excite someone like that.

What can you say about a band that put out solid albums and has a huge following? If you don't have any of The Clash's previous efforts, buy this disk. If you've already discovered the joy that The Clash will bring, this will refresh your love for them.

Chris Cornell*Euphoria Morning*
(A&M Universal)**Drugged Violet**

After a too-long absence from the music scene, former Soundgarden frontman Chris Cornell has blessed us with a wonder of a record. The first song (and first single), "Can't Change Me," is a wonderfully mellow pop song,



giving a perspective on love that is truly fitting in today's society: "She's going to change the world/ But she can't change me/ Suddenly I can see everything that's wrong with me/ But what can I do?/ I'm the only thing I really have at all."

"When I'm Down" is a R&B tinged master that lingers with you all day.

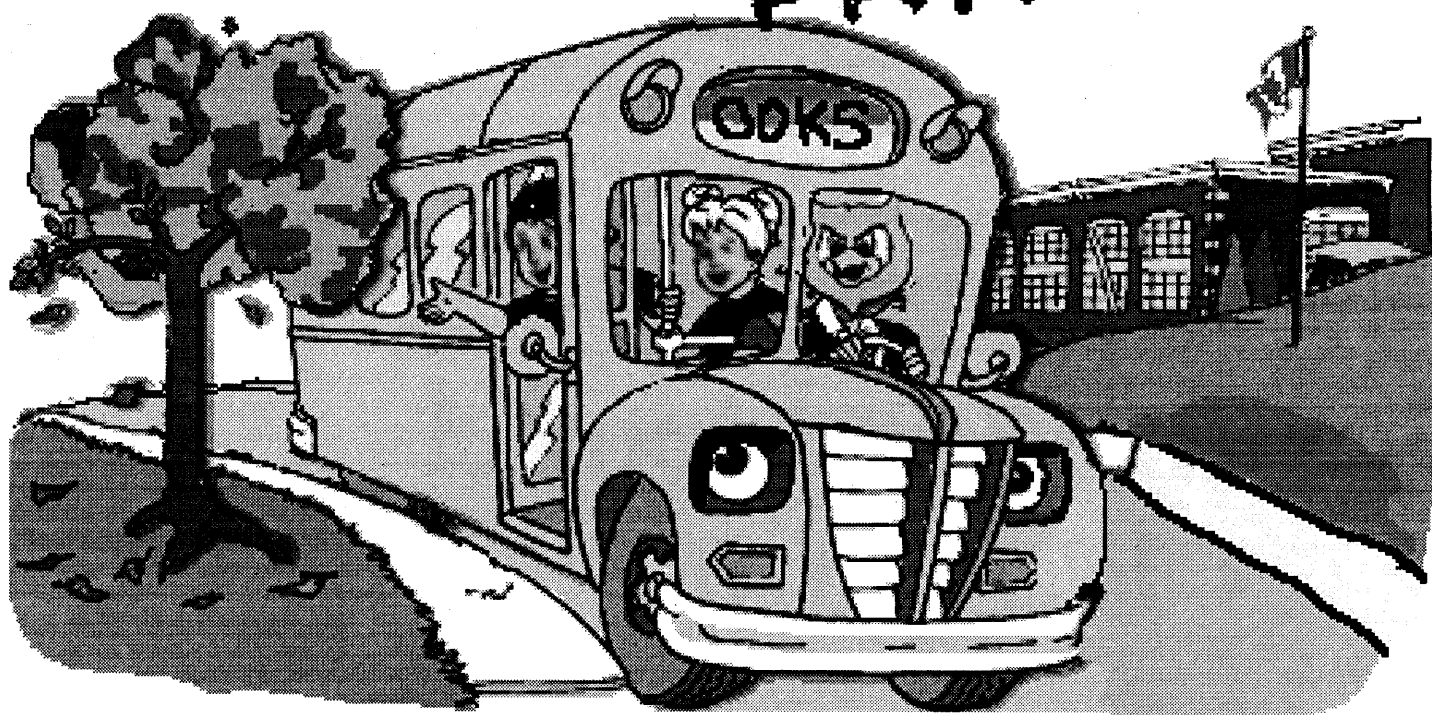
When asked about what emotions he felt while writing 'Euphoria Morning', Chris replied, "I didn't really fear too much. I think the biggest fear is always the same fear. When you're writing or recording music there are always those moments of writing and being by yourself; when you're in the middle of something that you thought was good and then suddenly you question yourself and think maybe this is absolute shit."

That happens when recording as well. One minute you're incredibly enthusiastic and the next minute you're thinking that you

have virtually no talent at all and you're thinking that it's awful. The fact that it was a solo record didn't change that. I don't think there were any new fears. To me, I approach it as something that should be fun. I think music, in a sense, can have serious themes and make big differences sometimes culturally or socially but I also think that you need to separate yourself from that and have fun and not take it so seriously."

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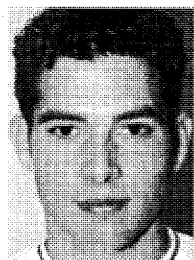

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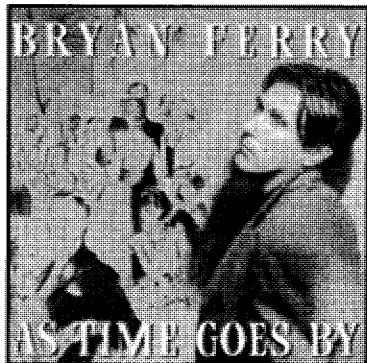

yourself (like Sting). Perhaps he writes songs about pain in an attempt to forget about his 42 canings in one year of Catholic grammar school when he was a child.

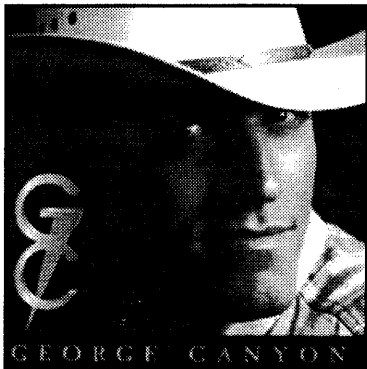
This album does have its strong points. Sting is great at finding catchy rhythms. He still has a great voice. The George Michael-esque tune "Big Lie Small World" really caught my at-

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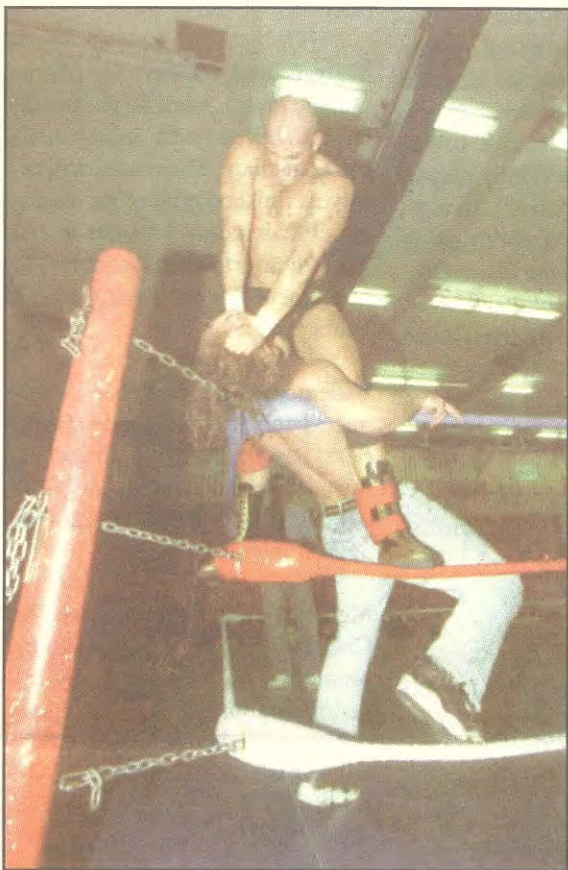

There were six matches for the fans to take in, and in

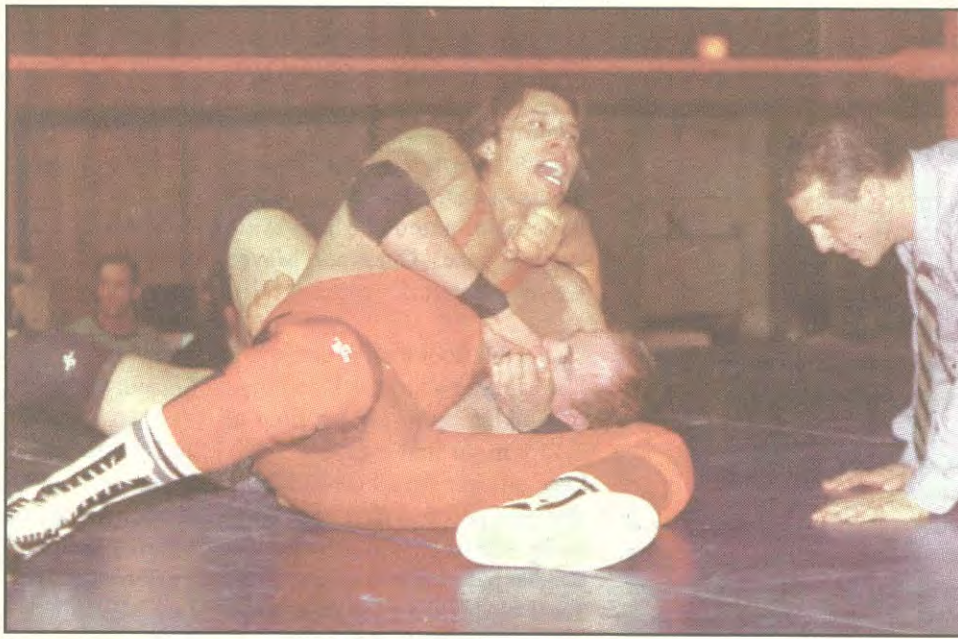
this humble writers opinion, all six matches were excellent.

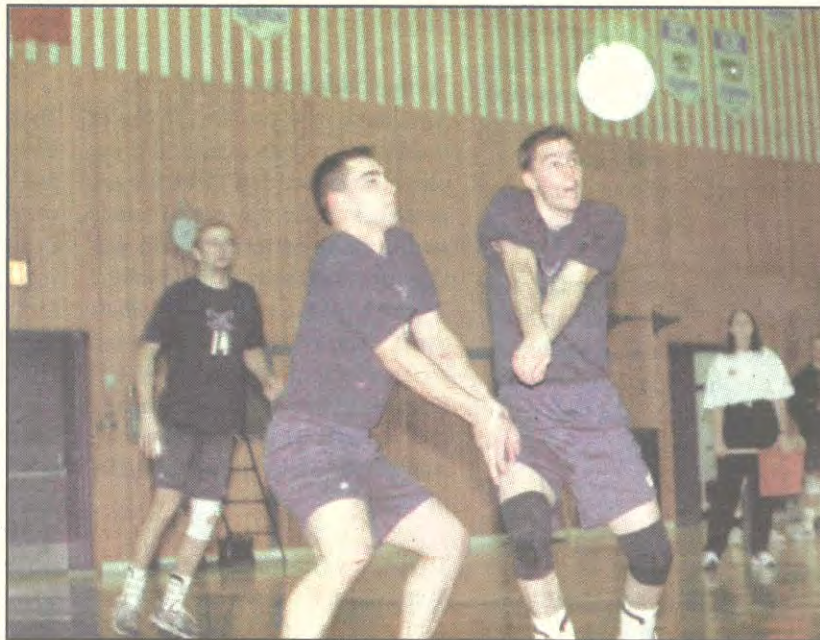
pushes us every day, and that is what makes us stronger.
