concert!

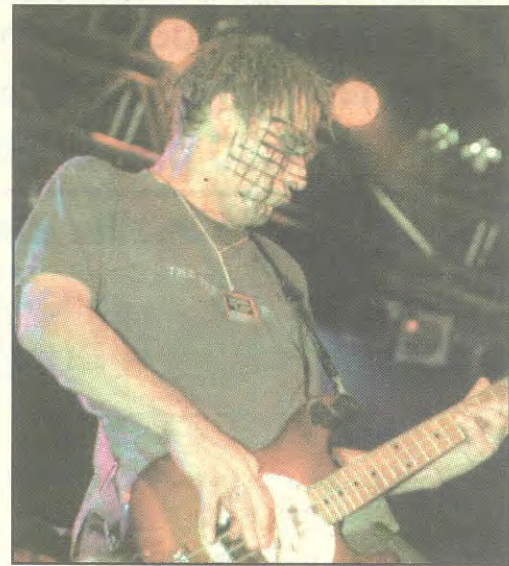

That shouldn't really make you relax, but basically anyone who has heard my tale of woe this past weekend mentioned, "Imagine what would have happened had it been a girl."

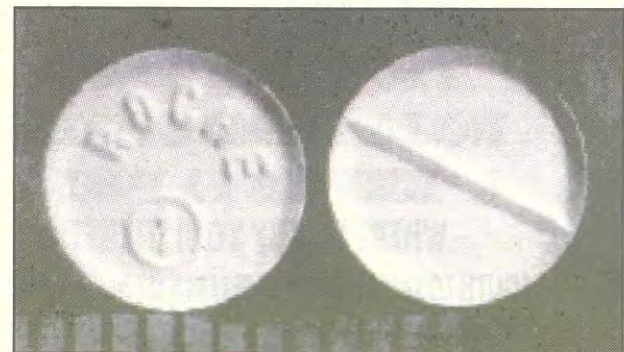
Men have rights, too. Men have been taken advantage of, "But, Mick, you don't really need to give a guy any drugs to get him in bed." This may or may not be

Stampede Wrestling at NAIT!

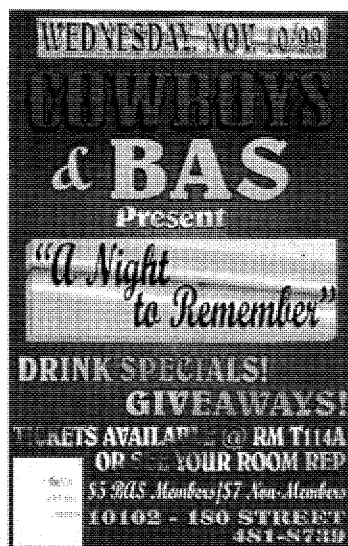

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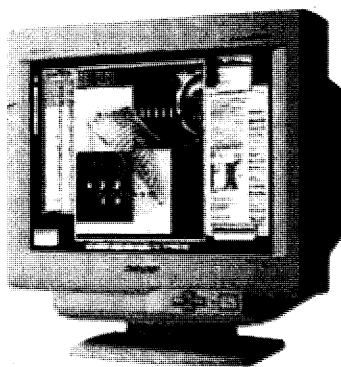

Imagine this:

Born on October 2, 1869, you are named Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi by your parents. At age 13, you marry Kasturba, a girl your age, and then head to London to study law until 1891, when you return to India. In 1893, you take a one-year contract in South Africa to do legal work and stay for 21 years working to secure the rights of abused Indian people under British rule in South Africa.

When you return to India in 1915, you have developed and practiced a discipline of nonviolent social reform called Satyagraha that you use to achieve your goals of Indian nationalism. Within 15 years, you are the head of the Indian nationalist movement, and by now, you are called "Mahatma", or "Great Soul" by the people of India. With fasts and diplomacy as your tools, you manage to finally rid India of the colonial British rule in 1947.

Yet, of course, the story does not end here. With the freeing of India comes the partition of the country into India, composed mainly of Hindus and Pakistan, composed mainly of Muslims. Over the next year, 500,000 people will die in rioting and fighting between the two nations while you struggle to reu-

nite the two factions.

As a final coup, you manage to force the leaders of both factions to sit down and hammer out a peace on January 13, 1948. Yet in a supreme act of irony 12 days later, you are assassinated by a young Hindu fanatic who has rejected your program of tolerance for all creeds and religions.

A stupid and wasteful end for a person who was arguably the greatest man of peace the world has ever known.

And why do I tell you this story? Because I would like to take you with me on a journey into the mind of the man who killed Gandhi. One Nathuram Godse, to be exact. Why do I want to go there? Because there is a bit of Godse's type in all of us, and I would like to expose it.

In Godse's mind lies the demon that slayed Gandhi, that of fanaticism. What is fanaticism? As defined by Webster, a fanatic is someone who is marked by intense enthusiasm and uncritical devotion to something. It is the uncritical devotion which scares me, deeply to the core. Why? Because when you question nothing, you accept everything.

Imagine that, and try to give this more than a moment's passing, irritated thought. Imagine believing something so blindly that you would do anything including destroy, pillage, rape, and even murder vast numbers of people without even thinking about why you are doing it. And though Godse was a religious fanatic, I am by no means limiting myself to the realm of the religious, though I point to that realm as producing the most fanatics.

It only takes one man; in 1095, Pope Urban II calls for a holy war, and **thousands** of Europeans drop everything they are doing and declare war upon a people they barely understand. Eight crusades and 200 years later,

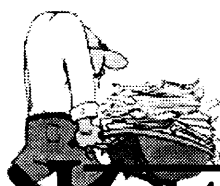
over 200,000 people are dead, including nearly 50,000 **children**. Hitler swept to power in a nearly dead Germany and raised it to a military power, engulfing the world in a stupid, wasteful war that killed over 15 million people and injured 27 million more. And these men were able to accomplish this because the people around them failed to think. They never questioned what they were doing and never stopped to think that what they were doing wasn't simply an innocent game. Ignorance is not bliss. As Karl Menninger put it, "The voice of intelligence... is drowned out by the roar of fear. It is ignored by the voice of desire. It is contradicted by the voice of shame. It is biased by hate and extinguished by anger. Most of all it is silenced by ignorance."

What does this have to do with the average person, especially you, comes the question. Look around you, my friend — how often is your thinking done for you? It is more than you think. If you doubt me, look at how many people you pay to think for you. When you buy a magazine, you are buying people's thoughts on a variety of subjects, conveniently thought for you on anything from fashion, to the best way to prune your garden. Advertisements show you what to buy. Often, the "unbiased" media is subtly telling you what to believe, or at the least, leaving out important facts. And there are dozens of religious fools who will tell you that only God can save you from all your problems. My personal favourite is the sign I saw outside a local church that said Self reliance and inner strength may go against God's purpose." Hmm.

Now, understand that I am not against religion on sheer principles; in fact, I have nothing but the highest regard for someone who has sat down and struggled through their beliefs, defining for themselves what they will believe, and where they will look for their help. But for too many, something like organized religion is a crutch — a way for people to abdicate the responsibility of critical thought. And it is down this road that leads to Waco, Texas, and the Heaven's Gate massacres. People will believe nearly anything today, and they will put their soul into nearly everything else. Stories abound of people who murder each other over items as stupid as track pants, while nations go to war over mere square miles of land, and yet neither can satisfactorily explain why.

Do you still believe that you think for yourself? Maybe you do. But the next time that you pick out an item on the supermarket shelf, stop and think about exactly why you chose that particular item, and not its cousin brand sitting right beside it. Was it the colour, the shape, the pretty picture on the box? Or was it the ad you heard on the radio, saw on the television, or read in the newspaper?

Or do you even know?

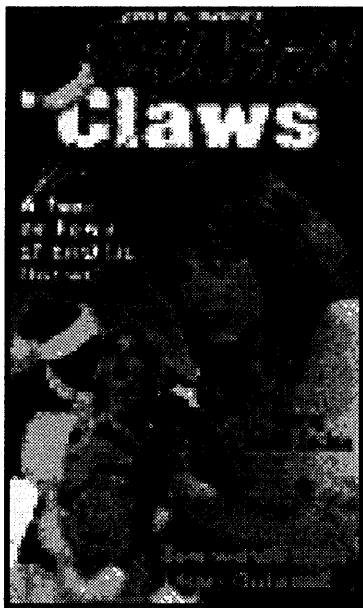
But an eerie silence hangs over us in these days, the days of waiting. Waiting for corporate america to deck the halls-

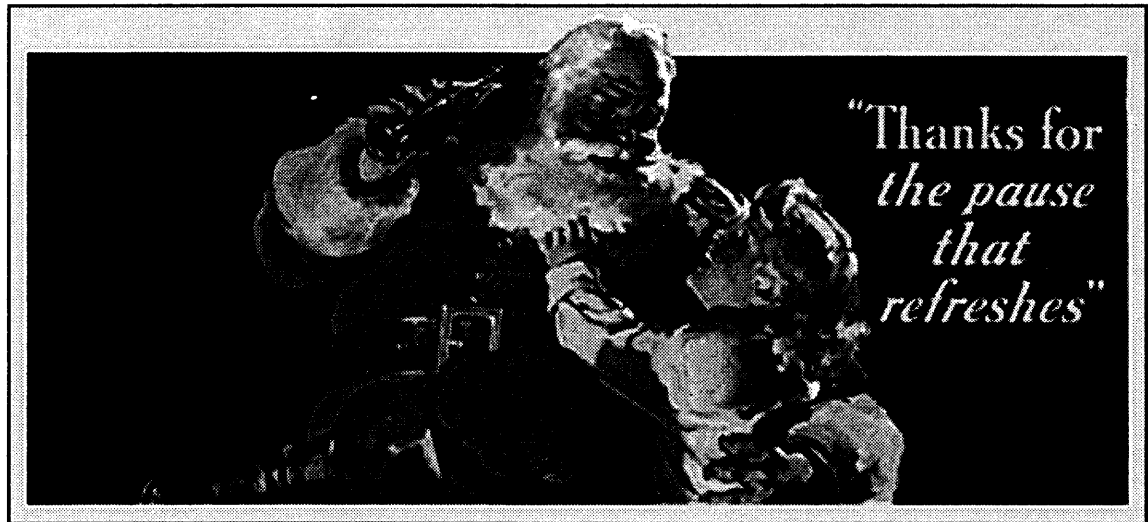

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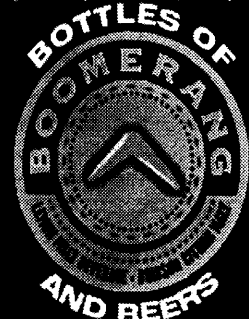
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Glass Tiger Played in My Town

Just the Facts on Men's Soccer

This article is in response to Bob Clement's inaccurate article concerning our men's soccer program. I would like to take this opportunity to provide the readers and Mr. Clements with some accurate information.

Graham Wood, not Stuart Brown (as Mr. Clements inaccurately stated in paragraph 5 of his article) is our Men's Soccer coach. Graham has been our Men's Soccer coach for the past nine seasons, in which he has an impressive record of 55 wins and 16 ties compared to only 19 losses. If we are to only look at wins and losses as the sole standard of success (which I don't), I would consider Graham a much better candidate than a certain staff member who has two losing seasons (and no winning seasons) as a head coach in the ACAC.

Last year, the team was very strong with a 7-1-2 record, a 1st place finish in the North division, and a national ranking of 7th. This season, with 14 first year players, the Ooks managed to finish with a 3-5-2 record and missed the playoffs (not the first time in team history, as Mr. Clements has incorrectly stated), which is an understandable result with the lack of experience on the team

— Coach Wood did a fine job with the program this season.

Graham Wood has earned the ACAC Coach of the Year twice as a coach of NAIT (93-94, 95-96), an honour in which he was selected by his peers. In addition to his peers' recognition of a job well done, Graham also worked with the national program this past summer — an honour that "qualified coaches on staff" cannot match.

As for the ACAC championships that have eluded NAIT soccer for the past nine years, I will share this information: The only other school other than Mount Royal College to win a championship in those nine years is Grant MacEwan College, who won last year by upsetting the #1 ranked team in the country (Mount Royal) in the first round of the playoffs. Mount Royal has been dominant in the men's soccer scene nationally for a decade, and very few teams have been successful against them. Let us not forget as well, that they have great support from their administration, which allows them to provide opportunities to their student athletes which are not yet available here.

The NAIT Men's Soccer program does deserve better — better support from staff members who should gather facts before venting in a public forum. Coach Wood has done a fine job with the program and athletes at NAIT. Keep up the good work, Graham!

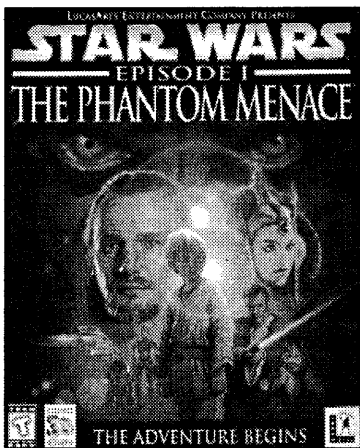

young Jedi, you will find the exit soon enough." So I calmed myself down, and sure enough, ended up finding my way out of the level.

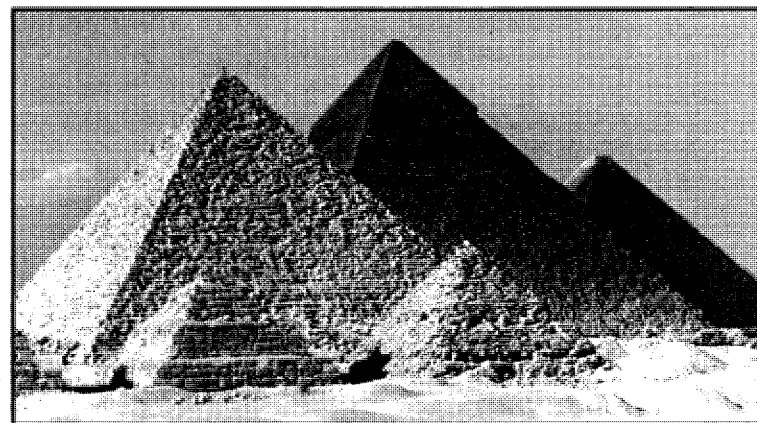
If any men are reading this article, get your butt to the computer store and pick up a copy of this game. It will provide you with countless hours of fun, adventure, and quality time away from your significant other.

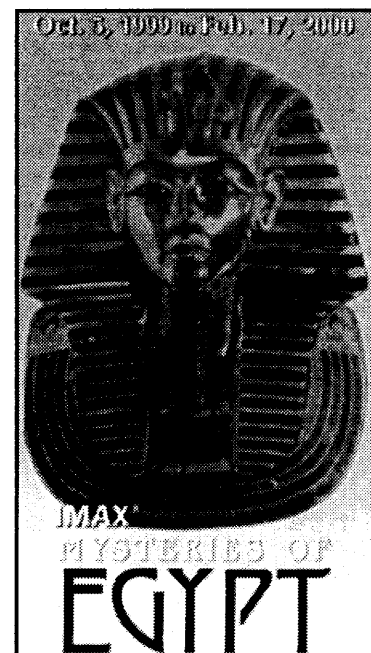

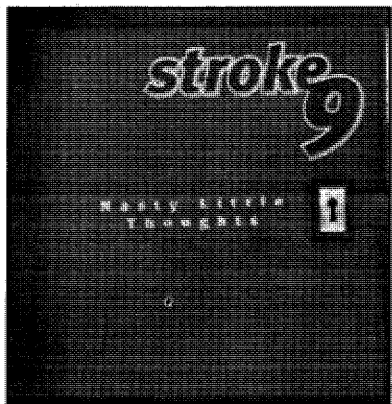
CD Reviews

Stroke 9

Nasty Little Thoughts

Good Album! I repeat, good album! This one really jumped up and bit me. I can't believe these guys aren't bigger than they are. Their sound is very much like Fastball. Stroke 9 is a San Francisco based rock band whose career thus far has followed the indie-rock work ethic to the letter. They formed in high school, released two albums themselves, booked their own national tour, and eventually made so much noise that they got signed. It's what comes next that will be really interesting: the band's Cherry/Universal debut album, *Nasty Little Thoughts*, is loaded with 3-to-4-minute harmony-loaded pop-rock songs which are so addictive that stardom seems like a foregone conclusion. The group is a tight and powerful rock band, but wisely never lets anything get in the way of melodies like the ones in "Little Black Backpack," "Letters" or "Washin' and Wonderin'." "The first thing with our music is always the song," Luke says. "In high school I was into a lot of English new wave - The Smiths, Love And Rockets, New Order - and then I had a big classic rock phase. I've just always been attracted to melodic music." They formed the band in high school - Marin Academy in San Rafael, across the Golden Gate Bridge from San Francisco. Drummer Eric Stock came on board two years ago. "At first it was kind of weird coming into such a tightly-knit bunch of guys," says Eric, who joined the



band shortly after an American tour with Modern English. "But, now I feel like I've known them all my life." "Yeah, we're together all day, every day and we're still best friends," John says. "People tell us that it really comes across when we're playing live." This band was their high school senior project. "We had a class called 'Rock Band' that we made a six-song tape for at a local guy's studio, and that was our senior project. Yes, we got graded," Luke laughs. "I can't remember what we got - probably a 'See me after class!'" At the very least, it didn't prevent any of them from graduating. All four members went to different colleges, yet each summer they'd "fall back into the band" and recorded their self-released debut album, *Boy Meets Girl*, during the summer of '93. In case you hadn't already noticed, yes, Stroke 9 is the band from the recent Ron Howard-directed film, "EdTV." "They had originally wanted a punk band for that scene," says Greg, "but they saw us and dug us, so we wrote a very aggressive song and got into the film." Stroke 9 is in it for the long haul, expect to see more of them as their star begins to brighten. Don't wait for the bandwagon, pick this disc for your collection now.

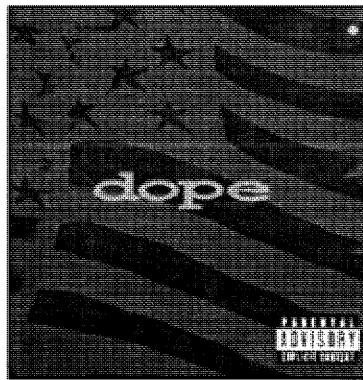
