Registration:


Make sure you complete all of the forms that anyone gives you. If you just moved here make sure you know your address, and that you use it. If you use your parents' address from out of town, make sure that you will or can eventually get those mailings. Pick up a student handbook. Your student handbook will inform you about a lot of the services that the school and NAITSA offer and it will have valuable coupons inside. Inside there will also be a ballot to win a \$2,000 towards your tuition. Bring this ballot to Ookfest on September 14th to win. Get your student ID photo and card. Once you have that you can then use the library facilities, buy cheaper bus passes at the bookstore and present proper ID during quizzes and exams. If you have student loan papers, get them signed. If you are unaware of the process, just ask. The staff at the counseling centre can help you through the process. If you need your papers processed right away, the closest post office is at Kingsway Garden Mall. It is located in The Press Gallery dry cleaner just down from the west doors of Sears.

Orientation:

If your program has an orientation session it is very important to attend. You should have received a sheet during registration outlining where and when your orientation will take place. The day, time and location are crucial. This is when you will receive your schedule and any other important program information. If you do not go to the appropriate location at the right time, you will not receive your schedule.

Tips for your first day at school. I do not recommend showing up late on the first day. If you arrive late for that first class, everyone will remember forever. The teacher will be making everyone stand up and say their name, where they're from and an interesting tidbit about themselves. If you're late, all eyes are definitely on you. But once that first class is over it won't seem that bad after all. Until you have a spare. If you live nearby, about a block or two, you can generally make it home to be there for about say half an hour, if you live too far, you're stuck here. The Nest has breakfast each morning until 10:30 and they also have lunch specials. Did I mention that after 3p.m. they serve alcohol. This is another great place to hang.



There are still many more things to do around campus, but these are some of the highlights. Be sure to check everything out and have some fun, there is something here for everyone.







Health & Dental Goes Digital

This year the health and dental benefits are going digital, well the card is anyways. Starting September 1, 2002, you will be able to download and print off your student benefits card. Watch for the display here at registration to get all the facts on how to get your card online.

The health and dental plans at NAIT are mandatory for all eligible students. To become eligible, students must be a member of the NAIT Student's association, registered in an applicable program, meet the full-time criteria and reside in Canada.

To activate the coverage, students MUST fill out the proper forms providing their full name, date of birth as well as their student ID number. Once this information has been processed, your coverage will be activated with the applicable insurance carriers.

For eligible students starting this fall, coverage begins on September 1st, 2001, and ends August 31st, 2003, providing there has been no change in your eligibility from the fall to winter semester. For eligible students starting in January, the coverage period is from January 1st, 2003, to August 31, 2003.

For students with a spouse

the opportunity to purchase family coverage from the student benefit plans. To do so, stop by the Student's Benefits office (E-133) and complete the "Family add-on form", and pay the family coverage fee. This must be done before deadline for the semester period of enrollment. For more information or assistance, please speak with your Student Service Coordina-

If you meet the eligibility requirements but already have comparable health and/or dental coverage, excluding Alberta Health Care, you may apply to waive the benefits. All eligible students are given the opportunity to waive the benefits offered. To do so you MUST complete the "Student Benefits Waiver Form". Once your waiver forms have been approved, the plan will be credited or refunded. To waive the benefits, documentation of existing coverage is needed. This can be in the form of the original certificate of coverage, statement of claim, verification letter from a current plan administrator/sponsor, benefit card, pay direct drug card, treaty status card or even a letter from your employer. It is very important that your documentation provide your policy number and/or dependants, they are given and the name of your insurance

provider.

The coverage that students receive is changing this year, but more information will be available September 1st, 2002 from the Student's Benefit office. Coverage in the past has been 80% on prescriptions, mostly generic drugs, and 100% on annual regular dental visits. The coverage is extended health care and includes ambulance services, chiropractic visits and massage therapy. For a comprehensive list please see the staff at the Student's Benefit

Before you make your appointment to see a dentist, stop by the Student's Benefit office for a list. To keep the plan at low cost to you, the student, there is only a small handful of dentists around the city that accept the Managed dental plan. If you have ANY questions about your coverage and the services available to you, stop by room E-133 on Main Campus, call them at 471-7730, or e-mail them at studentplans@nait.ab.ca The friendly staff will be able to assist you. Reminder, the deadline to waive your benefits is September 27, 2002 at 4:00 p.m. There will be no exceptions or extensions.

INFORMATION UPDATE

Changes to Procedures for Maintaining Interest-Free Status

Effective August 1, 2002, the Government of Canada will simplify and further harmonize the procedures for full-time students to maintain interest-free status on their Canada Student Loan(s) while they continue full-time

The Canada Student Loans Program will continue to offer the six-month interest-free period between periods of study during which time the Government of Canada pays the interest on behalf of the borrower. Student borrowers will be required to provide Confirmation of Enrolment to their previous lender (financial institution) and/or the National

The Canada Student Loans Program will continue to offer the six-month interest-free period between periods of study during which time the Government of Canada pays the interest on behalf of the borrower.

Student Loans Service Centre within this six-month period in order to maintain their interestfree status.

The four-month period provided to Canada Student Loans borrowers to confirm their instudy status from the date of their return-to-study will be eliminated. Most provincial programs did not offer this four-month period and it became a potential source of confusion for some borrowers and program administrators. This change supports the Government of Canada's effort to harmonize the Canada Student Loans Program with provincial program-

Procedures to Maintain Interest-free Status

For students continuing studies and receiving a new loan

If the student returns to fulltime studies within six months of the previous period of study end date and receives a new loan, a Certificate of Eligibility and Confirmation of Enrolment form will be sent to the student by the province for signature by their institution. It is the student's responsibility to send back this completed form to their previous lender and/or to the National Student Loans Service Centre.

For students continuina studies and not receiving a new loan

- If the student returns to fulltime studies within six months of the previous period of studies end date, the student must provide a Confirmation of Enrolment within six months of the previous period of study end date to maintain interest-free status. It is the student's responsibility to send back this completed form to their previous lender and/or to the National Student Loans Service Centre.
- Confirmation of Enrolment forms can be obtained from postsecondary educational institu-

For students not returning to studies

- Borrowers are required to consolidate their loans and begin repayment six months following the end of their most recent period
- Upon completion of study, interest begins to accrue on the outstanding balance of the loan. The borrower, however, is not required to make payments on the principal or interest until at least 6 months following the end of study.

Students failing to submit their Confirmation of Enrolment

- Where more than six months have elapsed after the last postsecondary study end date:
- If the student has a full-time Canada Student Loan(s) issued prior to August 1, 2000, the student is required to pay the financial institution any interest accrued on the loan(s) to the day before the first day of the confirmed period;
- If the student has a full-time Canada Student Loan(s) issued after August 1, 2000, the student is required to pay the Government of Canada any interest accrued on the loan(s) to the day before the first day of the confirmed period; or,
- The student may enter into a consolidated loan agreement in which the unpaid accrued interest is added to the principal amount.

OPERATIONAL QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Student Loans Canada Program (CSLP) Changes to Maintaining Interest-free

1. What are the changes to maintaining interest-free status?

Post-secondary students are required to provide a Confirmation of Enrolment in full-time study to maintain interest-free status on their Canada Student Loans.

Since 1995, student borrowers have been allowed a sixmonth period following their last study period plus an additional four-month period following the first day of their current study period to submit a Confirmation of Enrolment. If students fail to submit the documentation within this time frame, they are required to pay any interest accrued since their last period of study or consolidate their loans.

As of August 1, 2002, the additional four-month period will be removed. This will help to ensure greater consistency with provincial programs and in turn lessen the confusion for students. The changes will help students meet the responsibility of maintaining all their loans in good standing. Student borrowers will be less likely to unwittingly miss the deadline to provide Confirmation of Enrolment and will avoid the possibility of having to pay accrued interest and of having their loans being placed in "technical default."

2. When will the change be implemented?

on August 1, 2002.

3. Why is the Government of Canada making this change?

While the additional four months was intended to provide students with more flexibility in the loan process, it often resulted in greater students confusion for because most provinces require the Confirmation of Enrolment to be submitted

within six months. The inconsistency with the federal portion of the student loan has resulted in many students being confused about their responsibilities and they often overlook submitting their confirmation.

The change would bring the Canada Student Loans Program into accord with the six-month period afforded in most provincial programs. Ensuring the same requirements for both Canada Student Loans and provincial student loans will reduce the complexity and costs to the borrower. It will also minimize the administrative burden on lenders and the National Loans Service Student Centre.

4. How will the new rule interact with provincial requirements?

The amendments are another step toward harmonizing student loans, as they will ensure that the CSLP is identical to most provincial programs in this respect. This consistency will ensure less administrative burdens for both provincial and federal program staff.

The participating provincial/ territorial jurisdictions are supportive of the amendment and generally welcome changes that result in harmonized and streamlined rules for the federal and provincial portions of the student loan.

5. What is a Confirmation of Enrolment?

A Confirmation of Enrolment is a prescribed form signed by an official at a post-secondary educational institution The amendment takes effect that verifies the student's enrolment in full-time studies.

6. What happens when students fail to submit a Confirmation of Enrolment?

If students submit the Confirmation of Enrolment later than six months after the last study period they must either pay the interest accrued or consolidate their loans and begin repayment.

IT is here

After breaking ground two years ago, the construction of the NAIT HP Centre will be finished and opening its doors this September. This new Information and Communications Technology (ICT) building will be one of the most technologically innovative learning environments in the world, and will accommodate 1,662 full-time information and communications technology students. The state-of-the-art HP Centre will be the new home to the School of Applied Media and Information Technology as well as the School of Electrical and Electronics Technology. This 250,000 square foot building will house 20 classrooms and 56 computer, electrical and telecommunications labs, as well as a teleconferencing centre. In addition to these labs there will be a 24 hour, 5,000 square foot computer commons with 120 computers and print services, with a technical support area available for students to use. There will also be socialization and study areas available to students, retail and food services, and six multimedia payphone terminals.

This \$50 million project will increase NAIT's overall registrations by 11% and boost enrollment in ICT programs by 75%. These registrations will grow NAIT's student enrollment by 700 full time students and almost 7,000 part time students. The funding for such a large project was done through the help of corporate donors, the school and its fundraising activities, as well as one-time grants from the Province of Alberta totaling nearly \$28 million. This building comes as a response to the demand for ICT education. Previously NAIT received 2.5 applications for every ICT space available.

Did you know that NAIT trains 19% of Alberta's Information and Communications Technology graduates and nearly 50% of all Alberta apprentices? Through NAIT's Information and Communications Technology programs you can obtain a certificate in just one year, a diploma in two, or even receive an applied degree after four years of study. There are even nine apprenticeship programs offered by the School of Electrical and Electronics, your opportunities at NAIT are endless! The value of a NAIT education is more than you would expect. At NAIT, students receive more hours of instruction per dollar than any other college or university around. Check out the new HP Centre for opportunities for your ICT future.


