NAITSA VP Activities By-Election

As you've seen throughout the halls and corridors of NAIT, your Students' Association is having a by-election. Elections are usually held towards the end of the second semester every March. The only exception is when a by-election is called. This past August VP Activities Jason Anderson resigned from his VP Academic position for a different career opportunity.

Right about now you're probably asking yourself: "What exactly does a VP Activities do?" Well some of the positions' main responsibilities include:

- Working with Entertainment and Marketing Director in coordinating and executing curricular events;
- Co-organize awareness weeks and activities;

- Chair up the Activities Committee;
- Approve all NAIT student club and Technology fundraisers held on and off campus;

These are just a few of the positions' many responsibilities. If you would like to view all of the responsibilities, please stop by the NAITSA office and speak to Wade Babiuk, VP Academic and Chief Returning Officer, or call him at 471-8877. If you are interested in running for the position there are a few requirements. First off the candidates must be NAIT students. Secondly you must maintain between a minimum of three (3) class hours per week, and a maximum of twelve (12) class hours per week. This means that if you are interested in running

and elected, you would have to drop some courses in order to stay within the hour limit. All candidates must also provide a copy of current academic marks and must have a combined total average of at least 50 percent.

The position also requires that you maintain office hours between 8:00 am and 4:30 pm when not attending class. This does not include after hour work. The position also comes with a bi-monthly salary and part scholarship.

By now you're all thinking, "This sounds like something I want to do." Well if you would like to, then here's some important information you need to know.

The position does require extra work at times, and a lot of patience but the payoffs are well worth it. The people and experiences that you will have are a once in a lifetime opportunity. A Small Prick Isn't So Bad...

Canadian Blood Services Visits NAIT

The answer to the lifelong question of "does size matter" was answered last week, as several NAIT students discovered that one small pint of blood can help save a life.

Canadian Blood Services returned to the NAIT Main Campus with the Blood-mobile. Several Registered Nurses, CBS organizers and assistants, as well as countless volunteers all banded together in a consorted effort to give hope to those in need.

How much blood does a person have?

The average person has approximately 5 litres of blood in their body. One unit of blood is 450 mL. Healthy donors are encouraged to donate often, as long as there is a 56 day buffer between donations.

Where else can a person donate?

Donations are also accepted at the CBS Blood Centre - 8249-114th Street. To book an

appointment, you can call 431-0202.

Who needs blood?

The figures are surprising. The average hip-replacement surgery requires 2 units of blood. For abdominal surgery, up to 4 units are needed. Heart bypass patients could be using 6 units of donated blood, whereas a gunshot wound victim could necessitate an astonishing 15 units of blood.

Overall, the most recent campaign at NAIT was able to add 79

new units of blood to the bank, and defer 13 potential donors.

Your next chance to donate at NAIT will be on November 29 in the North Lobby. For more information, stop by NAITSA and talk to Wade Babiuk, or call Canadian Blood Services at 1-877-431-8775.

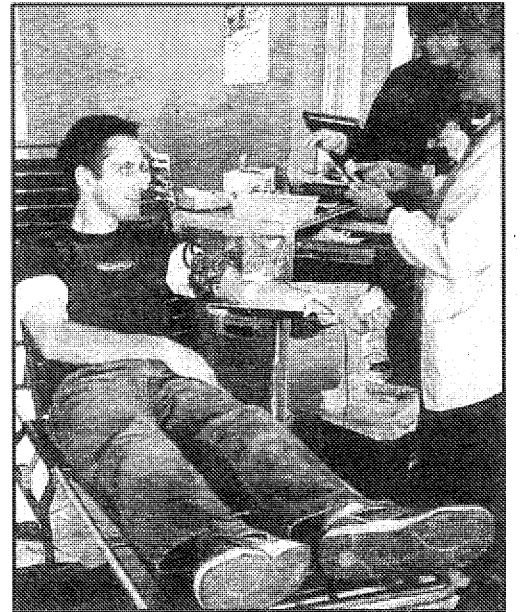

In good hands: NAIT Student Courtney Theriault gets briefed on procedure by a CBS specialist.

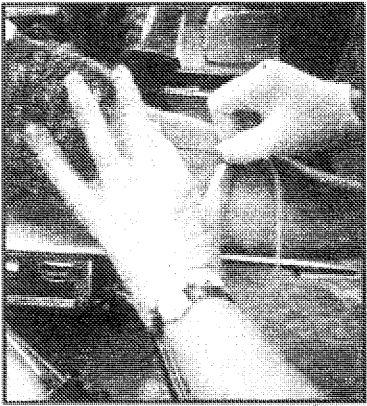

The decision to bring the Blood-mobile by NAIT is obvious, says CBS Coordinator Roxanne Jackson, "We come to high schools and colleges like NAIT to recruit new donors." New faces are something that CBS never gets tired of seeing, as approximately 30 new faces joined regular donors last week.

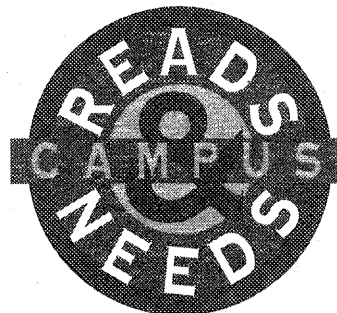
"We're very happy with this (clinic's) turnout," says Blood Donor Clinic organizer and NAITSA VP Academics Wade Babiuk. Unfortunately, the most recent session fell just short of the 100 donor goal, so there is still a need for new donors.

Why give blood? The simplest reason is that you can help save a life... perhaps even several lives with several donations, and all it takes is about an hour of your time each session.

The Facts on Giving Blood Not Everyone Can Give

While your desire may be your biggest reason to give, there are requirements to who can donate. Persons who have received a piercing or tattoo in the past twelve months, or the dentist within three days of donating are automatically deferred. Also, acceptable donors must weigh at least 110lbs. CBS takes extensive steps in screening donors, as a means of safety for the donors and the patients.

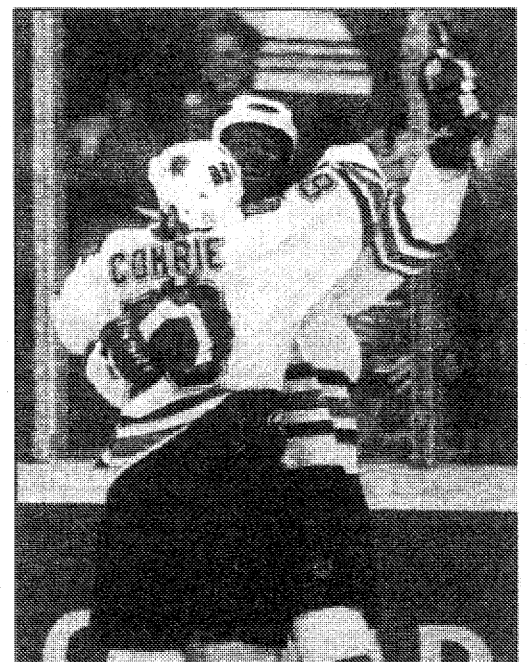

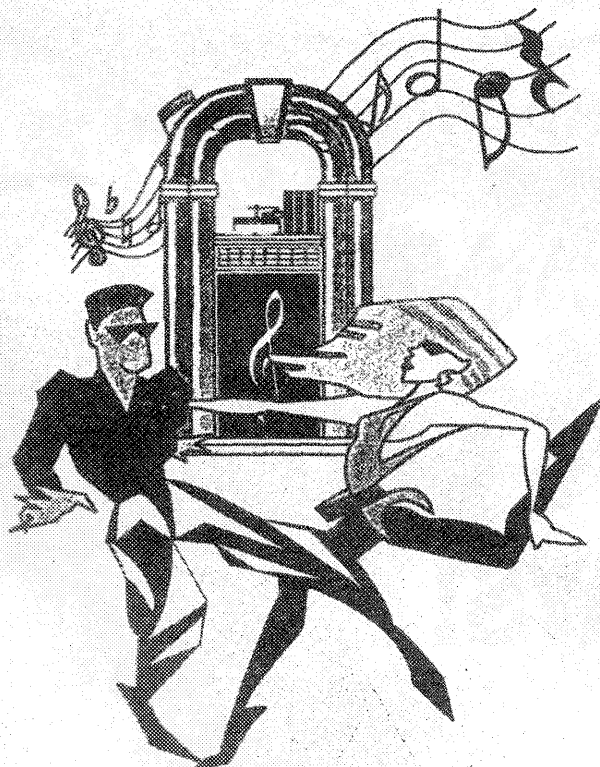

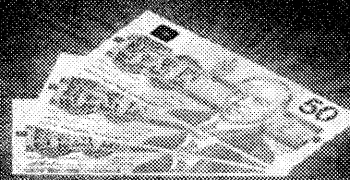
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Terrorist Britain

Student Submission

This article is in response to the "Terrorism" article, which some uninformed, unidentified student wrote in last week's edition.

First off us "white" people were very well aware of terrorism long before Sept. 11. Everyone is familiar with the IRA, and the daily activities in the West Bank. As for Britain using terrorist tactics to obtain India as its territory... here is a brief history lesson since you've never seen "Passage to India", or read "The Jungle Book".

In the 1700s the Moguls who ruled India began to lose their power, and rebellions sprang up in many parts of the subcontinent. After finally quelling the Marathas and defeating the Sikhs in the Punjab, Britain dominated the entire country by 1849. It controlled local rulers ad all trade.

The common people and the aristocracy disliked the British presence. This dislike boiled over in 1857 during "The Indian Mutiny". This quickly became an imperial war. It dragged on for two years, but it was won after a whirlwind of murder, siege, atrocity, forced marches, heroism, savagery and brutality. Men, women and children were butchered by **BOTH** sides.

During colonial rule in India, the British built thousands of miles of railroads, established courts of law, civil services, schools and universities. By 1900 India had 50,000 miles of paved roads. Telegraph lines were strung and a postal services established. Western ideas were introduced, and English became a second language, providing Indians from many different ethnic and cultural backgrounds with a common lan-

guage. Last time I checked, all Bin Laden and his gang ever did for America was PLACE TERROR in its citizens, hence the term TERRORISM. 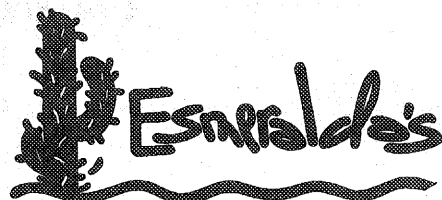
Once they're playing, if you even say one word, you usually get no response. Sometimes there is limited head bobbing, a small wave saying "shoo" or even the

The Men's Oaks meet other

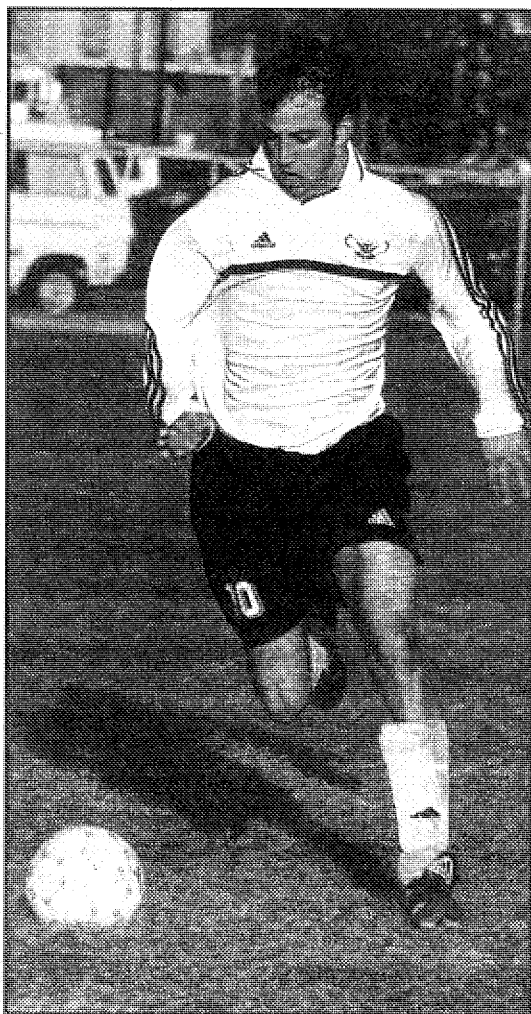

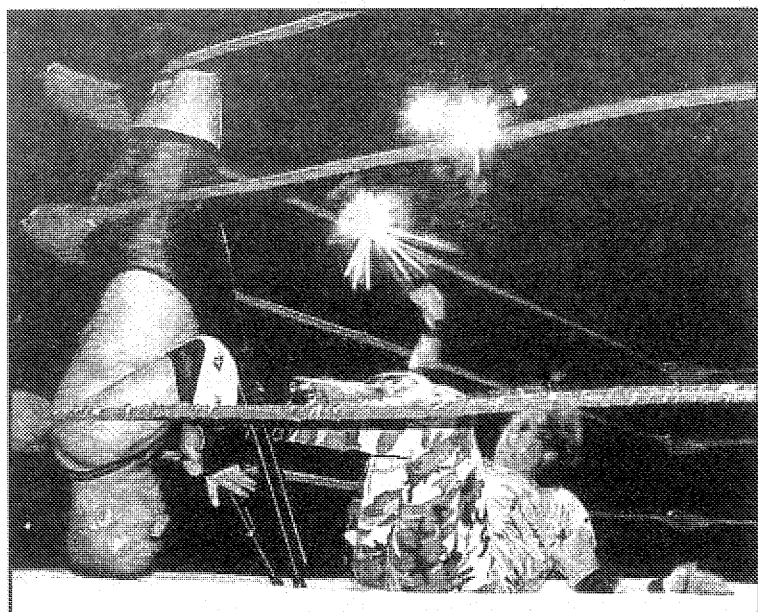

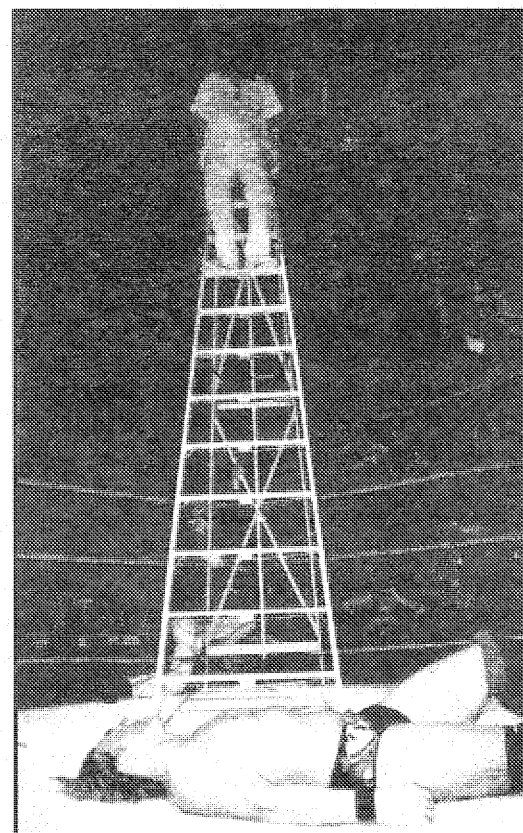

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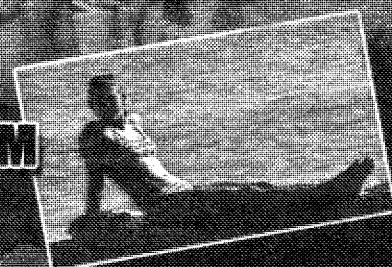
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CD Review

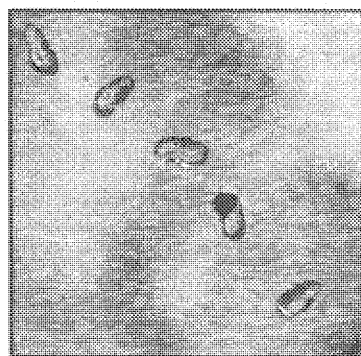

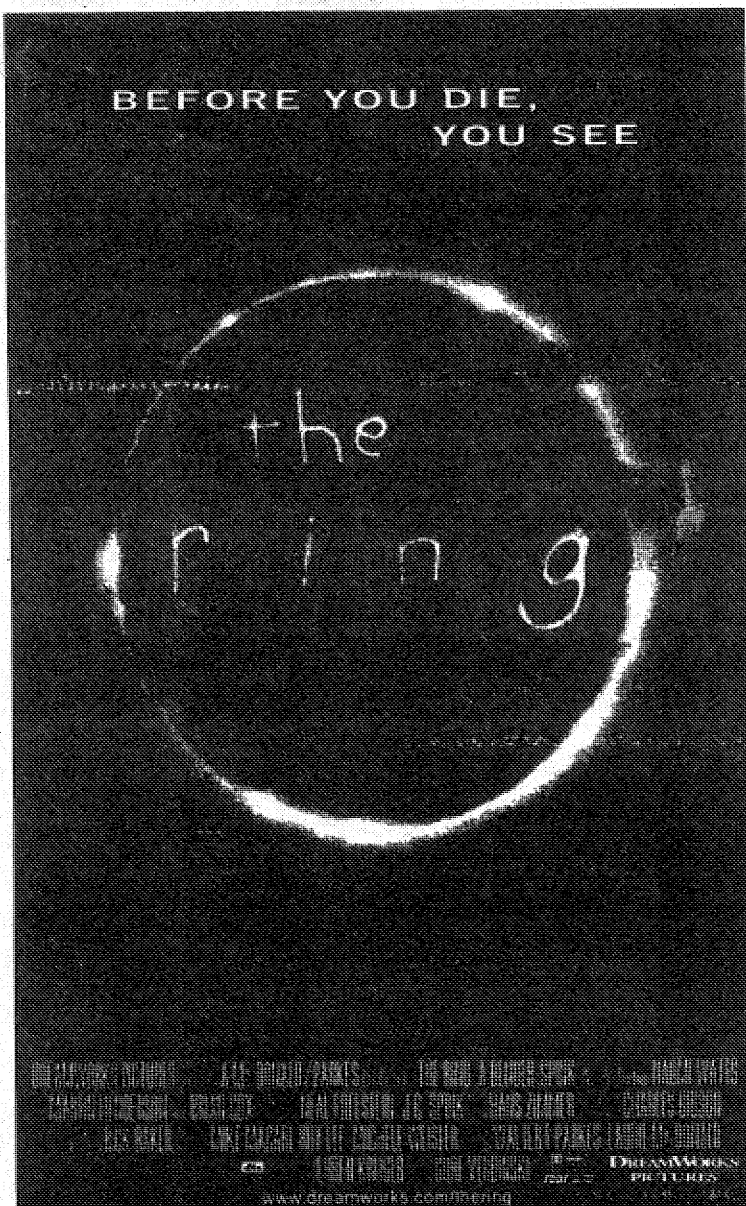
This movie is based on the first of a Japanese novel trilogy by
