But first, I'd like to take a minute to talk about math.



Doug Bell, Automotives instructor, says he has about two large cups a day during the week, "it's something to do, it's an event more than a beverage."

Oh, and if you like your java, you're in luck, there are some health benefits to it. Information released from the Coffee Association of Canada, states coffee:

- Improves attention and concentration (and test scores) a physiological outcome if not a health benefit directly
- Positive impact on asthma -coffee functions as a bronchodilator
- Boosts metabolism -in effect a "thinning / diet impact"

McAlpine, with the Coffee Association says the jury is still out on any bad affects of coffee, such as:

· Generalized negative coverage for being addictive -despite the fact that it is not classified by

health authorities as an addictive substance due to lack of psychosocial impacts, no increased tolerance to dose, very limited withdrawal symptoms

• Heartburn / stomach troubles based on a small minority of people who are sensitive to coffee's acidity

McAlpine says, "If one were trying to cram through the night for an exam it would be better to have a coffee every few hours rather than one extra large one at the beginning of the study haul." Coffee is the number one beverage choice of adult Canadians (over 18) and much more popular in Canada than the US where soft drinks are number one.

Crystal Eggert, in Environmental Sciences says she could start the day without a cup, "but definitely prefer not to."




Ook of the Week Tim Barlow

Before joining the Ooks, Tim played hockey for the Moose







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Snow, Ice, NAIT, and You!

NAITSA received a lot of complaints about the snow and ice removal in the parking lots and parkade after last week's dump of snow. We'd like to thank all of you for voicing your concerns, as we can't know about 100% of the problems in the school without help from our fellow students! However, on this issue, we aren't the ones that can solve the problem, but I'll tell you who can!

So in my quest to keep the students informed, I decided to write this article to explain what exactly happens after it snows. To do so, I asked Robert Kolba, Maintenance Services Coordinator with Facilities Maintenance, to give me some information I could pass along to the students.

"Our crew is mobilized by a call from the Services building (D) which is staffed 24 hours. Once the call is received, the grounds crew usually has all sidewalks and entrances at main campus cleared within 2 hours. In the case of [last] week (and many other cases) the snow does not stop and you end up in a catch-up situation throughout the day dealing with hotspots and high priority areas."

On the Facilities Operations web-

site, the priority areas are listed

- Sidewalks, ramps, curb cuts and parking stalls that are used by disabled persons.
- · Main building entrances and emergency road access points.
- · Sidewalks.
- Roads and parking lots.

He also mentioned that, "temperatures that are hovering at the freezing mark also impair our ability, in that slush will turn to ice and the ice is harder to remove. Our grounds crew consists of 5-7 individuals that are supported by other areas when required."

Some advice he has for students and staff on campus: "In my career, I have had the opportunity to investigate several slips from ice (not NAIT related) and I have a few tips to pass along..."

- · Footwear should be adequately
- · Soles made from the right material. Some rubber actually hardens in cold weather making them more slippery.
- Use handrails when available.
- Keep hands out of your pockets and free of coffee cups and bags. This is in case you slip you will have a method to break your fall.
- · Keep you eyes on the ground especially when crossing bumpy parking lots. Some degree of snow blindness takes over here as its difficult to judge the depth of holes.

Students and staff can contact maintenance at 7566 to report any trouble spots that need to be addressed. Hope this helps clear up some confusion!






Waking Eyes" finished their last


No Place Called Home – Saturday, November 6 @ 5:00pm (57 min)



Synchronized Swimming The Glory Days

Nobody cares about synchronized swimming anymore. Whatever happened to the glory days? Whatever happened to packing up your sequined swimming suit and trudging next door to Jimmy's house for a pick up game of musical water dance? Unfortunately, with the increasing popularity of other sports such as hockey, soccer and football, synchronized swimming has been forced to take a back seat.

Synchro wasn't always ostracized. Before it became a female dominated sport, synchronized swimming was well received by the male community. With men as the main participants, locker room chats weren't dominated by the talk of women, cars, and weight lifting as they are today. Instead, men were comfortable sharing stories of shiny hair pieces, performance make up and ballet poses. Synchronized swimming flourished, and soon had the largest following out of any activity in Canada.

With participation at an all time high, synchro became ruthless. Anybody who was anyone swam to music, and those who didn't were shunned from the community. John, a hockey player at the time of the Synchronized Swimming Revolution, relates his story: "I remember coming home after hockey practice to find all my school mates counting through their routine in the street in front of my house. They turned up the music and laughed at me, throwing bobby pins and nose plugs. One of them said he was going to


beadazzle my skates when I was asleep. I was terrified."


This mindset spread through all facets of the synchro world. Coaches were merciless, and nothing was spared to have the perfect routine. One ex-synchronized swimmer, who did not want to be named, comments: "Synchro was life. To be a synchronized swimmer, you had to be thick skinned. I remember the guys and I were practicing our technical components once, when my coach told me I would never be able to point my toes like a ballerina. Comments like those could cut deep."

Though coaches could be hurtful. the worst was from the parents of synchronized swimmers. Every couple wanted their child to be a star and some would stop at nothing to ensure their swimmer would receive a gold ribbon. At competitions, these 'Synchro Parents' would yell obscenities at the judges, demanding re-swims and recounts. Alex, a former swimmer, recalls an incident involving his mother: "She told the judge he better get some glasses, because my sailboat combination was ten times better than the guy who swam before me. After that, she chanted 'Daryl' until she was escorted out of the pool. I wasn't allowed to swim for the rest of the year. That hurt."

With such high demands and pressure, many athletes buckled under the stress. Swimmers began to play other sports in the evenings to release frustrations from synchro. As more swimmers became players in these little known sports, synchronized swimming became less and less popular. Parents who caught their children playing such games were intrigued and interested in the simplicity of 'scoring', 'skating', and 'running'. Soon, playing




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
