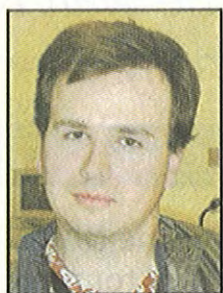

Classrooms are on the move!

Well, there's no more calling in sick to school. If you can't come to NAIT, NAIT will come to you! Last week, NAIT unveiled their brand new NAIT in Motion mobile classroom units. These two retrofitted tractor-trailers are designed to head out to remote locations to teach people who can't get to NAIT. The classrooms are expandable and can provide one thousand sq. ft. of teaching space. NAIT has already had requests from as far away as the Northwest Territories for the mobile classrooms to come to town. They're designed to work for just about every class NAIT teaches: from business to trades; with a focus on electrical, welding and pipe trades. The total project cost is \$1.4 million, but not to worry, students. The money came completely from private sector partnerships.

For many NAIT students, it is the first time you get to cast a ballot. The NAIT Nugget asked the top three mayoralty candidates what they thought about young adults exercising their right to vote. Robert Noce believes it is essential young people vote. Noce says, "City council has the greatest impact on your day to day life than any other level of government, and it's easy to be informed, most candidates have websites which can be accessed 24 hours a day, in today's world it doesn't take a lot of time."

Stephen Mandel agrees, "By getting involved in the electoral process, our youth can help set the course for this city by electing a mayor with a vision for the future of Edmonton. Edmonton needs a mayor who understands that building future opportunity is possible when a community brings people together and works to promote its best assets. Our youth need to find out who has the best plan for securing future opportunity and quality of life in our community. They should examine all the options and choose the best candidate for the Edmonton of their future."

Bill Smith says, "On a day-to-day basis, members of council make decisions on matters which have a direct influence on the future social, fiscal and economic development of our city. The group most affected by these decisions will be our young people, whose lives and future will be directly impacted. Therefore, it is important that as young voters, you not only take time to know where candidates stand on issues, but that you then take that information to the voting station to assist you in making an informed voting choice on Election Day."

NAIT launches new website

Mark October 20 on your calendar and get set to put a new NAIT face forward with the launch of a revised website.

"It was time to revamp our presence on the web," says NAIT Web Master Robin Morgan. "In many cases, the website is the first place people look to find out what's new at NAIT. Because of this, it is vital that the information they seek is easy to find and the details they want are current and accurate. That first impression can make all the difference in the world for some people."

Pointing to the coming changes, Robin says that, while the first thing people will notice is the new look and feel of the site, changes run deep under the surface.

"It definitely has a new look but, more importantly, it is the way the site functions and the way information is organized that has

undergone the most dramatic change. The new site will not draw attention to internal subdivisions. People are funneled in through the homepage and are directed to the information they are looking for through the use of role-based navigation. This means that once the visitor identifies who they are – student, staff, alumni etc. – they are directed into a section that contains information specific to their needs."

The new site, Robin explains, is built using templates that keep a consistent look and feel throughout and make it possible for all the program specific information to retain the same formatting. Once in, visitors will be able to navigate with ease without getting lost.

"Really, it's all about making the site customer focused and inviting. Once the user has identified their role, the website will help direct them to the specific information they are looking for."

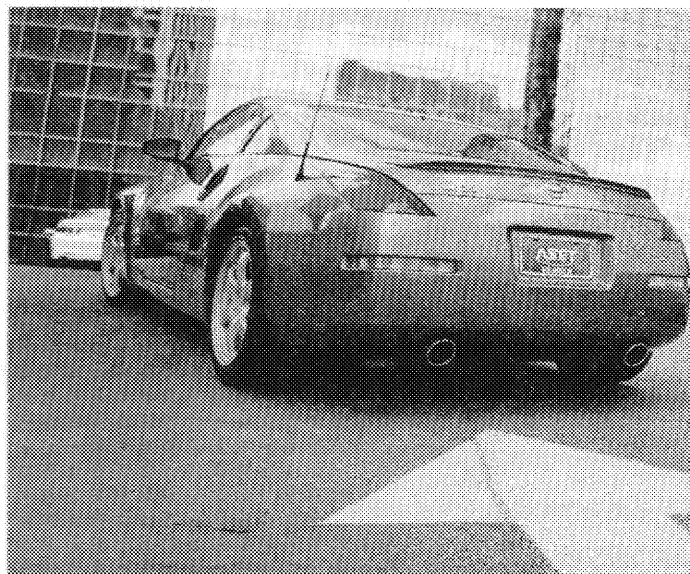

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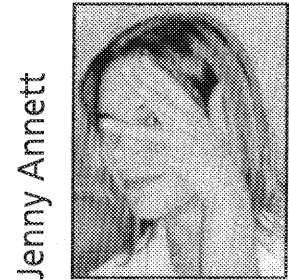

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Grocery Stores or State of the Art Torture Chambers?



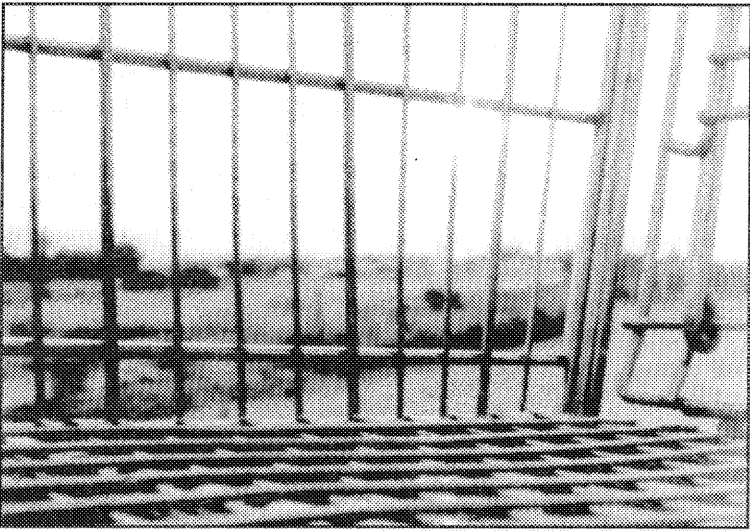

Bonny: It is not necessary to change your whole look to pick up a guy. Many guys go for a girl with a strong personality.

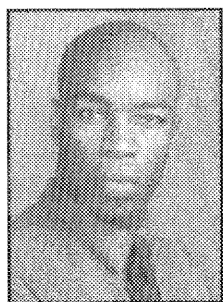

It is finally here!!! Our Speak Out! forms are ready for you. These are forms that you will find on poster boards and in the NAITSA office (E131). If you have a problem, idea, or solution for things around NAIT; jot it down on a Speak Out! form. I will be using your feedback to try and make changes around NAIT.

Don't just sit there!! SPEAK OUT!! If you have a suggestion or concern surrounding your experience here at NAIT, let us know and we'll be there to help! The process is simple!

Step 1: Student takes Speak Out! form from poster board or NAITSA office (E131).

Step 2: Student fills out Speak Out! form.

Step 3: Student drops off completed Speak Out! form in designated box in NAITSA office (E131).

Step 4: VP Student Affairs collects all completed Speak Out! forms from designated box daily.

Step 5: VP Student Affairs reviews each completed Speak Out!

form and decides which department in NAITSA or NAIT will be able to resolve or respond to the feedback.

Step 6: VP Student Affairs contacts the appropriate contact and informs them of the feedback and a photocopy of the Speak Out! form is sent to the appropriate department.

Step 7: The original completed Speak Out! form is dated and filed.

Step 8: A response is expected from the appropriate department within two weeks (please note that a solution does not need to take place in two weeks; however, a written response must be submitted with possible future solutions and timelines).

Step 9: The response will be attached to the original Speak Out! form and the back of the Speak Out! form must be filled out.

Step 10: The feedback and/or solution may or may not be submitted to the Nugget. This depends on whether or not the student permits us to place it in the Nugget.

Step 11: All paperwork is filed appropriately by date.

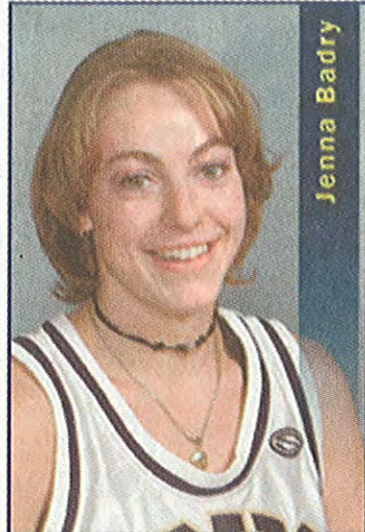

the 14th and the 19th, there's going to be remarkable new indie flick playing.

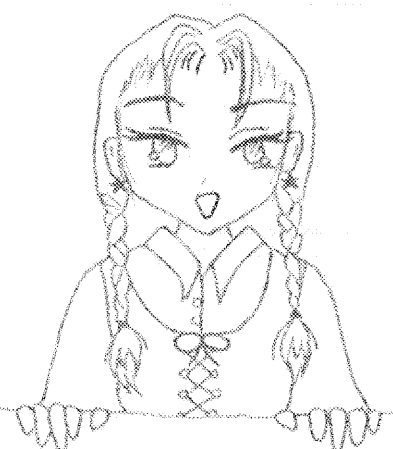

The beginning of a brand new season at the Citadel theatre kicked off late last month with the gala production *Cat On A Hot Tin Roof*. Bob Baker, Artistic Director, has brought Tennessee Williams' masterpiece to the downtown for the first time in Edmonton's history. But, who knew how disappointing it would be? Until October 17th, theatre-goers have been offered the opportunity to spend a weeknight dozing off in the Shoctor. Personally, I think it'd be much easier to just sleep at home.

Taking place in Mississippi around 50 years ago, the play opens with the Pollitts gathered at their family plantation to celebrate the 65th birthday of their beloved patriarch, Big Daddy. They have also met together to joyfully relish in the recent news that the illness that has been plaguing Big Daddy for so long has turned out to be nothing. At least, some of them are. Their two sons, Brick and Gooper, have really come to

break the news – Big Daddy has cancer. With the knowledge of Big Daddy's impending demise, Brick and his wife Maggie are left to fight with Gooper, his wife Mae, and their five children as to who will inherit the plantation. Gooper and his family plan to use the pressures of law and copious amount of paper work. Although Brick is his father's favorite of the sons, he is without an heir and has plunged into sorrowful alcoholism since the passing of his best friend. Maggie is ridiculed constantly by Mae at her lack of children and deeply wished her husband to inherit the plantation. But, there are other more personal problems to be sorted through as well.

If there was a bet to be won on how impossibly boring you could make a classic, Bob Baker takes home the prize. I consider it a very dark day in contemporary theatre when I'm falling asleep during a Tennessee Williams' Pulitzer Prize winner. And really, he's the

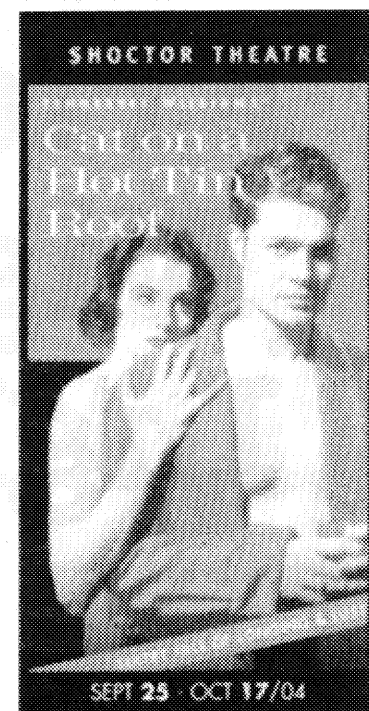
only one to blame. The casting was superb, and the acting was the best the direction could entail. After six seasons of being Artistic Director at the Citadel, I don't believe it's outlandish to expect Mr. Baker to have the hang of it by now. In fact, the entire concept behind artistic direction is to *improve* a play through manipulation. C'mon, Bob. There's no need to take a step in the opposite direction.

From the very beginning, you can tell it's originally a good play – the writing is brilliant. There are tons of great lines, it just all depends on the delivery. I was very impressed by Jan Alexandra Smith's (Maggie the Cat) quality of acting, but I still felt that she

was also being suppressed by the Bob Baker indoctrination.

Although I'm not totally sure who to point a finger at, but I have to admit I found the set also quite disappointing. Considering the hard working folks at the Citadel and how commendable past sets have been, this one lacked a particular quality – interest. At first glance, one might find it visually appealing and highly unusual. Atleast, until you find out it never changes. After 3 hours and 15 minutes of staring at that same, strange bedroom, you're plenty sick of it. Perhaps it isn't a bother to those with a greater attention span than my own.

If you really are dying to see this



one, don't let me stop you. Who knows, your opinion may be very different. Other local writers have been impressed with the production, but then again, none of them are under the age of thirty. There are plenty of great plays still left this year, so I'd stick it out and save some money.
