





Apprentice was star of show

The Young Professionals and Entrepreneurs Conference (YPEC) was held at the Winspear Centre on Nov. 23 and any who were lucky enough to attend know it was well worth their time to be there. If you weren't there, then here is a brief overview of the night.

The speakers for the night in order were, Jim Dinning, Luan Mitchell-Halter, Kelly Hrudey and Patrick R. Laforge, Victor Dodig and lastly, the keynote, Bill Rancic. In all sincerity the first few presentations were at best OK, with some entertaining stories/quotes that I'll tell you about, But for the most part, Bill Rancic stole the show with a very entertaining and informative talk. Peter Mackay was absent due to the likelihood of an upcoming election being announced.

The first speaker was premier wannabe Jim Dinning, who talked about the growing economy in Alberta, which was forgettable. He talked about how we need to

become a positive influence and leader for Canada, and he talked about giving back to the communities. There was nothing revolutionary or moving in his speech just the same old rhetoric that we always hear these days.

Second off was leading businesswomen Luan Mitchell-Halter who has been featured in many magazines. She talked about succeeding in business. Her main point was that change happens and you have to learn to adapt to succeed. The other main topic she addressed was not to judge a book by its cover, never pre-judge people because no one these days is predictable by appearances alone. Her best quote of the night was, "shift happens," when she was talking about change and how you have to go with the flow and learn from the past.

The third presentation of the night was Kelly Hrudey from Hockey Night in Canada questioning Patrick R. Laforge, the president of the Edmonton Oilers about his career as a businessman. It was mildly entertaining with some advice about how to overcome your own faults like he did with his lack of communication skills.

The better conversation was with Kelly Hrudey (played in the NHL from 1983-98) who I interviewed before the whole event

began. He likes the new NHL rules that have really opened up the game and the shootouts that thrill players and fans alike. His picks for teams to make it all the way to the Stanley Cup are Philadelphia, Ottawa or Carolina. Kelly hates mullets and thinks, "anyone with a mullet belongs in jail." He's most afraid of getting Don Cherry mad at him.

The fourth speaker was Victor Dodig who completely bored me. Sure investment is important, but I came to learn about leadership and how he got to his stature in life. He had a PowerPoint presentation that was quick and easy to forget. The only decent point he made was already said before about learning from the past.

The last and best presentation was the keynote speaker Bill Rancic, the winner of the first episode of the hit TV show The Apprentice. When I interviewed him before the conference, he was a very nice and funny guy, yet he also had many stories. One such story was that the car he won off the show was immediately sold for charity. Another charitable contribution he has made was a book that he and his sister co-wrote for children about lemonade stands.


His presentation was impressive in that he always reminded people that your roots are really important for your future and not

to forget them. He pointed out that your goals in life can't be the only thing you look at. You need to have mini goals that you set along the way to your final goal. Like a marathon, you must not just think about the full distance, otherwise you will lose focus and overwhelm yourself. He urged people to make a series of small goals until you reach the final finish.

The best quote he had was, "Not trying is the biggest failure of the all." It was in reference to the fact that you must conquer your fears in order to succeed. The three best traits that helped him succeed are

working hard, being able to adapt to situations and his ability to take risks. The never-quit spirit also aids you to reach the top, he said. People must heed the advice of others but also make their own decisions. In the end, realize that if you believe in yourself, you can make it, Rancic said.

All in all, this conference was full of advice but the best came from Rancic. Trump you really know how to pick the best of the best. I would recommend YPEC to anyone for next year, especially if the keynote speaker is Rancic or someone of that calibre.

We shouldn't forget the Montreal Massacre

On Dec. 6, 1989, 14 young women went to school as they did every

That night, none of them made it home.

All 14 were young and bright. They were students in a post secondary institution much like NAIT.

On this particular day, the 14 showed up for class. Then, one of their classmates arrived and walked up to the front of the classroom. He pulled out a gun. He separated the males from the females and he asked the males to leave.

He said, "I hate feminists," and he started shooting his female

He shot one of his victims, but she was still alive. So, he grabbed her and stabbed her repeatedly in the chest.

After many people died, somebody pulled the fire alarm. Onlookers said the killer seemed to realize it was only a matter of time until he was caught. He shot himself in the head.

It's a crime so violent, it's hard to imagine something like that happening in Canada. But it did.

Dec. 6 will forever be the anniversary of the Montreal Massacre, but now, that tragic day brings hope for some.

In memory to the women who were killed that day, Dec. 6 is now recognized as The National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women.

It's unfortunate that attention still needs to directed to this. We like to think things have progressed and violence towards women is no longer an issue. But the massacre didn't happen that long ago.

We like to think we are more civilized now, but are we really? Perhaps we are in the sense that Doctor Joe Blow, wife beater, washes his hands first before he back-hands his wife. Women are still physically, emotionally and sexually harmed by those they know.

People can be educated and attitudes can be changed, but we can't change nature.

There's no simple solution to violence, just as there isn't towards racism or the other injustices that we have as a society. But through education, public demonstrations and discussions, racism has become far less prevalent in North American society.

Let's hope for the same with regard to violence against women.



3.) What are the top three things on your Christmas wish list this year?




I hate down tempo crunk music. That is what I was expecting from this album, but I was shocked




to hear an easy listening, pop, R&B record. Unlike most urban albums the many guest artists does not clutter this album.

Tyler strikes a chord

The title of Brock Tyler's debut EP is A Canvas for Clarity. What is entirely clear after hearing this strong six song collection is how darn good Tyler is. Firmly entrenched in the acoustic/folk stylings of artists like Iron and Wine and Elliott Smith, this new Edmontonian is an extremely welcome addition to this city's burgeoning music scene.

Tyler moved to E-town in September from Winnipeg. Well, their loss is our gain.

And we have a prettier skyline.

"The city skyline is my favourite," said Tyler. "And I noticed the difference in bus etiquette too. People actually say thank you to the bus drivers when they leave. That was just foreign to me."

What may be a little foreign to Edmonton audiences is a local songwriter with chops this strong.

A Canvas for Clarity jumps out of the speakers and into your soul. Self-produced and all written by Brock himself in his parent's basement, this sounds like a big budget professional recording. The guitars shimmer like diamonds and Tyler accents the deceptively simple arrangements with tasteful touches of piano, organ and few kitchen sinks.

His voice resonates too. Indeed similar to Smith's, his vocals have a warm, familiar feel, like you've heard it for years. In this case, that's a good thing. After only one release, Tyler comes across as a seasoned artist. I can't wait to hear what he does next. If this is only the beginning, we may be in for a long, prolific career. But Tyler isn't sure how he feels about all this.

"I don't like the idea of people buying my music and thinking I have all the answers."

Brock Tyler is eminently humble. But the guy has a point. It doesn't take a brain surgeon to see that most audiences out there gobble up whatever they get shoved their way, picking up behaviours and trends without thinking about it. The bulk of modern music is empty and manufactured and thoughtful songwriters like Tyler tend to be labeled as poets, sages

and denim demi-gods.

"The tendency is to throw stuff out there, and people kind of just grab on to it," said Tyler. "People will take it as gospel. Is there any truth or validity to it? People worship the arts, even if they don't know it. People often wish they could 'sing like that,' or 'paint like that,' or whatever, without a second thought to what that art is conveying. It becomes a spiral of individualism - the artist makes self-seeking art and the audience adopts it for self-seeking purposes. In turn, it inspires new artists who don't care about the integrity of their content - rather, they'll write or sing or compose or paint about whatever will get them praise from those around them - i.e. whatever is fashionable in popular opinion - because the search for that is what is driving that artist's art in the first place. However, again, I do think that 'art' and 'the arts,' songwriting in this case, has real potential to be beautiful and wonderful, but so often it is all so easily and mercilessly abused."

The truth is that Tyler's music has a beating heart and a full brain (and a bit of soul) and it's damned refreshing. "I write about the things I work through," said Tyler. "Things meaningful to me and other people." Death, for example. "There was a succession of people I knew that died within a string of a month."

These kinds of things motivate his songwriting. Not a sexy girl or bad parents. "I write songs based around conversations I hear, people I see...I guess, in a word, my words are inspired by everything I experience through the senses: things I read, people I see, the beautiful and ugly world around me, how I feel, hearing about how you feel...all that finds its way into my songs."

Tyler is very much about words and thoughts. A glance at his website (brocktyler.com) makes that

immediately clear. Currently studyphilosophy, ing informs his he life and his music with literature and poetry and he has managed to do so without coming off as a pompous wiener like Conor Oberst or Tack White.

"I direct my efforts to the poetry, to the words," said Tyler. "Rather than try and give people answers I don't have, I want to give people the opportunity to participate in a greater dialogue."

And Brock Tyler believes there is a growing audience

for smart, literate music like his.

"People are reacting to a spectrum of contrived, unchallenging music. Indie music is getting a firm grip and I believe it just might salvage popular music," quipped Tyler.

I couldn't agree more. Get a grip on Brock Tyler and a couple of other rising Edmonton artists at New Music Showcase, Friday Dec. 9. Taking place at The Canopy (6005 Gateway Blvd. - the basement of CKER and SONIC 102.9), Tyler will be joined by Consider The Ravens and Amanda Gallant. Admission is only five beans. Don't be silly, spend five dollars and see who I believe is one of Canada's next bright lights. So

lf it ain't broken ...



Broken Social Scene Broken Social Scene (self-titled) Arts & Crafts

With their eagerly anticipated third album, Broken Social Scene, Montreal's music collective have done much to dispel that old "Too many cooks..." adage. In fact, in corralling well over a dozen diverse talents (Jason Collette, Leslie Feist and Metric's Emily Haines among them), they may well serve as a model of modern democracy.

A logical progression from their sophomore release, You Forgot It In People, Broken Social Scene still sticks to the same basic formula: a slow burning sea of cacophony from which springs frenetic, at times anthemic, pop music.

As motifs recur and recede, it's sometimes hard to decide whether to praise BSS for their thematic consistency or bemoan their dearth of fresh ideas. They certainly can't be faulted for their lack of panache. Ace producer David Newfeld captures the raw joie de vivre of a BSS live performance while maintaining a crisply defined sound. Defacto leaders



Kevin Drew and Brendan Canning should have prodded their cohorts to further fiddle with their sonic palette, as much here echoes their previous releases. You Forgot It In People, in particular, features a couple notable antecedents to a few of the tunes on Broken Social Scene. Both albums certainly have the same pacing.

Highlights include the breezy horn-driven live staple, "7/4 (shoreline)", the wistful "major label debut" (a superior version of which is featured on an accompanying bonus EP), and the stop/start catharsis of the climactic, "it's all gonna break."

In spite of these minor complaints, Broken Social Scene has once again struck gold and though it may be a bit more of the same, they can't be faulted for their fidelity to such a winning formula.

A 'space rock epic'


My Morning Jacket Z

After last years departure of two members, My Morning Jacket left some fans a little worried about what to expect from the bands fourth full-length. Any concerns have been quelled with the release of *Z*, a sprawling space rock epic in the best sense.

Album opener "Wordless Chorus," with its dreamy dub, immediately brings latter day Flaming Lips to mind, and the swirling paranoia of the following "It Beats For You" recalls Lips' cronies The Mercury Rev.

Two songs in and I was convinced I knew where the album was heading. Happily, this proved to be a misconception as the MMJ boys seem to be painting with a whole new palette. The mesmerizing "Gideon" actually sounds like U2's "One Tree Hill" slowed down with a spidery circular



guitar riff and features a soaring vocal from frontman Jim James sounding like Blind Melon's Shannon Hoon crying out from the other side after sipping on some scalding honey-lemon tea.

Veteran produce John Leckie's (Pink Floyd, Stone Roses) work has led some to call MMJ America's answer to Radiohead, with whom he produced The Bends. Apples and oranges, I say. Where Radiohead's last couple endeavors led me to believe they've all but quit listening to music, MMJ seem to have gained everything by just being music fans with good ears.

In the space of one song, MMJ

can mash up several genres and come up with something listenable and more incredibly, concise. With previous releases, A&R whores might have complained "I can't hear a single," but no such claim can be made here. Pop needn't be a dirty word and the point is well made on Z. The band have finally written the full out reggae ditty they've long promised with "Off The Record" and the infectious "Anytime" seems to cruise along like New Order meets Springsteen with a dash of Steely Dan.

Longtime fans still get a lot of the extending jamming they expect and the usual influences naturally crop up: Country rock still looms large as does the spectre of the Beach Boys and the delicate "Knot Comes Loose" wouldn't sound at all out of place on a Neil Young album.

It seems odd to say, but in channeling the sounds of so many seemingly disparate artists, My Morning Jacket have finally found a sound they can proudly call their own.








Clockwise from right: Jared Bonnett gives the MacEwan hitters a hard time.







SUNSHINE - There may not be any evidence in the city, but the mountains have a ton of snow with some of the best and earliest conditions in years. At 5,000 feet higher than Edmonton, Sunshine Village and many other resorts are stocked with snow. Downhill Riders tour guide Trevor Suer and I made it up to the Shine last Friday and took in a stellar first day. "I remember coming here a couple years back at the top of

December and compared to this year, only half the terrain was open and it's three weeks earlier," said Suer over lunch at Mad Trapper's, a popular on-mountain pub. We were chowing down with Moynihan, Mike the Shine's new sales and marketing guru. "I have been a resident of the Bow Valley for 11 years and these are the best early conditions I have ever seen."

Delirium Dive

Moynihan was looking to prove it and when he heard Suer and I had never been in Delirium Dive, one of Sunshine's three diamond freeride terrain

zones, he jumped from the table with the words "I'll be right back." Suer and I got real stoked when he returned with avy kits for the both of us. "No guarantees" he said, "but if ski patrol gives us the nod, we'll get you into the Dive this afternoon."

Anyone heading into any of Sunshine's free ride terrain should be warned - an avalanche transceiver and shovel are compulsory. Ripping up the dive or not, throw a helmet into the mix as well. We met up with the crew from biglines.com and were all given the green light for a special preview in the Dive. Being able to hit this zone on Nov. 11 and experience the amount of snow we ripped was unreal. Filled with


killer lines and incredible powder our day left us all repeatedly yelling, "this is the best first day,

Rowan Harper has been with Sunshine for 17 years and is the chief snow safety supervisor. "We were saying yesterday, if the snow level was this good Dec. 10 we'd be happy, but for Nov. 10 it's excellent." Get to Biglines.com to check out the gnarly video marked, "A Day to Remember," the crew shot from our day and see for yourself

what's waiting for you. With the continued storms that have brought big dumps to the slopes, it's not just Ullr the snow god who needs some praise. A hard working staff of 18 makes up Sunshine's trail crew, working all the hours God gave them to ensure that the most amount of terrain gets open as early as possible. And they are doing an exceptional job. Sunshine already has over 60 per cent of its terrain open with eight out of 12 lifts running, including

Continental Divide.

Matt Jasper has been with the crew for six years. "To be honest we haven't opened the Divide this early in a long time," he said. "This is the best year I've seen for snow." We're lucky; in the mountains this side of the Rockies and within the interior, the snow received is light, dry and fluffy, perfect for epic powder sessions. The only draw back is that wind will pick it up and move it anywhere it wants. Sunshine's trail crew has mastered the art of snow farming, hoisting up over 25 kilometres of snow fencing across the vast terrain.





Tragic story offers lessons

Imagine having your entire life in front of you and then having it all slip away into darkness before you could even enjoy it. It may be difficult to imagine? For the family of Brad Boechler, it is a harsh reality that they will have to remember for the rest of their lives.

Brad Boechler was once a prominent student on the NAIT campus. He was a student like all of us, who was just trying to make a better life for himself and his beloved girlfriend, Candice Bersani.

Boechler was a friend of all his Chemical Engineering Technology classmates and demonstrated his never ending will and desire to succeed. Brad successfully completed the program in April, 2004.


Before beginning his new career with Degussa Chemicals in Gibbons, the young man spent a welldeserved month long vacation in Europe.

"My life is perfect right now. I've got the job of my dreams and I've had the vacation of my dreams," the proud, goal-oriented individual emailed his mother from Europe near the end of his

After working only a week with Degussa, Boechler was hesitantly persuaded into joining a group of friends for a houseboat weekend on the Shuswap Lake in beautiful British Columbia.

After finishing his exhausting week of work, the young operator drove all night out to the lake, hopped a ride on a speedboat and joined his friends on the houseboat near Marble Point on July 10, 2004.

Many conflicting stories exist; however, after a barbeque, Boechler somehow ended up in the water. Friends say that he went below the five foot thermocline, was shocked by the cold

water, swallowed an amount of water and drowned after struggling to reach the surface.

"Fatigue was definitely an issue. Working all day and then driving all night couldn't have been easy on him," said Sharon Boechler. Brad was also in really great shape and his muscular body density also worked against him.

Brad did have the athletic ability and was quite a good swimmer. "Brad loved the water," said Bersani. "If he could've lived in the water, he would've. He was a great swimmer."

Boechler was not wearing a lifejacket. "I get that (the crew) didn't even know where (the lifejackets) were," said Boechler's mother.


"He really was at the peak of his life," said Brad's mother, Sharon Boechler. "He just got this great job. He had the vacation that he'd always wanted and the bank phoned to approve him mortgage just two days after he died."

Sharon Boechler was extremely pro-active after Brad's death and decided to remember her son by setting up a living memory water well in Ethiopia. The family had previously sponsored a child in the area through the Christian Children's Fund and by spreading alerting young people of the dangers of house-boating.

In addition, the family has donated \$10,000 to a perpetual scholarship fund for students entering the first year of the Chemical Engineering Technology program.

Many vacationers are unprepared for the dangers that a house-boating trip entails. The captains of the boat are required to be 18, but do not even have to possess a valid driver's license. Captains receive an orientation on how to run the boat; however, water safety is left as the responsibility of the captain and the vaca-

exists between the top five feet and bottom five feet of a body of water such as the Shuswap lake, which is 600 feet deep in some

Currently there is no emergency medical service on the lake. Boaters are warned to travel at their own risk. In the event of an emergency, there is no response team available. Therefore, it is suggested that a vacation crew include at least two people who are trained in CPR and first aid.

Wristbands supporting the water well cause are currently available at the PGC office at the Engineering Annex. Students are encouraged to support this cause and remember the fallen NAIT alumni member

Nest bar brings questions

Questions regarding The Nest's operations were raised last Tuesday at NAITSA's annual general meeting.

With the questions came concerns with the future of The Nest's continuing operations after a budget shortfall of \$70,000 during the 2004-2005 financial year.

During the meeting, Vice President of Finance and Administration Elaine Devine explained several causes for the shortfall.

"The contract for the manager at that time had expired and we went through a period of time where we had no properly trained management," said Devine. "We also lost a month's worth of business due to the delays in renovations during August and September. This is an important time for us in establishing return customers."

NAITSA did anticipate the budget shortfall and adjusted expenses to \$20,000 less than originally budgeted, to compensate for the setbacks.


Devine also notes other factors for the shortfall being a slight loss of business to The Nest's main competitors - Boston Pizza and Blind Duck, after NAIT went smoke free.

Also to be considered is that The Nest operates under a break-even basis, not one on which it expects to make a profit.

Regardless of the shortfall last year, NAITSA is confident that The Nest's operations will run smoothly in the years to come and that it will continue to be an important establishment on NAIT's campus.

Resident Evil 4 PE Review

Sound: The sound is wow! It's amazing, unbelievably real and intense for this game. I can't stress enough how well the team at Capcom did with the ambient noise, gunfire and creature sounds. You actually feel like the wood planks are creaking beneath your feet as you walk by hearing the possessed people of the town hollering chants and random foreign language sayings.

Graphics: The graphics are not as good on the PS2 as the GC version, but these shortcomings are easy to over look since the game still looks flawless. So what if there aren't many different models for the villagers - the ones they have are like actors in a movie. The cut scenes flow well with the story and are used mainly in game graphics. This is a very dark game so don't expect bright sunshine backlit scenery.

Gameplay: This game has no flaws in this category either. Outstanding controls that are easy to learn and even though the camera has its problems, you learn to live with them.

You learn quickly that conservation of ammo and health items is a must like many of the previous Resident Evil titles, but unlike before, you also have a side character (the president's daughter) following you around and you are responsible for her. This extra dynamic creates new situations and the need for puzzle solving not previously possible in the series. Don't worry though, aside from the new puzzles and item-buying system, there is still plenty of gunslinging action.

Lasting Appeal: Decent length and plenty of replay ability make this a game that is sure to stand the test of time. The story will have you returning again and again to play and be drawn into the game. No multiplayer, this is horror action genre that can be enjoyed by many, but only played by one at a time. Play this game in the dark and be ready to scream. It's full of twists in plot and scary scenes sure to have you dropping your controller. Oh and for anyone who really likes their games, pick up the Premium Edition; it comes with a limited edition foil card and a making-ofthe-game DVD all packaged in a snazzy metal case. It's a must buy for any resident evil fan.

This is a must buy for any PS2 owner who doesn't own the GC version of the game. The PS2 version offers more weapons and other optional story quests the GC version doesn't have. So if you are just picking it up, go for the PS2 version.
