

Well, if I happened to have some money, I would be very excited to buy something, but perhaps I could hold back on that one day.





I've called her about five times the last week and she won't call me back.


OK, she called me back once and said she's really busy and we can maybe get together next week depending on her part-time job schedule.



Reefer Madness: The Musical

Second only to Leni Riefenstahl's Triumph of the Will, the most notorious propaganda film ever produced would have to be 1936's Reefer Madness, a hilarious cautionary tale of "marijuana-scourge of youth." The sweet irony is that today, the film is essential stoner viewing.

A few years back, Kevin Murphy and Dan Studney, recognizing the inherent comedic potential, adapted Reefer Madness as a stage musical. Last year, Andy Fickman had the good sense to film it. So now we've got a film of a musical based on a film. Genius!

Alan Cumming assumes several roles herein, most notably the high school lecturer/narrator who guides us through the travails of teenage sweethearts Mary Lane and Jimmy Harper. Kristin Bell (TV's Veronica Mars) gamely tackles both the pre and post-pot Lane with verve and as Harper, Christian Campbell (brother to Neve, who cameos as a dancing waitress) bears an uncanny resemblance to his '36 counterpart.


Inevitably, they fall prey to Steven Weber's pusher Jack Stone and his moll Mae Coleman, as played by Saturday Night Live alum Ana Gasteyer. Where the original was pretty over the top, this garish everything and the kitchen sink production leaves no sacred cows untipped. There's an animated ode to the wonders of pot brownies and even Broadway/ soap star Robert Torti swings by as a hepcat Jesus replete with sexy showgirls.

Though not too pointed in its satire, Reefer Madness still reveals some sly digs at the ludicrous pot laws currently upheld by the American oppression machine. For example, the protagonist's high school is named for toker Enemy No. 1, original U.S. drug czar Harry Anslinger.

The many horrors of the demon weed are all illustrated: Amy Spanger, as sex bomb Sally, sells her baby for a fix and once the munchies run out, John Kassir's manic Ralphie settles for sweet human flesh.

In spite of Kassir's crazed performance, Gasteyer steals the show in the final act. Where she sort of faded into the background on SNL, here she's a powerhouse who literally throws herself into the role without a whiff of ego.

In an age where most musicals seem to regard melody as an afterthought, the tunes here are fairly enjoyable if not memorable and the zany choreography keeps any encroaching boredom at bay. Showtime's Reefer Madness: The Musical turns out to be a treat for all: however, as a musical about weed, I'd wager it totally has the gay stoner market cornered.



All of these "great shows" boldly portray screwing around, violence against women and teenagers having abortions as par for the course in this day and age. And maybe it is.





This leads me to wonder if this album could attain the status of Money Pt. 2 or if Jelleestone is headed for bankruptcy?







Left: Trevor Gaylor (#85) squeezes in a touchdown against the Toronto Argos earlier this season.












Annual bash is Canada's wildest weekend








early in the year as most rooms are already taken by mid-summer.

A new Rush in the Edmonton pro sports scene begins in January

A strange kind of sport lacrosse is. "What kind of sports is this?" Jesuit missionary Jean de Brebeuf must have thought when he saw the Huron Natives play it in the 1600s

The sport of lacrosse was actually born in the 1400s and got its name when Brebeuf compared the playing stick, the competitors used, to the crosier carried at religious ceremonies by a bishop. The sport was played by Natives, not just for recreation, but to settle disputes and train warriors for combat.

The game has evolved by leaps and bounds in the past 400 years.

Games were played by as few as 100 and as many as 1,000 men and lasted several days. Play began at sunup and ended at sundown each day. Goals, consisting of rocks or trees, were generally 500 yards to a half-mile apart, but could be several miles apart. There were no sidelines and players raced far and wide over the countryside.

In the early 1800s, European settlers in Montreal took up the game. When the Dominion of Canada was created a decade later, lacrosse was designated - and still remains - the national sport. Canadians introduced the game to the United States, England, Ireland and Scotland. Today, lacrosse is played at home and in international competition by England and Australia, as well as the United States and Canada.

Lacrosse is actually a hybrid of football, hockey and basketball.

It has been called by the National Lacrosse League "the fastest game on two feet and is a grueling test of stamina."

Today, lacrosse has taken on a new look as a professional indoor sport. The National Lacrosse League (NLL), played its inaugural game back in Jan. 1987 under the name Eagle Pro Box Lacrosse League. The league changed its name to the Major Indoor Lacrosse League (MILL) in 1988. The NLL took its current name after the 1997 season.

The NLL is an indoor lacrosse league that is a hybrid of box lacrosse and field lacrosse. Box lacrosse is popular in Canada because it is played indoors within the confines of an indoor soccer arena, with glass intact, while field lacrosse is the popular style in the United States.

Each team plays with five runners per side plus a goaltender. With the style and physical nature of indoor lacrosse, many fans have likened the sport to being "like hockey, only with a lot more scoring."

An average of 25 goals is scored per game. Basketball lends rules to the sport such as the 10 second violation where teams must bring the ball over the half-way line within ten seconds and the over and back rule is enforced as well. Teams also have a total of 30 seconds to shoot the ball on net.

A face-off occurs as the start of every 15 minute quarter. If the score is tied after four quarters, the teams play 15 minute sudden death overtime periods. Unlike the NHL, there are no points awarded for losing in overtime.

Like hockey, minor and major penalties are handed out during play for various infractions including delay of game, elbowing, holding, illegal crosschecking, slashing, tripping, high sticking, boarding, face masking, fighting and spearing.

The NLL brings its game to Edmonton with the inaugural season of the Edmonton Rush. The season starts in January and runs through April. Each of the 11 teams plays 16 games and all games are played on the weekend.

"To have been given this opportunity is a dream," states Director of Lacrosse Operations Ahmed Johma. "The game of lacrosse is great. I have been involved with the game in all aspects, player, coach and manager. I look forward to continuing the tradition of great sport teams in the City of Champions."

The NLL will change the landscape of professional sports in the City of Edmonton. The Edmonton Rush will rock Rexall Place on January 6 as they host the San Jose Stealth for their inaugural game. Fans can find weekly coverage of the Rush right here in the NAIT Nugget.





Four Downs

They're just poor sports

Oven the past century, many disturbing incidents have happened in the world of sports. This week, Four Downs takes a look back at four of the most disgraceful incidents in sports history.



Pacers-Pistons Brawl

Thumbs down to the Pacers and Pistons for their involvement in one of the ugliest spectacles of unsportsmanlike behavior in NBA history.

On Nov. 19, 2004, at the Detroit Pistons Palace of Auburn Hills, Michigan, Indiana Pacer Ron Artest and head coach Stephen Jackson charged into the stands and fought with fans in the final minute of a Pacers' 87-82 victory.

The ruckus began when Detroit's Ben Wallace went in for a layup and was fouled hard by Artest from behind. After the foul, Wallace wheeled around and pushed Artest in the face. The benches emptied and the brawl began.

As the players continued to brawl near center court and coaches tried to restore order, Artest sprawled out on his back on the scorer's table, looking relaxed.

Just when it appeared tempers had died down, Artest was struck by a cup and beverage thrown from the stands. He jumped up and charged into the stands, throwing punches as he climbed over seats.

Fans were punching back and Jackson and another teammate joined Artest in the melee.

Security personnel and ushers tried to break up the fighting. Former Pistons player Rick Mahorn, who was seated courtside as a Detroit radio analyst, tried to stop the brawl in the stands.

Later, a man in a Pistons jersey approached Artest on the court, shouting obscenities at him. Artest punched him in the face, knocking the man to the floor before leaving the court. Artest was pulled away and the fan charged back. Jermaine O'Neal stepped in and punched the man.

The game was stopped by officials with 45.9 seconds remaining after pushing and shoving headed into the stands once fans began throwing objects at the players near the scorers table.

After several minutes of fighting with spectators in the stands, a chair, beer, ice and popcorn were projected at the Pacers as they made their way to their dressing room.

"It's the ugliest thing I've seen as a coach or player," said Pistons coach Larry Brown, who was in the middle of the confrontation, trying to break it up.

"I felt like I was fighting for my life out there," Pacers coach Rick Carlisle said. "I'm sorry the game had to end this way."

Commissioner David Stern called the incident "shocking, repulsive and inexcusable."

As punishment, the NBA handed Wallace a 6-game suspension, O'Neal a 25-game suspension, Jackson a 30-game suspension and Artest a 73-game (remainder of season) suspension.

A year later, it's good to see that the league has been able to move on and most fans have put the incident in the back of their mind. Let's hope we never see another incident such as this.



Liverpool & Juventus Riot Thumbs down

to soccer fans who rioted during the European Cup Final in Brussels on May 29, 1985.

The two sets of supporters had spent the day drinking in the Belgian city and had arrived at the Heysel stadium waving flags and chanting.

But shortly before kick off the atmosphere turned violent and Liverpool supporters stampeded through a thin line of police towards the rival fans.

As the Juventus fans retreated, a wall collapsed under the pressure and fans were crushed and trampled to death in the panic.

Police at the scene were unable to contain the violence and riot police were called in to diffuse the situation.

As the full extent of the tragedy unfolded, the Red Cross moved in to treat the injured in tents set up at the scene. A priest was also called to give the last rites.

There were 58,000 fans in the stadium. 35 died and over 350 were injured.

Despite protests from both team managers, the game went ahead with Juventus winning 1-0 thanks to a second half penalty.

Trouble had been reported since the two sets of fans arrived in the city. There were reports of stabbings and police numbers were dramatically increased to separate the fans.

Colombia was a strong soccer club who was expected to advance far into the 1994 World Cup. They met USA in a

first round game June 22 at the Rose Bowl in California. While tied at one goal apiece, Colombian defender Andres Escobar inadvertently scored an own-goal to put USA ahead. The shock result sent the USA into the second round and eliminated Colombia from the tournament.

All the blame was put on to Escobar but even if he hadn't been there USA would have still scored.

Scottish football pundit Alan Hansen was forced to apologize after stating in his post-match analysis that "the player ought to be shot for making a mistake like that," a (perhaps worryingly) common expression in Britain.

The world was rocked when, ten days later, back home in Medellin, the 27-year-old defender was shot 12 times in the chest, executionstyle, by the bodyguard of angry fan Humberto Muñoz Castro.

"Thanks for the goal!" he snarled and exclaimed "goal" for each of the 12 rounds that shot Escobar dead.

Castro is currently serving a 42 year prison sentence but it hasn't been totally dismissed the possibility that the slaying was ordered by Mafiosi who may have lost millions in bets as a result of Escobar's error.

The death of one of Colombia's most promising players certainly had an impact on the team and has forever put a black mark on the sport of soccer.




Ty Cobb attacks fan with no arms


On May 15, 1912, Detroit Tigers' centerfielder Ty Cobb attacked Claude Lueker, a New York Highlander fan who had been verbally sparring with Cobb.

In the third inning a particularly taunting remark, especially to a man who grew up in a segregated South, sent the outfielder on a rampage. He charged into the stands and viciously beat Lueker, who could not defend himself - he had lost a hand in an industrial accident. American League President Ban Johnson, who was at the game, suspended Cobb on the spot.

The other Tiger players, in support of Cobb, refused to play without him. Having anticipated this move, Detroit manager Hugh Jennings had semi-pro players ready to fill in. After losing 24-2 to the Philadelphia Athletics, the



team was called together by Ban Johnson. He warned them if they did not play their next game (against Washington), they would never play baseball again. The players returned to the field after being urged by Cobb not to strike. These four events have darkened the sports world forever. No one ever wants to see this happen again. It puts professional sports into context. People are passionate about the game but under no circumstances should results be more important than human safety. The world must learn from these dark hours and ensure that safety at sporting events is prioritized.




Officials attempt to control basketball brawl.




"It has gone really good," said Kimbel. "The teams are awesome. Most everybody is playing fair







Lady Ooks find success on the ice

The Lady Ooks hockey club has continuously improved over the past three seasons.

This season is no different, under the tutelage of the well-respected head coach Keith Garner, as well as an outstanding support staff, the Lady Ooks are well on their way toward their best season in the history of the program.

Through eight games, the team has been firing on all cylinders, with a 5-2-1 record. The Lady Ooks are third in the ACAC, just one game behind SAIT and Mount Royal.

The Lady Ooks have a number of outstanding offensive players. Among them, Miranda Miller may be the most explosive. Mac-Millan has scored seven goals through eight games and added six helpers. Ashley Sochatsky has also been impressive with six goals and six assists.

Goaltending has also been outstanding for the club. Kristen Sugiyama and Erin Wilde have combined for a 2.63 GAA and five wins through eight games.

The play of Danielle Pruss, Kori McEwan and Stephanie Newnham has been a terrific surprise. All three have stepped up and have played with grit and intensity when needed. "They go out there, they get their short shifts and they work hard," said Garner. "They've done what we've asked them and played the system well."

The one glaring Achilles heel of the team is the discipline of its players. The Lady Ooks are the most penalized team in the league so far this season, averaging over 11 penalty minutes per game.

Perhaps the most obvious cause of penalties stems from the team's lack of true defensive players. Because of this, Garner has had the daunting task of converting some forwards to defense.

Kerry McDonald is one of the players who have been heavily relied upon to lead the defense. McDonald has had to learn positioning and defensive strategy on the fly and as a result, has tallied a 41 penalty minutes. "She plays tough and she plays rough and occasionally she gets her shoulder down and an elbow up," said Garner.

The top quality goaltending has allowed the defense to learn their positions and has bailed the team out of numerous threatening situations.

The Lady Ooks tied league-leading SAIT 2-2 on Nov. 18 and were defeated 6-3 on Nov. 19 at home. The loss was the team's second of the season. Both losses have come at home.

"Perhaps, we could have been better prepared," said Garner. "They jumped on us early. We tried to battle back. We would get a goal and I thought we were building momentum but it just wasn't meant to be.

"Throughout the season, we've been able to put the puck in the net pretty much whenever we've wanted. Tonight was a bit of a setback, but you need to have those games early in the year and feel the sting of defeat."

What can fans expect to see from the club in the near future? "We play the University of Calgary next week," said Garner, "and you'd hate to be the ones to give them their first victory. We're going to come out and just practice harder.

"Hopefully we can go out and get a couple of wins next week, to boost our confidence a little bit. I thought we panicked (against SAIT) a little bit and slapping around at the puck. We need to regain our composure."




