Big brother could be coming to a campus near you. According to John Younk, manager of the University of Alberta's One card, the university is collecting personal information on students through its student ID card, the One card.

"It's true that the information is being collected," said Younk. "It is for accounting. We keep it for that reason only."

The University of Alberta's One card keeps track of student's spending habits on campus and the card is used to enter some buildings.

This has advocacy groups like Privacy Rights Clearinghouse up in arms.

Beth Givens, director of pri-

vacy rights with Privacy Rights Clearinghouse, says that collected information may be abused.

"The problem is, when you're collecting data about students based on their usage with this multi-purpose card, you're going to end up with a profile about that individual and that profile could be used for other things," said Givens. "I do not favour student ID cards that are used for a multitude of purposes. Although, I realize that's the name of the game these days."

Another concern regarding the One card is that the information collected may be sold to companies. According to Givens, that fear is a valid one.

"Probably the data is collected here and there, but what happens

when the data is put together? There's a real possibility that the data could be used to come up with a profile about the individual and perhaps that profile could be sold," said Givens.

"Students are a very desired demographic category, because these days, university students do have some discretionary income. They buy music for example, they buy clothing," said Givens. "And so companies would love to have data about the way that students are using their One card, to pay for things. I think you have good reason to be concerned."

Younk disagrees and says this fear isn't justified. "We're the academic side of the campus, not the business side."

Still, many students unhappy with the direction the University of Alberta is taking with their student ID card.

"It's perpetuating the cash cow syndrome. They treat students like cash cows," said University of Alberta student Kreisha Oro.

"I feel like I'm being coerced into letting them make money off me," said Oro. "There's no informed consent."

Another concern with multipurpose cards like the One card is that it will be abused by the police and judicial groups.


"Let's say there is a crime on campus at a certain location. The school is going to want to analyze the building entrance data to see who entered or exited the building at certain times. A lot of students are going to be probably put on a suspect list," said Givens. "You're guilty until proven innocent if you happen to be on that suspect list."

Despite concerns, Younk says personal information gathering is the current trend. He says that other schools, like NAIT, are heading in the same direction.

Although NAIT currently does not have a multi-purpose student card, some administrative assistants with NAIT said there were discussions earlier this year.


At present, NAIT's student card is used to identify the name, program and student number of a student. The card is also used to sign out library books.

Regardless of how people feel, information gathering seems to be the way of the future - even at post-secondary institutions.



Do it right - the first time

It's your money — and you're the boss of it

With over 5,000 NAIT students set to graduate next June, there are thousands who will be in the market to buy their first homes soon. Unfortunately, most of those new homebuyers know very little about buying a home. Mike Holmes, star of the hit television show Holmes on Homes, visited Edmonton Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 at the Edmonton Fall Home Show where he shared his expertise on home buying.

The lack of patience of homebuyers is the root cause of the majority of problems encountered by new homeowners. "The lack of patience is a big mistake. Do not be in a hurry to pick a home. Check out the builder/developer as well as people who have already bought a home from them. Home buyers should be looking for the best built homes possible," said Holmes.

Homebuyers are always so excited when they see a floor plan and a map of where the home is being built. Holmes reminds us that people must slow down before making any quick decisions. "How long have the builders been in business? What do they specialize in? Do they care about the new technology? These are all things you've got to know."

New homebuyers should go and see homes that have already been built. "Ask those owners about the quality of their house," said Holmes. Ask those owners 1001 questions. Ask them how the foundation is. Did it leak? Did the home cost more to build that the original quote? Was the builder courteous? Were they clean? Were they on time? Did they come back to fix anything? Did they address the problems?

"If contractors are unwilling to answer your questions, then don't spend your money. They obviously don't want your business, so move on to someone who does. If they can't convince you that they are the best and that they use the best materials, then why are you talking to them? You're just asking for trouble."

What is the golden rule of home "Protect buying or building? the home from the outside in," said the experienced contractor. "Everybody builds their home from the inside out and they forget that they need a watertight home so they don't get mold and they don't get floods.

The technology exists today to build water resistant, fire resistant and mold resistant homes," said the 20-year professional. "But nobody's doing it.

"New home buyers must check out the new products. Do not build a minimal code requirement home. Nobody is out there telling people how much better their homes are than minimum code requirement, so people are just under the assumption that minimum code requirement homes are the best that you can get.

"Ask lots of questions. What type of foundation will the home have? What type of foundation coating will they use? Are there at least two membranes and not the minimum code requirement of liquid foundation coating? What kind of windows will they use? What kind of siding?"

Top 3 Areas of the home to build well:

Basement

"Minimum code requirement for concrete in homes is 15 MPa. We can do 100 MPa. Why aren't they doing it? Because they think that \$1,000 more is too much. Give me a break. I'll spend that money the right way the first time so that I'm not spending \$80,000 down the road trying to repair the damaged concrete. There are so many different types of concrete and home owners must choose the right one."

Windows and Insulation

The Canadian Home Builders' Association and the federal government are pushing the R-2000 homes. But are they the best?

"Everybody thinks that building the best home costs too much money," said Holmes. "That's what drives me insane. Everybody thinks that R-2000 homes are the best, but I don't agree with that. It consists of foam that

has trapped all your air, which requires an HRV and people don't know enough about heat recovery ventilators.

"Everyone is under the assumption that brick is the best built home. That is not true. The best-built homes are insulated concrete floors (ICF's) - all the way up. ICF's provide automatic R-40 insulation value. Unfortunately, most contractors only use ICF's to the floor joists and then go brickside to the top. Bring it right up to the roof. It's the best you can do because then you don't need vapor barrier."

Air circulation is also an extremely import quality to the home. "You want to make sure you've got an incredible breathing circulation in the home," said Holmes. "You want to make sure that there are the finest fans in the bathrooms. What that does is that it actually draws air from downstairs, brings it upstairs and draws it out. It removes contaminants from the air as well as removing stale air. You want your home to breathe, so opening windows is a good thing - not closing them. Why does a 100-year-old home look better than a home built today? Because it's not trapping air. And that's why I say that the R-2000 homes suck."

Plumbing

"I prefer IPEX polyethylene," said Holmes. "For years we've been using copper piping, but now there's this new product on the market. Why aren't people using it? Most don't know about it. Look at your copper pipes. See how crappy they look. It doesn't look much better on the inside. Would you want to drink from that? Neither do I, but everyone does because they don't realize it, because they can't see it."

"If more people put more money in the right place, they'll find that they'll save more money in the long run. Too many people are looking for the affordable home and don't realize that for a little bit of extra money today, they'll save thousands and thousands of dollars in the long run. Put your money in the right spots - the foundation, the roof, the structure and the bathroom and kitchen," advises Holmes.

"So many people today build new homes because they don't want to have to deal with contractors. But they're walking into the same problems. The homes are badly built and they're not going to last. If people genuinely want a good home, built the home from the outside in and then think about the decor.

"It's all about education and 99 per cent of the population aren't educated home owners in any which way or form. Make sure you pick the right time, pick the right location and pick the right builder. Then, you'll more than likely be successful in home build-

With so many new products on the market and so many different homebuilders to choose from, why not choose the best? After all, it's your money and you are the boss.

It's unfortunate that the apprentice students never had the opportunity to be heard, but should non-apprentice students care?


If you look at the large picture, apprentices aren't the only ones who were hurt by this. This is something that will affect all NAIT students.

Cars are a pain in the gas

All I do every day is burn money, but not because I'm rich or anything. Just gas is something required for my car.

Gas is 125 per cent more expensive these days than five years ago and yet gas prices are still rising higher. I can personally remember paying about \$15 to \$20 for a full tank of gas in my 1987 Jetta Gli, at a rate of approximately \$0.45 per litre, or less maybe. Today, I can barely fill a little more then half a tank for about \$30 due to gasoline costing upwards of \$1.10 per litre.

It's sad when were happy to pay a dollar per litre for gas these days thinking it's cutting a break at the pumps.

Diesel is just a bit cheaper, but even that has risen over the years. Only propane, I noticed, remains relatively constant.

Recently, I began thinking of alternate fuels I could possibly try. Such as one of those hybrid vehicles, but I came to the conclusion they're far too expensive for me right now compared to a similar gas car.

Even worse are those fuel cell cars, which are almost double the

cost of a normal car and hard to get a hold of, let alone the fuel to fill their hydrogen tanks, not sure if the oxygen ones need filling as well. Any other average commuter knows these pains while filling their gas tank; alternative fuels are possible, just not feasible at the moment.

A Honda Civic Hybrid costs about \$28,500 for a base model, a Toyota Prius Hybrid is about \$26,000 and a Ford Escape Hybrid will cost you the most at about \$35,925. All of these quotes were taking from local dealerships for pretty much the most basic models, which all cost about \$5,000 more then the regular model counterparts.

Just a note to all the gear heads out there, the Civic isn't a true hybrid since it still works mainly off a combustion engine only using the electric motor to boost performance and increase existing performance.

The one diesel engine out there for about the same price and gas economical value is made by VW is the Jetta, costing about \$27,245. It isn't quite as good on mileage but has better performance then the hybrids listed above.

In the end, all of us must get from point A to B and don't like public transits time consumption or are out of their route locations. For us, gas is just a way to burn our money till a better form of affordable (reliable too) transportation arises.

Corpse Bride

The second film from Tim Burton in stop motion animation, (the first was The Nightmare Before Christmas) Corpse Bride continues a lengthy streak of films for Burton that dance with brilliance.

It has been many years since Tim Burton has made a truly good film. His last great movie was 1994s Ed Wood, starring Johnny Depp. Depp is heard here as Victor Van Dort, a young man who inadvertently proposes to a corpse in a gothic forest, practicing his wedding vows. This leads him on an underworld adventure as he tries to sort out a ghostly love triangle.

This movie suffers from just one problem: there is not much of an antagonist. Victor may have a real predicament on his hands, but he has no real enemy. Death and love may be his stumbling blocks, but other than that he simply traipses about the netherworld hoping for an out.

As usual, though, Burton manages some beautiful visuals. The animation is crisp and smooth and all of the voice performances are fantastic. The songs, though, leave much to be desired. A musical in the same vein as NBC, there is nothing in this film to equal that movie's brilliant soundtrack.

Burton got it right nearly 20 years ago when he made Beetle Juice. Using some of the elements found here in Corpse Bride, it remains his best film with a gothic edge. None of his efforts in this genre have been disasters, but it would make for a perfect film if he had a script that was as good as his film's look.



Prairie wind carries familiar tune

Neil Young Prairie Wind Reprise Records



With Prairie Wind, Neil Young returns to the same back porch sing along vibe familiar to fans of Comes a Time, Harvest, and Harvest Moon. Even 2000's Silver and Gold mined similar terrain. The main difference here is context. In the last year, Young has lost his first wife Carrie Snodgress, former Buffalo Springfield band mate Bruce Palmer, and his father, Canadian journalist/commentator, Scott Young. Neil himself suffered a potentially fatal brain aneurysm in the midst of recording Prairie Wind.

Album opener "The Painter"

finds Young acknowledging the passage of time and ready for more: "It's a long road behind me/ It's a long road ahead ". The title track refers to "Tryin' to remember what my Daddy said/Before too much time took away his head ". There's a recurring theme of reflection-returning



from whence one has come, going back to the well. This is the voice of a man who's looking to get some stuff off his chest. In "Falling Off the Face of the Earth", he sings, "It's such a precious thing/ The times we share together/ I must apologize for all the troubled times." A simple sentiment, yes, but with just the perfect economy of words and delivered in that delicate reedy tone that speaks volumes. All this reflection and introspection can still give way to some cutting commentary. One lyric references Sept. 11, Chris Rock, and Willie Nelson without sounding the least bit contrived.

Young has never been afraid to cannibalize his own melodies, and Prairie Wind proves to be no exception. "Old Guitar" waltzes by with a shuffle eerily reminiscent of "Harvest Moon", while the lovely "Only a Dream" brings to mind the lush string arrangements of frequent collaborator, the late Jack Nitchze. "No Wonder" seems to echo at least two other Young melodies while borrowing a bit from Brian Wilson's "Surf's Up". Old friends such as Ben Keith on steel guitar and the ubiquitous Emmylou Harris add to the air of familiarity. Those hoping for another creative resurgence akin to that of Young's late '80's / early 90's output won't find it here; no matter - it might be the same old song, but it's a sweet one.

Viewers of the Hurricane Katrina benefit will recognize the hymn-like album closer, "When God Made Me". That this song wasn't written specifically for the event is incredible. "Did he give me the gift of love/ To say who I could choose?". This question and nine more are posed. By albums end, Neil hasn't found the answers - and that's just fine, so long as he keeps asking the right questions.

Cronenberg creeps us out again

A History of Violence Directed by David Cronenberg

David Cronenberg is one of Canada's biggest film exports. Directing such classics as Scanners, The Fly, Dead Ringers and Naked Lunch, A History of Violence is his latest opus and it continues his streak of bleak human dramas.

AHOV deals with a family man who has a hidden past riddled with violence. Viggo Mortensen (Lord of the Rings) is Tom Stall, a small businessman in a little town, who becomes a national news story when he guns down two serial killers who are trying to rob his restaurant.

A couple of old friends from his past show up and rattle his cage. Asking him to return to Philadelphia to settle a few scores, Stall refuses. He insists they have the wrong man. As it turns out, however, he is a man with an extremely violent past who hid very well.

All of this, however, is news to his family. What follows is a brutally violent, sexually charged character study that is hard to look away from.

Do any of these themes seem familiar? They should. They're old hat for creepy Cronenberg, who has a penchant for mixing sex and violence in his films. Sometimes that blend is potent. Flicks like Louis Malle's Damage and Henry: Portrait of a Serial Killer, mix those touchy subjects without becoming exploitative.

Sadly, the sexuality in this movie seems tacked on. Gratuitous and unable to move the plot forward, it detracts from an otherwise engrossing story.

That said, AHOV is still compelling. A return to form after the dud Spider, it is Cronenberg's best film since M. Butterfly. Just be warned that there are some very disturbing scenes of violence. But, hey, the movie is called A History of Violence.

(Hollywood agent to Miss Piggy: I'd like to handle you. Miss Piggy: I am not seeking representation. Agent: Hey, I just wanna handle ya.). Kermit himself proves quite the amorous amphibian. Not even sweet Sandy Duncan could escape his advances.

Highlights include a visit from Bert and Ernie, who mustn't have been properly informed how to get to Sesame Street, and the brilliant musical number "Lydia the Tattooed Lady", of whom Kermit sings, "She has eyes that folks adore so/and a torso, even more so.".

Though a long overdue treat for fans, this season one set suffers two major shortcomings. Episodes aren't in their original broadcast order, defeating some running gags. As well, it seems Disney couldn't secure the DVD rights to some songs as a few musical numbers have been noticeably excised.

Pantera. They also dedicated a Nirvana cover to Kurt Cobain and Alice in Chains' Layne Staley.

They played *Doesn't Remind Me, Out of Exile,* and *Be Yourself* early on and after Cornell impressed the crowd with his knowledge that we were the heartland of hockey, Cornell really settled in, even playing a song off their yet to be produced third album. Soundgarden's Spoonman and Rage's Bulls on Parade made appearances, and the crowd let Cornell know that they wanted to sing *Like a Stone*.

The 40 minute encore began with Cornell doing an acoustic set of *Black Hole Sun* and *I am the Highway* and it ended with a rockin' *Killing in the Name* and *Cochise*. The crowd was sent home pumped up because they knew all the songs and were treated to two opening acts and a headliner with three amazing playlists.




I Am and G-Unit's Olivia this album is a typical urban album with many tracks "featuring" other artists.





A new era of sports entertainment is dawning. The brutal yet shocking and awe inspiring sport of mixed martial arts has stormed into town and has taken Edmonton and the rest of North America by storm.

John "The Natural" Alessio defeated Savant Young in the main event of King of the Cage (KOTC) - Shock & Awe that rocked the Northlands Agricom on Oct. 1. The fight was among 10 others that featured a handful of top caliber American fighters as well as a number of home-grown athletes who were attempting to break into the outlandish sport.

"Mixed martial arts has really gone crazy over the past few years," said Keith Crawford, promoter of King of the Cage in Edmonton. "We have new partners in TSN and all of our fights will be shown on the station, starting with the one held in Calgary on Sept. 24. TSN believes that this sport will surpass the popularity of professional wrestling in the next two years. We are absolutely excited about that."

The highly controversial sport has grown in popularity in North America ever since the first Ultimate Fighting Championship in Nov. 1993.

There has been several small market events held in Canada over the past few years, but this one is different. KOTC is the second highest caliber of mixed martial arts, right below the UFC and for the first time in their eight-year history, they have finally brought their showcase to the City of Champi-

ons.

"King of the Cage puts on a good quality show every time," said Jimmy Westfall, who sports a respectable 64-18-4 record. "Mixed martial arts is always an exciting show. It's nothing like boxing. It's not one-dimensional like boxing. The great thing about mixed martial arts is that you can see a guy get elbowed, kneed and kicked in the head, or taken to the ground and beat in the head. It's a lot more exciting than boxing. It's a lot more exciting than football or any other sport there is.

"Our sport has grown tremen-

dously and it has gotten to the point where it is on cable television and we're getting a lot more exposure. People are starting to get more educated about our sport.

"Our fans see that these athletes aren't just two guys off the street who are beating each other's brains in like tough men. This is a real sport with real athletes

and the more people know about our sport, the bigger it's going to become."

Most athletes in mixed martial arts are trained in various disciplines such as Jiu-Jitsu, karate, kickboxing and wrestling before ever considering a sport as intense as this.

KOTC athletes must be proficient in both striking and grappling types of martial arts in order to be successful. "It's just like any other sport," said Westfall. "It takes a lot of time and determination."

"This sport takes at least a solid year or two in order to really understand and do well," said Alessio. "If you've got a lot of anger and like to fight, then this

Josh Kyrejto was among over a dozen Canadians who fought at Shock & Awe. "As Canadians, we've got a lot to live up to," remarked Kyrejto.

There is a huge advantage to being an American fighter, which is the reason why so many Canadians move down to the U.S. to train. Undefeated world champion John Alessio, originally from Duncan, B.C., moved down to Los Angeles, California to train. "There are better training opportunities," explained Alessio. "There are more opportunities to fight down there. Moving down there gave me the opportunity to be the world champion that I am today. A lot of Canadian fighters are actually better than the Americans. Canada has a lot of great fights that like to throw down. If they were ever given the training opportunities that the Americans have, they'd be kicking some ass."

With such an influx of exposure to the sport, KOTC is going to quickly explode in Canada. "This was a huge event for King of the Cage," said Alessio. "Any time you can get a crowd of over 4,000 fans out to a sport that's in its early stage, it does a lot (for its popularity). I know that this sport is going to get huge in the next couple of years.

Die-hard fans can see the next Alberta show in Calgary on Dec. 3. The next KOTC pay per view will be held in Reno, Nevada on Nov. 11. SHOT 18 of the week



Danya's a real keeper

Goalkeeper for lady Ooks brings hope to the team

"Don't take anything too seriously," said Lady Ooks returning soccer goalkeeper Danya Paleniuk. "Life is too short to get down on yourself over little things. Take your failures as learning experiences and keep your head up."

Paleniuk has stayed true to her philosophy even after the Lady Ooks had one of their worst seasons. Last season, NAIT finished a shortened season with a dismal 2-4-1 record.

This season is much different for Paleniuk, as she is now the starting keeper on the 3-3 squad. Paleniuk is the league's fourth best keeper with a shut-out and a respectable 2.00 goals against

The 18-year-old keeper started her soccer career eight years ago in community soccer. After a couple of seasons, Paleniuk moved up to the club level with Juventus and Southwest United where she started at midfield and forward.

Paleniuk always pushed herself by continuing to play in the age class above her. "I always played an age group up with the older girls for more of a challenge," said the star athlete.

So how did the young athlete move from scoring goals to keeping them out of the net? "One day I showed up for a game and our goalie had broken her arm," said Paleniuk. "So she couldn't play. Our back-up had a concussion so she was unable to play. So, we basically played rock paper scissors to see who would go in net. They've never let me out of the net since."

Paleniuk was selected for the Alberta Soccer Association winter training program and was the Team North goalie for the U16 provincial team trials. Also, while 16, the keeper began playing for the Northwest United ladies premier team, where she was a member of provincial indoor championship. That same year, Palemiuk enrolled in the HPG Academy - a high performance goaltending academy.

At age 17, the second year marketing student played in the San Diego Surf Cup with Southwest United in the U19 division. At the tournament, she was noticed by college scouts and received a scholarship offer from Missouri Baptist University in St.Louis. She turned down the offer after deciding to stay in Edmonton. She then enrolled at NAIT.

"My experience with the Ooks has assisted my student career because it has ignited a competitiveness that I carry over into my studies," said Paleniuk. "On the field, I make mini-goals to keep myself motivated. For example, wanting to make more saves than the Concordia goalie, or to have a better goal point average than the MacEwan goalie. I use this mentality in my schoolwork and group projects as well. Nothing is wrong with a little competitive

spirit! I think that's why I strive to be a part of the world of sales. The desire to outshine my opponent appeals to me!

"Athletics have taught me to challenge myself and to have faith in others. There is no 'I' in team and I think being able to participate in competitive soccer has given me a chance to really understand the concept of teamwork. This will help me in the business world as well.

"Never in my life have I ever played on a team that has clicked so quickly. I love my teammates to death. Everyone plays together so well and we all push each other to be the best that we can be! I love it. We are all the best of friends on and off the field and each and every girl brings something important to the team. I think the reason why we are so successful is because we know how to have fun."

"Danya has really worked hard this season to play consistently," said Lady Ooks coach Sue Melnyk. "She brings a great attitude to all practices and games. Her team has confidence in her and she has certainly earned their respect. She is easy to coach in the sense that she wants to do well and takes all the input she can get. She is a great player and has a great attitude with regards to her soccer and her life in general."

Paleniuk sometimes wonders what her life would have been like if she had gone down to St. Louis for a year. After playing for the Ooks, she is happy that she decided to stay in Edmonton. "If I would have gone, I wouldn't have met so many amazing people and I would've never played for the Ooks."

Before her time with the Ooks is up, Paleniuk would like to reach her full potential as a goalkeeper by continuing to improve her skills in goal. "I also want to do my best to take the Lady Ooks back to number one where we belong," said the young athlete.

The one thing that she urges young players to avoid is negativity of others. "A word of advice," said Paleniuk. "Don't ever let people bring you down. I learned that the hard way."


I would also like to take the time to thank everyone from last year for their vote and support. I wont let you all down!



Crunch time for Ooks eye ACAC Ooks soccer volleyball crown

The ACAC soccer season is about to heat up for the two NAIT teams. Both clubs are in a position to make this season's play-offs and both face perennial powerhouse Concordia and MacEwan in their next two games.

Coming off an 8-0 victory over the Keyano Huskies on Oct. 2, the Ooks find themselves tied with Concordia for first place in the North division.

The win was huge for the team as it now sets them up for a probable play-off spot. "This game was huge," said head coach Graham Wood. "It's three points. I said to the guys in the dressing room, I don't care how many goals we score in this one (against the Huskies), so long as we win it. The three points now keeps us up on top.

"We've changed the formation a bit and strengthened the defense and midfield," said Wood. "The system that we're playing now suits this group of players versus the system we had earlier in the season. The huge 12-0 and 5-0 results that we had against Grande Prairie are indications of just what this team can do.

"Next week's games are huge for us. They give us the opportunity to seal up first place in the North. (Concordia and MacEwan) are the two teams that are going to be in it at the end as well. (The play-off race) appears to be between the three of us. So, those games are massive.

"We're more that likely going to start the Concordia with the same system and same starters that we had (against the Huskies). I'm just going to ask them to go out and play and enjoy the game."

The difference for the Ooks could just be their teamwork. "When we're passing the ball, there's no one in the league better than us," said Wood.

Goaltending will be key for success against both Concordia and MacEwan. NAIT keeper Mike St. Armand is second in the league with a 0.50 goals against average

must win both their next two games to have the opportunity to compete for a play-off spot.

"These next two games are do or die for us," said Lady Ooks keeper Danya Paleniuk. "We have to pull out all the stops. Along with a pool of veterans, this year's team boasts some fresh blood looking to make an impact. The most immediate of which should be first year business student Chris Brouwer at libero. Brouwer, who spent the summer with the Canadian youth volleyball program, is expected to be an integral part of the Ooks title run this year and is adapting quickly to his new environment.

"I am really glad to play with all these third years because they've taught me so much (about playing at this level) compared to high school," said Brouwer. "And when everyone plays good it gets you fired up too." Despite walking away with a forth place finish, NAIT looked strong this past weekend at the NAIT-TKUC preseason tournament. After two wins in the round robin, the Ooks lost out in three straight sets in an ugly semifinal match to MacEwan (25-19, 25-21, 25-23) in which neither team played very well. The Ooks responded to their defeat with a strong effort in a tight match that they lost to BC team, the College of the Rockies, in five sets (25-23, 25-23, 20-25, 19-25, 15-10).

With three weeks until the start of the regular season, Coach Wourms is pleased with the way his team is coming together. Jared Bonnet, Ooks co-captain last year, says the team is bonding quickly after a series of road trips that saw the Ooks playing various powerhouse CIS university teams.

"We went to Saskatchewan for a road trip, which helped everyone bond." Bonnet also added that he enjoys playing with a group of guys who have been together for two or three seasons now. "We trust each other a lot more, playing the second and third year with some of these guys. We all pushed each other to come back and I mean you wanna play with your buddies."

Despite being a playoff team for many years, Coach Wourms is hoping that his player's dedication to the volleyball program at NAIT will help to propel the team to the next level. "These (returning players) just decided, this is a thing where we see where we are, so let's go back and change the program." Adding that a championship is on the minds of all these players. "All these guys are coming back saying we see it and we want to go get it."
