# student executives and one lucky Grade 5 student, Erica Van Dorp, got a chance to shine the skates of Raffi Torres and Jarret Stoll, two players of The Edmonton Oilers.

This wasn't just a routine skate shine. NAIT students executives teamed up with The Edmonton Oilers to help bring awareness to the NAIT Students' Association Shinerama campaign, a Canadawide post-secondary fundraiser for the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Erica, 10, lives with Cystic Fibrosis and her smile gives students inspiration to raise \$20,000 during the campaign. Erica's mother, Caroline found out her daughter had CF when she was only a few days old due to a blockage in her intestine. Today, Erica inhales three different kinds of medication (which takes about 2hours a day), takes about 25 pills each days and does physio therapy three times a day (which takes about an hour a day). This is her routine when she is "healthy."

When she is ill, the number of physio's can increase up to 6 / day. She has bloodwork done at least once/year and has x-rays twice a year (unless she is sick - then x-rays can happen every couple of months). She is tough on the outside, but I think inside, she's pretty scared. Her mother says she does everything she is asked to do without complaint or arguing. "She is a true treasure," said Van Dorp. "...and has definitely taught me the value of life."

Erica is a huge Oilers fan. She was more than thrilled to be given the day off school to meet the players and boost the profile of Shinerama and Cystic Fibrosis with the help of The Edmonton

# **Fast Facts**

- Cystic Fibrosis is the most common, fatal, inherited disease affecting Canadian children and young adults.
- One in every 25 Canadians is a carrier of the gene responsible for CF.
- Due to groundbreaking Canadian research and treatment, children and adults with CF are now living longer and healthier lives, often into their 30s and beyond. When the Foundation first began over 40 years ago, children with CF rarely lived to age five. Today, the median age of survival of Canadians with CF is age 37.
- Shinerama is the largest post-secondary fundraiser in Canada.
- Shinerama involves students from approximately 60 university and college campuses.
- While Shinerama began in 1964 as a shoe-shining campaign during Orientation week, it has since grown to include a wide variety of shining and nonshining activities under the Shinerama banner.



# NAIT alumnus is a Scrabble whiz

Ken Middleton began playing Scrabble with his mother when he was only nine years old.

Most of us play the game at least once as we grow up. But, for Middleton, this legendary game became a lifelong interest. Thirtysix years later he has participated in two National Scrabble Association Tournaments, and is the director of Edmonton's NSA chapter.

Readers may not be aware just how vast the world of Scrabble is. Ken knows. Read on to find out more about this fascinating North American sub-culture.

Scrabble was invented in the 1940s by Alfred Mosher Butts. Out of work as an architect, he decided to invent a board game. Originally conceived during the depression as an escape from the long hours of desolation, Butts used elements from other popular games like checkers and chess, bingo and the legendary crossword puzzle to come up with his concept.

To find out how many letters of each he should use he studied the front page of the New York Times, noting letter frequency, which was a long, arduous task. Later, Butts met all the right people and got his game distributed on national level. Nearly 60 years later, the game has enthralled millions, selling over 100 million units since its inception. Ken Middleton owns a few of those units himself and is quite smitten with the game.

As a young man, Ken Middleton was walking the shorefront in Toronto. There, he noticed a place called Queen's Quay. The odd thing was that it was pronounced key. Having taken a keen interest in the game Scrabble, it led to him note that there are many words linked to one pronunciation. Curious, Ken became more involved in playing the game. Before long he was reading Scrabble dictionaries, word lists and various other resources for players.

Being able to unlock the English

language, Ken realized that there were a myriad of possible word combinations. Moving to Western Canada, he and his mother joined Scrabble clubs. Since that time, the network of players, clubs and the level of competition has exploded. Now, Ken is holding a tournament locally as Director of Northern Alberta's only Scrabble club.

Is Ken seeking to be a world champion? He wouldn't mind, but according to him, "most players at that level do nothing with their lives but play Scrabble." Ever humble, he's always seeking to raise his skill level. "I usually play every day, sometimes 6 or 7 times." He has even gotten his son Daniel in to the game.

Seventeen years old, Ken took him to this years championship and he ended up ranking higher than his Dad! "You really meet the cream of the crop at the championship," and he and his son went head-to-head with them, over 700 players who attended this years NSA Championship.

There are over 10,000 members of the NSA in the U.S. and


There are over 175 clubs, and every year there is a national championship held in the States. This year it was held in Reno, Nevada.

In 2004, it was held in New Orleans. It's even broadcast on ESPN! Split into several different skill divisions, players compete in 28 games over 4 days, each game one hour long. Eventually, a winner is crowned receiving 25,000 dollars and a prestigious

This year the winner was David Wiegand, a 31-year old mortgage underwiter from Portland, Oregon. He beat Panupol Sujjayakorn, a 20-year old economics student from Thailand, who was the international champion. According to Middleton, players tend to be mostly female with a lot of guys as well. Most players have mathematical minds. (Ken is

a carpenter.)

The key isn't always in the word play, however. A mathematical mind with logic and clarity can excel at this game. Success could be based on pure memorization of

the English language.

For instance, Sujjayakorn doesn't speak English, yet he was second in the American tournament. Scrabble is a game of chance, a game of probabilities and if one does in fact have a mind that is algebraically inclined they could go quite far. Middeton's son is in commerce, Wiegand and Sujjayakorn both deal in numbers and like Butts, Ken is trained in architecture.

But, it is also a game for lovers of language, and is indeed the most popular game of its kind. The top selling word game in history, it ranks with Monopoly and Trivial Pursuit as a worldwide record setter.

How does Ken fare in a game with mere mortals as we? It isn't

Don't expect to walk into a Scrabble club and clean up your first night. It has taken Middleton many years to reach this level. There is a mind boggling amount of information to absorb to play at a competitive level. There are thousands of words many people don't realize exist in the English language. To learn them and use them takes many hours of study and preparation.

For example, did you know ZARF is a word? It is, and it is the name of a beer can sleeve. Strategy comes in to play, as well. Think you have word no one will think is a real? Play it. A player can

challenge it, and will likely find themselves red in the face. Of course, there is thinking ahead. How can you combine words to play more than one in a turn? Can you get a BINGO (playing all seven tiles)? I could go on.

It's really a bottomless pit.

For Ken Middleton, though, this interest of his has grown because he has such a great time doing it. And he isn't alone. Hasbro, makers of the game in North America, move over one million units per year with little or no promotion.

Stefan Fatsis, a reporter for the Wall Street Journal, wrote a bestselling book called Word Freak. Film makers Eric Chaikin and Julian Petrillo directed a documentary that was nominated for

the Grand Jury Prize at Sundance Film Festival, called Word Wars. On an international level, Scrabble is popular as well. Distributed by Mattel overseas, thousands participate in similar clubs and tournaments, from London to Bangkok.

Do you think you might like to test your mettle with some local players? Middleton is holding his second Edmonton chapter tournament this October. While Ken loves to play with his family and friends, when it's time to compete. "All bets are off. It's war." Besides, he says, "It's more fun to win."

Don't be intimidated, though. Ken and his club welcome new players and are happy to nurture novices to tournament level. Ken says that the game is as "simple or complicated as the people playing it." Middleton will be sure to align with a player at your skill level or close to it.

Just be a good speller and have a sense of humor and you'll likely have fun and go far.

Ken's local chapter meets every Monday in Sherwood Park at the Strathcona County Library in Sherwood Park Mall at 6:30. This vear's tournament will be held at the Queen Mary Park Community Centre (10844-117st) on October 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>. 
# Pras and The Fugees are back for 2005

# Pras Michel 2005 (Win, Lose Or Draw)

Prakazrel (Pras) Michel formerly of the 1990s super rap group the Fugees is back with his second album after a five-year hiatus.

Pras has not released a full-



length album since 1998 and started working on his new album in late 2000. Having worked on this album on and off for almost 5 years, Pras did not disappoint his listeners.

Pras attended high school with Lauryn Hill and also grew up with cousin Wyclef Jean. Pras has always been the under-achiever of the trio. Some people labeled him as a sell-out when the success of "Ghetto Supastar" featuring rappers Mya and the late Ol' Dirty-Bastard reached number one in 1998. He thenrushed to release a disappointing solo project shortly thereafter.

Claiming he was young, inexperienced and money-hungry, the now matured Pras has poured his heart and soul into his latest work.

Upon listening to this under promoted, below the radar album, I was pleasantly surprised. This album was free from the "rapper of the moment" guest spots with the exception of one track with Sean Paul. Other guest spots on the album include Wyclef Jean, Spragga Benz and Akon.

Since Pras is the solo performer for twelve out of the fifteen tracks this album seems to be a refreshing sound for 2005. The "played out" hip hop sound that we are so often force fed on Much Music and most radio stations is only present in the first single, "Haven't Found", which is a cover of a U2 track. Having sampled this track, Pras was obviously influenced byU2's front man Bono, rapping in a very political and evangelical style.

My choice for the second single is the track, "Dancehall", featuring Spragga Benz and Sean Paul.

Believe it or not, but almost every track on this album could be released as a single, that's how good this album really is. I have listened to this album from front to back and have found no irritating sounds like such as, "What", "O.K.", "Yeah" or "50 Uh", "Bentley Uh." As much as the hip hop purists will disagree with me, this album ranks with Kanye West's "Late Registration."

Pras took his time to release this album and did it with heart and soul. Pras has returned with a refreshing sound for hip hop. Pras, of Haitian decent remains strong on the rest of the album with some very grassroots hip hop sounds. Tracks like, "Ghetto Politics" and "Light My Fire" are very "old school" sounding while in other tracks, and he almost mimics the unique sound of Canadian rapper "K-oS."

Be on the watch for a new Fugees album in 2006. Pras is one of those people who believes that good music will prevail, and it's true.




If the novelty of this frog has not already worn off in North America it soon will, but for now I will just sit back, curse Jamba! for making millions and watch this fad pass by.

# NYC Rapper sets Power Plant ablaze

Saul Williams **Power Plant** September 16 2005

"In these times, when we're back home, south of the border, when I start speaking about 'African People', everyone in the crowd, regardless of their color, start realizing that I'm talking about themas much as I'm talking about black people, because we're all African people. We all came from the same place." Saul Williams stated to the crowd between songs. This is not exactly the kind of thing you'd hear at a hip-hop show, but Saul Williams isn't your stereotypical ice-flossin', beefinducing rapper.

Five years ago, New York City's Saul Williams was the cutting edge of a burgeoning genre of hiphop entitled Conscious Hip-Hop. The conscious rapper didn't sling crack rocks in the projects, nor pop a cap in anyone's ass while on the way to rap stardom. They usually lived in the suburbs or in lower middle class surroundings. They had a healthy family unit to support them, and most likely, were educated in the classrooms instead of the streets.

By 2000, Williams had already released a number of singles and EPs and had starred in his own lauded indie film, Slam, about a street poet who gets sent to prison for trying to keep it real in a situation that turns deadly.

Williams follows a distinguished crew of rappers who all have gotten tired of calling women "bitches" and their fellow brothers "niggas". Rappers like De La Soul, Common, Blackalicious and

wavelength as Williams, yet in the mainstream, they've been called soft for not following the stereotypical mold that has been cast by the 50 cents of the world. Hence, it was not surprising to see a large mosaic of people at his show at the University of Alberta's Power

Williams, accompanied by his mohawked dj, CX Kidtronik, ignited the Power Plant with their incendiary machine-gun flow and punk-rock-hip-hop beats. Although, that may sound a little too Insane Clown Posse for the most, Williams and Kidtronik mixed in thoughtfuand philosophic spoken word with staccato jungle beats.

Williams held the captive audience in the palm of his hand with his peaceful prose which often turned into rage towards the country he calls home ("Not in our name"), his own dark complexion ("Black Stacey"), and like all true artists, he aimed his own self-righteous word cannon upon himself ("She")

Saul Williams is not someone you're going to hear on mainstream radio. There is no chance you'll hear him on Mariah Carey's next remix. The closest thing he came to mainstream was his major label release, Amethyst Rock Star. That was 5 years ago, and the world has changed.

"When those planes crashed into those buildings, 5 years ago" Williams talks about 9/11, "I was there staring at the symbolism of what was happening. This is the fall of Rome, and radio and MTV are just turning their heads away from the truth, so they can dance to party jams 'till the break of dawn." Let's hope when the sun rises, it's Williams preaching to us instead of someone like Pat Rob-

# Movie is a bad car crash

**CRASH (2005)** (Lions Gate Films) **Directed by Paul Haggis** Starring Don Cheadle, Matt Dillon, Sandra Bullock and

(Playing at Cinema City 12 and Movies 12, now on DVD)

Crash is one of the most critically acclaimed films of 2005. Released way back in mid-spring, it's still in theaters even though it's on DVD.

Causing a huge ruckus with film critics upon its release, it has gained the most pre-oscar buzz of any movie released so far this year. With that in mind, I felt it necessary to pass on my recommendation to all of you at our esteemed technical institute. And, boy howdy, I wish I could. Crash is an extremely weak

I'm quite sure many who have seen it will approach me in the hallway to ask me what I wa smoking when I watched it. Several people I know raved about it. My question to them is this: What is so bloody good about it?

Paul Haggis, who wrote last year's best film Million Dollar Baby, is at the controls for this film. Co-written with Bobby Moresco, a former TV writer, it feels like a movie-of-the-week. This isn't too surprising seeing as Haggis is a former writer for CTV's Due South. But after the skillfully made Million Dollar Baby and the overwhelming amount of praise this film has received I expected to be blown off my couch. Not so.

Haggis and Moresco drag up every clichéd caricature you've ever seen. Black thugs, Muslim hating white men, rich, spoiled and angry white women, creepy cops and seemy politicians populate this film. Each of their stories is too good to be true, and the links between each of them are at times preposterous.

Crash is an ensemble picture in the vain of Magnolia or Short


Many unrelated characters are connected by a series of events, and most times these events are quite dramatic, i.e. death, divorce, accidents, personal struggle. Films of this type usually attempt to use these tenuous connections to tell a morality tale that will educate and enthrall. In this case, the common thread to the various scenes and characters is the underlying racial tension that still exists in America.


I am willing to admit that racism is still a problem in our society. Crash seeks valiantly to convince us of this, and it's something more films should try to do. But, just because this film is the first in many years to try, it's no reason to heap all of this love on it. The situations are over the top, and at times, unintentionally funny. ( Check out the scene with Sandra Bullock when she sprains her ankle. It's so out of place.)

The music score is absolutely awful as well. Swelling inappropriately and adding another layer of unneeded melodrama, it adversely affected the film. The script, too, is hamfisted and comes off like an episode of ABC Afterschool Spe-

Am I being too hard on this movie? Perhaps. There are a few scenes that were quite stirring and powerful to watch. But, for every one of those was a scene that was too implausible for it to have any kind of resonance.

Haggis does manage some nice visuals and the cast acts their behinds off; but, I am afraid it is not enough to salvage what is easily the year's most overrated film.

"When we first started this, we envisioned one big U-Haul truck, but we had no idea it would escalate to way more than that," says MacKinnon.


"We have been overwhelmed with the amount of donations. It is a true reflection of the generosity that Edmonton has for the world."





# 'New Orleans will make it'

# Journalist who covered hurricane, confident city will rebound

Hurricane Katrina was both a tragic disaster and a storyteller's

That's the view of veteran broadcast journalist Scott Rensberger who covered the aftermath of the storm that hammered the

U.S. Gulf coast Aug. 25.
"I wouldn't tell the average viewer this, because they wouldn't comprehend this, but New Orleans was a storyteller's dream. Everybody was affected. Everybody had a story," said Rensberger who was in Edmonton for a seminar sponsored by the Canadian Association of Journalists. The seminar took place this past weekend.

'You slept wherever you could sleep," said Rensberger.
"The buildings are all there. It's just flooded."

Despite the devastation, Rensberger says he has faith that New Orleans will recover.

"At first, I went in thinking New Orleans might not make it," said Rensberger. "I left thinking New Orleans will make it."


As an example of the resolve of the people of New Orleans, Rensberger talked about a pub that remained open throughout the hurricane.

In addition to discussing Hurricane Katrina, Rensberger spoke about the state of broadcast jour-

"A lot of people hate that we have to be entertaining," said Rensberger. "If we're not entertaining, we're not going to be watched."

Rensberger also talked about the push by news agencies to sensationalize stories. Sensationalized news might be the rage, but Rensberger says there will always be a place in journalism for good

"Things change, but stories are still the building blocks."





# **Blue/Gold Classic Provides Season Preview**

The NAIT Ooks proved that they could skate with the best ACAC talent this year, as they shut-down the Briercrest Clippers 2-0 on Friday night and were all over the Concordia Thunder in a fight-filled 4-0 games Saturday night.

Fans at the Blue/Gold Classic, an annual pre-season meeting of top ACAC talent at the NAIT Arena, were impressed by their own Ooks' squad but were taken by surprise as the Augustana Vikings, showed that they could be in it with the Ooks at the end of the

The Vikings went unscathed in the Classic as they nipped the MacEwan Griffins 2-1 Thursday, crushed the Clippers 8-2 on Saturday, and tied the desperate Thunder 5-5 on Sunday. Star Viking defenseman, Joel Olszowka noted, "we've got a fantastic core of returning players to our squad, but we've been watching (the Ooks) and boy those guys look tough to beat!"

Along with the Ooks, the remaining four of the seven ACAC mens hockey teams, in action at the 32-year-old Classic this past weekend, included the Augustana

Vikings, the Briercrest College Clippers, the Concordia University College Thunder, and the MacEwan Griffins. SAIT and Mount Royal competed in the 17th Annual SAIT Eye-Opener Tournament.

The tournament, like many Ooks games throughout the season, was only

attended by a few hundred people, most of whom were friends and family of the teams. "It's really a bit disappointing," said NAIT Athletics Marketing Director Mike Stefan. "These are some great teams here, and students never show up. That's one of my biggest jobs this season, to figure out how to get the students interested in their athletic teams."

The big draw for teams to this tournament is the opportunity to see their teams in action and determine their final cuts. After the tournament was said and done, here is a preview of what fans can expect from these teams this

season.NAIT Ooks

Led by Head Coach Terry Ballard, the NAIT Ooks have 12 returning players. The returning players include Ben Stokes who scored 12 and assisted on 29 last year on his way to leading the team in scoring and capturing ACAC rookie of the year honors and being named to the 1st All-Conference team.

Also returning this year are 23-goal scorer Adam Ferrante, forward Keith Reade, and top defenseman Cole Fischer. Both Ferrante and Fischer were also named to last season's 1st All-Conference team. The team lost top

goaltender Tim Barlow; however, they have retained Marc Alain who started five games for the Ooks, last season, and posted a 3.10 goals against average and a 0.916 save percentage.

With so many returning stars, the Ooks will be difficult to beat this season and will be targeted by their opponents on a regular basis. Augustana Vikings

The Vikings have a new head coach this season who knows what it takes to win a championship. Dan Peacocke, captain of the 1983-84 Canada West Champion University of Alberta Golden Bears, will tutor his young players and could turn them into champions this season.

The Vikings have a squad that features 19 returning players. Led by Tim Haun, who posted a 3.94 GAA and a 0.898 Save %, the Vikings should have the toughest goaltending squad to beat as all three of their goaltenders have returned.

Both the team's top scorer, Akihito Kawamoto, and the team's top defenseman, Joel Olszowka, have returned. Kawamoto scored 13 and assisted on 9 last season.

**Briercrest College Clippers** 

The Clippers returns nine players from last season including their top two scorers, Jayson Zilkie and Dave Cunning, who combined for 20 goals and 40 points.

Under the direction of new coach, Barret Kropf, the Clippers brought in a solid recruiting class that includes five players with Junior A hockey experience. The team has set their sites on their first ever playoff appearance.

Returning goalie Shane Marsh will be expected to carry a large load for the team this season, but should have a strong supporting cast in front of him clearing the way, as each of their defensemen is over 6' tall and have solid resumes.

### Concordia University College Thunder

Head Coach Jim MacLean, who has coached the Thunder since its inaugural season in 1992, brings back a good group of starting players. Of their returning players are four of their top seven scorers from last season.

Ryan Carignan scored 11 and assisted on 21, while Shane Kochar scored 13 and assisted on 11.

David Spooner returns as their starting goaltender. Spooner

played in 22 of the team's 24 games last season, while posting a 4.39 GAA and a 0.891 Save %. To be competitive in the ACAC, the team's suspect defense will have to improve from last year's second-to-last.

# MacEwan Griffins

Led by Head Coach, and former Pittsburgh Penguin, Terry Ewasiuk, the Griffins have an extremely difficult season ahead of them. Only six members of the ACAC's second place team have returned this season, the most notable being Scott Taje who was their second highest scorer with 10 goals and 24 assists. The Griffins could have the lamp lit on them frequently this season as they have no returning defensemen or goaltenders.
