



Trades in motion pays off

Students get hands-on training and valuable trades

The first class enrolled in the trades in motion program graduated in late September at a ceremony held in Conklin. What made the Sept. 23 event even more special was the fact that all 10 students found full-time jobs.

The Metis Nation of Alberta, the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology, Keyano College, and Devon Canada Corporation worked on the program together to deliver trades training directly to the Hamlet of Conklin, a Metis community located approximately 140 kilometres south of Fort McMurray.

Trades in motion is a 24week program custom fit for 12 students, who take academic upgrading and receive hands-on training in electrical, millwright and welding trades. The program is split into three phases: classroom training, hands-on trades training, and a work term, all of which ready the students for long-term employment. The program was sponsored by the MNA.

Graduate Joyce Quintal was pleased she finished the

program, which she found very thorough and educational.

"I enjoyed the shop - learning everything about all the four trades. It gave me more experience and the instructors were really good."


MNA President Audrey Poitras said the program will have a profound impact on the graduates and the Metis community.

"The Métis Nation of Alberta is very proud to sponsor an innovative approach to empowering and educating our people in communities such as Conklin. Bringing the classroom to the students through our sponsorship of the Trades in Motion program creates possibilities for our Métis people that may not otherwise exist. Our graduating students will now be able to respond to the increasing demand for trained tradespeople and become involved in a manner that's meaningful and productive."

A unique feature of the program was NAIT's education unit - an 80,000-pound, 53-foot long mobile shop featuring retractable sides and a state-of-the-art lab. The unit, which had been set up adjacent to the Keyano College Conklin Learning Centre, was equipped with welders, drill presses and a host of power and hand-held tools.


In the near future, NAIT and Keyano College plan to collaborate on similar projects.

The next trades in motion program will be set up in Janvier, with the hopes of training 12-15 students for the workforce.



Jobs, jobs, jobs for NAIT grads

Giant Halliburton firm promises jobs for 16 people in April

NAIT students from the petroleum, chemical, and mechanical engineering technology as well as the electronics technician programs packed the Shaw Theatre Sept. 23 for a company presentation by Halliburton. Representatives from the 86year-old company delivered some fantastic news to NAIT students when they announced that Halliburton would be offering jobs to 16 NAIT students in April 2006.

Founded in 1919, Halliburton is one of the world's largest providers of products and services to the oil and gas industries. The company adds value through the entire lifecycle of oil and gas reservoirs and provides and integrates products and services, starting with exploration and development, moving through production, operations, maintenance, conversion and refining, to infrastructure and abandonment.

Halliburton employs more than 100,000 people in over 120 countries working in drilling and formation evaluation, fluid systems, production optimization and digital consulting solu-

As an example of how Halliburton has progressed, Alan Gosse, MWD technical trainer for Sperry Drilling in Nisku, explained, "Remember in that episode of The Simpsons when they slant drilled? The put the drill at an angle and slant drilled to get the oil from under the school. Halliburton can do that now without even pointing the drill at an angle."

So how do students fit into Halliburton's future? "We need people who can make million dollar decisions and be responsible for them," said Gosse. "It's a big responsibility and with Halliburton, you make big-time responsible decisions.

"We aren't offering just a job - we're offering students a career. We have people who work all over the world. There are opportunities everywhere. We have technology that everyone in the world wants to learn and we send our people over to teach them how to use it."

"We offer our employees many different career paths," said Brian Chaver, field service quality coordinator of product enhancement in Red Deer. "We leave the direction of career paths up to our employees. They have an unlimited amount of options based on their likes and interests.

"Some of the rewards for working for Halliburton include lots of training, exposure to different cultures and the ability to travel," explains Chayer.

"This job is very rewarding," said Shane Wunderlick, a field operations for Coiled Tubing in Grand Prairie. "For example, we get to go out to a dead well site and figure out how to bring it back to life. I've been working for Halliburton for a long time and I've seen a lot of different jobs. One thing that I can say about this job is that it's never boring. I've never seen the same job twice."

"Some of the things we have our new hires doing involve simple chemistry," explains Rick Lazowski, principle technical professional of Baroid in Calgary. "We pay our new hires between \$40,000 and \$70,000. We also set them up for success quite nicely. We provide them with a truck, computer equipment, geological equipment and pressure equipment. All that combines to about \$90,000 per employee."

Students don't need to worry about equality in the workplace either. Lazowski boasts, "Last year we hired two women. We were very pleased to have them on board. Unfortunately, one had to quit because she got married and decided to move on. The other is completing her master's in chemical engineering."

Halliburton keeps their employees happy. "Out of the 14 new hires last year," said Lazowski, "Four transferred to different companies, two quit because they didn't like driving, and one was terminated for drug abuse. The rest are all still with

"The industry standard is 30 per cent," said Francis Krsinic, recruitment team leader of human resources in Calgary. "Our turnover rate is between 10 per cent and 15 per cent."

The opportunity available with Halliburton shows the strength of the oil and gas industry and provides proof of the quality of education that NAIT programs are offering. Students make a difference with Shinerama

This past Saturday, NAIT students shined as they raised money for cystic fibrosis. The last day of the Shinerama campaign saw a large turnout.

So, what is Shinerama? "It started out as a small shoe-shining day," said Nicole Ouellet, communications director for the NAIT students' association (NAITSA),

The small-scale operation has blossomed into a province-wide fundraising campaign. NAIT Students' Association, along with a few other post-secondary institutions in Alberta participate in the event.

Shinerama activities include shoe shining and car washing. The goal is to raise money for cystic fibrosis research.

Ouellet says that the large turnout of volunteers this year is not surprising.

"The students want to give back to the community," said Ouellet.

Over the years, NAIT has raised over \$400,000 for cystic fibrosis research. This year, NAIT was looking to raise \$20,000.

Michael Buttrey, a student at the University of Alberta, spoke briefly to the volunteers about cystic fibrosis. He knows a lot about the disorder - he has it.

Every day, Buttrey goes through two hours of therapy. If he's sick, his daily therapy increases to four

Despite this, Buttrey still goes to school. He studies genetics. He has an active lifestyle and an active social life.

"Compared to some people, I'm very blessed," said Buttrey.

Part of the reason why Buttrey says he is blessed is because of the progress that has been made with cystic fibrosis research.

"Cystic fibrosis research has made huge strides over the years," said Buttrev.

The average lifespan for a person living with cystic fibrosis used to be five years old. Through research, the average lifespan has increased to 37 years old.

Although the life of a person living with cystic fibrosis can be extended, there is still no cure for the disorder.

"I see there being a very effective control. I don't know that there will be a cure in my lifetime," said Buttrey.

While most students came out to support a good cause, that wasn't their only motivation for volunteering.

"I came here to have fun and get wet," said Bert Roy, a NAIT

Even non-NAIT students came out to lend a hand for the cause.

"I came here to volunteer for fun and to raise money for cystic fibrosis," said Sarah Campbell. "I know about the disease. It's a terrible disease."

Buttery says that he feels Shinerama is important and he is glad to see the community involve-

"I think what Shinerama does is very important," said Buttrey.



Our two big up coming events are our new year's ski trip and our Halloween party.



I don't really know of any services that we could provide and don't.





Techno Rocks with Carl Cox

"I said it about two years ago, this was going to happen." Carl Cox waxes musically about the state of music in his San Diego hotel room. Cox is pulling out all the stops on this tour with Loco Dice, Evil Nine, and Mark Lewis. They have started their North American tour this week, and they will be hitting The Standard on October 2 to serve an electronic throwdown of epic proportions.

"People still like to rock. They love to rock out. To get the fever of rock, the sounds of it, you don't need to go to the festivals or concerts to get that energy into your body." Cox is a part of a long line of electronic producers and DJs who are embracing rock music just as much as rockers like The Killers, Franz Ferdinand, and LCD Soundsystem are embracing dance beats.

"They like the dance music and the girly vocals, but only to a certain point. Once you start with the edgier sounds, especially with the electronic movement, it's a good time to change gears a little bit. When electronic fans hear a rock sound, they embrace it." Cox is a pioneer in the electronic world. Being on the bleeding edge of a musical scene, Cox sees that the state of music is changing everyday.

With rock music morphing into dance music, it's no surprise to see someone like Carl Cox play more rock-friendly events. "I've done so many festivals this year with rock acts on at the same time like Garbage and The White Stripes, and when I go on, I change it up a little bit to make it a little more acceptable to the rock fans, but they're still dancing to a 4/4 kick bass and a rock quitar"

But this tour is more than just trying to hammer the Carl Cox sound to North American audiences. He's done Ultra, which is a Florida-based massive, as well as The Winter Music Conference, held annually in Miami. He always leaves his fans starving for more.

"The sound of electronic music is knocking on the door of people who are interested in the 21st century of sound and a lot of the tracks now are heavily influenced by rock bands." Cox, obviously on top of what drives his musical career since he's been declared the #1 DJ in the world twice over, pulls out all the stops when he gets on the decks

He keeps the party dancing and wont stop until people fall dead from exhaustion on the dance floor with perma-smiles on their faces. "For me, I think it's a great combination to hear rock and electronic together. The force of that is impossible to deny. It kills people when I play it."





The Lady Ooks grabbed their season by the horns. Pronghorns, that is. Sept. 25, in front of a noisy crowd at the NAIT Arena, the Lady Ooks stunned the University of Lethbridge Pronghorns as the two teams played a scoreless three periods of hockey.

The game was the first, for the Lady Ooks, in their annual Blue/Gold Tournament. They couldn't have asked for a better performance against the Pronghorns

Lethbridge is a member of Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS). With the exception of a handful of rookies on the squad, the Pronghorns came to the tournament with a team full of veteran talent. Members of the team have been honing their skills for years against other schools in the tough CWUAA that includes Canada's top program – the University of Alberta Pandas.

Uptight Lady Ooks Head Coach Keith Garner paced the track around the rink for several hours before the start of their game. When asked for a comment on the game, Garner exclaimed, "I just don't want any mistakes."

Veteran goaltender Kristen Sugiyama led the charge for the Lady Ooks with an amazing display of athleticism and outstanding effort. The Pronghorns won the game by a shot from Captain Candice Matlo that just squeaked behind Sugiyama. NAIT shooters included Miranda Miller, Kendra Willis, and Ashley Sochatsky.

Even if the pair cleared waivers, the Oilers would still be on the hook for their full NHL salaries. Winchester was especially impressive against the Canucks on Sept. 21 when he nailed Sven Butenschon and then got into a fight with Nathan Smith. "It's the hardest I've ever been hit," Butenschon commented.

Other rookies that still have a shot at the big club include Zachery Stortini, who had a goal and a fight against Dallas on Sept. 18, Kyle Brodziak who played very well in his pro rookie year with the Roadrunners last season, Yan Stastny, son of Peter Stastny,

Jean-Francois Jacques who spent some time with the Roadrunners last season and hard-hitting defensemen Mathieu Roy and Matt Greene.

Jeff Drouin-Deslauriers, drafted in the second round in 2002 and Mike Morrison, drafted in 1998, will compete to be the number three goalie in the Oilers system.

With so many players legitimately competing for a roster spot, all signs indicate that the Oilers have a wealth of depth within their system.

Fans could definitely see any of these players on the roster now, or called up in the near future.

Sinisa gives team a kick

Sinisa auto-Matic-ally improves Ooks soccer

"Be true to yourself and others around you," said Sinisa Matic. "Try your best in achieving them and never give up."

True to himself is 32-year-old Matic. A new addition to the Ooks soccer squad, this season, the star soccer athlete has fought long and hard to get to where he is today.

Matic was born and raised in Prijedor, Bosnia and Herzegovina, a small town in northwest Bosnia with population of approximately 100,000 before civil war.

The Ooks forward began playing soccer when he was seven. At age of 18, he became a professional soccer player for second-division Yugoslavian team, Rudar.

In 1992, at age 19, Matic left the war-torn country and his family settled, temporarily, in Germany.

During the 1992-93 season, the forward played for third division SC Nordersted and then TBundesliga. He then completed his European career with fourth division Rasensport Elmshorn, who he was with for the 1994-97 seasons.

With his native country in the state it was, his return was not possible. At that time, he and his family and I applied to come to Canada, as Canada was one of three countries that allowed refugees from former Yugoslavia. A former neighbor suggested the family come to Edmonton. "Later on, the time proved that moving to Edmonton was right decision for us."

In Edmonton, Matic played the 1998-2003 seasons with Victoria Soccer Club. It won Nationals in Toronto in 2001. The athlete began his college career in 2000-2001 with the Concordia University College of Alberta. The ACAC athlete was named an all-star at nationals in Vancouver. Most recently, Matic was a member of the Gold Medal World Master's Games team that competed in the age 30-37 class

Matic is 32 and married to his wonderful wife, Nerma. Together, the couple has a beautiful three-year-old daughter, Ema. "As any sport, so does soccer take lots of time and sacrifice," said Matic. "Especially now when I am in school, the days seem to be shorter than usual. But I've learned to set priorities and make compromises so that everything falls into place. My family, school and my soccer all have their place. Certainly, that would not be possible without unconditional support of my wife who does my chores so I have the necessary time to study and practice.

"I have lots to thank to soccer. I have traveled a lot, seen many places that I probably would never seen, met many interesting people, made lifelong friendships, learned new languages. Athletics has also taught me to have discipline and patience, which I hope made me better person than I was 14 years ago.

"When I look back on to my soccer career, there are some things that could have been done differently, but there is a thing called destiny, so mine right now is to play for Ooks which gives me enormous pleasure. The coaching staff is very professional and my teammates are a great bunch of guys."

"During the short time the NAIT squad has been together (since mid-August), Sinisa has made a massive impression on the players and coaches," says Ooks Head Coach Graham Wood. "His ability to play the game at a high level is well known throughout (Alberta) and

he is respected for it. As the head coach at NAIT, obviously I am extremely pleased he is bringing his talents to the college.

"He is a prolific goal-scorer," says Wood. "He has an ability to control and manipulate the ball under pressure and create opportunities for other players to score.

"What has impressed me more than anything, though, is his obvious love of the game and commitment to practice. His natural leadership is having a great effect on the younger players and, when coaching them, I often refer to his ability 'off the ball' to make space for himself.

"Off the field Sini is a classy gentleman," says Wood. "Approachable and always looking to help the other players."

As for Matic's goals right now, they are very simple, "To finish my education, get my welding ticket and help the Ooks reach Nationals. Time will tell how close am I in achieving my goals. I just have to study hard and play hard and results will come."


Some words of wisdom that Matic would like to share with his fellow students, "Set reasonable goals. There is no shame in losing, but losing without fight is unacceptable."





Cat scratch fever builds

The Wildcats are the new kids on the block in Edmonton and many CJFL fans are catching cat scratch fever - they love the success of the Edmonton Wildcats

Coming off a tough 21-18 loss in Saskatoon on Sept. 25, the sixth rank CJFL Edmonton Wildcats look forward to their second of two annual meetings against the hometown rival Huskies. Clarke Park will be the host site of the 7 p.m. battle on Oct. 1.

The third place Wildcats narrowly escaped the first meeting against the Huskies with a 23-19 victory. The Huskies are hungry and they will be gunning for revenge for the first week loss.

The two Edmonton clubs find themselves tied for third in the Prairie Football Conference after last week's games. A second loss to the Wildcats could put the defending Canadian Junior Football Champion Huskies in jeopardy of an early end to their season.

This rematch between the cross-town rivals should be a fight to the finish. Both teams have matured quite a bit throughout the season. "We've been getting a lot better throughout the season," said Wildcats Defensive Back Cole Payne. "We still haven't played to our full potential."

The Wildcats' lack of discipline may haunt them this weekend if they let their emotions get out of control. The Wildcats have averaged a league high 123 penalty yards per game, in comparison to the Huskies league low of 58. In the three games that the Wildcats lost, the team committed numerous personal penalties.

"Take those penalties away," said Payne, "And we could have won those games. There is a lot of lack of discipline on our team, so we're going to have to stop taking the penalties if we want to do well in the play-offs.

"The Huskies are a lot better than they were at the beginning of the year," said Payne. "We're going to have to neutralize their quarterback and our defense will have to shut them down to allow our offense to keep marching down the field."

Huskies quarterback Nathan Aldred is the top quarterback in the league with a 57 per cent completion percentage, 1259 yards and seven touchdowns.

Wildcats Quarterback Brendan Maher had a slow start to the season, but has gained a lot of confidence over the past few weeks. "We know we can beat any team in the league," said the third year CJFL veteran. "It's just another game. We've got to go out there and do our job and expect them to come out and do the same. If we can keep the mental (mistakes) to a minimum, then we should win."

Running Back Cale Inglis returned to the Wildcats last week after missing two weeks due to injury. Inglis returned to the team with an impressive 159 yards on 27 rushing attempts.

Jean-Marc Jones and Dylan Karch, both of whom were selected Nike Player of the Week earlier this season, will have to have similar performances in order to shut down the formidable offense of the Huskies.

A lot of factors will decide the victor of this all-important rematch. Provided they can play a solid defense and limit their own penalties, the Wildcats appear to be a great position to turn the tide and shut down the Huskies who, until now, have



Mystical production opens 40th season at Citadel Theatre

What: Blithe Spirit Where: The Citadel Theatre, Shoctor When: Blithe Spirit runs until Oct. 16, 2005. Rating: 3 stars out of 5

I see dead people. Well, at least that was the intention of Bob Baker's new show, Blithe Spirit. That opens to a new season at the Citadel Theatre on Sept. 29.

The Citadel Theatre could not have chosen a more suitable show to open its 40th season either. Blithe Spirit is a classic English comedy written by Noel Coward, one of the 20th century's most renowned play-writers.

Charles Condomine, a novelist, does not see dead people - or does

In a ploy to research new material for his next book, Condomine and his second wife Ruth invite eccentric psychic Madame Arcati to perform a séance for their friends. Determined to prove that she truly has the power to summon the dead, Arcati accidentally materializes Charles' first wife Elvira. A supernatural tug-of-war between the two wives for the love and attention of their beloved Charles ensues.

Blithe Spirit proves itself to be the quintessential play about the eternal love triangle, whilst leaving its audience in stitches.

Blithe Spirit, previously produced at the Citadel as part of the 1971/72 season, continues to be the most-produced of all Coward's classics, including Private Lives and Present Laughter (part of the 2001-02 season and also directed by Bob Baker). Sir

Noel Coward died in April 1973, after an extraordinary career writing, directing, dancing, singing and acting in countless plays, 11 musicals, 11 films, three television appearances, 11 books and numerous short stories.

Noel Coward's classic was first produced in London in the



summer of 1941. Playing the part of Charles himself, Coward brought happiness and relief to a British society in the midst of the darkest days of the Second World War, when the country was enduring the German Blitzkrieg.

Citadel Theatre Artistic Director Bob Baker, and director of Blithe Spirit, feels this is the perfect production to begin our 40th anniversary. "In the dark days of 1941, Coward penned this play in less than a week. The initial production opened almost immediately thereafter and ran for an astonishing four and a half years," said Baker. "As well as being brilliantly constructed and psychologically complex, it remains a refreshing diversion for troubled times."

Blithe Spirit received its world premiere in London, England, July 2, 1941 and opened on Broadway later that same year, on Nov. 5, 1941. It received the New York Critics' Circle Award for Best Play in 1942.

The cast includes Leona Brausen as Edith (Citadel Theatre debut); Juan Chioran as Charles (An Ideal Husband); Dolores Drake as Mrs. Bradman (Citadel Theatre debut); Corrine Koslo as Madame Arcati (Servant of Two Masters); Brigitte Robinson as Ruth (Present Laughter); Jan Alexandra Smith as Elvira (Shakespeare's Will); Michael Spencer-Davis as Dr. Bradman (Einstein's Gift).

Joining Director Bob Baker is Set and Costume Designer Leslie Frankish; Lighting Designer Robert Thomson; Sound Designer and Original Music Composer Don Horsburgh; Stage Manager Cheryl L. Hoover and Assistant Stage Manager Michelle Chan.

Koslo makes this whole show work magically. The three hour production runs into some very dull stretches, but Koslo's eccentric and very flamboyant character provides the important comical interludes necessary for this type of show. Don't fall asleep, though, or you'll miss one of the most original endings in live theatre.



The album is not just any album; it looks back at Goods ten years on the Canadian music scene. The album features two new tracks "Big City Life" and the song making noise on the airwaves right now "Oh Be Joyful". Also included on the three disc set is one cd full of hits over the past ten years followed up by a nine song acoustic set of a few of his old songs redone acoustic style. The interesting part of the acoustic disc is there not individual tracks its one track spanning over thirty-five minutes of continuous Matthew Good. Also included in the music package are the two limited edition albums Matt released in 1998 and 2001, Loser Anthems and Lo-Fi B-Sides. Matt's huge devotion for his fans shows because he also including every single music video he has ever done including a special animated video on "While We Were Hunting Rabbits.

devotion to Amnesty


International along with his daily Blog updates on his website www.matthewgood.net keeps him in touch with his fans and the real world.

Nothing new for New Order


New Order has a maddening knack for not giving fans what they crave - not one of their perfunctory best-of's have done justice to their oeuvre. This trend continues with their latest release, the two DVD set, Item. Essentially a repackaging of 1993's The New Order Story with an accompanying disc of their video output entitled A Collection, die-hards will nonetheless find much of interest.

The New Order Story captures the band at their decadent worst. Burned out and nearly broke, the band had reached their creative nadir (The heavenly Regret notwithstanding). What led them - sans Gillian Gilbert - to return with '01s Get Ready and this year's Waiting For the Siren's Call? How do they feel, nearly three decades on, about their status as elder statesmen? One has to look elsewhere for these answers as no recent interviews are to be found herein. Further detracting from the experience is a narrator who sounds like she'd be better suited to shill chocolate covered Kotex.

Notable fans/collaborators such as Quincy Jones, Neil Tennant, and Bono (at the height of his early '90s

vanity) sing New Order's praises. Were someone thoughtful enough to update this package, we might have heard from the current spate of bands that have benefited from their blueprint. To name a few, Bloc Party, Interpol, My Favorite, Primal Scream, and The Killers - who even took their name from NO's "Crystal" video - all owe a

By focusing on the politics of the band and their recently dissolved relationship with Tony Wilson's Factory Records, the music sometimes seems an after thought - this in stark contrast to these onetime cryptic kids who'd



worked so hard to cultivate a nonimage, hiding behind those iconic minimalist Peter Saville sleeves. Too much attention is paid to the often-clunky Arthur Baker productions, which propelled them to the top of the pops rather than their rock 'n' roll hearts. Their magic lies in the clumsy clang of Sumner's guitar gliding off Hook's bubbling bass, bouncing on a bed of Gilbert's droning synch all the while lashed together by human drum machine

Morris. Shining examples of this ragged passion such as Age Of Consent and Love Vigilante are notably absent.

The video collection fares better. Jonathan Demme's Perfect Kiss clip (cinematography courtesy of legend Henri Alekan), which captures the band at their pensive/cutesy best and Philippe DecouflC's artful True Faith are always entertaining. Kathryn Bigelow gamely distils the pompous swagger of Touched By The Hand Of God into a perfect glam metal pastiche pre-dating that new Backstreet Boys Video by 18 years. As well, two of their finest tunes, Temptation and Ceremony receive the long overdue, if very lo-fi, video treatment.

Almost a third of The New Order Story consists of video footage which, when paired with the video collection, is entirely redun-

Academy-award winning actress Jodie Foster is back and her new movie is an exciting, pulsepounding, intense...retread of her last movie! Yes, call this one Panic Room on a plane and you've got the idea.

Foster plays Kyle Pratt, a propulsion engineer for Elgin Air, who is flying the body of her hus-

band back to New York. The film establishes a sombre tone early on and uses the opening scenes of grief to frame the film's action. Pratt and her daughter are in great distress and the situation they get themselves into will push them to the breaking point.

The situation is that Pratt loses her daughter while in flight. Falling asleep, she wakes to find her daughter gone. After looking the plane over thoroughly, she is nowhere to be found. Oh, but wait! Foster plays a propulsion engineer so she knows this plane like the back of her hand.

How convenient.

No one believes Pratt so the passengers and crew decide she has to be delusional. And that's where the film begins to get too ridiculous to enjoy. She roams the plane like she owns it, leading everyone aboard to think she has lost her marbles.

How many movies are we going to sit through where the characters happen to be experts on everything going on? How about putting a woman in peril that works at JC Penney? Anyway, Pratt knows just what to do in every scene. This saps the film of any real, crackling suspense.

Pratt's daughter, Julia, is the stolen little one. She is one of those typically aloof stock movie kids who ask cute little questions that beg the stock replies from their emotionless mothers. (In one scene, she asks her mom if they have good food in America. "Yes," she says. Oh, and this is so adorable. "Mommy, do they have toast?" "Of course, honey." Gag

Populated with a strong supporting cast including Sean Bean (Lord of the Rings) and Peter Sarsgaard (Shattered Glass), this film resides too long in clichÇd, been there done that territory. It is too bad, because Foster is a fantastic actress and the film had some potential.

Unfortunately, this bears too much resemblance to her previous film, Panic Room. In both movies, Foster is protecting her little girl from certain doom. We get nearly identical performances from her. After becoming used to seeing Foster give a unique voice to characters like Clarice Starling, it's a drag to watch her churn out a formulaic thriller like this.

It's not a total dud, but I can't recommend it.



The National - Alligator **Beggars Banquet**

With their two full lengths and the Cherry Tree EP, New York's The National have long promised perfection. On Alligator, they deliver. From the opening lyrics,



"I think this place is full of spies/ I think they're onto me," paranoia permeates every corner, only to give way to the cocksure strut of such sentiments as, "I'm a perfect piece of ass." Frontman Matt Beringer begs vocal comparisons to The Tindersticks' Stuart Staples, but where the The Tindersticks are contented to haunt cool cafCs and seedy strip joints, The National seem to roam all over wild America. Beringer's lyrics come off like a collaboration between Leonard Cohen and Robert Smith. Just when you think you've got him pinned, all that romantic cynicism gives way to a wistful plea. "Come be my waitress and serve me tonight/ Serve me the sky with a big piece of lemon."

Then there's the music. Holy moly, the music! On first listen, bearing such riffy barn burners as Lit Up, Abel, and Mr. November, Alligator might seem a little too staid or colourless. Further listens reveal a sonic palette far more shimmering yet subtler than anything U2 has done in over a decade. Part of the cohesive feel might be attributed to the fact that the rest of the band consists of two pairs of brothers. A tight rhythm section keeps the groove grounded while guitars dance around each other in a flurry of arpeggio. Tasteful accents of piano, cello and clarinet are deployed throughout in only the most germane manner.

It's a grower. Were I a doctor, I'd prescribe three listens over two days and on the third, a hefty dose of weed immediately followed by the fourth listen. Have some tissues handy as you may cry. Or spunk. Or both.


