# Ice is warm to Edmonton

Vanilla Ice is one of the bigname acts that'll be served up hot

steamy at this year's Ookfest on the NAIT soccer field in Edmonton.

To say Ice was huge more than a decade ago is an understatement.

The man who was born Rob Van Winkle took the music world by storm with his 1990 debut album, To the Extreme.

It still has a place in history as one of the best-selling rap albums of all time with a reported 17 million copies sold worldwide by the year 2000 alone.

Later Vanilla Ice projects failed to come close to the success of To the Extreme.

He struggled with drug problems and a controversy that revealed he hadn't grown up leading a gangsta lifestyle as his handlers thad told the media.

But now, 15 years later, the Iceman is on the comeback trail, turning heads again with his live performance and his recordings.

Nugget contributor Tara Copeland caught up to Vanilla Ice prior to his tour date here in Edmonton on Sept. 10. With only five minutes to chat, Copeland fired four quick questions his way.

**Nugget:** Why do you think you're so popular in Edmonton?

Vanilla Ice: Wow, that's s good question, I don't know. I always get a good response when I come

**Nugget:** What is the craziest thing that has happened to you so far this tour?



### No butts about new **NAIT** smoking rules

Administration is trying to clear up the smoke surrounding NAIT's smoking policy. The policy was updated on July 1, 2005.

With the updated policy, you cannot smoke within 10 metres of building entrances, within three metres of any bus shelter, in front of the entrance to the HP Centre or the Ernest's restaurant and within 10 meters of any fresh air source.

According to Sandy Sanderson, director of recruitment and student life, a smoking policy is nothing new - it's just been reworked. "The policy has always been there. There has always been a policy of where you can and can't smoke.'

"We recognized that we had to update our policy," said Sanderson.

"It's not something we're going to be writing tickets about," said Sanderson. "It's more about educating people. It's about re-

Sanderson says the feedback he has received from students has

been positive.

Leslie-Anne Fendelet is one of the many non-smoking students at NAIT who supports the updated

"I think that smoking is disgusting and if you want to smoke, you should have to do it on your own private property, not on NAIT campuses," said Fendelet. "If you are a smoker and you want to slowly commit suicide, that's fine. Just don't commit murder while you're at it."

James Oikawa, another nonsmoking student at NAIT agrees that the policy is a step in the right direction. "Now, I won't have to run the gauntlet and want to gag every time I want to get into a building at school."

"I don't appreciate having to hold my breath while I enter a building," said Sean Amato, nonsmoking NAIT student. "I agree with any by-law that makes smokers feel like the lepers they are."





Garner takes over for Jim Newman, who had led the Lady Ooks for the past four seasons. Garner has been with the Lady Ooks since 2001 as an assistant to Newman.

Born and raised in Lloydminister, Garner carries with him a very impressive resume.

The husband and father of two carefully balances his family life with hockey and his professional career as transportation administrator of the Transportation and Agricultural Services Department of Strathcona County.



# Oilers bulk up with new talent

"This is one of those moments where you wish you had 18,000 seats in the building!"

That was Oilers President Patrick LaForge's response to the hype the Oilers are getting for their pre-season opener against the Calgary Flames on Sept. 16.

It has been a very long time since hockey fans have been this excited about the hockey season. Over the past 15 brutal Canadian winters, since the Oilers won their last Stanley, they have made the playoffs only seven times and have been to the Conference semi-finals but once.

This attitude of hockey fans is much different this season. Not once, this summer, has a single Edmonton hockey fan muttered the words "small market" or been beleaguered by the exchange rate.

Hockey fans sense a coming of age for the Oilers. For over a decade now, the Oilers have acquired outstanding talents such as Doug Weight, Anson Carter, and Mike Comrie only to lose them to free-agency or have to trade them away dirt cheap because we couldn't afford to pay for their services.

This season, the Oilers are no longer restricted to only the "throw-away" players. The Edmonton Oilers, in fact, made a bold statement to fans and league critics alike, that they were no longer

just a "small market" Canadian team. The Oilers went out and paid top dollar for the services of top defenceman Chris Pronger and centre Mike Peca.

These acquisitions proved that the Oilers will be competitors in this new era of salary cap hockey. Hockey fans enthusiastically responded to the Oilers' new mindset by rushing to snap up the available season tickets.

Although the Oilers were able to pick up a couple of fan-

tastic free agents this summer, the Oilers likely still don't have enough firepower to make it past the second round of the playoffs.

Pronger is arguably one of the best defencemen currently playing in the NHL. The six-foot-six, 220-pound hulk puts fear in his opponents' eyes whenever he lurks near them. Teammates and opponents, alike, respect him because he always plays with heart and intensity. Pronger should be a monster up front on the Oilers ailing powerplay and a rock on the penalty-kill ... if he stays healthy. Pronger has not played an entire season since 1997/98. Most recently, Pronger missed all but five games in 2002/03 due to a wrist and knee injury, and he suffered an eye injury in the 2003/04 season.

Peca has a great attitude and a good sense of the game; however, he is not the first-line centre that the Oilers have so badly needed since losing Weight. Having won the Selke trophy, for best defensive forward, in the 1996/97 and 2001/02 seasons, Peca has proven he is valuable on the penalty kill and a great clutch player. Peca is

not a top offensive producer however as in his best season (2001/ 02) he was only able to muster 25 goals and 35 assists.

The biggest move the Oilers have made this off-season was the re-signing of Ryan Smyth minutes before his scheduled arbitration case.

Smyth is the Oilers' best player and the top scorer on the team with 23 goals and 36 assists in 2003/04. With the team since the 1994/95 season, Smyth is the longest tenured Oiler on the roster. "I'm very happy with this deal, especially since we didn't have to go through the arbitration process," Smyth said. "I've been an Oilers fan since I was a kid, and there isn't any other team I'd rather be with."

The most promising rookie entering the camp this season is Yan Stastny.

Stastny is the son of 16-year veteran Peter who lit the lamp for over a point-per-game in the NHL. "I watched him play at the World Hockey Championships," says Lowe. I think he's a great story. I don't like to make comparisons. But he thinks the game

like his dad. He skates like his dad. And he fits the mould of an Oiler." The Oilers were able to steal Stastny away from the Bruins in exchange for the 4th round pick that they gave the Oilers for the disappointing Brad Isbister.

Danny Syvret, Captain of the Memorial Champion London Knights, also has an honest chance of cracking the Oilers lineup this season. At six feet tall and 206 pounds, Syvret led the Knights in +/- last season with 69. Many Oilers analysts expect the Oilers to make a final move. this off-season, for the top-line centre that they have been missing since Weight was traded. Not to say it won't happen; however, as the season closes in, the pickings are getting slimmer by the day. The best two unrestricted centres left - Mark Messier and Ron Francis - are both over 40 years old.

Whatever the outcome of the season is for the Oilers, one thing is a guarantee. Despite the bad taste the lockout left in their mouths, fans are more excited about this season than they have been in more than 10 years.





# Kids wanna rock on The Rock

Newfoundland is a whole 'nother world - and a great one at that!

We think we know how to party in Edmonton.

Hell we're the city of festivals, and arts and music, right? I've attended our major events in E-town over the years: the Fringe, the Edmonton Folk Festival, Stage 13, Big Valley Jamboree, Ookfest, dozens of concerts - and more.

But I've got a confession to make.

The people in Newfoundland can teach us a thing or two about partying hard with not a whiff of the kind of butt-head BS violence you'll often see on Whyte Avenue on a weekend night.


A few weeks back I hopped a plane and checked out Canada's newest province - a place affectionately known as The Rock.

I had a quick realization: everywhere you go the kids wanna rock on The Rock.

There's no better place to realize that than the province's capital, St. John's.

I lucked out when I was there. The city with a metro population of more than 170,000 was smack in the middle of an annual ritual known as the George Street Festival.

During this time in late July and early August, it's doubtful there's a more lively city in the - Halifax, N.S. in-Maritimes cluded



Newfoundland's capital city, St. John's offers a pallet of colourful houses - some of which date back to the 1800s.

This fest sees thousands of people throng to catch top-notch musical talent at an outdoor stage on George Street, and entertainment strip of scores of bars that's St. John's answer to Edmonton's Whyte Avenue. (Only it's way more friendly and the crowd ranges from students to middle

aged and older - all partying side by side).

The outdoor stage is just a focal point. There's even more action indoors at dozens of bars along the city's entertainment strip that features acts ranging from rock, to Celtic, to country, to hip-hop. This year's fest was

headlined by the Juno award-winning Sam Roberts Band.

The concept is dead simple. The entire strip is blocked off to traffic during the famous fest (and at night during the rest of the year) and people pay one cover charge that gets them into any club. This year it ranged from \$10 to \$15 depending on the talent on the main outdoor stage.

Partiers are free to wander outside the bars with their drinks of choice so long as they're poured into plastic glasses.

At the tail end of the six-day festival is more Rock-style revelry, this one surrounding what's called North America's longest-running sporting event, the Royal St. John's Regatta. It sees tens of thousands flock to the city's Quidi Vidi lake to watch dozens of teams compete in Olympic-style rowing.

Whether you know a coxswain from an, er, cocker spaniel it's easy to have fun just cruising the crowds, checking out the handicrafts (a la Fringe Fest) and sipping a few cold ones at a packed refreshment tent.

(Oh, and get your mind out of the gutter. For the landlocked crowd, a cockswain is the helmsman of a ship's boat or a racing crew).

Naturally most people's livers couldn't keep up the partying pace in St. John's for too long so the smart thing to do is go farther afield and check out a few of the movie-set quaint towns and villages within 300 km of the capital.

The best bet is to take side trips off the Trans Canada Highway that begins in St. John's and heads west.



In Newfoundland, weathered houses perch precariously on the water's edge.

The first must-see stop is Cape St. Mary's Ecological Reserve, about a three hour jaunt by car southwest of St. John's.

It's about a one kilometre hike from an interpretive to a lookout point that puts you nose to beak with one of the largest nesting colonies of sea birds in North America.

Along the way you'll encounter (and nearly bump into) sheeploads of shy sheep, contentedly grazing on the grasses only a few meters from cliffs.

### A Must See

If you have a fear of heights or suffer from vertigo, take a deep breath before looking down because your vantage point at the end of the hike is right at the edge of a cliff that drops straight down, 100 metres or so to the Atlantic Ocean below.

Another must-see location is the old town of Trinity on the Bonavista Peninsula about a half day's drive northwest of St. John's.

There you'll likely bump into Tineke Gow, one of the first entrepreneurs to resuscitate the post-card perfect seaside town in the mid-1970s.

"People have been living here

for 500 years," says Tineke Gow, who's hooked on the former ship-building village.

Gow fell in love with the place more than 30 years ago and bought a ramshackle home in 1975 for a mere \$4,000 with a thought to opening a bed and breakfast.


"The locals thought I got taken for that price," says Gow who restored it to its former glory with a lot of sweat.

Today she owns or operates a handful of bed and breakfasts as well as a trendy restaurant called the Twine Loft in the Artisan Inn that offers licensed dining with a menu as sumptuous as you'll find in any North American city.

Today the community is a haven for artists – and there's even a theatre company that operates in a town as picturesque and quaint as any you'll find in the world.

There are scores of other destinations within a short drive from St. John's including Bonavista where John Cabot landed in 1497, Port Blandford at the entrance to Terra Nova National Park and Musgrave Harbour where you'll see thousands of lobster traps stacked near the seaside.

Numerous places operate whale watching and bird spotting tours where you can take in thou-

sands of exotic-looking puffins and spot humpback, minke and orcha whales.

Along the way you might even catch a wayward iceberg made of snow that's tens of thousands of years old.

WHERE TO STAY IN ST. JOHN'S: There's a youth hostel in St. John's right in the heart of


downtown. If you've got a few extra bucks to blow, park your butt at one of the numerous bed and breakfast operations. It's a fine way to get to know the locals, plus you'll get a hearty breakfast thrown in just like the one your mom rightfully forced you to eat before going to grade school. They'll cost you about \$69 and up.

Places I stayed that were amazing included Everton House on King's Bridge Road, Rendal Shea Manor on Cochrane Street and McCoubrey Manor on Ordnance Street. All of them were easy walking distance to downtown.



### Registration frustrated some students

Twas the 23rd of August, the first day of registration, and all through the halls they were lined up for hours, like lonely men at a kissing booth.

Eager NAIT students who ignored the warnings about showing up early to register and get their photo IDs found themselves gritting their teeth in frustration when a computer glitch forced them to wait up to three hours for a little bit of paperwork and a plastic

More than a few of them wondered why a technical school still insists on having students come down in person and wind their way through various line-ups to fill out forms.

"We pride ourselves on technology. I know the U of A does everything online," mused Kurtis Anderson, who wisely waited for the second day of registration to sign up for his fourth semester of business management.

He buzzed through the lineups in just a few minutes, having paid his tuition on-line.

The majority of students over at MacEwan College get registered without ever leaving the comfort of their glowing home computer screens. College spokesman David Beharry learned that the hard way last year, when he invited some local TV crews to come down and film students lining up.

"They were like, 'Where's the crowds?' And the lines were all moving," he laughed. "I spoke to the registrar's office later on and they said the majority of students do it online now."

It can be tough to keep up with technology, but they don't have much choice, Beharry said.

"Our students know what's out there, and if we don't have something they'll let us know."

So what's up with NAIT? Jeremy, an eager new NAIT student who shyly refused to give his last name, couldn't believe what he saw when he showed up on the first day of registration.

To get your ID upstairs (in the HP Centre) there was a lineup down the hall and into the stairwell. I gave up and went home. In a technical institute, you wouldn't expect that," he said.

Once the computer problem was fixed, things went along tickety-boo during the last two days of registration. It usually only takes about 20 minutes to go through the process, said NAIT registrar and Dean of Admissions Don Yurchuk.

The school could easily do everything online and have students use their drivers' licenses as photo ID - and in the next few years that could happen -- but Student Services and NAITSA would lose

valuable opportunities to show students what they offer, Yurchuk

"People need to know what's available. We do it for them, not for us.'

Standing at a booth near the ID cameras distributing handbooks on the second day of registration, NAITSA spokesman Nicole Oulette agreed.

"We really want to have that strong interaction with students, and if we don't have the face-toface contact, chances are they're not going to come down and meet she said. "We'd really be missing out on that with online registration."
