NAIT makes a world of difference

“NAIT has the best enterprise unit in the Canadian educational system.”

According to Jeff Sundquist, Dean of Global Enterprise Solutions, “NAIT has the best enterprise unit in the Canadian educational system.” A bold statement perhaps, but not considering “the unique hands-on learning that goes on here,” Sundquist added.

NAIT’s unique competency-based training programs allows Sundquist’s team to “work with Canadian companies here and abroad, with Fortune 500 companies, and governments from around the world.” They work with industry to help meet global resources and human development needs.

The Global branch of NAIT is huge and an important part of everything the school does. Specializing in oil and gas, business administration, telecom-

munications and other skills they have “assisted in training skilled and productive workforces in more than 60 countries.”

There are now seven training operations around the world located in: Beijing, China; Baroda, India; Vancouver; Bonnyville; Peace River; Abu Dhabi, UAE; and Cairo, Egypt. Over 1,000 instructors are involved with these facilities and regularly teach overseas.

Sundquist says that Global Enterprise Solutions “takes an entrepreneurial approach to running these institutions” from which the success then allows them to do “close to \$30 million per year of financial revenue which is then invested into programs, people, and facilities.”

“NAIT is a global institution with strong roots in Alberta rather than an Alberta institution dabbling in International activities” he explained. With a background in Business Improvement

and Business Development Operations, Sundquist has been dean for just over five years.

He still finds his work exciting due in large part to the fact that “NAIT is such a strong brand with a strong reputation.” For example, NAIT played an instrumental role attracting DELL to Edmonton being selected from over 300 cities. “NAIT was the very first organization that DELL outsourced their new-hire training.”

The Egypt training facility opened in 2004. There is now one full-time contact living in Cairo while instructors work on rotation. The corporate training and building in Egypt and other countries helps these jurisdictions with their capacity development.

Subjects being taught in Cairo include “mechanical and electrical maintenance, vibration, and ideally instrumentation.”

“By getting in early with emerging markets and building relationships and community activity in a region, new doors are opened for both the country involved and our institution.”

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Smokers way out in the cold

The smoking issue at NAIT continues, and while the snow helps to cover some of the mess the problem is not going away. I had the opportunity to speak with a group of smokers and then I took some of their comments to Ken Snider, Manager of Security Services.

Some students requested sheds outside their buildings where they could at least stand out of the elements. Others quipped in that these sheds could be heated and that much more comfortable.

Upon speaking of NAIT's smoking policy, all of the smokers said they were aware of the 10-meter rule from buildings where they should be smoking. While some responded they were too busy to walk out that far others stated they were just taking a quick puff.

When asked what it would take to improve the situation responses were similar. Some said that there were no seats near the designated smoking boxes. One person said that they felt "singled out" having to stand at a place that is often

"right next to the road."

Snider feels that smoking "is an issue for a lot of staff and students" adding "ideally all we want is for smokers to use the receptacles (located at the 10 metre location) and put their butts where they belong."

When NAIT security move across campus, they will ask smokers in the wrong place to move.

On main campus, both the North and South lobby entrances are designated as smoke-free. Grounds staff, Snider explains have a "bigger problem in keeping up with the constant pick-up to keep facilities looking their best."

He also thought that image becomes a factor. "NAIT receives a lot of visitors and it is not a great thing to see piles of cigarette butts in order to get through to a building." Essentially "campus is here for the students and we would just like to keep it clean. We're promoting the 10 metre area out of courtesy for others."

At Grant MacEwan staff and students are only permitted to smoke in one or two locations depending on the campus. It is more of an extreme move but still better than the alternative of going totally smoke-free as far as smokers are concerned.

Making a clean sweep

With Christmas just around the corner, the ol' pocketbook getting tighter, and exams fast approaching, who has the time? Well, if the family is coming to visit this holiday then a clean-up of your place is in order.

Instead of spending \$8 or \$9 on an expensive cleaner filled with chemicals that are bad for you and bad for the environment try using vinegar. When used regularly inside your oven, vinegar is all you need to keep it clean.

Dr. Shaw keen on expansion

Ah, it's the end of the term and the last issue of The Nugget until 2007.

As such we thought it would be a good time to touch base with NAIT president Dr. Sam Shaw.

Nugget writer Shant Chakmakian caught up with the prez recently for a question and answer session.

What do you love and hate about your job?

What I love about my job is interacting with great staff and students...and every day is a dynamic opportunity to leverage these assets. I wish I had more time to walk around the halls.

Why did you initially take this job?

I knew about NAIT because I completed some accreditations in some of the health programs. I felt it was a golden opportunity to leverage some of the great talent at NAIT.

If you had three wishes for NAIT, what would they be?

Wish one would be so the government gives us the \$75 million a year so we can complete our \$750 million plan...Wish two would be we would look at implementing that plan as soon as possible...And thirdly it would be that we would have more celebrations of our successes.

What makes NAIT different from all other institutions and what's our edge? Why should students choose NAIT?

Clearly it's in our mission statement and it's the human touch. If you look at what happens in the classroom and the support staff to focus on student success and their success is a reflection of our success.

What's NAIT's impact on the world around it?

Our impact is dramatic and profound, certainly in the jurisdictions that we go to look at training, people's lives are changed by it, wherever they are in the world. It certainly affects their lives and their families and entire communities.

Do you think NAIT will be the next MIT?

We are certainly using DIT (Dublin Institute of Technology) as models of how we look at some of our programs, and we are certainly working with MIT on our bachelor of business enterprise as well as Harvard and Boston College.

How does NAIT work with business and industry, what are the benefits from that?

Well certainly we have a foundation with our program advisory committees that draw people from business and industry. We give quarterly reports to business and industry...business and industry want to be partners of NAIT...success breeds success.

So what's going on with the future southside campus? What programs may be included on that campus?

We are looking at is Crane and Hoist, the pipe trades, automotive, heavy equipment, marine, aviation programs and so forth. And beyond that we have the land to expand as we see the need of new programs 10-50 years from now.

What's NAIT's plan for expansion? What will it look like in 10 or 20 years?

We have certainly our 10-year plan that looks at \$750 million; certainly it will help us grow from the current 72,000 to 108,000. With that we have plans for main campus and as we recently announced we have plans for a south campus that's contained on 151 acres.

How does NAIT intend to expand over the next 50 years?

Our extension plans look at the need for looking at the need for academic programs accessed by students and the infrastructure behind that. That looks at what we need to do on main campus and south campus and looking at all the buildings that will support all of the training we will do that is hands on.

How will more applied research make this a better institution?

Applied research is key to looking at good instruction because you can share what's going on with business and industry. And as we look at the four-year degrees, there will components of looking at a capstone project that will help students stay in touch with students looking at problems that businesses want answers to today not tomorrow...this for NAIT's faculty are very important and aligned with an excellent teaching institution.

How is NAIT funded aside from tuition? What does NAIT do to keep tuition prices down? What are other sources of funding?

Certainly on the tuition the government grants help us, but clearly when you look at the supplies on practical training we need business and industry...certainly looking at the capital campaigns have been key to ensuring that we can deliver some of the programs and scholarships to students.

What do you think NAIT needs to improve in the short and the long term?

As we look at our infrastructure, we need to be on course and on target with our 10-year campus expansion. That's No. 1. We must always look at reviewing the quality of our programs and certainly as we start looking at succession planning with our faculty, we need to hire the best and the brightest.

How does NAIT intend to maintain high quality as the institute expands?

Through our program reviews, KPIs (Key Performance Indicators) are done on all the programs as well as the program advisories make sure that the kind of curriculum in the program needs to be workplace-ready.

Many students complain about the quality of certain buildings (i.e. the business tower, the annex etc.) What will NAIT do to maintain the quality of our current infrastructure?

To address the business tower issue, it will be certainly to create a new business building and that's slated to hopefully start next year. Then there's the domino effect of refurbishing and renovating the current business tower for electrical, and once electrical moves in

we can expand health sciences.

What does NAIT intend to do on increasing quiet study spaces on campus?

One of the key things in all of our infrastructure planning is incorporating student space that is designated for learning and those kinds of amenities for students by students.

What's NAIT's greatest strength and obstacle?

Our greatest strength is the staff we've been able to attract and not just in the past but in the future. Our challenge is ensuring government support for technical education.

What's going on with the clocks?

What time is it? It's all GPS ready!

According to the Canadian Mental Health Association three quarters of Canadians feel stressed out at least once a month, and for most students stressing out probably seems like a way of life right now.

Stress isn't all bad since it can be a motivator to get things done, but if it has become overwhelming

and you're losing sleep over that group project or thinking about the number of finals you have gives you a migraine Capital Health has a few tips to get you through the next two weeks.

First they suggest trying to avoid stress by being prepared and proactive, anticipating your needs, saying no more often, and allowing extra time before important deadlines or meetings.

Basically, you're busy, so create a schedule for studying and working, and then follow it. This will help you visualize what has to be done and when, so you're not up at 4 a.m. madly scribbling last minute details out.

They suggest relaxing by exercising, enjoying a hobby or par-

ticipating in an activity you enjoy. Make sure to make room for breaks – small and large – in your schedule. While you are studying, experts recommend focusing on the books for 45 minutes, and then taking a 15-minute break.

Sleep can be hard to come by during these last few weeks of the semester, so make sure to unwind before bed. Try to forget about school and its worries so that you're calm before you head off to dreamland. Stretching, a warm bath or shower, and reading are recommended.

Ask the Sex Doc:

Dear Sex Doc;

I read on your website that some sex toys can be harmful to the body. Can you explain this? I'm a little worried because I have a jelly vibrator that I use occasionally.

Dear Perplexed About Plastic Penetrators @ SAIT;

You're right PAPP, not all sex toys are created equal.

What you need to be concerned about is the fact that your little friend is made from jelly.

You see PAPP, the sex toy industry is largely unregulated.

They sell sex toys as novelty items so they do not need to adhere to certain regulations. Unfortunately, most North Americans who purchase sex toys are not aware that these toys can burn your pleasure hole.

Besides the obvious adverse effects of poorly made sex toys such as sharp seams, allergies, decomposition, and bacteria infections due to porous toys, the most concerning issue is with off-gassing phthalates. Phthalates are a family of very common chemicals used in a variety of products, from polyvinyl chloride (PVC), children's toys, and sex toys made from jelly.

Phthalates are added to plastic (usually PVC) to increase their flexibility. Unfortunately, over time, the phthalates added slowly 'leak' out in a process called off-gassing.

They generally release lead and cadmium, which can be absorbed into the butt or vag.

In 2001, the popular German magazine, Stern, hired toxicologists to determine the safety of certain sex toy materials. They were alarmed at the high concentrations of phthalates, which were 100 times the acceptable European standard. The toxicologists warned that sex toys containing phthalates (i.e. anything initially made from PVC) would be absorbed into the mucous membrane of the front and back door and could lead to liver and kidney damage.

In 2006, Greenpeace Netherlands commissioned a study, which found seven out of eight vibrators and dildos tested contained phthalates in concentrations varying from 24 to 51 percent. Besides the affects mentioned above, the experts from this study indicated that vaginal or rectal exposure to these chemicals can harm hormone production and damage reproduction. They also indicated that phallic PVC poles might lead to cancer.

Now PAPP, I don't mean to scare you. If you really do use your jello vibe 'occasionally' you're probably fine.

But, you and anyone else out there who has a battery-operated boyfriend that can give you a chemical pussy peel should throw it away and replace it.

However, if your toxic twat tool gets you off like nothing else, you could always put a condom over it to keep the bad stuff out.

When purchasing an insertable sex toy you should make sure it is a good

one made of silicone or elastomer or you may come down with Chernobyl Coochy. So PAPP, a good motto to follow when it comes to sex toys is, "if it smells bad, don't buy it!"

For NYE 06, however, things may change. This year, Connected Entertainment is pulling out the stops. They're bringing an electro-rock throw down that will hopefully usher in another great year for music in Edmonton.

If you haven't heard by now, Death from Above 1979 are dead. After being hailed as Canada's best band during the year 2005, they decided that they had done all they could've done musically. Granted there's only so far you can go when your band consists of bass and drums.

What came next from DFA79 bassist, Jesse F. Keeler, was the formation of MSTRKRFT (mastercraft). It's a dance music project with DFA79 producer, Al-P. The Toronto duo started making their mark on the electro-dance scene in 2006 in a big way, and Keeler hasn't looked back. I talked to Jesse Keeler in his Toronto studio.

Taz: Hey, Jesse, whatcha doing?

Jesse F. Keeler: Right now I just had a breakthrough on this remix we're

doing for The All-American Rejects. However, when we got the song, it was only 88 bpm. The average dance track is 120 bpm or more.

T: 88 bpm? What?!

JFK: I know! I couldn't believe it, but I guess we gotta do what we gotta do.

T: You're well-known for remixing rock artists ranging from your label mates, Metric, to bigger bands like Wolfmother and Bloc Party. Is there anyone out there that you'd want to remix?

JFK: There's a U.K. dance act called Space Cowboy. We'd love to remix them. However, when it comes to remixes, we love playing remixes people do for our tracks. We play Par-One's remix of our track, Work on You, more than we play our own original mix.

T: I read on Wikipedia, that you're recording another album. You just released *The Looks* (on Last Gang records) earlier this year. Do you feel now that with the Internet making music a lot more accessible that you have to follow up quicker than bands did before?

JFK: The Beatles recorded *Revolver* and *Rubber Soul* in one year, so why can't we?

T: Next thing you know, you'll be bigger than Jesus.

JFK: We're not there...yet. I think the world is getting back to that point where singles and 45s ruled the music game. Obviously, with the dance scene singles rule, but now there's more pressure thanks to the internet and it's setting us up to be more competitive.



T: You're playing NYE in Edmonton. Why Edmonton?

JFK: NYE always sucks. In Toronto there's always a million parties, and it's never banging.

T: The last couple of times you've been here you guys have torn us a new one.

JFK: Yeah, that's pretty much the reason why we decided to come out west. Everyone is always receptive of us, and we have a great time. We can't wait for NYE.

Shout Out Out Out's Nik Kozub is a busy man these days. When he's not robot-voicing the hell out of an audience while he's on tour, he's producing bands in the Edmonton area on his label Nrmls Wlcm (Normals Welcome).

SOOOO released their first album, *Not Saying/Just Saying*, to some rave reviews this past August even though Pitchforkmedia.com claimed it was 'kinda meh.' The hybrid of electro and rock continues the dance floor domination that rock'n'roll is going through right now on both sides of the Atlantic.

SOOOO are co-headlining the NYE06 bash at the Citadel with MSTRKRFT. The electro-rock outfit

that boasts two drummers and a bevy of multi-instrumentalists recently released their first 12" remix. I talked to Kozub in his Edmonton studio.

Taz: Tell me about the remix.

Nik Kozub: This is our first 12" to be released for our album, *Not Saying/Just Saying*. The remix was done by German electro artist Malente. We sent him four tracks, and he picked to remix *Self Loathing Rulz*.

T: Your album dropped back in August. What has been the reception of it?

NK: It's pretty interesting touring for an album release. When you go to other cities you can really see what other places outside of your home think of it. So far, we've been pretty happy with the response, and it really shows when we play our gigs. It's really stunning to see the response from our first tour for the album to our third tour.

T: Edmonton has been getting a lot of attention as being the next big thing music-wise. What do you think of that?

NK: Oh man, Edmonton bands are getting a hard time in Montreal. Thanks to that *Globe* and *Mail* article, it's like "Focus on Edmonton, forget about Montreal!" And that has translated to us getting a lot of static when it comes to touring.

T: What does Edmonton have that other bigger cities are missing?

NK: The fact that our scene is smaller. When you go to shows, you always see the same people. In Toronto or Vancouver it's a larger scene, so you might not see the same people over and over. But here it's like we all help each other out, I think that's what's making our scene a little more noticeable. Everyone's not going for the jugular, and stepping on other bands to make it.

The geek shall inherit the Earth

Like most nerds I delved into the world of sci-fi when I thought the real world dictated that I was an outcast. Later in life I realized that I was wrong, so out went the Star Trek T-shirts and I lost interest in anything sci-fi.

Then in 1995 sci-fi went a little crazy, when *Buffy the Vampire Slayer* was released on an unsuspecting audience. All those sci-fi geeks went haywire.

I got into the show, and for years I was sucked back into the sci-fi world. *Buffy* was different. It had hot chicks, yes, but it also had its acerbic dialogue which was always amusing and never compromised its integrity as a cheap grab for ratings.

You can see *Buffy's* influence in the new substitute for *Buffy*, *Veronica Mars*. Despite its seemingly sci-fi name, *Veronica Mars* is more of a neo-noirish comedy mystery that continues *Buffy's* tradition of smart dialogue and complex storylines. It has kept me glued to my set for three

seasons running.

Appearances can be deceiving. *Veronica Mars* is a perfect example of that. When *Battlestar Galactica* was re-imagined three years ago, I dismissed it as another *Star Trek* wannabe. However, I am glad to say that I was completely and utterly wrong.

BSG is the best television show on right now. Forget about *The Sopranos*, which has alienated a lot of its audience by taking too long of a break between seasons. *24* and *Lost* are great escapes from the world around us, yet it's a sci-fi show that has broken a newly-formed mold within this new Golden Age.

BSG is like a mirror for what is happening in the world politically right now. When it is magnified on an intergalactic scale it can't help but suck the viewer into a world that seems so familiar to what is happening south of the border.

Forget that *BSG* is a Canadian venture as it's filmed in Vancouver, and that more than half of the cast are from Canada including Alberta's own Tricia Helfer.

This sci-fi story about the near-obliteration of the human race has connected a large group of fans now rabid in their obsession. So much so the show is able to take potshots against the US government that will last longer than a segment on *The Daily Show*.

Evening with Kevin Smith 2 DVD review

Vulgar, crass, smart and witty

Kevin Smith, director of such films as Clerks, Clerks 2, and Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back, makes appearances in Toronto, Canada and London, England to talk to fans in a Q&A format. This is the second DVD collection of his Q&As. The first of which were college appearances throughout the U.S.

Smith takes simple questions from fans, and turns them into long, highly entertaining anecdotes about his life as a filmmaker and family man. He shares his opinions and stories about things like photographing his wife for Playboy, past and future movie projects, the Passion of the Christ, and life with a kid.

Smith is an excellent storyteller, turning simple stories and observations into stand-up style comic gold. In fact, it is as much stand-up as it is Q&A.

A question about doing a DVD commentary for Donnie Darko can quickly turn into a story about Bears (the hairy and gay kind, not the Grizzly kind). His stories/answers are as vulgar and crass as his movies, but also as smart and witty.



Appearances by Jason Mews (Jay, of Jay and Silent Bob) add to the experience, as his warped take on the world gets added to the mix.

There are only two performances on this DVD, as opposed to the numerous US college appearances collected on the first edition. Surprisingly, there is just as much quality material here as the last. (Surely, the countries he appears in have nothing to do with it.)

Smith plays to his foreign audiences well especially the Canadian crowd. There were times though, that Smith was a bit patronizing to the British audience.

Whenever he couldn't make out a question due to the crowd member's accent, he would laugh, ask them to say it again, and then laugh some more and tell the crowd what he thought he heard. I was a little disappointed to see

such a smart guy be somewhat disrespectful.

Surprisingly, there is little in the way of DVD extras, especially for him. His DVDs are usually packed with very good bonus content, but there was not much on this one. Each disc has a short piece where he hits the streets and talks to the locals, asking them things like "What is Canadian cuisine?" or "Would Jason Mews' pick up lines work on British women?" It is quite funny, but that's all we get.

Smith's stories and observations are, once again, quite entertaining and interesting. Some people may not dig watching a fat guy swear and answer questions for over four hours though. However, if you liked the first "Evening With" DVD, or are a fan of his work this is a definite must.



Funky and fun album

Ok Go has been recording for a number of years, but it's only recently that they have rocketed to fame thanks to viral play of their videos for A Million Ways and Here it Goes Again on YouTube.

Even this album, Oh No, has been kicking around since 2005. It was re-released recently with a bonus DVD when their music increased in popularity, and it's not without good reason.

Ok Go bucks the trend of angst and

anguish seen in a lot of recent modern rock, with very high energy, catchy, tunes. Songs like the infamous Here it Goes Again (a.k.a. the treadmill song) are so funky and fun you find you just can't turn them up loud enough.

Some of their tracks are pretty mellow too, and this makes for a decent mix of energy and emotion so no song sounds the same as another.

The band plays with some pretty original sounds. The late '60s pop-rock style song The House Always Wins is lead by a single piano key keeping the beat with a synthesizer in the background.

This song and others like it are interesting experiments, but they don't really hold their own against some of the more straightforward, simpler songs on the album. After a few tracks you realize Ok Go wears their inspira-

tion on their argyle sleeve.

Many songs feature riffs and vocal structure very similar to bands like Weezer.

The "Limited Edition" DVD has some interesting content. There are official music videos, dance videos by the band and fans, and the most amusing, a behind-the-scenes of the treadmill video. Little extras like this are a great incentive to buy the disc instead of downloading it.

However, not every track on this album is a winner. The ones that do stick out are either high energy or smooth and mellow, but either way they're pretty damn catchy. From badminton and basketball to golf and hockey, our school's athletic department boasts a total of 13 competitive sports teams. However, one team that has never existed here at NAIT is an Ooks football squad.

As a matter of fact, not a single college in the ACAC, the athletics conference that NAIT competes in, has ever fielded a gridiron gang. Knowing the enormous amount of football talent in Alberta I found this fact very surprising.

Now I know what you're thinking, "Since when is Alberta such a football hotbed?"

Well, I will have you know that our province produces some very impressive football players. Let's start at the high school level, Team Alberta, a squad made up of high school all-stars, has placed in the top three at the Football Canada Championships every year since 1995. They've won the tournament five times.

Moving to Canadian junior football, there has been an Alberta representative in their national championship for the past three years. The Edmonton Huskies made appearances in 2004 and 2005, and this year the Edmonton Wildcats capped off their undefeated season with a trip to the big game.

At the university level, the U of A Golden Bears have been consistently ranked in the CIS Top 10 for the past couple of seasons, even



capturing the nations No. 1 ranking back in 2004.

And finally, at the professional level, there is Alberta born talent all over the CFL. Here in Edmonton, the Eskimos have one of the game's most talented young defensive players in safety J.R. Larose. Larose graduated from Strathcona High School right here in Edmonton, and even spent a couple of seasons with the Huskies before going pro.

The Eskis also have long snapper, Taylor Inglis, and running back, Jarred Winkel, on their roster. Both players are Edmonton born, and graduates of the Wildcats' and Golden Bears' systems.

So, with all of the talent out there, why is it that the University

of Alberta and University of Calgary are the only post-secondary institutions with football teams?

Well, after talking to NAIT's athletic director, Gregg Meropoulos, it turns out the answer is pretty simple. It would cost a whole lot of cash!

To put things into perspective for you, the funding a 40-man football team would require is in the same neighborhood as the operating cost of NAIT's entire athletics program, all 13 teams.

However, even with the sport being the budget breaker that it is, back in 2000 an Ooks football team was almost a reality. A group made up of people from Football Alberta, and headed by an instructor from here at NAIT approached the ACAC with the idea of a new football division.

The conference was not opposed to the plan, but ordered that at least three other colleges would have to add football to their athletic programs before competitive play could begin. After the costs were made known to other institutions, the group was unsuccessful in convincing anybody to even think about starting up a football team, thus quashing the idea.

With the ACAC recently lifting a three-year freeze on the addition of new sports teams, talks of a new football division may begin to surface again. However, according to Meropoulos, the poor financial status of many athletic programs in the province will be the deciding factor in a football division once again getting the cold shoulder.




