Panel slams Tories on education

The University of Alberta Students' Union hosted a panel discussion last Thursday to discuss tuition and other issues facing students in the post secondary education system. The meeting's original purpose was to discuss a tuition policy that was supposed to have been handed down to Alberta post secondary institutions by the provincial government at the beginning of October.

This purpose shifted; because by the time the forum took place the tuition policy still hadn't been received from the government as was promised more than 18 months ago.

A number of panelists took part in the forum, which was intended to start discussion within the campus community on the state of post secondary funding in the province.

Samantha Power - the president of the U of A Students' Union, Dave Taylor - the Liberal Party's Advanced Education Critic and MLA from Calgary, David Eggen - the NDP MLA from Edmonton/Calder, Bill Moore Kilgannon - the Executive Director of Public Interest Alberta, and Elaine Ho - a former student leader, all took

An invitation had also been extended to Denis Herard, who is the current Minister of Advanced Education. Herard chose not to participate in the forum.

"Students need to know what was promised to them by the government. That is the most

affordable tuition policy in the country, and what that actually means. It is unfortunate that the Minister has yet to respond, and it seems like he will not participate in this conversation with students," said David Cournover, Vice President (external) from the U of A's Student's

Among topics discussed were the rising cost of tuition; the passing of Bill 40 (which according to critics eliminates any rules or caps governing the rise of tuition); the ability (or lack thereof) of university governing bodies to fight education cutbacks; the student loans system and the government's failure to improve it; or even uphold the quality of education in the province over the past two decades.

Samantha Power, President of the U of A's Student's Union, also states, "This institution could have chosen 15 years ago not to accept cutbacks

This institution now has that same choice again, and is not taking it."

Some interesting figures were raised about NAIT in particular in relation to the funding that it receives. On average, the institution will turn away five students for every one student that is accepted into a program.

The University of Alberta Students' Union along with other Alberta post secondary institutions continue to await the government's promised tuition policy. They hope they will receive a plan that will begin to address some of the fundamental problems with tuition and debt affecting students in Alberta.

Radio tax attacked

Campus online radio stations across Canada may be experiencing financial difficulty this spring if a new fee is put through by the Society of Comoosers, Authors, and Music Publishers, or SOCAN.

SOCAN collects the licensing fees for music that is broadcast either commercially or in a non-commercial matter, ensuring musicians are paid for their work.

Presently SOCAN requires a non-commercial AM or FM radio station to pay 1.9% of the station's gross operating costs in the year covered by the license, but this does not include online campus radio broadcasts.

However, if Tariff 22 for the Communications of Musical Works via the Internet or Similar Transmission Facilities is passed there would be a mandatory fee of 7.5% of an online station's annual revenue or \$200 - whichever amounts to more - for the station to continue to have a licence to broadcast.

For some stations this added financial pressure may mean that the online broadcasts will

end, so the National Campus and Community Radio Association, or NCRA, is protesting

the possible tariff. According to the NCRA's most recent newsletter the organization "agrees with SOCAN in the sense that all art has a value. Artists should receive royalties for the public performance of their music...The problem occurs when SOCAN moves to ignore the artists' desire to have their music promoted — something that stations naturally provide by web casting their regular feed. The reality of the campus and community radio sector is that stations, faced with increased monthly fees, will simply be forced to pull their Internet feed. Some stations have already done so."

NR92, NAIT's own campus online radio station, is an integral teaching tool in the radio program at NAIT; but it is also an important part of the campus lifestyle since it

plays outside NAITSA, in the South Lobby, and in the RTA wing. As well by going to the NR92 website, http://www. nait.ca/nr92/, and clicking on the "Listen Live" button one is able to listen to the "Station for the Students" on any computer with an internet connection.

According to Patrick Galenza, Program Head of the RTA program, "Tariff 22 is another cost to the program, but because NR92 is such a large teaching tool in the program the fee would be absorbed. We try to make it as true to life for students here in RTA."

As Dave Albright, a radio instructor in the RTA program says, "the unfortunate bottom line for NR92 would be a \$2,400 a year fee to broadcast. My opinion, it's a cost of doing business. Not a fair tax for an education station, but SOCAN's intent is in the right place."





In their rush to be the first to have a story or the goriest footage, our news agencies are doing us a great disservice.

Not only are they exploiting tragedy for ratings, but they are providing the spark to copy cats out there that need only a little bit of inspiration to act.

The possibility exists that one of these desperate individuals could see these reports and commit a similar crime, yet

he/she may not have before.

I am not suggesting that we should look at the world through rose colored glasses, or that these tragedies definitely could have been prevented by not reporting them. My point is that there are a lot of news stories out there that deserve more coverage than these horrible tragedies.

We should be focusing on events that shape the world we live in and foster greater understanding and prosperity for us as a species. There will always be tragic events, but media has a duty to not be consumed and dominated by them.

Tell the story about the school shooting, but don't dedicate three days to it underscored by "haunting" piano music. After all, vast numbers of people are dying every day in Afghanistan, Iraq, and Darfur – the list goes on and on.

Perhaps we should be focusing on attempting to understand thereby ending all murders in the world instead of just the ones at home.

We deserve a fair and balanced media that allows us to view our world in its entirety, and not just in tragic pieces.

A: Two years ago I was a part of General Council and supported the creation of the Senate, during which time I was concurrently enrolled in the Computer **Network Administrator** program.


So far, I've really enjoyed getting results for the stu-

You don't get much more rock than this. Nashville Pussy, an '80s hair metal/rockabilly revival band from Georgia spearheaded by husband and wife team Blaine Cartwright and Ruyter Suys (already an interesting format) that engaged the Friday night crowd of long-haired, air-punching metal-heads with their special brand of Southern-Discomfort Trailer Park Rock.

They aimed to please selling sex, sin, and Satan with a noholds-barred low-end growl and a progressive, ever-evolving melodic charm that the band has been developing for some years now.

No doubt that their tour time with Marilyn Manson might have had some influence, however, Nashville Pussy retains a definite greasy feel that makes you want to drink beer, eat chicken, and slap asses.

Priestess' style set them apart from Nashville Pussy because of their genuineness. You can tell these guys are writing music because it's their life and soul.

Every song they played on Friday night oozed insight into their musical backgrounds - a wonderful sign these guys are on their way to developing a strong following.

If ya wanna rock out, see Nashville Pussy live. If you want to hear some great new metal from an emerging band, keep your eye out for Priestess, you'll be seeing more of them in the future.

For long-time elitist fans The Crane Wife offers fresh fuel to the fire of artists "selling out," while on the other hand, it's also a great jumping on point for most of you who might have been frightened away by some of the band's previous efforts.

The Decemberists first release, after their move from indie label Kill Rock Stars to "evil-giant" Capitol Records, streamlines their trademark rolling sea chanteys and haunting tales of star-crossed suicide into a polished package that's accessible to everyone.

The Crane Wife follows the typical format of the Decemberists, a band that's know for their use of history and period-fiction to sing stories, not songs, of introspection.

This album borrows from the Japanese story of the same name where a poor man finds a crane with an arrow in its wing on his doorstep. He heals the bird and it flies away, while that night a beautiful woman appears with whom he falls in love.

In order to make a living the woman agrees to spin clothes that her husband can sell in town under the condition that he never watches her as she does it. The man agrees, and soon his greed overcomes him as he makes his wife make more and more clothing - oblivious to the fact that her health is failing.

Finally, his curiosity overcomes him and he spies on her. She is actually the crane that he healed, plucking her own feathers to spin into the clothes. The woman sees her husband and flies away

So, if you're the kind of person that read the above paragraph and said, "Hey, that would make a kick-ass song!" then this CD is for

You also may have some sort of unhealthy obsession with birds.

Lead singer/songwriter Colin Meloy plays Capitol quite well. Taking what they have to offer, yet not giving a thing up. I'm hard pressed to find a single that's radio friendly. The closest I can see are Yankee Bayonet and Sons and Daughters, and even these are a little too drawn out and dreamy to make it to most stations.

Most of the changes can be heard instrumentally, with the band ditching some of their acoustic style in favour of newfangled electric guitars, keyboards and effects.
