Imagine it's 7:25 a.m. your eyes are barely open, and your posture is that of a zombie. You have a midterm in 35 minutes and you were up all night studying, hoping to do your best on this exam. I'm not to sure about you but I know for myself the .rst thing I would think of is "I really need a coffee."

Luckily we have many choices of coffee to choose from across the NAIT campus. With many choices come decisions of what type of coffee you should get. As a coffee lover, I hope to help you choose the best one to give that extra kick to start your morning.

First off I will educate you on the benefits of coffee. Caffeine stimulates your brain, improves performance of simple tasks and postpones fatigue. The caffeine's effect hits you in about half an hour and metabolizes in about four hours. Studies have confirmed that in moderate consumptions coffee is actually a high source of antioxidants, which can help prevent cancer, heart disease, and even increase the immune system's efficiency

As for your choices the two major ones are brewed coffee and espresso drinks. I find we have the most variety, and fresher, higher caffeinated drinks at our common market. Here, for brewed coffees, you can choose anywhere from a light to dark roast.

Remember that darker roasts are richer in flavor but actually have less caffeine, because the beans are roasted much longer to achieve that smooth taste. Lighter roasted beans are often flavored to make up for the bitter, higher caffeinated taste.

Espresso drinks are based on brewing a small amount - a shot - of very hot water under high pressure through a small amount of finely ground espresso beans. At the Common Market you have three choices.

Latte: A mixture of espresso shots and steamed milk, usually served with a small amount of the steamed milk57;s foam on top. This is usually the best choice taste wise, and no extra milk or sugar is necessary.

Americano: A mixture of espresso shots and hot water. The word derives from the Italian word for American - because often Americans did not enjoy the bitter taste of their straight espresso and had to water it down. This is a very strong drink, adding milk or sugar to this drink is very common.

Cappuccino: No, I am not talking about that wonderful drink from Timmies. The original cappuccino is a mixture of 1/3 espresso, steam milk, and foam. This drink is slightly stronger tasting then the latte and is easier to drink faster.

Now that you are up to par with the wonderful benefits and choices of coffee I feel it is important that you also know the health risks of consuming too much coffee. Caffeine increases the amount of gastric acids in your stomach. An excess of these acids can make you less hungry and possibly at extreme amounts cause stomach irritations and ulcers.

Caffeine also increases calcium loss in your urine which can be harmful for your bones over the long term. The healthiest way to enjoy that extra caffeinated boost in the morning is to make sure you eat a proper healthy breakfast and make sure you get plenty of milk and vitamin B12 to help with that calcium loss.

We're violent in Alberta

Statistics Canada says in a report released last week that Alberta is the most dangerous province for a woman to live in. The numbers were based on a 2004 survey, which read that 10% of females in this province face violence such as physical and sexual assault, stalking, and spousal homicide.

One of the reasons provided as explanation in this trend was Alberta's booming economy, and the added stresses it provides.

How does a booming economy contribute to an abusive relationship?

David Appell, a counselor here at NAIT, said that it makes sense. People from all over Canada are now calling Alberta home.

When people move they temporarily lose their immediate support network.

"There is more of an inclination to feel trapped," Appell says, adding that "the stress of moving introduces high stress into a relationship."

When something is wrong, the same resources are not available and so the problem escalates.

NAIT has over 17,500 students in both apprenticeship programs and full-time studies. Many of these people are from out of town themselves.

Not only are they away from home but they also are under academic stress. When there is a period of chronic stress "any issues around violence can escalate" Appell noted.

Because students are constantly exposed to a variety of stress factors, it is important to manage those factors and know that help is available.

Many of these same students are also holding part-time jobs filling a plate that is already full.

From a counselor's point of view it is important to find an outlet for the stress. Appell suggested activities like talking it out with someone to exercising, and remembering to take time out for oneself now and again.

"Realistically removing some of the demands, and getting coping mechanisms in place is key" he

There are now Internet sites devoted to determining your stress level, so that if you have doubts you can see for yourself where you sit on the stress wheel.

It may also be useful to look up relaxation techniques in an effort to soothe one's mind now before it boils over, or before someone else takes the brunt of it.

For the women facing abusive relationships, and even men who find themselves in similar situations, help is available. While NAIT does not have a direct support network, Counseling Services are available to students. The number is (780) 378-6133.

Go from Pole to Pole

In 2000 the first "Pole-to-Pole" Journey took place. It saw a team of young adults, ranging in age from 18 to 28, traveling 35, 000 kilometers from the North Pole to the South Pole through the Ameri-

While trekking the Earth, using either human powered or wind powered modes of transportation, this group stopped to help various communities along the way.

Whether planting trees in L.A., or serving meals to those living in poverty in Lima, "Pole-to-Pole" provides the inspiration and ability for millions of the world's youth to take initiative and create concrete, positive change in their communities and around the world."

This April a team of 24 will again travel 35, 000 kilometers, through Europe and Africa from the North Pole through to the South Pole. Scott Gluck, a NAIT alumnus, will be a part of it.

While working as a reporter in Fredericton, N.B., Scott was listening to the radio between interviews when he heard the founder of Pole to Pole, Martyn Williams, on CBC, "As stupid as it sounds, it was like time stood still for me while I listened to this incredible idea. I

began the application process that night."

"Coupling the adventure with the chance to create some positive change in the world was a combination that really appeals to me at this stage in my life," says Scott explaining his immediate attraction to the Pole to Pole Institute.

Scott expects to be traveling for more than half a year, but is unsure if it will be in Europe or Africa. The expedition split into two groups. The first group begins at the North Pole traveling south to Mt. Kilimanjaro, where two members from the initial group will continue on with the second group towards the


South Pole.

Dangerous control of media

The Internet's once seemingly independent display of information is quickly being dissipated by major corporations purchasing popular websites.

This past week YouTube was purchased by Google for the hefty sum of \$1.65 billion. The website started by Çhad Hurley, Steve Chen and Jawed Karim to showcase short films and such, became so influential that the most used search engine, Google, decided to acquire it.

As well, MySpace was purchased by News Corp. for \$580 million last year. Interestingly, on Aug. 8 Google paid \$900 million to have advertising as well as a Google search engine on MySpace.

This is comparable to the media convergence found in more mainstream outlets like newspapers, television, and radio.

In our city, the Edmonton Journal and Global TV are owned by CanWest Media, while CTV and CityTV are owned by Bell Globemedia. Two companies own our three major television stations as well as a daily paper. It doesn't exactly scream independence or objectivity.

Ideas, and especially the mediums that they are shared in, are hot commodities.

It is disturbing that our media outlets are controlled by a very powerful few; if the 'medium is the message', than it's all about the dollar. When we read the paper, watch the news, or log on to a website usually we are inundated with advertising.

For example, if you listen to the 630 CHED broadcast during their traffic update, the car sponsoring that segment can be mentioned up to three times. In trying to inform ourselves we become consumers, and the large corporations control our minds so we will buy their products.

However, is this really that different from the past? In early 17th century Britain, when newspapers were beginning to develop, they were seen as a danger to the monarchy's position. Their content was controlled.

An extreme example is Joseph Goebbel's work for the Nazi government, and his adeptness at creating propaganda.

Woodrow Wilson, the United State's president during WWI, hired Walter Lippman and Edward Bernays, two experts in the nuances of propaganda, to persuade popular opinion to favour entering the war on the side of Britain. Although they were shut down, it was very effective in changing the country's opinion regarding WWI.

The early 20th Century also saw the Harmsworth brothers, the Berry brothers, and Max Aitken own most of the print publications in Britain. Three groups owned the majority of newspapers in one country, which is not unlike Canada today.

Admittedly media allows for a discussion and distribution of ideas, but it is naïve to believe that it was ever independent from those in power. Whether it is government or business we are subject to what they want us to know.

It's depressing, but it does not mean that we stop reading, listening, observing and thinking. Compare, contrast, search, and question; because it is all we can do in trying to figure out what is happening in our world today.

What I think helped me get


a place on the Senate was pity mostly. Sweet, sweet pity. It's helped me so much in my life. Pretty much all of my relations with women can be linked to

Industry has no rules

By far, the most exciting new culture bite this month is The Mobile Phone Film industry. Now is the best time for you to create a short film for mobile phones, and I'm talking short like 40-90 seconds. The technology is easy and the demand is hot.

During the Edmonton International Film Festival, or EIFF, I had a chance to interview Shane and Duncan Kennedy, cousins and founders of Mobifest - Canada's first made-for-mobile film festival; as well as Mieko Ouchi, director, writer, and actor, about their exciting contributions to the Mobile Film world.

It went something like this:

JP: How did you come up with the concept for Mobifest?

DK: Like a lot of great ideas it was really stolen from another place. In fact, in 2003 Nokia started the first mobile film fest, Nokia Shorts.

JP: What's so awesome about this industry?

DK: There are no rules! No one knows what the best technique is. It's still evolving.

SK: It's really the creation of a new language. We're gathering with some really brilliant minds. We're trying to invent what works. The new inventions of what a mobile film should be... will only really occur in the next few years.

JP: Would you say you are creating this new language?

SK: We're part of it. There are a million people out there, or ten million, or a hundred million people creating that language right now; and they're figuring that out by presenting that movie to a friend, and they see that their friend gets it or doesn't get it.

JP: What advice can you give to NAIT students interested in making Made-For-Mobile films?

DK: If I was a student now at NAIT, for example, I would look at a couple of things. I would look very closely at what works on youtube.com, but I would think about that being very different than what might work on my phone. It's the shortest form of attention span.

JP: Do you recommend using sound or text in these films?

DK: You need to be able to understand story without the sound (since these films are being shared in a number of environments). Titles are actually very helpful in making these short films.

JP: How about length? I take it you don't have the luxury of developing plots or complex characters when the attention span associated with the medium is so short.

DK: What we're finding is that some of the most successful

mobile films are 40 seconds to a minute and a half.

JP: How do you make a Made-For-Mobile film?

DK: The easiest way for a student to do it... is to actually try it. If you've got a video phone already, go for it! Try and make something. Copy it to your PC, edit it in iMovie, and put it back on your phone. It's not that hard, and then show it to your friends. If you can make them laugh, maybe you're going to be the next director in this.

JP: Do you think comedy translates best in this medium?

DK: There are people doing a very wide range of them. There are people who are doing experimental, artistic things; there are people who are doing little journalistic, documentary type things. I think the most successful commercial medium now is comedy because it's vital. If it's something that you want to share with your friends, it's more likely to be popular.


that's not enough to make a movie good, and even though it was number one at the box office this past weekend, it doesn't mean that it's good at being scary.

Trevor's no Slack-er

A new and wise face will be gracing the sidelines at the Ooks basketball games this season. His name is Dr. Trevor Slack, and there's no better person to fill the job of assistant coach.

Dr. Slack has a strong history of achievement, diversity, world travel, education, and success; but not without his own struggles. He is one of Canada's finest assets right in line with the likes of Terry Fox; and brings invaluable experience to both Ooks basketball teams.

Dr. Slack was born in Darbyshire, England, and resided there for 21 years. While there, he made the most of a society rich in education

Trevor was an athlete from a young age, attending the prestigious University of London for track; and dabbling in basketball on the side. As well he has succeeded immensely in the world of business management and organizational studies.

He became a world class distance runner, and was so successful that the University of Nevada headhunted and eventually recruited him for their track program in the early 1970's.

He made his way to the U.S.A. But he remained there for a short period of time, due to the unfolding

political drama that was Vietnam and the subsequent threat of being drafted into the military.

A friend of his who resided in Medicine Hat contacted him, and Slack promptly picked up and relocated to Alberta, where he found a job as a substitute teacher for Crescent Heights High School in 1972.

It was there that his interest in basketball was sparked again. He took over as coach of the school's basketball team, which would go on to become provincial champiTrevor didn't stop there. He left Medicine Hat and moved to Edmonton to attend the University of Alberta. It was at the U of A, that Mr. Slack became Dr. Slack when he completed his PhD. in Sport Management in 1983.

His contributions and presence as a professor at the U of A were immense and include:

- Awarded Canada Research Chair in Sport Management (U of A)
- Adjunct Professor at U of A School of Business

- Heads International Institute for study of Sport Management
- Awarded the North American Society for Sport Management's Zeigler
- Award for outstanding services to the field of sport management (1995).

Throughout his life, Dr. Slack has been known as one of the world's foremost scholars in sports management, but nothing could have prepared him for the terrible setback he would soon encounter.

He had an aneurysm that led to a

stroke, and consequently left him in a wheelchair. The rapid change in his life opened up an unexpected world of learning and interaction, but it didn't come without disappointment.

Dr. Slack experienced the cold side of human nature - the side that assumes that a person with a disability is a person "that has something wrong with them."

It's a case that permeates every pore of our society; because it involves the simple, but for some people incomprehensible, acts of human compassion and decency.

For complex psychological reasons, some people would rather not know about, or begin to understand the world of disability; because they'd rather not deal with it.

It is with great honor that the NAIT Athletics Department, and both men's and women's basketball teams welcome Dr. Trevor Slack.

He is a wonderful role model to all. His support for the teams and love of the game is moving, and his unwavering spirit and determination to never give up is inspirational.






