I have been working on some exciting things for apprentices this summer. I have started tackling the lack of funding, scholarships, grants and bursaries that apprentices face in Alberta by creating a policy for our provincial lobby group ACTI-SEC. I have started to create policies with regard to Employment Insurance wait times that I will present on Parliament Hill in early November with a national lobby group named CASA, and I have put together a working group of student executives from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Nova Scotia to address the free flow of skilled workers from province to province and the issues surrounding the Red Seal Certification program.

Other things that I have been working on are a comprehensive survey for apprentices and satellite campuses, finding the best alternatives to the housing crisis for apprentices, increasing existing services on the satellite campuses and bringing new services to the campuses.

As well, I have been assisting the Campus Life department in planning orientations and events for every apprenticeship intake and am doing a lot of reading to ensure that I am as informed as I can be with the issues that apprentices face.

I will be on the Patricia Campus every Tuesday from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m., the Souch Campus every Wednesday from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m., the St. Albert Campus Thursdays from noon until 1:30 p.m., the Fairview and Grande Prairie campuses at minimum of once per month and on the main campus for the remainder of the week.

This is going to be an amazing and groundbreaking year for my position and NAITSA as well. My door is always open; please do not hesitate to contact me at any time, whether you are a student or a staff member. I look forward to speaking with you!

### **NAIT preparing a call to bloggers**

## It's time to Shine!

Hey all you future Shiners! Welcome to another event-filled year at NAIT!

Here's all you need to know about Shinerama – it is Canada's largest post secondary fundraiser, involving over 60 schools and 30,000 students nationwide.

This year marks NAIT's 38th annual campaign (It's actually supposed to be the 39th campaign but some slackers back in 1990 dropped the ball!). Our goal this year is to raise \$30,000, but we think we can do better than that!

Shinerama dates back to 1964 when students in Ontario decided to create a new orientation initiative where students would have fun, meet new people and do something for a great and worthwhile cause. Their idea was simple – shining shoes in exchange for donations to a charity, the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

CF affects approximately one in 3,600 young Canadians. Most of those affected are diagnosed by the time they are one year old, and then have an average live expectancy of only 37 years. CF primarily affects the respiratory and digestive tracts of individuals. As a result, the proper nutritional value is not taken from the food ingested and CF patients have a difficult time keeping weight on and staying healthy. This disease robs its victims of their childhood and future.

There is no cure yet, so we're doing what we can to help!

On September 22, you can help, too! This is what we call "Shine

Day" – the official fundraiser of our Shinerama campaign. And if you're interested in volunteering, we're interested in having you there!

Show up at NAIT at 9 a.m. (yes, in the morning), and have a pancake breakfast on us. Watch some presentations and hear stories about people affected by CF, and get super pumped to go out and do some serious shining of shoes and cars! You will be sent to your specific location with your group leader for the rest of the day and shine and cheer your hearts out for donations to the cause.

That night, we have a bit of a surprise in store for you, BUT you have to volunteer first to find out what it is (and we're looking for 500 volunteers, so don't be shy)!

Stay tuned to the Nugget and keep your eyes open on campus for more information regarding volunteer meetings, incentives and other Shinerama information. But wait! There's another way you can help too! Stop by the NAITSA office in room E-131 and pick up your Shinerama VIP card. This card entitles you to a host of benefits at various bars throughout the city. The best part? It's only \$10 and lasts the whole school year!

We'll be at NAITSA events as well, selling VIP cards and promoting our events. Come see us to sign up to volunteer and help support Shine Day on Sept. 22. It's a great way to get involved and meet new people on campus!

### An eco-challenge for all

Our environment committee, ecoNAIT, is challenging members of the NAIT community to use reusable mugs when buying coffee or tea on campus. Visit www.nait. ca/econait and pledge to be part of the solution.

Using a travel mug for your daily coffee during the school year means you could save at least 160 disposable cups from the landfill. And it'll save you money. Food Services offers discounts on coffee and tea sold in reusable mugs at participating cafeterias.

"ecoNAIT's mission is to help transform NAIT into a showcase of environmental performance," said committee chairman Conrad Nobert.

"Part of the institute's environmental performance is measured by the amount of solid waste we produce. In 2006-2007, 249,809 single-use disposable hot beverage cups from 92 per cent of coffee and tea sales on Main and Patricia campuses, excluding Bytes, ended up in the landfill.

"But the solution is easy. All you have to do is bring a travel mug along."

ecoNAIT wants to see the number of coffee and tea sales in reusable mugs rise from eight per cent in 2006-07 to 11 per cent this year. Buy a recycled plastic ecoNAIT travel mug for \$5 in the Fresh Express during registration (Aug. 21-23) and from the NAIT bookstore.

ecoNAIT, our environment committee, has representation from across the institute, including food services, the bookstore, capital projects and facilities operations, NASA, AUPE and NAITSA.

The reusable mug campaign is supported by NAIT, food services and NASA.



So get involved, and have your voice heard by the student body!





# A good investment

Registration is here, and classes will soon upon us, so, of course, it's time to open up your wallet. If you're reading this, I'm sure you've paid your tuition (using your own money or the government's), but there's one more important stop to make; you'll need to take the trip down the long hallway to the Campus Reads and Needs bookstore.

If you aren't careful, when you get there you may end up standing in line for 30-40 minutes outside due to fire regulations, but once you get in, it's smooth sailing.

#### Two guarantees

At NAIT, I feel like there are two guarantees - first you will get a practical education while you are here, and then, when you leave, "studies" show that you are destined for a good job afterwards. While I was in university, the trips to the bookstore were discouraging because I knew that I wouldn't be using the textbooks very much in class, and definitely wouldn't need them when I graduated (ie: Soc 101).

NAIT is different because our classes are technical and, in most cases, you'll want to refer back to the information when you graduate, so

your purchases are more of an investment. To get a handle on this "investment," I spoke with an expert on the subject of textbooks, Alan Skinner, an industry professional who, before providing leadership here at our Reads and Needs, learned the ropes from his time at Chapters.

From our conversation, I've put together 10 tips to hopefully make your bookstore experience a bit easier.

1. You'll want to stay away on Sept. 4 because it's the busiest day of the year. For apprentices, the busiest day is Aug. 27. But, if you do need to get your books on these days, try to go in the afternoon (mornings are always the busiest times, regardless of the date).

2. The store can be a bit confusing when you're looking for a program specific book. If you can't find what you need, ask. Staff are more than willing to direct you to the books and supplies you need.

3. The best way to save a lot of money is to take advantage of two special services that the bookstore offers. If you keep your book in decent shape after you're done with it, there is an opportunity use the Buy Back Program, which can pay you up to half the cost of your book. These books are put back onto the shelves and sold at a lowered price.

So, if you're looking to save money and don't mind the lines, come early and buy used texts. I sure found it a lot easier to study when somebody had already highlighted the most important topics. So, if you're lucky, you can actually buy a used book, keep it in good shape and then sell it back for half the original cost. That's awesome, huh?

#### Donation an option

4. If you have extra textbooks that you can't sell, why not donate them to the Books for Africa program? It's a great way to support those who may not be able to afford that material. For the past few years, our school has been the largest donor in the Rocky Mountain region, so let's keep it going.

5. Check out the new NAIT merchandise because you can be one of the first on campus to wear the new logo with pride. A NAIT hoodie is at least \$10 cheaper than an Oiler's one sold at Kingsway across the street. Lets support our Ooks, take pride in our school and save money!

6. If you use public transportation, you need to know that this year the only place to buy a student bus pass is at Campus Reads and Needs. With U of A and Mac-Ewan students paying for the Universal Bus Pass (a survey last year at NAIT rejected participation) the city of Edmonton is no longer supplying student passes to convenience stores.

7. Take advantage of the cheap advertised prices at other stores, but know that our bookstore is competitive and even cheaper than the corporate retail outlet's regular priced items. Our second year marketing students will know that these stores use a "loss leader" to draw you in and then inflate the prices on other products.

8. Be a smart shopper and check out the prices at Amazon or Chapters online, but be careful about hidden shipping charges and remember that often the text will not come for four to six weeks, which at NAIT could be disastrous.

9. Join a club this year because that's the best way

that you can meet other people who love to do the same things. I was told that if your club wants to order shirts or jackets, the bookstore management will gladly help you find discounted prices.
