Cuba tour engineered

The February break is under a month away, and for 32 students in Petroleum Engineering Feb. 19-26 will be a time for both relaxation and education on the sunny Caribbean shores of Cuba. While taking an educational vacation, students will also be lending a helping hand to the less fortunate.

"I wanted the students to see the oil and gas industry in a developing country where there are limited nancial resources and skilled labour to give them a different perspective," said Bruce Reinders, program head for Petroleum Engineering.

Used connections

Knowing the students wanted to go somewhere warm Reinders used his connections and suggested Varadero, Cuba. He contacted a Canadian company called Sherritt Gordon with operations there, and arranged for two days of industry related field trips.

The community operations manager for that company was more than willing to help out and is even covering the \$400 cost of renting a bus for those two days. "It's a tremendous show of goodwill on their part," Reinders said.


Jaime Cloutier, one of the students helping to organize the trip is excited to be going. "We study the oil and gas industry from around the world looking at the industry in Canada and internationally," said Cloutier.

'Something different'

"We wanted to do something different for the break and see what the industry was like at the same time," he said.

However, the students will also be carrying some precious cargo along with them. Working with a group called Not Just Tourists, they will be taking medical supplies that are often in short supply in cities like Varadero.

"We were told that we are the biggest group in Canada to do this so far.

This is the most suitcases being carried at one time," he added.

Not Just Tourists is a non-profit group collecting surplus medical supplies and medicines for delivery to Cuba and other developing countries.

For example, one will be filled with prescription eyeglasses. In all, 15-20 suitcases will be delivered to three Cuban clinics where supplies will be further divided. One standard wheelchair and one pediatric wheelchair will also be delivered.

"Students will get to see firsthand that there other ways of doing things by witnessing different technology that is not necessarily better than ours," said Reinders.

"At the same time, they will be interacting with local people on a voluntary basis."

Light and shadows created interesting images on the Shaw Theatre's screen Monday night at NAIT's main campus.

Family, friends, and fellow NAIT students came out to view the photographic technology program's third annual showcase, which is the final part of a thesis class third semester students participate in.

Each student handed in 15 images based on a topic of their choice. They were then set to music and presented in a multimedia slide show.

"It's a showcase of the quality of the work that the students have done," says Randy Zutter, the Program Chair of Photographic Technology

"It shows a good representation of the skill level and the photo-

graphic approach that the students are using, so it's a good time to show it to the public."

The project is developed over the entire third semester, and theses ranged from documenting community life to exploring light at night. Intimacy, water, shoes – topics were varied.

"The students choose their own topic and they consult with they're instructor just to see about their approach as to how their going to do it, and the viability of the technology that they're going to use, the lighting approach, and the equipment needs," explains Zutter.

The Q-Lot is the latest scene for a rash of vehicle break-ins that have been plaguing the campus lately.

NAIT lot hit by break-ins

If you parked in Q-Lot last Friday morning you may have already heard of the latest rash of break-and-enters that occurred.

Seven or eight cars were vandalized with damage sustained to many locks, while at least one vehicle suffered a broken window.

According to Manager of Security Services Ken Snider, the incidents were only in Q-lot.

It's believed the break-ins occurred between 7 a.m. and 12 p.m. There are no suspects.

His department started receiv-

ing calls between 10:30 a.m. and 11 a.m. and promptly informed the Edmonton Police Service. Snider believes one individual is responsible.

While few items were taken, many of the cars' contents were rifled through.

"Likely the individual involved was looking for something of value, possibly to pawn," said Snider. "Likely, that individual is trying to keep up a habit such as a drug habit," he said.

"Things have been really good up until now. We have had very few break-ins or reports of vandalism since October.

"We will continue to step up patrols especially in Q-lot. "It's on the other side of the hangar where visibility from the street is limited."

Dylan Roberts has been parking there since September and was surprised to learn of the burglaries. When told that NAIT security has beefed up security in the area he was happy to hear it.

"I don't know what else they can do but I'm happy I keep my stuff locked up," said Roberts.

Snider urges the owners of the vehicles that were targeted to report it to the police. In order to make an insurance claim, it is often not enough to just report the incident to NAIT security.


He also hopes that any students with information will step forward.



> those on the elevators off before they get on, or to hold a door open for someone behind you, something is not quite right.


Of course it's not going to be automatic sunshine and roses when you 'pay it

ples that we Albertans come across every day.




Once inside the NAITSA website, go to "Current Students" then to "Services" and then to "Car Pool Registry". Then simply follow the instructions.







Movie gets a bit tangled

After Gray Wheeler's (Jennifer Garner) fiancé passes away on a fishing trip, she soon realizes she didn't know everything about him, in both the literal and metaphorical sense.

While she deals with the onslaught of problems and secrets that bubble up post funeral, Gray and her fiancé's aloof, womanizing friend Fritz (Timothy Olyphant) begin to fall for each other.

Catch and Release goes beyond the usual romantic comedy formula of boy and girl meet, fall in love, fight and then kiss and make up.

All the characters in the movie, including her fisherman pals Denis and Sam (Sam Jaeger and Kevin Smith) have a story to tell. Their relationships with one another, with the dead fiancé, and their own personal problems are all explored.

While I like to see these sort of

movies break the mould, this film tries to cram too much into one movie.

Like five fishermen in one boat, lines tend to get crossed. Exploring each character's interaction with one another makes certain scenes and events not necessary or interesting, and others that are necessary and interesting not fleshed out as much as they should have been.

The ending also fails to fully tie all these parts together, adding more to the lack of focus and direction. There is a good story, or even stories, here, but it is hard to see through all the other stuff.

The flick is paced very well, balancing romance with comedy. Most of the comedy scenes are very funny, especially thanks to antics from Kevin Smith, placed in a comic relief role. As funny as these parts are, however, some of them seem to be there solely to generate a laugh, and don't really

forward or contribute to the story.

Jennifer Garner and company are well cast. They all did an excellent job with their characters. They made the characters believable and likable even though emotions bounced around a lot from scene to scene. Timothy Olyphant was especially good at being weasellike and crass at first, and then developing over the course of the film. The character Denis, unfortunately, served little purpose in the film other than to be another knot in Gray's already tangled fishing line.

Like a fish pulled out of water, Catch and Release flops around a lot and makes a big mess at first. It is, however, pretty funny to watch, and ends up quite satisfying when all is said and done. Some scenes garner apathy more than laughs or tears, but it certainly is better than most other romantic comedies.






