For more than two weeks, controversy and questions have swirled around a Christmas break ski trip to British Columbia promoted by NAIT Students' Association (NAITSA).

A hole was punched in a hotel room wall, a soft drink machine was vandalized and looted of pop, carpets needed steam cleaning after being soaked with alcohol, and booze-fueled guests were lighting up in non-smoking hotel rooms leaving management at two establishments fuming, The Nugget has learned.

Some drunken ski trip patrons were also said to be arguing, swearing and interrupting other hotel guests not registered with the excursion.

Misbehaviour at the Sportsman Lodge in Golden, B.C. was serious enough that ski trip patrons were barred from the hotel when they "It's really hard to con.rm if people doing the damages were NAIT students. A lot of students were going with friends and even co-workers..."

asked to stay an extra night after an avalanche blocked the main highway and the group was forced to stay one more day. They found refuge in another hotel for the night.

Two of the seven ski buses departed Edmonton from the maincampus Nest bar Dec. 30 bound for Golden B.C. in a trip organized by Downhill Riders Ski & Travel Co. Ltd. Some 21 ski trip tickets were sold at the NAITSA office. Students were also able to buy directly from Downhill Riders.

While all parties involved have avoided pointing fingers, there were still unpaid accounts earlier this week at one of two hotels that hosted ski trip participants.

Officials with the Sportsman Lodge, where ski bus patrons stayed for the first three nights, declined to offer The Nugget on-the-record comments about the problems since they were still negotiating outstanding damages.

Jim Barr, spokesman for the

Downhill Riders was equally tight-lipped.

Barr said he was "not comfortable talking about the problems," calling the situation "a non-issue."

However, the Nugget has learned police were called to the Sportsman that weekend.

"When you have a group this size you have to anticipate that something is going to happen," Barr said, adding, "there were small damages but nothing out of the ordinary."

Barr worried the would "be blown into something bigger." He refused further comment.

Rooms at both hotels that needed cleaning and took longer than one day to do so could not be rented out immediately over a very busy holiday, The Nugget has learned.

NAITSA President Jon Hoffman was on the trip and said he wasn't aware of all the incidents that occurred.

"It's really hard to confirm if people doing the damages were NAIT students. A lot of students were going with friends and even co-workers, therefore no academic action will be taken," Hoffman said.

"As far as NAIT's reputation is concerned the trip was booked through Downhill Riders so NAIT is not directly associated." Only 21 tickets were sold out of the NAITSA office.

"At the same time, it's unfortunate these events took place ..."

The trip was to depart Golden Jan. 2 but due to an avalanche that closed the main highway it was extended an extra night. Due to the misbehaviour, ski trip guests weren't allowed to stay at the Sportsman that night.

Instead, they found refuge at the Golden Village Inn but

under strict conditions. Pavi Qunqun, manager of that inn was already aware of the situations facing the two buses that left from NAIT's main campus.

"For the most part a lot of the students who came (here) were fine. There were only a handful that caused a problem," Qunqun said.

Instead of getting the discounted rate granted to Downhill Riders for the added night, the patrons who found a new one-night home at his hotel paid full room price.

They also had to produce credit cards beforehand. Qunqun still received reports of students smoking in non-smoking rooms and had to deal with damage.

A Coke machine was vandalized and all pop removed.

Carpets in some rooms were soaked with alcohol and needed steam-cleaning which can result in a bill of almost \$100, Qunqun added.

He doesn't blame Downhill Riders and hopes to work with them in the future. "The kids who come here need to police themselves so that the experience is not ruined by a few bad apples.

"A lot of the hotels in this town are family owned and operated – from the clerks to the cleaners – and when students come here it's like they are staying in our house. That's the way we see it."

Perfect resumes for students

As the final term of the 2006-2007 school year gets underway it may seem pre-mature to start thinking what comes after. Not so if one is preparing to head out into the work force according to Pat Quilley, a Career Advisor with Student Employment Services.

"Wouldn't life be better if you landed a job prior to completing school and you just had to focus on finishing the term?" Quilley asks. She brings up a valid point. With a week off in February, winter semester has the potential to speed right by.

To help students get their resumes in order and make job searching a little easier, Student Employment Services will be offering "Rapid Resume Reviews" on Thursdays throughout the term. The first session starts Jan. 18 in the Engineering Annex on the main floor.

According to Quilley this is the time of year when a lot of students hope to meet with a Career Advisor which can put a crunch on resources. "The solution we came up with is to take staff out of the office to meet with students over the lunch period for a 15 minute resume critique."

There are many advantages in having a resume reviewed before sending it out for your dream position. "Staff at Student Employment Services research current job search trends" she explains. This gives them added insight as to what employers are looking for.

"We provide students with tips from employers and generally accepted job search methods which should be applied in today's job market" says Quilley.

"Students need to concentrate on content. If a resume is not focused on the particular needs of the employer, it doesn't matter what format you use, the resume will be of little interest."

Some other helpful tips Quilley offers include reading the specifics of the job being applied for. By taking the time to research the company and obtain any other information related to the position you can match your skills to what is required to fill the position.

She adds that sometimes students focus on a lack of experience in their particular field of study. "Although employers value experience, not all experience is technical. When surveyed, employers are interested in teamwork, communication and problem solving skills along with flexibility and motivation.

The first step to applying for any posting is keeping your resume up to date. "Too often, I speak with students who do not apply for jobs because their resume is not up to date. This virtually screens them out of a job that may have been a perfect fit."

NAIT job postings will "be at their peak over the next few months," Quilley emphasizes. If the "Rapid Resume Reviews" do not fit your schedule she states students can still book an appointment with a Career Advisor in room E134 to discuss their options.

- Editorial -Are we the generation of slackers?

Apparently we're a slacker generation according to the Globe and Mail's recent article by Alexandra Shimo. "The job market is hot, and yet many well-off, educated kids are adrift, moving back in with their parents, often smoking pot, and delaying careers in what can seem like a willful 'failure to launch,"" Shimo writes in her piece.

OK - that seems like a sweeping generalization.

Shimo uses case studies to illustrate the point, and experts are asked their opinions. Many 'kidults' as Shimo labels members of Generation Y may under-achieve on purpose.

Current films like Clerks and The Wedding Crashers add glamour to under-achieving says clinical psychologist Peter Spevak, one of Shimo's experts. "They give people an easy justification not to engage. Many young people who have motivational problems think it's uncool to work hard. Hard workers are known as chumps."

A heated discussion ensued when this article was mentioned in a group of 20-somethings, and when asked if we were part of a 'slacker generation' the answers were varied.

"I'm going to say yes because I've been in school for eight years, and my parents still give me money," admits perma-student Kim van Nieuvenhuyse.

"I think there are a lot of people that slack. We bounce around from job to job," Holly Miller, a part time assistant manager at Silver City says.

"No more than any other generation, no," Chris Poirer, a full time student, contends.

However when asked if they had ambition and motivation everyone said ves.

"I put my ambition into my school work. I don't mind staying at school for 12 hours because I want to put out a good product," savs Chance Hoffman a secondyear television student.

"I would work at my crappy job, but my parents and the slacker stigma that warehouse jobs have made me go to school," says Poirer who is motivated to work but chose to fulfill outside expectations.

"I do have ambition, but I'm just finding the right outlet for it," says van Nieuvenhuyse.

Consensus: We're ambitious slackers. Shimo's article says we're out of touch with reality. "Young people are both highly ambitious and highly unrealistic," says psychologist John Reynolds another expert Shimo polls.

Apparently we expect too much, but aren't willing to work for it.

Does no one remember Generation X? Our coffee-swilling, grunge-listening, flannel-wearing predecessors redefined slacking. Now they're baby-stroller pushing, full-time working members of society.

Singles and Reality Bites glorified the Gen-Xers' slacker ways just like Clerks 2 glorifies ours, so it's probably safe to say that when we figure out where to channel our ambition we'll be paying mortgages to shelter our young families. Hopefully we'll be done the figuring out by the time we're 30 - okay35.

Remember this number: 23.5 tonnes, because as of 2003 that is the amount of Greenhouse Gas emissions each person in this country contributes. According to the United Nations University, this figure is up from 21.5 tonnes in 1991

It took only five degrees to change the climate of our Earth over 10,000 years ago, from an ice age to what you see today. Wherever you are reading this, it is probable that there was nothing but ice there over 10,000 years ago.

This change from ice age to the conditions mammals thrive in occurred over tens of thousands of years. The alarming fact is that scientists predict a 2 - 6 degree Celsius increase in the global mean temperature over the next century.

Such a violent change in the Earth's ecosystem won't give most species a chance to adapt given it will raise sea levels and change weather patterns drastically.

I was in Montreal last July with CUTA (Canadian Urban Transportation Association) on a conference focusing on sustainable urban transportation.

During the first day there was a presentation given by Glen Murray, Chair of the Nation Roundtable on the Environment and the Economy. Also present was Lawrence Cannon, Minister of Transporta-

This presentation was the worst barrage of bad news I have ever heard in one sitting: "Forty per cent of our species will go extinct by 2050, and that's our most conservative estimate," said Glen Murray.

"Global warming is a problem that increases exponentially," Murray added.

Although Lawrence Cannon at the time gave us a preview of what the clean air act was going to sound like, most critics feel it is not enough. Current increased investment in public transit is a great start but fuel efficiency standards need to be toughened.

For example the Clean Air Act sets out a goal of "5 per cent renewable fuel content in motor fuels by 2010."

Jan. 22 and 23 the Winspear Centre gets its game on.

For two days the Videogames Live Concert, a multimedia extravaganza featuring familiar game themes performed by the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, comes to Edmonton for the first show of its kind in Alberta.

Described as a mixture between a rock concert, an orchestra, and a film by concert co-creator and videogame composer, Tommy Tallarico, the show promises to be something that everyone can enjoy.

"Non-gamers are definitrely the most impressed," says Tallarico.

"The show opens their eyes to what video-gamers have known for

years. Game music isn't just bleeps and bloops. It's a real art form, and that's what we want to show. We want to display videogames in a cultured way," he says.

As a veteran of the game industry for over 17 composing soundtracks, and 10 years co-hosting North America's longest running game themed show, Electric Playground, Tallarico says that the business has proven it's not just for kids.

"Videogames are the entertainment choice of the 21st century," Tallarico boasts

"Today of course younger people make up a significant portion of the user base, but the majority of people buying and playing games are in their early thirties. These are the people that started with Mario and Zelda, and as they've grown up the games have grown up with them."

"What we're trying to do is get people excited about games, and gamers excited about live orchestra. It's something that some people might find a little dry, so if we can ease them in with music they're familiar with hopefully they'll love it and come back for more!"

When asked which classics will make an appearance Tallarico assured that they'll be showcasing some of the most iconic themes

"We've got Mario, Zelda, Halo, Final Fantasy, Warcraft stuff, just to name a few. People familiar with the tunes come in and are blown away when they see what we've done. We've got synchronized music, and video and stage performances going on, so it's pretty amazing.'

The show also has a special treat for the Edmonton area. The city's own videogame studio, BioWare (creator of titles such as Jade Empire and Star Wars: Knights of the Old Republic), has some of its original music premiered at the Winspear.

"BioWare is one of the leading game houses in the world right now,' Tallarico says, "and we're all really excited about bringing their pieces into the show."

Bad Boy Bill comes calling

Edmonton is in for a treat. Bad Boy Bill, America's favourite DJ, founding partner of Beatport. com, and a definitive force behind the development of the Hard House genre, is returning to Edmonton tonight for a gig at Fever, courtesy of Connected Entertainment.

Bad Boy Bill was born and raised in Chicago. He started mixing records at the age of 14 when the house scene was brand new and electric. He became an avid fan of radio station WBMX's Hot Mix Five mix team, and got his first break from Farley Jackmaster Funk, an original member of the HMF team in 1981.

Five years later Jackmaster Funk became the first DJ ever to get a house single on the charts. Bill wasn't far behind.

Bill formed his own record label while still a senior in high school, and his love of the aggressive and chunky house sound propelled him to the top spot in the Midwest Division of DMC's Battle DJ competition. He then went on to become a regular "house"-hold name on Chicago's B96 coining the name Bad Boy Bill while hosting his own radio show, Street Mix.

To put this in perspective, when Flock of Seagulls and Corey Hart were becoming big, Bad Boy Bill was already ripping up and redefining the world of electronic music. He was etching his own sound into a relatively new musical concept.

One that would later spread around the world and be played everywhere from back-alley underground US clubs, to ultra-chic lounges, to European, Asian, and South American arena parties with thousands upon thousands in attendance. to help him promote the release of his fourteenth compilation album, Behind the Decks Live, which was released in October of 2006. This is his first CD and live DVD set.

I got the chance to ask him about his new release, and here's what he had to say:

RE: What can someone expect from Behind the Decks Live?

BBB: The concept behind the multi-media format is designed to bring people into the club scene, whether you're new to the music or have loved it for a while but haven't gotten the chance to see me live.

The DVD will bring you into the whole experience of a Bad Boy Bill live set. You get to go behind the scenes with me, and see the "making of" so to speak, of my live shows as well as exclusive interviews.

RE: How has the global dance scene changed since you started dj'ing?

BBB: It's exploded. It was small when I started, and it's amazing to see how huge it's become all over the world. It used to be just a group of guys who really loved this new sound, but now it's everywhere.

Bad Boy Bill is unique compared to a wide array of today's DJ's, because of his ability on the turntables and the show he puts on while exacting his skills. Known to use up to six different turntables and cdj's at once, Bill's style is fast, hard, and loose. If you need pauses between dance breaks forget about

it, because you'll get none while in Bill's presence.

He seamlessly mixes banging electro house from the likes of Eric Prydz, Green Velvet, Fedde Le Grand, and Steve Angello with a cappella, and incorporates scratching and hip-hop techniques to create distinctive mash-ups.


A breed of sport from the past has climbed its way back into the picture around the world. In fact, we are seeing cards and chips scrambled around poker players in schools all over the place.

points back of Grande Prairie for


