Eight year old Garret Langille thoughtfully paced in front of eight dream-playhouse designs submitted by students in the Architectural Technology and Interior Design program last Wednesday. He listened to each student's reasoning behind their designs, but in the end it was Sarah Holm's The Ice Box that he chose.

NAIT has partnered with the Make a Wish Foundation so that Garret, who suffers from Duchene Muscular Dystrophy, is able to play out his dreams in what will be an incredible playhouse.

Over 100 first-year students drafted a playhouse according to the likes and dislikes of Garret. From those designs eight favourites were chosen for the eight-year old from which to pick.

All attention was on him as he pointed at his favourite, The Ice Box – a playhouse designed to look like a hockey rink including its own TV as a scoreboard. While his fohawk-hairstyle suggested an outgoing kid, Garret was wide-eyed but quiet - understandably overwhelmed by the number of cameras, microphones, and people surrounding him. It was also a personal milestone for Sarah Holm, an interior-design student. "I wanted to design something that will be built. It's one of my top 100 things to do before I die," Holm said, explaining that she had created the list a year ago. Bob Winterford, President of the Make a Wish Foundation, thought of NAIT as he was walking through

For the 64 students in Animal Health Technology, NAIT's Animal Health Clinic provides a one-of-akind-environment, and invaluable hands on experience. Their patients are the furry friends of NAIT staff and students.


The clinic has been open for nearly 20 years. Services offered range from spaying and neutering to dental cleaning. Vaccinations are also provided for staff pets as they are typically returning patients.

"We are the only Animal Health Technology in Canada currently working on client animals," says Dr. Milton Ness, resident Veterinarian. "It is a unique and humane approach as opposed to working on colony animals."

Colony animals are those taken from places like the city pound or a local animal shelter as is standard practice in the industry. There are many advantages to using client "Students are allowed to perform physical exams, take blood..."

animals, says Ness.

"We get to see more patients coming through the clinic. This helps to demonstrate realistic situations students will encounter when finished school. These animals also have a documented medical history students can look at," explains Ness.

In a typical veterinarian clinic there is not a lot of blood work carried out. "The added advantage to both client and pet here is that you get better physical exams than at a regular clinic just due to the way we organize our teaching," he adds.

"Students are allowed to perform physical exams, take blood, hand

more cats than dogs but this year more dogs are being admitted. Students also have the opportunity to work on larger animals such as cows, horses, and pigs by going offsite to work at various stables and ranches.

Life can get pretty crazy at the clinic too. In the 7:30 a.m. to 8 a.m. admitting period sometimes up to 10 animals can be coming in. Discharge is after classes from 3 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Typically it is the students under a technician's watchful eye performing these tasks.

The key to getting your pet in is to book your appointment early.

NAIT beefing up security

Most people would agree a safe campus is as important as an institution that offers good education – and that's music to the ears of NAIT's security head.

"I started at NAIT at the end of July taking over security and parking," says Manager of Security Services, Ken Snider, .

"What attracted me to come to NAIT was the institution's emphasis on security," Snider admits. Currently the department is undergoing a massive upgrade. The main campus, Souch Campus, Fairview, High Level and Peace River will all be included in a new beefed up security infrastructure.

"What we're doing is installing a system for setting up card access for after hours and camera systems," he explains. NAIT is also looking at

the possibility of setting up a one card system.

"From what I understand the intent of the card will have account information and could also be a debit card for expenses on campus such as food and books."

This system in turn could be used in the future to allow certain students after-hour lab access.

Such a move would be a sigh of relief for many. The new security upgrade will also allow staff to monitor other NAIT campuses across the province, and to respond to certain situations and emergencies.

Among other issues, parking has always been a thorn in the side of students and staff alike. Certain measures have been taken to help increase traffic flow as much as possible through the parking areas. However, the main issue is theft within vehicles.

"When I first came here in July, during the month of August, theft was almost a daily thing and now it's more of a monthly thing. By putting the staff out there in the kiosk and looking for illegal parkers, it has lowered our crime rate to almost nothing."

Locker theft has also significantly decreased over the past few years, yet it still occurs. Many lockers that are broken into are generally sporting cheap locks. What students should be aware of is that sometimes, someone may be watching you put a laptop or other valuable possession in your locker and break into it shortly after.

Security at NAIT has been challenging for Ken and his team. Some students may recall the incident during the summer where a former student was hiding cameras in a vent above the stalls in one of the ladies washrooms.

There has been some criticism as to why security did not find the second camera after Edmonton Police found the first, especially after it was found in the same vent of the same washroom. As the man was caught and the case is going to court, Snider was only able to verify that security was performing checks at the time of the incident.

"You're our best resource," says Snider of students, while referring to making our campus a safer place.

When you see someone who is acting suspiciously, or any other suspicious activity, report it to security, he says.

Academic appeal is a serious matter at NAIT. Now that the first semester of 2006-2007 has come and gone, final course marks are in.

"We only have about three appeals per year due to the process we have in place," said Don Yurchuk Registrar and Dean of Admissions.

According to the NAIT Course Calendar, if students feel a mark in a given course is unsatisfactory they are advised to bring the matter to the instructor involved. Should the issue go unresolved, students should then speak to their program head or leader.

In cases where a whole semester's worth of work is in question, students are to go directly to the program head. If unsatisfactory results still prevail, the final resort is to ask the Registrar for a re-evaluation.

"If a student has an issue before they go anyplace, they should talk to the instructor. Some 95 per cent of issues are resolved before they even move to the Program level," Yurchuk said.

In instances where appeals do reach the registrar's office there is a re-evaluation fee.

Individuals with successful appeals have that fee refunded. Unsuccessful appeals are not refunded. When an entire semester is being investigated there is a review committee involving the Program Leader, one instructor not previously involved, and the student.

"Whenever we are dealing with an academic appeal we want to resolve the

matter as quickly as possible before it escalates to higher levels," he explained.

Yurchuk also said that if deemed to change, marks do not go down

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they only go up.

"We want people, both staff and students, to take responsibility for their own actions. If marks are being discussed, go through them several times with an objective judgment."

If you are having trouble understanding a mark, talk to your instructor and go over the marking scheme together. At the very least you can see where you went wrong and how you can improve this term.

This was going to be an editorial about the safety of students who need to stay late at school, but have parked in the municipal airport parking lot. Since the shuttle buses stop running at 6 p.m. it means at least a 20 minute walk from campus for students who need to stay later.

Laura Brandon a student who has parked in the distant lot feels it's both a safety issue as well as inconvenience. "When it's January or February and it's -25C I hope somebody will give me a ride to my car, and also because it's unsafe."

However when conducting some research by logging on to NAIT's Student Services website and clicking on the Security & Parking link the web browser was directed to a financial aid page – three times! After clicking around for a little bit, and hitting Security & Parking under Departments and not Student Services it worked. Perhaps the website is trying to tell us something.


This is fitting, because it seems parking really isn't a service for students at NAIT. Recently the eighth level of lot B – the parkade – was annexed for staff parking. Driving by

each morning there are still empty stalls on the eighth level, but it's getting tight for students from the ninth level up to the 13th.

Continuing my research for student safety I discovered the Safe Walk program, and read a brief paragraph about being escorted to your car or bus stop when it's dark out. It was not mentioned if security officers were willing to walk 20 minutes to the municipal parking lot and back, or if they would drive students there.

"I thought Safe Walk was kind of inconvenient, and I'd feel awkward spending 20 minutes with two Safe Walk people walking me to the municipal lot," says Brandon who had heard of the program.

While safety is always an issue, what has been realized is that parking is no longer a student service. The Student Services Parking website is uncooperative, an entire level of student parking is given to staff without warning, and we're left with a 20 minute jaunt to our cars if the shuttle buses have stopped. Dare I say the Edmonton Transit System is starting to look good.



NAITSA passes on U-Pass

Does NAIT need a U-Pass? That is the question NAITSA executive and Senate have been asking over the past few months and the answer is, not yet.

What is a U-Pass? A U-Pass is essentially making your student ID become a universal bus pass. But as great as this sounds, it doesn't come free. NAITSA fees would increase significantly to offset such costs.

ETS service within the city is often not practical, nor is it convenient enough to warrant having 50% (or more) of the population using a U-Pass.

After careful surveying, NAITSA has found that most students are not in favor of such a prospect. However, working towards such a goal is an option that will be pursued.

Whether you take the bus or not you would have to pay for it – there is no opting out. Students generally aren't the richest demographic out there, and such a cost would have to be justified for them.

As it stands, only some students take public transit, therefore it is a cost not worth inflicting on everyone. However, NAITSA will be working with ETS to expand the level of service and infrastructure to make such an idea become a practicality.

At some point in the future ETS

hopes to be running high speed BRT bus lines here, and is also looking at implementing an LRT service. As this develops and usage becomes more common, it could be an idea worth pursuing.

As ETS expands, these solutions are a great way to offset the parking situation here at NAIT, which is often challenging. But until demand increases along with the capacity of the current infrastructure, we have to make due with what we've got.

Downtown gives Whyte competition

It's Saturday night in Edmonton and there's nothing to do besides checking out the game at Hudson's, going dancing at the Globe, grabbing a pint at O'Byrne's, being seen at the Bank, seeing a band at the Sidetrack, checking out the Ranch for a two-steppin' good time, partying at the Stonehouse or the Druid if you're downtown, Fever or Dante's if you're in the west end, Lux for a martini, or maybe New City or the Roost for an open-minded experience.

So really, with all of that, how do you decide where to go?

Is there really a division between the north and south sides of the North Saskatchewan?

Does a vibrant downtown stem from a vibrant nightlife? These questions fuel my thoughts as I make up my mind to go out dressed fashionably, but not practically for the -21C night.

A friend invites me out promising "naked cello playing and condiments" so I make The Landing Pad my first stop of the evening.

After viewing several pieces in the avant-garde performance salon series Ce N'est pas une Pirouette, I can tell it's going to be an interesting night. After a mayonnaisefilled finale (don't ask) it's time to cross the High Level and hit the Ave.

We hit the Black Dog, hangout where fashionable hipsters mingle, sip pints of Grasshopper, and discuss matters with a backdrop of alternative music. Bouncer Cody Krahn describes the scene on Whyte as "a complete gong show."

The Attic and the Funky Buddha, like the Dog, are also attracting throngs.

A patron explains his philosophy on why he prefers Whyte Avenue. "There's like 40 bars on the Ave. You can go to whatever you want. It's very convenient, and you always see someone you

know. Its familiarity is what it is."

Funky Buddha bouncer Derek Banks figures what sets the Funky Buddha apart from other places on Whyte is there's "no attitude."

At this point, I've been harassing bouncers and random partiers for nearly 20 minutes and I'm freezing, so I thaw in the sophisticated Sapphire. Owner Casey Greabeiel believes Edmonton's changing. "It's becoming way more of a downtown city," Greabeiel says.

"In the next five to 10 years downtown has the ability to be a destination as downtown, rather than just one location," he predicts.

Juan Cortez, a University of Alberta student, makes an interesting point about Whyte Ave. "It's not really called bar-hopping downtown. It's more like bar-catcha-cab-and-go-to-the-next-place," explains Cortez.

This distance between clubs downtown sometimes bothers people but not everyone agrees Whyte Avenue is the only place to party.

Steve Atamaniuk, a NAIT Radio and Television student, believes the downtown party scene is getting a lot better. "In the past maybe four years downtown has really exploded."

Starbucks employees Sarah and Garrett also figure the downtown is now the place to be.

"It's a hooch-fest on Whyte Ave," says Garrett.

"It's not even fun. You get everybody who's 18 and 19 strutting their stuff. It's all a show and you can barely talk to any of these people. There's way more to do downtown," he explains.

Sarah prefers an environment that's not a meat market. "You can actually hear people when you're talking, you can dance, and you don't get ripped off," she explains.

Sidetrack Cafe programs operator Leard Robertson figures the appeal of his place is that "we're a live music venue. Live entertainment seven nights a week."

Audio engineer John Rubuliak thinks club owners downtown have to cooperate to grow the scene.

"Club owners downtown need to stick together rather than fight over business and try to bring more people downtown on the weekends," believes Rubuliak.

Matt Austin, Hudson's downtown manager, figures the main distinction between Hudson's downtown and Hudson's on the south side is the demographics.

"Downtown is an older crowd. More people who live in this area own their own condos. Nearer the university there are more rental

properties," says Austin. Mike Yasinski, president of Gateway Entertainment, has bars on Whyte and one downtown – Hudson's locations, the Union Hall and the Ranch.

"The city is growing," says Yaskinski who recently opened a Hudson's location downtown. "People are living downtown and staying downtown, but for the overall success of any area there have to be restaurants, shops, campuses, and the residents of the area are all considered. It can't be only bars," he observes.

Because it's close to the U of A campus Whyte Avenue will likely remain lively and popular while the downtown grows in popularity, say bar operators and patrons who were interviewed.

DJ David Stone sums it up this way: "As much as business and industry drive the economy nightlife defines the soul of a city. Nightlife is how we interact and express ourselves. All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy as the saying goes."

Hinder is out to bring back the glory days of bad-boy rock pioneered by legendary outfits like Led Zeppelin, the Rolling Stones and Aerosmith.

That's evident given the Oklahoma City band's Vancouver-produced hit CD is called Extreme Behavior and features tunes like Get Stoned.

It's a case of speaking from experience on that topic seeing as how Hinder's official website (www. hindermusic.com) displays a prominent photo of tattooed lead singer Austin Winkler sparking up what looks to be a sizable bowl of bud.


The issue is being original and memorable lyrically, and the rhymes the members of Politic Live drop feel slightly generic.


Overall, this album is impressive, but fails to be truly great by lacking the fire necessary to truly separate it from the crowd.

Price of admission steep for students

With player salaries soaring and the desire for pro sports tickets heating up, attending games nowadays comes with great sacrifice. With escalating ticket prices, the real losers are the students. Ultimately, problems arise for student fans, who are hungry for a chance to witness live sports because of the all mighty dollar.

Here in the city of champions, the Edmonton Oilers are the only franchise associated with a worldclass professional sports league. Statistics reported that after the 2005-2006 NHL season, more then half of the teams reported raised ticket prices.

Edmonton juiced up prices by 12.4 percent (the second highest in the league). Currently the cheapest ticket anyone can find is \$34, which is during the week up in the standing gallery. At the end of the day the average price of admission is \$101.31.

These numbers create nightmares for students who battle through various expenses just to get by.

Certainly some students have the ability to afford these outrageous prices, but in most cases the tickets grow more and more out of reach.

Darch also adds that witnessing a junior game would be a pretty good experience. Overall, students will be able to manage cheaper ticket prices and also discover a new brand of hockey.

The question we must ask ourselves is how much is too much?

Many of the fans in today's society are students. However, with the average ticket to an Oilers game being about \$100 the students will most likely have to stay home.

Welcoming a junior hockey team can bring some relief to the pressures of affording to go to a quality hockey game. But the meat and potatoes of ticket prices, is that if admissions rates continue to mount students will suffer!

On Saturday it took the Ooks overtime, but they still managed to get the job done against King's 81-73.


The women had themselves a difficult weekend against King's College. On Thursday NAIT played tough, but in the end came up short 75-70 in a heart breaker.

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

It's time for the annual all-star break in the NHL, and for the Edmonton Oilers the break couldn't come soon enough.


