

This past holiday Monday, NAIT students affiliated with Club Culinaire prepared, packaged and distributed holiday meals to Edmonton's less fortunate at the downtown Boyle Street Co-op.

"I think that is fabulous!" says Campus Clubs Director Rose Martin Baumgartner. Fabulous indeed. Reports indicate that students from NAIT's School of Hospitality cooked between 1,600 and 1,800 meals for the needy.

After a start to a school year which left many students with a sour taste in their mouths and the feeling that there was a lack of trust in their peer-group, borne of the Campus Chaos debacle, Club Culinaire affiliates are still tackling city issues. Thankfully, the young and "irresponsible" in our city are willing to set aside a holiday not to study, but to put food in the stomaches of Edmonton's less fortunate.

Approximately 15 people from Club Culinaire, with the help of culinary arts instructor Troy Lymburner, put their collective skills together to cook 100 turkeys (that's about 2,000 pounds of turkey meat cooked total!) that were donated to the club by Lilydale. Not willing to stop at just turkey, then Club Culinaire cooked up mashed potatoes, stuffing and vegetables to accompany every meal

"Cheryl Court (club president), and Devon Black (club treasurer) assisted the volunteers at the Coop to serve the food up, and they deserve a big pat on the back for being the only two people who went to the co-op and stayed to help out those that are less fortunate," says club secretary Corey Wren.

"From a club perspective, we all feel fortunate for what we have and for helping the community."

After so many months of poverty and homelessness issues weighing down on Edmontonians, NAIT students are standing up and proactively being part of the solution through efforts such as these.

"On a personal note I feel as though my life is pretty sheltered and I hope future club members will recognize that this is a good community event."

On Tuesday, Oct. 9, NAIT held the Ward 2 candidate forum and provided the public with an opportunity to hear and focus on student issues from the mouths of the candidates for city council.

This year there are six representatives running for the two positions available to Ward 2, including incumbents Kim Krushell and Ron Hayter.

Fearless Fred (100.3 The Bear FM) was chairing the question period, where important issues such as environment, transportation and affordable housing were addressed. There were some issues that all of the councillors held common ground on, most notably the LRT expansion up to NAIT in the course of the next few years.

Willing to talk

Although everyone was willing to talk about it, and how it was an excellent idea, it seemed that few had taken not only an in-depth look into the feasibility of the expansion, but were also actively involved in it.

Kim Krushell stated she is currently working with the ETS (Edmonton Transit System) and various city departments to bring about change, including the Donate-A-Ride, which helps provide transit access to the needy, and spoke knowledgeably concerning the LRT expansion.

Jabin Coulette is strongly advocating increases to security on our existing transit system, but alas, was somewhat unrealistic on his goal of having the LRT to NAIT in the next three years.

Ron Hayter was very clear in his statements that LRT coming north was more than just in the plans, he is "fighting to make it a priority."

Kerry Hutton's priorities include review of the management overrun on projects, shutting down the municipal airport for affordable hous-

ing and lobbying the government for funding overpasses on Yellowhead Trail.

Now, while the city has a 50-year contract with the Airport Authority to maintain service at the Edmonton Municipal Airport, it was stressed by the incumbent councillors that the difficulty of breaching this contract could be looked at.

Other contenders, such as Shelley Tupper and David Loken, were quiet on some issues, both finding themselves on the same platform of maintaining existing housing and focusing on keeping the city green. There seemed to be a disparity in information between some of the up-and-coming candidates and the incumbents from last year, the latter came very prepared for the forum and even the most critical members in the audience had to say, "They knew their stuff."

Seasoned

Kim Krushell, Ron Hayter and David Loken all had the air of seasoned politicians, explaining their strategies to obtain real funding from the provincial government that were realistic and politically sound.

Jabin Coulette spent a great deal of the debate trying to defend his 1% levy on new communities, while Shelley Tupper, a NAIT graduate, made a strong point about a focus on the transit grid and not just the LRT.

The municipal election takes

place Monday, Oct. 15 and student involvement is critical in this election as more of the serious issues in the city target the demographics of those currently attending NAIT.

Mercury linked to industry

EDMONTON (CUP) - New research is suggesting a powerful link between atmospheric mercury, and increased mercury levels in fish. Now, the researchers are calling for increased regulations on mercury emissions from industry.

According to a new study by an international contingent of researchers, the mercury showing up in fish comes from factory emissions produced on dry land. The group of 24 North American researchers includes Vincent St Louis, a University of Alberta professor of watershed biogeochemistry; and Jennifer Graydon, a PhD candidate in biological sciences.

Vincent St Louis, a watershed biogeochemist from the University of Alberta, explained that until now there was no study definitively linking higher levels of mercury in the atmosphere to higher levels of mercury in

Instead, he said, legislators pointed to other causes for the rise in mercury found in fish.

"For example, climate change. If a lake's warming up, it increases the microbial activity that converts the [type of] mercury in rain to the [type found in fish]," St Louis said. "So said, 'Well, it's climate change causing this mercury problem in fish,

how much mercury we're putting out into the atmosphere."

The results finally link atmospheric mercury emissions to mercury in fish, he

"When you burn coal, coal has

a lot of mercury in it. So, you burn coal to produce energy, for example, at Lake Wabamun. The mercury goes up in the atmosphere," St Louis said.

This mercury in the atmosphere then turns into a form of ionic mercury captured in rainfall. Rain falling into lakes and streams then comes into contact with bacteria that convert the ionic mercury it into methyl-mercury.

From there, the methyl-mercury finds its way into algae, then into fish, and finally into humans that eat these

To prove the complex cycle, the group of researchers went to the Experimental Lakes Area in north-

To make sure that any rise in methyl-mercury levels in fish in this of this new study Lake Wabamun. The lake was due to this increase in inorganic mercury and not any other factors, they used an U of A biogeochemist easily identified

And, as Graydon pointed out, mercury does quite a bit of harm in living

form]," St Louis said.

"[It mostly has] neurological effects: stumbling, slurred speech, blurred vision, [and], in the very worse scenarios, total neurological death," she said.

As a result, Health Canada advises people to limit their consumption of fish known to have high mercury levels to no more than once per week.

However, according to St Louis,

despite the fact that ingesting mercury has long been known to be harmful, mercury emissions have remained, until now, either unregulated or under voluntarily regulations.

He said that this is because there was previously little proof of mercury emissions from factories affecting mercury levels in the human diet.

St Louis now hopes that, in light of these results, the lack of regulation will change on an international scale, noting that mercury emitted from one country often ends up in the lakes and streams of another.

"Politicians used to say, 'We can't enforce these regulations because there is no direct link," St Louis said. "Now they can't say that because there is a direct link. Now it becomes the argument of, 'If we do remove mercury from the emissions, it will cost all this money and cost all these

"In the acid rain days, they actually said the exact same thing: 'This is going to cause a loss of jobs.' It didn't. It really didn't. It actually pays off for industry to lower their

St Louis suggested that one factory could benefit by selling their emission credits to another factory, and that capping mercury emissions might even pay off in other ways.

"If you start looking at health benefits and things like that, those are big payoffs that are never accounted for in statements of the cost associated with putting in regulations."




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Volunteers off to the bowling lanes

Well Heather, if you just gave away a trip to Mexico, I'm sure the next idea will be just as





All in all, thanks to our security peeps, we can worry a little more about other things like exams, global warming, and why there was an Irishman for every fifth line.





Raising the bar

As we start a new year here at NAIT going forth into midterms, NAIT has outlined and is executing many new initiatives and policies that will raise the bar on our institution.

The President's Council outlined this year's priorities, and at the top of the list was academic delivery and development.

Also topping the list are facilities, welcome news to students and staff. As our campus grows, we need the facilities to support that growth.

"As we are painfully aware, we are soon going to run out of space. Even programs in newly opened facilities are already increasing the amount of students they are training, such as Instrumentation Technology apprentices growing from 448 to 720, and Millwright Technology from 750 to 790. Add to that the space issue for many other programs – including our support groups – and it becomes more important than ever to realize our 10-year campus development plan," says a news release on NAITLine.

Also worth noting is that our institution is moving more into the area of applied research. Strategically this will help us further the programs such research relates to, while establishing NAIT as a leader

But outlining priorities is just the beginning. Our institution is 46% government funded, with our operating costs expected to cost \$284 million; it is evident that corporate sponsorship has proved to be a mutually beneficial alliance as most recently shown by the \$1 million donation by Imperial Oil for instrumentation labs and Aboriginal initiatives.

But as our institution grows, sustainability is key. This is why NAIT has hired a sustainability officer, and also why EcoNAIT is going a long way to making our institution more environmentally friendly.

For example, EcoNAIT's tip of the month suggests that if NAIT's roughly 2,500 staff turned off their computers at the end of the day, NAIT would save \$92,500 a year and 1,250 tonnes of carbon dioxide, equivalent to removing 227 cars from the road for a year.

What it really comes down to is our institution is progressing by leaps and bounds, which in the end will make your degree worth its weight in gold.



Margaret Marean, student counselling

I'm feeling really overwhelmed and sometimes I feel like quitting. Mid-terms aren't even here yet. I didn't expect school to be this stressful. I also have a part-time job. What should I do?

Coming to NAIT is a big adjustment and a lot of students are surprised at the amount of work as compared to high school, and at the heavy class schedule as compared to some post-secondary

Often students have parttime jobs and one of the first questions to ask is: Do I have to work and, if so, could I work less? You may be able to access loans, awards or bursaries, or get financial help from family members. You may also be able to cut down your expenses. If not, is it possible to ask for days off before mid-terms?

Here are some other questions you might need to

- Are there other commitments I could let go of?
- Do I have good time management? Using a daytimer, prioritizing the tasks you have to do and making a daily or weekly schedule can help you budget your time effectively. Working on your priority tasks first and breaking major tasks into achievable chunks makes them seem less overwhelming. Allocate your study time wisely by planning a study schedule for mid-terms and finals well in advance.
- Am I organized? Taking the time to organize your study area and your binders and study materials can save a lot of time and stress. Organizing yourself the night before reduces stress as well as helping you

to sleep more soundly.

- Am I being realistic? Perfectionism, comparing yourself to others and negative self-talk all increase stress.
- Do I have a good support network? Understanding friends and family members are great outlets for stress. You might also need to look at whether there are unhealthy relationships you need to let
- Do I have relaxation techniques that work for me? Deep breathing, music, humour, yoga, meditation, exercise, muscle relaxation and visualization are all techniques you can experiment
- Am I taking care of myself? Relaxation techniques are helpful but if you aren't getting enough sleep, eating properly and having some fun, stress is going

to build up. Caffeine, junk food and smoking can also make you more susceptible to

The film is fairly unbiased, but Gay marriage and drug policy a leftist lean toward the above-mentioned issues does shine through, which may put off some of the more




Intriguing is the best way to describe the next song on the album. Picture almost has a jazzy feel to it, and its definitely worth checking out.
