

So, if you would like to experience a fine dining experience that isn't too hard on the



This year the Respiratory Health students took on the massive campaign, and they did great. They put their hearts and souls into it and it showed. I have nothing but love and respect for their efforts and valour.

Why is it called Shinerama? Well, simply put, the fundraiser's original focus was shining shoes. Nowadays, the model of shining shoes is a little outdated, but money is easily raised by exchanging balloons, toys, pens and other swag for donations, in addition to washing cars. Even though the campaign was largely successful, participation could have been better. Compared with last year's \$11,000 take, Shinerama '07 raised \$7,000, with about 100 people shining; half of last year's volunteer turnout.

In the end, everyone did NAIT proud, and all had a (welldeserved) killer celebration after at the Ranch. We are another step closer to destroying CF and a stronger community for such an effort.

What did disappoint me is that the turnout could have been better, but again, we did great considering the turnout. But I feel it could have been advertised better, even though they did a great job of it, and they could have used help in getting the word out.

Amazing progress

It's awesome to see such amazing people come together and fight a disease that eats away at people's lives. As a society and a community, it makes us stronger when we unite to find a common solution. Looking back, in the 60s the average lifespan of someone with CF was about four to five years, and now it's 37. That's amazing progress!

If we all stay the course, I am optimistic that one day we will conquer such diseases. In the future, we may even look back at them as relics and simple problems our society once faced and then gloriously conquered, simply because we were motivated by a common goal and worked together to achieve it.

Ask A Counsellor:

Do you have a question related to personal, academic or career choice concerns? We will be running regular columns in the *Nugget* to answer questions submitted by students. All submissions are confidential. You don't have to include your name. Send your question to counselling@ nait.ca or drop it off in person at Student Counselling, Room W111-PB in the HP Centre.

How do I know if I should see a counsellor?

If you have a personal, academic or career concern that is important to you, then it is probably worthwhile to see a counsellor. Often students think they have to have a severe problem before booking a counselling appointment. In fact, our main roles include helping you to resolve personal concerns before they become too overwhelming, assisting you with identifying and resolving study skill problems and offering guidance if you have not yet made a career decision or are questioning your program choice.

Some of the most common reasons that students see counsellors include concerns about poor marks, difficulties concentrating, exam stress, career indecision and personal concerns such as difficulty adjusting to NAIT, depression, anxiety, relationship problems, feelings of hopelessness or thoughts of suicide. As counsellors we have the expertise to help you work through issues that are bothering you.

Sometimes having the opportunity to talk to someone who is not personally involved can be very helpful. If we can't help, we will refer you to someone who can. If you think counselling might benefit you, please feel welcome to book an appointment to help you decide whether further sessions would be of use.
