# Teach an

**Teaching English** as a second language offers opportunities

Perhaps you are dropping out of your program. Perhaps you are being thrown out. Perhaps you have committed an illegality of such monstrous proportions that you need to leave the country.

Possibly (and hopefully more likely than the last possibility) you have simply been searching for a means of having a year of adventure after graduating from your program (and before locking yourself into your carefully chosen career, 25 to life).

Whatever your current situation may be, there is a way to curb depression after failure, to get yourself out of the country, or to provide sought-after adventure! It is called TESOL.

### Blank stare

Judging by the blank stare I am imagining upon your face, it is necessary to elaborate. TESOL (Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages) was actually founded in Edmonton, and has now spread throughout Canada and the world. You know that huge sign you see while cruising down Whyte Avenue that says "Teach English Overseas" in huge, bold letters? That sign is situated on the side of the Global TESOL College.

The general idea is that you can learn how to teach English, and then choose from over 85 countries. Not only do you get to choose which country you'd like to teach in, (which contributes to the determination of your pay rate), you also get to decide the amount of travelling you do while you are abroad, as well as the type of teaching in which you want to specialize.

During a passionate recount of her experiences, Mauve LaFleur, who is the facilitator of the Global TESOL College in Edmonton and who has spent nearly a decade abroad, enthusiastically explained how " ... you get to design the job that you want."

No teaching experience is required, although as in most things, every little bit helps. There are a variety of programs to choose from, which can be completed online, through correspondence, or in a classroom.

Each program includes the Foundations TESOL course, and one or more specialization courses of your choosing. The specialization courses include Teaching Children English (part of which includes creating games to play with the wee little tykes!), Teaching Medical English, Tutoring English, as well as 13 other options.

The Foundations course is a . ve-day commitment, set after school hours and on weekends. You have the next six months to complete the specialization course(s) you choose, which average 60 hours each. Admittedly, it would be quite difficult for a full-time student to tackle this, but it may work well with a part-time student's schedule, or be completed during the summer.

### Voila!

Then voila! After finishing your program at NAIT, you could be on an exotic adventure in Puerto Rico! And graduates from the program are guaranteed an overseas job, so lose no sleep over the idea of being a desperate and jobless TESOL graduate.

Not to mention when you get back, the line "Travelling the globe, expanding my knowledge of worldly culture and teaching English to small children," is bound to impress on a resume! (Oh, and I was just kidding about this being a good way to escape the country after committing a serious offence ... I'm pretty sure it would take

The NAITSA Senate recently ended an ongoing debate over the executives' salaries, voting for a sorely needed pay raise.

Considering the current cost of living throughout the city, it becomes very hard for the executives to work a full-time job while being paid under the current minimum wage. The Senate and executives agreed that change was needed, given how long it has been since the last pay raise was

awarded.

The Senate's finance committee chairman Terry Chiasson adds:

"The executive are very deserving of an increase in wages. The economic reality in this province is that wages are just not keeping up with

cost of living, and it being said that, they have not had an adjustment to their wages in the last two years that it is sorely needed."

The debate was posed to the Senate in late November, and was passed to be implemented for the new executives after the next election. So to any people who are considering running in future elections, this is yet another incentive for you to get out there and make a difference.

# **Locker theft a growth industry**

Security has been busy coping with locker break-ins over the past couple of weeks, leaving student leaders concerned.


"I don't feel that there is enough security to protect students' property or to identify those responsible for thefts or other crimes," says Lisi Monro, VP Academic of NAITSA.

According to security officials, the locker break-ins are in mostly low-traffic areas around campus. Also, specific articles you have in your possession may make you a target because, in many cases, before the break-in happens, there is someone watching you put the item in your locker. Such things as laptops and other expensive electronics are examples of targeted items.

Security feels that basic prevention and common sense can help with stopping locker theft: Avoid bringing valuables, keep your combination confidential, use a good lock and make sure no one is hanging out and watching you place valuables into your locker.

If someone looks like they aren't a NAIT student, or is acting suspiciously, call security (471-7477) and at the very least they can identify if the individual is a student here.



# Buying a PC

Buying a new PC can be a little bit challenging, especially for the newb, so let's look at what you need to consider before buying.

The most important questions to ask yourself are: how long do you need this PC, and what you will use it for. These will help you determine how much money you need to invest.

If your needs are simple, then you can buy a less expensive machine. Even if you need something that's more powerful, you don't necessarily need the top-of-the-line machine.

Luckily, the value associated with your computer isn't measured by the dollar sign attached to it. Go mid-range with the technology you buy, and you're generally in the area where you're not paying for the name on the box, nor for a useless piece of junk.

When selecting your technology, weigh the cost against the benefits. This is a good way to help make sure you get the features you need.

When selecting a brand, do your research and look for reviews from professionals and customers.

This can be as simple as Googling

see what other customers think and how the product measures up with your needs.

Warranty and support are also important, although generally desktops don't need extra warranty. But big screen TVs and laptops should have all the extra warranty you can get.

For TVs, it's because packaging and then shipping back a 40-inch LCD TV to Korea for repairs isn't cheap.

For laptops, their portability can take away from their lifespan, especially when it comes to the screen, casing or ports.

Ports on laptops can be finicky after some wear, and they can become loose, worn or dysfunctional unless plugged in at a certain angle. When plugging something into your laptop, make sure you plug it straight in and never pull on the cords.

Nowadays, no matter what machine you buy, do not settle for less than 1 GB of RAM. I recommend 2 GB because everything ships with Windows Vista and Vista is a hog when it comes to RAM.

If you intend to hook up your TV to your new computer, make sure it comes with a video card. Most video cards have TV Out in the form of S-Video. That form isn't the best quality, but it will get the job done.

If you want to take the high definition route, make sure you get a video card with HDTV Out in the form of composite.

Most desktops come equipped with surround sound capability. You can hook it up analogue and get up to 7.1 surround sound out and a sound system starting at \$50.

Or you can go for the digital out and plug it into a receiver and get fully digital full surround sound. Both have the same result but the latter option is pricier.

If you're hardcore and want to build a custom system, as previously mentioned be particular on manufacturers, especially for your motherboard or hard drives.

The motherboard is the main board everything is connected to, so if that dies, it's a painful and generally costly procedure to get it fixed. The hard drive can be just as bad or worse. It holds all your data, so if that goes, well, you might just lose everything.

The brands I recommend for motherboards are Intel, Asus and Gigabyte; for hard drives go with Seagate. They have the best warranty system and their drives are tough as

Finding or building the right system can be a time demanding experi-

ence, but pays off a lot, whether it's for work, leisure or both. Do your homework, and you might find that your next machine is just as awesome as you hoped.


### **Dell pulls plug**

In a desperate attempt to cut down costs and consolidate customer service, Dell closed down its Edmonton call centre, laying off approximately 900 employees. The move comes after EEDC (Edmonton Economic Development Corporation) gave Dell \$1.1 million and a land-lease agreement of \$1 a year for 20 years.

Dell currently has 25 call centres around the world, and announced in 2006 that they'd spend over \$150 million to hire more workers to respond to rising customer complaints.

Last week's layoffs are a part of Dell's plan to cut 10 percent of its work force (8,800 jobs over 12 months), which Dell announced last May. Dell also scrapped a plan to create 1,200 jobs in Ottawa. With no end to the layoffs in sight, it seems working for Dell is not an option for most people in the near future.

### Locker headache

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

Having been assigned lockers in the basement of NAIT, our program (Medical Laboratory Assisting) has quickly come to the realization that our belongings are not safe. Three of the downstairs lockers have already been broken into within the span of a week and a half. It is annoying and rude enough to have one's wallet stolen, but add the removal of one's backpack and corresponding coursepacks/textbooks and the phrase "kick me while I'm down," comes to mind. Especially considering coursepacks cannot be returned for a monetary refund and therefore are useless to anyone outside the specific program.

These incidents bring an obvious question to mind: What is the point of having a locker, if it is unsafe and not recommended to leave anything in it? It is very impractical and cumbersome to cart all our textbooks, binders, jackets, scrubs, shoes,

etc. to all our classes. A locker is required, therefore extra security precautions should be taken to ensure our belongings are kept safe.

Some suggestions we came up with would be to train security cameras on the banks of lockers that have been targeted, as well as any other areas that don't see a lot of pedestrian traffic. An added relief would be the knowledge that security guards are making a scheduled trip to the basement every 30 minutes or so. # NCAT concerns won't go away

What is the nature of corporate sponsorship? Well, in the name of professional development, it is typically money in exchange for a larger educated workforce.

On the other hand, what is to be expected of corporate dollars when used as a provision for educational institutions? Usually, and that term is used loosely, it arises out of a need to create or maintain structures that cannot be taken care of with campus funds alone. However, a big shiny sign with the company's name on it seems to be the real payoff. Simply said, when money is needed, big business will and can deliver.

Whether the funds are divvied up as a onetime lump sum or given as payments, it does still come. Right? Comments from certain student populations within the NCAT building seem to have a questionable tone.

In 2005, a donation of \$1 million was directed to NAIT president Dr. Sam Shaw. This donation helped create more opportunities for apprenticeship training and an advanced facility where students could learn all aspects of steel fabrication and installation. May I say "Mo' money, mo' problems." Yes, I will, and yes, I did.

With many varities of aesthetic problems, the NCAT building proves Biggie's point. Concerns are in the air about the basic structural requirements that piece-by-piece make up this gift building. Cracks in non-tempered

glass windows are creatively and very temporarily fixed with Red's very own household adhesive ("if the women don't find you handsome, they should at least find you handy"). "The window tends to have a wobbling effect. If it did break, the glass could shatter right into the atrium," said one student.

The following is a list of concerns from students who take classes in the NCAT building. Then there is the issue of unsecured, unfinished rooms containing equipment and open access to control boxes and wiring. Now to answer: What is the nature of corporate sponsorship? At the risk of egging on a riotous, anti-establishment mob, where are the maintenance funds? And exactly how much duct tape can you buy with corporate money? I guess just enough to bind the higher expectations of paying students.






> the game. The Ooks went to the dressing room with the momentum in their favour and a score of 1-0.





I've said it before – if you missed out on Freeze Over, you missed out on a lot. The unique plus to a NAITSA-run event is that it is fun for everyone, regardless of what they're coming into the event with.

Take Blake Berglund of the New Weapon, for example. Normally the band's lead vocalist, Berglund was working double-time as a bassist that night as well.

"Our bassist is sick, you know. I figured I could probably figure the bass out, but I'd never played the bass for our songs before. So we ended up playing only two songs in soundcheck and then it was time to go. I wasn't 100 percent sure what I was doing, but we had a pretty good set anyway."

Playing in a college arena is something new for the band Social Code, as well.

"We've never played in an arena before ... there's hockey players everywhere, dancers doing the hand thing ... what is that? And people hanging from the roof. It's crazy business,"

says lead singer Travis Nesbitt.

One would think that with so many young, male musicians around, it would be a dream come true for NAIT's female population. According to Berglund and Nesbitt, that's not so

"We don't go for the groupies. We have this term – groadies. They're the girls that love the band and would be sweet to hang out with after the show, that "somehow" end up helping us reload our gear into the van. Groupie plus roadie equals ... groadie!" explains Nesbitt.

"Do you bring your partner with you to work? No. Tours and shows are the same. But Morgan (Gies) does get all the hot chicks, anyway."

Blake Berglund has a slightly different take on the groupie situation.

"You don't want to let the girls down, or have them be disappointed, but why fool around on tour just to come back home to an empty place and no one to call? It's not a good situation. Sure, there are plenty of girls that like our music that we definitely hang out with, but nothing happens there."

Berglund also says that while his job title is musician, he works longer hours than one would expect. It's an 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. workday on average for Berglund alone. The job is a tough one, but Berglund says Sundays are his day off.

"Sunday ... Sunday we don't touch an instrument at all. For me, it's a go-to-church and resting day. In the summer, sometimes it's Saturday, too."

"Right now, the days are so long and we are working at it so hard because we really want to establish a good, strong, lasting home base of support. Fans mean everything. They're what really makes or breaks a band."

Have you ever felt frustrated with trying to learn the material in a course, while noticing that other students seem to be quickly catching on to what the instructor is teaching?. One reason for this can be a clash between your preferred learning style and the teaching style of your instructor. Understanding your learning style and applying the information to your academic work can help you "learn how to learn" more effectively and improve your academic performance by building on your learning strengths as well as helping you to develop a wider range of learning

One inventory that has been used by many college students is the Index of Learning Styles developed by Dr. Richard Felder and Dr. Barbara Soloman. You can complete this web

based questionnaire at: (http://www. engr.ncsu.edu/learningstyles/ilsweb.

After completing the online Index of Learning Styles questionnaire, you will immediately be provided with information on your own learning preferences on four continuums, including active/reflective; sensing/ intuitive; visual/verbal; and sequential/global (detailed below).
