Break-in foiled

A suspect has been arrested after an attempt was made to break into the Bistro in the Annex building overnight on Tuesday, Feb. 26.

NAIT students in the Annex were confused and concerned on the morning of Feb. 27 when they found their cafeteria closed off and a trail of blood clearly visible behind police tape.

Concern heightened for some students who had been asked to leave the building the night before. According to students interviewed, this is an uncommon event for the Annex.

"People were in rooms, work-

ing on homework they needed VP Academic, Lisi Monro. equipment for, but security came in around 11 p.m. and shut it down. I think the other room (occupied by students) was arguing with the guard, but they eventually left, apprehending the suspect ... after too," said Soheil Ghorbaninezhad, a student who had been in the Annex until roughly 11 p.m. the night

"It was surprising (being told to leave the building), because I've been there till ... well, I've been there real late before," said Ghorbaninezhad.

going on circulated among students the next morning, Edmonton police were carefully investigating

"My understanding is that a suspect attempted to break into the Bistro overnight, and in the attempt to do so was injured on some window glass – which was why there was blood splatter fairly evident to students in the hallway," said NAITSA

According to NAIT security, the suspect was apprehended just outside the Annex building.

"Security did a great job in the break-in attempt," said Monro.

"It's good to see that they were on top of what was happening that evening, and that we don't have this individual continuing to be around our campus and NAIT students."

Despite the excellent work done in the wee hours of the morning on As speculation about what was Feb. 27, some students expressed surprise at the impressive presence of NAIT security in the building during the Edmonton police investigation.

The Tories were handed a huge victory when Alberta went to the polls on March 3 to select a new provincial government.

"It's not how long you govern, but how well you govern," said Ed Stelmach in his victory speech, as a packed

and cheering crowd . Iled the room. Stelmach cited the strength of the party and its optimistic plans on moving forward for the win.

NAIT students had their own opinions about the election.

"It's sad that no one voted," says Blair Rice, commenting on the voter turnout, one of the smallest in provincial history.

"I was in line for two hours just to register," complained Deana Reid as she saw people walk away from the lines due to the inconvenience.

This comes amid speculation that Alberta Elections could have run a better election. Specific concerns have arisen, such as the Elections Alberta website going down.

"From our perspective, the election and our role in it was a success," Teresa Atterbury (Elections Alberta communications liaison) told the *Calgary Herald* on Tuesday. However there will be a formal review of the election process soon, according to Stelmach.

Although some students here at NAIT don't feel this will affect them, the rest don't seem optimistic.

"I'm not happy.I'm sure tuition will probably go up again," says Jenna Mccoll, who is hoping our institution gets more funding for equipment.

But many just didn't see many other viable alternatives, leaving some frustrated.

"They (the Liberals) didn't represent themselves well, there was too much (trash) talking," says Graham Macdonald, referring to the attack ads and U.S.-style politics that frustrated voters.

Despite the current upsets and triumphs, Alberta has selected a new government and time will tell as to what a majority Tory government under Ed Stelmach will mean to this province.

Stay secure

Security and privacy are very important issues in today's personal and business computing.

The Canadian Council of Better Business Bureaus (CCBBB) estimates that consumers, banks, credit card firms, stores and other businesses lost \$2.5 billion to identity theft in 2002.

Identity theft and other security issues generally occur because of lax or non-existent protocols, the most common being a weak password. The solution is as simple as using a minimum of eight character passwords with numbers, letter and characters.

It's also highly recommended to

have different passwords for everything; for example, make sure that the password you use to log on to an online service is not the same as the email they have registered to you. Also, don't write down your passwords and keep them in obvious places; if you do, lock them up.

Good passwords are nothing when you don't log off, whether it's your profile in the NAITSA Computer Commons or your Facebook. It's also a good measure to close the browser after clearing the history, cache and cookies.

Secure communication is an absolute must when sending and receiving confidential data. For those who have wireless, please do not use it without some form of encryption, preferably WPA or WPA2. This makes sure that not only can no one log onto your network, but makes the information you sent hard or impossible to read and decipher.

Despite the convenience of wireless, most people don't understand the information is sent across the air. This gives anyone with malicious intent who is nearby and has the right tools the ability to capture or alter that

Shopping online can be a safe experience when done responsibly.

Use a trusted third party for payment such as Paypal when purchasing from eBay. It's a better alternative then sending credit card information to some guy in Hong Kong.

Also, never shop online unless the session is secure. The three main indicators are: being prompted to accept a security certificate, your address bar begins with "https://" instead of "http://," and also a small lock icon will show in the bottom portion of your browser window.

Keeping your private information private is the basis for ensuring good security. Communications claiming you won some bogus lottery that ask for your SIN, birth date and address are obvious things to avoid. Unfortunately, these wouldn't work anymore if people didn't fall for them, but peo-

Trusting your instincts when it comes to personal security is vital in today's information age, but no matter what you do, just remember you are only as good as your weakest link.

Student makes citizen's arrest

On Feb. 12, Matt Antwright, a first-year hospitality management student, was stunned and shocked to find an intruder boldly ransacking his personal vehicle on NAIT property – the top floor of the parkade.

"I made eye contact with a white male sitting in my vehicle ... I opened the door and pulled the male out of the vehicle and to the ground," stated Antwright in a written statement he provided to the Nugget.

March 10-13

"We walked down to the South Lobby where I came across two security guards. I told them that I had just caught this guy breaking into my vehicle and asked if they could assist me. I was told they were busy ... and that I should sort it out. The two security officers never offered me any assistance ... ," continued Antwright in his statement, adding that he was then forced to let the culprit go.

Jerry Hove, NAIT's security coordinator, said later that the student essentially "made a citizen's arrest ... citizen's arrests aren't exactly simple (for guards). You need facts," he said.

It must be determined if the arrest was just, he said.

"If it was, a guard can take over. Then a guard should call EPS and follow up with the correct recording process," Hove said.

United Protection Services, a

separate company that provides NAIT with its guards, said security firms have limitations on what they

"Our security - any security does not have the power to work on the problem, not the same power as a peace officer," stated Curtis Long of United Protection Services.

"This isn't the wild west, we don't tote six guns and hunt people down like criminals," he said.

y hat's off to the crook considerate enough to leave a blood trail for his pursuers to follow. Personally, I'd recommend breadcrumbs, or money, but if you can handle the dizziness that sets in after an hour or two of painting a blood-trail ... well, you're a stronger man than I, and good on you. If only everyone were so conscientious. The saddest

part of last week's break-in at the Annex – seriously, who breaks into the Annex? – is that it's less an indication of NAIT's rising crime rates than a sign of growing stupidity in the province. 
Funding reduced

That was the idea behind previous provincial government decisions to reduce funding to post-secondary institutions (and everything else but petroleum companies). Any educational institute seeking provincial funding would have to prove they were worth the investment before the government coughed up, putting an unreasonable amount of pressure on the institutions themselves, and their students. That legacy resonates through NAIT's battered halls, its run-down buildings, and even in its criminals, who, as previously mentioned, are getting more stupid and desperate. Yet despite the Klein government's approach to budget trimming (which, by the way, has resulted in skilled labour shortages in Alberta and huge student debt), NAIT has consistently trained the backbone for Alberta's economic strength.

Sudden splurge

Prior to Alberta's March 3 provincial election (thank you, two out of five Albertans who voted to give the Tories an almost mandate), NAIT noticed a sudden splurge of provincial spending. Not much spending, perhaps, but just a sniff of more to come, – a blood trail to the culprit, if you will – or so it was suggested. Of course, Premier Stelmach's budget didn't mention NAIT at all, and given the state of the Annex, NAIT needs a lot of money. In this instance, I won't even mention NAIT adminstration's plans for expansion. Instead, let's concentrate on what is, rather than what might be. Thus far, Alberta's short on trained labour in the trades, in technology, in IT and even in hospitality (as a province, we seem not to be very welcoming, despite a 500,000-person addition to Alberta's population). NAIT, the largest technological institution in the country, just can't keep up with the province's demands. Fewer people on the job translates into less production, and consequently less money. What's that, Tory government? Yes, I said less money. Was that a wince? Did you cut yourself on the broken glass of your fiscal dreams?

Too many NAIT graduates and current students have worked too hard making this province rich for another provincial government to run off with the swag, uttering protestations that we haven't proven ourselves worthy. I think we've proved our value, and it's about time that some of that surplus came back to NAIT, and by proxy, to NAIT students. Because, let's face it, the blood-trail the government leaves behind will never be its own blood.

Double gold at nationals

NAIT's Sun Yang and Dan Kai captured the CCAA women's and men's singles badminton titles at the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association National Championships, held this past week at Mount Allison University in Sackville, N.B. The singles titles were the first ever for the NAIT badminton program and the first CCAA badminton gold since 2002 when Lionel Chong and Austin Liaw captured the CCAA men's doubles championships.

Sun Yang was easily the class of the field, as she swept through the round-robin competition and the semifinals before taking out Jessy Sung from the BCCAA 21-8 and 21-10 to capture her first national title. Sun never let any opponent score more that 14 points against her. A first-year student from NaNing, China, Sun is

enrolled in the ESL program.

Dan Kai had a much tougher road to the gold medal. After losing his first round matchup to Ontario, Dan then won the rest of his round-robin matches to face the same Ontario opponent in the semis, where he won two close games to advance to the final against Kiran Bogavelli from British Columbia. After narrowly winning the first game 25-23, Dan dropped the second game 13-21 and in a winner-take-all third game, Dan rebounded to win 21-8 and capture his first CCAA national championship. Dan, like Sun, is a first-year student in the ESL program and hails from Xi'An, China.

Congratulations to coach Jordan Richey and both Sun and Dan on their outstanding seasons.


soft, soulful lyrics or with a whisper of a sweet, smoky something.

Spiderwick a fun family fantasy

Welcome to a very special edition of Back of the Rack, usually a look at lesser-know movies new on DVD. This week, however, it's a rundown of some of the movies that came out during the weeks the Nugget took off for Reading Week and midterms.

The Spiderwick Chronicles

Based on a series of youth fantasy books in the same vein as Eragon, Seeker, and that one about the wizards (Harry Botter? Something like that), Spiderwick Chronicles tells the story of a problem child who finds an ominous book in the attic of his family's new home. The book is a field guide to supernatural forces such as ogres and fairies, written by the house's previous owner, Arthur Spiderwick. The young boy, played by child star Freddie Highmore, and his siblings end up in an adventure to protect the book from the shapeshifting ogre Mulgarath.

Needing little makeup to play an

evil, gnarly ogre, Nick Nolte portrays the villain. Seth Rogen and Martin Short steal the show, though, as the voices of the two comic relief characters. The digital effects are not only impressive, but are also seamlessly meshed into the real world. Spiderwick is an easy, enjoyable family fantasy film, perfect for audiences with mixed ages. I certainly found it more enjoyable than the above-mentioned films based on children's books. Yes, even the wizard one.



Be Kind, Rewind

Jack Black and Mos Def team up to bring us the best feel-good indie-comedy since, well ... Juno, but whose counting? When Jerry (Black) gets magnetized after an illconceived attack on a power plant, he accidentally erases all the tapes in a community video store called Be Kind, Rewind, that Mike (Def) was left to manage. In an attempt to cover their asses, Jerry and Mike shoot their own version of Ghostbusters before a regular customer alerts the manager. Soon everyone in the nieghbourhood wants their favourite movie done in Jerry and Mike's silly, home video style. While Black's and Def's characters are goofy and amiable, the

majority of the laughs come from the footage of their half-cocked remakes. The film suffers a bit from choppy editing and inconsistent dialogue, but the quick-witted jokes and feelgood story make up for it. Be Kind, Rewind, coincidentally, would make a great movie to pick up on DVD. (Or you could just shoot your own.)



Jumper

While I wasn't expecting cinema gold, I went into Jumper expecting a decent, moderately exciting sci-fi distraction, on par with something like iRobot or Resident Evil. Even with the bar set low, Jumper still couldn't make that hurdle. Jumper follows David Rice, a young man who discovers he has the power to teleport anywhere in the world, but a secret organization lead by Samuel L. Jackson is bent on destroying him and others like him.

The movie basically writes itself, yet the filmmakers found a way to make one of the least cohesive and fluid movies I have ever seen. I'd hate to see what the book it was based on was like. The lead actors (and I use that term loosely) Hayden Christensen and Rachel Bilson seem to be competing to see who can put less emphasis and believability into their roles. There are one or two cool action sequences, and Sam Jackson's appearance doesn't hurt, but overall the movie was just directionless and hard to watch. This is one of the worst big budget movies of recent years.

I'm not even going to give this movie a star rating, since that would suggest it has some measurable value. Instead, it receives the lowest, most pathetic award one can receive. (Ironically, I got more than a few of these in junior high long jump.)

1 Participation Ribbon

Semi-Pro

While Semi-Pro is the best of the four straight sports comedies Will Ferrel has put out, it is definitely time to bench this shtick. Ferrel plays Jackie Moon, another dumb but cocky sports star. After his one-hit wonder "Love me Sexy," Moon uses his payola to buy the Tropics, a minor league Flint, Mich. basketball team. As the coach, captain, and owner, Moon attempts to bring his underdog team into fourth place so that they can merge with the NBA. The flick

follows two plots. The first is Moon's silly attempts to bring in a crowd, such as wrestling a bear at half time, and the second is the Rocky-like story of Ed Monix (Woody Harrelson), the team's ringer.

Ferrel delivers the laughs, and Harrelson and André Benjamin build the character development, and in the end we get a fairly funny and enjoyable flick. Unfortunately, it is nothing we haven't seen from Fer-



Motivation – and how to get it

Question: I was really motivated first semester and did really well. This semester I just can't seem to get going and I'm not sure what to do differently.

Answer: Students often feel less motivated in the winter term. You haven't had a summer break to get refreshed and winter is generally a time when we fell less energetic. NAIT isn't new and exciting

Here are some tips that might help get you back on track:

- Get into a routine. If you start setting aside the same time every afternoon or evening for studying, it will become a habit within a few weeks. You may have to force yourself at first, but you will end up accomplishing more.
- Make a daily "to-do list" a checklist of what you can realistically accomplish. Prioritize the items from most to least crucial and

always work on your most impor- cause guilt and de-energize you; tant tasks first, even if they are the most difficult or the longest.

- Make a schedule. Put clear time boundaries for projects and studying. Do your studying first so you can look forward to some down time or something fun later.
- Try studying in groups or with a partner occasionally. This makes studying more fun and you may be surprised at how effective it is.
- want to achieve before you sit down to do homework or to study (i.e. "by the end of this hour I want to accomplish ... "). This puts you in a competitive mode and stimulates you to stay motivated and
- Know your body rhythms. If you are a morning person, do your most important tasks in the morning - don't force yourself to do them at
- realistically concentrate (no longer than 50 minutes for most people) and make sure you take breaks when you need them.
- Get started on tasks early, the day you receive the assignment if possible. Tasks that are put on hold

getting started right away arouses your interest and gets your creative iuices flowing.

- Work on building a positive attitude. Self-statements like "I'm too lazy," "I'm a procrastinator" or "I can't do this" can become selffulfilling prophecies. So can statements such as "I am self-motivated" and "I love to learn."
- Visualize yourself being suc-• Specify a clear-cut goal you cessful. A clear picture of what success means can keep you going when your workload seems overwhelming.
 - Don't waste energy being negative and blaming yourself or others for how much work you have or for past failures. Negative energy makes it difficult to learn and to be creative. Put your energy towards accomplishing your goals
- Concentrate on your suc-• Evaluate how long you can cesses and build on them. Evaluate areas where you could have done better, learn from them and change them into future successes.
 - Surround yourself with positive, motivated people.
 - Set realistic standards. Being a perfectionist can de-motivate

even the brightest of students. Decide how much time and effort each assignment is worth and allocate accordingly.

- If you are feeling overwhelmed by a project or assignment, break it into smaller parts and focus on one part at a time.
- Set rewards for accomplishing difficult tasks or getting through a study period when you aren't motivated. Most people work best with positive reinforcement but for some people it is also helpful to set penalties for failing to follow through
- Give yourself pep talks remind yourself why you have chosen to continue your education and the long and short-term benefits this

- Make sure you have something to look forward to every
- And finally, take care of yourself by getting enough sleep, eating properly, exercising and having some fun. Motivated, energetic people have balance in their






