An exhausting 24-hour marathon to finish their culinary creations ended with massive victories at the World Culinary Olympics for NAIT's chefs. The chefs, all recent graduates of the Culinary Arts Program, flew to Germany on Wednesday to compete on Sunday, Oct. 19. They won five medals for their droolicious dishes; gold for Jack Lee, gold for Tang Pham, silver for Norman Brownlee, and bronze for both Jack Pelletier and Norman Brownlee.

Accompanying them were team captain/ instructor Vinod Varshney, several other culinary teachers, two students, and a NAIT communications team documenting this year's trip. They left Edmonton overladen with heavy Styrofoam coolers filled with food and meats pre-prepared at NAIT's kitchens.

Despite this, slicing, dicing and glazing the dishes kept everyone up from dusk till dawn.

"The pace was steady and relentless," said videographer and TV instructer Perry Thomas.

"The culinary team worked without sleep and very little rest ... "

Gold winner Jack Lee agreed. "Everyone was working over 24 hours straight," he added.

"There was no time to look around. We were all focused on our own dishes because time was running out very quickly that morning."

The prestigious competition, considered by many to be the most important event in this field, happens once every four years in Erfurt, Germany. Teams come from over 35 countries for a chance to showcase the best of their countries' cooking talent. Competition is fierce, and only a small number of entries even place. Lee says the stiffest competitors the team faced came from Norway.

While there, Thomas says the chefs stayed at "a nice little 2.5 star hotel in Erfurt," Hotel Sonja.

Thomas added: "There were some very stressful moments and some words were spoken. But, you have to expect that in a situation where people are under an enormous amount of pressure and are sleep-deprived."

Despite the pressures, Lee says everyone at the show was "friendly. Everyone was taking pictures."

The mouth-watering dishes included cured salmon appetizers, scallop mousse and stuffed calamari. The deserts included petits fours decorated as bills and coins.

But Thomas didn't get to taste any of the winning food. "A little known fact about the Culinary Olympics is

that the food is not edible," he lamented. "The plates are coated with several layers of a glazing liquid to preserve their appearance for judging. It's all about presentation."

Lee thinks his college turns out world class chefs because of "the support from coaches and everyone from the kitchen."

This is NAIT's second year in the competition, and plans are already underway for 2012.

To try gourmet dishes without the pesky glaze, book a table at NAIT's resident restaurant, Ernest's, which boasts the delectable expertise of graduating students.

International students will have centre

Bruce Belbin, associate vicepresident of Student Services, has provided some new information regarding the impending closure and relocation of the International Student Centre (ISC).

A story in the Nugget last week indicated that the centre would be closing in the near future and likely would not reopen until next fall.

Belbin wishes to clear up any misunderstandings that may have arisen over the issue.

"The current ISC will tentatively close in early spring, at a time when students will be minimally disrupted," said Belbin in

an interview. "The new centre will open shortly after as per our plan."

He added that it is important to note that the ISC staff will still be available to assist students.

Although we know the new location is to be set up in E-Wing, Belbin states, "no specific location has been identified yet, but it will be accessible and renovated to the standard currently enjoyed."

The ISC hopes that the relocation will move its patrons closer to the core of campus activity. The ISC intends to involve students in planning for the future of the



Windows 7 heaven?

Is Windows Vista done? Microsoft has announced at its Professional Developers Conference early this week that it plans to release a full Windows 7 beta early next year.

Microsoft also distributed a prebeta build to attendees, so that software developers can start getting an idea now of how Windows 7 will shape up.

"We are focused on enabling the creation of the next generation of user experiences that change the way we live, work and play" said Ray Ozzie, chief software architect at Microsoft.

Microsoft promises to deliver innovative new features while focusing on application and device compatibility as a response to some of the failed enhancements in Windows

Vista. Microsoft has also lost market share due to the fact that Vista hogs

Windows 7 promises to offer more choice in how users interact with their PCs, such as through multitouch gestures. With Device Stage, Windows 7 enables people to get more from the devices they use most often with their PC, such as cameras, phones and printers.

Windows 7 also promises to make it easier to use home audio-video systems and other networked media devices to play music, watch videos and display photos that reside on Windows-based PCs. Windows 7 will also offer more options than ever to customize and personalize Windowsbased PCs with styles that match the user's personality.

With the revolution of high speed internet, Microsoft also plans to offer office applications via the web. This will be offered to businesses through a hosted subscription and existing volume licensing program.

Windows 7 will also be integrated with the Live Service platform. Microsoft emphasized that its Live Services platform is the means by which products such as Windows Live, Office Live and Xbox LIVE deliver experiences that span beyond the level of a single PC, mobile device or the web.

Although all these enhancements and changes may sound like good news in terms of technological enhancement to some, some analysts see it as a panic.

When Vista was released, it met the market with much resistance, as did Windows XP; but those who resisted Vista had a good argument. It was a hog. Windows Vista meant that most computers had to either have major upgrades or be replaced altogether.

"Vista is bigger than XP. It's going to stay bigger than XP," said Steve Balmer at a Microsoft MVP conference. Vista was engineered to be flashy, with many bells and whistles, allowing the user to be "wowed" by the interface, but it needs a lot of horsepower.

Having a graphics intensive interface and a large kernel does not help business users who are trying to do

serious work. Those of you who are running Vista, the best tip I can give you is to turn off all Visual Effects features located in the performance settings under the advanced tab of system properties. With the flashier graphics turned off you will notice a sizeable performance increase.

As far as Windows 7 goes, stay status quo where you are. You may not be able to buy XP easily, but it doesn't mean you have to get Vista. The best is to stay with what works for you and let the market sort out the rest, or get a Mac.

Open letter for feedback

I need your feedback on the issue of locker theft problems we've been having on campus. NAIT, like any other public building with easily assessable locker storage, has a theft problem. NAITSA receives numerous reports from students regarding locker break-ins, and we are actively working with NAIT to advocate for increased security measures.

Information I received in mid-September, from NAIT Security, pegs the number of reported thefts on campus at 86 since last January. Mind you, it's now the end of October, and, when I originally requested the numbers there had already been 24 reported break-ins by September 16, so the problem appears to be

As I've been advised, there are areas that are definitely more of a target than others, such as E,F,G,H,J, and L buildings (you can locate these on any campus map).

That's not to say that other areas aren't hit, but it appears like that highest risk belongs to those areas that are in the older buildings, on hallways that have little foot-traffic during class time and to program areas that traditionally have more valuable equipment in their lockers (dental, electronics, etc.). Thieves seem to be avoiding areas with more visibility, like the HP Centre and the NCAT building, both of which are designed with more windows and include surveillance systems.

Of course preventative measures are always best and I encourage all students to be careful of what they're putting into their lockers. As

someone who's had two bicycles stolen from NAIT over the past two years I've realized that it's ultimately your responsibility to ensure your investment (books/electronics/clothes/whatever) remains secure

But, even the best locks can be broken and, sometimes it's just impractical to expect you to carry all of your materials from class to class and then home at night (or maybe not, I see more and more "luggage" style bags around

So, while NAITSA will continue to ask for more and better preventative measures I've been thinking of some ideas that I wanted your feedback on. Keep in mind these are just ideas and completely hypothetical at this point.

I'm considering the implementation of some kind of locker insurance policy that would allow students affected by theft the ability to recoup some of their losses and ease the strain on those that are already in a position barely able to meet their needs financially.

I've inquired at several insurance providers and what I heard was that, for the small claims that I'm looking to cover (less than \$1,000) the deductible would make the process to file claims ridiculously impractical.

So, I've been turned onto the idea of the Students' Association possibly self-insuring and operating the service internally. I won't go into too much detail on what this might look like (because the claims get a little murky for me). but, roughly, if you have your locker broken into you would have a report filed with security, and provide the SA with some sort of proof of what was lost, with certain things unrelated to class not covered.

What I'd like some feedback on is the need for this service:

- Is this something you'd like to see your Students' Association move towards?
- Is this a service that you think will be too easily abused?
 - Should your student fees go towards



The road to glory

The countdown is on for NAIT's own women's basketball player Dale-Marie Cumberbatch as she chases the ACAC record for top scorer.

Earlier this year, on Jan. 18, Cumberbatch made ACAC history, as she was the fastest athlete to score 1,000 points. This is an unbelievable feat as most top scorers in the ACAC have taken four full years to achieve that mark. It only took Cumberbatch a year and a half.

She continued her ascent in the ACAC record books as she passed Grande Prairie alumnus Jennifer Seemann for second place in ACAC career scoring during a 75-70 Ooks loss to the Grande Prairie Wolves on Friday (Oct. 24). Seemann's mark of 1,316 points in 110 games was surpassed by Cumberbatch in just 53 games as she recorded

Cumberbatch added 24 more points the following day as the Ooks lost 83-70 to the Wolves, while also averaging 9.5 rebounds, a 44 per cent field goal percentage, and scoring 25 of 31 free throw attempts through both games.

As of Oct. 30, Cumberbatch is sitting at 1,349 points. Top scorer Lisa Ozcan (Erickson) had 1,407 points before retiring after 80 games (in four seasons). With just 58 points between them, Cumberbatch looks to get the record in the next couple of games as she averages about 25 points a game.

While Cumberbatch has broken many records, this is the one that will last for a while as Cumberbatch has more seasons to go, many more records to smash. The Nugget will keep you updated with her recordbreaking run.

The women's team plays a home-and-home series against the King's University College this Friday with the home game here on Saturday. Game time is at 6 p.m.

> were more respectable for the Ooks as the period total was 17-12 in their favour.

The third period saw the Ooks get back on top, with an amazing give and go tic-tactoe play that would have made it on the highlight reels around town. Jiri Prochazka (Ales

Hemsky's childhood friend) passed the puck to Josh Butt, who played give and go with Shea Wilson. The Augustana goalie was caught off guard with the quick play, and the puck found itself in the wide open net.

A little later in the period, tempers started to flare as Ooks Kevin Reinholt was upended along the boards. The Ooks finished the period

with another three penalties.

In the end, Ooks head coach Terry Ballard and the coaching staff were happy the team escaped with two points.

"We played with a one goal lead and held them off the last 14 minutes. Our goalie played really well," Ballard said.

"We're happy with the result and give credit for weathering the storm of penalties."

Grande Prairie was a different team the next day, matching the Ooks' intensity from the night

If not for a late second quarter run, high-

"We saw their start as a great learning opportunity for us," Phillips said. "It showed us we can't take anyone for granted."

The Ooks returned to form in the third quarter, riding the strong shooting of Eger, Makasiar and first year guard Cyril Ashworth. With the Wolves pressing late in the fourth, Ashworth nailed a jumper with zero on the shot clock to put the game out of reach.

"We've got a young team, and we can't live on history," Phillips concluded. "We've got to build our own history here."

The team plans to take that mentality into their next game this Friday when they host King's University College at 8 p.m.







Sean B: In 2000, the Vagina Monologues came out and I was like one of six guys in the audience. I got the idea there to create a show for guys.


N: How is this show different than the V.M.?

The first thing about the game that you'll notice is there's no campaign. This one is strictly online. While the

game is still good, this is really disappointing. The PS3 has been out for about two years now and SOCOM is one of Sony's strongest exclusives.

While the campaign is gone,



everything about the multiplayer has been stepped up. If you've played any of the other SOCOM games, everything will be very familiar and if you haven't, it's very easy to dive into. You start by customizing your two characters with complexion, fea-

tures, clothes and weapons. From

there, you'll move to the lobby, where you can join a game anywhere in the world.

The game has six maps and several games modes like Elimination, Suppression and Demolition, with each bringing a different experience to the table. SOCOM is all about working with a team, so it gives a different experience than most online shooters. It's best to play this game with a headset, as communication is a very important part of your team's success. At one point, I moved into an alley to advance on an enemy camp when I was attacked from the back. Luckily, I had called for sniper support before I entered the alley and my teammate took out the enemy before any harm was done to me. Trying to play alone will get you killed quickly.

The sound in the game is great. Each weapon has its own unique sound and the voice commands have been rerecorded to a higher quality. The maps look very detailed but you'll occasionally run into small cases of screen tearing and frame rate drops.

All in all, I was satisfied with SOCOM: Confrontation but not completely blown away. It's the same formula

from the Playstation 2 versions of the game but with an audio and visual upgrade. The lack of a campaign was disappointing because I've waited two years for a new SOCOM and it wasn't exactly what I was looking for. It's a fun game that should hold me over until the release of a true SOCOM sequel.




So if you like Keane, then I recommend you pick this one up, folks, you won't be disappointed.

Guitar heroes in every living room

WINNIPEG (CUP) – Instrument in hand, the confident young man stands on stage gazing out at the masses, understanding that his countless hours of practice have all come down to

His instrument: plastic.

His stage: his parents' living room.

greatest Guitar Hero players to ever walk this earth."

He proceeds to play the hardest song in the game, a power-metal shred-fest called Through the Fire and Flames, without missing a single

The performance, posted on YouTube, has over one million views.

Since its introduction on Playstation 2 in November 2005, Guitar Hero has spawned its own culture of fans and fanatics.

EASY

Guitar Hero World Tour, the latest installment in the series, hit stores Sunday, Oct. 26.

The Guitar Hero series has been lucrative for Activision, the company behind the games. In April, Wired magazine reported that the franchise had sold 14 million units. That's amounted to \$1 billion U.S. in sales, online gaming magazine Edge-Online. com reported at the beginning of the year.

Daniel Koreen, store manager at HMV St. Vital in Winnipeg, expects Guitar Hero World Tour to be on the top of many shoppers' lists this holiday season.

"It was a huge seller for us last year. We're expecting it to do just as well as [Guitar Hero III: Legends of Rock]

did last Christmas."

The extreme popularity of games like Guitar Hero and Rock Band, however, is inspiring kids to play real guitars.

Steve Lagimodiere, an instructor at The Music Cellar, says he sees the game's influence in his classroom daily.

"I ask my students what songs they'd like to learn, and The boy stares into the camera and says: "I'm one of the around 75 per cent of them are from Guitar Hero or Rock

Band."

Aside from introducing bands to younger audiences, Lagimodiere adds, the game puts deserved attention on the guitar.

"I think it's positive because it keeps guitar alive," he said. "It brings guitar to the forefront. To me, as a teacher, I have more students who want to play."

Joey Landreth, a guitar instructor at Long & McQuade in Winnipeg, isn't as positive.

While he admits that the game is getting people interested in the

instrument, he says it can make aspiring virtuosos think learn-

ing the guitar is as easy as mashing a few buttons.

"It gives people a false perspective of what it takes to play the instrument," said Landreth.

What's worse is that students who excel at the game can develop a concept of rhythm that is completely different from playing a real guitar.

In order to score high points in the game, players hit the oncoming notes as they appear on the screen. That is, they are relying on anticipation in order to play the next note correctly, not on

an understanding of musical rhythm.

"When they actually

come [to lessons] and try to play something in the pocket with a metronome, they can't do it," Landreth said. "It's worse in people who play the game more, as it becomes a muscle memory issue. It instills a weird time-feel in kids."

With the widespread commercial success of Guitar Hero, bands, record companies and instrument manufacturers are getting on board the marketing juggernaut. Guitar Hero: World Tour features licensed recordings from bands such as Coldplay, Foo Fighters and the Guess Who. As with previous installments of the game, the characters play Gibson guitars.

While HMV's Koreen hasn't seen an increase in CD sales as a result of Guitar Hero, Long & McQuade salesman Mark London says that electric guitar sales have increased "somewhat"


"Kids aren't buying Gibsons, but they are buying Epiphones," London said. A Gibson guitar sells for about \$2,000, while an Epiphone looks identical and is a fraction of the

Hungry for the real thing, guitarists can now learn their favourite songs from the game in official Guitar Hero songbooks. Glen Hartley, the department manager at St. John's Music, has sold several copies of the book to parents.

TOP 10 TIPS

Managing procrastination

Procrastination is a habit and, like any habit, it can be changed. But you have to be persistent. Make it your goal to get schoolwork and other priorities under control and keep them there.

- 1. Recognize self-defeating patterns such as poor time management, indecisiveness, perfectionism and anxiety.
- 2. **Break major tasks down** into smaller pieces and take one small step at a time.
- 3. Either start with the most difficult or boring task (to get it over with) or with a very easy task (to get motivated).
- 4. Use the **five-minute method**. Commit to do something on the project for 5 minutes; after the 5 minutes decide if you're going to continue for another 5 minutes. (You almost always will!)
 - 5. Avoid saying "I'll start tomorrow."

Do something towards your goal right now.

- 6. **Get rested**. Fatigue is one of the biggest contributors to procrastination.
- 7. Do not reward yourself for procrastinating. Every time you do another activity such as watching television, visiting with friends, washing your car ... instead of working towards your goal you are rewarding yourself for procrastinating.
- 8. Incorporate positive **self-motivating statements** into your thinking such as "it is going to feel great to get this done" or "I know I can learn this material".
- 9. **Reward yourself for accomplishments**, and for completing steps along the way. Often the most effective rewards are your procrastination techniques. For example, if you procrastinate by watching television or phoning a friend use those things as rewards after you have accomplished your goal.
- 10. Challenge the faulty reasoning behind putting things off. Recognize that letting yourself get away with excuses is only fueling further procrastination.

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

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

Time to trash those dumb rules

There has never been a shortage of questions at NAIT. The problem was always deciding who to raise them with.

The Dumb Rules Committee, which has been allowing students direct access to the ears of the decision makers at NAIT, is again open to questions. The committee resumed sitting on Oct. 16.

The committee, which was set up to identify and revisit irrelevant rules and inefficient processes, responded to 66 concerns from students and staff last year. Questions from students were many and varied.

One question surrounded the use of Facebook in the Business Tower.

"Why is access to Facebook blocked in the Business Tower?" a student asked. "This is completely counter-productive since Facebook is a communication interface. I communicate with my group members through Facebook and it is needed."

The Dumb Rules Committee consulted with the dean of the school of business and together they agreed with the student.

Students in the Business Tower now have uninterrupted access to Facebook.

Lisi Monro, vice president of NAITSA and a member of the Dumb Rules Committee, believes the committee provides a wonderful opportunity for students to have their voices heard.

"As a student, it can sometimes be really difficult to get answers to questions or see change in the short time that they're in classes here. The Dumb Rules system is set up to efficiently and effectively deal with issues that are brought to its attention."

While every question raised goes directly to the attention of the committee, questioners do not always get the response they expect.

The student who suggested that it was wrong for latecomers to be locked out of class was told that such a decision was the prerogative of individual instructors.

"Different instructors have different tolerances to late students and utilize various techniques to deal with this situation. The decision to lock students out of class if they arrive late is made at the instructor and program level and is not a NAIT policy," the committee's ruling stated.

The student was advised to discuss this rule with his or her instructor or program chair.

Kevin Shufflebotham, chief of staff to the president and chair of the committee, believes the high student response stems from the frank and objective way in which the committee handles concerns

"At minimum, even if the policy or practice can't be changed, the committee will provide a rationale for its existence. The positive feedback that we've been receiving confirms this," he says.

To help improve its response time, the committee will be accepting student submissions only in the fall (Oct. 16-Dec. 5). Staff submissions will be accepted in the spring.

All submissions (see form above) will be confidential and the names of questioners will only

be viewed by members of the committee. Submissions must include your name and contact information. This will allow the committee to respond to you directly and seek clarification as required.

Questions may be submitted through the

Dumb Rules Committee website, which is accessible via the student portal.





Be safe at Halloween!

For Kids
