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

Minimum wage increased 5%

NAIT! It no longer matters that your tuition may be rising by 4.1 per cent! Because all you minimum wage makers are getting a five per cent raise. Nice. Alberta's minimum wage officially increased from \$8.40 to \$8.80. Hallelujah.

This will make Alberta second among the Canadian provinces with an estimated 20,000 minimum wage earners. Although it is expected that by May or June, provinces like though perhaps this recession isn't killing us Ontario, Saskatchewan and Newfoundland will all be on the rise. Ontario's minimum wage will lead at \$9.50 per hour this year, and it is estimated to rise to \$10.25 by 2010. In Canada, however, the hourly wage is quite high, with an average of \$23.90.

Employment ministry spokesperson Barrie Harrison, expressed the stress that comes with deciding about the minimum wage. Obviously there is pressure from both the employees and employers who really have two separate interests: One wants to make money, and the other doesn't want to lose it. Finding a happy medium is not a simple

"We want to ensure that Albertans earning the minimum wage are as protected as possible during these changing times," said Hector Goudreau, Minister of Employment and Immigration.

"While a vast majority of Albertans earn much more than keep on rollin' in the dough. the minimum wage, we can't forget about those in lower-income occupations."

Some employees don't really believe the 40 cent raise will make much difference in their bi-weekly pay cheques. However, those who have been with a company for over a year have seen some significant increases. Thinking back to 2007, Alberta's minimum wage was only \$7, and it jumped by one dollar over the next year. Since then it has been hiked almost \$2.

Although this is an attempt to keep up with the raising wages across Canada, it seems as all that much. This rate is much better than the wage throughout the Klein years. Then, the problem was said to be that we could not raise the minimum wage without killing jobs and the economy.

To put this into perspective, a full-time (40 hours/month) employee will receive about \$1,400/month before taxes. Before, at 40 cents less, he or she made about \$1,340/month before taxes. This is basically a \$60 increase, which may not seem like much, but to a student or single parent living on their own, this could make

or break their ability to make rent. The majority of these wage earners are between the ages of 15 and 19 and are working in the accommodation or food industry.

NAITSA budget Ok'ed

After months of hard work, the NAIT Students' Association Senate has approved its new budget. Work on the budget began in January and continued up until last week when the budget was accepted by the senate.

"It started with me and the great people on my staff and the finance committee, which is made up of five members of the senate," said Jon Hoffman, director of finance for NAITSA.

"The first part is to start tabulating where we stand on the current year and then seeing where we're at compared to last year's budget," Hoff-

"We get reports from directors of different departments to see where they're at, then we get input from the executive and after that is working with the finance committee to see what

With all the hard work that went into the budget you can expect to see some changes around NAIT campus next year. The first change that will take place is in the Nest. The kitchen will undergo a complete renovation, giving the kitchen

staff more storage, new equipment, and more prep and cooking space. This will lead some changes in the menu.

"The equipment in the kitchen is pretty old right now and that had created some inconsistencies, but with the new kitchen we'll be able to keep the quality high and bring some new menu items. Hopefully we'll be and more prep and able to appeal to some more people," said Hoffman.

Another change to the Nest will be the signage outside. NAITSA has budgeted to add an archway to the outside entrance of the Nest along with a new sign on the brick wall hopefully to attract more people to the location.

"The Nest is in a tough spot because it's not in a central location. A lot of people don't usually wander down there. I know our manager at the Nest usually

leaves 10 to 15 minutes when she does a job interview because it's hard to find," said Hoffman.

Along with changes to the Nest, the new budget will bring changes to the first week of the school. A new frosh leader plan has been put in place to help students connect with each other and take pride in

> the fact they go to NAIT. The plan is to put key leaders around areas on campus where new students congregate and help show them all the things that NAIT has to offer. Twenty seven leaders, three from each of the nine schools, will be selected and will attend a two-day retreat at the end of August that will build camaraderie among the leaders, create an understanding of what NAITSA does, build excitement for events next year, and bring

The new building fund is another interesting part of the budget. The budget now allows for a portion of student fees to be allotted to a savings fund over the next 10 years to be used on a new building or to update or renovate spaces on NAIT

Incident highlights security

NAIT campus served as the backdrop for the latest arrest by the special projects team from the Edmonton Police Service. At noon on Tuesday March 24, officers arrested an individual who was driving a stolen car full of stolen property.

According to a police release to Campus Security, the individual had no connection to NAIT, and it was a pure fluke that they were picked up near campus.

NAIT security head Jerry Hove spoke to this relationship with the EPS: "We do have a very good network with the community beat station nearby, and the security services at Kingsway Garden Mall ... we work together a lot on common issues."

Answering questions

In this particular incident so close to home, Hove said EPS was mainly concerned about answering questions the campus community might have about it.

"Of course, EPS couldn't release the names and particulars, but I can confirm that the individual had nothing to do with NAIT," said Hove.

Hove later said that the usual interaction between NAIT Security and the EPS occurs when EPS is looking for a student and needs help locating them on campus.

"Usually this is just for questioning, or if a student has been subpoenaed," said Hove, adding "this is a far more formalized process than what happened last Tuesday."

Facelift for security

Within the next year, this existing relationship with EPS will change as Campus Security gets a facelift.

"We will be building on existing relationships with EPS when the new peace officers are brought onto campus," said Hove.

When the new security force – to be made up of one inspector, four sergeants, and 16 peace officers - takes over security at NAIT on June 28, they will be able to enforce much more than the current security services are able to.

These new powers include the recently passed Tobacco Reduction act – so no smoking on campus, and the Trespass of Premise Act – which means that people who do not belong on campus can actually be removed from campus. Campus Security is still in the process of hiring the peace officers, and already has hired the inspector for the new force.

The peace officers will be responsible for all NAIT prop-

erty and attached roadways. They will continue to work with city police on area crime as it relates to the NAIT campus. Current security will still be contracted out to run the A/B parkade on the north end of main campus and to patrol both South and Patricia Campuses after hours.



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
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Onlive or Offlive?

Well, that's all for now folks. Hope you enjoyed this quick preview on the Onlive! Until next

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

An eager look ahead

First-year men's basketball coach Don Phillips has some ideas about taking the team to the next level in the coming year.

It often gets worse before it gets better. For the NAIT men's basketball team, that's a cliché they hope proves true heading into the offseason.

After a season of unusual and frustrating circum-

stances, the Ooks are looking forward to a fresh start next fall.

It was the first year for head coach Don Phillips, who was one of six full-time coaches hired by NAIT in their new approach to improving the athletic program.

The only downfall was that Phillips, a former NCAA and CIS standout, with coaching experience at the U of A and Paul Kane High School, took on a program

comprised of a talented young squad, but with less time to prepare entering the season.

Even with familiar faces from St. Albert like Evan Eger, Marcus Bennett and Klaus Figueiredo on the squad, it was an accelerated bonding process between players and coaches to start the season. Unfortunately this was complicated by a number of student athletes leaving the team at the start of the season.

"All of the kids that decided to join us and stick this turbulent ride out should be commended for the blood, sweat and tears they contributed to NAIT Ooks Athletics," said Phillips.

The praise was returned by brothers Cyril and Dennis Ashworth, who commented in this year's NAIT *Athletics Magazine*: "It's great to see a coach who loves the game so much. He makes us work so much harder."

It was this mutual respect that helped lay the foundation for a solid start to the season, not to mention the emergence of players like the Ashworths, who emerged from relatively low expectations to become impact players.

But by midseason, adversity struck. A coaching suspension, key injuries and the forfeit of five games due to student eligibility issues plagued the team over the remainder of the season.

Despite this they still made the playoffs and pushed the defending national champion Mount Royal College Cougars in two close games before being eliminated a

few weeks ago.

As for next season, Phillips cites a couple of key areas to improve upon:

For himself he plans on taking a more invested interest in off-the-court affairs in order to avoid another eligibility mishap.

"It is my responsibility to micro-manage my own program. It was a difficult lesson

to learn for a young coach and an even younger team," admitted Phillips. "But whatever doesn't kill you will definitely help you build character if you identify it, accept it and learn from it."

As for the team, he emphasized the need to mature, either by recruiting new players or developing the ones already here. He pointed to Mount Royal's recruitment of Craig Jantzen from Briercrest in 2007 as a key catalyst to their success.

The second is getting bigger in the shooting guard and small forward positions.

"In the crunch, this made it tough for us to score and defend bigger opponents," said Phillips.

He also pointed out a grim reality for Canadian colleges, citing the inability to offer full-ride scholarships to players like our NCAA counterparts. Regardless, optimism is present among fans, players and staff alike, in particular for the man at the helm.

"Rome wasn't built in one day, but I think what we have been able to build here in one year has and will serve as one hell of a foundation to continue to rebuild this program back into national prominence."

The worst is over – now for the good part.


Huh


4. Gambling

Play this one with a friend

Not too long ago Capcom brought out Resident Evil 5, a survival-horror game for the Playstation 3 and Xbox 360. Set in the fictional African village of Kijuju, you take the role of Chris Redfield and his partner Sheva Alomar. The story involves viruses, tentacles, mutated African people, and (as usual) umbrellas.

At the beginning, RE5 looks incredible and captures the essence of being in Africa. Then Capcom puts their spin on Kijuju as it progresses, keeping the experience fairly unique. The writing and acting are cheesy, but the story is very deep. It builds up on the previous RE titles and offers up insight on the whole series, so RE5 can appeal to a broader audience. The music throughout isn't memorable with the exception of the final boss

RE5's core gameplay is unchanged from Resident Evil 4. You still move around and stop to aim at the people you want to shoot,

but an enemy receiving five headshots, and still standing is pretty nuts. The main feature of RE5 is cooperative play, which you'll be able to play with a friend locally or online, which is recommended. Artificial Intelligence on enemies and allies is also very weak.


The inventory system, which has nine slots for weapons, ammo, etc. is broken. It's just the balancing. One herb takes up the same space as an RPG. It gets worse with the protective vests, because they take up a space even when you're wearing them! The cover mechanic is annoying, but the quick time events are exciting. The best part about RE5 is the boss battles, as they pack a sense of scale and challenge that keeps it exciting (unless there's an RPG). There are lots of extras, like mercenaries mode, the gallery, and the theatre.

Resident Evil 5 is a game which is frustrating and exciting at the same time. It has gone through a transition from survival-horror to

U of W bans bottled water

MONTREAL (CUP) - Last week, the University of Winnipeg became the first university in Canada to ban plastic water bottles on campus. An advocacy group is trying to do the same at Montreal's universities.

The ban at U of W came after almost 75 per cent of students voted in favour of it.

The ban is not being implemented just yet, because the university does not have enough water fountains installed on campus to serve the entire student population.

All containers

Once implemented, it will include every container from small, portable water bottles to the bigger gallon water containers.

Vinay Iyer, University of Winnipeg Students' Association president, says that realistically speaking, water bottles should be out of sight by January 2010.

Though he considers the ban a success, some students are a little upset about this new rule.

"They have a right to be angry, because they are just not informed," said Iyer.

Iyer says tap water is safer than bottled water because it does not boast the same toxic elements found in the plastic used for water bottles – something he said many students aren't aware of.

Tap Thirst, a Montreal-based project that lobbies against selling and consuming bottled water, is working with McGill and Concordia in hopes of eliminating bottled water on campuses at both universities.

According to a recent audit of the univer-

ty's waste. Concordia University alone sees 1.2 million bottles of water go through the hands of students and administration each year.

Getting the attention of administration at Concordia hasn't been the problem, says Laura Beach, Tap Thirst's co-founder.

The problem, she says, is that they're not following through. "A major obstacle is the lack of communication," said Beach.

On-campus associations such as

Sustainable Concordia have already adopted a "no bottle" policy. Beach calls this a sign of price of bottled water. Water is a free to purchase it."

"I am optimistic that things will happen and the ball will keep rolling," she said.

One obstacle anti-water bottle advocates have to overcome, she says, is how companies make people think bottled water is safer for them.

While city water is tested daily, companies don't test their water very often.

Louise Hénault-Éthier, Concordia's environmental coordinator, says water bottles are unnecessary.

Water fountains

"The quality of tap water in Montreal is really high," she said. "Bringing your own refillable container will allow you to have fresh, clean water available to you whenever you like, by simply refilling it at the water fountain."

The Students' Society of McGill University has already taken a step in banning water bottles in their building.

"McGill is committed to sustainable operation," said Dennis Fortune, McGill's Sustainability Director. "We believe we should be encouraging tap water."

Hénault-Éthier also points to the high resource, she says, and "we shouldn't need



TOP 10 TIPS

Steps to finding happiness

When I ask students who come for personal counselling what they want, many will say "I just want to be happy." But when I ask "What does happiness mean to you?" most don't have a clear definition. It takes some work but there are many things that you can do to improve your happiness immediately and throughout your life.

1. Define what happiness means to you. If you want something it is important to be clear on what it is that you want. What factors make up happiness and how will you know when you get there? (keep-

ing in mind that old saying 'happiness is a journey not a destination'). Does your definition depend on someone else (I will be happy when I meet the right partner) or something out of your control (I will be happy when I win the lottery) or something unlikely (I will be happy when my parents admit they were wrong)? If so, you need to rework your definition so that you are in control of your own level of contentment.

- **2.** Choose to be happy. Once you recognize that happiness is a choice, and that you can choose to react to things positively or negatively, you have taken a big step towards becoming happy. Give yourself permission to feel good and enjoy your life. Find things you are grateful for. Monitor negative self talk and change your language to be kind and forgiving to yourself. Look for silver linings in negative situations.
- 3. Take care of yourself both physically and mentally by exercising, eating regular, nutri-

tional meals and snacks, getting adequate sleep, taking time for relaxation, doing things you enjoy and having things to look forward to. By prioritizing self-care (doing things that make you happy) you are automatically fostering happiness.

4. Nurture relationships. Too busy to get together with a friend? Then chances are you always will be. Take the time to schedule in coffee dates with people you have neglected. Do kind things for others. Not only will this make you feel better about yourself – you'll probably get kindness in return.

5. Take control of your environment.

Surround yourself with happy, nurturing people, things you love, and an organized work space. Whenever possible avoid people or situations that cause you to feel stressed and negative. Evaluate whether your routine and lifestyle is working for you, and if not, what needs to change.

- **6. Laugh.** Don't take yourself too seriously. "Laughter is a marvelous medicine with no side effects. It is the great tranquilizer of life. In all stages of laughter, the brain releases endorphins, those feel-good compounds that increase your sense of peace and serenity. Laughter even stops hyperventilation, regulates digestion, blood pressure, and boosts immunity function." (From Be Happy: Tips to Banish Bad Moods by T.
- 7. Achieve. Find things you are passionate about and engage in them. Working hard and reaching goals create satisfaction. Procrastina-

tion might feel good momentarily but overall it creates discontent. Having long-term goals as well as realistic daily goals enhances satisfaction with life. However make sure your whole life is not about achieving goals. Balance is important.

- **8. Take risks.** Trying new things, even if it is just doing something differently, makes life seem fresher. Challenge yourself to learn something new every day or to take a risk
- **9. Don't worry.** Worry and guilt use a lot of mental energy and foster negativity. Try to stay focused in the present and use your mental energies by making the best use of your time and energy right now. Deal with concerns that are within your control and accept those that you cannot change.

10. You are OK just the way you are.

Perfectionists are usually disappointed in themselves and this leads to self-criticism which fosters more negativity. Strive to do the best you can under the circumstances and forgive yourself when it isn't

If feeling good is a constant struggle for you, or if you have other personal, academic or career choice concerns, it may be helpful to seek help from a professional. Uncharted territory of digital law

TORONTO (CUP) - Facebook offers its users a sense of confidentiality and privacy. Personal messages, private chats, and embarrassing photos are meant to be just between the user and their friends. But everything John Leduc considered private will soon be public.

Leduc is involved in a lawsuit over a car accident, and the defendant's lawyers claimed his Facebook page should be included as evidence. The judge on the case agreed, ordering Leduc to submit the contents of his page for trial.

This groundbreaking ruling is an example of the developing culture of digital law and privacy that first erupted on the Ryerson University campus last spring, surrounding the case of Chris Avenir.

Avenir, then a first-year engineering student, was accused of cheating for taking part in a Facebook study group that offered solutions and help on chemical engineering assignments.

Though one of his professors originally called for his expulsion, the ensuing media maelstrom and student outcry led Ryerson to rethink its position, and Avenir was allowed to stay at the school.

Cases like these, and others constantly pepper-

ing the news, will only increase as people's lives move further online and the disconnect between law and society grows.

"We're facing a generation gap like we haven't seen since the 1550s," said Mark Federman, a researcher at the Ontario Institute for Studies in

Federman says the last time a similar change occurred was the societal upheaval of the Renaissance, when great scientific discoveries shared the world stage with the likes of the Inquisition and

He adds everyone needs to be extra-cautious while in the midst of such social change.

Federman believes our digital culture increasingly leads us to conduct our private lives in public view on the Internet.

But how people behave in person and on the Internet is very different.

"Society is in a state of confusion," he said, pointing to what many students post on Facebook as a perfect example.

"Some of the people in the fogey generation would say: 'Be careful. Your employer is going to
