

NEWS&FEATURES Recruiting ... quickly

Last Thursday, March 12, NAIT held a unique Career Fair event in the conference room next to Common Market. It was referred to as "Speed Recruiting," an idea that Brian Wrightson, an instructor in Marketing and Management, came up with last month

"I just happened to hear something on the radio about speed dating and I thought, why not? So we made the transition to speed recruiting and got on the phone and got some employers" said Wrightson, who seemed very satisfied with how the event was going.

NAIT was looking to do something a little different with the Career Fair (which still took place in the

South Lobby) and speed recruiting seemed like a new, exciting spin on typical formats. Wrightson understands that the Career Fair is "a good concept, and it's a tried and proven one. This isn't, though, so we thought we would try and see what it would do for the students."

The hope was to allow both students and employers to generate as many ideas and interviews in one hour as they could.

It worked much like speed dating. A few employers were

five minute face-to-face interviews. Almost 30 students and

10 employers were able to participate over three one-hour sessions. Wrightson said that finding employers and students to participate was one of the easiest parts.

"We were having employers come to us saying they need people."

When asked how many students they might end up hiring, Wrightson replied, "hopefully everyone. Even if we just get to the second or third interview because of this, that is important. When I've been listening to the various employers, I'm regularly hearing, 'we have to talk again.'"

Dennis Schultz, a finance diploma course stu-

dent, was among the people in speed recruiting. Schultz said his experience was a positive one and added that the five minutes gave little time to get to know the employer: "You have to cut to the chase. You don't have much time even to introduce yourself and where you've been before. It's pretty much just exchanging

e-mails," he said.

Although the meetings were short, students felt it was an advantage to have that interview experience, and perhaps even a second

Three students from NAIT's Sheet Metal Manufacturing classes are about to make life a lot tastier for people who rely on the Boyle Street Community Services for support.

Ian Palnerchuk, Adam Brian and Sterrin Kereliuk, all students at NAIT's Patricia Campus, are making an industrial sized, stainless steel barbecue that will

be presented to Boyle Street Community Services when it is finished later this

Speaking about the yearly project, Jim Ripley, chair of the Sheet Metal Apprenticeship program, said he is very proud of the students taking part.

"This is not an easy project," said Ripley, as he discussed the intricate methods needed to get the BBQ "just

This is considered a cost recovery program, and usually one of the two industrial BBQs made each year will be sold off. This year, it was different. The dean of Applied Building Sciences, Peter Lawlar, asked if this time around one of the BBQs could be donated to the Boyle Street Community Co-op for use in their facilities.

As for the students, they are little nervous.

"I just want it to turn out OK," said Kereliuk, as the group took a break from working for the day.

"Today has been a tough day," added Brian, saying that some things aren't going perfectly on the BBQ. Brian added that the overall turnout of the project will be fine, this is just one of the usual bumps along the

All three of the students were happy that the BBQ will be going somewhere charitable.

From an instructor's point of view, it is nice to let

the students come out of the box with more custom type of work, although with the media attention this may generate, there is more pressure on the students.

"They're a little nervous, I think," said Ripley, noting that the students are likely more worried about grinding through and getting the project done, rather than the media attention at the end of it.

"That's the unfortunate thing, the students will likely not be around for when the BBQ itself is presented, as this classroom term ends on April 9," he said.

Ripley went on to say that the school may work to put on a media event the students can be part of.

"They are working hard on this, and deserve recognition for all their work," said Ripley.

The BBQ will end up being six feet long, made of 16-guage steel and have the NAIT logo right on the front of the lid.



World's greatest job

Grant MacEwan student Linda Hoang wants to win Australian competition

In the midst of a cold Alberta winter, many dream of visiting warmer climates, snorkelling by the Great Barrier Reef, surfing and enjoying the sun. Some even go so far as to take out a temporary work visa and visit the land down under for themselves.

For Grant MacEwan Journalism student Linda Hoang, this dream just got closer to becoming a reality. Hoang is one of the top 50 finalists in a competition for what is being advertised as the greatest job in the world: "Caretaker of the Islands of the Great Barrier Reef," in the state of Queensland in Australia. The responsibilities of the job are simple – use Web 2.0 skills, such as blogging, video blogging, Twitter, Flickr and Facebook to tell the world about what you have done and what tourists could do if they visit Queensland for themselves. And as a bonus, it pays \$125,000 Cdn for a six month contract.

'So excited'

"I'm so excited for this chance – if I get the job it will be life

changing," says Hoang adding that the requirements are perfect for her outgoing, bubbly personality.

"Being in the top 50, I'm super excited about it. Here were almost 35,000 other people who applied, so that is a big accomplishment."

Hoang had always planned on travelling after school and considers herself a very independent person, which only made this opportunity more enticing for the 19-yearold.

To enter the competition, Hoang had to create a video exactly 60 seconds long detailing why she would be best for the position, which is featured on the competition's website. She was then chosen to be in the top 50 by Queensland judges. Of these lucky 50, 10 will be chosen by the judges to go to Australia for interviews, with one person chosen as a "wild card" by the public.

Hoang doubts she will be one of the wild cards, but is optimistic about her chances with the judges. "I'm hoping to be one of the 10 people chosen by the judges, they've already noticed me to pick me in the top 50, so hopefully I'll get to go down to Australia for the interview process."

Happy with her options

Even if she doesn't get chosen for this opportunity, Hoang is happy with the options she has in Edmonton, saving. "I think this is helpful for my career as a journalist. Some of the media that have interviewed me have said to call them if this doesn't work out."

The online voting deadline is March 24, with the top 11 finalists being announced publicly on April 2. These candidates will then have just over a month to get ready to go to Australia for interviews, starting on May 3, to determine the final winner on May 6. Queensland will be taking care of the winner's visa needs, and supplying the housing for the duration of the six-month contract.

Stem cells hold out promise

Recently, U.S. President Barak Obama lifted the ban on funding embryonic stem cell research that was put in place by former President George W. Bush in 2001.

"In recent years when it comes to stem cell research, rather than furthering discovery, our government has forced what I believe is a false choice between sound science and moral values," Obama said in announcing his decision last week.

The decision allows scientists and researchers in the U.S., normally world leaders in many types or research, to get the funding they need to hopefully create a cure for many diseases that have been thought of as incurable. Researchers haven't been able to do much research during the last eight years because most of their time was spent looking for funding rather than doing research.

Hope for many cures

Embryonic stem cells (ES cells) appear in an embryo four to five days after a sperm has fertilized an egg. ES cells are pluripotent, meaning they can differentiate into different types of cells in our body.

The hope is that through research, ES cells can be used to repair parts of our bodies that have suffered damage. For example, when a person suffers a


curable.

heart attack, a scar is left where the attack took place. That part of the heart won't "work" anymore and it can't be healed because heart cells can't divide and repair themselves like skin or liver cells. The hope is that ES cells can be

used to fix the scar in the heart.

The hope for ES cells goes much farther than the heart, though. Scientists believe that one day they will be able to cure many diseases and heal many injuries. Alzheimer's, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS or Lou Gehrig's Disease) and Parkinson's are all believed to be curable. Curing paralysis and growing new organs are other things that embryonic stem cell research could lead to.

Obama's decision is meeting some opposition, though. Most of the controversy surrounding embryonic stem cell research comes from the fact that harvesting stem cells destroys the embryo. It brings up the age-old debate over



whether an embryo is a human life. Obama is mostly being criticized by his opponents on the right. Speaking to MSNBC, House Minority Leader John Boehner said Obama's decision breaks his election promises and is separating Americans.

"This decision runs counter to President Obama's promise to be a president for all Americans," Boehner said. "For a third time in his young presidency, the president has rolled back important protections for innocent life, further divid-

ing our nation at a time when we need greater unity to tackle the challenges before us."

But for the opposition Obama is facing, he's getting a lot of support, too, in some cases from surprising people. Nancy Reagan, wife of the late for President Ronald

Reagan, has become one of Obama's biggest supporters.

World leader

Currently, Canada is one of the world leaders in embryonic stem cell research, but the U.S. decision could mean that many talented Canadian researchers would be lured away.

Under the current government, the laws around embryonic stem cell research are unclear and hard to understand.

Canadian researchers expect many of their people to be recruited by large American research companies with more money and less red tape to work around.

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Municipal airport and its fate

Canada's oldest licensed airfield, the Edmonton City Centre Airport, may soon be shutting down. The airport, which has been open for over 80 years, used to be Edmonton's thriving transportation facility. But once the International Airport opened its doors, the City Centre Airport limited its access to private, corporate and small commuter flights to northern Alberta and only commutes about 20,000 passengers a year. This makes the city question whether the airport is worth keeping open.

Mary-Anne Stanway, chairman of the Kingsway Business Association, said to NAIT Newswatch that the City Centre Airport is still bringing in a substantial amount of revenue to the city and that the airport is an important historical monument for downtown Edmonton.

"A company called The Sun did a report and they estimated the City Centre Airport, in its current state right now, with the restrictions it does have, still contributes about \$7 million to the Edmonton economy on an annual basis. The airport has been here for decades and for it to be sacrificed simply

because certain developers want to develop certain areas of downtown Edmonton seems like a huge loss for the City of Edmonton," says Stanway.

A city report claims that the 217 hectares of land could be worth over \$500 million if the airport were to shut down, and that the land could be used for housing for over 32,000 people. If Edmonton where to utilize the land for accommodations, this would bring in over \$95 million a year in property taxes. This would also be an opportunity for NAIT to potentially expand its campus downtown and provide more housing for students in the future.

The ultimate question is whether or not the city wants to preserve an historical monument, perhaps even fix it up to create more revenue, or shut it down and create a more compact downtown Edmonton. If there is a way for the city to improve and develop the City Centre Airport, then perhaps it's worth

But with urban sprawl becoming more and more of a problem for Edmonton, then perhaps utilizing that space for housing and



businesses would bring more money downtown. This revenue could even improve downtown Edmonton's transportation system, and create a bigger NAIT campus.

City council will resume the Edmonton municipal airport debate in early July.



Ironman's dream comes true

It is amazing and inspirational what you can do when you work hard and have some determination

Michael Watson, a first year Civil Engineering student at NAIT, took part in Ironman Canada on Aug. 24, 2008.

Unlike some people, as well as doing it for himself, Watson raced to raise money for

the Canadian Diabetes Association and for a family member.

"My grandfather was a great inspiration to me ... surviving WWII ... and living half his life as a diabetic ... I know he was proud of me and I wish he could have seen me (in the Ironman)," says Watson.

His grandfather passed away two months before the race, but Watson says that he was always a great encouragement for him since he was "tough as nails." Faced with not only the challenge of a gruelling training regime, Watson was also trying to raise money for his spot on Team Diabetes, and work to make money for school in the fall.

That's where NAITSA stepped in. Watson went to NAITSA and gave them a demonstration and he says, "I would like to

thank NAITSA again for their help. Without their help I would never have reached my fundraising goals and been able to run in

Ironman Canada."

Watson thought the bigger challenge was going to be the fundraising, but it turned out he was wrong. "The training was crazy ... I followed a strict eightweek schedule ... some of my larger training days consisted of 35-30 kilometre runs, 120-160 kilometre bikes and three to five kilometre swims."

Watson is a swimmer, so he felt that was his best discipline,

but found the biking was a bit out of 23 for his age group (18-24 years) and

also been because Watson did the whole race on a \$200 Canadian Tire bike, without pedal clips or a repair kit. But he says there was no way he was stopping.

"It was pure determination to finish.

I kept thinking how much punishment I had been through already and I knew I would not stop until I had that medal."

Despite the amount of effort and work the Ironman took, Watson says he would do it again to raise money for Team Diabetes.


So my point is, why doesn't NAIT make a bigger deal about him? Why can't we have a school holiday in his honour? Or rename a wing of the building "K-Mart?"

who have TSN-2, have been some of the notable points of this season.



The Pontypool man speaks

As promised, I am following through with my interview with Bruce McDonald, who directed *Pontypool*, the movie I reviewed last week.

Over the background music at Lux Steakhouse & Bar, Bruce and I began to discuss what the inspiration for Pontypool was. He replied that much of the inspiration came from a Martin Scorsese documentary on film producer/ screenwriter Val Lewton called The Man in the Shadows. It detailed Lewton's making of a few influential horror films for RKO Pictures in the 1940s, but specifically one film interested McDonald, which was 1942's Cat People which was a low budget horror/suspense film known for creating fear and fright through atmosphere. That is, each situation was made frightening through unseen horrors and framed

by the music, setting, mood, etc. Bruce then began to discuss how this began to influence him to make a film that went back to the elemental side of fear (like being afraid of the dark) that was more about storytelling and performance, than just an overload of blood and guts. To put it more bluntly, Bruce stated, "Our Industrial Light & Magic is your brain. We let the mind create the horror."

At this point, I asked for a clarification into the "conversationalists" I had heard McDonald earlier describe. Bruce replied that the film was made with a bit of a homage to zombies, but his characters were definitely not among the undead. Rather, his monsters are easily dispatched with conventional weapons. The real enemy, though, is the fast spreading virus that infects people with the "sickness." The first stage of this sickness is when someone begins repeating a word or gets stuck on a phrase, the second stage is when your language becomes scrambled and you cannot express yourself, and finally the third, and last stage is when you feel the need to chew your way through the mouth of another person.

As Bruce explained, the conversationalists go from catatonic to extreme emotions rather quickly. Finally, as our interview came to a close, I had to ask Bruce if the main protagonist Grant was based on himself. His reply was that while Grant is different than him, he identifies with the character and they do indeed have similarities. The fact they both wear the same style of hat is just one of those "similarities," but Bruce pointed out that he and the character both have a similar take-no-prisoners attitude and both believe strongly in full disclosure.

So with that, there is everything you could ever want to know about Pontypool. Personally, I believe this film is the next big thing in the horror genre and should enjoy a tidy profit at the box office/cult following IF enough people get the word to go and see it. On that note, you do have the chance to go see this movie as Pontypool opens soon in Edmonton. If you are a fan at all of movies in the horror genre, I strongly suggest that you go see it. At least so you can think of how to prepare if a virus was to infect the English language for real

actually took time to put considerable work on her second album. About a two and a half years to be



Men not so liberated after all?

SASKATOON (CUP) – While society expects men to demonstrate a constant and insatiable desire for sexual activity, they are limited in what sexual behaviours they may exhibit once in the bedroom, a new study has found.

Todd Morrison, a University of Saskatchewan researcher and psychologist, has discovered that men are more bound by considerations of sexual normality than women, turning on its head the assumption that men have a high degree of sexual freedom.

Morrison surveyed a group of 104 university students between the ages of 18 to 25, seeking to find what they considered normal and abnormal behaviour

Each student was given 33 different written sexual scenarios – half of the surveys with a female exhibiting the sexual behaviour, the other half with a male playing out the exact same scenarios.

"We were interested in looking at university students' perception of reality ... when they look at sexual practices – which ones would they deem normal," said Morrison.
"We had assumed that if a male target engages in given behaviour that's more likely to be seen as normal than a female engaging in the same behaviour."

But, when the surveys were tallied, the assumption Morrison and fellow researchers made was proven incorrect.

While only one of the sexual scenarios – voyeurism – was deemed abnormal for a woman and not men, there were seven examples considered more abnormal when the genders were flipped.

For example, participants thought it was less normal for a man to have homoerotic fantasies as well as receive or desire pain during sex.

Participants also thought it was abnormal for a male target to be less interested in sex.

On the question asking about the relative normalcy of a person never masturbating, it was considered considerably more abnormal for a man than for a woman. There were similar results on a question regarding celibacy

Also, it was considered more abnormal if a man didn't achieve

orgasm in a sexual encounter, Morrison says.

Morrison and his team of researchers have been able to draw a fascinating conclusion telling of a blatant societal hypocrisy.

"On one hand, society disseminates the message that men should be hyper sexual and interested in all things sexual and whatever sexual opportunity presents itself, they should just go for it," Morrison said. "Yet, we argue that it seems that expectation is channelled in specific ways, so men are not quite as free as they may assume they are."





Students homeless by choice

MONTREAL (CUP) – Students often live on the bare necessities, but this week, eight Concordia University students and alumni will survive on far less.

As part of the 5 Days for the Homeless fundraising campaign, the Concordians are camping out on the streets from March 15-20 in a makeshift shelter and without food. The group plans on surviving on nothing more than handouts for nourishment to raise awareness for the nearly 30,000 homeless Montrealers.

Environment Canada has predicted four of the five nights of their campaign will dip below zero.

"Warmth is the biggest issue," said Kristina Partsinevelos, a Concordia alumnus who is cochair of the 5 Days campaign. "People can go for a couple days without a lot of food but staying warm will be the biggest issue, as will the construction."

The group will literally live on a construction site: the underground tunnel running through campus, a \$5-million project to be completed in December 2009, is already under excavation.

Partsinevelos says the close proximity of the group to the early morning noises of bulldozers and jackhammers could wreak havoc on the sleeping patterns and patience of the volunteers.

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TOP 10 TIPS

Managing your anger

In addition to affecting relationships with friends, family and co-workers, angry outbursts also affect your self-esteem and your overall health. While anger is usually a reaction to stress, losing your temper has the overall impact, ironically, of increasing your stress levels

- 1. Know your triggers and your warning signs. Look back and determine what types of things cause you to explode. Be aware of the physical, mental and emotional signs that let you know that you are getting out of control. Rapid breathing, increased heart rate or muscles tightening in the upper body, neck and jaw are common physical signs.
- **2.** Recognize that how you respond to a situation is your choice. There are many alternatives to losing your temper.
- **3.** Take a physical and/or mental time out. If possible leave the situation until you can calm down. If this is not possible, count to 10 slowly or say the alphabet backwards.
- **4.** Find ways to express your feelings in a calm way. It is important not to hold anger in and stew on it. Stick to the current issues and do not bring up past problems. Keep your

focus on finding a solution rather than placing blame. Practise empathy by trying to see things from the other person's perspective. If you cannot speak to the person that has triggered your anger, try talking about it to a friend, family member or counsellor. For some people, writing can help. However, if you write something you want the person you are angry with to read you may not want to give them your first draft or to send your e-mail immediately.

- **5.** Regular exercise is a great method for defusing overall stress. Physical activity, such as a brisk walk, pushups or jumping rope, can quickly release pent up frustration.
- **6.** Quick relaxation techniques include deep breathing, visualizing a relaxing place or thinking of something humorous. Yoga, meditation, listening to music that relaxes you or doing a relaxing craft or hobby are other stress reducing techniques. And of course having a balance of school, personal time and social time is important too.
- 7. Identify the negative thinking that leads up to angry outbursts. Your inner self talk has a major impact on how your respond to stressful people or situations in your life. It often helps to keep a journal of what triggers your anger and of what self-talk goes on when you are triggered. Examples are self-criticism, over generalizing, all-or-nothing thinking, a need to always be right or building things out of proportion. When you are aware of your usual pattern of inner messages, you can work on changing your self talk with the goal of creating positive resolutions.
- **8.** Learn to talk yourself down. You can defuse anger with simple questions such as

"How much will this matter in five years?", "Is this a reaction to the situation right now or to something from the past?", "Are my expectations realistic?" or "Is this person trying to make me angry on purpose?" (e.g. if a stranger cuts you off while you are driving it is very unlikely that they are trying to annoy you personally). If your anger is justified then it is important to talk yourself down with messages such as "I need to wait until I can think about this rationally" or "I can stay calm and relaxed" before you respond with words or actions that you might regret.

9. Keep a "what to do" list of techniques that work for you when you are angry. Practise deep breathing, brisk walks, humour, visualization, positive self talk, carrying your MP3 player with you and listening to calming music, and other things which may be calming for you.

Carrying an object such as a smooth stone in your pocket and rubbing it when you feel your stress rising works as a quick calming technique for many people. Once you have figured out what works best for you in most situations make a list that you can refer to when you feel yourself losing control. Having a list of options will also help you deal with a variety of stressful situations.

10. Seek help. Talking about stressful situations in your life can help you put them into a new perspective. Relationship counselling can help couples develop more effective communication techniques. Individual counselling is free through Student Counselling while you are a NAIT student, so take the opportunity to try it out while you are here. All appointments are confidential and can be booked at Room O-117 or by calling 780-378-6135.





Identity theft and what to do



Identity theft is the unauthorized acquisition, possession or trafficking of personal information. It is also the unauthorized use of information to create a fictitious identity or to assume an existing identity. This is done to obtain financial gain, goods or services or to conceal criminal activities.

Identity theft presents a serious threat to public safety. The impact of identity theft is felt by government, business and the public. The two major credit bureaus, Equifax and Trans Union, indicate that they each receive approximately 1,400 to 1,800 Canadian identity theft complaints every month.

Be vigilant. Protect

Theft of your identity can occur by Internet, telephone, fax or through the mail. Everyone must be vigilant in protecting themselves against loss.

Be proactive.

Learn and use safety measures to minimize the chance of becoming a victim. Be wary of unsolicited e-mails, telephone calls or mail attempting to extract personal and financial information. Ask yourself if you need all of the identity documents in your wallet. Remove any cards you don't need and store them in a safe place.

Be careful about sharing personal information.

Provide personal information on the phone, mail or Internet only when you have initiated the contact or know who you are dealing with. Someone with your SIN or birth certificate can pretend they are you and make fraudulent financial transactions.




