Tasty gesture by students

NAIT's culinary program helped to fill the bellies of over 1,500 of Edmonton's less fortunate. The annual Boyle Street Thanksgiving dinner was this past weekend, and about 40 NAIT students were the reason behind the event. It took several days to prepare, but by Sunday night, both the Retail Meatcutting program and the Culinary Arts program collaborated to prepare 80 turkeys, 225 kg of potatoes, carrots and broccoli and 120 pies, all donated by Edmonton's Food Bank. It was a chance for students to give to the community, while practising the skills they are acquiring here at NAIT.

Students who served lunch say the line to get into the hall was far down the block. Many families attended who just didn't have enough to afford a turkey meal this year. Instead, they were able to come and enjoy a turkey dinner with hundreds of others.

"We've been helping Boyle Street out for the last six Thanksgivings," says NAIT Culinary Arts instructor Jeff Gordon.

"We have a club, called Club Culinaire, and every culinary student is a member. This year, about 40 students are helping throughout the weekend."

Club Culinaire has been around since the 1960s, when NAIT first introduced the Culinary Arts program.

"It's a student based club ... so we do a lot of community activities," Gordon said. "For example, we help with Boyle Street, but we also do Habitat for Humanity, Santas Anonymous,

Mayor Stephen Mandel was alongside the many volunteers. He shared that he understands the importance of attending meals such as this in order to attain a better understanding of the reality

of problems faced by Edmonton's less fortunate.

Chef Gordon says it is a very rewarding weekend for the students and that "until they actually get to Boyle Street on Sunday, they don't realize the impact that they are making.

"When you see the line down the street of the city's less fortunate: people who don't have access to a good holiday meal, you really feel like your making a difference."

Souch Campus gets a \$19M refit

NAIT prides itself on being a top destination for people pursuing careers in the skilled trades. To that end, the institute's Souch Campus is currently undergoing a major expansion to enhance its capacity for training welders.

The project, which broke ground in May of this year, is intended to provide enough training facilities to accommodate an additional 900 welding apprenticeship students per school year.

Calvin Reivonen, NAIT's Capital Projects Manager, is pleased with the progress made thus far.

"The new construction is progressing extremely well. The favourable weather conditions have allowed us to be approximately two weeks ahead of schedule," he states, adding that the project remains on budget as well.

That budget – approximately \$19.5 million - covers a number of brand new

facilities, including three new 30-station welding labs, a pair of grinding shops, a blueprint reading lab, a special welding process area and three new classrooms.

According to Morris Jackson, Associate Dean of the School of Mechanical and Manufacturing Technology, "this will make NAIT by far the largest trainer of welding apprentices in Alberta." Additionally, a new fitness area and change room an expanded cafeteria and a building resource area will be constructed.

Many renovations to the existing facility are also part of the project. Students and staff can expect to see a relocated student games room, expanded book store, relocated quiet study area and increased staff offices. On top of that, there will be a new Student Services Suite, which will include a campus security office, visiting staff office (for NAITSA executive use as well), and a

relocated first aid/nursing area, counselling services and testing facilities. To accommodate the increased number of students, the parking area will be expanded, adding approximately 200 new student and staff parking spaces, as well as provisions to improve the access to and from Gateway Boulevard and

Care was taken to ensure that the students' voices were heard during the planning phase of the project.

Reivonen says "the previous NAITSA president, Brent Constantin, was a member of the project steering committee and was involved in the design development of the student spaces."

This is far from the end of NAIT's plans to continually improve their facilities for staff and students alike.

Reivonen confirms that "NAIT's top campus development priority (continues) to be the Centre for Applied Technologies," and while construction funding has yet to be approved, "NAIT has been approved to move forward with design development activities."

In addition, the school has received funding through the federal government from the Knowledge Infrastructure Program, or KIP, for two other large projects

- renos to the NAIT Services Building featuring an Alternative Energy Centre, expected to be completed around March 2011, and a window replacement project involving the E, F, G, H and J wings that will begin in spring 2010.

The Souch Campus expansion is slated to be completed by September

It was a dull, damp and dreary Sunday morning. Many people woke up, looked outside their window and restarted a warm and comfortable sleep. It was almost like something was telling people to stay in bed. But for over 10,000 Edmontonians, a day best suited for ducks wasn't going to keep them from their fight against cancer. By 9 a.m., a sea of pink took over Churchill Square. The diverse crowd showed that Breast

Cancer affects all types of people in Edmonton. With some heavy hearts and a positive outlook for the future, the crowd of punctual people in pink walked or ran one or five kilometres, raising over \$1.3 million for the CIBC Run for the Cure. The disease affects one out of every nine women. In Canada, about 23,000 women are diagnosed each year. Close to 25 per cent of those cases are fatal.

Team NAIT did an amazing job of fundraising, bringing in close to \$10,000. In the process, the team won the CIBC Corporate Spirit Award for their efforts. Michelle Berg, fundrais-

ing leader for the NAIT group, said her team "did an awesome job raising funds," and are "already planning for next year's event."

The run has special meaning for Michelle. After participating in the run for years to help others, her mother was diagnosed with breast cancer in December.

"I ended up with a sinus infection but managed to walk the one

> kilometre with my family anyway," she said.

The run has a special meaning for Television student Krista Supervich, because of her family's history with breast cancer.

"My mom

and my grandma are survivors, that's who I was walking for," she said.

"It was pretty chilly outside, and I was kind of tired, but once you start walking, you feel great. It's such a positive atmosphere and everyone is so supportive. I'm really glad that I did it and I can't wait to do it again."

Michelle is also looking forward to next year, saying, "We are already planning for next year's event. Our team is open to NAIT staff, students and family-friends, anyone who wants to represent NAIT for such an amazing cause."

One hundred per cent of the money raised from the CIBC Run for the Cure goes to the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation. The foundation uses the fund for education and awareness programs, early diagnosis

Greenpeace raises ante

Love them or hate them, they sure know how to get us talking. While counting down to the Copenhagen Climate Talks, Greenpeace is escalating the pace of its civil disobedience campaign against the Alberta Oil Sands. Protests against Suncor and Shell, as a part of Greenpeace's campaign to draw attention to emissions produced in the Alberta Oil Sands, have resulted in many people being charged with mischief and trespassing. However, their most recent action at a Shellowned upgrader in Fort Saskatchewan resulted in 16 charges of break and enter, in addition to others.

It was these most recent arrests that prompted Premier Ed Stelmach to claim that protesters

tice system in the past. According to Greenpeace's lawyer, Brian Beresh, this smells of the McCa-

rthy trials, where suspected communists and their sympathizers were rounded up and made to stand trial for being in league with the Russians. "Premier Stelmach's public suggestion that he will use the force of the law to deal with these people confirms his lack

of knowledge of the limits of his authority," said Beresh during a press conference at the Alberta Legislature.

According to Beresh, this kind

of interference makes it difficult for the protesters to get a fair trial.

sized the need for

also said that if Alberta has an open-door policy to multi-national energy companies, then activists from other parts of the world shouldn't be considered

"There are solutions out there," said Hudema, pointing to a document created by Greenpeace, the Alberta Federation of Labour and the Sierra Club. In the document, it points to a new energy economy and "green jobs" that could be created as a shift away from the fossil fuel industry.

"Thousands of jobs could be created," said Hudema, pointing to projects like a high-speed rail line between Edmonton and Calgary, wind farms and home retrofitting as methods to reduce people's reliance on fossil fuels. "It takes political will," said Hudema, and that is just not there at the moment.

Those who have been arrested will be tried in November. Some will be tried in Fort McMurray and some in Edmonton.


National Champion MacEwan Griffins.


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Habs touch down at NAIT





Tea-bagging time

Halo is a series that either musters feelings of joy or frustration in many gamers. Halo 3 ODST, which was meant for an expansion pack, but is now a fully fledged piece of the halo story, has arrived. ODST takes place between Halo 2-3 and puts you through the eyes of The Rookie.

You are an Orbital Drop Shock Trooper (ODST) dropped to earth. Your task is to deal with the covenant invading New Mombasa, while Master Chief goes out hunting covenant and flood in outer space. The city is on a day/night setting through a hub-world. Day sections

are action packed events set through the eyes of your squad mates before your arrival. You go through the night sections, picking up clues towards what happened in the city before your arrival, and deal with Covenant foes in the night sections.

The hub-world design of New Mombasa looks incredible at both day and night, however the soldiers could have looked sharper. This is due to being on the same engine from Halo 3, but tweaked so that it looks better. The sound design from voice acting, to the sound-

track, to the sounds of the weapons and enemies is classic top-notch Halo.

The gameplay is fine tuned while maintaining a solid pace from action to exploration. There is no dual-wielding, but you get more grenades to hold. The game is still easy, accessible on normal, hard on heroic and headache inducing on legendary (solo or co-op). The ODSTs have it tougher this time. Falls hurt, bullets hurt more and health packs and those night vision goggles are a necessity. But on your side is the super intendent, an AI program that aids you throughout the city.

The weapons and items are similar from previous Halo games. Now you have a silenced submachine gun for when you want to be silent and deadly. You also get the awesome pistol from Halo Combat Evolved, not the crummy Halo 2-3 pistol. The online multiplayer is still great,

and it has firefight, which is basically Horde from Gears 2 with four friends, under the Halo scheme. The second disc has all of the Halo 3 maps plus new ones, which is pointless if you already have them. Also there's the key towards the Halo Reach beta.

ODST is an excellent game like the first Halo, but it's probably too small for its price tag for the average gamer. Fans will rightfully grab it, the campaign is exceptional even though short, and the multiplayer is solid save

for some matchmaking issues. If price isn't an issue, what is in Halo 3 ODST is absolute brilliance. Rent it first to avoid being disappointed.

Chosen as the closing night gala film at the Edmonton International Film Festival this past Saturday, the film is a far cry from the pair's first theatrical foray, the mockumentary Rock, Paper, Scissors: The Way Of The Tosser.

Whereas RPS played it pseudostraight with great effect, GravyTrain "is just a real good time. Wacky, even,

I guess you could say," says Doiron. "Eccentric, too," declares Mullen.

In GravyTrain, Doiron plays Charles "Chuck" Gravytrain, a ne'er-do-well cop bent on putting the serial-killing villain, Jimmy Fish Eyes, behind bars in the small town of Gypsy Creek. Mullen plays his newly minted partner, big city cop Miss Uma Booma, whose greater competence hides her own sordid past. Also involved are big and small screen veterans like Canadians Colin Mochrie, Jennifer Dale and Peter Keleghan. Even Canadian rock legend Alan Frew, former lead singer of Glass Tiger is on board, and probably most surprisingly, Saturday Night Live alum Tim Meadows.

How did Doiron and Mullen secure such talent for a "It's kind of like Starsky and Hutch meet David Lynch small Canadian film? It helps if you've worked with the actor before. Mullen, whose first film credit is as a teen lover in Meadows' SNL skit-turned-feature, The Ladies

Man, approached Meadows' manager. As Mullen recounts, "I approached (the manager) and said 'I was 16 when I did The Ladies Man and could Tim just read the script?' And he loved it! And it was easy after that, because the role was written for him."

GravyTrain is a visually pleasing trip into semi-'70s buddy cop parody, but the discussion of its creation does require a look into its creation pedigree. Rock, Paper, Scissors and its subsequent DVD distribution through Alliance Atlantis, one of Canada's biggest distribution companies, allowed Doiron and Mullen entrance into uncharted territory – a larger budget for their next picture. And that larger budget allowed them not only a larger and more identifiable cast, but more time to flex their filmmaking skills, which they developed while creating RPS.

"The training we had with RPS with the seven-day shoot definitely came in handy when dealing with so many variables, like stars and other people, because it can get hairy at times," relates Doiron. The hardest part, they say, was getting RPS seen.

Doiron and Mullen, costumes and attitudes in tow, did all of the promotion themselves. They toured the country coastto-coast, showcased at festivals, did every media interview they could get and conducted screenings and tournaments at colleges. As a result, the film became a critical and audience hit and had widespread recognition, almost unheard of for an independent Canadian film, even in its home country.

Though the creative duo achieved great heights with Rock, Paper, Scissors all over Canada and even in the U.S. and the U.K., there is one city that they credit with having a major influence on their success: Edmonton.

"It's our second home!" exclaims Mullen, to which Doiron adds, "We love E-Town. Edmonton took a risk on us with our first film and we owe all of our success up to date to Edmonton. We met people who loved the film, and that led to meeting people at Telefilm, then Alliance and that enabled us to get distribution and the ability to make our

It's been a long, arduous, but fruitful journey for the once grad-class president and former Miss Teen Niagra, but the journey won't stop to rest on its laurels.




