NEWS&FEATURES It's a yes to U-Pass!

The debate is finally over. With 68 per cent of students on board, the Universal Transit Pass, or U-Pass, will be implemented at NAIT in September.

Starting in the fall, a mandatory fee of \$110 per semester will be added to most students' tuition fees. The fee will increase to \$125 per semester in 2011/2012, and \$140 in 2012/2013. In exchange, students will get transit passes, which normally cost about \$270 per semester, at a discount of over 50 per cent.

Better service?

Even though the plan has been approved, there has been no promise of better service from Edmonton Transit just yet. Jason Roth, advocacy director for the NAIT Students' Association, is hopeful that the school may see some better service in the future.

"What they said to us was that the last time the first contract was just complete, this year between Grant MacEwan, U of A and ETS, they both saw a significant service increase. They wouldn't guarantee for us that we get service increases if we were on U-Pass, [but] we would go up their priority list." says Roth

Working hard

That said, Roth asserts that he and the other members of NAITSA are working hard to make improved transit service a reality at the school.

"That still leaves the student executives and myself with the job of making sure that better service happens," he explains.

Roth and the rest of the Students' Association are presently working with the Registrar and cash

offices to ensure that students will be able to pick up their U-Pass stickers after paying student fees.

He also stated that the U-Pass could potentially help solve the problem of parking at the school -a factor which may have pushed a lot of people to vote.

"What we do know here at NAIT is that

there isn't enough parking for everybody and that was one of the attractive things for a lot of people to want to get us on U-Pass," says Roth.

The fact that over 2,000 students cast their votes in the referendum was an encouraging one for NAITSA, and the turnout was significantly higher than that of recent executive elec-

tions. Roth attributes the increased numbers to the simple fact that students are less apathetic when the issue at hand involves money.

Only time will tell if the school's willingness to get on board with the U-Pass program will lead to the increased service, which students have been requesting for many years.

NAIT, Ledcor in \$3M partnership

NAIT solidified its status as a leading partner of industry last week. The school and the Ledcor Group will invest \$3-million to establish an applied research chair in oilsands environmental sustainability. The goal is to work together to develop systems and technologies that will allow Ledcor to continue doing business while reducing the environmental impact of its numerous operations.

The cost of the chair, NAIT's first in applied research, will be split evenly between the two groups, with a \$1.5-million donation by Ledcor being matched by the school to create an endowment to fund research that can be applied to industry practices in the here and now.

NAIT's president and CEO, Dr. Sam Shaw, is eager to see the school continuing to expand its reputation as a leading source of industry research and innovation.

"It's definitely something we are excited about," he said. "We want to be an important partner with business and help come up with real-world solutions for members of industry."

Now that the partnership has been announced, the next step will be to name a scientist to head things

up. The person who is selected will be installed in July at a facility in Edmonton Research Park that the school has leased and upgraded. The plan is to eventually build an applied research centre right here on campus, one that would hopefully house a number of related research projects.

To that end, Shaw says that there are a few more partnerships of this type in the works, though he's not prepared to give any details just yet. "We're hoping to make at least three more announcements in the coming months," he said. "Keep your eves peeled." Though Shaw wasn't prepared to elaborate, he hinted in an interview last week that at least one of the plans could involve NAIT's Calgary campus and research in water and wastewater.

Don Breen, president of Ledcor, was unavailable for comment at press time, but stressed the importance of oilsands environmental sustainability in a press release about the partnership.

"If we are to truly make practices in the oilsands sustainable, we need to make changes now," he said. "However, these changes need to be based on a reasoned approach and sound science and be conducted in a collaborative manner making use of all research being conducted in this area."

The focus of the research has yet to be determined, but Shaw says several of NAIT's programs will be involved. "Certainly our petroleum, biology and chemistry programs will be involved," he explained.

In addition to providing its share of the endowment, Ledcor will also establish a \$250,000 scholarship fund, which will dole out five \$2,500 scholarships a year to NAIT students involved in oilsands related studies.

A friend remembered

Many of you may not have known Katharine, but her articles appeared in The Nugget regularly. Katharine was in her second year studying radio at NAIT. Also known as K-Hay, Katharine was determined and fiercely passionate about the things she believed in: politics, journalism and her family and friends.

Katharine underwent a kidney transplant in 2007. Unfortunately, last summer she lost function in the new kidney. Over the past two semesters Katharine received frequent dialysis treatments.

Despite enormous obstacles, K-Hay continued her education and her quality of work was superior to most. Struggling with her health, Katharine approached every challenge with passion and dedication, securing herself as one of the top students in her class.

"She was so persistent and very accepting of anything that was brought her way," says Lamya Asiff, one of Katharine's instructors.

"Whether it was her medical condition or anything related to school, no matter how challenging it was, she never complained and did it with a smile."

sidelines, Katharine's interest in politics led her to represent the NDP as a candidate for the Sherwood Park riding in the 2008 provincial election. Additionally, Katharine found it important to remain involved in the party at both the provincial and federal levels, in a way relating to its underdog status. She regularly jumped at the chance to interview a wide variety of newsmakers, whether through the RTA program, as a writer for The Nugget or as a volunteer with CJSR FM radio.

Katharine co-hosted two shows on NR92.com, NAIT's campus radio station, called Lemurs and Meerkats and The Scene with Shai, Kat and Lauren.

"The one person in our class who never sat and did radio was K-Hay," remembers classmate Raeesa Merali. "She danced and moved her hips."

Katharine had planned to take part in the Give the Gift of Life Fun Run and Walk in support of the Kidney Foundation of Alberta next month. She had already begun to accept donations and to date had been the top fundraiser.

Although many buildings across Edmonton went dark during Earth Hour this past Saturday evening, some still think the amount of decreased electricity use could have been larger.

Power consumption in the city dropped three per cent between 8:30 and 9:30 p.m. - the hour designated by the World Wildlife Fund for homes and businesses around the world to go dark for

climate change awareness. In 2009, power consumption dur ing Earth Hour went down by five per cent.

"I look across the river val ley towards downtown from my apartment," said one Edmontor resident.

"When 8:30 came, there was almost no noticeable difference in the lights on downtown. In the office buildings I actually saw lights go on. I'm not surprised the power decrease was so small."

The three percent decrease works out to 1,008 megawat hours of electricity, a 31 mega watt hour reduction when compared to the same time last week.

This was Edmonton's third year participating in Earth Hour

since the event started in 2008 in Sydney, Australia. A total of over 35 nations participated in the growing movement.

There were some questions about whether or not the power usage would decrease that much with the George St-Pierre-Dan Hardy UFC bout taking place on the same night. Another big sporting event raising the same question was the Vancouver Canucks/San Jose Sharks hockey game. In

the end, neither of the events seemed to interfere with the total power usage numbers. Many people had all other devices turned off and classified their television viewing as essential usage.

For those keeping score, Edmonton outdid Calgary, who was shamed in 2008 when it recorded a 2.1 per cent increase in power usage during Earth Hour. This year, Cowtown recorded a half per cent drop.

Google phones are better

Mandel still has work to do

Last week, Edmonton Mayor Stephen Mandel announced he will seek a third term in the city's top office. Although the election won't take place until October, the move ends months of speculation over Mandel's status as a candidate.

Announcing his candidacy now also gives the mayor a leg up on any potential opponents, and it puts those opponents behind the proverbial eight ball if they want to mount a serious challenge.

More importantly, with Mandel's hat already in the ring, the likelihood of someone posing a credible threat to his chances has grown a lot smaller. After all, in the world of civic politics, an incumbent candidate has the odds stacked in their favour.

For starters, they have the automatic

advantage of a higher profile. It's uncommon to see a challenger who is more well-known than the person who has had their name in the media virtually every day of their time in office. This is generally the toughest mountain to climb in a municipal election, especially given the notoriously low number of people who actually vote.

One of the reasons Mandel gave for his decision was that he feels he has unfinished business to take care of. Here's a quick look at some of the key issues which Mandel's campaign, and those of his challengers, will address.

Airport redevelopment – The city is in the midst of exploring a number of possible uses for the land currently dedicated to Edmonton Municipal Airport, which is slated to close in stages over the coming years. A number of proposals are on the table, and Mandel's legacy as mayor could be determined in part by how he and city council handle the issue.

Arena proposal – The latest big-ticket issue to push to the forefront, thanks to Katz Group CEO and Oilers owner Daryl Katz, is that of a proposed downtown complex that would essentially render Rexall Place obsolete. Though public support for the proposal is lukewarm at the moment, the sheer quantities of both money and power involved in the debate

> makes for a potentially volatile political situation. Mandel will likely make the topic an important part of his campaign platform, and how he deals with it will have a direct impact on the results at the polls.

> Homelessness – Since first being elected in 2004, Mayor Mandel has said that finding a solution for Edmonton's homeless problem is one of his top priorities. Although the harsh winters here have meant that the numbers aren't wildly out of control, the mayor is deter-

mined to bring them down much lower than they are now. Opinions are mixed on whether he's even made a significant dent since taking office, and this promises to be a persistent subject.

LRT expansion - In a city that seems to keep expanding

in an outward direction, it seems unlikely that this is an issue that will ever cease to be important in the minds of many Edmonton residents. At the very least the mayor wants to see the near-completion of the NAIT line, and an approved plan for Stony Plain and St. Albert lines as well, before he leaves city hall.

At 65 years old, it appears that, if elected, Stephen Mandel's third term will likely be his last as mayor. However, when it comes to the man who has repeatedly defied public perception while in office, nothing is a sure bet. It's entirely possible this discussion could be repeated in another three years, with some of the same issues, not to mention a whole host of others.

Health care





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SPORTS A season to be proud of

This season review of one of NAIT's top teams is long overdue. The Ooks women's hockey team finished runner-up, taking silver, in the ACAC women's hockey finals, nearly completing the perfect season. The Mount Royal Cougars took gold, defeating the Ooks 3-1 in the championship series, with the Ooks taking Game 2. All in all, for a team with so many young faces and often with less experience than their opponents, the Ooks managed to display a fantastic brand of hockey and were a team to reckon with all year long.

'Very successful overall'

"The season was very successful overall," said head coach Deanna Iwanicka. "Always when you're in that final game, or that final championship series, you want to win. So losing at the end was definitely disappointing but I think looking at the season as a whole, we have to call it a successful year.

"Just based on the strides we made, the team we started with, and the fact that for the first time in NAIT women's hockey history the team was in the conference final."

"There were a lot of good things that happened this year," Iwanicka added. "We had players named to the ACAC all-conference teams, I had the honour of receiving Coach of the Year in the league; all of those things considered, we have to call it a successful year."

The team may have shown some inexperience at some points in the playoffs, but they finished the season strong, out-shooting the Mount Royal Cougars in the final game for the first time in the series.

Last 20 minutes the best

After a very evenly matched series, Mount Royal's more seasoned squad seemed to have the advantage. The Ooks' third period was their best, finishing the season out strong, displaying their heart.

"Our last period of the season was definitely one of our best," said Iwanicka.

"That last weekend just came down to a little bit of maybe inexperience. We had 13 rookies on our team, so I think it maybe caught up to us at that point a little bit. In the last period when nothing really mattered [the girls] were able to pull themselves together and put together a good period to finish the season.

"Overall, the playoffs were pretty outstanding," added Iwanicka. "To win three straight versus Red Deer, shutting them out for eight [straight] periods and for us to get goals on their goalie as much as we did was pretty impressive. They had the top defensive team in the league and the top goalie in the

league. So the fact that we were able to out-score them was a pretty good achievement."

Red Deer College took Game 1 in a shooting gallery for the goalies, with shots 51-46 in favour of Red Deer. The Ooks then clamped down defensively, played their game, and shut out Red Deer in games 2 and 3, finishing them off in Game 4.

Their next opponent, the Mount Royal Cougars, was as far from a push-over as you can be, as they dominated the regular season, finishing first. Also, Mount Royal was in the final last year and

lost in Game 5, so they didn't want to see another Game 5. Many thought of this as the classic "David against Goliath" matchup. However, the Ooks proved they're going to give the Cougars a run for their money next season. Game 1 was a hard fought, evenly shot one-goal game with the Cougars coming out on the right end. However, Game 2 was a different story with the Ooks putting up four goals, allowing only one.

"We gave [Mount Royal] their first loss since the beginning of January, and that was in playoffs," said Iwanicka. With

that win the Ooks had beaten every team in the league. "The third game was much like Game 1 as well.

They started off the game strong. We caught up in the second. Then the third period just came down to battles and unfortunately they got an empty net

goal to finish the game," said Iwanicka. Game 3 was a much similar story to Game 1 with the score being 3-2 again.

Frst-year goalie Meghan Witt has continued to improve and played her best In the playoffs.

"I think Meghan's playoff performance really highlights what she can do. She's definitely a [big] game goalie. She's a pressure goalie," said Iwanicka. "We'd like to see her play that way all the time. Coming back in her second year that's definitely what we're going to expect of her."

> Then there's the very talented league leader in regular season goals (18 in 24 games), Kendal Jurista, who gained playoff experience to prepare her for next season. "She scored some big goals for us," said Iwanicka. "On the ice she definitely has the skills to outmatch any player in the league."

> However, a great hockey team is a team, not just a great goalie and scorer. Sometimes it's that fourth liner who gets your team going before games and practices that means the most.

"I think some unsung heroes on our team that def-

initely need to be mentioned are Chelsea Lande on the back end," said Iwanicka. "She never put up any points on the board all year, but as a defenceman, she was a solid defencemen. And every practice Lande was there with intention. So she's definitely someone I think who deserves recognition."

Up front, there is Lacie Richard, who played on Jurista's line, and was a key player for the Ooks all season.

"She fed [Jurista] a lot of pucks and gave her a lot of room," remarked Iwanicka. "She and Kendal played the PK together as well. [Richard was] a player who was basically hidden in Kendal's limelight a lot, but did a lot of hard work and helped Kendal get where she was."

Looking forward to next season, there are only three graduating players. Goalie Lauryn Dzioba, who was injured since Christmas with a concussion won't be back next season, along with veteran blueliner Lande. "She's going to be a big loss for us on the back end," remarked Iwanicka. However she explained the upside is that top-end midget AAA recruit Danielle Brown is already set to come in next season. Brown's from Lloydminster and was assistant captain with the Under 18 Team Alberta. "She's a very strong player," said Iwanicka. "I think she can fill that role for sure."

The Ooks also lose Meryl Ditchburn, a key piece to the Ooks' forward contingent. "We're going to miss her maturity and leadership as an assistant captain," said Iwanicka.

Coming home with a silver medal will only motivate the Ooks, as it did the Cougars last season, and no doubt gives the team a hunger for gold next season. "We've seen the prize now, we've seen what we want to be; starting the day that we finish, we're moving forward to that," said Iwanicka.

"Our goal definitely is to be the 2011 ACAC champs. We want that to be us next year and we're set on doing that, so we've already started the process of moving forward to it."

Ryan Stock is one of the world's few true swordswallowers, as well as a former stage magician. Walker is a contortionist and Stock's partner and fiancée. Together they host the show *Guinea Pig* for the Discovery Channel.

Stock is a *Guinness World Record* holder for pulling a four-ton car by chains connected to a sword down his throat.

"Rather than magic, there is no illusion. It's all real," said Stock. "I learned to eat fire when I was 14, as well as become a magician's assistant. [After] I learned to eat fire, I learned to eat glass (light bulbs)."

Two swords

During their live show, Stock put not one sword down his throat, but two. Also, he kept the audience on the edge of their seats when he balanced a chainsaw on his chin. Not content with just suspense, he went on to disgust the audience by swallowing a concoction of beer, Pepto-Bismol and other liquids, then brought them back up through a hose down his nose.

Walker put her body through a coat hanger, a tennis racket and then helped Stock bend a sword in his throat by banging a metal plate over his head. Stock first met Walker in 2001 at the Edmonton Fringe Festival when he needed an assistant.

'More skillful than you think'

"Most of the dangerous stuff I do [is] putting him in danger, which is more skillful than you think," Walker said.

This is not to say she isn't extreme her-

self – unless you consider being suspended by hooks through the flesh to be passé.

Their television show resulted after a failed attempt to take part in an extreme sleep deprivation test one their insurance company wouldn't cover because of the risk of death. So they paired up with the Discovery Channel to start Guinea Pig, a show where Stock puts power tools into his face and performs various other feats with Walker to challenge their minds and bodies. One such example has been strand-

ing themselves for 36 hours in the Utah desert, having no food and very little water, just to see how they deteriorate.

"I do what I do because I don't panic. I am not an adrenalin junkie; I am able to remain calm," said Stock.

"There's a certain instant gratification to perform in front of a stunned, live audience."

"How about a few slow chomps? How much teeth do you like?" She keeps biting the air.


The man manages to talk his way

to be grossly inappropriate, lame, or just out of a chomping, but this only seems to excite the girl further. "Oh, you are kinky!" she exclaims.



Being role models, setting good examples and making a good impact is what rapper Keith Laboucan describes of REDDNA-TION. Through their smooth style of beats and lyrics, REDDNA-TION's goal is to reach out to their audience in a good way.

"There's a lot of issues that affect our people on reserves and small native communities and we felt that if we give something positive to the youth and something good for them to look up to, then we're going to make an impact," Laboucan said during a recent interview.

Some may not be familiar with the band; however, in the Aboriginal community they're something to really brag about. The group consists of six members; group founder Darren Brule (Ill Logikal), Joey Cappo (Cappo), Will Strongheart (Rayne), Sean Beaver (DJ Hooligan), Keith Laboucan (Madjikal) and newly added member Jordan Johnson (DJ Kracka Jack). The Edmonton/Regina based group has been touring extensively for many years now and is approaching its 10th anniversary in October.

With the success of their second album *Now or Never*, the group has won a staggering five awards, proving them to be very strong artists. They've won the Best Hip-Hop or Rap Album and Best Group or Duo during the Aboriginal People's Choice Music Awards and Best Hip-Hop or Rap Album award at the Canadian Aboriginal Music Awards. When asked about giving his acceptance speech,



Laboucan remembers being slightly nervous.

"The first award we won gave me butterflies and I'm not a guy who gets butterflies or feels the jitters because I've been performing for over 10 years," he said.

"But at the same time it was a feeling of accomplishment and being proud that you're representing your people."

Being a hip-hop group predominantly, Laboucan stresses that even though the group is Aboriginal they don't categorize themselves separately from other hip hop or rap groups. The only way they differ is in the uniqueness formed by the different talents each member of the group brings and in the goals they set for themselves.

"We have our own taste, style and sound. Everything that we do now we're always looking to break the mold, whether it's a new sound or a way of reaching our audience," said Laboucan. Performing (at big venues such as the recent 2010 Arctic Winter Games) and making music aren't the only things on Laboucan's schedule. He is actually a student at NAIT enrolled in the Radio and Television program. With the other members spread out in Regina, Calgary and Edmonton, Laboucan says planning and time management is a key.

"We all have to find a happy medium. When it comes to our bookings we have to get the majority of them on the weekends so we can all meet up together."

With their popularity steadily growing, REDDNATION is definitely here to stay. They are currently working on a third album called *Grown Folk Muzic* to be released on May 7, along with a music video to be featured on MuchMusic called "It's you."







TIMELY TIPS How not to be perfect

Do you set excessively high standards for almost everything you do?

Do your accomplishments rarely meet your expectations? Do you try to appear faultless to the outside world, even to your friends?

Do you judge yourself based on your accomplishments? ... consider yourself a failure if you get a 'B'? ... put things off because you can't get them perfect? ... avoid giving your opinion for fear of looking dumb?

If so, you may be a perfectionist. Perfectionism is a selfdefeating cycle. Perfectionists set unrealistically high standards, fail to live up to these standards, feel bad about themselves and then blame themselves for not being good enough or trying hard enough. To offset this, they feel compelled to set more unrealistic goals in order to try and feel better. Perfectionism is not the healthy pursuit of excellence but rather, as Dr. David Burns states in his bestseller Feeling Good, the compulsive striving towards unrealistic goals.

Why not strive to be perfect?

Perfectionism usually interferes with, rather than contributes to, success. Perfectionists never feel satisfied, and even if they get some temporary satisfaction, they usually don't accomplish as much as non-perfectionists because they spend so much time trying to get things just right.

Perfectionists tend to be all-or-nothing thinkers, believing that if they don't get A+ marks or do a job perfectly they are failures. Becoming so obsessed with achievement often means missing out on the satisfactions and joys of life.

Perfectionists are very self critical and usually value themselves based on the approval of others. Because their self-esteem comes from outside approval, the perfectionist is vulnerable.

Perfectionists often have problems with relationships because they apply their own unrealistic standards to others and can be critical and demanding.

Perfectionism is also a major cause of procrastination. Fear that they cannot do a task perfectly, or anticipation of the effort involved to achieve perfection, often causes perfectionists to avoid tasks. Tasks become arduous rather than rewarding. Perfectionists may think that it is better to put in a halfhearted effort and maintain the belief that they could have done a great job, than to give their full effort and risk getting a mediocre mark.

The constant pressure that perfectionists put on themselves, as well as the lack of joy or sense of satisfaction they get from doing tasks is wearing and makes perfectionists more susceptible to anxiety and/or depression.

Making Changes

All of this isn't to say that you shouldn't strive to do well. Setting realistic goals based on what you want rather than on what you perceive others expect of you is constructive. Healthy achievers take pleasure in pursuing their goals rather than feeling stressed that they might not achieve perfection. Perfectionists can change. If you have tendencies towards perfectionism:

• Look at what you have accomplished in the past, assess whether it is realistic to continue those standards, and set small, achievable goals based doing well but maintaining some balance in your life.

• Decide on one or two things that are really important to you and put your effort into those goals. Lower your standards on other tasks.

• If you are feeling highly stressed, feel like giving up or find yourself avoiding necessary tasks, use this as a warning signal that you may have unrealistic expectations such as taking on too much or trying to do everything perfectly.

• Remember that people learn by making mistakes. If you're not taking risks because you think you might fail you are probably missing out on a lot of growth and learning.

• Set limits on how much time you will spend on a project and stick to them!

• Judge yourself by who you are, not by what you accomplish.

• Try not to compare yourself to anyone else.

• Lighten up by scheduling free time for fun and relaxation. (This actually makes you more creative and productive).

• Ask yourself: "What is the worst thing that could happen if I don't do this perfectly?" "Or if I fail?"

• Stop chasing the impossible dream. No one is, or ever will be, perfect.

Perfectionists often fear letting go of their high expectations thinking that they will become total slackers. Don't worry - people almost never move from one end of the continuum to the other.

Letting go of perfectionist tendencies requires time, effort and patience (and the willingness to accept that your efforts at change won't be perfect)! But healthy goal setting is within your reach ... and you will probably find yourself having a lot more fun!
