A faculty researcher from NAIT is hoping to create a new technology that can test air quality instantly - something that could save lives in the event of a chemical attack or an environmental accident.

In order to do that, NAIT is one of two technical colleges in the country to get a \$125,000 grant from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council for the research. It's a grant usually given to universities, like the University of Alberta.

Dr. Ron Currie, a senior faculty researcher with NAIT's Chemical Technology Program, says current technologies are often too slow to measure air quality and it can be complicated.

"As a researcher, I view this as a tremendous opportunity to learn," says Currie, who will be heading up the research project.

Currie says NAIT's research will help develop a new technology that will analyze samples that have a very wide concentration in range, and can do it very quickly.

> The new technology could involve testers or workers in Alberta's oil and gas industry carrying hand held, toastersized devices - like tricorders from the fictional Star Trek

universe - that can test air quality much more quickly, says Currie.

Currie's team of researchers, who have already developed a prototype, created a column apparatus that can be used in gas chromatography, an analytical chemistry technique that's used in a variety of industries to vaporize and separate mixtures into their component compounds for analysis.

Currie's prototype has greater capacity and is much more efficient than traditional ways to measure air quality, and it's cheaper, he said.

"We've removed the huge oven that is usually part of the gas chromatograph," says Currie.

"We are using an innovative heating approach so we will be able to heat faster, cool faster, and it will require little energy to cause the temperatures needed to separate the components.

"We have to heat to bring everything into the gas phase."

Stuart Cullum, an executive director for NAIT's home of applied research and development, says the grant and Currie's research are a perfect fit for the technical institute.

"NAIT's success in this competition is significant," said Cullum in a release.


"The program is highly competitive and successful applications demonstrate strong scientific evidence, as well as a clearly identified and welldescribed potential market.

"This is recognition that colleges and technical institutes can be competitive when it comes to research."

Currie's idea could mark "a significant advance in exciting technologies" that "could lead to excellent commercial opportunities," say NSERC reviewers who added the prototype could benefit companies in many sectors.

Like your teacher?

What makes a great teacher? The question has nearly as many answers as there are students at NAIT. For some, it's a person who encourages active learning. For others, it might be someone who gives prompt feedback. Still others may say that a good teacher is one who respects the diverse talents and learning styles of their students and accommodates them accordingly.

Whatever the reason, the NAIT Department of Teaching and Academic Development is asking students to nominate the best teachers in their respective programs for an Instructional Excellence Award. The awards are handed out each year at Convocation ceremonies, and are given to one teacher in each NAIT school.

First year

This is the first year that instructor excellence is being acknowledged on a separate platform from other annual awards given out at the school. Alison Lewis, co-ordinator of curriculum development and faculty support at the DTAD, explains that the school wanted these particular awards to have a bit of a bigger profile.

"The awards used to be part of something called SHINE, which rewarded a number of different kinds of achievement, but this year NAIT decided to make the instructional awards a stand-alone category," she says. "They wanted to promote the idea that teaching excellence is something that is really important to recognize."

The DTAD has employed a number of strategies to encourage students to submit nominations. These include a poster campaign, handbills, campuswide e-mail messages, and a particularly creative idea which brings back memories of elementary school.

"We've even used fortune tellers," Lewis explains, showing off one of the classic folded paper contraptions. Instead of picking colours and numbers, however, students choose from attributes like "motivates" or "inspires," and inside the flaps there is information about the nomination process.

Motivates

Radio and Television Arts instructor Jeannette LaBrie was an award recipient last year. She says that the recognition motivates her to continue striving for self-improvement. "It feels great," she says. "It's very rewarding to know that you are affecting students in a positive way and it makes you want to keep trying to provide more opportunities for them to be successful."

Lewis says that so far, response to the promotional blitz has been positive. "Every time I go to food services, the rack for the nomination forms needs to be refilled," she points out. "It's great to see."

A significant number of nominations have already been submitted, but nomination forms are still available at all program offices or any food services outlet and can be dropped off at the program office of the nominated instructor. Students can nominate almost any instructor for an award, though there are a few exceptions, which are listed on the forms. The deadline for submissions is Friday, Jan. 29.

Having a great idea can take you places.

Local businessman Darryl Weflen has proven this by being awarded \$10,000 from NAIT for his great idea.

Weflen, president of Airworks Compressors, won \$10,000 last month after entering the nova-NAIT Technology Commercialization Challenge, which encourages innovators and entrepreneurs to submit their research and ideas. NovaNAIT emphasizes new discoveries with practical applications, which is exactly what Weflen's idea embodied.

Invented

He invented an environmentally-friendly air compressor.

"The product was developed to operate on trucks and equipment that are powered by compressed natural gas," Weflen said. "The existing product was for diesel power equipment, but customers in the United States had an interest to move towards a compressed gas vehicle."

Not only can Weflen's ecofriendly compressor run the preferred fuel of compressed gas, but it can run three others including gasoline, propane, and e85. E85 consists of 85 per cent of ethanol and 15 per cent gasoline. However, compressed gas is cheaper and works more efficiently.

Weflen has already designed his air compressor to be different than most. Since other companies' products require the air compressors to be powered by a truck engine, his invention has a separate engine to reduce the amount of fuel and resources required to work, thus greatly reducing green house emissions.

At the forefront

"(My company) is at the forefront of anti-idle technology for fleet and service vehicles," Weflen said. "(We are) developing products that are designed to conserve energy, decrease greenhouse gas emissions and increase productivity while reducing costs for our most valuable asset, our customers."

Although the air compressor will be used in the United States first, Weflen plans to use novaNAIT's research support and prize money to develop the eco-air compressor market for Canada.

The novaNAIT Technology Commercialization Challenge is held annually.

NAIT CLASS IS ONE DIG EAU Aso, as Knight's pregnancy progressed

The stress of school can get to any student, but for some that's just the beginning. Angela Knight, a NAIT Medical Lab Technology student, has a husband in Afghanistan, family in Ontario and, on top of that, is 30 weeks pregnant. However, her tightly-knit classmates are not going to let her go it alone.

"As more and more people were finding out I was pregnant, everybody wanted to take part in the pregnancy," says Knight. "Even before my husband left, they offered help, even if it was just a hug."

Communication difficult

Opportunities to connect with her husband Jeff are difficult to schedule. Sometimes they communicate every day of the week, but other times she has to go two weeks with just one e-mail.

With Jeff away, Knight would be alone in Edmonton – if not for her classmates.

She moved here from Toronto, where her family remains, and her husband left for Afghanistan in October.

"Emotional [problems] are huge. You go home and there is nobody there and you have to deal with pregnancy and the stresses of school," she says.

Knight's classmates are impressed with how she's handled the situation. "She's really independent. She doesn't like to take a lot of help. She actually offers to help me instead," says Katherine Jones, Knight's friend and lab partner.

However, Knight's independence does not keep her classmates from doing everything they can to lend a hand.

Small things help, like when two classmates came to her home with food and kept her company. Also, as Knight's pregnancy progresses, Jones said she does everything she can to help her in the lab, like setting up and putting away the equipment.

"Christmas was very different for me this year, it was the most emotional," Knight says.

However, she adds that she never felt depressed about Christmas because of the atmosphere in her class and the bonds shared with her classmates.

She brought a small Christmas tree to the classroom and the class had a gift exchange.

Knight and Jones say they've been told by a number of NAIT staff members that theirs is the most unique group of students they have seen.

"It wouldn't change if she wasn't pregnant, it's a very close class and we take care of each other. We bonded together," says Jones.

Everyone concerned

Jones adds that if someone doesn't show up for class, everyone is concerned and someone calls the missing person to see if they are alright.

The class has even started a baby pool, with classmates betting on the sex of Knight's child as well as the exact time and date of birth.

A military veteran herself, having served in Bosnia among other places, Knight is anxiously awaiting Jeff's safe return.

"I can't wait for him to get home," she says. "My husband is taking parental leave, and I am going to give birth and finish school."

Knight is grateful for the support she has received. "I really appreciate my class. I really want my class to know that they are wonderful individuals," she says.

Knight's baby is due March 27.

The Career Fair will be held in the gym and the south lobby.



MP defends PM's decision

I would bet that a year ago you'd be hardpressed to find 100 people in Canada who had heard the term "prorogue." Now the word has become satirical gold for political cartoonists and Rick Mercer alike. And as varied as Canada is, so are the opinions on this break from sitting in Parliament.

Laurie Hawn, Conservative MP for Edmonton-Centre, said he doesn't look at the break as a vacation.

The notion that this is a holiday is just silly," said Hawn, adding that it's easy for Canadians to get mad at politicians. During the prorogation of Parliament, Hawn says he is still working in his constituency, and even invites students to come down and visit to discuss any concerns with him.

"I had a Town Hall [meeting] about [proroguing parliament] on Tuesday the 14th ... and am more than happy to come and speak at students' events," he said. Hawn also pointed to the extensive budget consultations that the government is doing as a reason to spend time out of Ottawa.

"We don't need to be sitting to get work done," he explained. "Government work is still happening, it's just not happening as visibly."

Critics of the government, however, say this is just another show of how democracy in Canada is dwindling. Linda Duncan, New Democrat Party MP for Edmonton-Strathcona, called the prorogation of Parliament "one more death knell to democracy at the federal level." Duncan stressed that all government bills will have to be re-submitted after Parliament resumes, including the Conservative Party's justice bills.

"Stephen Harper," said Duncan, "ran on this platform of openness, transparency and grassroots and now he's stopped his own agenda by proroguing Parliament," Duncan said.

Duncan also spoke about the public out-

cry – particularly through an anti-prorogation Facebook group with over 160,000 members – as proof that Canadians are simply not happy with the prime minister's decision to prorogue Parliament.

Despite the criticism by Duncan and other opposition members, Hawn suggests that not a lot is being lost by proroguing Parliament, pointing out that only 23 working days are actually being lost.

"With technology, I can get as much done whether I am in Ottawa or Timbuktu," he said. He added that even though potential legislation brought in by the Conservatives is automatically "dead" and has to be re-entered, opposition bills are not.

Parliament is scheduled to resume again on March 3, with a new session and throne speech, which is expected to lay out the economic and social priorities the government has come up with since Parliament last sat in Ottawa.

NAITSA gives \$30,000 for bursaries

In an effort to keep students more informed about student government affairs, this week I bring you the first installment of a new feature centred around the nuts and bolts of the NAITSA Senate.

I'll fill you in on the details of Senate meetings, and let you know about all the important discussions and decisions that these people face on behalf of the student body.

First and foremost, what is the NAITSA Senate? According to their website, "The NAITSA Senate is composed of 18 students, elected to represent each of the nine schools at NAIT. They meet on a bi-weekly basis to discuss issues that concern NAIT students."

Various reasons

Reasons for being on the NAITSA Senate are as varied as the students representing you. There's the altruistic "I want to do good" reason, and the "I want to pad my sweet resume" reason, among others. For me, it would be the free food. Never attend a Senate meeting hungry, as my craving skyrocketed while enjoying the aroma of pasta throughout the proceedings.

But enough about the food, because a 5:02 p.m., it was business time.

With no presentations to be made this week, Senators had a short meeting with three issues of note. First, the official welcome and approval of Crystal Bergeron, who beat out nine other candidates to become the new senator for the School of Health Sciences.

Money for bursaries

Secondly, a motion was passed to contribute \$30,000 to NAIT's Department of Advancement to fund grants and bursaries. The money will be divided into 56 bursaries worth \$500 each, and an additional two worth \$1,000 each. Any NAIT student can apply for these bursaries. They are based mostly on financial need, and applications are reviewed by a NAITSA committee. During question period – which is conducted in a much more mature fashion than in Ottawa – Vice President Academic Timothy Jobs answered questions about identifying and meeting with political allies in the Legislature as the unveiling of Alberta's latest budget swiftly approaches.

On a lighter note, Vice President Campus Life Bryce Althouse reported that the New Year's ski trip to Golden, B.C. was once again a success for NAITSA. Although apparently what happens in Golden stays in Golden.

Finally, President Geoff Tate, along with Jobs, met with representatives of NAIT regarding tuition increases and – more importantly to Tate – the potential cuts coming down the line as NAIT attempts to balance its books. Members of NAIT administration will be presenting to the Senate information about tuition and expenses on Jan. 27 and Feb. 10.

NAITSA Senate meetings are held every other Wednesday at 5 p.m.

Check with the NAITSA office for each meeting's time and location. Your Senate rep's information is available at www. naitsa.ca, and they likely wouldn't mind if you approached them about issues near and dear to your heart.

Wildrose Alliance Party primer

Don't look now, but Alberta's political landscape is in the midst of some big changes. That growing rumble you may have heard over the past year or two is the steadily increasing momentum of the upstart Wildrose Alliance hensive platform and strategizing about Party, which threatens to wrestle power from the grip of the Progressive Conservatives, who have held it for nearly 40 years. Many Albertans feel it's a matter of when, not if, the Alliance takes over the premier's office.

But where did this party come from? And why has it grown in popularity at such a rapid rate? Here's a Coles Notes history to bring you up to speed.

The Wildrose Alliance was formed in January, 2008 after two small conservative parties, the Wildrose Party of Alberta and the Alberta Alliance Party, agreed to merge. The two parties felt that since they shared similar political ideals, they stood a better chance of challenging the Conservatives in the March, 2008 election by banding together. The party's only sitting MLA, Paul Hinman, was appointed as its first leader and the Wildrose Alliance was off and running. Like many infant parties, the Alliance experienced its

share of growing pains. Their president resigned, and pre-

election polls indicated the party had the support of only six per cent of voters. In fact, what many experts perceived as a growing backlash against the ruling PCs never translated into results at the polls. The Conservatives actually increased their number of seats in the Legislature, Hinman narrowly lost his seat, and some felt the Wildrose Alliance would take the hint and fade into the background. Instead, the party spent the next year or so building a comprehow it could drum up support throughout the province.

Last April, Hinman announced he would step down as leader, stating he had always intended to serve on an interim basis. At the party's leadership

convention in June, three candidates announced their candidacy; and in October, former Canadian Federation of Independent Business provincial director Danielle Smith was elected. In the meantime, Hinman won a byelection in the constituency of Calgary-Glenmore, and suddenly the Wildrose Alliance was back in the game.

Since Smith's election as leader, support for the party

has grown at an increasingly rapid rate. In early November they had already risen to 28 per cent support in the polls, and by year's end they had overtaken the PCs with 39 per cent support. Just a couple of weeks ago, on Jan-

uary 4, Smith announced that two sitting Conservative party members, Rob Anderson and Heather Forsyth, had crossed the legislative floor and joined the Wildrose Alliance. The party now holds more seats in the Legislature than the NDP, and has up to three years to continue building momentum before the next provincial election.

Smith's vision is that of a "mainstream, big tent, centre-right" party which is a credible alternative for conservative voters.

Upon being elected, she said: "Every 30 or 40 years, we get tired of the government that's in power and we sweep them out and we look to a new alternative. I think we have an opportunity to catch one of those historic waves."

It's too early to say just yet, but she just might be in that proverbial right place at the right time. The interesting thing to see will be this: if the Wildrose Alliance party does indeed get elected in the not-too-distant future, what impact will it have on the life of the average Albertan?

Stay tuned, folks. This one's just getting interesting. Next week: Doin' the Cabinet Shuffle.

very few years there is an unfortunate event I that shakes the world in ways we least expect. In 2001, we stared terrorism in the face with the attack on the World Trade Centre. New Orleans fell victim to a hurricane that left thousands homeless, hungry or dead. Most recently, rating 7.0 on the Richter scale, an earthquake of massive propor-

tions ripped through one of the world's poorest nations. To date, this devastating disaster has left over 500,000 Haitian people without shelter, an additional 72,000 dead, and a country without food, electricity or running water.

Nations from around the world have flooded Haiti with monetary support, and countless governments have provided manpower to help with relief efforts. As of yesterday, \$210 million has been donated to the Haiti relief efforts, and the number is growing daily. Churches, schools, communities, governments and individuals have all united to help a country in need.

Miracle baby

Tuesday night I was watching the news as they pulled out a baby that had been trapped in the rubble for five days. Immediately health workers from three different countries surrounded the young girl, who was no larger than my arm. The child was placed on medication and given something to re-hydrate her, and she lived. Imagine losing your child under a ton of debris and five days later having a foreign health worker tell you that your baby girl has been found and she's going to be OK.

That's amazing! In a time of mourning I find it inspirational to see the world come together to resolve an issue that doesn't affect everyone. Too many times these days we hear about war and terrorism. It is nice to hear about unity for a change. It's nice to recognize that sometimes empathy and compassion can extend beyond our borders and reach out to a place that has next to nothing. The only return on investment people will see is the satisfaction in knowing they did something to help a cause – that is true generosity.

On the other hand, it's upsetting to know it takes a disaster of such magnitude to create an international response. Imagine the change we could make on the international stage if we always allocated resources in such a way and focused on a problem that didn't reside in Afghanistan for once.

What does it take?

According to the United Nations, world hunger could be solved at a total cost of \$30 billion. I understand \$200 million is a far cry from \$30 billion, but if the world can produce \$200 million in only seven days, who knows what could be done in a year. Crises are happening every day, every moment, in every country. People in our very own streets are freezing, hungry and dying; what are we doing to help that cause? Why is it necessary for a country to fall apart before society is willing to acknowledge a disaster? Disasters, both big and small, are still disasters, it shouldn't matter where, or how, they happen.

A 7.0 on the Richter scale is going to shake up any country, big, small, rich or poor. Disaster response programs are now becoming common in our culture, but it's not the same everywhere. We're blessed to live in a country with a solid infrastructure and stable government. Let's not take this for granted. We get so caught up in our daily lives that we forget how important it is to lend a helping hand to people who need it. It doesn't need to be in the form of money to Haiti, but I think it is important for the people who reap the benefits of our society do something to pay society back. When you go home tonight look in the mirror and ask yourself - what have I done lately?

Joey Vandervet Badminton





The film tells the tale of a lone wanderer, Eli (Washington), who travels with a supposedly all problem solving book through a nuclear-war ravaged land, infested with ruthless derelicts to massacre, and where stylish sunglasses are necessary because of a hole in the ozone layer.

For those who may have fallen asleep during the other recent apocalypse film, *The Road*, this is a perfect substitute.

Sam Raimi, the director of the Spider-Man films, withdrew from the project due to his doubt that he could finish the movie for the planned May 2011 deadline while keeping creative integrity throughout the movie.

Maguire said in an interview last week there was "great stuff in terms of the story and script." That's believable, since before the scrap Anne Hathaway and John Malkovich were both confirmed as newcomers for the sequel. It's safe to say that adding new love interests and villains to any trilogy with familiar characters like Spider-Man would have kept things interesting for the audience.

As of right now, no one is confirmed to take over the new project as director or star. What we do know is that the new film will re-do the original story and focus on a teenaged Peter Parker in high school. The reboot of the franchise is set for summer of 2012.

Although people all over the world have fallen in love with Raimi's Spider-Man tril-

ogy, the time has come for a change. Maybe the blow wouldn't have been so hard if Raimi and Tobey hadn't announced a fourth and fifth movie to be released. Now we are stuck with a reboot and an attempt to re-launch the character in a different direction. When approached by MTV News, even James Cameron stated that he wouldn't be interested in the reboot, saying "no, no, it's a little bit like sloppy seconds."


Raimi was able to turn this monumental

comic book story into something that the whole world could enjoy (seeing as how the trilogy has made over \$2.5 billion world wide), while bringing this old-time superhero to new generations.

But all hope is not lost. With the slight disappointment of *Spider-Man 3*, and the criticism of Spider-Man not living up to the "wit" and "humour" of the comics,

some hardcore Spidey fans are looking at the reboot as a good thing. They have James Vanderbilt (*X-Men Origins: Wolverine*) lined up to write the script, and hopefully they will be able to please (again) an already solid fan base.

One thing's for sure though, the web-slinging's not over, and we should look forward to more from our friendly neighborhood Spider-Man.


"We are just all jealous of one another and all want to be front man," explained Taylor.

Laptop theft does occur. This information can provide users with an overview on how laptop theft can be prevented.

The main reason why laptops are sought by thieves is the same reason people like to use them. They are small, easily carried, powerful mobile computers that provide the user with the means to work outside of the office easily.

Of course, not all laptop thefts are committed in an attempt to grab valuable property, some thefts are to gain the proprietary information stored on the laptop itself. According to some research, approximately 10 per cent to 15 per cent of laptops stolen are taken with intent to sell the data.

Given the risk of laptop theft and the potential losses that laptop theft can cause, what are some of the steps that individuals and organizations can implement to prevent it?

NON-TECHNICAL SOLUTIONS

• Keep the laptop out of sight. When not in use, the laptop should be safely tucked away in a locked desk drawer or cabinet. Never leave a laptop in a locker. Always take it with you or put it in the trunk of your vehicle ... out of sight, out of mind.

• If you work in an office, keep your office space locked when you are not in it. Everyone is busy working, so relying on coworkers to watch your office while you are out is taking a significant risk. It is amazing how quickly items can grow legs when left unattended.

• Communicate employee responsibility of owning a laptop. Extra care must be taken to ensure it is safe and secure.

• Be aware of your environment and report suspicious people or events to Campus Security Services at 780-471-7477.

CABLES

One of the cheapest and most cost-effective solutions to deter thieves is to attach a security cable to your laptop. In most cases, the very fact that you have made the effort to physically secure the laptop to an immobile object will be enough to cause a potential thief to look for easier prey.

SECURE STORAGE CABINETS

Don't leave laptops unsecured in general areas. If your work group has "common use" laptops, lock them in a storage area or cabinet. Do not leave them in the general work area for everyone to see and potentially steal.

LABEL AND TAG THE LAPTOP AND ALL ACCESSORIES

Make sure that everything that can be labelled is labelled with the name of the individual or organization it belongs to and ensure that these labels are conspicuous. Record the serial number of the laptop and have that information accessible if you need it.

Laptop theft will always be a possibility. Do your part to

ensure that it doesn't happen to you. For more tips and information visit www.nait.ca/security.


