Stewart, who is the director of media, technology and telecommunications for Deloitte Canada Research, had plenty good to say about why he and David Burry, novaNAIT's manager for enterprise development and technology transfer program decided to do the presentation here at NAIT.

"Edmonton is a technology hub. You've The Shaw Theatre at NAIT was vibrant got the U of A, great technical schools,

and great healthcare those are your best natural resources right now," said Stewart.

"Truthfully, Edmonton probably won't come out with something like RIM [Research in Motion], sort of like how you can't make Hollywood out of a small town, but there is great potential for all sorts of smaller digital media, and you've got great minds coming out of your schools."

Stewart also said he believes that Alberta will have "tremendous success in cancer research, even if it is not happening as quickly as we may have thought."

Stewart and his panel discussed with the audience some surprising trends, including the fact that of the 15 per cent of the North American population that use smartphones, only three per cent are iPhones, indicating that while smartphones will continue to be huge, they are not as affordable and massively used as one might think.

When asked what he thought one of the biggest trends are right now, Stewart discussed what he called the "death of traditional media."

"Advertising is going through an ero-

sion. With so much social network advertising, as in five or six cents spent per ad, more marketing money will be available for developing brands and brand equity," he said. "The demographics on newspapers are hard, no offence to anyone here, but lots of newspapers are wondering when their last subscriber is going to die."

But, Stewart said, newspapers wouldn't likely disappear altogether.

"Not that there will not be any more newspapers, just fewer and with different funding models," he said. "Technology is like a oneway ratchet. People will not go back to the old ways any more than I would go look for my old typewriter if my laptop broke. I would simply

buy a new laptop."

Also, many positive things were said about Alberta in terms of the environment.

Stewart described our cleaner coal, water treatment systems and carbon capture, stating

"the marriage between cleaner technology and new media is going to be very sensible."

When asked whether the presentation seemed beneficial to those who attended it, an attendee said "it definitely gave me a lot to think about. He is a great speaker."

It looks like the Deloitte futurist left a good impression here at NAIT.

NAIT food prices take a hike

As many students return to the lineups in Common Market and Fresh Express, some have noticed some price increases.

"These prices are ridiculous," said Dustin Stashko, a second semester radio student. "Last time I checked, we're students. I

know there's a monopoly here, but the recession's over."

But while many students have been complaining over the increases in prices, Kathryn Howden, Food Services manager, said NAIT's price

increases are in line with normal business

"Commodities are changing in the open market all the time, so our prices change and we need to have prices that will maintain our business as a successful one," she explained. "One of the things we want to make sure is

that we are not subsidized by NAIT."

Franchise brands are completely owned by NAIT, Howden explained, leaving little for NAIT to do in terms of pricing.

"Most students and staff both want franchise brands on campus and I think they lend some excitement and consistent products, so they have prices that are market prices and

we are bound by those," Howden said.

She said while Food Services fully operates Common Market, business in the Fresh Express is a little bit different.

"Food Services operates the front area and back of

the house [but] the four station grills are run by students in the school of hospitality," she said. "We don't have any control over the prices."

However, Food Services did do its research and compared market prices before anything was raised this year.

"Our biggest focus is to maintain the

value and the quality of our product," Howden said. "When we look at the meal you get at any of our outlets, the value is incredible if you compare it to market standards."

"For \$6.75 at NAIT you are getting a sixounce ground sirloin, so a top of the line burger with all the fixes and fries, all for \$6.75. At one of the high end places we looked at, they offered a 5.3-ounce beef burger with cheese only and fries and it's over \$10. That's already a 32 per cent decrease," Howden explained.

Howden also added that a very small percentage of NAIT's food products actually rose this semester.

"Less than 10 per cent of our products over the summer had a price increase. We were able to maintain over 90 per cent of our prices and we were pretty proud of

that," she said. "The price increases that we did implement were between one and five per cent of that 10 per cent."

The commodity prices that increased the most over the last year were things like pork, coffee, dairy and commodities. Food Services prices for coffee in particular, jumped 14 per cent. But Howden said Food Services continues to have two coffee providers to keep the competition healthy.



New faces in place

NAIT's president and CEO Dr. Sam Shaw has officially stepped down after 13 years in the position.

After announcing his retirement in July, NAIT's Board of Governors launched an international search to find a new president and CEO but the search – which is ongoing – has taken longer than expected

David Janzen, NAIT's vice president administration and chief financial officer, has stepped up as acting president and CEO for Shaw as of Monday.

"Needing to have more time to complete the selection process for the new president and CEO and really putting an emphasis on making sure enough time is taken to select the right candidate, they [the Board of Governors] asked me if I would be acting president and CEO," Janzen explained. "I'm pleased to be able to fulfill that role."

While board chairman Doug Goss said last

month that Shaw had intended on staying in his position until a replacement had been found, two factors led to his early departure.

"We had hoped to have a person in place sooner but it became evident that it was going to take significantly longer," Goss said. "Secondly, Sam had an offer in the private sector that he didn't want to pass up."

But both Janzen and Goss said students won't likely see any changes during the interim period.

"I don't think NAIT students should experience any impact whatsoever with the [leadership] changes," Goss said.

NAIT has a fouryear business plan cur- the private sector that he rently in place and Janzen expects to "stay the course" and help achieve the school's goals set for this current year.

And NAITSA president Timothy Jobs agreed.

"I think he's simply going to keep the ship steady while we search for a new president," Jobs said.

He adds that having worked with Janzen in the past, he expects nothing but good to come from Janzen's interim period as president.

"I expect him to do a wonderful job."

Shaw declined a request for an interview with the Nugget.

Meanwhile, NAIT is expecting another leadership change next week.

On Sunday (Oct. 10), Goss will step down as

board chairman. James Cumming, who has served on the NAIT

> Board of Governors for six years, will become the new chairman.

> Cumming, a past NAIT graduate himself, said he is excited to take on the position of chair and assured that the board's human resources committee is continuing to search for the best, permanent replacement for Shaw.

"We're right in the middle of our search," Cumming said. "We expect over the next cou-

ple months hopefully that we'll have that position filled."

Janzen is expected to remain as acting president and CEO until at least February of the new year, when he is also set to retire from NAIT.

Cumming will serve as board of governors chair for the next three years.

Catherine Ye (CY): What are the key issues for your platform?

Dave Dowling (DD): My main issues are democracy, environment and poverty. Having democracy will make people feel that they have control over government once they are elected in. Rachel Jacques (RJ): Why do you want to run for mayor?

Andrew Lineker (AL): I have been taking a long look over the past few years and feel we have been going in a downward spiral. my Edmonton heritage and want to keep the city's heritage alive. I have 18 years experience in the political arena and have studied many formats, political parties and platforms over the years. Politics is my passion. You will see some of those results by going onto my website and tak[ing] a look at my studies. I have the background knowledge and experience to perform duties as mayor of the Edmonton. I want to hear issues from Edmontonians and together we can work out solutions for the betterment of our city. I do not make empty promises like most politicians offer during a campaign. I research everything before I put it on my website. We need to manage the city the same as we manage our homes and finances. We need to separate our wants from our needs.

RJ: What are the key issues for your

AL: My vision [is] fighting for democracy - democracy for all the citizens of Edmonton. I feel we, the citizens, should be allowed to not only vote for current and future issues, but should be informed where the City of Edmonton is going regarding major changes for development, expansion, taxation, pertinent updates, [and more]. The taxpayers should be allowed to know where money [has] been issued, why it's been issued, and when it's issued. Decisions regarding our way of life are being planned and discussed without our knowledge. We aren't given the right to choose what we want anymore as everything is decided without the intervention or consultation of the taxpayers. We should be given the right to vote on new large plebiscites. Not only have we had that right taken away, but

gered the rights we currently have. If we choose not to vote, we may place our right to vote in jeopardy. There was a 27 per cent voter turnout last election. We placed a small minority of citizens in charge and now we have no voice. We need to hold businesses and people accountable for their actions or lack thereof. We need to acknowledge our seniors and their contribution to our city. We need to stimulate our economy by taking a look at taxes for smaller local existing and new businesses. We need to jump start our economy quickly and stimulate growth and leadership in our communities. Looking at urban sprawl in our city needs an incentive for new buyers to buy existing homes in already established areas of the city. My ETS plan with proposed new LRT lines has been thought out with a greener view [and] more efficient routes. We need to protect our citizens and we need to develop an open line with the police force and increase our beat patrols. Our water is [also] very important. It meets the bare standards as set out by the federal government; however, our water doesn't have enough alkaline to kill off cancer, for instance. We need to exercise caution and our health and look at increasing the alkalinity and soften our water. It will save on our health system; replacement of faucets, pipes, soap, razors, etc., and all for the same cost of the funding the city gave to the zoo last year. Why were our utilities sold out to an American company? And why did we only find out about it after it was all said and done? When speaking with many people while door knocking starting last April, these issues were critical and need to be addressed.

RJ: Can you talk about your stance on student-related issues?

AL: After speaking with members of the student executives last week, I empathize with your plight for the need of student residences on NAIT and expansion of the facility. I would like to see this addressed for new and existing students. I would like the city to co-operate and work with NAIT in order to develop new residences or dorms as soon as possible, as they are long overdue. I realize that the traffic flow to and from NAIT is difficult and the LRT won't be available to NAIT for at least four years from now, so we must address this issue immediately by proposing new and innovative ideas.

RJ: Why should NAIT students/post-secondary students vote for you?

AL: I believe that post-secondary education is extremely important. In fact, NAIT is the key focal point educational facility for trades people, engineers, drafts people and the list goes on. [Also] NAIT is crucial to development in our north. We need to facilitate the students of NAIT to help them further their education Students are our future and we need listen to their needs and work together now and in the future.

RJ: Is there anything else you would like to tell NAIT students?

Green roof project

Students in the Bachelor of Technology in Technology Management (BTech) Capstone Applied Research Project course are thinking green – green roofs

Green roof projects are all about discovering what different types of vegetation and plant life can sustainably grow on rooftops. Their objective is to provide insulation, help lower urban air temperatures and filter pollutants and carbon dioxide out of the air.

NAIT's green roof project allows students to test many different types of vegetation that can be best suited for Edmonton's harsh climates

Dr. Leonie Nadeau, senior faculty

researcher for the school of resources and environmental management at NAIT, explained that students are hard at work on the project.

"There are three Capstone students. There are also Wagner high school students involved," Nadeau said. "There are three horticulture courses they offer and a module in one of the courses is a green roof top."

Wagner students have a lab assigned to them, where they are partnered with NAIT Capstone students. NAIT students bring samples of their work for the Wagner students to learn with.

Nadeau explained the two teams have a lot of good corporations partnered with them and that they have started to see the challenges of the project since it began. But the project hasn't been without its bumps.

"The only thing that was unexpected was all the logistics that goes with it," Nadeau said. "It takes months and months and months for everything to be planned and worked out"

Each of the Capstone students put eight hours of work into the project last Saturday when the students viewed the Williams Engineering green rooftop at

On average, each student involved in the project spends about eight hours a week working on the project. The entire work for the project not only includes a hands-on portion, but there is paper work and extra tasks that also need to be

As for the success of the project, Nadeau explained that everyone involved

"Everyone involved is very excited and the B-Tech program people are really interested in keeping this project going,"

And the project has continued to get more partners. Nadeau said there is a small project recently started with the Waste Management Resource Centre.

"We started some work there last semester and we are working with containers. The procedure that we are using is the same as the green rooftop but the only difference is we can move the containers," she said.

It takes three years for a green rooftop to be established.

An explosion of jellyfish

Around the globe, a venomous creature is

Wondrous and elegant, it has no bones, blood or brains, but the jellyfish has survived in our oceans for more than 500 million years.

Now, its numbers are exploding.

Species of jellyfish around the world are blooming out of control and infesting our oceans.

Australia, Indonesia, Japan and the United States are all feeling the effects.

Scientists warn that the explosive growth of jellyfish populations in oceans and seas around the world is a sign of marine ecosystems being devastated by overfishing, nutrient pollution, global warming and the introduction of non-native species. And the problem is getting worse.

Roughly 500 million jellyfish weighing 450 pounds each are hitting the Sea of Japan on a daily basis and Australian beaches are overrun

Tourist beaches across the planet are being closed on a more frequent basis as more and more jellyfish begin to appear and take over the

On top of all this, jellyfish are beginning to clog water intake pipes of nuclear power plants, causing some to have to shut down, including one in the Philippines that resulted in 40 million people sitting in darkness.

Jellyfish are called cockroaches of the sea because they can thrive under many conditions and are now experiencing population booms because of the changes in the oceans, brought on by man-made influences.

The jellyfish is linked to ocean pollution, and in areas called dead zones, where there is little oxygen because of pollution, jellyfish dominate as the only species able to survive

As well, the only enemies jellyfish have are sea turtles, and all but seven species of sea turtles are listed as threatened, in decline or endangered.

The warming seas from global warming are also allowing the jellyfish to spread wild and

One thing to note about the jellyfish is that if it feels harmed or threatened, the female will expose her eggs, and the male exposes his sperm, meaning all the killing can create a million more. So the upset fisherman hacking the jellyfish up and putting them back in the ocean creates the biggest breeding ground of all.

With most fish stocks expected to be extinct by 2048, all that may be left in the once thriving oceans will be jellyfish, and try as we might, I don't think we will ever see that on the menu at a restaurant.

The jellyfish are an early warning sign of the effects of global warming and man on our

Unless we do something now, our oceans could become dominated by the jellyfish, ultimately making it one of the most dominant species on the planet.

In today's world of 24-hour entertainment, we are often so inundated with information that we don't take the time to look at things on a detailed level. We live off headlines, sound bytes and four-sentence summaries in order to stay informed, sacrificing a full understanding of most subjects. When it comes to sports, that means condensing all

the important stories of the day into a one-hour nightly show like *Sportscentre* or summing up the news in a series of links on a website. The very nature of the sports news cycle means that we don't often spend a lot of time on the last game or play because there is always another right around the corner.

So, when a documentary series like ESPN's 30 For 30 comes along, it's a welcome opportunity for us to relive some memorable moments in sports history at a much more relaxed, dare I say human, pace. The widely acclaimed – not to mention, widely varied – series has given me a new perspective on a number of significant milestone events and opened my eyes to some of which I was never even aware.

The concept of 30 For 30 is simple – ESPN selected 30 of what they call "today's best storytellers" to each create a

film surrounding an important event in the sports world in each year from 1979-2009. The goal is to give sports fans added insight into the modern history of sports, all while celebrating the network's 30th anniversary.


By all accounts, the results of the project have been phenomenal. I've seen maybe half of the 30 docs so far, and I've yet to come across one that hasn't either fascinated or astounded me, or both. There's *Kings Ransom*, which examines the Oilers' infamous trade of Wayne Gretzky in 1988, featuring present-day interviews with Glen Sather, who can still barely contain his disdain for former Oilers owner Peter Pocklington. Or check out *The Two Escobars*, which tracks the rise and fall of Colombian drug kingpin Pablo Escobar and his involvement in the tragic death of national football team captain Andrés Escobar. Did you like the Matt Damon/Morgan Freeman rugby pic *Invictus*? Learn the truth behind the Hollywood script in *The 16th Man*.

The list goes on. Features on Terry Fox (co-directed

by none other than Steve Nash), the USFL, and even the relationship between Mike Tyson and Tupac Shakur highlight this impressive collection. My personal favourite is June 17, 1994, which follows the television coverage of

the notorious O.J. Simpson car chase and the profound effect it had on how our society views and consumes celebrity and tabloid news.

But honestly, you can't go wrong with any of these films. I've spoken to casual and serious sports fans alike and I've yet to meet someone who hasn't been impressed by the depth and care these filmmakers have taken in putting the docs together. They appeal to sports fans, history buffs, movie lovers and just about anybody else who simply loves a good story, well told.

Best-of-7 way to go


English, and not take it upon themselves to evolve as well?




Regardless, the night was definitely interesting with some great rap and hip-hop tunes. The aggravated K'naan was definitely the best part of the show.

In the meantime, there's always the Internet.



The detail and precision taken by the animators is absolutely spectacular and, in 3D presentation, the environment and ocean surroundings were breathtaking.


The overall movie had a fantastic story line and message for people of all ages, and I would highly recommend it to anyone with a heart of adventure or fantasy.

Addressing locker safety



Locker thefts tend to be in, but not limited to, remote areas of the school and / or in low traffic areas. In many of these thefts, specific items are targeted, leading security personnel to believe that the perpetrators monitor the area before they strike. Once the thief or thieves spot a likely target, they wait until the area is clear, and then, by utilizing a small and easily hidden pair of bolt cutters, quickly cut the lock and remove the valuables. This crime can be committed and the thief or thieves can vacate the premises within

As lockers are used to store valuables while students attend class or perform job duties, it is important that the lockers be well secured. Following are a number of tips to decrease the likelihood that you will become a victim of locker theft.

To reduce the chance of becoming a locker theft victim follow these few tips:

- Purchase a high quality lock. The price of a quality lock is slightly higher, but its value is related to the value of the locker contents.
- Always fully engage the lock. For combination types, spin the dial to ensure it is secured. Tug on the lock before leaving.
- Do not bring any large sums of money or unnecessary valuables to school and store them in your locker. To do so is inviting unneeded risk.

- Do not record your locker combination on, or about, the locker or the lock. For a key lock, keep the extra key with you in a safe place.
- Observe the people around you and know the people that have lockers around your locker area.
- If you observe suspected criminal activity, do not challenge those involved. Instead, immediately proceed to the nearest telephone and inform Security.
- When you observe someone other than a NAIT peace officer using bolt cutters to cut a lock from a locker, contact Security immediately.
- If you see someone loitering near lockers or in the area or taking an unusual interest in locker contents, be
- Take note of the person's description, height, approximate age and any identifying characteristics or
- Report these to NAIT Campus Security Services. If you have information about a crime, contact Campus Security Services at

780-471-7477. If you wish to remain anonymous, contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477). You will remain anonymous, and, if the information you provide leads to a conviction, you could eligible for a reward of up to \$2,000. Visit www.nait.ca/security for more security tips.

> from this event in the best ways, through interaction and education. The knowledge and team building strategies that came from the event will help clubs be successful and efficient throughout the year.




make friends. The event brought together all kinds of people who would have never otherwise met," commented participant Evan

There is always a tender spot in my heart for a good old-fashioned zombie killa-thon. Good thing Dead Rising 2 is worth the four years wait since the original was released.

The hero this time is Chuck Greene, a widowed ex-motocross champion who is fighting for his young daughter's life. His wife was killed in the Las Vegas outbreak years ago, and his daughter, Katey, was infected. Luckily, there is a drug called Zombrex that has to be administered every 24 hours – but it's very expensive.

So, Chuck works on a sleazy reality game show that pits the living to fight on motorbikes against the walking dead, until he is framed for letting the zombies loose one night.

The gameplay is exactly the same as the original, inspired by the 1979 movie Dawn of the Dead, but adds online co-op play, where another person can drop into your game and assist on quests. You have 72 hours (elapsed game time) to find survivors, find Katey Zombrex and clear your name until the military arrives. The story doesn't take itself seriously, with cheesy dialogue and over the top enemies


The zombies are the main enemy, but the boss fights consist of living psychopaths who have been mentally affected by the situation, such as a chef who wants to make a dinner out of you and someone in a mascot uniform too obsessed with his role. Fighting these people is the most difficult aspect of the game, because they are extremely hard to kill.

You find firearms, but rely mostly on melee weapons from swords and knives to chairs and signs. There is also a system where you customize weapons by mixing items with each other at a workbench. For example, you can put together a baseball bat and nails, or put gasoline in a water gun to make a flamethrower or later in the game use a wheelchair and strap assault rifles to it.

Maximizing your reading



TIMELY TIPS MARGARET MAREAN NAIT Student Counselling

Reading scientific or technical material can be frustrating because of the large number of facts and details, and the complex terminology. Be prepared to read materials more than once for a thorough understanding. Here are some suggestions to enhance understanding

and retention of scientific readings:

- ▶ Preview the chapter looking over the chapter title, introduction, subheadings, figures, diagrams, italicized or boldfaced words, and summaries. This lets your brain know what to expect so you can organize and store the information more effectively.
- ▶ Skim the chapter quickly read first and last sentences of paragraphs and try to pull out major ideas. The purpose of this is to get a general idea of the material. This should not be very time consuming. (If you can skim text-book or note package material to be covered in a lecture beforehand you will get a lot more out of a lecture).
- ► Then read for detail, focusing on the material highlighted in your course outline and in class.
 - ► Read actively:

- formulate questions from the subheadings and read to answer them
- look ahead to homework questions or questions at the end of the chapter and read for the answers
- translate abstract formulas into verbal explanations
- write down procedures in step form
- draw your own diagrams to illustrate and explain problems and to summarize material
- visualize what you are reading
- anticipate possible exam questions and the responses
- think about application to the "real world" how will this material be useful in your field or how is it related to something you already know
 - make flash cards as you read

- write a question on one side with the answer on the back, a word on one side with the definition on the back, or a formula on one side and when and how to use it on the back.

- ▶ Read dense material in small blocks; for example read one section or paragraph in your textbook and then make some notes on it or do some questions related to it.
- ► Stop after reading every paragraph or subsection to recall what you have read; tell it to yourself in your own words.
- ► Have a dictionary or program such as www.dictionary.com nearby. Look up any words you don't understand right away.
- ► Leave a wide margin on the left hand side of your paper when taking class notes so that you can supplement

them with notes from the textbook. Try to create a single study source.

- ► If you can read ahead by skimming the material for the next lecture, you will understand and retain the lecture information more easily.
- ➤ When learning new material, you should not read for more than 25 to 30 minutes. Take a 5 or 10 minute break, and then go on to a different subject.

Think you might have a reading problem? A counsellor can help you determine if there is a problem and suggest ways to resolve it. Peer tutors can earn money

Courses don't always come easily to students, admit it, you've all been there.

With such a vast variety of programs it isn't always easy to find someone willing to help with course specific material. This year, it's been harder than ever.

NAIT's Academic Success Centre, which co-ordinates tutors for students looking for help in certain subjects, is in "desperate" need of tutors.

"I have many students who come to me from all programs," explained Kristin Janzen, NAIT's tutor co-ordinator.

"They ask me for help and there is obviously a huge need for peer tutors."

The school has been trying to recruit student tutors for all programs and subject areas, Janzen said. Although the current number of students signed up as potential tutors are on par with last year, she said the numbers need to be higher.

"I wouldn't say there is less people signed up than any other year. It's just that we don't have enough."

Janzen said she'd like to have at least 100 student tutors available for those who need help.

"It's so hard to know exactly where I am going to need tutors because it depends on who comes in and asks for one but I am really trying hard to cover all of the programs if I can," Janzen said.

She is encouraging students who have succeeded in the past to help new students strengthen their skills.

The requirements for students to become a "peer tutor" are that they must have completed at least one semester at NAIT and maintained an average of 75 per cent or higher. Peer tutors make up to \$15 an hour.

Peer tutoring pairs a student with an appropriate tutoring partner.

After they have been matched, students regulate their own hours, pricing and subject areas.

Another tutoring program offered at

NAIT is the SDD program.

This program pairs approved tutors with students with disabilities.

Janzen said tutors should be empathetic, patient and confident while interacting with other students.

For those who are interested in becoming a peer tutor and haven't yet completed a semester at NAIT, continue to focus on your grades and achievements.

By doing so, students can guarantee their own success and eventually provide the opportunity for another student to follow in their footsteps.


