April is officially Daffodil Month! To others, the daffodil is simply a flower; however, to the Canadian Cancer Society it is a sign of hope against cancer. These yellow, cheerful flowers are used to symbolize hope and instill faith that cancer can be defeated.

Last Wednesday, March 30, the Canadian Cancer Society dropped by the NAIT South Lobby and sold these cheerful flowers for a good cause. This was part of the Daffodil Days campaign. Some NAIT students also volunteered to help sell the daffodils to help raise money in support of the fight against cancer.

Most of the students thought this was a great idea.

"The proceeds will not only go to cancer research and funding but buying the plant will also save the ozone layer against global warming," said Jameel Waniwan, a NAIT Business Administration student.

As the ozone layers continue to deplete, harmful UV rays turn out to be more damaging to the skin, which can lead to increased rates of skin cancer. All the funds will go to the best cancer research available and to programs or services for those affected with cancer.

Daffodil Days began in Toronto in the 1950s. A group of Canadian Cancer Society volunteers organized a fundraising tea and decided to decorate the tables with daffodils. This soon came to be known as Daffodil Teas. Different volunteers encouraged the idea of Daffodil Teas which garnered a great deal of support. The Canadian Cancer Society raised over a \$1,000 the first year. This idea was embraced by other provinces across Canada as well as the American Cancer Society.

There are many different ways to raise awareness about cancer. One of the events that the Canadian Cancer Society established is the Relay for Life. It is an overnight non-competitive relay that involves teams of 10 people who take turns walking, running, or wheeling around a track. In 2009, over 207,000 Canadians participated in Relay for Life events, making up 21,135 teams.

Last Saturday, April 2, Edmonton City Coun. Karen Leibouvici, along with Stephanie Walchuk (Relay for Life Leadership – Co-Chair), and Tracy Dryden (Honorary Survivor for the 2011 Relay for Life) led the event at Southgate Centre. The annual

Canora a place for the homeless

On Thursday, March 24, government officials and prominent members of the community gathered to officiate the opening of Canora Place, an apartment complex on the west side of Edmonton. The main aim of Canora Place is to provide housing for previously homeless Edmontonians.

Developed by the Jasper Place Health and Wellness Centre, Canora Place was a project funded by both the provincial government and Homeward Trust Edmonton.

Homeward Trust is a not for profit organization based in Edmonton. By co-ordinating the needs of the community and working with government and local agencies, they are working towards the goal of ending homelessness in Edmonton.

The Hon. Minister of Housing and Urban Affairs Jonathan Denis was in attendance for the grand opening. "The new units will provide homeless people with a permanent home and the supports they need to address their individual issues in order to build healthier and independent lives – which strengthen both them and the community," he remarked.

The Homeward Trust, through government programs and grants, was able to donate 1.8 million in funds to the project, while the Government of Alberta contributed nearly \$4.2 million.

The apartment complex is three-floors tall, with 30 units which are self contained. Fifteen of those units are bachelor suites, 14 are one bedroom suites and there is one two-bedroom unit. The hope is to get people who are considered "chronically homeless" and may have addictions or mental illness that prevent them from gainful employment. At least 60 per cent of the residents will have aboriginal ancestry.

Homelessness and affordable housing are serious

problems in Edmonton. According to the Edmonton Homeless Commission, homelessness has increased in Edmonton nearly 125 per cent in the last 11 years. Over 38,000 families/people in Edmonton are in need of affordable housing. Forty thousand households in Edmonton earning less than \$30,000 per year put over 30 per cent of their income towards housing.

Conditions like these have created a class known as "the working poor" – individuals and families who maintain regular employment but remain in relative poverty due to low levels of pay and high housing costs.

It is the hope of the community, the organizations involved, and the Government of Alberta that Canora place will go a long way to helping reduce homelessness in the city, and help people truly in need get back on their feet.

"The support of the Government of Alberta and Government of Canada is essential for new developments like this to go ahead," said Susan McGee, Executive Director of Homeward Trust.

"With that support, and the participation of the partner organizations, we're confident that Canora Place will make a positive impact in the lives of its residents and the community as a whole."

Rivers need protection

In the last 10 years, sustainability has been a popular topic of concern among all walks of life. Water supply, greenhouse gases, oil and the environment are a few of the common words that cause debate and deliberation in the government.

Only one per cent of the world's fresh water is accessible for direct usage by humans. This water comes from lakes, rivers, reservoirs and those underground sources that are shallow enough to be tapped at an affordable cost.

According to research done by the University of Michigan, it is suggested that the growing populations are putting pressure on water supply. Currently the planet is consuming 30 per cent of accessible fresh water sources, but by 2025 it's expected this number will jump to 70 per cent.

Even though there is an acknowledged concern for fresh water supply there are still developments being planned that can affect natural fresh water. On March 25, the Alberta Liberal Caucus noted that the South Saskatchewan Regional Advisory Council is planning development in the South Saskatchewan watershed. This would put the region at further risk of drought.

The Liberal Caucus noted that the Minister of Sustainable Resource Development, Mel Knight, suggested that up to 89 per cent of the South Saskatchewan could be open to development. This would put the fresh water of the South Saskatch-

"Any plan emerging from these recommendations needs to protect water. Without a consistent supply of clean water, everything grinds to a halt. Public consultation on this issue is about to begin, and Albertans should make sure the government knows we value our water," said Laurie Blakeman, Alberta Liberal Environment Critic, as quoted by the Alberta Liberal Caucus.

Public consultation of the development is expected to begin later this year. If Albertans want to balance development and environmental stewardship, Blakeman says they need to show the government how they feel.

In order to practise conservation Albertans need to find a balance between development and

Vote timing bad for students

WATERLOO, Ont. (CUP) - Many are wondering if students will even be able to vote in the upcoming federal election with polling days scheduled at such an inconvenient time.

With the election slated for May 2 and advanced polls announced for the Easter weekend, there has been growing concern about how student voter turnout will fare, considering the inconvenience of such a time for post-secondary students.

Chris Hyde, policy researcher and advocacy coordinator for Wilfrid Laurier University's students' union, described the current situation as a "perfect storm." which could hinder voter turnout on campuses across the country.

It's also a concern for Elections Canada, said Diane Benson of media relations.

"Voting at the time of the year that's a very busy time for students certainly presents a challenge for them," said Benson. "But what Elections Canada tries to do is offer as many options as possible."

These options include voting by advanced ballot, by mail and by taking advantage of advanced polls.

"It does require students to plan ahead and go through a process depending on what voting process they choose, if they want to avoid the end of exam time period right when the election day happens," Benson said.

Hyde is currently drafting a letter to the chief electoral officer of Canada regarding the issue in hopes that it will receive more attention.

"It really is almost a national issue and it's a national issue that it receives a lot of attention because a lot of people are out there saying this isn't fair to students," he said. "But there aren't a lot of people at the national level saying, 'Here's an alternative.'"

Hyde added that an advanced poll on the April 20 or 21 would help student voter turnout.

He also mentioned how difficult it will be for students to vote in the ridings they live in while at school because most students go home for the Easter holiday, which will impede the use of advanced polls.

These sentiments were echoed by Elizabeth Dubois, a University of Ottawa fourth-year currently planning a youth rally.

"I really do think that it's going to cause some big problems," Dubois. "Without the significant conversations going on and some significant information getting out to students, we're going to have a big problem with the youth turnout."

Hyde stressed the importance of post-secondary students being able to vote in the ridings where they attend school. However, many will no longer be residents of these ridings once the semester ends and they return to their parents' homes for the summer.

"It affects [students] because they're not allowed to vote in a riding that may mean something to them," Hyde said.

Although the dates of the election are inconvenient for students, Dubois remained confident that post-secondary students will remain engaged in the election, though it will take some effort on the part of other students.

"It's a really hard time for students right now, we're in the middle of exams, we're writing final papers," Dubois said. "It's not easy, but I think that youth are really getting behind this and using the tools we know how to use best like social media to really make sure that our voice is heard."

Citing YouTube videos of rallies at the University of Guelph and the ongoing national coverage of two London youth who were kicked out of a Conservative rally, Dubois agreed students are gearing up to be a large part of this year's election.

Looking for life ... out there

I constantly find myself gazing at the sky and asking the eternal question: What is life, really? In the past, people were able to answer without doubt that there was life on other planets but, they couldn't prove it. The funny thing is, the more we've learned about biology and DNA, the farther we're actually getting from answering that question.

How do we know that our biochemistry is the only possibility for harbouring life? And how many planets out there could actually sustain life?

Well, in the next few years we could be getting a few of these answers, and the results might surprise you. If you look straight up and put your palm to the sky, you'll be covering the area that the Kepler telescope will be searching for the next two years.

The Kepler telescope is similar to the Hubble telescope, but, it has an extra white field lens. It's searching other solar systems within

the Milky Way, specifically to find other planets that orbit stars, like Earth. Using a method called the transit method, it records mini-eclipses that occur when a planet passes in front of the star it's orbiting. By doing this, Kepler can measure the size and orbit of the planet, telling us the distribution of planets around the universe by size.

Before the scientific revolution, there was thought to be only four Earth-like planets and two large planets. As the years passed, more technology was able to help us discover over 500 planets using different methods, but the only problem was our technology. Bigger celestial bodies were easier to discover and we were getting an inaccurate representation of the distribution of planet sizes. We didn't have any evidence about where other planets like Earth were.

In the last year, Kepler has helped us discover over 1,160 planets, with small planets like Earth dominating the picture. Close to 700 planets that have the size qualities of our world have been discovered. This statistic shows that there

are in fact Earth-like planets out there. What's next? When Kepler returns, scien-

tists can study the new planets (now that we know where they are), and find the ones that would be considered habitable. A celestial body is considered habitable if it has similar living conditions to Earth, where a lot of complex chemistry can happen. Because of Kep-



ler, astronomers now predict that in the Milky Way galaxy alone, there is around 100 million planets that have habitable potential. In the next few years, we can find out what they're made of, their type of atmosphere and if they have carbon dioxide and water. Essentially, it can help us discover another suitable planet for us to live on.

But that brings us back to the eternal question: What if all life isn't the same? If there is

life on other planets, will it be similar to that on Earth? I'm not talking about human existence, rather the biochemical process in general. The discoveries that we make through Kepler can get us closer to finding the answer of what life is. Although we don't have all the answers yet, we do know that life needs a smaller planet with a complex atmosphere and that leaves millions of possibilities for existence.

NAIT biz students exce

On March 24-26, a team of NAIT Business students competed in the Alberta Deans of Business Competition held at Red Deer College and won gold. The team, consisting of Hussein Alibhai (team captain), Graeme Harrington, Loryn Marcellus and Olivia McGhan, were judged ahead of 12 other competitive teams and won \$4,000.

This is the Alberta Business Dean's Case Competition, held every year in March. It is an Alberta regional case competition with 12 postsecondary institutions competing for the top three places. This year, the participants included NAIT, SAIT, Grant MacEwen University, Mount Royal University and eight regional colleges.

WestJet case

Student teams were given a case based around WestJet and how to best grow the business. During the competition they had to prepare Power-Point slides to present the following day to a panel of judges that included senior executives from WestJet, Servus Credit Union and Travel Alberta. They were only given nine hours to do this in order to simulate industry conditions, where issues must be evaluated under time pressures. The judges ranked only the top three teams.

"In 2009 and 2010, NAIT placed second and third respectively," said Don Ausman, chair of the Capstone and Community Projects. "This year, the NAIT student team won first place. In the past three years, NAIT is the only post-secondary institution to place in the top three positions in three consecutive years."

Ausman said the Bachelor of Business Administration student teams placed second in the Edge competition in January, competing against 17 teams from universities across Canada, competed in the Royal Roads University International Case Competition in March, and placed first in the Certified Management Accountants competition in March.

He feels these achievements provided the School of Business with an opportunity to benchmark itself against other institutions in order to gauge the excellence of its courses and programs. Placing well, and/or winning case competitions clearly demonstrates to any potential students that NAIT's degree is competitive with degrees offered at other post-secondary institutions and universities.

"As successful as the team was in the competition, I was probably most proud of seeing how professionally and respectfully they conducted themselves in their interactions with other students, faculty advisers, Red Deer College staff and hotel staff," said Tad Drinkwater, Acting Dean of JR Shaw School of Business.

Members of the winning team, Loryn Marcellus and Olivia McGhan, had a lot to say about their experience with JRSB.

"The only qualification to be a part of the team is that everyone brings something unique to the table, I bring unique strategy ideas and PowerPoint skills to the group," said Marcellus.

"To become a member of this team, you generally must be a part of JRSB 410 (Business and Competitive Analysis). This course focuses on analysis, recommendations and implementations in regard to business cases. Essentially, this course prepares you for real world problems and how to solve them. Third- and fourth-year business students, as well as the occasional second-year student, can take this course. Now, for this specific competition, there needed to be two second-year students. There was already a fourth, third and second year, from accounting and management, on the team from the JRSB 410 class, so they needed another second year, preferably in marketing. I was recruited for this team because I fit the criteria of a second-year marketing student," said McGhan.

"To prepare for the competition, we did five cases that imitated the case competition, so each case preparation is roughly eight hours in length and then presented to a panel of instructors who gave us feedback on our content and presentation. During the whole process, we also encounter some difficulties. Initially, when our team first started meeting, we didn't know what each others strengths were and weren't able to divide the work up accordingly. We also didn't know what to expect going into the competition. The case we got to do during the case competition was unknown to us, so it was difficult to know how to approach it or how to prepare for it," said Marcellus.

When it comes to the things they learned from this competition, there is one word they both mentioned, which was teamwork.

Imitates real world

"The competition really imitates how a functional organization would work. In school, we are divided into sections based upon what our major is, whereas in the real world, if you were taking on a project you would likely have members from many departments meeting. The interdisciplinary nature of the competition really helped me learn how to look at an issue from not just a management standpoint, but an accounting or marketing standpoint as well," Marcellus said.

"This competition has taught me many things. I have learned that working with different disciplines is very enlightening. We all had different opinions, but were able to work well together. Because we are a cross-functional group (management, accounting and marketing), we all brought different perspectives to the table. The more we practised, the more we excelled together," McGhan said. **NEWS & FEATURES**

Crysis 2 lets PC users down

The first Crysis, a first-person shooter released in 2007 for PC, is a technical benchmark for many PC gamers. The graphics were phenomenal and the system requirements to run it were very steep. Back then, you may have thought you had an awesome computer, but the real test was whether it could run Crysis.

So, Crysis 2, released on March 22, has a lot to live up to. The sequel is built with a more advanced graphics engine, but this time it is for the Xbox 360 and PS3 as well as PC. This makes hardcore PC gamers nervous and a lot of the time, angry.

Making a game for the PC gives developers a lot more freedom when it comes to creating a technical marvel. PCs are always moving forward, while the individual consoles are static with their system specifications.

I rented Crysis 2 for 360, and am going to buy it for PC. I am definitely impressed with the game - it is probably the best looking console game yet.

However, for PC fanatics, it might not be as technically pleasing as it could have been if the development was focused on a PC version. Unfortunately, it seems that the game was developed for the 360 and then ported over to the PC.

The PC version seems to be plagued with



technical problems for now. On PC, you can usually tweak graphical options in the game's menu but this was extremely limited in this game and it apparently lacks the ability to be able to choose texture quality options and anti-aliasing levels. There have been patches released to fix some issues, and it's said that there will be a patch to eventually allow for DirectX 11.

There are other issues when PC and console games mix.

One is that the console version of a first person shooter usually doesn't allow you to save your progress in the game anywhere you want in a save menu; it relies on checkpoint autosaves. Especially, it seems, if the FPS was made solely for the console.

Another is that the PC uses mouse/keyboard combo controls, while the console uses a console controller. Perhaps it might not matter much for a single-player campaign, but in the competitive multi-player, death match world, thereviewcrew.com

the mass of key functions with a keyboard and the precision and swift aiming with the mouse leaps ahead of the console controller.

And, of course, PC gaming has its large mod community that creates its own maps, modes and patches for games.

Ultimately, Crysis 2 is a great game. Unfortunately, PC gamers didn't get the benchmark they were hoping for but this is a great example to illustrate the schism between console and PC gaming.

Planning for potholes



hile driving in my residential neighbourhood this past weekend, I noticed how bumpy a ride my drive turned out to be. I can't even count the number of potholes and cracks I managed to find within a few kilometres. And to make matters worse, the majority of them were hidden under large puddles of

water. I'm sure a lot of you have run into the same problem. Literally. These potholes are prevalent across the city.

I only just recently learned how a pothole is formed. Cracks and fatigue that are already present in the road surface typically form in a pattern known as "alligator cracking." The pavement between the cracks is eventually worked loose by continued travel of vehicles and heavy loads. The formation of potholes is accelerated by rising and lowering of outside temperatures, such as those Edmonton has seen in the past few weeks.

As the temperature rises, the snow melts and water seeps into the small cracks and holes in the road. When the temperature drops below freezing overnight, the water freezes and expands, creating the large holes our car tires find in the road. The majority of potholes are formed in the spring months because the road surfaces have a high moisture content.

Should have thought ahead

The city would have a much easier job this spring if they had thought ahead a month ago when Edmonton saw a massive dump of snow. While clearing the main and residential roads of snow, the city failed to keep in mind most of its sewer drains. Yes, the city did a pretty good job of clearing the main portion of the streets of this snow, but in doing so, created massive windrows that covered the drainage system. At the time, this was a minor problem since the temperatures were still below freezing. However, since the warm weather and sun starting teasing us with the promise of spring, some city streets have seen minor flooding as well. Perhaps if the crews had thought about leaving spaces along the street for the run-off come spring time, we wouldn't be facing such major problems.

An article in the Edmonton Journal a few weeks ago highlighted the many problems these potholes are creating. Al Cepas, pavement management engineer with the city's roadway maintenance department, estimated that there are anywhere between 450,000 and 500,000 potholes scattered across Edmonton's 4,800 kilometres of paved roads. That's quite a jump from last year's 410,000, but still a ways away from the 600,000 we saw in 2007. The city is estimating this year's pothole repair budget at \$5.9 million, a \$100,000 increase from last year.

24 hours a day

The crews are now out on the streets 24 hours a day filling the potholes with temporary patches until full construction can take place. These temporary patches can last anywhere between eight months and a couple of years. But the work they do and how fast it gets done depends on the weather. If this year turns out to be a fast melt, that could cause some major problems for the road crews and delay much needed repairs to city streets.

On the other hand, are these temporary fixes or "patches" an acceptable solution to these problems? Or is finding the root cause and fixing it in a correct manner a better form of management?

The next time we are given a road tax or gasoline tax by the provincial government, perhaps it should be targeted for road maintenance and budgets for individual cities and highways and not for the province's general budget.

So be prepared for a few more bumpy rides and make sure those lids on your double-doubles are closed tightly.



NAIT's women's hockey coach has been involved in Canada's pastime for almost as long as she can remember. Deanna Iwanicka grew up in Calmar and starting playing ringette at about seven years old. She then began playing hockey when the local minor hockey association in Calmar started a girl's team.

"My aunt was a major influence in getting me started," says Iwanicka.

"She is still involved, in fact. She worked the door at our games this season. She is a great supporter!"

Like every hockey-crazy Canadian kid, Iwanicka would lace them up on the outdoor rink and play against her friends and family.

"My brothers and cousins all played hockey as well," explains Iwanicka. "We had an outdoor rink down the highway from us, so it was natural for us to get out and play."

Iwanicka also started coaching at an early

age. At just 14 years old she began helping out with a local atom boys team. "I just wanted to be at the rink as much as

I could." She continued to help coach minor hockey teams until college when she began coaching

her first girl's team. "Things just went on from there," answered Iwanicka when asked about her coaching start "I was involved with Hockey Alberta and their programs, like the student leadership program and so on."

Iwanicka then ended up in her first paid coaching position here at NAIT. In fact, there are only four paid women's hockey coaching positions in Alberta and only eight across the whole country, so Iwanicka knows she is very fortunate to be in such a position.

"It would be unlikely that a college or uni-

versity position would be your first head coach experience," says explains Iwanicka. She previously coached the Sherwood Park Midget AAA girls team – The Fury – and believes this was a great position because it allowed her to recruit some excellent players that now play for the

Ooks.

"We have had great this program. Lacie Richard, Lindsev Brouwer and current recruits Krysten Pattison and Ashley Rossi are all from this program."

Iwanicka has had a successful first two years at the helm of the lady Ooks, including leading them to a silver medal in her first year after losing to the Mount Royal Cougars in the ACAC final. The end result this year was a little different. The Ooks made the playoffs, but were swept by the eventual ACAC Champion SAIT Trojans in the first round. Despite not reaching their goal of winning the ACAC, Iwanicka says there were still some bright spots to the season, including almost beating the University of Alberta Pandas in preseason action and the team's trip to Europe over the Christmas break.

"This past season is difficult to describe. There was a lot of ups and downs," says success recruiting from Iwanicka. "Overall though, I think everyone would agree the end result of the season was disappointing."

> The head coach has put the 2010-2011 ACAC season behind her, is looking forward to next season and has high hopes for the team.

> "I am excited," answered Iwanicka. "We expect to have great goaltending with Diachuk and first-year Pattison, our defensive core will remain strong and up front, we should have some new players that can add to the offence of Sherri Bowles."

> With a great attitude and a crop of new talented players to work with, the sky is the limit for Iwanicka and the Ooks.


This past weekend the Rush and Mammoth played a home-and-home series that could have gone a long way in determining who made the playoffs, but the teams split the series, with each winning their home game. The score was 14-10 for the Rush at Rexall Place on Friday, followed by an extremely defensive battle in Colorado on Saturday that resulted in a 7-6 Mammoth win, which ties a season low for goals in a game. The Toronto Rock beat the Buffalo Bandits in a 8-5 game on Jan. 29.

Luckily for the Rush, they get a chance at redemption against the Mammoth when the two teams play again this weekend in Edmonton. The Rush will host the Mammoth on Saturday night in a game that should be the determining matchup to decide who gets that final playoff spot. The Rush are going to need some help from their southern rivals if they are going to make it to the postseason. If Colorado loses the night before in Calgary, which is likely considering the Roughnecks are the top team in the West and are tied for the best record in the NLL at 10-4, a Rush win on Saturday would guarantee them a playoff spot.

I am confident that the Rush will be seeing postseason action this spring. The Rush are a way different team than the one that started off the season with five straight losses. A variety of trades and signings throughout the season have turned the Rush into a more offensive and exciting team.

There are a few trades that have had a significant impact on the club. At the beginning of March, the Rush sent their first round pick in the 2013 NLL Entry Draft to the Minnesota Swarm in exchange for forward Zack Greer. Greer has been an offensive sparkplug for Edmonton since arriving and has nine goals and five assists for 14 points in just five games, highlighted by a five-goal, two-assist performance against his former club on March 25. The Rush beat the Swarm 14-13 in a thriller that saw Greer score the winner with just 3.5 seconds left in the game.

Another trade made earlier in the season saw Edmonton send defender Rory Glaves to the Rochester Knighthawks for Scott Evans. I would describe Evans as a loose cannon. He's exactly the kind of player every good lacrosse team needs on their roster. He hits, he fights, he likes to muck it up more than most and he can

score goals. Evans has an excellent shot and has put it to good use in Edmonton. He leads the team in goals with 23, which ranks him 16th in the league and has only played 11 games, three less than the team has.

All of these offensive additions have also given a little extra jump to Rush forward Corey Small, who has taken over as the team's leading point getter after the Rush traded leading scorer Gavin Prout back to the Mammoth at the deadline. Small currently sits 21st in league scoring with 52 points in 14 games and is coming off an impressive weekend that saw him put up four goals and six assists for 10 points in the two game home-and-home set against the Mammoth.

Inconsistent goaltending from starter Matt Disher was another concern earlier in the season, but Disher seems to be finding his game and it couldn't come at a better time for the Rush. Disher was outstanding in Edmonton's 14-10 win over Colorado on Friday, making high quality save after high quality save and finishing the night with 47 stops.

"He's been a streaky goalie his whole career and at this time last year he got hot again. We certainly hope that's going to happen again," said Rush head coach Derek Keenan after Friday's win. "When he gets hot he's really, really good and I thought he was good tonight."

Disher was just as good in Saturday's 7-6 loss, stopping 43 of the 50 shots he faced in the close game.

The Oilers aren't anywhere close to the playoffs and the Oil Kings were swept in the first round of their WHL playoff series against Red Deer, but don't worry, there is more playoff action still to come for the City of Champions.

UConn wreeks **Butler's dream** of a title

The third and final week of March Madness happened this past weekend with the last three games of the tournament being played in Houston, Texas at Reliant Stadium. Seventy five thousand crazy basketball fans packed into the football stadium for the two final four games on Saturday.

The first game saw this year's Cinderella story Virginia Commonwealth University, an 11th-seed and one of four teams to get into

the tournament through first-round play-in games, matched up against last year's Cinderella squad, the Butler Bulldogs. This game was also a matchup of two young and very talented

coaches, Shaka Smart from VCU (only 33), and from Butler's Brad Stevens, who is just one year older at 34. The game was a back and forth affair with both teams going on scoring runs and the lead changing hands throughout the game. In the end Butler was the team who went on a run last and ended VCU's Cinderella story one game before the ball was supposed to be over, with a 70-62 victory.

Matchup No. 2 of the night saw two basketball powerhouses square off for the final spot in the championship game. Probably the hottest team coming into the tournament was University of Connecticut, who came into the game on a nine game winning streak. They faced off against Kentucky University who had just come off beating the No. 1 overall seed in the tournament, Ohio State. This game remained close throughout both

halves, with it coming down to the last shot where Kentucky was not able to capitalize, and UConn squeaked out the victory 56-55.

So with the matchup finally set and only one game left to play, Butler and Connecticut took the court at Reliant Stadium in Houston. It would be interesting to see if Butler could finally break through and be the first Mid Major University to win the national championship, a feat that they were within a half court shot of going in, in last years cham-

> pionship game, of doing. Coming out of the Horizon Valley Conference, Butler held claim to the best record in the past two March Madness tournaments with an over-

all record of 10-1. And then you have Connecticut team that before the Big East Tournament was in danger of not even making the Madness, but thanks to the five game winning streak in the Big East and five game winning streak in March Madness, had ten consecutive victories coming into the Championship game. Who knew that with both of these teams being on such a streak that the Championship game would be one of the worst statistically in History. At halftime Butler was up on Connecticut 22-19 and that's when it just got downright awful. At one point in the second half, Butler went over 13 minutes with only scoring two points and Connecticut outscored Butler 34-19 in the second half. Butler set records for a championship game, but the records were in futility. Scoring only two, yes that's right, two

West Coast pro teams go green

BRANTFORD, Ont. (CUP) – Last week, six professional sports teams from six pro sports leagues launched the Green Sports Alliance.

The alliance is a group dedicated to identifying and adopting environmental initiatives to measure and reduce their impact on the environment.

The six teams, all based in the northwest, include the Portland Trail Blazers (NBA), Seattle Mariners (MLB), Seattle Seahawks (NFL), Seattle Sounders FC (MLS), Seattle Storm (WNBA) and Vancouver Canucks (NHL).

Each club will work alongside the National Defense Resource Council, the United States' EPA and Portland State University in this push to become more green.

"[We] take pride in our commitment to our community," Canucks Sports and Entertainment COO Victor de Bonis wrote in a release. "As a responsible community leader we also must do our best for environmental sustainability – for current and future generations.

"It became imperative for [the Canucks] to be a founding member of the Green Sports Alliance. We believe that by exchanging ideas and through open dialogue, we can have a positive impact in our community and can also effect change in the entire Pacific Northwest through the newly formed alliance."

While the newly formed alliance is taking a massive step in greening professional sports, it's hardly a new idea.

> A 2009 survey conducted by Pro-GreenSports, a Massachusetts-based business specializing in sustainability strategy and services for pro sports teams, showed that half of the teams surveyed either had or were

developing a sustainability plan.

Mark McSherry, the founder and president of ProGreenSports, believes that a couple of factors are responsible for the shift in sports teams going green. The first, he says, is the green consumerism and green corporate trends, as well as a competition among teams in mega markets to try to become green first.

"For example, in our area, the Red Sox compete with the Patriots, the Bruins and the Celtics for fans and sponsorship attention," McSherry said. "So as one team goes green, the others respond and are competitive so they tend to ratchet up their

programs.

"They try to, just like on the field, beat out their competition."

Currently, this green initiative in sports has taken off primarily in four geographical areas: California, Colorado, the metro-Philadelphia area and the Pacific Northwest.

The steps they are taking to help become "greener" are quite impressive as well.

"They are measuring their energy and carbon footprint, implementing plans to reduce energy usage, put in more efficient equipment, and in certain instances, they are aiming to reduce their waste streams," McSherry said.

While much of the focus on going green in sports is taking place in the U.S. — most likely due to the sheer number

of pro sports franchises operating in comparison to Canada — steps are being taken here, as well.

The National Hockey League and its players' association, for instance, teamed up with the Canadian-based David Suzuki Foundation in 2007 to create the NHLPA Carbon Neutral Challenge, whereby players bought clean air credits to offset the footprint left by travel associated with playing. All money from those credits went to Mont-

real-based Planetair, who used it to fund clean-air projects around the world.

Also, in the progressively green centre of Vancouver, the University of British Columbia established a sports and sustainability research centre in honour of hosting the Olympics.

While these initiatives obviously benefit the environment, McSherry also points out how going green can help the teams them-

> selves from a business standpoint.

"There's a whole business dynamic: As sports teams can garner sponsorships and green advertising revenue, to the degree that as they green their brand, they become more attractive to the increasing green corporate trend, and avail themselves to the

sponsorship money and green advertising revenue," he explained.

"So it becomes not only a good environmental decision, and a good decision for fan base and local image, but also it becomes a good business decision, too."

actually is for these pro sports teams, it's obvious that going green in the world of sports is a definite step in the right direction for the environment.




SIRC-CCAA Academic All-Canadian Awards went to Joey Vandervet, badminton;

Since the beginning, DC has been introducing new titles on a monthly basis. In their first year of operation, DC Comics published eight titles. In 2007, the number was well over 1,400. Talk about growth.

DC has dabbled in the film industry as well. From 1978-1997, they periodically would release a movie based on one of their heroes, to mild or no fanfare. But, in 2005, DC Comics hit one out of the park with the 2005 release of *Batman Begins*. *Begins* would lead to the eventual release of *Superman Returns* in 2006, as well as *The Dark Knight* in 2008. Coming up from DC Comics on the silver screen, they have *Green Lantern* starring Canadian actor Ryan Reynolds in 2011, as well as the final chapter in director Christopher

Nolan's Batman saga, *The Dark Knight Rises* in 2012.

The world of television has also been infiltrated by DC Comics, as the brand has had multiple television series over the last 30 years, with the most notable being *Smallville*. Since 2001, *Smallville* has shown the progression of Clark Kent, AKA, Superman, as he graduates high school, and learns to control his powers. The show has won multiple Emmy Awards, and will end its tremendous 10 season run in May of this year.

League of Legends may be a year old but it is still fairly new. If anything, now would be a good time to see how far the game has come since its beta launch. For anyone that used to play DOTA and loved it, look no further, this game is very similar. The game's premise is simple: you select your champion of choice and from there, you have to push to the heart of the base and destroy it. Simple in theory, this game is anything but.

First, we'll discuss the maps there are only two, which to be honest is a bit plain. Summoner's Rift is a map, where you have five champions on each team and three lanes where your minions will keep coming in waves. The second map is Twisted Tree Line, where there are only two lanes and is considerably smaller then Summoner's Rift. This map is much more rushed. Although both maps are fun in their own way, they left me wanting more maps and a lot more variation. Once you familiarize yourself with the map, what you see is what you get. Next up are the

champions. Every two weeks Riot, the LoL developers, release a new cham-

pion. This is where the game gets a bit complicated. Though the pool of champions Riot has is very large, it's also its downfall. You have so many champions that all do different things. In order to be a "good" LoL player, you have to have a basic idea of all their moves, which is fair, but at the same time a little confusing. For this reason, games can be won purely due to team composition. But this is still a skill based game and as such, advantages can be overcome based on skilled

play. During the beginning of each game your champion starts with zero items. The items are bought with gold acquired by players' actions like destroying a tower, killing minions in every wave and for killing other players. Your builds are always dynamic and they change depending on many factors, such as what the other team is like, for example. A little confusing? Relax, because each

champ has items that are

suggested to them. This only gives you a basic idea of how to build your champion, however. All this of course takes time to figure out and before you do, you will find it very frustrating. This is why this game can be hard to recommend. On the one hand, there are lots of variability in play styles, but all these things take time to learn. Every game is different and there are new things to learn from each one. The learning curve is quite high if you are completely new.

This is also a team-based game though and that can come with its own set of problems. I have found myself swearing at my teammates and feeling frustrated at times. It leaves you feeling at the mercy of your teammates and, for most of us, that's a bother, which leads us to the biggest downfall of this game. It is plagued by quitters. People may start the game, get mad and leave. This results in games that are played four versus five. Nothing is more frustrating then having a whole match lost because someone decided they had to go or leave. Also, matches feel drawn out. I felt myself playing a match for more then an hour only to lose it because of someone else's stupidity.

The learning curve is extremely hard at times. Source Code is an original fast-paced action thriller directed by Duncan Jones. It opens by throwing the audience into the heart of the action and hooks you immediately. Helicopter pilot Capt. Colter Stevens (Jake Gyllenhaal), wakes up to find himself on a train facing a lovely young woman named Christina (Michelle Monaghan) who calls him Sean and seems to know him. He is confused and disoriented and manages to make his way to the bathroom of the train where he realizes the reflection in the mirror is not his own.

There is an explosion and Capt. Stevens wakes up in a dark capsule with a video feed of a woman instructing him to locate the bomb on the train – a train that actually exploded earlier that morning. He discovers he is part of a government project that can put you into the body of someone eight minutes before they've died.

His mission is to find the bomb on the train and track down the terrorist before the next strike. The catch – he only has eight minutes to do it, and must relive the same scenario over and over until he uncovers the information they need.

The four main actors driving *Source Code*, Gyllenhaal, Monaghan, Vera Farmiga and Jeffrey Wright, don't fail to deliver brilliant and dynamic performances. With Duncan Jones at the helm, this film may be the one that marks him as one of Hollywood's bigwig directors. Jones doesn't waste a single moment of the film's 93 minutes. Each scene has a purpose. Each character interaction is intentional and the conclusion

was perfectly constructed.

The sci-fi premise of the film holds weight in the leagues of movies such as *Inception*. With the concept of quantum physics and, for all intents and purposes, time travel, the storyline is complicated yet told in an understandable way.

The growth and realizations of Capt. Stevens are monumental as he overcomes the most difficult of tasks. Dying over and over again while trying to find the terrorist in time becomes an exhausting feat. His new personal mission becomes trying to save Christina. He knows the event he is living is one of the past and anything he does within the eight minutes won't change her outcome but he doesn't give up.

Source Code is a dream for sci-fi lovers and movie goers. There's a buffet of elements that turn this wouldbe typical action flop into a cinematic work of art. Filled with great acting, an intriguing story and tasteful special effects, it also dishes out shocking twist after twist. There is even a romantic aspect that unfolds gracefully, without being too distracting or in-your-face.

The film is surprisingly deep. The main theme begs the questions: What would you do differently if you had the chance? What would you do if you knew you only had a few minutes to live? It is very moving and I am betting you won't be dry-eyed by the end of it. It wasn't spoiled by over-marketing, so be sure to see it before too many secrets are given away. Indie darling still dreaming

WATERLOO, Ont. (CUP) - Dan Mangan didn't always have his hopes set on being a musician

"When I was a kid I thought I was going to be a vet," he reminisced. "I kind of realized

how many years of school were involved and I lost interest, right around the time I really gained an interest in playing guitar."

His high school band dissolved when its members headed off to separate universities, but Mangan stuck with music.

"I recorded some painfully awful songs and terrible demos when I was 19 or 20 and started playing around Vancouver," he said. "I was filled with all these grandiose ideas of what it meant to be a musician."

Despite years of experience and his increasingly realistic approach to the job, Mangan acknowledged the importance of dreaming big.

"There's so many reasons why becoming a career musician is so nearly impossible," he stated. "You need that optimism and that fantastical view of it all in order to get yourself through the steps along the way."

More recently, Mangan was shortlisted for the prestigious Polaris Music Prize for 2009's Nice, Nice, Very Nice – an experience he described as a milestone in his career.

Admitting that he has "a rich history of going a little bit crazy" whenever he makes a record, Mangan could not have been more appreciative of the nomination. After the personal investment and dedication that was poured into crafting the album, he claimed, "getting that critical feedback was really amazing and not something that I will forget or take lightly."

But Mangan's rise to a Canadian indie darling hasn't been all about recording studios and awards galas. Currently at home for the longest time in years — though, only a couple months – Mangan has spent the majority of his adult life on the road.

From "formative" solo tours across Europe to travelling across North America to performing at Glastonbury, one of the biggest music festivals in the world, he's learned the ups and downs of working as a touring

musician.

One of the most frustrating facets of touring is the quick pace of a "day in, day out, new city" schedule.

"You go to all these amazing places, but you hardly get to see them," said Mangan. "But it still excites me, we've got to do some amazing things."

He recalled one of his favourite tour memories, sharing a story about getting the chance to play at the Fillmore in San Francisco alongside the Walkmen and fellow Vancouverites Japandroids.

"There's so much history in that venue and we had our own little green room up on the balcony," he said, fondly recalling "sitting up on our little perch" enjoying the show.

Regardless of the at times less than ideal lifestyle, Mangan declared, "The tiring nature of touring will never, for me - at least, I hope eclipse the awesomeness of it."

An eating disorder is a set of eating habits, weight management practices and attitudes about weight and body shape that are caused by emotional problems. Eating disorders result in loss of control or over control around food, and often lead to obsession, anxiety and guilt, alienation from yourself or others and/or physiological imbalances that are potentially life-threatening.

Eating disorders are experienced by both males and females and include anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa and compulsive overeating. All are serious emotional problems that can have life-threatening consequences.

People with anorexia have an intense and irrational fear of body fat and weight gain, an incredibly strong determination to become thinner and thinner and a misperception of body weight and shape. Thoughts about food, calories, weight and weight management dominate the person's life.

Bulimia is characterized by self-perpetuating and self-defeating cycles of binge-eating and vomiting. During a binge, the person consumes a large amount of food in a rapid, automatic and helpless fashion. The food may act like an emotional anesthetic but the person usually experiences physical discomfort and anxiety about weight gain.

Therefore, the person makes her or himself vomit or uses a combination of restrictive dieting, excessive exercising, laxatives and/or diuretics.

Compulsive overeating is characterized by periods of impulsive gorging or continuous eating. Sporadic fasts or repetitive diets are common with compulsive overeaters and body weight may vary significantly.

What causes an eating disorder?

Eating disorders arise from a combination of long standing psychological, interpersonal and social conditions. Feelings of inadequacy, depression, anxiety and loneliness, as well as troubled family and personal relationships, may contribute to the development of an eating disorder. Our culture, with its unrelenting idealization of thinness and the "perfect body," is often a contributing factor.

Dieting, bingeing and purging help some people cope with painful emotions and, initially, to feel more in control of their lives. At the same time, these behaviours undermine physical health, self-esteem and a sense of competence and control.

Assessing Your Risk (this is not meant to replace a discussion with a qualified professional)

My eating habits are different from 1. those of my family and friends

2. I have become obsessed with food to the point that I cannot go through a day without worrying about what I will or will not eat. A high percentage of my time is spent thinking about food, weight, body fat, hunger and/or exercise.

3. I would panic if I got on the scale tomorrow and found out I had gained two pounds.

I find myself going on uncontrollable 4. eating binges during which I consume large amounts of food to the point that I feel sick and make myself vomit or I find myself compul-

sively eating more than I want to while feel- About Food by Jane Hirschmann and Carol ing out of control and/or unaware of what I am doing or I have lost weight and am currently below the minimum recommended weight for my height.

5. I have felt more depressed and irritable recently than I used to and/or have been spending an increasing amount of time alone.

6. The most powerful fear in my life is the fear of gaining weight or becoming fat.

7. I exercise a lot (more than five times per week and/or more than five hours per week) as a means of weight control.

8. I tend to be a perfectionist and am not satisfied with myself unless I do things perfectly.

9. Even though people tell me I look good, I think they are being polite and I still believe I need to go on a diet because I am not satisfied with my body.

10. I spend, or have spent, a substantial amount of time reading books, websites or magazines about dieting, exercising and calorie counting.

If you checked two or more of the above questions consider seeing a counsellor or family physician to determine whether you may have an eating disorder or a tendency toward developing an eating disorder. Seeking help early on makes it easier to overcome a disorder.

If you think you might have an eating disorder ...

• Get help as soon as possible. It is much easier to recover from an eating disorder if you catch it early on. Counsellors are available at NAIT Student Counselling.

• Learn as much as you can. Books like When Food Is Love by Geneen Roth or It's Not until the end of June.

Munter are helpful for many people.

• You may want to contact the Eating Disorder Clinic at the University of Alberta Hospital.

How to help a friend you think may have an eating disorder

• Approach your friend in a private place when there is time to talk. Be caring but straightforward and tell your friend what you have observed and what your concerns are. Let him or her know that you are worried and want to help.

• Give the person time to talk and encourage them to verbalize feelings. Ask clarifying questions. Listen carefully and be non-judgmental.

• Try not to get into a power struggle about whether there is a problem or not. Just let your friend know that you are concerned.

• Offer to help the person make an appointment with a counsellor. If they are resistant, encourage them to consider going for one appointment before they make a decision about ongoing treatment.

• If the person denies the problem, recognize that this is often part of the illness. Unless the person's life is in immediate danger they have the right to refuse treatment.

• Do not continually bring the subject up or the person will resent you and may start avoiding you. By talking with the person and offering help you have done all that is reasonably expected and have, hopefully, planted a seed that may lead the person to seek help in the future.
