

NEWS&FEATURES NAITSA adjusts budget

The NAIT Students' Association tabled the first reading of its budget for the 2012-2013 school year, and yes, there will be some cuts.

Finance Director Jon Hoffman led the Senate and NAITSA's Executive Council through the changes in the proposed budget at the Senate meeting held on March 7. The gist is that most of the notable budget cuts are to NAITSArun student activities and much of that money will instead be funnelled towards alternate activities

and student clubs.

The argument for the activities funding cuts is that NAITSA is playing to its strengths by continuing and enhancing events that have proven to be successful and reducing or eliminating funding for events that haven't been suc-

cessful. In all, around \$50,000 has been cut from various activities, but other activities see their funding increased to a total of almost \$45,000. Thus, the amount spent on student activities hasn't changed much. What has changed is which activities are getting the money.

Funding for frosh and orientation activities on the Main Campus will drop by just over \$4,000 to \$14,630, while two other NAIT campuses will see an increase in those funds. Patricia Campus and Souch Campus will each receive \$8,000 next year for frosh and orientation activities.

\$18,000 cut

Funding for Awareness Weeks was cut by almost \$18,000, including the elimination of funding altogether for International Awareness Week and Days of Action. Meanwhile, the exceptionally popular How-To series, which ran a How To DJ event in January, will receive an extra \$4,500 next year.

When it comes to live music events, NAITSA is going big and small bands, it seems, are going home. Indie Nights, which hosted independent bands at the Nest every Thursday, have been cancelled for the upcoming year because they weren't successful enough to stay off the chopping block.

NAITSA deemed an increase in sales at the Nest to be an important indicator of the success of Indie Nights, and unfortunately for indie music lovers, no such increase occurred

Instead, NAITSA wants to focus on big-name bands that will appeal to a greater number of students and thus draw bigger crowds. Following this line, NestFest will be back next year, and with a substantial price tag for a one-day event.

NestFest of 2008 hosted several bands, including Ontario's Tokyo Police Club, and featured a beer garden in the Nest parking lot for those who like some sunshine

with their suds.

Some events, such as the New Year's trip and Spring Break trip, actually competed with similar events that student clubs organized. These two trips have been cut out of the budget for the upcoming school year, freeing up \$5,000 and eliminating competition between NAITSA-organized trips and cluborganized trips.

Club grants in the new budget have more than doubled – from \$41,000 to \$85,000 – in response to a growing demand. This increase will allow for the creation of more clubs, and will empower clubs to organize more and bigger events.

In short, giving clubs more money gives the student body more control over the money that's spent on their activities.

NAITSA Senator Alex Sackiw, a Respiratory Therapy student, supports the club funding increase, "because there's a stronger independence ... if clubs want to put more into an event, now there's more money for that."

Insurance policy

A total of \$20,000 is budgeted for a Clubs insurance policy, which was made necessary by a recently passed NAITSA bylaw that allows the creation of clubs that focus on higher-risk activities, such as skydiving or firearms clubs. Club leaders will also receive more support through an increase in spending on Clubs orientation and training.

One notable budget cut that isn't expressly made up for elsewhere in the budget is the elimination of volunteer resources funding. Part of administration expenses rather than activities expenses, volunteer resources received \$16,242 in the 2011-2012 budget.

It is expected that clubs will provide some volunteer opportunities, though this is not mandated – each club has autonomy over its activities.

Celebrity chef keen

The Culinary Arts students at NAIT are looking forward to their upcoming visit from celebrity chef Massimo Capra. And those feelings are certainly reciprocated.

Chef Massimo says that when he visited NAIT last November and was asked to participate, he jumped at the opportunity to come back this month for the Hokanson Celebrity Chef in

"I've done a few classes and courses over at George Brown College here in Toronto," says Massimo, "but I've never really taken the time to do something as wonderful as this with NAIT."

This is not Capra's first time working in Alberta. He has done Christmas in November with Breakfast Television in Jasper, as well as demos and odd bits of work with Jasper Park Lodge and the Fairmont Hotel.

"I like coming to Alberta, and quite enjoy it actually," says Massimo.

Massimo started out as a young chef in Italy before moving to Toronto in the late '80s.

"I never had this kind of opportunity given to me," he says of his training. "What I did was a trade school in Italy, a chef school basically, and that was a three-year course, full time. I got to work in good hotels, the chef from the school brought me on board, and we travelled around. But I've never been exposed to different cuisines in the classroom. That's a great program to have."

As far as chef Massimo's plans for the students during his week long visit, he plans to dive into the Italian philosophy of cooking, exploring what cooking Italian food means and is.

"Just understanding what makes a dish Italian, or non-Italian, or [knowing when] something's Italianized instead of just being a true original,"

And that's not all Capra wants to pass on to

"I'm hoping to inspire a little bit, the future chefs," Massimo said. "I'm always a very happy person. I take everything with a grain of salt. I don't have a great big ego to feed and so I'd like to give a better impression to some of the junior chefs and the future chefs that basically, you have to love what you do, and if you do what you love, you never really have to feel like you're

Massimo loves his line of work, simply because it really puts one in touch with a lot of different people, cultures, and styles. You are able

to have a great time and do something that is really wonderful and pleasant. Above all else, that is the knowledge that he would like to impart to the students. You must love what you do.

The Celebrity Chef is only one area of the Hokanson Chef in Residence Program, and Massimo Capra fits into this category easily, after his extensive work in television and his two published cookbooks.

Massimo's most frequent

appearance is weekly on Cityline Breakfast Televison but he also has his own show, called Gourmet Escapes on the Travel and Escape channel.

He enjoys his own show because it gives him the opportunity to travel to various locations around the world and meet up with local chefs and learn from them what local, traditional food is all about in that area.

"My day starts very early in the morning and ends very late at night." he says.

And above all else, getting to be on television and travel around the world every month, Massimo Capra does what he does for a love of food.

"I love food of every kind. Every day you can bring something different to your palette," he said. "Food is life, and there is nothing like going to a market and seeing a beautiful stock of fresh food.

"To me, a great bowl of soup is what really gets me going. Nothing is like a great bowl of chicken noodle soup. For some reason, you feel so content after you've eaten


This is the truest example of Massimo Capra's character. The man loves life, he

Three promises: President

NAIT President and CEO Glenn Feltham has reviewed feedback from student engagement sessions held in the past months and has created three fundamental promises to students as part of his vision for NAIT in 2021.

In addition to creating a positive student experience and preparing students for career success, the promises aim for quality instruction and meeting students' needs for food and transportation.

The promises help set a level for where NAIT wants to be as an institution by 2021 and were created after input from student sessions in the Tower Lounge in January. More than 700 students offered input on everything from parking

Feltham says that the feedback fell into a three major categories.

"The first one was a lot of base needs, 'We need a place to park' and 'We want to be able to eat food at a reasonable price," Fetham said. "And those came through loud and clear."

The second is 'we really care about the quality of education'," Feltham added.

"The third category, and highest priority, is

meaningful careers: 'We want to ensure (our courses) will make us career ready and that there will be outstanding opportunities waiting for us."

Dr. Feltham says he was able to synthesize the information to create the promises.

"NAIT is currently in the midst of an institute-

wide quality curriculum initiative" Suzan Fitzsimmons, Director of Teaching and Academic Development, said. "The focus is in keeping with what a NAIT education has always stood for, real world education."

Fitzimmons said that "One of NAIT's greatest strengths is we provide high quality, practical, hands-on learning approaches. (The curriculum initiative) provides a consistent way of talking about this type of education based on what we want stuand fees to post graduation employ- **Dr. Glenn Feltham** dents to be able demonstrate in the real world."

> Fitzsimmons said the curriculum initiative also helps programs assess student learning.

"One of the exciting things happening right now is the potential to accommodate NAIT's space requirements for expansion and new programs at the main campus," Associate Vice President of Capital Projects and Facilities Operations John Engleder said. "This is happening because the city is redeveloping the airport land

where NAIT anticipates acquiring significant land for its future space requirements."

Engleder said that NAIT is currently updating its campus development plan and said it will include space for student services and health and wellness, as well as academic facilities.

Engleder also said the plan will include student housing, something NAIT currently lacks.

Already under construction is a new 1,000 stall, 12-storey parkade north of the HP Centre, expected to be finished by the end of the year.

These trends will continue as the Continuing Education (K) building will be demolished this summer, with the Engineering Annex (L) scheduled for demolition as soon as facilities can be constructed to accommodate the programs.

Feltham said these promises are by no means final draft, stating that they will be asking for more feedback but adds "I expect that they will be quite consistent with what they are right now. All the feedback I have received (on the promises) has been extremely positive.

"This is also going to be part of our brand going forward," Feltham said enthusiastically. "We will be making promises to different groups, the province, the faculty, as well as the students. If we can meet these expectations, we're going to be in awfully good shape to attract a lot of good students in the future."

Local food blogger, professional foods educator, advocate, writer and editor, A Canadian Foodie (aka Valerie Lugonja) will also bring her expertise and enthusiasm to the judge's table.

The tasting portion of the Cook Off runs from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Saturday, March 17, at Mount Royal School (11303 55 St.). Remember to get there early for a chance to win the fourth judging spot!

There's wisdom in skepticism

I have a confession to make. I'm a cynic.

I'm not writing this editorial as some sort of self-therapy to fight it, quite the opposite. I can't imagine my life without a cynical viewpoint. Like a drug addict and his fix, I will not let it go.

You say you look at life through rose-coloured glasses, I say you're a fool. You call yourself an idealist, I call you a blind optimist.

I wasn't always like this. In fact, I remember a time when I was very different. Seven years ago, as a baby-faced first year Political Science student, I was the most optimistic kid on campus. I had grand notions of changing the world like never before. I would silently campaign for all of the latest international tragedies that I would hear about by protest groups at the quad. The naivety was almost cute in a way.

Why take a journey into the past now? Because thanks to social media and viral videos, I see weird clones of my past self up in arms with their own silent protests. They fight and claw their way to the top of my Facebook and twitter feeds about a man named Joseph Kony.

The Kony 2012 revolution started with an immaculately produced half hour video by the charity group Invisible Children.

As a broadcast student, I absolutely love this video. It personalizes the story, following a Ugandan boy named Jacob who has seen atrocities our Western society can barely comprehend, let alone experience in our lifetime.

The director's son Gavin is introduced early in the video, partly I think to humanize the director more, but mostly to give the audience an emotional litmus test. As the director regales his son about the atrocities committed in a foreign land (one that most people could not point to on a map of Africa, I might add), his child's real reaction of confusion and fear is more real than most movie stars could imitate. If you don't have a reaction to that, you are hardly human.

The villain is the next addition to this dangerous concoction of movie magic and real life. His name is Joseph Kony and he is a monster. Like a bad George Lucas film, the director portrays him as a larger than life demon of the underworld. Forget AIDS, starvation and disease, Kony is the real boogieman of Africa.

Now to tie it all together, we need a hero, one, who with many allies, can vanquish the evil of Africa once and for all and save the planet while they are at it. Conveniently that hero is you, the viewer of the video.

The director feeds your inner desire to be an activist and brings you together with everyone else as like-minded as you on the planet. As videos and sounds go by of people coming together on every corner of the globe, holding hands, chanting and being a general force for change, you start to feel like you're a part of something and the system must be fought. I half expected "We're not gonna take it" by Twisted Sister to come on at that

The video is so well edited and written that I'm not surprised that it became so popular via social media. It's the perfect blend of emotion and action, which in reality is directed at a group of people not fully aware of the real issues at hand. Instead of going into what the real issues are in the region, they have oversimplified everything for their audience.

Invisible Children have shown the situation with Uganda and Kony's LRA (Lord's Resistance Army) as black and white. The solution that the group presents is to have the Ugandan military, with aid from U.S. experts, drive Kony out and stop his army (Neat fact: Joseph Kony fled Uganda in 2006 and is believed to be in Sudan).

What they choose to ignore is that the Ugandan forces have themselves been accused and are under investigation of rape and looting. The New York based Social Science Research Council

(SSRC) even brought forth information in December 2011 that some Ugandan soldiers operated a prostitution ring and raped and infected Congolese women in the war-torn Central African Republic (CAR).

Similar reports have soldiers plundering timber, gold and diamonds in both the CAR and the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). No action has yet been taken against these soldiers, and they are

supposed to be the good guys?

In fairness, Invisible Children did respond online to these allegations, saying the Ugandan Army is "better equipped than that of any of the other affected countries." If that is the case, then that just goes to show how more complicated the issue is.

At the end of the day, I do find it hard to fault Invisible Children. They are trying to educate the world about this conflict, after all. They crafted a piece of work that they knew would get people's attention, and did it ever.

The problem occurred when everybody seemed to become an idealist and a political activist overnight after watching the half hour video. Professors and scholars have been analyzing and debating the issues in the region for decades now, and still there are no real solutions. Changing your Facebook profile picture unfortunately won't do

Joseph Kony is a bad man for sure, and the

evidence is stacked against him. But he's joined in using child soldiers by others including:

- Forces Nationales pour la Libération (Rebel group in Burundi)
- Union of Democratic Forces for Unity (Rebel group in The Central African Republic)
- United Front for Democratic Change (Rebel Group in Chad)
- Republic of Congo

• Sudan's People's Liberation

• Robert Mugabe's youth militia in Zimbabwe

All of these have been accused of using children to fight wars.

To all you idealists, there is still hope for you. Become a cynic. Question everything you see. Don't let emotions get the better of you, and take the time to educate yourself instead of reacting.

Who knows? You might actually enjoy it.

NAIT collects CASE awards

NAIT's Marketing and Communications department members took home seven awards at the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) District VIII Awards in Seattle, Washington this past month.

Members competed against entries for outstanding work in writing, photography and design from post-secondary institutes across the Pacific Northwest and Western Canada.

Communications specialist Scott Messenger took home the biggest prize in writing, the Grand Gold for his article "California Dreamin' " – which was published in the fall 2011 issue of NAIT techlife.

Messenger was praised by judges for his "well-researched" story that followed NAIT business incubator client Jim Barr as he pitched his online company (Seekers Media) to a a mecca of San Fransisco investors.

> "It's nice to get recognition, even just to be nominated was nice," Messenger said. "It's those little things that keep you engaged and keep inspiring you to get better."

Messenger knew he has a great story right from the get-go. "We knew we had a pretty good opportunity to tell a compelling story. We knew there'd be an opportunity to take our readers into an environment they wouldn't have the versity and the University of Victoria. chance to otherwise."

Writing the story chronologically was a unique experience for both Messenger and techlife to take. "It's not an approach we generally take," Messenger said. "It's a little closer to pure reporting than what we're usually delivering."

Messenger also took home a silver medal for an article on NAIT President and CEO Glenn Feltham when he took over in the spring of 2011. The article was also published in *techlife*.

NAIT's success was particularly special, as nearly 500 entires were submitted in several categories from much larger institutions, including the University of Washington, Oregon State Uni-

"It was a good feeling to see that we are producing quality work in comparison to even larger universities," Messenger said.

Messenger and other members of NAIT's Marketing and Communications department are already hard at work at the Spring issue of techlife. In addition, the team also tries to publish a weekly article on its website www.techlifemag.ca.

Other big winners included a Gold in Individual Illustrations for Sandy Brown and Derek Lue for their techlife article "Innovate - Your House and the Rising Sun." NAIT also picked up a Silver in Photography and Illustrations and three Bronze medals.

PIN protection all that you have

The days when a debit PIN code wasn't such a big deal are gone. In junior high, the worst that would happen to you if you gave your PIN code to your friend was they'd buy themselves a pop – a price you were willing to pay if it meant you didn't have to go get your own treats at the nearby gas station.

However, at this age you actually have money in the bank (not a lot being a college student, but some) and more people than your friends want your PIN code.

This might sound a lot like your mom nagging you to hide your PIN code or put on a winter coat, but this worry is caused

by past events, not paranoia. This year in Alberta over \$62 million were lost to identity theft frauds.

Some of these victims find themselves embarrassed and don't report the theft to the police because of it. However, if you suspect you have been a victim of fraud, reporting it to the police is the first thing you should do. Getting information about these types of crimes helps the RCMP investigate effectively. If the RCMP don't know the problem exists, how can they help combat it?

However, the RCMP are not the only people who should be contacted. People who suspect they've been a victim of fraud should also contact their credit card companies, banks and other financial institutions to review any transactions made using your name to determine if there were any purchases that weren't made by you.

The first thing Edmonton Mayor Stephen Mandel said when he announced Fraud Prevention Month was that people should change their PIN numbers regularly, and certainly during this month to advocate fraud prevention.

If a PIN code hasn't already been compromised, changing a PIN makes it less likely to happen. If a PIN code has been compromised it becomes useless to whoever

Criminals don't simply peek over a shoulder when they are in line at the local dive bar.

> No, criminals have gotten far more sophisticated than that. It takes

a team of highly technologically savvy offenders, typically working

for organized crime, to crack the PIN of a bank card.

It must be copied onto another card, bombarded with complex algorithms and equations for hours on end and nothing can stop them from stealing your oney except ... changing a PIN? Yes it takes crimin-

als hours of effort to find the PIN of a stolen debit card and it can have a wrench thrown in it by a five-minute stop at your bank to change the PIN.

This won't stop any transactions the identity thief has already made, but suddenly they are sitting at home trying to buy a new stretch Hummer on Ebay with your money, and the card stops working.

Preventing fraud is made simple for the public. Fraud is thought to be as profitable to

organized crime as drug related offences. Don't become part of that statistic.

Iwanicka had nothing but praise for her team's scoring leader.

"Danielle Brown had an influential impact as captain. She took the role on with pride and did the best job she possibly could. She also moved from defence to forward and achieved team top scorer, which is a great feat!"

One of the team's strong points was its core of returning defencemen, who stepped up to their individual roles and worked as a team to help put NAIT among the top teams in the ACAC.

With many veterans returning again next season, and this year's rookies stepping into bigger roles with a season of college experience now behind them, the 2012-2013 season has the potential to have a different ending.

The team and the coaching staff recognize the team's strengths and weaknesses and expect nothing less than to bring home the banner for NAIT next year.

Oil Kings wear WHL East crown

The Oil Kings have the ability to beat any team in the league in seven games, it's just a matter of going out and doing it.



The Phoenix Coyotes, San Jose Sharks, Calgary Flames, Colorado Avalanche, and L.A Kings all sit within four points of one another, and are heading into the remaining games of the season competing for seventh and eighth place in the West.


The Chicago Black Hawks, Nashville Predators and Dallas Stars currently fill the remaining playoff spots and are hoping to make a hard final run for the post-season.

VIRAL VIDEO

Accused war criminal goes viral

Here at the *Nugget* we've reviewed a lot of viral videos over the years. Most of these videos have two things in common:

- They are usually mindless, though hilarious, diversions with little substance beyond a good laugh.
- They generally run less than five minutes. This week's video is neither. It will take up 30 minutes of your time and hopefully more if you decide to research this matter, (and I suggest you should) before making up your mind.

By now you have probably seen the shares on Facebook, the Tweets, the blogs, perhaps even some homemade posters around campus. Love it or hate it, the Invisible Children "Make Kony Famous" campaign has worked.

30 million views

Within 48 hours, thanks to 30 million views on YouTube (plus millions more on other websites such as Vimeo), Ugandan warlord Joseph Kony has become a household name. Those numbers nearly tripled in less than a week.

The Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) leader ordered the abduction of children to become child-sex slaves and child soldiers. An estimated 66,000 children became soldiers and two million people have been internally displaced since 1986.

In 2005, Kony was indicted for war crimes by the International Criminal Court in The Hague, Netherlands but has evaded capture.

Invisible Children's three-fold mission promotes awareness by making documentary films and touring them around the world, channelling energy from viewers into large scale advocacy campaigns and operating protection and rehabilitation programs in LRA-affected areas.

The 30-minute video includes a plea to get various celebrities, dubbed the "culture-makers," onboard, including musicians (such as Rihanna, Bono and Justin Bieber), actors (George Clooney and Ben Affleck), talk show hosts (Bill O'Reilly, Stephen Colbert), technological innovators (Bill Gates and Facebook creator Mark Zuckerberg) as well as Denver Broncos quarterback Tim Tebow.

The video also takes aim at politicians, dubbed the "policy-makers," mostly American, apart from Prime Minister Stephen Harper and UN Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon.

Notable U.S. politicians include Democratic senators John Kerry and Harry Reid as well as presidential candidate Mitt Romney. In addition, former presidents Bill Clinton and George W. Bush (along with his former secretary of state, Condoleezza Rice) are included, even though the latter's

administration already tried to go after Kony.

Interestingly enough, neither current President Barack Obama, nor current Secretary of State Hilary Clinton are mentioned, despite Obama deploying 100 U.S. military advisers last October to help pursue Kony and the LRA.

Action kits, which sell at \$30 apiece and contain posters, stickers and other promotional material, have flown off shelves. With nearly 500,000 shipped worldwide, the campaign has potentially already brought in \$15 million.

Some controversies have arisen about the Invisible Children organization, particularly its finances, which are public by law.

Critics suggested only 32 per cent of their earnings in 2011 went to direct services, with much of the rest paying for staff, travel and film production. However, Invisible Children claims that 80 per cent of its spending went to programs supporting its three-fold mission, with only 19 per cent spent on administration and management as well as direct fundraising.

Advocacy organization

Invisible Children's director of ideology, Jedidiah Jenkins, addressed the concerns via the group website, saying, "we are not an aid organization. People think we're over there delivering shoes or food. But we are an advocacy and awareness organization."

One of the biggest critics has been the tumblr page Visible Children, which has posted almost daily since the KONY 2012 video went viral. The blog has received 2.2 million hits and has criticized the KONY 2012 campaign for its finances or the fact that Invisible Children is supporting the Sudan People's Liberation Army (PLA), which has been riddled with accusations of rape and looting.

Although the Visible Children blog admits that Kony is a "very evil man" and that those involved in the KONY 2012 campaign have great intentions, the writer is uncomfortable supporting the controversial activist group.


Although Visible Children and many other blogs have created backlash, the biggest obstacle that Invisible Children campaign has faced has been online cynicism, such as the fact that Kony has not been seen in Uganda since 2006.

While it is good to raise questions, one must remember that cynicism breeds apathy and we can't afford to be apathetic while atrocities are committed on our fellow human beings.

Prevent apathy and do your research. As the recently popular Internet meme claims watching a 30-minute YouTube video doesn't make you an expert on African politics.

Latest movie a stretch for Ed Helms

"In New Orleans, walking around town in a goatee, you fit in a lot better," says Ed Helms, speaking of the facial hair he grew to play Pat, a middle aged man going through a failing marriage in Paramount Pictures' Jeff, Who Lives at Home, which opens this Friday.

"I felt like the needy character of Pat on set, but (off set), walking around New Orleans, I felt like a cool cat," he said in a recent confer-

Jeff, Who Lives at Home tells the story of a middle-aged man (played by Jason Segel) who is dispatched from his mother's basement, where he still lives, by his mom (Susan Sarandon) on an errand. He runs into his brother Pat (Helms) just as Pat discovers his wife (Judy Greer) might be cheating on him.

"Pat is someone who is desperate to portray himself as someone who really has his s**t together, but really doesn't," Helms said of his character.

"I think we all know this guy, and sometimes we are this person at various times in our life. I'm not as dysfunctional as (Pat), at least I hope not, but I do share that kind of struggle to be a better person. We have a very different fashion sense though, to be clear."

Jeff, Who Lives at Home is the latest film from Jay and Mark Duplass (Cyrus, Baghead) and Helms was more than excited to be involved.

"I had became buds with Jason Reitman. He directed a couple of Office episodes, and I guess Mark and Jay had written the script and Jason jumped on to produce it. The script got floated my way and I thought I might be a good candidate, so I said, 'sign me up, let's do this!" "said Helms.

With an all-star comedy cast, one would expect an outrageous laugh out loud film, but Helms begs to differ.

"It might not be what you expect from Jason and me," he said. "Obviously we both come from a comedy background and Susan Sarandon obviously has done some great comedy work, but this movie, in keeping with the Duplass brothers' tone, sort of rides the line into drama a little bit."

Students work on film

NAIT Digital Media and IT students are going to be jumping feet first into the post production of their documentary *Crossing the Axis: The Journey of Gentle Wind* from now until the end of April.

The project, which is part of the Capstone program, is the fourth and final semester project that has been in production for about a month already.

The Capstone project is a partnership with an industry production company that approaches the DMIT program and works with and mentors

students in the creation of a feature length film. This year's production is with Catharsis Films, with producer/director Steven Ashworth and executive producer Larry Anderson.

During these Capstone projects, the members of the production company will act as the mentors in a few specific areas and the film crew is made up the fourth semester students.

Mentors

This year, the mentors include a producer/director, a director of photography, the sound recordist and the post-production supervisor. The students will be filling the crew roles of production manager, assistant director, camera operators, boom operators, editors, colourists and so on.

The film this semester is a documentary about foster children in Alberta, and specifically, the life and struggles of the late Ted Dallaire, an aboriginal man who had a rather tumultuous journey through the foster care system as a child

Cheryl Dalmer, an instructor in the DMIT program, is serving as the supervisor for the co-ordination and organization roles during this production.

"Not all foster children have this experience," says Dalmer, "but there seems to be a large number of aboriginal children who find themselves in not ideal situations because the foster parents don't understand their culture."

'Against all odds'

Ted Dallaire did grow to be a young man rather rough around the edges but he worked with social services as a model in the designing of a process for integrating aboriginal children into the foster care system and in helping foster families understand what it is to foster aboriginal children.

"Regardless, [Dallaire] did turn out to be a remarkable, remarkable foster parent model," said Dalmer, "an amazing man, who against all odds, survived."

The students had their last day of principal shooting on Friday at the Ben Calf Robe - St. Clare school, for a gala dinner and fundraiser. The Ben Calf Robe - St. Clare school has a hot lunch program that has come under duress recently because of a huge increase in the student population.

The gala used the legacy of Dallaire to raise money and save the hot lunch program, which will now be renamed the "Ted Dallaire Lunch Program."

As well as the gala, students filmed interviews with Dallaire's widow, a former co-worker from social services, a foster child of Dallaire's and footage of aboriginal ceremonies at the Ben Calfrobe - St. Clare school.

"The documentary's main purpose," Dalmer says, "is to create awareness for the value of children, all children – not just aboriginal children, but all children – that they deserve a good life, they deserve good care should they fall into the foster care system."

Dalmer says she expects the film to be finished at the end of April.

The official final day of post-production is April 27 and the film will then be used for educational purposes within social services, as well as doing the festival circuit, before being screened and released.



BOOK REVIEW

Excellent read, not a classic

The Year of the Flood, published in 2009, is the most recent novel from seminal Canadian writer Margaret Atwood.

It takes place in the same dystopian version of Earth as her 2003 novel *Oryx and Crake*, and even shares a few characters. However, those characters play minor parts in the *The Year of the Flood*. They serve more as backstory and context than primary actors.

Though the two books are natural companions and do explain some things about each other, it would be wrong to call *The Year of the Flood* a sequel, as it stands alone quite capably.

The book follows the lives of two women, Ren and Toby, who are members of a religious-environmental group called God's Gardeners. The Gardeners honour and strive to cultivate nature in a world that has become a wasteland, devastated by corporate rapacity and misguided bioengineering.

The book begins after an epidemic – the waterless flood of the title – all but decimates the human race. Ren and Toby survive the outbreak separately, one by cunning and one by blind luck. They are each left alone to navigate a ruined and dangerous world.

Atwood employs the common literary device of non-chronological storytelling. *The*

Year of the Flood begins at Year 25, the year of the plague, and jumps back and forth – sometimes a dozen years at a time – in the narrative timeline. This allows her to effectively pace the suspense and emotional impact of the book.

Atwood hooks you with a shocking and intriguing opening scene, goes back in time to provide context and to flesh out characters, then delivers the climactic event near the end of the book, even though that event takes place a short time after the opening moment.

This book is harrowing and even terrifying at points, which is fitting, given the apocalyptic nature of the story.

Atwood evokes these emotions primarily through the use of genuinely menacing subject matter and through her deft manipulation of language. However, the emotional impact could have been greater if the two primary characters were given more depth. This seems like a harsh criticism, but I level it only because of the precedent Atwood set for herself in previous works.

Many of her novels, such as *Cat's Eye*, *The Blind Assassin* and even *Oryx and Crake* feature characters that I completely empathize with – I feel what they feel. In *The Year of the Flood*, I get enough of Ren's and Toby's backstory to make them interesting characters and to understand what they feel, but I don't always feel it myself.

Though called science fiction by many (as were her earlier books, *Oryx and Crake* and *The Handmaid's Tale*), Atwood prefers to categorize these books as speculative fiction.

The distinction is that speculative fiction could really happen. All of the features of the story that are not true-to-life are based on our current technologies and are just a small step beyond what already exists. That this chilling

world is a possibility makes the story that much more compelling.

In *The Year of the Flood*, Atwood does a characteristically excellent job of crafting a fascinating and eminently readable story. I don't rank it among her masterpieces, but I suppose not everything she writes can be a modern classic.

John Carter – action to spare

John Carter is an interesting beast. In the lead-up to Disney's space epic based on Edgar Rice Burroughs' novel *Princess of Mars* and the subsequent series of books that it spawned, it was unclear what we should expect.

When a trailer for *John Carter* premiered last summer in theatres before *Harry Potter* and *The Deathly Hallows – Part 2*, audiences were shown a minute and a half montage that showed a handful of visceral and visually-stimulating action scenes, but revealed few story elements or character information.

With a staggering budget of \$250 million and an additional reported marketing allowance of \$115 million, many were sceptical if *John Carter* could live up to its massive expense and make its money back.

John Carter follows a 19th century millionaire's adventures through a diary he has left exclusively for his nephew to read. Early on, we learn that John Carter had accidentally discovered a way to travel to Mars (or Barsoom, as the locals call it).

Everything isn't as it should be on the Red Planet, as is showcased by the ongoing civil war that is tearing apart the planet's society and is destroying cities. Naturally, John Carter is whisked into the middle of this conflict.

The film is Andrew Stanton's (the man behind Pixar's *Wall-E*, *Finding Nemo* and *A Bug's Life*) first shot at directing a live-action film and the results, minus a few expositional quirks, are impressive.

Carter's special effects are outstanding, especially the work done on the planet's aliens. This isn't all that surprising, considering the film's mon-

ster budget and that the trailers showcased quite a bit of its visual prowess before the film's release. There's one particular battle scene in the film's second act that best sums up the film's style and the fluid nature of its action sequences.

The film looked outstanding in IMAX format but unfortunately the Disney-forced 3D added absolutely nothing to the experience. *John Carter* is the latest in the long string of films that makes the case that 3D, if shoe-horned into films, can detract from experiences.

To truly justify the dimmer screen and the burden of those bulky glasses on your head, the 3D should be outstanding and add something meaningful to the experience. *John Carter* falls completely flat in this justification.

The story in *John Carter* moves along at an even and steady pace and is broken up nicely by entertaining action sequences, impressive-looking wide views of the planet's landscape, and surprisingly well shot and written dialogue scenes. Stanton does a good job of ensuring the movie's potentially more dull moments are kept lively by the use of cool-looking lighting effects and clean-looking CGI.

The thing that *John Carter* struggles to do is to establish its universe early on. Certain characters, and why the planet's conflicts are occurring, are not fully explained. We're not told why what's happening is that way, or why we should care that it's occurring. The opening sequence of the film is especially confusing due to some strange editing choices and originally unexplained changing of characters' names.

Helium, one of Barsoom's cities and focal

points of the film, seems excruciatingly lifeless and gives no reason for the viewer to get invested in its storyline. The city is under constant threats throughout the movie, and not once did I care about the effect the outcome would have on the city. Fortunately, this lack of establishment and exposition doesn't translate to most of the film's characters.

John Carter (played by Kelowna, B.C.'s Taylor Kitsch) and Lynn Collins have a great onscreen chemistry that gets better and better as the film continues. The love story that develops is cliché and predictable, but it gets the job done.

The film's musical score, composed by Michael Giacchino (*Lost*, *Up*) is worth mentioning as well. The music subtly adds a dynamic sense of intensity to the action sequences and even dialogue scenes. Although at times it's very Prince of Persia-y (mostly because of the similar film's landscapes and tone), the music is a definite highlight of the film.

John Carter is a great popcorn action flick. If you're looking for a good time at the movies, without having to get too invested into what's going on, this is a good choice.

It would have been nicer if the screenplay was a little clearer for those people that wanted to get more invested in the film, especially the beginning. The bulk of the confusion comes from the fictional names of the cities, planets and characters that seem to jumble together at times in the film.

However, if you're willing to let that all go (and can put up with the lifeless 3D), you're bound to have a solid time at the movies.

GAME REVIEW

Challenging, and price is right

Unlike knitting, collecting rocks, creative writing or sandcastle building, gaming can be an expensive hobby. Most of the aforementioned activities just require a few basic and largely inexpensive materials, where buying the latest video games can decimate the bank account quickly.

Gaming on a budget is something that I have quickly learned I must adopt, otherwise I'll soon become an expert on ramen and soap-less showers. You just get dirty again any-

With my newfound frugality intact, the fact that Rhythm Heaven Fever was only \$30 was the primary reason I decided to pick it up. I had heard good things about the Rhythm Heaven series and finally decided it was time to try out the latest installment. I guess the box art didn't hurt its cause either. It looked like a unicorn had regurgitated on it.

As the title aptly suggests, Rhythm Heaven Fever is a rhythm based mini-game collection. I hate calling Nintendo's latest a "mini-game" collection, as that term is now associated with sub-par Walmart bargain-bin games. Don't be fooled though, despite its simplicity (the game uses two buttons for the game play) Rhythm Heaven Fever has more depth than any "Carnival," "Lawn" or "Dress Up Your Horse" game that the Wii has grown excruciatingly accustomed to.

The format of the game is deceivingly simple and straightforward. When you first turn Rhythm Heaven on, there's just one game unlocked. Once you successfully complete that minigame up to the game's ridiculously high standards, the next game unlocks.

The game play consists of hitting either the A or B button (sometimes both) in time with the music. The characters or objects on the screen react to the music and whether you successfully timed the button presses, and that - alongside with the sound effects – is the only feedback you receive as to whether you are doing it right.

There are no meters or numbers to tell you if you're doing OK, just a screen at the end of the game that informs you whether you did good enough or not. This can sometimes be frustrating, as there were games where I wasn't sure if I was even close or not to completing the task, dampening my desire to try that game

I'll be frank, Rhythm Heaven Fever is weird. The game is distinctly "Japanese." From the clean and crisp anime-style art to the over-thetop sound effects and the awkward phrasing of text, it's easy to tell where this game was developed.

A cat and a dog playing badminton while flying through the clouds in their own separate planes? Four pigs pitching a business idea by spinning circles in their office chairs? Monkeys losing their patience when you can't perfect your golf swing?

Scenarios like these are too many to count in Rhythm Heaven Fever. It's like very little else out there. The only other game that I can think of that compares to this one is the WarioWare series. But even that pales in weirdness compared

The games are snappy and quick, and mostly clear on the end goal. You'll find yourself tapping your foot to keep the beat and some of the music is fantastic. That cat and dog badminton game I alluded to earlier has some of the most addicting music I've listened to in a while.

Ultimately, playing the game is a blast and with an un-lock-



be fun with a buddy.

My only gripe is this game is hard. It's infuriating at times. I was on the first mini-game for an hour, which featured two primates as my golf instructors. I had to keep the beat to the music so I could sink the golf balls that they threw up and I couldn't get it for the life of me. Funny enough, closing my eyes and completely ignoring the visual cues on the screen ended up being the secret to success.

If you're up for a challenge, can keep a steady beat and love weird stuff, Rhythm Heaven Fever is sure to satisfy all those urges. The \$29.99 price tag makes it ultra enticing too. I couldn't imagine how many hours (of frustration) you could spend trying to perfect every game.

If you can't quite afford Mass Effect 3 this week, dust off your Wii and pick Rhythm Heaven Fever. Just don't blame me when you get weird looks.

Former Idol hits all the right notes

Generally one would think placing fourth on American Idol isn't the most common way for an artist to put out a hard rock album. However, two fourth-place contestants have done just that. Chris Daughtry, and most recently James Durbin, both artists who were portrayed as rockers and chose plenty of songs from their roots during their time

The comparisons are apparent on Durbin's debut album, Memories of a Beautiful Disaster. Durbin may rock a little bit harder than Daughtry from time to time, but Durbin is equally capable of breaking things down for a ballad.

Like Daughtry who enlisted Slash and Shinedown's Brent Smith to help out on his debut album, Durbin brings in some friends of his own. Durbin enlists Motley Crue guitarist Mick Mars on the hardrocking "Outcast."

In addition, session guitarist Phil X (Triumph) and drummer Josh Freese (The Vandals, A Perfect Circle, Weezer and hundreds more) play on over half of Durbin's album. Both men were also heavily involved in Daughtry's live album.

Memories of a Beautiful Disaster kicks off fast and heavy with "Higher than Heaven," a title that also might describe some of the notes that Durbin is able to tackle.

Durbin slows it down and enters Daughtry ter-

ritory on second track with "All I Want." Unfortunately, this is where the album loses its edge, which it doesn't pick back up until the Shinedown-esque


Durbin shows off his more than ample pipes on crooners like "Love In Ruins" and "Right Behind You" but he's at his best when he turns it up a notch on rockers like first single "Stand Up" and the 30 Seconds to Mars-like "Screaming." Durbin performed the 30 Seconds to Mars hit "Closer to the Edge" during his time on Amer-

The 23-year-old amicably tackles "Everything Burns," which was originally performed by former Evanescence guitarist Ben Moody and pop star Anastacia for the Fantastic Four soundtrack. Moody co-wrote Daughtry's smash hit "What About Now."

While Memories of a Beautiful Disaster is a solid album front to back, it's unlikely to launch Durbin into the same level of stardom that Daughtry has experienced, but he could certainly establish a following in the hard rock community.

Durbin is ready to hit the road with help from friends, both old (hometown friends Dylan Rose and Tyler Molinaro) and new (former In This Moment members Blake Bunzel and Jeff Fabb).



How to prevent date rape

Date rape is defined as being forced or pressured into having sex against your will and without your consent by a person who is known to you. It includes new acquaintances or ongoing relationships. The best defence against date rape is to become informed and to minimize situations that put you at risk.

Here are some suggestions:

- Don't keep your head in the sand. Recognize that date rape could happen to you. Between 10 to 25 per cent of college women report being raped by men they knew. Although far less common, men can also be raped.
- Know that it is your right to set limits and to defend them, and to tell your partner if/when you do and don't want to have sex.
- Firmly discourage any unwanted contact, even if it is casual.

- Be assertive in setting relationship boundaries. Think about your limits in advance and communicate limits and expectations clearly (e.g. how much touch is OK). If you are clear in your own mind about your limits it is easier to communicate them.
- Passivity may be interpreted as permission, so say 'No' in a tone that relays that you mean it. Don't hint or expect anyone to read your mind.
- Be wary of acquaintances who are excessively jealous or possessive, get hostile when you say no, ignore your wishes or opinions, act in an intimidating way, or attempt to make you feel guilty if you say no to sex.
- If you are uncertain about the person you are with avoid or limit alcohol or drug

If you do get into a situation where you feel uncomfortable or are forced:

- Try to stay calm. Think about your options and how safe it would be to resist.
 - Stay no strongly.
- If you have a safe option to resist, act nuickly.
- Try to get away. Use self defence tactics. You may be able to hit, bite or kick to gain a chance of escape. However realize that fighting back might cause the offender to become violent so appraise the situation.
 - Yell for help.
- Buy time with talk. Try to convince or persuade the offender. Flatter him. When he

thinks he no longer needs to use force, he may ease up his guard and give you a chance to break away.

- Be as non-seductive as possible. Tell him you have a sexually transmitted disease, your period or that you are pregnant. Do physical things to turn him off (e.g. urinate on the floor, pick your nose, pass gas, belch or yomit).
- Remember that giving in is not consent. It may be the only survival strategy.

If you are raped, get medical attention as soon as possible. Do not shower or bathe until you have been examined at an emergency department. The Sexual Assault Response Team offers 24-hour service and support through hospital emergency departments. You may also want to talk to a friend or family member who will be supportive and/or inform the police of the attack. Remember rape is not your fault; it is an act of violence.

Men have the responsibility to prevent date rape, too:

- Listen carefully to what the woman is saying. If you feel like you are getting a mixed message, clarify what she wants.
- Be sensitive to women who are unsure whether they want to have sex. If you pressure a woman into sex, this is classified as force.
- Do not let your desires control your actions. Think about whether you really want to have sex with someone who doesn't want

to have sex with you.

- Remember that date rape is a crime and that it is never acceptable to use force in sexual situations.
- Don't make assumptions about a woman's behaviour. Because a woman drinks or dresses sexily it does not mean that she is inviting you to have sex.
- The fact that you were intoxicated is not legal defence regarding rape. You are responsible for your actions, whether drunk or sober.
- Just because a woman has had sex with you previously does not mean you have the right to have sex in the future. Date rape is a crime even if there has been past sexual involvement.
- Don't assume that a woman who consents to kissing or other sexual intimacies is willing to have sexual intercourse.
- If you have sex with a woman who is drugged, intoxicated, incapable of saying no or unaware of what is happening, you may be guilty of rape.
- Get involved if you believe someone is at risk. Don't be afraid to intervene you may save a woman from assault and a man from criminal prosecution.

Fraud awareness



With March being Fraud Awareness Month, here are some helpful tips to avoid becoming a victim of fraud.

What is Fraud? Fraud is a wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain.

According to the RCMP's Commercial Crime branch, fraud-related offences are now thought to be as profitable as drug-related offences, estimated at between \$10 and \$30 billion annually in Canada. The majority of these crimes aren't committed by kids at their computers, 80 per cent or more of the work is conducted by criminal organizations.

Here are a few tips to help protect you and your loved ones:

Payment cards (credit and debit)

- Periodically check your credit report, bank and credit card statements. Report irregularities promptly.
- Don't lose sight of your credit and debit cards during transactions.
- Shield your PIN when using your debit or credit card.
- Memorize all PINs. Do not write them on the cards.
- Change your PIN regularly. It's recommended that you change your PIN every month.
- Shred personal and financial information before putting it in the garbage.
- Protect your mail. Deposit outgoing mail in post office boxes and remove mail from your mailbox promptly.
- If you are unable to pick up your mail, have someone pick it up for you.

E-mail and online

- Create strong passwords to protect your accounts and change them often. A weak password could leave your personal information vulnerable.
- Spyware may be sent as an attachment in an e-mail allowing criminals access to your information. Do not open e-mails from people you don't know
- Check out the privacy and security settings of your social network and use them to control who sees what.
- If someone you don't know tries to "friend" you, ignore it. There's no way to be sure they are who they say they are.
- Before posting pictures, think about whether or not they're appropriate or give away too much information.
- Make sure your computer is loaded up with a firewall, anti-spyware software and virus software.
- Don't give away person information to a stranger during online chatting.
- Be wary of online contests...especially if you're asked for money up front.

How can I recognize a scam?

If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is:

- You've won a big prize in a contest that you don't recall entering.
- You're offered a once-in-a-lifetime investment that offers a huge return.
- You're told that you can buy into a lottery ticket pool that cannot lose.

You must pay or you can't play:

• "You're a winner!" but you must agree

to send money to the caller in order to pay for delivery, processing, taxes, duties or some other fee in order to receive your prize.

You must give them your private financial information:

• The caller asks for all your confidential banking and/or credit card information. Honest businesses do not require these details unless you are using that specific method of payment.

Will that be cash ... or cash?:

• Often criminal telemarketers ask you to send cash or a money order, rather than a cheque or credit card. Cash is untraceable and can't be cancelled. And, crooks also have difficulty in establishing themselves as merchants with legitimate credit card companies.

The caller is more excited than you are:

• The crooks want to get you excited about this "opportunity" so that you won't be able to think clearly.

It's the manager calling:

• The person calling claims to be a government official, tax officer, banking official, law-yer or some other person in authority.

The stranger calling wants to become your best friend:

• Criminals love finding out if you're lonely and willing to talk. Once they know that, they'll try to convince you that they are your friend.

It's a limited opportunity and you're going to miss out:

• If you are pressured to make a big purchase decision immediately, it's probably not a legitimate deal. Real businesses or charities will give you a chance to check them out or think about it.

Warning – your computer may be infected by a virus. Take preventative action now!:

• The virus scam has grown to epidemic proportions in Canada, now accounting for between 70 and 80 per cent of frauds reported daily to the Canadian Anti Fraud Centre (CAFC). Allowing someone to remotely access your computer is extremely dangerous and can leave you vulnerable to a variety of frauds. If a service provider calls and offers to upgrade your computer's anti-virus software, be extremely cautious. It's most likely a scam.

What to do

- 1. Act immediately. Report the incident.
- 2. Notify creditors and financial institutions immediately.
- 3. File a report with the Edmonton Police Service or the RCMP.
 - 4. Cancel credit and debit cards.
- 5. Check your credit file with both credit bureaus (Equifax and Trans Union).
- 6. Report fraudulent activities to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre:

 - Toll free: 1-888-495-8501

Fraud – Recognize It, Report It, Stop It.

If you have information about a crime, contact Protective Services at 780-471-7477. If you see a crime in progress, call 911, then Protective Services. If you wish to remain anonymous, contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477). You will remain anonymous and, if the information you provide leads to a conviction, you could eligible for a reward of up to \$2,000.

Handy lunch break destination

Lan's Asian Grill serves up modern Vietnamese and Thai cuisine with a pinch of Chinese.

I've talked about Vietnamese food and I've talked about Thai food, so why am I writing about Lan's Asian Grill? Because they're within 10 minutes walking distance of NAIT and they deserve to be recognized.

Why? Because there's a Subway attached to a Mac's that's only about 6.096 metres closer to NAIT than Lan's, and the people who go there regularly don't realize what they're missing out on.

When you first walk in, the interior isn't necessarily gripping. It's quite simple and basic, but the smiling faces and positive atmosphere tends to pull you in, in place of the interior.

Keep in mind that this is an "order at counter" restaurant. Is this a good thing or a bad thing? Well, that's debatable. Personally, I would say it's a bad thing, however there's one major element in this restaurant that makes the system work and that is the man behind the counter, Tom.

Tom owns half of Lan's Asian Grill with his sister Monica (head chef) and in my opinion, he's a major part of their success. He's a very upbeat person who will actually make you feel welcome, and want to come back for more, but more than that, he'll become your friend on the spot, which is something you will not find in many other restaurants.

The food is not fine-dining, but the presentation is clean and looks delicious, and the taste is very homely, in a good way. The flavours in each dish are well balanced, with each element being present and representing itself, without overpowering any other parts of the dish. It's almost like one big happy family on a plate ... that you can eat.

A lot of their menu is customizable to your liking, and since I've tried so many different things on their menu before, I won't go into too many individual dishes. But two dishes that I would recommend would be their Pad Thai, which has a good flavour and great texture to it, and a really strong spice as well, if that's your thing (it's optional), but it's not like a raw hot and no taste spice – it's a tasty spice.

My second recommendation, and my personal favourite, is their Savoury Steak on Jasmine Rice. It's a bit pricier than the rest of the menu, but well worth it. The steak is juicy, soft and absolutely delicious. Then, of course, the sauce on it drips onto the rice, making that heavenly as well.

If you're health conscious, then that's great, because Lan's takes care to minimize grease and oils in their food to make it as healthy as possible without compromising flavour. If you're a herbivore, then Lan's has a nice vegetarian menu as well. The best part about their food, though, is their use of daily fresh ingredients.

Their price is on the "fair" scale, but bordering on "slightly overpriced," not that you should care after your first taste, anyway. Ultimately, you go there for the experience.
