\$3B deficit?

Albertans may have to dig deep into their pockets to cover a possible \$3 billion deficit.

Due to a depressing first quarter of the year, when Alberta's energy revenue didn't make as much as predicted, critics are concerned Albertans will be on the hook to the tune of between \$2.3 billion and \$3 billion.

According to Finance Minister Doug Horner, unstable global marketplaces such as Europe and the United States, as well as a period of low oil revenues, are to blame.

Back in February, the government predicted the deficit would sit at around \$886 million. In the first three months of the fiscal year, revenue dropped by \$400 million partly due to low bitumen and oil royalties.

Right now, the government plans on capping spending as well as re-evaluating some

future building projects. Without making any major cutback or raising taxes, Horner says the government will be able to get out of its financial woes.

Critics and opposition MLAs have been quick to blame the government for its overly optimistic revenue estimates.


Canadian Taxpayers Federation's Scott Hennig has called the situation "ugly," and said that this government has "had a lot of bad news quarters."

Hennig suggests that the government has something to hide, stating that the budget was too optimistic in its predictions. The federation says that the province has broken its own laws by not releasing the numbers showing the government's spending and finances.

The Wildrose Party has also put the blame on the Redford government, saying some of their decisions have put core government programs at risk.

Already, the police college that was supposed to be underway in Fort Macleod has been cancelled. The government says it was cancelled on merit and not due to the province's current financial troubles.

Horner says the government will make sure they meet Premier Alison Redford's promise to have the budget balanced by

Memorial for cyclist

Hundreds of cyclists took to our city's streets on Friday, Aug. 31, in remembrance of Isaak Kornelsen. Kornelsen, a University of Alberta student and track athlete, was killed on Aug. 27 while cycling on Whyte Avenue.

The riders began at City Hall at about 6 p.m. More and more cyclists joined the group as they wound through downtown, across the High Level Bridge and on to their destination at the white-painted memorial bicycle that marks the site of Kornelsen's fatal accident, on Whyte Avenue near 102 Street.

A few days after his death, Kornelsen's friends decided to plan the memorial ride. They contacted Edmonton Bicycle Commuters (EBC), a non-profit society that promotes and facilitates cycling as transportation, to help publicize the event and organize the logistics.

No official escort

EBC Executive Director Chris Chan says that when he told the city about their plans, there wasn't enough time to arrange for an official police escort or to close traffic along the route.

"They said that if we ride the same way we would as individual cyclists – as vehicles – we'll be OK," said Chan.

There were, however, police officers on bicycles who followed along with the group and eventually stepped in to stop traffic.

"After a few minutes of watching us following traffic rules and getting split up by red lights because of that, the police decided it would be better to let us go through as a group," says Chan. "By the time we got to Whyte Avenue, there were police cars and vans blocking traffic for us."

Chan says that the purpose of the ride was to pay tribute to the life of a much-loved community member but also to bring awareness to cycling safety.


'Shouldn't have happened'

"One of the main ideas – even for Isaak's friends – was that this [ride] was about remembering but it was also about talking about how this death shouldn't have happened," said Chan.

Chan believes that measures such as slowing traffic on residential streets and protected bike lanes on major roads are important for creating a city in which all residents can feel safe riding their bikes. He recently attended Velo-City Global, an international cycling planning conference that brings together cycling advocates, urban planners and politicians.

Chan noticed an emerging theme from all over the world – traditional bike lanes, designated only by a painted line on the pavement, are not good.

"They're only good for those who would

ride with or without a bike lane," said Chan, "they don't encourage those who are hesitant."

In contrast, a protected bike lane features barriers of some kind between automotive traffic and bicycles.

"They provide a psychological and physical separation between bikes and cars," says Chan

This separation not only makes avid cyclists safer, it also works to encourage those who are less confident on a bike to choose cycling as a form of transportation. Chan says that in some areas of Vancouver, cycling has increased 10-fold with the addition of protected bike

He also notes that it can often be easier to implement protected bike lanes on major arterial roadways, such as Whyte Avenue, because street parking can be maintained on the left side of the barrier.

Looking more deeply into the circumstances surrounding Kornelsen's death could provide an important insight into how we can and should structure our streets. Police said that he struck the side mirror of a parked truck, lost control of his bike and fell under the wheels of a passing cement truck.

"Police called Isaak's death a freak accident, said he lost control," says Chan, "but they didn't take it one step further and ask 'why would a cyclist lose control and run into a parked car?""

Chan places blame with the conditions surrounding the accident rather than with any individual

"If we had appropriate and safe infrastructure for cyclists, this wouldn't have happened," he said.

Chan hopes that the tragedy of Kornelsen's death will spur city planners and policy-makers to do some good for the city's cyclists.

"We would like to see the city take bolder steps – steps that take

more political will – than just a painted line," he says. "We all deserve to be able to travel safely around our city no matter what form of transportation we choose."

In addition to advocacy work, Edmonton Bicycle Commuters offers cycling education, sells low-cost refurbished bikes and operates BikeWorks, a volunteer-run community bicycle shop. BikeWorks has a North location at 9305 111 Ave. and a South location at 10047 80 Ave. Visit their website at edmontonbikes ca

A St. Albert family is asking for a donation.

But not just any donation, this request is for bone marrow. Kurt and Deana Popowich's five-year-old daughter Halle was diagnosed with a rare form of acute myeloid leukemia (AML) earlier this summer.

About one in five cases of leukemia is AML. Most cases in young children end up being acute lympho-



blastic leukemia (ALL).

The main hope she has now is a bone marrow transplant.

A bone marrow transplant is a procedure to replace damaged or destroyed bone marrow with healthy bone marrow and stem cells.

Currently, Halle is staying at the Stollery Children's Hospital here in Edmonton, waiting for a match. Since being admitted, Halle has gone through numerous blood transfusions, platelet transfusions and chemotherapy

treatments.

Without a bone marrow transplant, doctors have said Halle's chances for survival sit between five and 20 per cent.

Canadian Blood Services have said that young men between the ages of 17 and 35 provide the best bone marrow and stem cells, but make up less than one out of 10 donors. There is currently a shortage in ethnic donors.

Donating bone marrow is low risk and the procedure takes up to three to four

Is it graffiti or is it art?

Like a 13-year-old kid, as Edmonton continues to grow and develop it is inevitably going to experience some growing pains.

As Edmonton transitions from a prairie township to a busting city centre, certain rules that were once black-and-white become more greyed.

One such issue that seems to have stumped out policy-makers is graffiti, and defining where art ends and vandalism begins.

"Graffiti is a major concern for many citizens, organizations and businesses," reads a statement on the city of Edmonton's website. "Regardless of the style, size or colour, graffiti is vandalism and a criminal offence when placed on public or private property without the owner's consent. If not removed, it can lead to more acts of graffiti and create an environment in which crime can thrive."

City has a point, but ...

For the most part, when talking about the juvenile and aesthetically offensive scrawling of names and certain symbols, the city does have a point.

But what happens when acts of guerilla art are less about property destruction and more about moments of inspiration displayed in a free and public forum?

Take, for example, a mural celebrating famed Edmonton Eskimo Rollie Miles painted on a garage door on Strathcona High School's property.

Although it seems the art was put in place to replace another mural that had been defaced on the same property, as a heart-warming and positive tribute to a local legend, as the art was not commissioned and painted without permission, it was still considered graffiti.

This case was fairly straight forward, as the piece was clearly art and not some vandal looking for a cheap thrill. But what happens to street art that isn't so well received?

Now, Edmonton's paper-pushers are faced with a dilemma. How do you decide what is art?

Is about intent?

Is it about the feeling of the piece? The intent? Maybe, but perspective is relative and what is beautiful to one may be repulsive to another.

Take, for example, a new commissioned mural of the Famous Five, celebrating Nellie McClung, Emily Murphy, Irene Parlby, Louise McKinney and Henrietta Muir Edwards for their contributions to advancing the status of women in society.

Through their actions, women became officially defined as persons under the law and therefore became eligible for rights and freedoms they were previously denied. Something worth plastering up on a wall, no?

What the mural does not address is the link between the famous five and a culture of accepted racism and their campaigning to limit non-white immigration and their pushing for eugenics legislation in Canada.

Now we have a mural that all at once celebrates our soci-

ety's progressive triumphs while also celebrating a culture of racism. Beauty here is truly in the eye of the beholder.

Whatever side you are on, here is a clear example of how trying to define art based on the impact it has on the community and the impression it gives is dangerous and inadequate.

With that being said, how can we define what art is worthy of protection and what should be painted over?

The Edmonton Arts Council takes a more sympathetic stance on street art.

"Graffiti arts are important in encouraging diversity and accessibility for artists into the realm of public artmaking, and to foster connection and communication with communities through the arts," reads a statement on the Edmonton Arts Council Website.

I believe there is such a thing as graffiti art. Art that is allowed to roam free, and is accessible to all, can have a powerful message. Free from any premeditated expectations, art on the street speaks truths from the people to the people and should be allowed to exist.

But how, then, can we allow art to flourish without opening the flood gates for every jerk on the back of an ETS bus who feels like scrawling a swastika on the window?

You can't.

By controlling art, you effectively destroy it. Controlling artistic licence with broad sweeping policy will leave us with nothing but Soviet era-esque propaganda murals and limit the free spirit that can make art powerful.

Policy makers need to learn to accept that not all things can be forced into boxes, and some all-or-nothing rule making is simply insufficient

No one person is qualified to judge the inherent merit of a work of art, and calling for a referendum every time something interesting pops up on the side of a building or under a bridge is unrealistic.

In law, it is deemed better to have a thousand criminals go free then to wrongly convict an innocent person. So to should it be with street art.

Although I will not jump to the defence of the obvious dribble, I believe street art has a powerful ability to reflect the true culture of a people that otherwise would not exist.

Set whatever rules you will, true art will always be as it is, whatever that is.

Being hired later in the off-season meant that Julius was directly behind the 8-ball from the start, because the pressure was on to ensure that his new team was good to go come September.

Additional obstacle

Worked together

"However, I'm also bringing three of my own players here to NAIT from previous teams and both Mike and I have been working very hard at making the transition easier for the players that had been recruited over the summer."

"I have also done a lot of work in head hunting some local talent in the area, so all of this helps," he said. "Unfortunately, some players decided that they would no longer be coming to join our team here at NAIT, but these are circumstances beyond our control."

Aside from the recruitment issues this summer, a new team coming together also brings its own specific challenges. But for coach Julius, there is one challenge that has taken precedence over the others, and that's team chemistry.

"You can work as hard as you can over the summer, but you can't construct team chemistry. Things may look good on paper, but we all have to be a team together. I hope that all of our guys can develop a bond of chemistry with each other this season," Jul"As coaches, we have the major challenge of making sure all of our guys are on the same page and that we are as ready as we possibly can be, come the start of the season."

With a new team and a new start, it's hard to have a lot of expectations. For coach Julius, if his team can come out and compete hard every game, that will be all he can ask for.

"I think that if we come together we can definitely contend as a playoff team this season," said Julius. "If we can do this, we will surely be able to cause problems for the other teams in our conference this season."

Although Julius has faced a ton of challenges already, there are always going to be things to look forward to.

"It's definitely been a long summer," Julius said. "I'm really just looking forward to finally being able to implement all of my strategy and planning that I have been working on in the off-season. I'm just really excited to get our season going and to be a part of the athletic excellence here at NAIT."



Although all of the other sports at NAIT are getting ready to start their new season, things are a little different for the badminton team.

Before the start of this season, some major changes took place that rocked the college world of badminton and thrust the entire sport into some uncertainty.

This summer, Mount Royal College decided to make the transition into a university. With this shift, Mount Royal also decided to join the CIS university league with all of its athletic teams.

Because the ACAC had only four teams last year, Mount Royal's departure from the ACAC meant that there would only be three teams returning to participate in the conference this season. Those teams were Concordia, Red Deer College and, of course, NAIT.

All is good for the three returning schools, right?

Hold on just one second.

ACAC bylaws state that sports must have a minimum of four institutions enrolled in the sport to have an official regular season. With this ruling, RDC decided to pull out of the ACAC as well, leaving only Concordia and NAIT in the badminton league for this upcoming season.

Ooks Mascot – \$900 per semester

The Ooks mascot is a pivotal position and requires a lot of enthusiasm. You will interact with the crowd with a high level of energy and entertainment. The person chosen must be good with kids and will be required to work part of every home game and a few special

Cameraman - \$900 per semester

Coach Paulus also filled some midfield gaps in the off-season. With a few key centre back positions locked down now, the team will definitely bring a stronger presence to the pitch this season.

Up front, he is more than impressed.

"When it comes to the players that we have up front, the team is the fastest I have seen in my eight years of coaching here at NAIT. Our offence will be scary for other teams in the conference."

Although the team is confident heading into the season, Paulus is aware that there will always be challenges but he is not stressed.

"I have incredible trust in our ability to recruit players in the off-season. We're taking our recruiting strategies very seriously and this helps us acquire players that are readily adaptable to any situation," Paulus said.

All of that being said, Paulus understands that this year's conference looks tougher than ever. So in that sense, one of the true tests of this season will be the challenge that the Ooks' opponents place upon them.

"As a team we feel good," Paulus said, "but we know our opponents feel good too!"

When asked about the leadership roles on a team surrounded by new recruits, coach Paulus was confident in his guys.

Good character guys

"Our team has an exceptional amount of good character guys, with many having the ability to step up and assume a leadership role. Our recruiting strategy has always been in place to help us avoid problems like leadership from the start," he said.

For a team looking to repeat at the national championships again this year, things are looking pretty solid. But Paulus knows there is one challenge for this season that will outweigh them all.

"As a team, we cannot get complacent," he said. "We've been to nationals two years in a row now, and this can play a huge part in a team's ability to stay motivated.

"We have to maintain our motivation throughout this season, if we are going to have success. But I know there will be 14 new players on our roster, hungry for a national championship. Those guys will definitely bring the motivation."

It's hard not to expect a national championship calibre team every year when your team has been a contender for the last couple of years. When Paulus was asked about his expectations for this season, his mentality has not changed.



"We expect every year that we are going to challenge and contend for a national title," he said. "Coming out of the ACAC conference, we have a great shot at making nationals. This year is not different than last year. We still have that same potential.

"As a team, we are just really excited to get our season going and to play our first game against MacEwan on Sept. 8," Paulus said. "We are just ready to test ourselves to see if we are really as good as we feel."






cruise control).

Whole hour of pure hilarity

As someone who has been a long time improv fan, I am ashamed to say that for whatever reason this Fringe would mark my first ever Rapid Fire Theatre performance. The joke is obviously on me as the performance of Gordon's Big Bald Head: Euripides ... You Pay Fo' Dese was an hour of pure hilarity.

The premise is simple and requires perhaps the most minimal stage production the Fringe has ever seen. Three talented improvisers (Jacob Banigan, Mark Meer and Chris Craddock), three chairs and a Fringe program. After an audience volunteer picks a random number the Fringe program is consulted and a random play is chosen. For the ninth and final performance Kenneth Brown's The Titanic is chosen.

E.J. Pratt poem

The Titanic is a Fringe play performed at La Cite Francophone by four Grant McEwan theatre grads based around the 1935 poem by Canadian E.J. Pratt. However, the Gordon's Big Bald Head version takes the story of the "unsinkable" ship to a whole other level.

The hilarious Craddock portrays a down on his luck E.J. Pratt, behind on rent and forced

to take a commissioned job to write a poem on the Titanic's voyage. He meets a man, one John Smith (played superbly by Banigan) who over several on the house drinks at a local pub recalls his time on the fateful journey. Mark Meer portrays the occasionally abusive bartender.

Along the way, with several flashbacks brilliantly interwoven, every actor portrays several characters with vary-

interest and eventually gets in with the creator ity. The show we attended was sold out, as were of the ship, who in a moment of sheer improvised brilliance is named Jerry Titanic.

Brilliant improvisation

Mark Meer is at his comedic best and Craddock brilliantly improvises some of the story's best moments but it is Banigan who steals the show. Banigan, who draws comparisons with a young Rowan Atkinson, brings a new level of physical humour to the show, including a brilliantly inspired insertion of himself into a hippopotamus anus. It should be noted this is likely the first time that the

Buffy the Vampire Slayer, Buck Rogers in the 25th Century and Sanctuary.



It's back to stand-up for Butt

EDMONTON (CUP) – While most are more familiar with Brent Butt's work on TV series such as *Corner Gas* and *Hiccups*, Butt himself is more accustomed to life as a "struggling nightclub comic." With both shows behind him now, Butt is returning to the familiar art of stand-up, with plans to build on his artistic ability through new projects that present fresh challenges but stay true to his comedic persona.

With years of writing comedy under his belt, Butt has no trouble coming up with funny material. And despite the contrast between the mediums of television and stand-up comedy, his experience as a lone stand-up writer helped strengthen his skills as a collaborative scriptwriter down the road.

"You develop a sense of what's funny and what people are going to laugh at because you have to rely on that when you're writing the show." Butt says.

"You're writing the jokes and hoping they're funny because there is no audience."

When all else fails, Butt resorts to the strategy that got his career rolling in the first place: simply being himself. Since generating stand-up material is derived largely from inner thoughts and personality quirks, Butt used his own natural timing and sense of humour to come up with material for his *Corner Gas* character, Brent Leroy. In fact, the sole distinguishing characteristic between him and his *Corner Gas* counterpart is the shape of their timepieces.

"The interesting thing about my character from *Corner Gas* is that he's basically identical to me," Butt muses.

"I didn't know how good of an actor I was so I thought I'd better make this character as close to me as possible – that way I'd know how to react to situations. I always said the biggest difference between Brent Butt and Brent Leroy was that he wears the square watch and I wear a round watch."

The fact that he relates so closely to his television character is why Butt doesn't mind being known for the show, even years after its cancellation. But content with its six-year run and the resulting legacy, Butt now prefers to look ahead his future endeavours.

"I had a certain fan base before *Corner Gas* and I have a much bigger fan base now because of the show. I still feel blessed about having the chance to do it; it changed my life completely, so I'm all good with it," Butt says.

With his higher profile to fall back on, Butt plans to take full advantage by tackling his biggest project yet. A fan of detective movies, he's now attempting to merge his passion for comedy and mystery into a feature film.

"It is a comedy but I intentionally wrote it, and we're going to shoot it, in a very realistic way so that if it wasn't funny, it would still work as a mystery and a thriller," Butt explains. "But a movie's a big, visual feast and you really have to know what you're doing, so I thought it was best that I don't direct."

Whether the film is successful or not, Butt's creative side will push him to continue moving forward with his comedy in one form or



another. For now, he's just hoping the audience will be willing to come along for the ride.

"I think if you concentrate on making a good product, that's all you can really control,"

Butt says. "So that's all I concern myself with: making sure that I'm happy and that I think it's funny, then cross my fingers and hope people like it"

Steps for locker safety



Locker thefts tend to be in, but not limited to, remote areas of the school and / or in low traffic areas. In many of these thefts, specific items are targeted, leading security personnel to believe that the perpetrators monitor the area before they strike. Once the thief or thieves spot a likely target they wait until the area is clear and then, by utilizing a small and easily hidden pair of bolt cutters, quickly cut the lock and remove the valuables. This crime can be committed and the thief can vacate the premises within a few seconds.

As lockers are used to store valuables while students attend class or perform job duties, it is important that they be well secured. The following provides a number of tips that should be followed to decrease the likelihood that you will become a victim of locker theft.

To reduce the chance of becoming a locker theft victim, follow these few tips:

- Purchase a high quality lock. The price of a quality lock is slightly higher, but its value is related to the value of the locker
 - Always fully engage the lock. For

combination types spin the dial to ensure it is secured. Tug on the lock before

- Do not bring any large sums of money or unnecessary valuables to school and store them in your locker. To do so is inviting unneeded
- Do not record your locker combination on, or about, the locker or the lock. For a key lock, keep the extra key with you in a safe
- Observe the people around you and know the people that have lockers around your locker
- If you observe suspected criminal activity, do not challenge them. But instead immediately proceed to the nearest telephone and inform Security.
- When you observe someone, other than a NAIT peace officer or security guard, using bolt cutters to cut a lock from a locker, contact a peace officer

If you see someone loitering near lockers or in the area, or taking an unusual interest in locker contents, be suspicious.

• Take note of their description, height,

approximate age and any identifying characteristics or markings.

• Report these to NAIT Protective Services. If you have information about a crime, contact Protective Services at 780-471-7477. If you wish to remain anonymous, contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477). You will remain anonymous, and if the information you provide leads to a conviction, you could eligible for a reward of up to \$2,000.

How to manage your time



TIMELY TIPS MARGARET MAREAN NAIT Student Counselling

Good time management is probably the most important factor for success at NAIT and in your future career. Getting into good habits now will help you manage the added stress of exams.

- **1. Define clear goals.** Set goals for the week, the day and your study session as well as longer term. Make sure your expectations are reasonable.
- **2.** Make a daily to-do list and prioritize it. Can you delegate or eliminate anything on the list? Always work on top priority items first.

- 3. Start by keeping track of how you spend your time now. Keeping track every hour for a couple of days can provide a lot of information about how you tend to waste time or procrastinate. Make a realistic schedule based on modifying, not completely changing, your current time usage.
- **4.** Use a weekly planning schedule. Allocate specific periods each day to study and stick to them. If you can study at the same time each day, your brain will automatically become more prepared for studying at that time and your study sessions will be more effective.
- **5. Review within 24 hours** take at least 15 minutes per course to highlight main points and jot down any questions about material you don't understand. Review again at the end of the week. This saves time because you will retain most of the information rather than having to relearn it.
- **6. Regular sleep** (at least seven hours a night), nutritious and regular meals and snacks, and regular exercise and relaxation times also help you to concentrate, learn and memorize more effectively.
- 7. Study in small blocks instead of long time periods. You will accomplish more if you

work in 20 to 30 minute blocks and take 10 minute breaks in between rather than studying for two to three hours straight without breaks. You will also find it easier to prevent procrastination when you are studying in smaller blocks.

- **8. Get organized** your binders, your study space, your locker, your living area ... an organized environment reduces stress and also helps your brain to organize information more effectively.
- 9. Monitor and control the amount of time you spend watching TV, on the Internet,

phoning or texting ... these activities can use up a lot of time without you realizing it.

10. Ask for help – get help from the classmates, instructors, the Tutorial Centre (Room A-133; free math, physics and chemistry tutoring), or hire a peer tutor (log into MyNAIT Student Portal, and click on "NAIT Peer Tutor Registry" under Resources). 

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MOVIE REVIEW

Prohibition in a little town

There have been plenty of entertaining 1920s gangster films set in the big city such as The Untouchables (Chicago) and Scarface (Havana/Miami) but Lawless shows us how small town America coped with prohibition.

Set in rural Virginia, the film is an entertaining, although at times slow moving, romp of excessive violence and humour.

Director John Hillcoat's (The Road) film sees the Bondurant brothers and the hilarious and adorable Cricket Pete running a successful bootlegging business in Franklin County, VA. After one of the brothers hires a new waitress from Chicago they begin to be hunted down by the brutally violent Special Agent Charlie Rakes.

The film features an all-star cast of Shia LaBeouf, Tom Hardy, Gary Oldman, Mia Wasikowska and Guy Pearce. LaBeouf is his usual awkward teenage self as younger Bondurant brother Jack and, while Jason Clarke puts in a strong performance as Howard, it's obvious from the start of the film this is the Tom Hardy show. His hilarious portrayal of indestructible but not all mentally there Forrest Bondurant draws the films biggest laughs, all of them at the character's expense. The ridiculous epilogue had the entire theatre in hysterics. Rivaling Hardy for best character in the movie is the always excellent Guy Pearce as the intense and violent Rakes.

Female leads Wasikowska and Jessica Chastain are humorous diversions from all the bloodshed as the love interests of LaBeouf and Hardy respectively.

Both relationships showcase the awkwardness and inadequacies of the two brothers in a humorous manner.

Gary Oldman turns in another adequate if slightly uninspiring performance as mobster Floyd Banner. It is still odd to see him not be the bad guy as he plays somewhat of an anti-hero.

Of course this is not Oldman's first on-screen turn with Hardy this year as the pair starred in the summer blockbuster *The* Dark Knight Rises. Their characters in the two films couldn't be

any more different.

Forrest Bonudrant probably has more in common with the portrayal of Bane in 1997's awful Batman and Robin than Hardy's turn as a much more intelligent version of the villain in Dark Knight Rises.

Both films, while wildly entertaining, suffer from being slow moving and taking a long time to get to the point. What Lawless lacks in over the top CGI effects and incomprehensible dialogue, it makes up for with witty banter and surprisingly exces-

The film is an adaption of the 2008 novel The Wettest Country In the World by Matt Bondurant about his grandfather and great uncles. The violent novel is adapted for the big screen by musician Nick Cave, who also wrote the soundtrack.

The entertaining *Lawless* is in theatres now and has done well with critics, even competing for the prestigious Palme d'Or at the 2012 Cannes Film Festival.

RECIPE

So you finally got up the courage to invite that special someone over for a date. Now what? You wouldn't go through all of that effort to impress them just so you could order in a pizza. You need a fail-safe recipe to blow the pants off of your date. Unless your mother was Julia Child, you need a recipe that is cheap, easy and oh so delicious. This easy faux carbonara recipe will warm their stomach and their heart. For you singles, save the leftovers and heat it up for lunch.

Ingredients

- 6 strips thick-cut bacon, chopped
- 1 onion, cut in half and sliced
- 6 mid-sized white mushrooms, sliced
- 1 boneless, skinless chicken breast, cubed

 - 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese, finely grated
 - Handful of walnuts, coarsely chopped


- Pasta of your choice, cooked to your liking

Method

- 1. In a large pan over medium heat, fry bacon and set aside
- 2. In the same pan over low heat, cook and reduce onion until soft, sweet, and golden brown. Set aside.
- 3. In the same pan on medium heat, saute mushrooms until browned. Set aside.
- 4. Saute chicken until cooked all the way through (juices from centre will run clear), seasoning with salt and pepper. Set aside.
- 5. In pan, combine cream and cheese stirring occasionally until reduced.
- 6. Reduce heat and add bacon, onion, mushrooms, and chicken to sauce. Stir and simmer for a few minutes to allow flavours to combine.
- 7. Stir in your cooked pasta, top with walnuts, and serve. Garnish with a sprig of parsley for added effect. Bon appetit!
