

Balanced budget?

The Alberta government's proclamation last Friday of a "balanced budget" may have some NAIT accounting students shaking their heads about just how these numbers are presented, noting that a \$2.6 billion operating surplus and nearly \$5 billion in new debt doesn't exactly present a province that's running in the black. The current projections for Alberta's debt sees \$21 billion by 2017 despite the record \$44 billion that the Alberta government will take in this year.

Leading up to the budget, Edmonton Mayor Don Iveson described himself as "cautiously optimistic," noting "We heard (in the throne speech) a recommitment to the city charter process and acknowledgement from the government that that's a direct working relationship with Edmonton and Calgary."

However, the budget underperformed for even the cautiously optimistic with Edmonton's interests in mind, with only \$667 million in Green Trip funding to share between Calgary and Edmonton. To put this into context, Edmonton requires \$365 million in funding to be on track to complete the southeast LRT line within budget by 2019.

Images of Edmonton's mayor with clear disappointment on his face circulated on the Internet with #SadDonIveson after the disappointing budget news. Thankfully, Tuesday, March 11 saw the government singing a different tune about LRT funding for Edmonton, with an additional \$400 million in grants and a 10-year, \$200 million inter-

est free loan in line for 2016. The loan was not an item that the City of Edmonton requested, with most funding coming in the form of grants and not expected to be repaid, but the loan does allow the project to move ahead.

Iveson says the city should be able to pay off what they owe either through future government grants or through cutting construction costs. If neither of those options transpire, however, the city will have to find \$200 million in their budget to repay the loan by 2026.

An item of serious concern to NAIT stakeholders was how the budget would treat our institution – last year's cuts to funding didn't skip over NAIT and the administration was forced to consider the possibility of increasing class sizes and cutting programs. In April 2013, staff members were asked to voluntarily leave to help alleviate some of the budgetary constraints as NAIT stoically attempted to shield students from the effects of the cuts.

With an average annual rate of inflation hovering near one per cent for the past two years, anything less than an inflation-matching increase would have forced NAIT further into a funding shortfall after a \$147 million dollar cut to post secondary funding in 2013. Thankfully on budget day, post secondary institutions saw no further cuts and a modest increase of 5.5 per cent. However, the increase in operating grants is still \$143 million (six per cent) less than what the Red-

ford government promised.

With Redford's approval rating continually dropping, Wildrose Party leader Danielle Smith remarked shortly after the speech to the throne: "They want politicians who say what they're going to do and then do what they say they're going to do ... Unfortunately, the premier continues to disappoint."

Further, nearly all of the additional grants are set aside for the creation of additional seats for post-secondary students, and therefore not available for assisting with operational costs of post-secondary institutions.

One area of government that saw an excellent increase in funding was the premier's own office, with a 9.2 per cent increase that is sure to be raising eyebrows after so much scrutiny has been on the premier's indulgent travel arrangements. Contextually, the \$1.3 million increase would see nearly 300 students through school next year at the J R Shaw School of Business at the current tuition rate. With only \$50 million to invest in maintaining post-secondary physical infrastructure next year, still \$25 million dollars less than before the budget cuts, it's unlikely the infrastructure could handle the extra students regardless.

Ukrainian turmoil

The conflict in Ukraine has been omnipresent in the news of late, especially with the escalation of Russia's forceful interest in the area of Crimea, but for one NAIT student, the conflict has hit much closer to home

Igor Chupin is an English as a Second Language student at NAIT and has spent the past year getting to know Edmonton while preparing for his Mechanical Engineering Technology application.

"It's hard, because at any time there could be a war, there's pressure because people don't want a war with Russia," Chupin explains. Some of his family is near Crimea, which is an autonomous republic within Ukraine, but they are currently weathering the conflict unscathed.

Ever changing

The situation in Ukraine is ever changing, which has lead many to question what exactly is going on. This brief and condensed timeline shows how a civil conflict evolved into an international crisis with Russia's attempted annexation and occupation of Crimea.

November 2013 – Ukraine's EuroMaidan stages protests immediately following President Yanukovich's announcement that a trade deal with the European Union has been abandoned in favour of closer ties with Russia. Images of bloodied protesters circulate on the Internet, garnering massive public support for the pro-EU EuroMaidan.

December 2013 – An estimated 300,000 protesters descend on Kiev's Independence Square and seize city hall on Dec. 1. On Dec 17 Russia President Vladimir Putin announced cheaper natural gas prices for Ukraine and a multi-billion dollar purchase of Ukrainian bonds.

Three killed

January 2014 - The Ukrainian parliament passes anti-protesting laws and within a week, three protesters are killed by either live ammunition or in confrontations with police as protests escalate. By the end of the month. Ukraine's Prime Minister resigns and parliament repeals the inflammatory anti-protest laws and amnesty is offered to arrested protestors if they leave the buildings they have occupied. Opposition activist Dymitro Bulatov is found after being allegedly tortured by a pro-Russian group for eight days.

February 2014 - On Feb. 16, protesters leave the buildings they had occupied and hundreds of arrested protesters are released in exchange. By Feb. 18, however, protesters took those buildings back and hundreds are injured and dozens killed in the protests. On Feb. 20, violence erupts once again despite a truce being called. Government snipers on rooftops shoot at the protesters and 70 die. On Feb. 21, President Yanukovich's powers are greatly reduced as parliamentarians and protesters agree to form a new government and

hold an early election. Jailed former Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko is to be released and Yanukovich flees Kiev.

Ukraine's parliament votes to remove Yanukovich from office and gives interim presidential powers to Oleksander Turchinov, causing pro-Russian protesters to assemble in Crimea. The interim government issues a warrant for Yanukovich's arrest and pro-Russian Aleksey Chaly is named Sevastapol's (a significant Crimean city) mayor as pro-Ukraine and pro-Russia protesters clash in the region and Russian soldiers drill near Ukraine's border By Feb. 27, pro-Russian activists seize government buildings in Crimea and the Crimean parliament sets May 25 as the referendum date for determining if they will remain a part of Ukraine. Ousted president Yanukovich is given refuge in southern Russia. On Feb. 28, armed men take control of the international airport and military airfield in Sevastopol and the interim Ukrainian government accuses the Russian government of aggression. Moscow responds that their military operations in Crimea are warranted due to previous agreements allowing their entry to protect Russian fleet positions in the Black Sea

March 2014 - The situation in Crimea worsens and local leadership turns to Putin for assistance, which through the upper house of Russia's parliament is approved and Putin is cleared to use military power in Ukraine. On March 2, as hundreds of Russian troops move into the Black Sea peninsula, Ukraine's new prime minister accuses Russia of declaring war with Ukraine. NATO alleges that Russia is threatening the peace and security of Europe, but Putin counters that his county will protect its citizens in Eastern Ukraine by all means necessary. On March 6, Crimea's parliament unanimously votes in favour of

joining Russia. Ukraine's interim government promptly deems the vote illegitimate.

Meanwhile at NAIT, Chupin weighs in on the conflict.

"Russia was always a part of Ukraine, I'm not a fan but we worked together. Eastern Ukraine shares a lot of economic (business)

When asked if he will return to Ukraine after completing his studies, Chupin softly says, "I came for a better future ... I hope to find that here?

Personal information exposed

Ontario university compromises application data of 56,000 students

WATERLOO (CUP) – Approximately 56,000 student applicants to the University of Waterloo (UW) had their personal information inadvertently exposed as a result of a technology glitch discovered in mid-February. Now, the university has some apologizing to do.

"We were very sorry that any applicant data was exposed," said Nick Manning, director of media relations and issues management at UW. "Information security is a high priority for us."

UW was informed by a prospective student on Feb. 18 that it was possible to view details from other students' applications in their online student information system. While the issue was discovered on Feb. 18, information had been open since Feb. 11. The university issued a mass e-mail to students on Feb. 21, explaining the incident.

According to Manning, due to an administrative error, a self-service option that should only be made available to staff had accidentally been turned on.

"Meaning that about 8,000 of our 56,000 applicants in the system were able to use the search function to look at other records," Manning explained.

For each of those records, an existing applicant could potentially view other applicants' information, such which high school they attended, test scores and prior academic achievements. However, according to Manning, no names were exposed in the glitch, only applicants' ID numbers.

"All of the applicants could only be identified by their ID number," Manning assured. "There was no financial, contact or health information potentially exposed."

However, for a number of graduate students applicants, the glitch potentially leaked the name institution and e-mail address of their referees. As a result, an additional 8,000 referees who were in the system also had their information exposed

Within 30 minutes of being notified of the glitch, Manning said the school's information technology department fixed the issue. In addition, UW also put new oversight procedures in place to make sure that there are further checks made to any changes within the system. The school will continue to monitor the online database to make sure that another incident does not occur. They also contacted Ontario's Information Privacy Commissioner who issued an e-mail statement explaining that they were "presently looking into the incident."

The privacy lapse also affected applicants for joint programs affiliated with UW, including Wilfrid Laurier University (WLU) and the University of Guelph.

Jessica Lalonde, a student at WLU's Brantford campus, had just applied for the tri-university history master's program

when she received the news of a possible identity breech. "I wasn't even going to apply to the program initially and then I finally did and I was like 'oh of course the second I apply to it something bad happens," she said.

> and I think they did what they could." Lalonde said that the incident would not have an impact on her decision to accept admission. Manning also noted that a majority of the applicants were generally co-operative and understanding.

"They reassured me it was limited exposure

"The vast majority of people who got back in touch with us were very grateful that they were informed and maybe wanted to know how their application was progressing," he said.

According to Kevin Crowley, the assistant vice-president of communications, public affairs and marketing at WLU, 126 graduate students at WLU were affected by the data error

"Both schools take the security of data very seriously," he said. "It's unfortunate that it happened in this case, but I believe that UW acted as quickly as they could on it."

Manning stressed that upon a thorough analysis of the database, no unusual activity occurred within the system over the period. This means that there is no indicator that anyone viewed another student's online

"To the best of our knowledge we are confident that there was no unusual activity," Manning said.

Head: Balance and time management! There is



Tell us about the most ridiculous or funny thing that you remember happening or a favourite memory you have of being an executive.



Do you have anything you want to say to your fellow Ooks?



CUP future uncertain

Student news service facina cash crunch

The world's oldest student news service is in danger after lack of funding forced the layoffs of 86 per cent of its staff. The Canadian University Press, of which the Nugget is an affiliate, has a history in Canada that spans 76 years, the introduction of a new Canadian flag, the Second World War, mult ple recessions and the movement into the digital journalism age.

The Canadian University Press launched an Indiegogo fundraising campaign on Feb. 28 in the hopes of raising \$50,000 to sustain critical operations for the next year. CUP provides services such as a lawyer for affiliate newspapers, national syndication for up-and-coming student journalists, employment to 18 student journalists, professional development conferences and advocacy

"CUP is the organization to call when you're in trouble, in crisis or in need of resources. It's the organization with a national network that can be activated in a matter of hours. Students from coast-to-coast will lose that link if CUP is unable to stabilize," reads the Indiegogo page.

This time, the national network has been activated in the interest of saving its own organization, pleading with alumni, current members and anyone who will listen to #keepCUPstrong via Twitter, press release and email. Previously, CUP has run in a deficit position but always had investments to rely on to see operations forward. Those investments are gone with the bankruptcy proceedings of Campus Plus, and as the only shareholder CUP was projected to run at a \$7,000 deficit for the year. "Our emergency response plan was effective in reversing the deficit," explained CUP President Erin Hudson. "It included steps such as cutting staff, cutting my salary, and office expenses like cell phones."

"We will now have a small surplus ... the problem is that we have no reserves," she continued. However, even if CUP's fundraising campaign is effective, the work isn't done to keep the organization afloat. "Raising the money gets us six months, maybe eight ... it's our responsibility to increase the surplus... even if we raise the the money, I think CUP needs to change." According to Hudson, warning signs of the funding issues showed up two years ago,

but the organization at the time did not act. "... we need to focus on rebuilding so we can continue our mission."

CUP alumni (affectionately called CUPpies) include media giants like Lisa Laflamme and public figures like Edmonton Mayor Don Iveson. CUP members also roam the halls of NAIT and are among NAIT's alumni. Radio and Television graduate and former Nugget editor

Nahreman Issa shared her experience at the 2008 Canadian University Press National Conference, saying

"I will always remember my CUP experience in

Ottawa in January 2008. I was the Sports Editor at the time, and I was quite excited to be able to go to all the sports seminars. And not just the sports one; I went to a few news seminars as well... I was most pumped for the seminar with Ian Mendes, who at the time was with Sportsnet. Being able to hear the ins and outs of his work days, how his journey came to be getting to a big network; it's such an eye opener. And the opportunity to chat afterwards is something not many people get the chance to do."

Now a news and sports anchor for Newcap News in Lloydminster. Issa also stresses the importance of in-person networking opportunities like the conferences the Canadian University Press organizes, "I know things have changed now with social media. At the time, I wasn't on Twitter. I know you can reach these journalists on there now, but there is something very different about relaying your message in 140 characters, or hearing them elaborate in person ... to see them get animated as they talk about their professions, their personal life and anything else people ask them about.

You can never underestimate the importance of networking. Social media isn't everything... you need to learn how to talk to people in person as in our career, we are constantly in communication with the outside

There were plenty of blockbuster trades made, including the swap of team captains in New York and Tampa Bay and plenty of smaller trades that may have more of an impact than you might think.

In what shocked the hockey world, the Marty St. Louis for Ryan Callahan trade stole the spotlight on trade day. Or maybe even the different gear you get to wear compared with the other players. Either way, I thought it was something I always wanted to try. So I gave it a shot this week. And knowing me, I only learn from the best and by the best, I mean two-time Ooks' gold medallist goalie Jill Diachuk and her coach, Kristen Sugiyama.

I had previously learned how to skate when I was young but my figure skates just wouldn't cut it for goalie skates that I had to put on. The look of the skates seemed wider than the other ones I've seen, but I wasn't fazed by it. After the skates were tied up, it was time to put on the goalie pads. The butterfly save is where you bend your knees in to a point where you fall to the ice and your shins hits the ice. It was harder than I thought it would be. I'm not going to lie, I got to a point where I just couldn't get up, so I just laid there for bit to recuperate ... and cue that Snow Patrol song (If I lay here, if I just lay here ...) But after a few cracks at it, I could finally get up with no help. All I really had to do was lift one knee and use force to get the other leg up as well.

Of course, there's more to being a goalie than just that. There are movements as well. First, the goalie shuffle, where you literally use your skates to scrape the ice while shuffling. That was

Even though goaltending may not be the easiest job on the ice, "if you let in a goal, then everyone looks at you." Kristen said. On the other hand, it certainly has its upside as well.

"But if you make the biggest save, then you're a hero," she said.


Oil Kings remain in first

the 1993 Buffalo Bandits for best start to a season after beating the Toronto Rock last week. Not only was the record on the minds of the players and the fans, but so was the added motivation of having the Dallas Cowboy Cheerleaders in attendance.

The game started out just the way the Rush had envisioned it, as they scored twice in the opening two minutes. Curtis Knight

scored less than five minutes later, giving the home town team had an early three goal advantage. The Stealth were quick to

respond with a marker of their own, but were still down 3-1 after 15 minutes.

The tables were flipped in the second quarter, as the Stealth defence roared to life, and they began to chip away at the Rush lead. Even after getting the record breaking win, Rush head coach Derek Keenan wasn't thrilled with how his team played. "Our fundamentals were brutal," he said. "We missed shots, missed nets, made bad passes. They outran us and outplayed us in a lot of areas."

here is a small group of enthusiastic young filmmakers in Edmonton called The House of Heathens. They already made a bunch of crazy short movies (that you can check out online) and as one of their latest work got standing ovation and acclaim all around the world, they are currently working on its feature film version.

Alfred Hitchcock said that you need three things for a great movie: "the script, the script. the script." Another famous saying among lowbudget movie makers states the "three Bs" of a successful film: "blood, boobs and a beast." These guys have the script and the movie will feature rivers of fake blood scores of naked ladies and mobs of evil monsters.

However, before you start shooting, you need a horse of another colour: money. So they are going to hold a fundraiser this Friday (March 14) but I don't want to spoil the great interview that Kevin Martin and Tim Rutherford gave us. Kevin is Western Canada's own horror-pope, owner of The Lobby DVD shop, co-founder of DEDFest and screenwriter/star of The Last Video Store while Tim is the director, special effects artist, set designer, production manager and the "brain" behind The House of Heathens

Nugget: What is House of Heathens exactly?

Tim Rutherford: It's a creative production company that started as just a bunch of friends with an interest in film production, cohabiting in a house hilariously owned by the church next door. My partner in crime is the infamous Cody Kennedy. Along with Josh Lenner, our actor, we are the three original Heathens. We've been lucky enough to pick up some awesome new talent over the years – local musicians, other filmmakers that share our vision and awesome local video-store owner and all-around rad guy Kevin Martin, who is my co-writer as well. You really can't get far without pals like that.

Kevin Martin: As far as the feature movie goes, we have my DEDFest partners Derek Clayton and Matthew Novak - they are part of the producing side. I could rattle off about 15 to 20 other names now as the group is getting bigger and bigger but the above mentioned are the main pieces

N: What kind of films you have done?

Tim: They're throwback '80s sci-fi action movies with an element of horror. We love Hong Kong action movies, so we try to throw in a bit of the surrealistic element that is so prevalent in many of those.

Kevin: Since I've been involved all the shorts are tributes to video stores. But we decided to make it more original instead of the usual "hard to keep the business going because of money situation, Netflix and downloading." We jack it up a little bit and blame it all on robotic monsters and evil armies trying to shut me down because I'm obsolete and can no longer be around. So we fight the good fight to keep the store going!

Nugget: What achievements you have reached with these films so far?

Kevin: It all started as just some fun to do but The Last Video Store short got picked up for Fantasia Film Festival in Montreal, which is the biggest genre film festival in North America. It went over pretty well there so. after, it got picked up by another dozen film fests. So my odd-looking face has now been seen in places like Texas, Chicago, New York City, Amsterdam, England and all across Canada. The buzz is been really positive.

Another short film we did last year called M is for Magnetic Tape was part of the competition for the "ABC's of Death part 2" (Editor's note: It's a highly anticipated horror anthology involving 24 world famous genre film directors with a free spot for one lucky "newcomer"). We didn't win that one but we got the silver medal and our short is being picked up for the "ABC's Of Death 1.5" which will be playing this year in selected theatres and coming out video on demand. That's kind of neat!

Tim: I also got nominated for the AMPIA Costume Design award in 2013 for Night of the Tree Beast, which was pretty cool!

Nugget: When did the idea of the featurelength version of The Last Video Store shown

and got all the positive feedback from people in the actual film industry. Producers and actors who have seen it said "this is really good stuff and you guys shot it with no money; you should do a feature film!" We have tossed the idea around for almost two years

now. We'd gone through 10 different scripts before Tim and myself hammered out the one that we feel could make a 90-minute movie. People always ask: "you guys are going to be in the store for 90 minutes?" No, absolutely no. We want to show the fantastic world outside the last video store. This is not going to be *Clerks*; this is going to be a fantasy, adventure, sci-fi, "Bill and Ted" kind of buddy-comedy with just a bunch of crazy monsters and ridiculous shenanigans. It's our tribute and love letter to bad 1980s and early '90s direct-to-VHS

We're just hoping that we can make video stores live forever in this one movie because we are trying to strike while the iron's hot and

Tim: The movie is going to be pretty much exactly what you'd expect, along with everything you don't. Prepare for a fast-paced action adventure full of villainous robots, atom age wizards, inter-dimensional intrigue, magic, mayhem, and of course our trademark magnetic tape!

Nugget: To help financing this project you are going to hold a fundraiser...

Tim: We are waiting to hear back about the TELEFILM micro-budget grant, which

> we're shortlisted for. If we get selected, we'll be awarded up to \$120,000, which is much more than we ever planned to make our first movie for.

> Kevin: Yes, we are hoping for government grants but in the meantime we have to build a fake location for the video

store as you might not know but I'm located below a daycare centre and we really can't set fires or blow stuff up here as its bad for business and the kids upstairs, haha!

And know this: no matter how much you donate, if you pick up a DVD, you just contributed at least a light bulb to one of our lightning gears that is going to shine the set for The Last Video Store!

Sam Mendes, who recently gave us Skyfall, has only made a handful of films. In 2002, he gave us his follow-up to American Beauty. It's called Road to Perdition and over a decade later. I think the film is massively underrated.

Based on the graphic novel by Max Allan Collins, it follows a boy, Michael (played by Tyler Hoechlin) and his father, Michael (played by Tom Hanks) during the Great Depression. We start in Rock Island, Illinois, where young Michael has

a sort of distant relationship with his father, never knowing exactly what it is he does for a living.

One night, young Michael sneaks into his father's car at night as he goes to "work" with another man. They drive to a warehouse and young Michael sneaks his way to the outer wall and peers in through a hole to see what's happening. And what hap-

pens is Michael Sr. and Connor shoot and kill three men

Michael Jr then realizes his father is an assassin for John Rooney, the local crime boss (played by Paul Newman in his final screen performance).

Without spoiling anything, I'll say that Michael Sr. and Jr. end up on the road together to Chicago while being pursued by a number of parties. And it's then that the heart of the movie appears.

Road to Perdition is a film about a father and son bonding through a violent and harrowing few weeks.

crime films sometimes are ones that are almost trying not to be crime films, trying to be dramas or something not tied to a genre, as this film does. Well, along with being a touching drama about a father and son, it also happens to be a terrific gangster film.

There's an outstanding cast at work here, led by Hanks, featuring pre-Bond Daniel Craig as a great sleazebag, Stanley Tucci as real-life gangster Frank Nitti, Paul Newman and standing out is Jude Law.



What is fraud? Fraud is a wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain.

According to the RCMP's Commercial Crime Branch, fraud-related offences are now thought to be as profitable as drug-related offences, estimated at between \$10 and \$30 billion annually in Canada. The majority of these crimes aren't committed by kids at their computers, 80 per cent or more of the work is conducted by criminal organizations.

Here are a few protection tips:

Payment cards (credit and debit)

- Periodically check your credit report, bank and credit card statements. Report irregularities promptly.
- Don't lose sight of your credit and debit cards during transactions.
- · Shield your PIN when using your debit or credit card
- Memorize all PINs. Do not write them on the cards
- Change your PIN regularly. It's recommended that it be done every month.

Mail

- · Shred personal and financial information before putting it in the garbage.
- Protect your mail. Deposit outgoing mail in post office boxes and remove mail from your mailbox promptly.
- If you are unable to pick up your mail, have someone pick it up for you.

E-mail and online

- Create strong passwords to protect your accounts and change them often.
- Spyware may be sent as an attachment in an e-mail. Do not open e-mails from people you don't know.
- Check out the privacy and security settings of your social network and use them to control who sees what.
- If someone you don't know tries to "friend" you, ignore it. There's no way to be sure they are who they say they are.

- Before posting pictures, think about whether or not they're appropriate or give away too much information.
- Make sure your computer has a firewall, anti-spyware software and virus software.
- Don't give away person information to a stranger during online chatting.
- Be wary of online contests ... especially if you're asked for money up front.

How can I recognize a scam?

- If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is, such as:
- You've won a big prize in a contest that you don't recall entering.
- You're offered a once-in-a-lifetime investment that offers a huge return.
- You're told that you can buy into a lottery ticket pool that cannot lose.
 - You must pay or you can't play.
- "You're a winner!" but you must agree to send money to the caller in order to pay for delivery, processing, taxes, duties or some other fee in order to receive your prize.
- You must provide private financial information
- The caller asks for all your confidential banking and credit card information. Honest businesses do not require these details unless you are using that specific method of payment.
 - Will that be cash ... or cash?
- Often criminal telemarketers ask you to send cash or a money order, rather than a cheque or credit card. Cash is untraceable and can't be cancelled. And, crooks also have difficulty in establishing themselves as merchants with legitimate credit card companies.
 - The caller is more excited than you are.
- The crooks want to get you excited about this "opportunity" so that you won't be able to think clearly
- It's the manager calling. The person calling claims to be a government official, tax officer, banking official, lawyer or some other person in authority.

- The stranger calling wants to become your best friend.
- Criminals love finding out if you're lonely and willing to talk. Once they know that, they'll try to convince you that they are your friend
- It's a limited opportunity and you're going to miss out.
- If you are pressured to make a big purchase decision immediately, it's probably not a legitimate deal. Real businesses or charities will give you a chance to check them out or think about it.
- · Warning: Your computer may be infected by a virus. Take preventative action now! The virus scam has grown to epidemic proportions in Canada, now accounting for between 70 and 80 per cent of frauds reported daily to the Canadian Anti Fraud Centre (CAFC). Allowing someone to remotely access your computer is extremely dangerous and can leave you vulnerable to a variety of frauds. If a service provider calls and offers to upgrade your computer's anti-virus software, be extremely cautious. It's most likely a scam.

Dating and romance scams

Despite many legitimate dating websites operating in Canada, there are many dating and romance scams as well. Dating and romance scams try to lower your defences by appealing to your romantic and compassionate side.

Warning signs

- · You meet someone on an Internet dating website and their profile picture is different from their description or looks like it's from a magazine.
- After just a few contacts they profess strong feelings for you and suggest moving the conversation away from the website to e-mail, instant messaging or phone instead.
- After gaining your trust, they tell you an elaborate story and ask for money, gifts or bank account or credit card details
 - They continue to ask you for money but

never actually visit you.

- If you don't send money straightaway their e-mails and calls will often become more desperate, persistent or direct.
- The e-mail is poorly written, vague or contains information from news articles. It may repeat itself, addresses you by the wrong name, or the e-mail is not personally addressed.

Remember

- · Check website addresses carefully. Scammers often set up fake websites with very similar addresses to legitimate dating websites.
- Never send money or give credit card or online account details to anyone you don't
- Don't give out any personal information in an e-mail or when you are chatting online.
- Make sure you only use legitimate and reputable dating websites.
- Ask yourself, would someone I have never met really declare their love for me after only a few letters or e-mails?

What to do

- 1. Act immediately. Report the incident.
- 2. Notify creditors and financial institutions immediately.
- 3. File a report with the Edmonton Police Service or the RCMP.
 - 4. Cancel credit and debit cards.
- 5. Check your credit file with both credit bureaus (Equifax and Trans Union).
- 6. Report fraudulent activities to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre:
 - a. www.antifraudcentre.ca
 - b Toll Free: 1-888-495-8501

If you have information about a crime, contact Protective Services at 780-471-7477. If vou wish to remain anonymous, contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477). You will remain anonymous and, if the information you provide leads to a conviction, you could eligible for a reward of up to \$2,000. Please visit www.nait.ca/security for more information.

Given the ease with which information can be accessed, as well as the myriad of social networks available, it can sometimes be confusing to find exactly the information you are looking for. If you are wanting ways to stay informed and find out about mental health on the fly, hopefully this list will keep you in the loop and on top of current issues!

DJs and producers as well as several other artists, including painters and glassblowers.

The amazing thing about these shows is the vibe surrounding them and its constant expansion and growth. The amazing vibe becomes more and more like a music festi-

val with each show that happens. You start seeing the same people, develop friendships within the community, get to know the same vendors who come to each show and see the unbelievable impact of each one.

Celtic Bass is sure to be another classic installment in the string of amazing shows to be put on by Zodiac Series, which shows no sign of slowing down.
