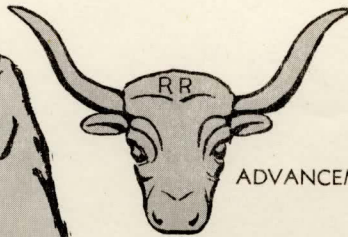


BUCK - A - ROOS

CHARTERING

The process for chartering with the National Royal Rangers office is the same as with other Royal Rangers units. Charter application forms and information may be obtained from the National Royal Rangers office.

INSTRUCTION

The Buck-A-Roo program is church-related, instructing and challenging boys in the areas of Bible study, church indoctrination, moral conduct, and Christian service.

EVANGELISM

Royal Rangers is proving an ideal way to reach boys for Christ. Reports indicate that over 8,000 boys were won for Christ through the program last year. We believe the Buck-A-Roos will provide even greater opportunities to reach additional boys.

ROYAL RANGERS HAS JUST launched a new program for seven- and eight-year-old boys. It is called Buck-A-Roos.

Buck-A-Roos is a junior auxiliary to the regular Royal Rangers program. It has the same goals and emphases as the other age divisions in Royal Rangers—to reach, teach, and keep boys for Christ—but on a more simplified basis. It features a western theme which is a favorite for boys at this age level.

Buckaroo was the first name given to the American cowboy. It was adapted from *vaquero*, the Spanish word for cowherd. The name *cowboy* was not used until the cattle drives after the Civil War.

UNIFORMS

The Buck-A-Roos do not have a complete uniform as do the other Royal Rangers. However, they are provided with colorful Buck-A-Roo neckerchiefs, neckerchief slides, and advancement pins.

HANDBOOKS

An exciting *Buck-A-Roo Handbook* is available for boys, and an informative *Buck-A-Roo Leader's Handbook* for men.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

The organizational structure is the same as the regular Royal Rangers program. The group is called an outpost, the leader is an outpost commander, and his assistant is a lieutenant commander. The outpost is divided into two or more patrols with a boy leader, called a guide, over each.
